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Aldhouse extradition Maid throat slasher delayed

THE move to have British murder suspect Lee Aldhouse extradited from the UK back to Phuket took a step backward this week after the Phuket Public Prosecutor's Office returned the case file to Chalong Police for more DNA evidence, the Gazette has learned.

Mr Aldhouse, 28, is wanted for the August 14 stabbing murder of 23-year-old American Dashawn Longfellow in Rawai.

Despite an island-wide manhunt, Mr Aldhouse managed to flee the island and then Thailand.

He was arrested by authorities at Heathrow Airport as he tried to enter the UK.

A Metropolitan Police spokesman told the press, "He was wanted on a warrant for recall to prison and has been returned to the prison service."

Phuket Provincial Prosecutor Tawan Sukyiran told the Gazette that he sent the case file back to the investigating officers with a request for DNA evidence from the alleged murder weapon, a bloodstained knife found about 500 meters from where Mr Longfellow was stabbed in his rented room at the Ya Nui Paradise resort.

EMOTIONS ran high in Thalang as local villagers and relatives of Sunee Premprasert, the maid whose throat was slashed by an intruder, reacted angrily to the August 27 re-enactment of her murder.

Mrs Sunee, 43, was stabbed some 80 times before her throat was slit and she was left to die bleeding on the floor at the home where she worked, said the police report.

The attack on July 22 was captured on CCTV cameras inside the home, an upscale residence near Sirinat National Park surrounded by cleared land.

The suspect, whose face was shown clearly in the CCTV footage, wore a balaclava during the re-enactment.

He remains unnamed by police as he is 17 years old, not in his early thirties as initially estimated.

Brought to the scene by Phuket Provincial Police Commander Pekad Tantipong and Tah Chat Chai Police Superintendent Sakchai Limcharoen, the youth *Continued on Page 2* | was protected from the angry

Also present were Sunee's cousins and village neighbors.

Police arrested the youth in Krabi on August 26. Officers at the re-enactment identified him only as a Thalang resident and a former student at Phuket Technology College with the nickname "Phee Dib" (Zombie).

After the murder, he fled to his cousin's house in Tambon Klongphon, in Klong Thom District, the youth told police.

Sai Khao District Police moved in and arrested him at the nearby Klongphon sports field.

During the re-enactment, he related how the murder unfolded. He pointed to the bathroom

window he scaled to gain access to the home, as well as the outdoor kitchen where Sunee was murdered.

He also pointed out some of the CCTV cameras around the house that he had destroyed.

Turtle meat exorcism lifts sea gypsy spirits

SEA gypsies in Rawai held a ceremony on Mai Thon Island on August 25 to exorcise evil from turtle meat and seek forgiveness from their guardian spirit.

They were looking to appease spirit Balai Da Toe after two fellow sea gypsies died from food poisoning in June after eating Hawksbill turtle meat.

Many others fell seriously ill,

The ceremony on Mai Thon Island last week involved the release of three sea turtles, and took place at a shrine to Balai Da Toe.

workers reportedly said that while the poisonings of the sea gypsies were unprecedented in Phuket, they suspected toxins might have accumulated in the turtle's flesh due to its diet, which includes

"We believe the turtle was caught in this area and thus under the spiritual protection of Balai Da Toe. From now on the sea gypsies in Rawai will refrain from eating the flesh of any sea turtle species," said Shaman Hari.

This will come as good news to the local office of the Department of Marine and Coastal Resources (DMRC), which operates the Phuket Marine Biological Center on Cape Panwa. The DMRC provided the three Hawksbill turtles used in the ceremony as well as the boat used to transport the group to the island.

Paitoon Panchaiphum, head of the regional DMCR office in Phuket, said the ceremony would lift the sea gypsies' spirits.

The DMCR has an uneasy relationship with the community, whose poverty and traditional way of life often puts them in direct conflict with the marine conservation laws the agency is sworn to uphold.

The knife, found between Freedom Bar and Ya Nui Paradise, has since been confirmed as not one of two stolen from a nearby 7-Eleven store, where CCTV images of Mr Aldhouse were recorded.

The knife is now being examined by Forensics Police at Police Region 8 headquarters in Surat Thani, Mr Tawan said.

The DNA results were expected to be added to the case file no later than September 3, Mr Tawan said, after which time he will forward the case to the Office of the Attorney General (OAG) in Bangkok, the International Affairs Office of which will be responsible for contacting their British counterparts to request extradition.

Aldhouse extradition delayed

Mr Tawan declined to say what the main charge against Mr Aldhouse will be, or even confirm that the case will in fact be pros-

He did say, however, that Mr Aldhouse will likely face assault charges against his girlfriend, whom he allegedly beat while she was asleep in bed. That incident

was sometime before the night of the stabbing.

Mr Aldhouse's girlfriend, from the northeast province of Udon Thani, was questioned by Chalong police on September 1, the Ga-

The assault left the woman with bruises on her face, broken ribs and damaged kidneys, Mr Tawan said.

Mr Aldhouse also faces a lesser charge of theft from the 7-Eleven store, he added.

Whether Mr Aldhouse will be charged with premeditated murder or a lesser charge could play a key factor in whether he can be extradited back to Thailand.

Like many European countries, the UK does not extradite in cases where a conviction could result in the death penalty.

Arson considered in pawnshop inferno

POLICE have not ruled out arson in a pre-dawn blaze that gutted a Phuket pawnshop warehouse on August 30.

No one was reported as injured in the fire, although it took five firetrucks 30 minutes to extinguish the inferno on Sri Sena Rd in Rassada.

An initial investigation suggests that an electrical short circuit might have started the fire, but the shop had been the target of arson attempts in the past, said Phuket City Police duty officer Sien Kaewthong.

Keen competition for customers among the many pawnshops on the island might have been a motive for arson, he added.

He will forward the case to police arson investigators, who are expected to question Sadayen "Bang Yen" Merteria, the owner of the warehouse, he said.

The fire was reported at 2am. Among those responding to the call were firefighters from Phuket City and Koh Kaew, who had difficulty accessing the flames that were largely contained within the structure.



Fueling the blaze were oil-filled drums, paper, plastics, wood and gas cylinders.

Windy conditions helped the fire to spread, and fueling the blaze were a large variety of flammable materials, including oil-filled drums, paper, plastics, wood and gas cylinders that sent out echoing booms as they exploded.

An inspection of the warehouse

found extensive damage, including a scorched six-wheel truck, valued at an estimated 500,000 baht, parked inside.

Bang Yen was not present at the time of the fire, though some of his employees were asleep in the area at the time. – *Phuket Gazette*

He retraced his steps through the house, showing where he pocketed 500 baht in cash and a mobile phone, the only valuables he could find in the house to steal.

He also explained what motivated the attack. The youth said he drank a few cans of beer before riding past the house. Stopping at the front, he threw a few empty cans at the gate.

Mrs Sunee told him off as he rode away, but her admonishments angered him into returning and entering the house by climbing over a fence into the maid's quarters bathroom.

The two argued at the back kitchen for about 20 minutes be-

fore Sunee told him to climb back over the fence, even placing a ladder there for him.

That's when he started stabbing. He stopped only after slicing her throat, he said.

He then spent the next two hours walking around inside the house before Ms Khwanjai returned home.

"He was not afraid of being caught because I arrived home about 8:30pm and he was still inside," Ms Khwanjai said.

"I knew something bad had happened, so I drove away from the house and called the police,"



Mayor Aroon told the Gazette that Rawai Municipality already provided 30,000 baht each year to each of the four mosques in Rawai to support their Ramadan activities.

From the 30,000 baht provided, each of the four mosques sends one person annually to complete the Hajj pilgrimage to Mecca. - Sitthipong Nongkaew

Local effort top priority for beaches

CONCERNED by the deteriorating state of the nation's beaches, the Pollution Control Department (PCD) has announced plans to launch a program aiming to teach coastal communities the importance of protecting their beaches.

The announcement follows the release of a PCD survey of 233 beaches throughout 18 provinces earlier this month.

PCD Deputy Director-General Worasart Apaipong expressed his concern about the poor quality of beaches and the toll of destructive activities: "Wastewater discharges are the main threat to beaches, and in many places, untreated wastewater has been



released into the sea, leading to poor quality sea water."

Mr Worasart said officials will concentrate more on improving the environmental condition of low-rated beaches in an effort to raise their rating in the next beach survey.

The PCD Deputy shared his strategy. "The local community is key to fixing beaches. We are devising incentives for coastal communities to work harder in protecting beaches," he said. The announcement bears special importance to Krabi province, which had two of its beaches bestowed a "five-star" ranking in the survey, from a total of just six

nationwide. The two five-star beaches in Krabi were Ao Bi Leh (also known as Ao Pilay) at Koh Hong and Koh Rok off the coast of Koh Lanta.

The other five-star beaches were Koh Samsao and Ao Kha beaches in Surat Thani, Lidi beach

in Satun, and Tai Muang beach in Phang Nga.

The survey criteria was based on how well the beaches adhered to the strict guidelines on environmental protection; pollution management; conservation of natural resources; and tourism management.

What stands out about the Krabi beaches that received acclaim are that both are located within National Park boundaries, with no human settlement nearby.

In contrast, Ao Nang beach, one of Krabi's most developed tourist destinations, is increasingly gaining a reputation for its water pollution, rubbish and tuk-tuk drivers.

The overall findings from the PCD survey reflect the general deterioration of beaches throughout the entire country; litter, pollution from diesel engines and waste water discharges are constantly increasing and are damaging beaches nationwide.

Convention center to be ready 2014

WORK on a world-class conference and exhibition center in Phuket should begin next year and be ready to open by mid-2014, attendees at recent public hearings on the project have been told.

Two days of public feedback meetings over the proposed Phuket International Convention and Exhibition Center (Phuket-ICEC), planned for the island's northern tip, met with no serious opposition, but some concerns over environmental impact and infrastructure needs were voiced.

The first hearing took place on August 24 at the Mai Khao Tambon Administration Organization offices near the Tah Chat Chai checkpoint. This was followed by a gathering at The Metropole hotel in Phuket Town the next day.

About 100 participants from various government agencies, elected bodies and members of the public took part in each session.

Presenting both groups with the proposed project design and draft environmental impact assessment (EIA) report was Prasit Suebchana and his consulting team from King Mongkut's Institute of Technology, Ladkrabang campus.

Mr Prasit, currently deputy director-general of the Treasury Department, served as head of the Phuket Treasury Office for six years, from 1998 to 2003, and is a key project advisor.

The 150-rai plot of state land where the project is to be built, behind Tha Chat Chai School, is administered by the Treasury Department's State Property Management and Services Office, or Ratchapassadu.

Under the current design, the 2.6-billion-baht center would include a convention hall, exhibition hall, 200-room hotel and a 100-

room accommodation facility for government officers and staff.

Although everyone taking part in the hearings agreed in principle with the project, concerns were raised over a variety of issues.

center would sit idle for long periods between events. "It is impossible to have events all year round, so the consultants should add some entertainment and a shopping facilities for locals and tourists. This would keep the center active all year long," said one participant.

Mr Prasit said all of these factors had been considered.

The airport, Thailand's second busiest, is 10 kilometers south of the proposed site.

As for environmental protection, existing mangroves in the area would be preserved as a barrier against tsunami waves. Different species of mangrove vegetation could also be labeled for the area to serve as an educational and recreational area, he said

As for public utilities, Mai Khao villagers worried about water shortages would be glad to know that a water supply system to be built as part of the project would be shared with their community, he added.

On the financial front, funding has been approved and both Finance Minister Korn Chatikavanij and his deputy Man Pattanotai want work to begin as soon as possible.

Mr Prasit added that after the hearing all of the comments and concerns voiced would be added to the EIA report, which will then be forwarded to the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environment (MNRE) for approval.

Once the EIA has been approved, the next step would be to consult with executives from existing Thai conventions centers in order to gain from their experience and expertise in large convention center design and management. After that, architectural design work could begin and construction bid plans drawn up.

Mr Prasit said he expected the construction contract to be signed in mid-2011, with the work completed about three years later.

Saving scrap to save lives Dems sweep Bangkok polls to save lives

A POLICE officer in Phitsanulok has resorted to collecting scrap plastic while on duty to raise money for surgery on his two sick children, Khao Sod reports.

Sen Sgt Maj Thanat Chiang Saen's 10-year-old daughter needs an artificial stomach, which must be replaced every year. His fiveyear-old son needs major heart surgery.

He and his wife Jiraphan have spent more than 200,000 baht in savings on hospital fees and had to sell 10 rai of land belonging to Maj Thanat's mother and borrow money from the Police Cooperative Bank and from unofficial lenders.

Today the couple owe more than two million baht and need another 80,000 baht to pay for his son's heart surgery.

Maj Thanat tearfully told Khao Sod he earns 14,900 baht a month, but for the past two years hasn't had a single baht left after loan repayments are made.

Every day, Maj Thanat collects rubbish while on patrol and exchanges it, making about 100 baht a day, he said.

AROUND THE nation

THE ruling Democrat Party swept to victory in the Bangkok municipality and district council elections on August 29, comfortably beating opposition Pheu Thai Party in both polls.

The yellow-shirt New Politics Party (NPP) failed to win a single seat, despite predictions it would "split the vote" with the Democrats.

The Democrats won 45 of 61 seats in the Bangkok Metropolitan Council (BMC) and 210 of 256 seats in the capital's District Councils, while Pheu Thai won 15 seats in the BMC and 39 District Council seats.

An independent candidate won a BMC seat in Laksri District, while seven independents won District Council seats.

The Bangkok Election Commission estimated voter turnout at 41 15%

The Democrat victory follows the party's Bangkok by-election win last month, when Panich Vikitsreth beat Pheu Thai candidate Kokaew Pikulthong to a seat in parliament.

Ong-art Klampaibul, a minister and elections adviser to the Democrat Party, cautioned that the result

did not necessarily reflect what would happen in a national general election.

> Voters paid more attention to individual candidates in local elections, while they looked at parties in the general election, he said.

> Pheu Thai Party deputy leader Plodprasop Surassawadi said his

party lost partly because of the red-shirt protests.

"Bangkokians always think about the burning of the city," he said.

Mr Plodprasop added that the "silent majority" not coming out to vote was another reason for the defeat.

NPP Secretary-General Suriyasai Katasila blamed his party's dismal showing on low voter turnout and "the fact the party did not cheat".

The party would have won some seats if voter turnout reached 60% to 70%, he said.

Meanwhile, Bangkok Metropolitan Administration (BMA) Permanent Secretary Charoenrat Chutikarn, who was in charge of the election, promised an investigation into why voter turnout was not higher.

One of the reasons was that the candidates did not campaign sufficiently to encourage the public to exercise their right to vote, he said.

He also blamed the poor weather, insisting the BMA had tried its best to get voters to the poll.

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Thepthai gets more than a load

THEPTHAI Senpong, Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva's forthright spokesperson, received a parcel full of excrement in the post on August 30, Kom Chad Luek reports.

The parcel arrived at Democrat Party headquarters at 10am and was reportedly sent straight to Mr Thepthai's office without examination by security staff.

Inside the box was an envelope and a plastic bag. Mr Thepthai opened the envelope to read the letter, while another official opened the bag.

As soon as the bag was opened a stench engulfed the room and excrement spurted out onto the official's hands.

The letter was reportedly from "The Northern Isaan Association, Kumphawaphi District, Udon Thani Province."

It read: "I've sent you a letter to praise you for being a loyal dog for your owner. I notice someone has sent you a muzzle. I think this is a bit inconvenient for you, so I'm sending you a little bit of excrement for you to eat. Dogs like to eat excrement. If you've eaten it and you want to eat more, please go ahead and get the most out of life. The day I see you in northern Isaan is the day you die, you son of a bitch. Isaan people want to kick you in the mouth. Yours, Kan Muangkum."

Mr Thepthai said that the incident was just people who see things differently expressing themselves and that he was not bothered by it.


He understood that in doing his duty he sometimes hurt this group of people, but that everybody should respect each other in performing their duties, and accept non-violent modes of expression.

Mr Thepthai, who serves as an MP for the southern seat of Nakhon Sri Thammarat, has been fiercely criticized both within and outside the Democract Party for his outspoken comments.

In February 2010 he was quoted by Matichon as comparing former premier Thaksin Shinawatra to the owner of a dog farm and his red-shirt supporters to dogs.

In July 2010 he came under pressure to resign after claiming the red shirts had set up training bases where recruits were taught to use weapons.

Authorities denied Mr Thepthai's claims and the comments reportedly earned the displeasure of PM Abhisit.

Look twice before making a U-turn

PLANS to introduce an "experimental" U-turn lane for inter-provincial buses departing from the new Phuket Bus Terminal 2 on Thepkrasattri Road in Rassada is indeed a novel approach to a vexing problem, but one that is likely to confuse motorists who are unfamiliar with the rather unique approach to motoring we have here in Phuket.

To quickly summarize the proposed solution: departing buses will turn left out of the station and drive along Thepkrasattri Road southbound in the breakdown lane until they reach Tantalum Junction. [See page 1] Modified traffic lights at the junction will signal all other traffic there to stop, theoretically giving the large buses the space they need to complete the U-turn and begin the journey north.

The fact that such a system has never been tried anywhere else in the world, at least that we are aware of, should set off at least a few warning bells, however. For it to work safely and effectively, everything will have to be clearly marked and there will also need to be an active police presence at all times, especially at night.

Most important of all is that all motorists will have to exercise patience, discipline and common sense, all virtues not necessarily in great abundance on the streets of Phuket. Failure to comply with the rules could produce some very messy results – such as being crushed to the thickness of a pancake by these buses, which can run up to 30 tonnes

This will not be the first time the Phuket authorities have resorted to "creative" solutions to traffic problems. The one-way system introduced in Patong in 2007 continues to confound visiting drivers. One unique characteristic of the system is the need for drivers to "keep right" on connecting roads, making them the only roads in Thailand where a North American driver would feel right at home: at least until he hit the next intersection, and quite possibly another vehicle.

When he took up his post early this year, Kathu Police Superintendent Arayapan Pukbuakao announced as his top priority redirecting the one-way system from clockwise to anti-clockwise by year's end. We hope he makes good on that goal.

As for the Rassada U-turn, if things gets ugly don't be surprised if local residents take to the streets in protest the same way they did back in 1986, when they burned down the tantalum factory that the junction is so famous for.

The *Gazette* would advise readers not to hold their breath waiting to see the outcome of this experiment, however. The new station continues to sit idle nine months after its completion, and with no opening date sufficiently firm to be announced as yet.

HAS Kasikornbank had a hacker access their computers? An email sent to me from the bank on August 24 said I could no longer transfer money from accounts for security reasons.

On August 28, I received another email from the bank about additional security measures for accounts.

I checked my anti-virus software and found someone has been trying to access my computer


since August 24.

Customer Service Officer Khun Sukanya (ID 10530) at Kasikornbank replies:

The email on August 24 was not the result of a hacker accessing KBank's computer system.

It was a notice announcing enhanced security measures so that



money *only* to accounts that have first been nominated and registered on KBank's computers by the customer.

This of course will prevent any potential hackers from transferring money to an account that you have never transferred money to before.

If someone tries to transfer money from your account to an account not registered on our system, KBank will suspend the transaction until customer has been informed.

If the customer verifies that the transaction is genuine *and* adds the account number (of the account to receive the money) into

KBank's system, then we will make the transfer.

Adding an account to receive funds is very simple. A customer can choose to use a one-time password, or "OTP", and add an account into the system immediately.

Alternatively, a customer can be issued a second PIN number to enter when making such transactions. Please note that you will need *both* your original PIN and the second PIN to authorize accounts to receive funds transferred from your account.

To be issued a second PIN number, you can either complete the application form and submit it in person at your nearest KBank branch. This will take two days to process.

You can also download the PIN2 application form from the KBank website (kasikornbank. com) and fax it to your home branch.

This will take five days to process. The extra days are needed for the bank to verify that the application is genuine.

Real learning takes something special

FIRST PERSON

ALL parents want their children to be special, to have that extra something that other children don't have.

For most parents these days, that usually means being smarter.

The only way children get smarter is by learning, and the more opportunity they have to learn, the smarter they get. That's why children should be provided extra lessons or more opportunity for skill development than simply by going to school.

Have extra opportunities to learn helps develop children's brains. The brain is like a muscle: the more it's used, the stronger it gets. Research indicates that most people use only 30% of their brain's potential. Extra lessons help children to use their brains better, not just more, and extra learning in different areas improves different skills.

Children can start taking extra lessons from three years old, depending on the support from their parents.

The ability to speak English is given high priority in Phuket because the island's economy relies on tourism that needs Englishspeaking people.

For this, it is much better for children to learn foreign languages from a very young age. They will become "near native speakers" and will not need to translate their

thoughts from Thai into the foreign language and then speak.

Learning any kind of art, such as painting, handicrafts and so on, makes children use their imagination and become creative. Using-hand skills is also an advantage. Learning music in particular helps them to concentrate and to control their emotions. The practicing involved in learning to play a musical instrument teaches them discipline. Also, children have better listening skills than adults. If they start early, they will develop an ear for musical notes.

Computers are also important today. Learning to use computers and the internet at school or in extra lessons is much better than just letting the child play on the computer at home, because parents never know what - or if the child is learning anything at all.

Some parents worry about which lessons to start their child with. I say parents should let their child learn about whatever subjects the child is naturally interested in. But if the child later says he doesn't like it, don't let him to stop or change immediately. Let him continue for at least 20 more lessons before making a decision.

Most people - not just children like doing things that are easy. If it gets too hard, they give up. But if you have to do something say 20 times, then it becomes habit and little extra effort is required to do it, regardless whether you like it or not. By that time a child will know whether they really like, or dislike, what they are learning.

As for parents who like to teach their children at home, what we call "home-school education", I think that actually reduces the child's learning opportunities and is appropriate only for special needs children.

I urge parents to raise their children with love and care. Don't compare them with other children because each child is unique.

Base your expectations on your child's potential, not on what you want them to be. If you do that, your child will be a genius anyway.

A license to kill?

AFTER reading the Gazette's recent article about red license plates in Phuket (Phuket Gazette, August 7) I would like to bring up another related topic; that of driving without a license plate.

Bike bomb couriers or 2nd-class citizens?

I WOULD like someone to explain why, when you visit Jungceylon on a motorcycle, you are stopped by a security guard who conducts a search of the space underneath the seat of your motorcycle?

I ask because when you visit in a car, no search of the inside of the car is undertaken - ever.

I don't know exactly what is being searched for, maybe guns, knives, drugs or even a bomb, but I can assure you that whatever it is, a lot more of it could fitted into the boot of a car than under the seat of a motorcycle.

It seems that if you are riding a motorcycle it is presumed you don't have enough money to be able to afford a car and are therefore treated like a second-class citizen.

If you arrive in a car you are waived through and saluted.

If someone from Jungceylon would like to give me a different explanation and prove me wrong,

I would be very glad to hear it. Also, I would like to point out that at least Jungceylon provides covered parking for motorcycle visitors, something other large shopping complexes on the island clearly didn't think worthwhile even though a huge portion of their customers arrive on motorcycles. Paul Rochel, Jungceylon General Manager replies:

First, I would like to apologize for any inconvenience and would like to confirm that customers coming by motorbike to Jungceylon are not "second-class citizens". Most of our customers come by motorbike.

The reasons we search underneath the seats of motorbikes and not open the boots of cars are:

• Customers coming by car to Jungceylon have to take a card and go through a checkpoint with CCTV, of which we keep records and can identify the driver later, which is currently not the case for motorbikes.

· We are looking for explosives and we use mirrors to check under cars. If there were a crisis situation, would also check the boot, though this is not currently required.

• Our coordination with police, and the experience of incidents in the Deep South show that motorbikes are more often used for planting bombs, and this is the policy that police recommend for safety standards.

Our policy is to salute all customers, and we will reinforce this. The number of motorbikes compared with cars coming to Jungceylon may explain why security guards find it not as easy to salute all the motorcycles arriving as it is to salute all the cars that arrive.

However, I confirm that all our customers should be welcomed and security guards will be trained again on this issue.

Thank you for your comments. This will help us improve our service and improve customer satisfaction.

Taxing times for British expats

BRITISH expatriates living in Phuket who still have connections with the UK may face a challenge over their residency that could put them at the mercy of the taxman.

Under the new guidance, UK tax authorities will scrutinise more closely the non-resident status of British citizens living overseas.

With an estimated 50,000 British expats living in Thailand, the new UK tax rules are expected to have an immediate and long-term impact on Thailand's economy.

Until last year, British expats could claim non-residency status if they spent no more than 91 days a year in the UK. Now, the number of days spent in the UK is only one factor.

Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs (HMRC) are going to look at many things about the way your life is arranged and decide if

HMRC is looking at:

- *i* Property and whether it is rented
- Where you stay when in the UK Correspondence address
- Any commercial interests held Education
- i Any bank accounts
- i Social activities such as club memberships

ï Mobile phone contracts *ï* Any UK company pension scheme

the UK is the center of your life. The new guidelines from HMRC require British nationals claiming non-resident status to prove they do not retain connections with the UK.

These links include having a property, holding sports or social club memberships, keeping a mobile phone contract and having family there or children going to schools or universities in the UK.

A Briton who makes regular visits home could also be liable for UK tax. UK residents are required to pay British taxes on their world-

wide assets and income, whereas generally non-residents only pay UK tax on income that originates from UK sources.

The changes in UK tax practice followed the case against Robert Gaines-Cooper, a British business tycoon who lost his appeal earlier this year to HMRC.

Mr Gaines-Cooper, who has established a business empire since the 1970s in the Seychelles, claimed to be wrongly denied non-resident status since he complied with HMRC guidance.

He is now facing a tax bill estimated to be in the region of GB 20 million pounds

British expats should make three checks. The first is to ensure they really are non-resident under the new UK rules.

If they could be seen as UK residents, the second step is to decide whether they want to change their lifestyle to sever the connections, which may mean not flying back to the UK every summer to visit their family and friends.

Third, they might need to change their approach to tax planning.

If you are not prepared to make such changes, you might need to change your tax planning.

You might need to think about planning your affairs from the point of view of being a UK resident, which is a very different outlook to planning your affairs as a non-resident.

British expats with property offshore should take the necessary steps to convince UK authorities they are not UK residents.

Transferring a British company pension outside the UK, disposing of non-investment property as well as holding an offshore bank account are also recommended ways to indicate non-resident status.

This rule change could herald

a host of measures from Western tax authorities seeking to boost tax revenues from nationals overseas.

The big concern is that the next step by the UK and all the other indebted Western governments will be to move to an American-style tax basis, where all citizens are liable to tax on worldwide gains and income, irrespective of their residence status. This could affect millions of expats worldwide and have a huge impact on the economy of countries such as Thailand.

Therefore, British expats must ensure the UK is not regarded as the "centre of gravity" of their lives or financial interests.

TAT changes tack in luring high-end tourists

IN A bid to attract more high-end tourists to Phuket next year, tourism leaders will try a different approach in their marketing strategy.

Sailors and celebrities will be the focus of next year's efforts according to the director of the Tourism Authority of Thailand's (TAT) Phuket office Bangornrat Shinaprayoon.

The move comes on the back of hotel occupancy rates in favor

of four and five-star resorts, which had 25% more occupancy over the lower end of the market establishments in July and August this year, according to the South of Thailand Hotel Association president Suchart Hirankanokkul.

Another influential factor is Phuket being voted the Best Asian Maritime Capital by the Asia Boating Awards this year, and the amount of luxury services available around the island.

"At the moment, middle-income tourists make up the majority of arrivals in Phuket. Overseas marketing that promotes Phuket as a high-end destination will be launched to attract more big spenders," says Mrs Bangornrat.

Property groups are also showing signs of following this trend. Phuket Ocean Villas, together with parent company Ocean Villas

Gourmet Restaurants in Phuket

Group, recently announced that they will be targeting China in the second half of this year as they look to add many more "high net worth individuals" to their database of clients.

Sales Director of Ocean Villas Group, Rebecca Smith said, "China has been on our radar for some time now as the wealth in the country increases and the number of new high net worth individuals is growing all the time. China currently boasts over 477,000 millionaires and 89 billionaires."

Meanwhile, Mr Suchart said the combination of Phuket's growing high-end facilities would help the promotional drive next year.

"The revenue generated from an increase in high-end tourism would be great for Phuket," he added. – Alexandra Andersson

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
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Revenue Dept targets startups, e-coms

Government looks to new and e-commerce businesses to balance national budget

THE REVENUE Department plans to increase taxes this year and next, aiming to add 350,000 new businesses to its tax base within the next fiscal year.

According to Mr Winai Witthawatkanvech, head of Thailand's Revenue Department, the planned increase in tax collection is part of the government's plan to balance the national budget within the next five years.

In the past, the government has been running a budget deficit, with public spending exceeding revenue collection.

Although such deficit spending from the public sector is vital to stimulate the economy during economic slumps, now that the national economy is recovering, it is expected that businesses will be able to expand their revenue and meet higher tax demands.

Mr Winai said the department plans to target businesses that continue to earn revenue but may have been left out as a source of government taxation, such as service apartments and e-commerce businesses.

The department estimates that there are around 10,000 businesses that conduct their trade through the Internet but do not pay tax. These are potential businesses that can be added to the country's revenue base.

According to Mr Sanchai Rattanasangoun, head of the Phuket Regional Revenue Office, the National Revenue Department holds a general meeting at the start of every fiscal

year to discuss taxation policies.

Details and changes to the taxation policies for next year, will therefore still need to be finalized in a national meeting to be held in October.

With regards to service industries in Phuket, Mr Sanchai mentioned that it is the duty of his office to decide which businesses are earning enough revenue and

are liable to be brought into the provincial tax base.

When asked about service apartments in Phuket, Mr Sanchai mentioned that there are a number of service apartments in Phuket that may still be liable for increased taxation.

"I believe most service apartments that are doing business in Phuket are already paying the correct taxes and contributing to the provincial tax base," he said.

"However there are also several newly constructed condominiums and apartments that have yet to register with the provincial Revenue Office. Some of these apartments rent out their rooms on a daily basis. If this is the case then they are classed as service apartments. Such businesses are liable to pay VAT," Mr Sanchai said.

"Increasingly more newly constructed apartments in Phuket are joining the market as service apartments.

"If the Revenue Department is able to prove that an apartment is letting out rooms on a daily basis, they will be liable to pay VAT as well, provided their income exceeds 1.8 million baht per year," he added.

According to Mr Sanchai, hotel businesses in Phuket contribute to around 50% of the provincial tax income.

Real estate businesses and construction industries contribute another 40% to the provincial revenue.

Abac voices worries over free-trade ties

BUSINESS leaders attending the times of economic hardship, it is third meeting of the Apec Business Advisory Council (Abac), which drew to a close in Bangkok on August 27, voiced their concerns over trade-protection measures, which have been increasing globally in the wake of the financial crisis.

The council also renewed its call for Apec member economies to work towards establishing a freetrade area within the Asia-Pacific region.

ABAC chairman Mr Gempachiro Aihara said that in the past, free trade and capital liberalization had increased employment, whist helping to reduce poverty and social instability throughout the Asia-Pacific region.

As more countries resort to increased trade protection during vital for APEC to renew their commitment to economic integration and free trade.

The APEC Business Advisory Council includes representatives from business communities in each of the APEC's 21 member states.

The council provides APEC leaders with information and concerns of the business sector.

The previous year saw the fastest decline in world trade since the Great Depression in the 1930s.

Many countries that were hit hard by the global economic crisis have increased trade protection to their home industries, reversing over three decades of continued effort in liberalizing world trade. – Anand Singh

A strange Splice of sci-fi life free-spirited biochemist couple,

Splice

THERE'S a reason old-school "creature-based" movies of the 80s are no longer made. It could be that the flimsy storylines that drive those sci-fi/horror films have simply run their course, and audiences expect a bit more. Or it could be that the modern target audience for horror – young adults – prefer twisted psychopaths to

science experiments gone wrong. Whatever the reason, Splice feels about 20 years overdue, and

that doesn't help the fact that even if it was intended to be a homage to movies such as The Fly and The *Thing*, it's still a bad movie – and also exceptionally weird.

Splice does give the requisite explanatory scene on the science behind what happens – but eh, whatever. Nowadays, audiences don't need a scientific theory to justify a bloodbath.

This is the cell phone generation. Just give us the sadist who got dropped on his head when he was a baby.

Nevertheless, giving credit where it is due: Clive (Brody) and Elsa (Polley), an ambitious and are in charge of a breakthrough project that splices – or combines – animal and human DNA to make "perfect creatures" (which are nothing more than moving blobs of excess flesh). Conveniently, they seem to have

complete autonomy and unlimited resources to experiment with whatever their hearts desire, and Elsa decides she can quietly use the company's resources to make a "super-species" that she has envisioned. All she needs is Clive's support. This is a prime example of why people who are dating should not work together. Everwanting to be the supportive boyfriend, Clive agrees to it.

This is where the tone of *Splice* becomes confusing. As "the creature" first appears on the screen, it almost kills Elsa, but then it's cute. It makes high-pitched squeaky noises and clumsily jumps around the lab room in search of a hiding place.

Clive insists on killing it immediately, but Elsa proves that it is an intelligent and gentle creature. Together, they start to care for it and while hiding it from the outside world.

At this point, the film is like *E*.*T*. for grown-ups, which is what makes it all the more bizarre when weird sexual elements come into the situation – try to imagine what it would have been like if little E.T. discovered that little finger wasn't just for calling home.. Yes, a bit awkward. E.T. meets Species... It doesn't work.

TOO LITTLE, TOO LATE: Splice fails to make an impact in modern sci-fi.

As the story disappears further down the rabbit hole, some of the scenes are so strange that the audience was laughing out loud myself included. What I can't figure out is if this was intended.

Cult classics like The Evil Dead became famous because they were aware of their own brand of humor so perfectly that they didn't need to make it obvious.

The result was a select group of horror fans laughing endlessly as others in the theater gasped in horror – more from the people laughing than the gore on screen.

That's how cult classics are made. There are scenes in Splice that come close, but are certainly not destined for the same cult status as Evil Dead.

Although some of Splice's scenes are so bizarre and offbeat that they could have been

ROBERT Wigman likes wine, so he decided to open his own boutique wine store where he can spend his free time sharing his appreciation of the fermented juice with his many friends on the island.

"When I moved to my home at Laguna, I soon discovered I could not find a decent bottle of wine in the area, so I opened Wine and Taste. Wine has long been my hobby and I was interested to present the best of New World wines for the growing numbers of local residents."

He is proud that he offers only high-end and boutique labels, none of which are available locally. He has partners in Bangkok where they maintain an enormous inventory, in addition to the already large stock on the shelves in Phuket.

"I have a particular love for Italian wines and can offer such superior bottles as Gaja from Tuscany which rates 99 points from Wine Spectator magazine. It's an exclusive wine and I could only get four bottles for 2010."

But Robert has not always been focused on wine. He was born in Rotterdam, Holland and graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Electronics. Because he likes people and communicates well, he worked his first five years out of school in sales, for a French electrical equipment and electronics company.

"I've been known to have a good nose for reds and I wanted to know more about Italian wines, which hold a very interesting mystery.



HuaHin winehigh

Travelers find there's plenty to whet their appetite, and thirst, at the Siam Winery.

THINK HUA Hin, and wine isn't the first thing that springs to mind.

But in the sultry heat of the southwestern Thai tropics, a region more famous for its beaches than its wine, there is a vineyard proving popular with tourists.

The Siam Winery is defying the belief that wine-making grapes can not be successfully grown in tropical climates. The company's Monsoon Valley wine, made from Thai-grown grapes is exported to 20 countries. Last month, the label won five awards at the 13th Japan Wine Challenge, to add to its accolades.

Previously thought to be an unsuitable climate for wine production, Thailand's wineries have been labelled as New Latitude wines. Siam Winery is helping bring a new wine culture to South East Asia.

Many experts believe New Latitude Wines, and their terroir (the personality of a wine due to environmental factors) complements Thai cuisine.

Siam Winery's vineyard (hua hinhillsvineyard.com) is located on a former elephant corral, around 40 kilometers from downtown Hua Hin. A transfer service from Hua Hin Market shuttles visitors to and from the site; minibuses depart from the town at 10:30am and 3pm It is essential to book your seat on the minibus in advance (telephone: 032 526 351).

After a 40 minute drive through the rolling hills of Hua Hin, visitors are greeted by a landscape which could almost pass for the Napa Valley. Until an ambling elephant gives the location away.

Neat rows of fruit-laden vines lead the eye to the winery's Sala Bar and Bistro which overlooks the vineyard. Designed by former Norman Foster architect, Sylvia Soh, the sala pavilion's design was recently cited by the World Architecture Community Awards for receiving the admiration of many of their honorary members.

The bistro's menu offers guidance on pairing the Monsoon Valley wine with a selection of Thai appetizers.

Pairing wine and Thai cuisine is challenging, but the chef's choice at the bistro makes perfect sense. The aromatic Shiraz Special Reserve is a divine partner for the spicy beef salad with grapes, and the crispness of the Colombard complements the zesty seafood salad. Standard fare, such as fried rice, spaghetti, and sandwiches, are also available.

Entrance to the vineyard is free, but it's a good idea to book an organized tour if you want to gain real insight into the concept of New Latitude wine.


A tour package consisting of a wine pairing and tasting session, video presentation, vineyard tour by elephant back, and a souvenir, costs 1,200 baht. For 600 baht more you can add a three course meal to the package. Transfer to-and-from the site is an additional 200 baht.


The vineyard is open all year but just before harvest season - late November to early March - visitors can view the vines laden with bunches of plump rosy grapes.

A visit to the winery will consume half a day, leaving time to explore other nearby attractions. Pa La-U Waterfall in Kaeng Krachan National Park is reachable and well-worth a dip mid-afternoon. Hiking the 15 tiers to the top, is no walk in the park, but experiencing the natural beauty makes it worth the mosquitoes, sweat and leeches.

Other local attractions include Khao Takiab (Chopstick Mountain) with its quaint hilltop temple, and Khao Sam Roi Yod National Park, home to one of Asia's most diverse bird populations.

Travel between Phuket and Hua Hin is time consuming. It's a seven-hour drive north. Taking the scenic route through Ranong adds some visual pleasure despite lengthening the journey. Coaches take 10 hours and while the overnight train from Surat Thani guarantees a bed, it adds an extra leg to the journey.

Regardless of your mode of transport, be sure to make a stop at Hua Hin Railway Station. Thailand's oldest and most beautiful railway station was once a royal pavilion in Nakon Pathom.

Accommodation in Hua Hin varies from basic guesthouse digs to plush five star luxury hotels. If being within easy access to the night market, beach, and local amenities is more important than spa services and a squash court, you can find a good room for around 1000 baht.

In the Kitchen with Brian Burger

EATING raw food doesn't sound particularly mouth-watering, but it is when South African Chef Brian Burger is the one preparing it.

Chef Brian believes raw food contains benefits for both physical and mental well-being.

The Executive Chef at Six Senses Destination Spa on Koh Naka, says most green vegetables boost the body's ability to fight ailments.

He said living the "raw" lifestyle is about following a few simple guidelines.

above 42°C destroys food enzymes which diminishes the nutrient value in food, according to Chef Brian.

"Keeping the enzymes alive is of the utmost importance because they are essential to the digestion process.

"By using uncooked, unprocessed organic food and following simple preparation steps, you don't need expensive kitchen equipment or a professional cooking background to create delicious healthy meals," he added.

"A common misconception is that the majority of raw food diets consist of eating salad and fruit, but it is far more than that.

"Anything you can cook can Heating vegetables and meat be adapted into a raw version,"

according to Chef Brian. There are two concepts that

fall under the raw food ideology: raw living and vegan.

Raw living produce includes uncooked and unprocessed meats and dairy. But not all produce can actually be eaten in its raw form.

"Some have toxins that need to be removed first and while most foods are simple to prepare, others can require advanced planning," said Chef Brian.

Rice and other grains tend to require soaking overnight to become digestible.

There are fairly lengthy processes for some raw food recipes such as crackers, breads and cookies which produce the

taste and texture of cooked food.

Most raw recipes usually call for a blender, food processor, juicer and dehydrator to achieve best results.

For Gazette readers this week, Chef Brian has recommended a quick and easy recipe for making zucchini pasta with dehydrated shitake mushrooms.

And if you like results, and want to know more about raw food, Chef Brian holds regular raw food classes on-site on Koh Naka Island.



Handing students brighter futures

SOME 55 students were awarded scholarships to support their studies by the ladies of the Phuket International Women's Club (PIWC) on August 25. So far this year, PIWC has awarded 196 scholarships.

Parents, teachers and PIWC members beamed from the sidelines as the fortunate students collected their scholarships at the award ceremony in Satree Phuket School's Mahogany Hall.

The scholarships cover tuition fees ranging from 10,000 baht to help children through the first three years of mathayom (secondary school) to 60,000 baht for a six year medical degree. Uniforms, books, stationary, lunches and living costs are also included in many of the scholarships. The program is designed to help students from impoverished and underprivileged backgrounds.

Boonwiroj Jitvileatlat, 13, from Bang Neaw is just one of many children who received a scholarship on August 25. His favorite subject is science and he wants to be a doctor. Like all the students who receive the scholarships, his grades are excellent. His grandmother, Sokhoon and grandfather Amnaj, both in their 70s have struggled to provide for Boonwiroj and his sister since their parents passed away when Grandparents Sokhoon and Amnaj Jitvileatlat (right) with their grandson Boonwiroj.

"He once asked me if he would be able to continue on to higher education, I could not promise anything. I was very worried about his future, but now I am happy and I have hope for our family," says Sokhoon.

The PIWC scholarship program has helped a total of 625 students over the past two decades study a wide range of programs in mass communication, computer programming, medicine and teaching.

Kittituch Maitreejit is living proof of how important the scholarships are to the students. After completing a four-year course at a nursing college in Nakhon Sri Thammarat under a PIWC scholarship, he now works in the emergency room at Vachira Phuket Hospital. He gave a speech at the Satree school event, inspiring the other students and thanking the PIWC for helping so many young people have a chance at a better life.

Wipa Tanmanatragul, president of the PIWC explains: "We do not want anything in return from the students. We are proud that we can give Phuket young people a better start in life".





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Chinese mega-developer looks beyond light-rail

YET another Chinese development company is vying for a slice of the Phuket development pie.

Executives from the Pan-China Construction Group Co Ltd met with Phuket Governor Wichai Phraisa-ngop on August 28 to discuss the Chinese group's intention to construct a light-rail system for Phuket.

The Pan-China executives not only showed interest in the lightrail project, but also put on the table the possibility of taking on other mega-projects, such as private universities, hospitals and entertainment complexes, among others.

Pan China Group General Manager Yuan Shan said Phuket was famous for its high potential in tourism development, but that the island's transportation system needed much improvement.

"[Pan China] has ability to design and invest in developing Phuket into a more beautiful place and also to extend into other kinds of business development in the future," he said.

However, the executives insisted on first conducting a study to ensure the preservation of the local culture and the environment before moving ahead with any plans.

Governor Wichai said his office would assist Pan-China with its research, if needed.

"As the company [Pan-China] representatives are interested in investing not only in the light-rail project, but the whole system, they want to conduct their assessment survey by themselves," said Governor Wichai.

To help the company in its research, the governor proposed the formation of a bi-partisan committee comprising Pan-China specialists and provincial officers so that the final proposals are in line with government policy and guidelines.

Pan-China is not the first Chinese company to express interest in Phuket's light-rail project.

On August 2, executives from the Ershisanye Construction Group, a part of the China Minmetals group, met Governor Wichai to discuss their interest in the project.

China Minmetals was ranked 332 on the Fortune 500 list in July this year. The firm enjoys annual revenues of just under US\$25 billion.

Governor Wichai presented the Ershisanye executives with a copy of a government-commission research study entitled *Feasibility Study of Light Rail Transit for Phuket and Phuket Airport Rail Link.*

On August 23, the Ershisanye were back on Phuket to meet with the Governor and reaffirm their interest in the project.


As this newspaper went to print, the executives were seeking confirmation from the province and central government that they are ready to move forward with the project.

Earlier this year on June 18, Pan-China signed a strategic cooperation framework agreement with the Shanwei government in Guangdong Province, Southeast


China, in connection with land area of 200 square kilometers. The area, located in the Shenzhen-Shanwei special cooperation zone, is expected to attract a total investment of about 137.89 billion baht with a 15-year cooperation period. Meanwhile, Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva was due to visit China on September 4 to finalize details of another Thai-Chinese joint venture to invest in a highspeed train project for Thailand, said Finance Minister Korn Chatikavanij in August.

Shining light on hedging shrubs

Gardening **By Green Sleeves**



KEEN gardeners will have noticed that one of the most popular hedging shrubs in Thailand is a lustrous-leaved, evergreen plant with bright green, oval foliage.

If you look closely, you will see that the tiny leaves, usually about one centimeter or so in diameter, are slightly scalloped at the edges.

The plant is widely sold at garden centers in soft plastic containers, and is often used by resort and hotel landscapers to create rectilinear hedges. What is it?

My own guess, for what it is worth, is that it is Japanese holly, or *ilex crenata*. Thais call it *chaa*.

Sometimes known as boxleaved holly because of its clear similarity to European box varieties, it is used for low hedges and borders almost as much as the *ixora* and *duranta*.

Its popularity in Asia is reflected in the wide range of cultivars that exist, of which *compacta* is the smallest, and *maresii* the slowest growing.

These are landscapers' preferred choice. The columnar "Sky Pencil" is a surprising, but unusual member of the family.

Of all the tropical hedging plants, *chaa* is perhaps the most amenable



to clipping, a fact reflected in its frequent selection as a topiary specimen.

The Japanese influence is evident elsewhere in Thai formal plantings. Ligustrum or Japanese privet is a similarly compact and dense evergreen shrub, with masses of leathery, olive-green leaves.

The young foliage is very shiny, but loses its sheen with age.

A member of the olive genus, known in Thailand as *tonsai*, it is extremely tough, tolerates drastic clipping and can form a substantial screening hedge.

A number of cultivars exist, among them rotundifolium which is particularly slow-growing.

As its name implies, it possesses small, round leaves. The faster growing texanum has fragrant white flowers, and larger oval, pointed leaves reminiscent of privet.

When newly formed, the leaves are light green, but darken with age. This variety is a heavy feeder, and when placed next to other plants, is liable to deprive them of nourishment.

Nonetheless, it is deservedly popular because of its resilience.

It also retains its shape very well, and is frequently used to create elegant, conical tree shapes.

Outside the Honda Showroom on Chao Fa West Road there are some fine examples.

If one thinks of the hibiscus, one usually thinks of rosa-sinensis, the eponymous tropical variety, which is cultivated all over Phuket for its large, dramatic flowers, or more mundanely, as a tall, decorative screening shrub.

But there is also a variegated form, propagated as much for its foliage than for its smaller red blooms, which is often pressed into service as a low, formal hedge or border.

Since its mottled leaves are bi

or tri-colored in shades of green, rose-pink and white, it provides a contrast to more conventionally verdant shrubs.

As the leaves and stems are relatively soft, care should be taken when pruning, but it is a durable, fast-growing shrub and the foliage will thicken with regular, light clipping.

Like all members of the hibiscus family, it will, however, need good soil and plenty of sun to be seen at its best. If it is unhappy, it will likely contract fungal disease.

The fire bush (hamelia patens) is not usually thought of as a hedging plant. In Phuket however, it is routinely cultivated as a bedding or border shrub, where its clusters of tubular orange flowers can be seen to advantage, and makes for an attractive and unusual hedge.

The fire bush is fast-growing, tolerates full sun, has an open structure, and in the right conditions can attain a height of two or three meters.

But, unlike many rapid growers, it responds well to hard pruning, and can be regulated to medium hedge height if required.

The reddish stems and pale, oval-shaped leaves which turn an attractive shade of green and orange, make this a good choice as a formal element of your garden. It's easy to find in plant nurseries.

Tip of the week

Fertilizers: The dirty truth

FERTILIZERS are often in the news. Recently, Potash Corp, the world's largest producer of inorganic fertilizers, has been subject to a hostile takeover bid from Billiton, the world's biggest miner.

One of the reasons behind this is population increase, which demands more efficient ways of producing food.

Everywhere crop production is on the increase, and Fertilizers are central to this strategy, since plants benefit from supplementary feeding. Few soils on their own contain adequate nutrients.

Fertilizers can be divided into

organic and inorganic categories. Inorganic ones are chemically synthesized or mined, and are usually marketed in granular form in clear plastic bags. Commercial quantities are sold in 50 kilogram sacks.


They contain the essential macro-nutrients, nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium. The strength and balance is stated in numbers.

Thus 16/16/16 (the most common formulation) means that there are equal proportions of the three elements in the mix. This basic formula is suitable for general garden use.

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
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




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
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Sport PHUKET GAZETTE 35 FC Phuket defeated at home

FC PHUKET were unlucky to be into the second half for the home beaten 2-1 at home by Thai Premier League side Osotspa Saraburi in the opening round of the Toyota League Cup.

The first leg of the pairing, which took place at Surakul Stadium on August 29, was a big step up in opposition for FC Phuket, currently two divisions below their opponents.

It was Osotspa Saraburi who got the better of the opening exchanges, but with Diarra Ali an increasingly influential presence in midfield FC Phuket improved as the half wore on.

FC Phuket were growing in confidence and Nene Bi almost gave his side the lead on the stroke of half time when he got his head on the end of a long range free kick from Diarra Ali. The Ivory Coast defender was desperately unfortunate to see his header

across goal fly wide of the post.

Disaster struck two minutes side when Phaitoon Tiepma was given time and space in the FC Phuket penalty area and, despite getting two hands on the ball, FC keeper Thamassaen was unable to keep his shot out.

Phuket FC's Poramat Krongburisut had a good chance for an equalizer after 57 minutes, but sliced his shot wide. It would prove to be a costly miss, as Osotspa Saraburi grabbed a second goal almost immediately after when Thai under-23 international Apipoo Suntornpanavej whipped in a free kick from the right that landed in the bottom right hand corner of the net.

It was harsh on FC Phuket, who had played on par with their high-ranking opponents.

To the team's credit they picked up the pace and were unfortunate not to be awarded a

penalty after 66 minutes. Kraisorn brilliantly weaved his way through the Osotspa Saraburi defense and was just about to pull the trigger when a defender slid straight through him.

The crowd rose as one in anticipation of a penalty, but the referee chose to waive away the furious FC Phuket protests and allow the game to continue.

A goal for FC Phuket finally arrived when Diarra Ali curled a brilliant free kick into the top right hand corner from 25 yards. It was a fine strike and no more than FC Phuket deserved.

Striker Chakrit Rawanprakon was thrown on as FC Phuket looked to grab an equalizer in injury time. The Osotspa Saraburi defense stood firm in the face of FC Phuket pressure and will take a commanding lead into the next leg.

The away goals rule means that FC Phuket must score twice in Saraburi.
