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End of landfills in sight

THE days of the landfills behind the Phuket City Incinerator at Saphan Hin may be numbered following confirmation that the new incinerator, currently under construction at the site, will use any extra burning capacity to reduce the huge stockpiles of trash.

Phuket City Deputy Mayor Thaworn Jeeraphat told *Gazette* that contractor PJT is bound by the terms of the tender to burn initially at least 300 tons of trash a day as well as any excess it can from the landfills.

Currently more than 250 tons of trash are dumped at the land-fills each day, as the existing incinerator can dispose of only 250 tons of the more than 500 tons of trash brought to the facility each day.

Mr Thaworn added that Phuket City Municipality will take steps to reclaim whatever recyclable materials can be salvaged from the landfills before trash is taken for incineration.

"We must think carefully about how we take waste from the landfills. We cannot just take it and

burn it. We have already done a test run separating recyclable trash on Landfill No 5, and we found that 30% of the trash could be recycled. The rest will be burned,"

Prachoom Suriya, who heads

the Phuket City Municipality Environmental Division said, "The maximum burn-off capacity of the new incinerator plant will be 700 tons a day, so it depends on the quantity of the trash delivered each day from around the island.

"For example, if 600 tons of waste is sent to the plant, another 100 tons from the landfill would be incinerated," he explained.

The boost in burn-off capacity from 600 tons to 700 tons a day follows PJT redrafting the plans

for the new facility to ensure more trash could be incinerated.

Aongart Chanachanmongkol, chief of the Phuket Provincial Office of the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environment (MNRE), said, "It would be good for PJT to take trash from the landfill to burn off because they could produce more electricity."

PJT is to generate electricity from exhaust turbines and plug the power back into the grid. Most of the electricity will be used to power the plant itself, but any excess is to be sold to Phuket Provincial Electricity Authority.

Mr Aongart also explained the end goal of the project: "The principle is to empty the landfills to support our trash management policy and so the area can reused in the future."

However, Mr Aongart cautioned, "But don't expect too much when the new incinerator first comes online. By that time, there will be much more trash to dispose of than there is now.

"I'm not sure whether the volume of waste to be disposed of will be less than the new incinerator's capacity," he added.

Climate change experts to converge on Phuket

THE Thailand Environment Institute (TEI) will hold a seminar in Phuket bringing together key business people and nearly every branch of local government to raise awareness of climate change and the possible consequences for Phuket and its valuable tourism industry.

The seminar, to be held on October 7, is being organized as part of the Rockefeller Foundation's US\$70 million climate change resilience initiative: the Asian Cities Climate Change Resilience Network (ACCCRN).

A venue for the event, scheduled from 8:30am to 4:30pm, is to be confirmed.

"Phuket is famous as a tourist destination with beautiful beaches. Millions of people come to Phuket each year, generating a lot of income for the island," said a statement issued by the ACCCRN.

"Climate change effects that will affect Phuket tourism include changes in sea water temperatures, which will affect coral reefs and marine ecosystems. It also includes increases in sea levels and

Patong smoking crackdown

PATONG business operators have been given one month to post No Smoking signs and set up smoking areas in their air-conditioned restaurants and nightclubs, or face a fine of up to 20,000 baht.

Smokers found breaking the law will face a fine of up to 2,000 baht.

The deadline was handed down by Kathu Police Superintendent Arayapan Pukbuakao on September 14.

At Kathu Police Station to hear the news was Preechavude "Prap" Keesin, the son of Patong Mayor Pian Keesin. Mr Prap is also president of the Pisona Group of



companies and president of the Patong Taxi Federation.

Also present to hear the news on behalf of some 200 entertain-

ment operators in the area were Weerawit Kurasombat and Sompetch Moosopon, respectively the current and former presidents of the Patong Entertainment Business Association.

Col Arayapan said the crackdown was the result of Kathu police receiving many complaints, mostly from tourists.

"There have been many complaints that this law was launched a long time ago, but that people still smoke in nightclubs and restaurants. We have been asked why this law is not being enforced," he said.

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Sugar palms to help revive Phromthep

PHUKET Governor Wichai Phraisa-ngop on Saturday led a group of Phuket VIPs in a treeplanting ceremony aimed at increasing the number of palm trees on Phuket's iconic Phromthep

Accompanying GovWichai was his wife Taisika, Phuket MPs Tossaporn Thepabutr and Rewat Areerob, Phuket Senator Thanyarat Achariyachai and Anchalee Vanich-Thepabutr, Deputy Secretary to the Prime Minister's Office.

Local officials included Rawai Mayor Aroon Solos and Phuket Provincial Police Commander Pekad Tantipong, who together led villagers from Rawai, Cherng Talay and Kamala in planting 46 sugar palm saplings and 200 sugar palm seeds.

The saplings, each about two meters tall, were provided by the Pattaya adventure park Nong Nooch Tropical Garden, while the sugar palm seeds were provided by Rawai Elders Club.

Governor Wichai said sugar palm trees have been recognized for centuries as the icons of Phromthep Cape.

The cape today is one of Phuket's top tourist attractions, especially at dusk when people gather there to view sunsets over the western horizon.

However, the number of the trees on the popular peninsula has started to decline.

The trees are dying from old age, changes in weather patterns and fire damage, Gov Wichai said.

The newly-planted trees and seedlings will be watered through a system of PVC pipes installed under the ground. The amount of

water needed is large, working out to about 30 liters per tree daily, he

A team of specialists has been contracted to ensure the project is a long-term success.

'We also plan to plant other types of trees [here] next year," said Mayor Aroon.

Engineer slain in Thalang

was gunned down on September 15 on the Baan Don-Cherng Talay Road..

Police received the report at 9:30pm. Arriving at the scene, Superintendent Witoon Kongsudjai and duty officer Capt Tatchagrit Ritnuang found the bloody, bullet-riddled body of Sirichai Suphansai, 33, lying under a motorbike on the side of the road.

It has not yet been determined whether Mr Sirichai was driving the motorbike at the time of the shooting, police said.

There were three bullet wounds to Mr Sirichai's body, police said: one pierced the right side of his chest and exited through his back,

A CONSTRUCTION engineer another was at his left ear and one was under his chin.

The size of the bullets remains unknown.

Local villagers told police that they had heard several shots and went outside of their homes to see what happened. They saw Mr Sirichai's body, but no sign of the murderer, police said.

The victim, a native of Ubon Ratchathani, was a project engineer at the Tamarind Hills condominium construction site on Soi Layan 2 in Cherng Talay.

Capt Tatchagrit speculated the murder could have been the result of one of three issues: a love affair, personal problems or business problems.

coastal erosion along land that is currently home to seaside communities, resorts and hotels.

"If people don't do anything to stop the problem, it will affect the number of tourists coming to Phuket, in turn affecting tourism and local communities," said the statement.

Some 80 participants have been invited to the conference, including relevant figures from local government agencies, private organizations, educational institutions and local branches of environmental NGOs.

High on the agenda are raising awareness of climate change and its impact on Phuket and to encourage local figures to start devising strategies to cope with the potential effects.

Among the speakers being lined up to make presentations at the event are Senior Director of TEI and ACCCRN Project Director for Chamniern Vorratnchaiphan and director of Southeast Asia START Regional Research Center Dr Arnon Sanidwong na Ayudhaya.

Dr Arnon made headlines earlier this month when he released his prediction models of climate

change effects on Thailand indicating that average temperatures would rise by up to 4°C.

The models also showed that sea levels would rise by 14-15 centimeters, affecting the coastal areas from Bangkok to Rayong and Phetchaburi all the way to Narathiwat, he said.

Representing Phuket, John Gray, lecturer in coastal tourism management at Prince of Songkla University's Phuket campus, will talk about readiness and handling climate change.

Interested members of the public are invited to attend the event. Entry is free.

The announcement of the TEI conference in Phuket follows ministers at the September 22 opening of the 6th APEC Tourism Ministerial Meeting in Nara, Japan, urging the sustainable growth of tourism.

"In particular, ministers discussed the need for protection of the region's natural and cultural assets to create a more environmentally sustainable sector. Creating more stable workforces in the sector and enabling tourism to generate business opportunities for small and medium sized enterprises would also lead to more inclusive growth of the sector that benefits more sections of society."

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Sea gypsy cultural center moves ahead

THE award-winning design of the Orang Laut Culture Center is one big step closer to construction now that the extra budget needed has been approved.

The Phuket Cultural Office (PCO) has announced they will soon be seeking tenders for construction.

The center, which takes its name from the Malay Orang Laut, meaning "sea people", will be built at Baan Laem Tukkae on Koh Sireh.

PCO chief Tawichart Intarit said the extra funding of 4,838,200 baht had been approved under the Thai Khem Kaeng (Strong Thailand) scheme.

This will be used in conjunction with the original budget of 2.1 million baht sourced from the 2010 provincial budget, applied for under the original plans for the

"The PCO assigned the Phuket Provincial Public Works Office to draft the Terms of Reference and to hold an e-auction to hire the construction company," said Mr Tawichart.

"We expect construction to start this year," he added.

Patong villagers ramp up protest against tunnel

MORE than 100 villagers from Baan Mon community in Patong descended on Provincial Hall on Monday, September 21 to hand a formal letter of complaint to the governor against the proposed Patong tunnel project.

The villagers vowed to fight any government effort to expropriate their land, which is needed for the project.

Current scheduled rates for expropriation set by the Land Department would never cover the high costs of finding new homes in Patong, they said.

They also called for another public hearing on the project, now that a Korean firm has expressed interest in funding construction.

Governor Wichai Phraisa-ngop readily accepted the villagers' concerns. "It's good when people stand up to voice their opinions. Any project must have minimal negative impact on the people.

"However, the tunnel project

still has many steps to go through," he said.

Witsanu Yidsua, village headman of the 3,000-member community, said about 30 of the community's 380 families would lose their homes from expropriation if the project becomes reality.

"We only found out that our village would be affected after it was announced that this plan had been chosen," said Mr Witsanu.

Fellow Baan Mon representative Kittisak Sa-nguanporn said, "Baan Mon is the only village in Patong that still keeps its village lifestyle. Everywhere else is jampacked with apartment blocks and hotels.'

The previous town council rejected the tunnel project in 2008, but the current board continues to push for it, he said, "This option was chosen because it costs less, but they didn't think about the cost to our village," he said.

"The project will affect the village's water supply from the dam in the forest in the hills above, which was built after HM The King visited."

Baan Mon is home to the Ratchapathanusorn on Phisit Gorani Road. The site commemorates HM The King's visit to Patong on March 11, 1959.

Mr Witsanu said the monument will undergo a complete rebuild for next year's annual celebration marking the event. "The design is already being created by renowned artist Chalermchai Kositpipat and Patong Municipality will provide the budget of more than 10 million baht to build it," he said.

August drug cases up 70%

AUGUST saw a 70% jump in the number of reported drug cases year-on-year in Phuket, according to statistics released by the Phuket Provincial Police.

According to the statistics, 333 were people arrested in 305 drug cases last month, a 70.1% increase on the number of cases reported in August 2009.

However, the numbers for last month were down compared with July this year, when 438 people were arrested on drug charges.

Most of the drugs arrests were for ya bah (methamphetamine), with 235 people arrested in 225 cases, with 9,935.4 ya bah pills and 132.7 grams of ya Ice (crystal methamphetamine) seized.

Other drug arrests included: Heroin (nine arrests in seven cases, 32.9 grams seized); mari-

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juana (25 arrests in seven cases, 128 grams seized); kratom (31 arrests in 18 cases); cocaine (one arrest, 11.2 grams seized).

There were 173 arrests for prostitution last month, a slight rise (5.5%) on last year.

There were 169 arrests in 51 cases of gambling, down 32.3% year-on-year. Twenty-six people were arrested in cases involving underground lotteries, a significant decrease (29.3%) compared with August 2009.

The number of fraud cases (six cases, three arrests) were down compared with August 2009 (15 cases, 10 arrests). Embezzlement was down 35%, with no arrests in nine reported cases.



Murder suspect endures '10-hour grilling'

THE prime suspect in the investigation into the murder of a karaoke hostess whose body was found south of Patong presented himself at Chalong Police Station on September 15.

Phitsanulok native Nipon "Maew" Pongpanit, 20, was subjected to more than 10 hours of questioning by police.

He was wanted for questioning over the rape and murder of his former girlfriend, Anicha "Nan" Khaigunha, 21, a hostess at a karaoke bar in Patong whose body was found on September 14.

Mr Nipon, who lives in Kathu, arrived at Chalong Police Station at about 11am shortly after his close friend Aot Nanmuang, 18, from Petchabun, who lives in

Despite the marathon grilling by Inspector Lt Col Jaran Bangprasert, who is leading the murder investigation, both denied killing Ms Anicha, saying they knew nothing of her murder until Col

Jaran told them about it.

The last time they had seen the victim was on the night of September 8 at her home on Nanai Rd, they said.

The suspects were released af-

Col Jaran said the investigation so far had revealed that Ms Anicha was flirtatious and had many boyfriends, which led officers to believe jealousy was the prime motive for the killing.

Ghost ambulance gives lucky numbers

A HOMEOWNER in Thung Song District in Nakhon Sri Thammarat is thanking a "phantom" emergency rescue vehicle for her luck in winning over 500,000 baht in the underground lottery.

The bizarre tale began shortly after midnight on September 3.

Pracha Ruamjai Foundation coordinator Akhom Phumi-wetphong said that as rescue workers were relaxing at the station that night, one of their Isuzu pickup trucks converted for use as a makeshift ambulance suddenly switched on its engine.

The sound of the engine starting did not give the crew a shock, but what did frighten them was the fact that the doors were locked and the keys were safely in the hands of its owner, who was chatting with friends.

The driverless ambulance then pulled out of its parking spot, heading away from the foundation building.

The rescue workers tried to

stop the slow-moving vehicle, but to no avail.

After traveling about 15 meters, the ambulance crashed into the wall of a house diagonally across the street, Mr Akhom said.

The vehicle then switched on its tail and emergency lights, and the engine stalled.

None of the rescue workers, often derisively known as "body snatchers" in Thailand, dared to approach the vehicle.

They waited until the following morning because they were sure it had been "driven" by the angry spirit of someone who had died in the vehicle while on the way to hospital.

The rescue workers, who had begun to forget about the automotive apparition after a few weeks, got yet another surprise later on November 19.

The owner of the home the vehicle had run into appeared at the station at 8am with a strip of 500 firecrackers and some food offerings.

The woman, who asked that her name not be reported, wanted to hold a ritual to pay respect to the vehicle after hitting it big in the underground lottery.

She had been playing her own house number "423" in the illegal lottery without success for some time, she said.

After the house was rammed, she decided to change the number she played to 422, the number of the Ruamjai Foundation's headquarters.

The move paid off on September 16, when she won over half-a-million baht, she said.

Officials mark the end of a blackspot

TOP Phuket officials, including Governor Wichai Phraisa-ngop, on September 18 attended Muslim and Buddhist ceremonies for those who died at a notorious 20-meter stretch along Wiset Road in Rawai in recent years.

The section of road, where Soi Ruamjai 1 joins Wiset Road, was a center of controversy for more than two years because the land owner refused to sell it to the Phuket Provincial Highways Office (PPHO) so it could be included in a road-expansion project.

Since then, many people have lost their lives in accidents at the traffic blackspot.

The ceremony follows landowner Krissana Samart agreeing to sell the entire 400-square-meter plot, not just the 20m by 5m section that is now part of the road, for 2.5 million baht. The price is in accordance with the government schedule of "fair prices for land expropriation for government projects" as of April 8.

The Pink Buses, known locally as *poh thong*, were introduced by PPAO President Paiboon in September last year.

The fleet of 16 songtaew ("two-row") open-air buses gradually replaced a fleet of mechanically-plagued air-conditioned minibuses introduced by a previous PPAO administration.

None of the 16 green minibuses are still in operation. A source at the PPAO said the organization was still unsure what to do with old green buses, as they were too run down to justify the cost of repair or replacement.

The Pink Buses run the same two routes as their predecessors: Route 1: Big C to Saphan Hin; and

Route 2: Super Cheap to the Fresh Market on Chao Fa East Road. Fares are 10 baht for all journeys and free for children.

A third route connecting Koh Sireh in Rassada to Phuket Town is the next route planned.

In the latest development, PPAO officials are now inspecting 73 newly-installed signs at bus stops along both routes.

Chutaporn Chantat, an officer at PPAO Supplies and Property Division, said work installing the signs was carried out under a two-million-baht budget, with work beginning March 31 and ending September 15. As with other projects carried out by the current PPAO administration, the signs are pink. – *Phuket Gazette*



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Broker of dreams and ambitions

AS SCORES of Burmese workers rush to become legal workers in Phuket, Thanadech Supasuwan has stepped up to take care of guiding laborers through the bureaucratic maze – a task many see as monumental and sometimes dangerous.

Mr Thanadech runs Noom Broker Co, a Burmese citizenship verification coordination center on Thepkrasattri Road that facilitates the process of legalizing foreign laborers amid an initiative by the Thai government to have a fully legitimate workforce within two years.

BEGINNINGS

It's a line of work he fell into as a matter of circumstance, Mr Thanadech explained to the *Gazette*.

His father owned a fishing vessel and had between 40 and 50 Burmese workers under his care. It was his responsibility to submit foreign labor applications for the crew. Proving himself adept at handling the process, many of his father's friends asked him to help them as well, he said.

In the past, the Thai government limited Burmese laborers to working in the fishing industry. Nowadays they work in many fields, such as construction, gardening, housekeeping and laundry, he pointed out.

"At that time, we thought that making applications for Burmese laborers in the fishing industry would be enough for us and the Thai government didn't allow migrant workers to come to Thailand and work in various industries like they do nowadays," he said.

THE BUSINESS

Mr Thanadech started the business 14 years ago to deal with document preparation and to coordinate between government

agencies and employers.

At the "heart" of the process is the nationality verification workers must obtain from their home country, he said.

His company helps Burmese laborers verify their nationality by first submitting applications to Phuket Provincial Employment Office. From there it goes to the Bangkok office, Embassy of Myanmar Thailand, to Yangon and then to relative provincial offices in Burma, he said.

He added that it takes at least two months before identification certificates are sent from Burma, to Thailand and onto his desk.

After receiving the documents, he can assist Burmese workers in applying for temporary passports at Kawthaung (formerly named Victoria Point), a village in Burma reached through Ranong, Thailand.

document preparation and to coordinate between government MrThanadech's company provides a bus for workers to Ranong where they cross the border, get their temporary passports which are valid for three years, then receive a two-year non-immigrant visa on re-entry to Thailand, he said.

Back in Thailand, the workers must report to Phuket Immigration within seven days and apply for a work permit within one month.

Noom Broker takes care of preparing and submitting all of the documents to the Phuket Provincial Employment Office for processing, which takes two to three days, he said.

The whole process, Mr Thanadech said, from nationality verification to work permit, takes approximately three months. The total, per-person cost charged for the entire process, including travel to Ranong, is 500 baht.

Noom Broker General Manager Prathtana Kanjanavanon said, "The process is so complicated and takes so much time. It's also confusing for employers because the government officers tend to use formal language that is unclear to them."

So far, Noom Broker has successfully obtained temporary

passports for 600 Burmese workers on Phuket. According to the Phuket Provincial Employment Office's latest statistics, there are 4,470 Burmese workers holding passports registered with the office. Unofficial estimates of the total number of Burmese workers on Phuket go as high as 200,000.

TROUBLES

There have been rumors among Burmese laborers that they would not be able to return to their homeland, as they fear extortion. A major concern is that the Burmese junta would levy excessive taxes against their family members remaining in Burma, as the government assumes workers in Thailand are commanding much higher wages.

Beyond the myriad difficulties and confusion Burmese citizens face in the process, local employers are also uncertain.

Rachanee Danurakchai, owner of MS Food, said she attended a meeting with the Ministry of Labor in Bangkok about foreign workers illegally working in Thailand.

"At the meeting, employers were

told that after the workers run the term of their passports, they will be sent back to Burma and cannot return to Thailand for at least two years. We, as the employers, are confused. We will be in trouble because we won't be able to find more workers when the others return home. All we can do is wait for clear orders from the government," she said.

Suthichai Pinkate, a building contractor in Chalong, said, "I went through the temporary passport application process by myself [without hiring a broker]. However, after the Burmese workers got their passports and work permits, more than 160 of them quit their jobs and left me without reason."

THE FUTURE?

Mr Thanadech said that the younger generation of Burmese on Phuket wish to work in other fields, outside of manual labor.

"I have talked to some workers who graduated from Yangon University. They are just as talented as Thai people are; they have English as a second language. It's just that their opportunities are limited.

"However, if the Thai government allows them the opportunity to work in other fields, Thai workers would suffer because the competition would be greater in the future," he said.

Mr Thanadech said that for now, despite the obstacles, "some of the Burmese are delighted to make everything right. They want to work and return home legally. They feel more secured and accepted by being able to go anywhere and do anything they want. Most of them, after getting their passports and work permits, are very happy.

"They can apply for driving licenses, open bank accounts and catch flights. They [wishing to stay in Phuket] think it is not good for them to return to Burma anyway."

The national verification process will run until the end of February 2011, after which Burmese workers in Thailand without passports will be sent back to Burma.

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Reds pour in for ceremony

MONTHS after the bloody crackdown that ended this year's red shirt protests, Bangkok's Rajprasong shopping district was once again engulfed in a sea of red.

About 10,000 red shirts gathered there on September 19 for a peaceful rally to commemorate the fourth anniversary of the coup that ended Thaksin Shinawatra's premiership.

The protesters demanded that the killers of the 91 people who died during the protests face justice.

Events also took place in the red-shirt strongholds of Chiang Mai, Phitsanuloke, Phayao, Ubon Ratchathani, Ayudhaya, Rayong and Nakhon Sri Thammarat.

Despite earlier fears, there were no violent incidents.

Sombat Boon-ngam-anong, the red shirt leader who organized the Rajprasong rally, said more people turned out than expected.

The high numbers led to Mr Sombat calling off the event an hour early at 6:30pm.

The crowd was getting too difficult to control without loudspeakers, which are banned under the emergency decree still in place in the capital, he said.

The large gathering brought traffic at Rajprasong intersection

to a halt for most of the afternoon.

The protesters released red bal-

loons and lit candles in remembrance of the dead.

There was little sign of Mr Thaksin's influence over the rally. Department of Special Investigation director-general Tharit Pengdit told the *Bangkok Post* that there was no indication of money flowing in from abroad to fund the activities.

The character of the event was

more in keeping with the peaceful and symbolic protests held by Mr Sombat and his Red Sunday group in recent weeks.

Student activists re-enacted the suppression of protesters and the crowd cheered a man impersonating the late Maj-General Khattiya "Seh Daeng" Sawasdipol, the red shirt army specialist killed by a shot to the head by a sniper.

Nevertheless, many protesters

were angry. Some repeatedly shouted "Abhisit, get out!" and "B***** ordered the killing."

Mr Sombat told the crowd that he would like to apologise to businesses affected by the latest rally and those in April and May.

"We should come back and apologise. I and all red shirts would like to apologise. I'll also come back and shop here," he said.

Burma vote spurs Thai drug surge

ETHNIC rebels in Burma are ramping up their supply of *ya bah* (methamphetamine) to Thailand as tensions increase in the run-up to the Burmese elections in November, AFP reports.

The northern branch of Thailand's Office of the Narcotics Control Board (ONCB) has reported a surge in seizures of methamphetamine tablets to 10.8 million between January and August 2010, from 2.9 million in the same period last year.

Burma has been torn by civil war since independence in 1948, with ethnic minorities fighting domination by the Burmese junta.

The country is preparing to hold its first elections in 20 years on November 7. The elections have largely been dismissed by observers as a sham designed to cement military rule.

In the run up to the polls the government has sought to force many ethnic rebel groups to join the Burmese army as border guard forces.

Many of the groups oppose the plans, and fighting looks likely to break out again after a recent lull.

The trade in opium and *ya bah* (methamphetamine) funds many of the rebel groups' activities.

Aung Naing Oo, a Burma analyst based in Thailand, told AFP the rising threat of hostilities has led to increased drug trafficking on the border by rebel groups because they need money to fight the government.

Chief among the traffickers is the United Wa State Army (UWSA), the military arm of the Wa people. It has been described as the "leading heroin and methamphetamine trafficking organisation in Southeast Asia" by the US Drug Enforcement Agency.

The UWSA invests much of the profits from the drugs trade into its military.

Saudi Arabia hits back, 'killer cop' retreats

THE NEXT in line to become assistant national police chief, Lt Gen Somkid Boonthanom, will not accept the position after Saudi Arabia strongly objected due to his alleged involvement in the disappearance of a Saudi businessman in Bangkok 20 years ago, *The Nation* reported.

Lt Gen Somkid is one of five suspects indicted in the 1990 disappearance of Mohammad al-Ruwaili.

The Saudi embassy as of September 21 had returned 1,035 visa applications from Thai Muslims wishing to take part in the Hajj pilgrimage to Mecca this year and was refusing to accept any more, according to a *Khao Sod* report.

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The move prompted Thailand's Hajj Organizers Association (HOA) to demand the government take action to end the dispute.

On September 15, Deputy Prime Minister Suthep Thaugsuban and Saudi Charge d'Affaires Nabil Hussein Ashri met with a House of Representatives committee.

Mr Ashri told the committee that "if the promotion was not revoked, it might affect bilateral relations, the quota of Thai Muslims going on Hajj and tourism between the two countries," according to committee chairman Pracha Prasobdee.

Culture Minister Niphit Intharasombat denied that the halt in the processing of visas was related to

Diplomatic relations appeared to sour further after a meeting on September 18 between Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva and Mr Ashri.

After Mr Abhisit made a statement about the meeting which

appeared to claim Mr Ashri was "ill-informed", the Saudi envoy released a statement blasting the government.

"I strongly object to comments made by Thai officials to the public claiming my misunderstanding or 'ill information' of local issues and laws regarding the promotion of Pol Lt Gen Somkid," he said, according to the *Bangkok Post*.

The Police Commission is likely to hold a special session September 24 to amend police appointments, *The Nation* reported September 22.

The Saudi Embassy has resumed issuing visas to Thai pilgrims. There are about 13,000 Thais planning to go on Hajj this year.

Setting the stage for a new start

A MEETING earlier this month about problems facing the central stage area at Saphan Hin ended with an unsurprising result: a new committee will be formed to deal with the issues involved.

For readers who missed the *Gazette*'s online report ('Phuket Town officials tackle Saphan Hin woes', September 18, 2010), the key issues are economic, although some stakeholders have donned the mantle of environmentalism to help further their goals.

Few would argue that the central stage area at Saphan Hin and its surroundings are strained by the number of people attending events there. Anyone who has visited the area the morning after a "big night" cannot fail to notice the piles of garbage, stench of urine and other manifestations of a collective environmental hangover – one that has to be cleaned up before the next round of partying begins.

That task generally falls to the event organizers and the municipality, who generally do an impressive job of moving the mountains of unsorted waste to the incinerator and landfill, conveniently located a kilometer away.

Among those complaining about the events are small business operators nearby. These people pay rent to the city, only to find the masses shunning their establishments in favor of the great food, cheap draft beer, amusement park entertainments, live performances and other attractions at the main stage area.

They certainly have a right to complain, but

they should consider that these events also draw a lot of people to the area who might otherwise stay away, not an irrational decision given all the violence that has taken place there over the years. In some cases, notably the Halal Festival and Local Food Fair when no alcohol is available, nearby shopkeepers also enjoy record sales.

Saphan Hin offers island residents yearround, authentic Thai fun and good value for money. Rather than consider moving some these events to Patong, which is already choking under the volume of waste it generates, let's put more emphasis on organizing events at Saphan Hin in an environmentallyfriendly way.

A good start would be to provide different bins for organic, non-organic and recyclable wastes and force vendors to use biodegradable containers, not plastic. All the different agencies that stage events there bleat endlessly on these issues, then organize events in the most hypocritical fashion imaginable.

If raising public awareness is so important, what more appropriate place could there be to start than at Saphan Hin? Not only is it the receptacle of 500 tons of waste daily from all over the island, but it wouldn't even exist if not for the environmental sins of our tinmining forefathers.

So far there have been no customer complaints about "fake" Phuket Cable staff collecting bills, but as a precaution we ask all Phuket Cable customers to verify the status of bill collectors.

They can do this by asking to see their employee ID cards, which state their full name and position. The card also features the company logo. Customers can also call the company office to ask whether the person is an employee.

As for our broadband service, it is currently available only at Land and Houses Park residential estate on Chao Fa East Road in Chalong. Many people have expressed interest in this service, which we plan to extend island-wide by the end of next year.

Cultural tourism is no small attraction

THE upcoming Phuket Vegetarian Festival is the one major cultural event in Phuket that has plenty of activities all in the one festival. This makes the Vegetarian Festival look much more interesting to tourists than other festivals, such as the Moon Festival that got underway earlier this week.

The Moon Festival is too small, not powerful enough to attract many tourists. Small festivals like these could potentially attract more tourists, but part of the problem is that tourists don't even know when the festivals are on or when to join in the activities, enjoying things to see and do.

Tourism organizations such as the Tourism Authority of Thailand should promote these small events more, perhaps by producing a festival calendar or promoting them through a tourist information center, or posting more details about them on the Internet or in news-

Our cuisine and cooking traditions are tourism resources, but they need to be better promoted. Food vendors should coordinate more, offering tourists a wider range of dishes to try.

If one vendor isn't offering one particular dish that a tourist asks for, then the vendor should direct the tourist to a vendor who does have it.

For example, this month is the Sart Duen Sib festival, or "10th

month merit-making festival", in Nakhon Sri Thammarat. It is being well promoted, which means fewer people will be coming to Phuket.

But here in Phuket we can promote the traditional foods associated with this festival, such as Khanom La and Khanom Tian. All we need to do is tell tourists where they can find it, such as at the many fresh markets where they are available.

The sea gypsy boat floating festival, held in the middle of the sixth and eleventh lunar months, is another cultural event often overlooked.

If the TAT provided more details on what is happening in which village on which days, tourists wouldn't have to miss a thing. Just for example, if they missed the boat floating ceremony on Koh Sireh, they could go to the one in Rawai the following day.

Other Thai festivals are well known, but not well run in Phuket. Loy Kratong is not a big celebration in the South, but we can make it into a big festival. We have rivers, canals and the sea for people who want to organize big events. The only problem is the rain at that time of year.

Songkran is another festival in Phuket that runs for just a short time. This one also needs more activities, other than just splashing water at each other.

Phuket has a mixed culture blending together Chinese, Muslim and even Western people. We can take all these cultures offer and offer them as one.

For example, on Songkran we should hold activities in which young people show respect to elders.

We could invite important people, such as the governor or even ambassadors, to join a water-pouring ceremony to ask for blessings from a respected elder.

This would highlight to tourists the beauty of this festival while bringing together people who would otherwise never have met. It would be such a good activity.

Google takes to the sky

I BET a few of you saw this coming. The next big thing in the airline industry is "Google Airlines".

Google has entered the airline industry through ITA Software, a major US flight information software company that will encourage users to purchase flights online.

This USD 700 million acquisition Google has made will benefit passengers, airlines and online travel agencies by making it easier for users to make comparisons of flights and airfares.

They will do this by directing more potential customers to the websites of airlines and online travel agencies. Google will not be setting airfare prices, that will still be up to the airlines. They also have no plans to sell airline tickets to consumers.

The acquisition means Google has access to ITA's QPX software system, an efficient management system for airfare pricing and shopping.

QPX can search a billion combinations per query for fares, schedules and availability of flights.

Its XML interface lets customers make changes more quickly and efficiently, respond to shifting market conditions, drive sales and reduce distribution costs.

The Google purchase might present a threat to existing online travel agencies [OTAs] like Hotels.com and Expedia.

ITA's technology would enable Google to consolidate the search for hotels and airlines with the actual booking process, eliminating a need for travelers to search on a search engine and then book on an existing OTA's booking engine.

On the other hand there are a

multitude of search engines in the cyber sphere that could still make them competitive.

Certainly the reactions in the blogosphere to the Google announcement were mixed. One anonymous user contended that consumers are going back to the travel shops such as Kayak, Expedia and Tripadvisor who are the "real" travel experts.

Other industry experts see the Google power brand as giving it a pivotal position in the travel planning process and an impact on consumer traffic patterns.

Another thought the threat to the OTAs from Google is significant as it would give "highly qualified" leads for good purchases and override commissions for a ticket sold through an OTA.

A survey from Jupiter Research,

a US based company, showed that Internet searches have surpassed referrals from friends or family and visits to the travel agent's office as the main source for determining where to go on holiday (20%).


That is considerably ahead of the next source; online advertisements and television advertisements at just under 10% each followed by emails and newsletters (6%), radio ads, magazine ads and newspaper ads each around 2%.

Google has already taken the lead on smart phone platforms such as iPhone, Nokia Symbian and Blackberry, so if it were additionally to become the number one travel search and booking site, it would be a one-stop-shop that no other OTA could compete with.

An alternative point of view comes from Graham Turner, managing director of large Australian based travel service provider Flight Centre Ltd. He believes that online travel buying has reached a plateau, saying that online margins were very low. As Flight Centre Ltd was not an online agent, he was not concerned about the Google purchase.

But the Google move does have other sectors of the travel industry worried, fearing Google will useits enormous power to cut out competition from the likes of OTAs such as Kayak, Orbitz and Microsoft's Bing. Kayak, in fact, backed by Expedia Inc. tried to buy ITA instead of Google to stop the deal, but failed.

The deal still has to get regulatory approval.







Vage hike sought for low-earners

PHUKET'S minimum wage could rise by 10 baht per day following a local committee agreement.

The hike would see base wages jump from 204 to 214 baht if approved by the Central Wage Committee this month.

This could place Phuket ahead of Bangkok and Samut Prakan, currently the highest in the country at 206 baht per day.

Phuket's Minimum Wage Committee announced the move at Phuket Provincial Hall on September 15.

Director of the Phuket Provincial Labor Office Suthipong Saiskarej, said the current minimum wage did not reflect the high cost of living on the island.

"Employees spend most of their money on living [expenses] and there is also inflation, so our top priority in making this decision had to be for the employees.

Mr Suthipong said many Phuket employers already pay higher than the minimum wage and would not be affected by the increase.

Chairman of The Federation of Thai Industries(FTI) Phuket Chapter Ornanong Suwannakarn, said increasing the minimum wage may adversely affect the Small and Medium Enterprises (SME) and Phuket's economy.

"Some SMEs are not capable of paying an increased wage and will have to consider more carefully the number of employees they can afford," she said.

In making its decision, the committee considered the cost of living expenses in Phuket, local employers' capacity to pay, and the province's current economic climate.

The committee also considered Phuket Provincial Labor Office (PPLO) statistics for January through August this year.

According to the statistics, 25,624 workers lost their jobs and 34,140 workers found employment during the period.

Meanwhile, the PPLO job center recorded 4,307 workers applying for jobs and 3,841 positions being filled during the period.

Although the general consensus is that the minimum wage hike will be good for the island, Phuket Chamber of Commerce (PCC) President Dr Sirichai Silpa-archa believes that the problem has not been fully solved.

"I agree with the increase, but the real problem is that the cost of living in Phuket is so high. This is the issue that needs to be addressed, and reduced," he said.

TRAVELERS with plenty of stamina will soon be able to travel directly by bus between Phuket and Chiang Mai, a journey of nearly a full day.

Green Bus, which already holds a concession for air-conditioned bus transport in Northern Thailand, plans to launch the service in early 2011. The journey will take 22 to

Somchai Thongkhamkhoon, managing director of Green Bus parent company Chaipattana Transportation, said the company won the concession for the service from the Department of Land Transportation in mid-August.

The company has ordered five new air-conditioned "VIP" buses at a cost eight million baht each to service the long-haul route.

While normal Thai "Standard 1" VIP buses are 12 meters long with 24 seats, the new buses will be 15 meters long and seat 30, Mr Somchai said.

A Chaipattana Transportation representative told the *Gazette* the cost of a round-trip journey is tentatively set to cost about 1,700 baht. The service will probably start in March, she said

Thai Airways and Thai AirAsia currently operate daily direct flights between the two cities, which take around two hours.

Admitting the journey for the new service was rather long, Mr Somehai said the route would help train company staff in longdistance driving.

The company also plans to launch bus services from Thailand to Kunming in China, he said.

Following the new Asian Highway R3a, the route will leave Thailand at Chiang Khong in Chiang Rai Province, pass through Laos and connect to Kunming in China's Yunnan Province.

A Comanche Indian empire strikes back


THE greatest western ever made was the John Ford/John Wayne epic *The Searchers*. It is the tale of two Texans searching for a white girl abducted by the Comanches and raised as one of their own. Alan Le May, who wrote the novel upon which the screenplay was based, researched no less than 64 cases of white children raised as Comanches.

The most famous was Cynthia Ann Parker. She was nine in 1836 when the Comanches killed and mutilated the rest of her family and she was rescued by the Texas Rangers in 1860 at the age of 33. Except she didn't want to be rescued.

She was a Comanche with a husband and three children. The oldest was Quanah Parker, aged 12, who would become the tribe's greatest warrior chief. He was the leader of the last free band of raiders and buffalo hunters who finally surrendered to the whites in 1875.

S.C. Gwynne's Empire of the Summer Moon (Scribner, New York, 2010, 371pp) is a rousing history of the Comanches, a tribe that never numbered more than 20,000, whose mounted warriors held back the march of millions of whites into much of Texas for over half a century. They also terrorized Mexicans and Apaches, raiding freely over the American southwest.

"The Comanche male was thus gloriously, astonishingly free," Gwynne writes. "He was subject to no church . . . no state, no police, no public law, no strict rules



of personal behavior, nothing telling him he could not leave his band and join another one.

"They would meet their match with the Texas Rangers. The Texans were unlike the Spanish or the Mexicans."They were tougher, meaner, almost impossible to discourage, willing to take absurd risks to secure themselves a plot of dirt."

Quanah Parker was 12 when his mother was abducted by the whites. He achieved early fame as a raider and stealer of horses.

He defeated the first detachment of the US Calvary sent out to chase him down in his stronghold of the Staked Plains desert of West Texas. He stole their horse herd and dispatched them off on an ordeal by foot across the desert back to their fort.

He successfully fought off three army campaigns against him until he and his band of 1,000 were alone on the plains. After his surrender, he prospered as a rancher and farmer in Oklahoma, filling a large house with his seven wives and 23 children, some of whom married white men. Cynthia Ann's ending was sad. She never accepted the white world and tried

time and again to escape back to her people, the Comanche.

The notion of a white woman becoming an Indian wife and mother horrified the polite society of the time. To the whites, the Comanche were the savages in black war paint and buffalohorned caps who attacked farmhouses by night, burning, looting, raping, killing, inflicting horrible torture and mutilation.

But to Cynthia Ann, the Comanche were her people. Though as a woman her lot was hard, following the buffalo herds to do the butchering and skinning, her memories of camp life were happy ones.

Her heart was broken when her four-year-old daughter Prairie Flower died in 1864 of influenza and pneumonia. She herself died in 1870, believing that her two sons were dead out in the prairie.

Quanah Parker died in 1911, but not before reinterring his mother from Texas to a plot near his home in Oklahoma. His most precious possession, kept on a wall above is bed, was a photo of Cynthia Ann taken in Fort Worth in 1862, with Prairie Flower nursing at her breast.

AMERICAN author Elizabeth Gilbert, most famous for her 2006 memoir Eat, Pray, Love, has found her way into many womens' hearts with her honest and intimate recollection of self-exploration and discovery into what it means to be living as a woman today.

Her appeal as an author lies in her emotional relation to billions of women on the planet and how every woman at some point, like the author, has doubts about the life path they chose.

Determined to shed light on commitment, marriage and family life, she poses questions of compatibility, infatuation, fidelity, family tradition, social expectations, risks and responsibilities.

Her latest memoir. Committed: A Skeptic Makes Peace with Marriage, released in January this year picks up where Eat, Pray, Love



There's an elephant in the attic

IN PHUKET town's muchvaunted old quarter lies a strikingly attractive former governor's mansion that is one of the town's most beautiful buildings.

Straddling the corner of Krabi and Satun roads, The Blue Elephant has a rich and well-documented history of previous familial incumbents – all tin barons with names that would rack up triple-digit Scrabble scores.

But times have changed, so, over the years, what was once a powerful symbol of the barons' power has grad- ually morphed into something of a white elephant.

No wonder the owners decided to change it into a blue one.

Blue Elephant restaurants and cooking schools franchise have branches in 12 countries around the globe and are to be found at some pretty snooty Parisian and Brussels addresses.

This makes it sort of logical that the Phuket Branch would be

barracked in an impressive pied*a-terre* in such tropically verdant surroundings.

The seemingly endless rooms and halls at the colonial Chinese mansion have had a major makeover and pretty much the only original trappings remaining nowadays are the green-and-white checkered flooring tiles along with teakwood fittings and stairs.

Still, display cupboards throughout are full of items that have long since gone the way of the rotary dial telephone.

The main dining room is, despite the indignant protests of several local hoteliers and restaurateurs, the most elegant place to dine on the island, if not in the whole of southern Thailand. But that's a matter

The main vision behind Blue Elephant was conceived by Chef

Nooror Somany Steppe, the "Unofficial Culinary Ambassador" for Thailand since 1980 and it basically consists of her reinventing "forgotten" Thai dishes and resurrecting them for this generation.

This is all on top of a healthy dose of Royal Thai Cuisine, which can't be bad. As a result, the whole evening at this restaurant adds up to little short of the spectacular.

Dining with polished brass cutlery and hand-beaten brass plates under white arches and Doric columns beats munching on a mutated hamburger under the auspices of the Golden Arches any day of the week.

Décor and odious comparisons aside, the menu is a veritable treasure trove of international and Thai classic dishes.

But be warned. The blue pachyderm certainly doesn't swing its proboscis at budget prices.

My starter of eggplant salad is undoubtedly tasty and yielding but costs a hefty 380 baht.

The accompanying imported foie gras in tamarind sauce at 720 baht also rings up a cheerful "Ddring!" at the cash register.

These may be jumbo-like rice and the upstairs rumble and prices, but they are served in undeniably princely settings.

A filet of parrot fish marinated with herbs and served up in an interesting-looking bamboo case (480 baht) is filling and rich in taste and texture.

We order a bottle of refreshing Tavel Beaurevoir 2007 (3.920 baht) and it's the perfect dining companion – not imposing on the rich flavors of the dishes served and light to the taste but with enough punch to stun a buffalo.

Indeed, the ensuing buffalo satay (320 baht) with homemade peanut sauce is excellent.

All this is accompanied by organic brown or white jasmine chair-scraping of a crowded back-slapping convention.


It almost sounds as though there's an elephant in the attic.

I could go on and on, trumpeting about the stunning delicacies served up at Blue Elephant but it wouldn't be entirely fair to the restaurant as they're reviewing their wine and menu listings.

Suffice it to say that the evening was impressive, in a gargantuan way. It was a genuine pleasure to dine there.

I'M OFTEN asked why I have spent 20 years, the "main course" of my life, on Phuket. Perhaps it has something to do with having spent my youth growing up in Las Vegas, the happiness center of North America.

My family owned a resort which catered strictly to a clientele of women from around the United States who came to Las Vegas to get a quick divorce.

In the 1950s, divorcing was a major legal procedure which took many months to achieve in most places, but in Las Vegas it only required a six week residency. And even back then, there were lots of women who wanted to get divorced quickly, and often for strange reasons.

I'm not sure it was the best place for my parents to raise their only child but, then again, maybe it was the best place of all. I spent my childhood listening to stories of despair and hope from the mouths of women who had been sent into desert exile to end their married lives.

At some point, I began writing down their stories in notebooks. By the time I was ten, my first story was published – in the *Las* Vegas Sun!

It was about Rita Sprague who used to wash her thin, frizzy hair in beer every day to give it shine

and body. That story began my career as a writer.

As a child, living in Las Vegas was almost intolerable, especially during the day. There were no air conditioners back then and staying cool often meant lying on the concrete floor inside the house and waiting for the sun to pass behind Mount Charleston.

I spent every afternoon lying on that floor watching my favorite television show, Tarzan, who lived in a tropical jungle and got around by swinging from the trees. I decided at a young age that when I grew up I would live in a tropical jungle.

I was told early on at school that I was not very intelligent and had few talents. That's why I became a journalist.

I was good at asking questions and listening to people's stories. And I was fascinated by words and how combinations of words could affect the imagination and the emotions.

After graduating from college with a journalism degree, I decided to fulfill my dreams and head to the tropics. I wanted to live in a big tree and swing from the vines. But first I had to work.


I was hired as a stringer for a variety of publications to write travel stories. This turned into quite a few years of living and writing about civil wars in unappealing places in Latin America and Central Africa.

Even though I spent years in the tropics, it was never as appealing as the Tarzan movies. At least not until I got to Phuket 20 years ago and thought I had found the place I was looking for all my life.

Phuket is like Las Vegas in that people come here to have a break from their ordinary lives or to relaunch a new life in new surroundings with new people.


I always heard as a child that people had to work hard in order to earn enough money for a vacation in a magical place. It occurred to me that it was a better idea to simply live in the magical place in the first place.

Phuket is a magical place. It's like an enchanted jungle full of opportunities to experience life like one never could have done back home. I still spend my time talking to people and writing down their stories. It's the only thing I can do well.

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Life & style Revered monk celebrates his 114th birthday

HUGE crowds of nearly 8,000 people turned out over two days to help respected Buddhist monk Luang Pu Supha celebrate his 114th birthday on September 17.

Luang Pu Supha lives at a temple in Chalong named after him in his honor. In his long life he has helped build 38 temples throughout Thailand and is regarded as a theological figure of inspiration to many.

More than 200 monks from around the country joined the celebrations to pay tribute and take part in religious meritmaking ceremonies.

In the morning, 119 birds were released to freedom, 260 scholarships worth 520,000 baht were presented to Phuket children from 25 schools and hundreds of locals brought gifts and prayed before the great monk

Luang Pu Supha was born in Sakhon Nakhon in northeastern Thailand on September 17, 1896, which unofficially makes him the oldest man on the planet.

The monk was born four days earlier than American Walter Bruening, currently recognized as the World's Oldest Living Man by Guinness World Records.

Mr Bruening celebrated his 114th birthday on September 21.

But his remarkable longevity isn't important to Luang Pu Supha and the temple committee who care for him. His Buddhist teachings and the monk's spiritual path are their concern.

The secret to the aged monk's longevity is to "eat less, speak less and always speak the truth."

Luang Pu Supha eats only nine mouthfuls of food at each meal. He avoids spice in his diet, but is said to have a sweet tooth, his favorite dish being *Kao neaw kaew* (sticky rice cooked in sugar).

But Luang Pu Supha believes moderation is the key to success

"Take care of your mind, don't get angry and don't be greedy," he says.

Earlier this year, Luang Pu Supha was admitted to Siriraj Hospital in Bangkok to receive treatment for an "enlarged heart", but he has been recovering well, his carers say.

Amazingly, last month Luang Pu Supha flew to Medan, Indonesia with his aides on a five-day pilgrimage. But Luang Pu Supha is a monk used to life on the road.

When he was nine years old Luang Pu Supha's father took him to a temple in Ubon Rachathani where he was ordained as a Buddhist monk.

He stayed at the temple until 1917, when he set out on his official ordination pilgrimage into Laos. In 1923, he traveled to Burma where he met other Thai monks who were on a pilgrimage

Luang Pu Supha joined them and embarked on a series of adventures which took him into the foothills of the Himalayas, then to China in search of a monk who reportedly achieved a high meditation level. The monk's travels also took him to Europe.

When he was 62, Luang Pu Supha returned to his birthplace, Sakhon Nakhon, where he visited relatives he hadn't seen since he was ordained as a monk more than 50 years earlier.

He moved to Phuket 30 years ago, to help the impoverished Morgan sea gypsy villagers in Koh Sireh, who had no religion.

The villagers embraced the Buddhist faith and Luang Pu Supha helped them build their own temple.

At the birthday celebrations last week, many locals told the Gazette that Luang Pu Supha held a special place in their hearts.

Malee Boonyapongchai, 55, said the aged monk respects all religions.

"He is generous to all people, no matter what religion they

follow. His teachings are very popular here in Phuket," she said.


'Seeing Luang Pu Supha today makes me adore him even more. You can see by how many people are here, how loved he is," she added.

Car salesmen Peeraroj Boon-

siroj, 43, from Nakhon Sri Thammarat said this was the second year in a row he had come to celebrate the monk's birthday.

"Luang Pu Supha teaches only good things, today is a joyous occasion and he is a source of inspiration to all," he said.





When Phuket gets possessed

THE Phuket Vegetarian Festival will explode onto the island next month for nine days of selfmutilation, fire walking, oil bathing, and firework dancing to appease the gods.

There will also be a spot of vegetarian food to sample.

The Chinese Taoist festival will be held from October 8 to 16 at temples around the island.

Families of Hokkien Chinese descent living on the island have celebrated Phuket's most infamous festival for over a century.

The tradition of keeping to a purely vegetarian diet for nine days from the start of the ninth lunar month is done out of reverence for the gods and legendary heroes in traditional Chinese beliefs. It is a way to purify the body and make merit.

The festival is believed to have begun in Kathu district during the mid 19th Century. Many Hokkien Chinese workers lived in the area and worked in the abundant tin mines. For many years the flourishing tin industry in Phuket had led to a growing population of Chinese immigrants on the island.

The Hokkien Chinese had great reverence for their gods, enlightened beings and even their ancestors, who they believed protected their families and **Looking Back**

communities from harm.

Sometime in the mid 19th Century a traveling crew of Chinese opera performers visited Kathu where the Hokkien tin miners lived.

Performers often visited Chinese mining communities to entertain the workers. Visiting performers would often stay for months in the district because the mining industry in Kathu was flourishing.

But after performing for the community in Kathu for some time, some of the performers fell ill, stricken with horrific disease.

They realized they had made a grave mistake because they had forgotten to pay their respects to the nine emperor gods, by observing the tradition of keeping to a vegetarian diet for nine days, like they would every year in their hometown.

The performers decided to hold the vegetarian merit making ceremony that year in the makeshift theater they built in Kathu district. They asked the gods they revered for forgiveness and to ward off the evils that had befallen them.

After they held the ceremony and observed the nine days purification ritual, the plague that had stricken their crew and the Kathu mining community was gone before long, to the amazement of the local Chinese community. The mystic benefits associated with practicing the age old tradition soon became the talk of the town.

The performers advised the local Chinese community in Kathu that it was necessary to pay their respects to the nine emperor gods vearly and invite them to descend from heaven.

It was believed the gods would protect them and ward off evil and misfortune that may befall their families. It was also important to keep to a strict vegetarian diet as a way of making merit and purifying their bodies during the duration of the ceremonies.

From then on the festival has been widely practiced by the local community of Phuket every year. Today the festival is celebrated throughout the country but is still at its height in Phuket, where it started many years ago.

The Phuket Vegetarian Festival



its own and does not mimic the original traditions practiced in China.

The tradition of *Mah Song* does not feature in the vegetarian festivals held in China today. Mah Song refers to devotees who invite the spirits of the gods to possess their bodies and use them as "vehicles".


To be a *Mah Song*, the devotees must keep themselves pure during the duration of the festival, refraining from meat and engagement in any "unclean" activities.

is believed that when possessed the Mah Song can endure superhuman pain thresholds.

The gory tradition of the *Mah* Song has become one of the most recognizable traditions of Phuket's Vegetarian Festival over the years.

The practice of self-mutilation is believed to have originated, not from China but from southern India, with striking resemblance to the Tamil festival of Thaipusam. In this festival, devotees often pierce their faces with similarly sharp objects in the belief that it will constantly remind them of their revered deity.

The all-inclusive cost for the



The Hilton also will be offering discounted packages for those wishing to stay overnight.



PHUTHAI Souvenir Market is in the process of relocating to new premises with a grand opening slated for October 1.

Strong baht a threat to property investors?

AS the Thai baht continues its steroid appreciation, Kasikorn bank's Head of Financial Markets has been quoted saying the US\$ rate could hit US\$29.5 next year. This comes hot on the heels of the baht reaching its strongest currency rating in 13 years.

For Phuket, which has high exposure to both the tourism and property markets, there is a link to the large expat retirement market. Many non-US-nationals have US\$ savings, investments or recurring pension payments. For them, high inflation and weakening spending

Accessing all areas, legally

PURCHASE of property, either completed or off-plan, in property developments has gained popularity amongst buyers recently.

Property buyers seem to prefer living in a gated community rather than dwelling in a standalone residence.

The reasons for this may vary from buyer to buyer, but the wide range of management services and amenities typically provided in property developments seem to be what is making the difference for

Property developers often maintain their own management company or contract a manager who will provide management services and amenities.

These may include 24 hour security, garbage collection, pool keeping and gardening.

Furthermore, common areas and facilities such as club houses, restaurants, pool areas, spas and fitness centers are often provided for use of the community members and its dependents.

When buying into a property development, buyers often focus exclusively on their chosen unit and the legal documentation to be executed with it.

This means that they may

neglect to pay attention to their rights regarding the common areas and facilities as well as professional management of the project.

This mistake can have severe consequences, particularly in cases where no statutory provisions or regulations provide minimum standards and legal framework in this matter.

In case of condominium unit purchase, buyers certainly benefit from laws and regulations such as the Condominium Act which is not only influenced by the principle of consumer protection but also includes a legal framework and minimum standards regarding project management.

For instance, it provides owners with rights to participate in the management and control over common areas and facilities in the project.

When it comes to control and securing a buyer's say in the management of a project, it is crucial to verify if the applicable laws or legal structure underlying a project provides for this purpose.

For instance voting rights in the

corporate body or committee managing the project, and, in addition, how such right to participate in the management will be established and allocated.

This is of importance as such right to participate in the management might be worthless in cases where a majority buyer (or a developer retaining majority amount of units), controls the management with no protection for the interests of minority groups of buyers.

Therefore, when considering

purchasing a property in a managed project it is advisable to investigate the proposed management and its underlying legal structure and carefully review all legal documentation.

A buyer would be well advised to check if certain parts of the common areas and facilities will actually not be part of "the common areas" to which all owners shall have unrestricted access and usage rights but privately owned by the developer.

If this is the case, buyers may face a situation where their access to "common areas and facilities" shall be subject to the discretion of its owner and/or certain conditions.

For example, acquisition of a club house membership which shall be granted upon payment of an additional membership fee.

To summarize, secured participation in the project management is of paramount importance for property buyers to protect their interests in a professional, transparent and balanced management for the benefit of all occupiers in a project.

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Watching your little ones grow

SOWING seeds or striking from stem cuttings may be the two most common ways of propagating your plants, but there are other methods which require a bit more skill and patience.

To an extent it depends on the growing habit of the plant.

Plants with no single stem or crown, but which grow as a clump, are probably best propagated by division of their root systems.

If the case for treatment is in open ground, carefully dig it up, and

upend it so you can see the roots. Shake out surplus earth.

If the plant is in a container, then water liberally a day or so before removal, and ease it out of its pot while supporting the top growth.

Banging the pot gently on the ground can help loosen the soil if the plant tries to stay put.

Look for sprouts or eves, and try to ensure that each separated section

contains one or two of these growth points.

It is best to pull the plant apart gently, so that the roots separate in a natural way, but if they are too intertwined, then use a sharp knife or, more crudely, a spade. After this trauma, the new segments will need to be potted up straight away, and kept wellwatered while they recover.

Plants that are suitable for this kind of treatment include *hosta*, aglaonema, calathea, spathiphylum and most members of the ginger family, such as the popular French kiss variety.

Plants which produce tubers (rhizomes) or bulbs are easier to divide. In the case of rhizotomous

plants such as the canna lily, or members of the heliconia genus, just separate the tubers and plant afresh.

With bulbs or corms such as gladioli, small clones form at the base of the parent bulb can be easily removed.

The only snag is that these bulbs will take two or three years to develop

into flowering plants.

Some plants regularly produce offsets or offshoots from the base of the parent plant after flowering.

These are small versions of the main plant, and can be cut off when they are about a quarter the size of the parent.

The plants should be cleanly severed close to the point where they sprout, and be re potted in a medium like moist coconut husk.

Most members of the huge genus of bromeliads, of which the pineapple is the best known, multiply in this way.

Since they are frequently cultivated in containers, the offsets are easy to spot.

It is even possible to propagate some flowering plants from individual leaves, though it is unlikely that the plants in question, namely begonias, sedums, calanchoes and African violets, will figure prominently in your Thai garden.

They are more likely to decorate Western drawing rooms as house plants.

But if you do want to try, take a leaf and trim off about a third of the lower part. Plant the leaf stem. so about half is immersed in a sandy mix. With luck, small leaves will appear after few weeks.

Air layering is an altogether more demanding procedure, but well worth the attempt, especially if you have leggy plants which would be better cut back.

To air-layer or marcott, cut two rings around a woody part of your chosen shrub about half to an inch apart, and just deep enough to remove the bark and inner cambium.

Choose your cut at a height where you would consider prun-

Spread moistened coconut fiber or peat both over and around the exposed wound, and wrap it firmly in place with a clear plastic sheath tied at both ends. After a few weeks, new roots should fill the ball.

Cut off the contraption just below the rooted portion, remove the plastic wrapping, and pot the new plant. Happily, the truncated stem on the mother plant will also develop offshoots.

So the benefits are dual. Hibiscus, allamanda, croton, dracaena and euphorbia milii are all suitable subjects for this treatment.

Tip of the week

Sizing things up

WHEN creating a garden, thought needs to be given to the selection of shrubs and trees.

On the one hand, you will want substantial plants to provide quick cover, and to create patches of shade or dappled sunlight.

On the other hand, you don't want specimens that will outgrow their surroundings and dominate everything else.

Remember that plants grow at vastly different rates: a papaya or banana tree will mature in a year or so; small shrubs such as euphorbias, adeniums and most ixoras will develop

A general rule of thumb is the bigger the mature plant, the more rapidly it is likely to skyrocket. Fast growers are normally gross feeders too.

Although palms generally do not possess massive root systems, yellow cane, bismarck or traveller palms will give short shrift to other shrubs planted too close to them. And pruning isn't always an option.
