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Violent crime skyrockets

PHUKET has suffered a sharp increase in violent crime over the past 12 months, according to statistics recently released by the Phuket Provincial Police.

The figures compare numbers of reported crime cases for fiscal years 2009 and 2010 (from October 1 to September 30).

They show a 72.9% increase in reported cases of "heinous crimes": group muggings, armed robbery, premeditated murder, kidnapping and arson.

There were a total of 102 such cases reported in the past year.

Premeditated murders rose by 18.4% year-on-year, with 28 people arrested in 45 reported cases in 2010.

Despite large increases in the number of armed robberies and muggings (133%) and "group muggings" (366.7%), general theft cases were down 21% yearon-year, with 494 cases in 2010.

There were 42 reports of armed robbery and muggings, with 41 arrests, over the past year.

During the same period, there were 14 cases of "group robbery", with 12 people arrested.

Group robbery is defined as theft carried out by three or more people using violence, weapons or other forms of intimidation.

Water woes prompt series of 'mini-dams'

DESPITE recent heavy downpours, a pilot project in the hills of Kathu is being aimed at alleviating the long-term water supply woes for the Prince of Songkla University (PSU) Phuket campus.

The campus is home to more than 3,000 staff and students.

The project, headed by Bangkok Hospital Phuket (BHP), involves three weirs, or "minidams", being built on the hillside.

The first weir, so far the only one completed, fills three 6,000liter tanks that will feed into the campus' water supply mains while being replenished by the rain runoff from the hills.

"A PSU research project has showed that 70% of the rain that falls on Phuket flows straight back into the sea. Phuket needs to have better water-retention management," said Project Manager Pareeya Jullaphong.

The PSU has its own water reservoir with a capacity of 500,000 cubic meters.

However, Jaroon Kueachoo, PSU's Head of Buildings and Location department, explained, "The

water level in our reservoir has fallen three meters. There is enough to supply our people this year, but I am still concerned about it in the long run."

To help build the weirs, army engineers were called in from the Internal Security Operations Command (ISOC) Fourth Region in Narathiwat.

"For construction materials, we

try to use natural elements – sand, rocks and bamboo - that we already have at our disposal in the construction area. However, some cement is needed in some parts," said Colonel Roengrit Chaloeyrerk, who heads weir construction projects in all three southern border provinces.

Issara Anugul, chief of the Phuket Provincial Irrigation Office (PPIO) Water Management Department, commended the project, despite the recent heavy rains nearly replenishing all the island's main reservoirs to capacity - and some of them to overflowing.

"We will have enough water to use for the upcoming dry [and "tourist high"] season. I think we will have water to use until the end of May next year," he added.

A TAXI drivers co-operative will be allowed to operate a stand just outside the Westin Siray Bay Resort in Phuket, but only under certain conditions hammered out during a meeting with hotel management last week.

Local taxi co-operative Sirae Island Taxi Service earlier petitioned the hotel management to allow them to operate a stand at the luxury hotel, which opened at the start of August.

The drivers said resort guests were unaware of their services because they weren't visible from inside resort grounds.

Taxi access to the resort was restricted to vehicles operated by Hello Phuket, which has an agreement with the resort.

Phuket City Police Superintendent Wanchai Ekpornpit and Muang District Chief Supachai Pochanukul attended the latest meeting between co-op representatives and hotel management.

During that meeting, the hotel representatives agreed to let the co-op operate a stand at the resort, but only if they promised not

to stage protests, block Hello Phuket vehicles from accessing the resort or cause any other disturbances to resort operations.

New Westin resort reaches

agreement with taxi co-op

The Westin Siray Bay Resort in return agreed not to allow in any other taxi operators, except for Hello Phuket.

Other conditions agreed to by the co-op were that the stand will be operated by a single Englishspeaking representative from 9am

No co-op vehicles will be allowed into the resort parking lot. They must remain parked no closer than 200 meters from the main entrance until called for.

Taxi stand manager Praderm Klomsuwan said, "We will begin installing the taxi stand, which should be ready in two weeks."

Chula to open learning center near airport

CHULALONGKORN University's Sasin Graduate Institute of Business Administration is planning to develop a Sasin International Learning Center in Phang Nga. The center is to provide management education for both Thai and international executives.

The project covers a 50-rai plot of land 15 minutes from Phuket Airport, aimed at business people flying in for weekends.

Sasin director Toemsakdi Krishnamra said that because the world's economic focus has shifted from the West to Asia, the demand for quality managers in

the region will rise dramatically.

Once in operation, the center will produce premium-quality business leaders to serve business growth in Asia.

Prof Toemsakdi said the project is the realization of Sasin's vision "to be at the forefront of graduate management study in the Asia Pacific region and among leading international institutions of management education".

An architect has already been hired and the project's first phase is expected to be complete by the end of 2012.

Patong tout killer caught

SIX months after gunning down an ex-friend and colleague in Phuket, a former Patong tout is in police custody after his arrest in his home province of Nakhon Sri Thammarat.

Thung Thong Police arrested Viroon "Beer" Sudthue at a market in Kapang, Thung Song district, on October 11. He was helping his mother, a local fishmonger.

The suspect was presented to Phuket Provincial Police Commander Pekad Tantipong at Thung Thong Police Station in Kathu three days later.

Mr Viroon confessed to the murder, saying the April 15 slaying of Pornsak "James Patong" Thongbaiyai was driven by anger and vengeance after Mr Pornsak, also of Nakhon Sri Thammarat, betrayed him.

Mr Viroon told police the pair were once close friends who worked together as touts on Soi Bangla. However, Mr Pornsak's aggressive behavior and failure to respect Mr Viroon as his elder soured the friendship, police said.

Official nabbed in meth bust

THE vice president of Kathu Municipality was among three people arrested in Phuket for the sale of *ya Ice* (crystal methamphetamine) last week.

Kathu Police Crime Suppression Inspector Akanit Danpitaksat identified the suspect as Somkuan Somboon, 44, arrested in a roadside sting operation in Kathu at about 4am October 15.

The successful sting operation followed the arrest, at about 1am the same day, of Wittaya "King" Gingjampa, 34.

Kathu Police, led by Lt Col Akanit, arrested Mr Witthaya in a home on Soi Trog Nam, off Rat-U-Thit 200 Pi Road, with six bags of *ya Ice* weighing a total of nine grams.

Police then set up a sting operation that led to the arrest of fellow meth ring dealer Sineenart



"Ann" Niphat, 39. She was arrested in Patong with eight bags of *ya Ice*, with a total weight of about 10 grams.

Under questioning, the pair identified Mr Somkuan as their supplier.

Kathu Police then set up a sting operation in which Ms Sineenart agreed to be resupplied with three grams of the drug for 11,000 baht.

Mr Somkuan was arrested during a roadside rendezvous on Phra Phuket Kaew Road in Kathu and sent to nearby Thung Thong Police District to be charged.

The other two suspects were charged at Kathu Police Station, which has jurisdiction over Patong.



Body found in search for missing Russian tourist

LOCAL fishermen have found what is believed to be the body of Alexey Agaponov, a Russian tourist who went missing off Nai Thon Beach Monday afternoon.

Phuket Marine Police Lt Jirayuth Onthong told the *Gazette* that local fishermen informed them of the gruesome discovery at 6:30pm Wednesday.

Marine Police recovered the body from a rocky area at Koh Krata, a small islet near Layan Beach, Lt Jirayuth said.

Mr Agaponov disappeared in rough surf the same day the Russian Embassy in Bangkok confirmed that a 50-year-old Russian had drowned at Surin Beach, further south down the Phuket coastline.

In the search for Mr Agaponov, Lt Jirayuth said the waves were too strong and divers were initially unable to search for the body.

Mr Agaponov, 28, had gone swimming with his wife and another couple around noon on Monday.

"We warned them that it was dangerous to swim around that time and they said that they understood," said Surasak Bumroongrak, chief of the lifeguard

contingent assigned to the beach.

"First, they swam near our lifeguard station, but about an later they started to getting into trouble.

The two ladies were safe because they were close to the beach, but the men were further out playing in the waves," he said.

Mr Agaponov's male friend, who asked not to be named, was rescued by a tourist, Mr Surasak added.

One of the restaurant operators on the beach who saw the inci-

dent told the *Gazette*, "The sea was very rough that day."

Mr Agaponov was missing for about two hours before witnesses on the beach said they saw him floating near the rocks at the north end of the bay.

Whether or not Mr Agaponov was still alive at that time the witnesses could not confirm.

The body is at Thalang hospital for examination. Relatives have been called to identify the remains, police said.

Cynics rail against new road safety rule

NEARLY three-quarters of *Phuket Gazette* readers believe having to submit a doctor's certificate when applying for a driving license will make no difference to road safety in Thailand

Under new Transport Ministry regulations, all new license applicants, and those renewing licenses, will have to submit a doctor's certificate in order to ensure that health conditions – both physical and mental – will not adversely affect driving performance.

In our latest readers' poll, we asked readers if the regulations would have no affect.

they thought this would make the roads any safer. Of 333 respondents, 73.3% thought the new requirement would make no difference.

Those who identified themselves as foreign Phuket residents were far more cynical than Thai nationals and tourists, with 90% of expats dismissing the regulations as folly, many elaborating their views in the on-line readers' forum.

In contrast, 46% of tourists and Thais thought the regulations would have no affect.



Murder victim ID's husband in dream

A MAN was arrested in Phitsanuloke after being fingered for murdering his young wife by an unlikely source: her ghost.

Four months after her disappearance, the spirit of Ratree Thongdee, 21, reportedly appeared to her mother, Somjit Jitprajak, in a dream and told her that she had been killed by her husband and buried under a mango tree near the couple's home.

The dream led to the discovery of Mrs Ratree's body under the tree. It also led to the arrest this month of her husband, Senee Thongdee, 27, for murder.

Police received a report on September 22 that a body had been discovered. At the scene, they found a skeleton that had been freshly exhumed from the ground underneath a mango tree. The front of the skull appeared to have been bashed with a blunt object.

Villagers insisted the body was that of Mrs Ratree, saying they recognized her clothing.

Mrs Somjit said her daughter was married to Mr Senee and that the couple had a son together.

Around two months ago, Mrs Somjit went to visit Mrs Ratree but she was not at home. Mr Senee told her that her daughter had run away from the house around two months earlier.

Later, Mrs Ratree appeared to her mother in a dream. According to Mrs Somjit, Mrs Ratree told her she had been murdered by her husband and buried underneath the mango tree behind the house.

The next day Mrs Somjit and some relatives dug a hole under the tree but failed to find anything. That night Mrs Ratree appeared to Mrs Somjit a second time. She told her

mother that she had dug in the right place, but not deep enough.

The next day the group dug deeper under the tree. This time they found a skeleton and police are awaiting results of tests to ascertain the identity of the body.

On October 11, police arrested Mr Senee. He reportedly confessed to killing his wife.

Mrs Ratree had been very good looking and other men were always trying to get involved with her, leading the couple to argue often, Mr Senee said.

On the day of the murder, Mr Senee arrived back from work to find his wife wasn't home. Later, he heard the sound of her talking to a young man outside the house.

He sneaked a look and saw that his wife was indeed talking to a man. He waited for the man to leave and then shot Mrs Ratree in the head. He buried her in the garden and went to tell the police she had gone missing, he said.

Sea gypsies prepare for Loy Ruea festival

PHUKET sea gypsies will pay their respects to the ocean as part of the annual "Boat Floating" festival next week.

The event, organized by Rassada Municipality, will take place at Baan Laem Tukkae sea gypsy village on Koh Sireh from October 21 to 23.

Rassada Municipality Deputy Mayor Chaolerd Jitjumnong said the festival, known in Thai as *Loy Ruea*, is a unique cultural event that has been celebrated by villagers for many years. The municipality, which wants to preserve the tradition, is providing the funds for it, he said.

The festival takes place twice a year on the full moon nights of the sixth and 11th months of the lunar calendar.

Loy Ruea sees the villagers pay their respects to the spirit of the sea. Early in the morning on the final day, the villagers symbolically float their bad fortune out to sea in a boat. The event is also a chance for sea gypsy girls and boys to meet each other.

Around 4pm on the first day of the festival, villagers build the boat

and decorate it.

The next day at 10am, Rassada Municipality Mayor Surathin Leunudom will preside over the official opening ceremony.

Later there will be traditional dance performances and an ancestor worshipping ceremony at the village shrine.

The highlight of the festival will be the boat floating ceremony, which will take place around 5am on October 23. Festivities will continue throughout the day.

"Those who are interested in this unique festival are welcome to the village, but make sure you get there on time.

"If you want to see the boat being floated, you must come in the early morning of the last day," said Mr Chaolerd.





The Cove for sale at Bt1.2bn

DEVELOPER Asian Tropical Homes (ATH) has announced that its 460-rai project The Cove Krabi is for sale at 1.242 billion baht.

The Cove Krabi site is at Haad Yao Beach, famed for its scenery in the hit move *The Beach*.

The project was originally touted as Krabi's answer to Laguna Phuket, associated with such names as Colin Montgomerie as the golf course designer and various high-profile global glitterati as project ambassadors, said ATH in a press release issued this week.

"The potential and opportunities this particular site has to offer the right developer are boundless, anyone with vision will see and realize this" said ATH Group CEO John Grice.

However, he added, "Unfortunately this site will not now be developed by ATH...Due to the global economic and local political climate we have after five years decided, for the protection of our shareholders, to pass the opportunity onto someone else."

New hospital rising in Krabi

DEVELOPMENTS underway, including a new private hospital being built in Krabi Town, have prompted much talk around town of more comprehensive medical care for Krabi residents in the near future.

The new hospital is being built on Pisalpop Road, near the junction with Maharat Road, where it is expected to provide improved medical care for Krabi residents, especially those living in or near the main town.

Most Krabi residents and tourists currently make the journey to Phuket, to either Phuket International Hospital or Bangkok Hospital Phuket, for advice or treatment of major health problems.

More good news for local residents seems to be on the way as

the Bangkok Hospital Group is reported to have signed a Memorandum of Understanding to open a clinic at the site of the new Port Takola Marina in the Baan Laempho section of Ao Nang.

The thinking is to open the clinic for the first two years and as the

marina and new residential communities are developed, the clinic can expand to become a small hospital.

It is reported the land plot they have selected is 10 rai, ample enough for the future expansion into a full hospital facility.

Meanwhile, another construction site in Krabi Town has also caused a buzz among the local community.


As a row of Krabi's oldest shophouses tumbled to the ground, rumors that Central Group had finally settled on a spot for their much-awaited Krabi mall raced around town.

However, a Central mall will not be constructed on this plot. Instead, a new four-story retail development called City Plaza will be built on the riverside site on Utarakit Road.

It is widely known that the Central retail giant has been in search of land, and rumors that the mall will be constructed on a 15-rai site outside of town are much more believable.

Over the past few years Krabi's shopping scene has grown.

Aside from the wide range of goods on offer in the large malls on the outskirts of town, the city center has attracted larger retailers. Among them the department store Vogue has introduced new lines of fashion clothing and chain brand food outlets in an effort to keep up with competitors.





Death of Phuket's own dialect

DEVELOPED over generations in isolation, Phuket's unique version of the southern Thai dialect is dying out, diluted by the huge influx of migrant workers, the tourism boom, mass media and a slew of other factors.

The Phuket dialect is unique. Compared with other versions of southern Thai, it tends to be slower and more flowing than the rapid-fire varieties found elsewhere. It is even considered "cute" or somewhat effeminate by some southerners.

"I was teased a lot by my other southern friends when I said words with "Y" and "W" sounds and for dropping "G" sounds. My friends tried to mimic the unique sound of the Phuket accent, but couldn't," said one resident.

At 93 years old, Cherng Talay native Chote Jumpada has witnessed enormous changes in his lifetime. "It is difficult to watch Phuket's unique language and customs disappear, but nothing can stay the same forever," he said with a sigh.

Although he predicts the Phuket dialect will be gone forever within a few decades, he still uses it with his children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren as a way of passing it on. But it's an uphill battle. "When I want them to put ice in the glass I say ao sueng sai jog, but they say ao namkhang sai gaew," he explained.

Many of the disappearing words were imported from Hokkien Chinese, a legacy of the tin mining era. One such word that has enjoyed a comeback of sorts in recent years is banzaan (wet market). A market of the same name opened in Patong in 2005.

Dilok Vuttipanich, born in

Phuket 84 years ago, said the soft tone of the Phuket dialect comes across as polite to people from other parts of the south, even though final "politeness particles" like *krab* or *ka* are often dropped.

Dr Prasit Koeysiripong, who heads the Old Phuket Foundation, explained that many young people in Phuket now blend central Thai with the Phuket dialect.

"Even if they can speak with a Phuket accent, many no longer use the Phuket words. For example, in central Thai the word for 'wait' is same of the word for 'station' -

because when you go to a station you wait.

"So it's dying in two ways vocabulary and accent - but we are trying in schools and privately to save it," Dr Prasit said.

Professor Sommai Pinphutasin, president of the Phuket Historical Interest Group, held Phuket's modern role as the cause for the demise of the island's own dialect.

"The island is a melting pot of people from other regions of Thailand, Asians and Europeans. This has a big impact on local language and culture," Prof Sommai said.

"Natives tend to use the language most easily understood by outsiders, so the local dialect is being used less in daily conversation. New generations, whose parents are not Phuket natives, blend the Phuket dialect with their parents' native tongue.

"The local dialect is not included in [most] school curriculum; students are prohibited from using it when talking with teachers.

"Also, it is now trendy for new parents to speak Bangkok Thai with their children at home, and younger Thais now blend the Bangkok and Phuket dialects.

"The result is that a new hybrid Phuket dialect is being khoy, but in Phuket it's tah, the created, while the old one fades away," he said.

Hope lies waiting

LOCAL historian Pranee Sakulpipatana hails the effort by Phuket City Municipality schools to include the Phuket dialect into curricula. The effort is the reverse of what she experienced as a Phuket schoolgirl when Thailand was under the rule of Field Marshal Plaek Pibulsongkram, she explained.

"General P wanted to completely unify the country. He didn't want us to be like a salad, with green peppers and red peppers, but like khao tom everything needed to be mixed together to make one [homogeneous] nation," she said.

"Later, people in the south came to think that speaking central Thai properly was a sign of high status. That's why the students didn't speak southern Thai...

"But now we are encouraging schools to promote the southern dialect. Most of the [Phuket City] schools have done this. They have one course that focuses on local Phuket culture, including language," said Ajarn Pranee.

Even southern Thai has regional variations. There is one main variety along the Gulf coast and another along the Andaman Coast. But Phuket was isolated for so long it developed its own dialect, she added.

"For example, if I want to ask 'How are you?', in Phuket we we say bpen pheuy, but in Ranong they say bpen phreu (high) or even bpen pheu-reu [three syllables with a trill on the final one]. In Phuket Thai we often drop the final sound compared

to, say Surat Thani, where they say it very clearly," she explained.

However, she added, "If you ask me whether I think the Phuket dialect is dying, I would say, 'No.' But it is not the real, proper Phuket language."

Phuket Town is where people are most likely to hear old-school Phuket Thai being spoken, Ajarn

"A lot of people in Phuket Town still speak the local dialect and I try to keep the language going myself. If I am in public I always speak using Phuket dialect first.

"If I am in town with foreign-

ers, I ask if it is okay to switch to English... and they are shocked. They feel like 'Hey! That lady speaks Phuket Thai and she speaks good English.' "The

point I want to get across is that it is isn't cheuy [outdated] to use Southern Thai," she said with a laugh.


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Floods wreak havoc across country

AT LEAST five people have died from floods in the northeastern gateway province of Nakhon Ratchasima, better known as Korat.

Officials there described this year's annual deluge as the worst in 50 years, *The Nation* reported.

After two days of continual downpours the Korat governor declared 15 districts in the province as "disaster areas".

Floods were also reported in nine other provinces throughout the north and northeast of the country.

When floodwaters reached the 1.5-meter mark, officials were forced to suspend train services linking Bangkok with the affected areas.

Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva flew to Nakhon Ratchasima to inspect the handling of the disaster.

At Maharat Hospital, he saw hospital staff struggling to take care of their 1,200 in-patients in the face of flooding.

In response, he ordered provincial budgets earmarked especially for dealing with

When floodwaters reached the 1.5-meter floods to be boosted from 50 to 100 million baht, it was reported.

Scenes at the hospital reportedly prompted HM King Bhumibol Adulyadej to express his fears for the safety of its patients.

Army Commander in Chief Prayuth Chanocha ordered disaster relief centers to evacuate flood victims, distribute food and drinking water and provide medical services.

Soldiers were assigned to guard homes to prevent looting of properties whose owners had evacuated.

Dems in more hot water

THE ruling Democrat Party's dissolution case took a scandalous turn after the opposition released a video appearing to show a Democrat MP attempting to influence a senior court official.

The official, Pasit Sakdanarong, has been sacked as secretary to the president of the Constitution Court for damaging the court's reputation.

The Democrat Party is accused of misusing 29 million baht of Election Commission funds.

If found guilty, the party could be dissolved and its executives – including Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva – banned from politics for five years.

The video, one of five released by Pheu Thai spokesman Prompong Nopparit, allegedly showed Democrat MP Wiruch Romyen trying to convince Mr Pasit to call particular witnesses in the case.

"This shows that the Democrats, who always present that they do no wrong, are afraid of the mistake they made. Otherwise, they would not have lobbied," Mr Prompong said.

Judge Udomsak Nitimontri told a press conference the court would launch an internal investigation into the matter. He urged the authorities concerned to take legal action against Mr Pasit. The footage forced Mr Abhisit to deny the party had attempted to lobby the court.

In his weekly TV address, he said there was no need for the Democrats to influence the court because it was a "pillar for the country" that would make its judgment based on the law.

"The court might be able to read the verdict within the next month. I'm not in a place to say whether the party will win the case or not, but I am satisfied with the party's testimony both on the facts and the legal aspects," Mr Abhisit said.

The Democrat Party also faces dissolution in a second case concerning 258 million baht it acquired in donations from a petrochemicals company. This second case was related to the Election Commission funds case, PM Abhisit said.

"If we win in the first case, we will win the second case too," he said.

Thepthai Seanapong, the prime minster's spokesman, said Mr Prompong's accusations could constitute contempt of court.

Mr Prompong released four other clips aimed at damaging the Democrat Party's reputation.

One, containing a slideshow of photos, purportedly showed former prime minister and head of the Privy Council General Prem Tinsulanonda trying to influence court judges to make sure the case verdict favored the Democrats.

General Prem allegedly told court President Chat Chonlawon he would propose him as a Privy Councilor if the crisis was averted.

Drought leads to murder

Nikhom Thidam, 47, shot his sister's 51-year-old husband Lachai Khiowphrom before gruesomely attacking his face with a serrated hoe, police said.

Villagers in Tambon Wiangta, Lawng District, searched all night for Mr Lachai's body.

They eventually found it in a nearby field, one of the many paddies in the area where the crops had failed.

The murder ended a dispute between the two that apparently began after Mr Nikhom caught Mr Lachai pumping out of a dikeenclosed area where Mr Nikhom was storing water for his own rice field

Mr Nikhom has reportedly fled. Police said if he did not hand himself in soon they would pursue a warrant for his arrest.

Needed in Phuket: White Lines

THERE are some grandiose schemes underway to accommodate the rising number of vehicles plying Phuket's roads, which is growing at a higher rate than ever with some 500 new registrations every month.

Few hold out much hope that the strangle-hold the island's transport syndicates have over public transport will ever be seriously addressed – at least in areas frequented by tourists. The provincial council recently won a national "innovation" award for its Pink Bus project that provides a safe and affordable transport option, but only in and around Phuket Town. Of course such "innovation" has been in place in virtually every other part of Thailand for decades.

Over in Patong, which has the highest tuktuk density and passenger fares in the world, we are told that work on the Patong Tunnel will be underway by 2013, and that the project is needed to ensure public safety.

Meanwhile, up on Patong Hill two backhoes have been working on-and-off on the nine-million-baht "Welcome to Patong" sign, funded under the government's *Thai Khem Kaeng* (Strong Thailand) stimulus package.

How the sign will make the country "stronger" is anyone's guess, but the work raises an interesting question: how much road paint would nine million baht buy?

The question stems from the deplorable state of Patong Hill in the project area. As if the hairpin turns and steep gradients there weren't bad enough, the streetlights in the

area no longer work – at a time they are needed more than ever. Perfectly completing this formula for rainy-season disaster is the fact that road markings in the area are badly faded, at least where they have not disappeared completely.

The failure to keep our roads properly lined and lit is particularly shameful, especially given the relatively modest costs involved – a drop in the bucket compared with the billions it will cost to bore a tunnel under Patong Hill or create a flyover at the Darasamuth School junction.

Local driving skills are bad enough, but it seems the authorities remain content to sit back and allow our roads to degenerate to a state that ensures maximum carnage. The problem is an island-wide one that needs to be addressed by every local administration organization.

A few years ago a group of Prince of Songkla University students showed that in some cases road lines can be rediscovered by simply using a stiff brush, strong detergent and water to scrape the grunge off.

Why do we so seldom see such simple and cost effective work being done to improve road safety? Perhaps it's because some people are too busy scheming up ways to line their pockets rather than line our roads.

I'd like to remind readers that criminal indictments were promised regarding the crash, as it was determined it was entirely pilot error due to management and regulatory failures.

In the Bangkok Post on July 22, 2008, then director-general of the Department of Civil Aviation, Chaisak Angsuwan was quoted as saying that "the airline and its pilots were liable to criminal penalties and the department would file charges against them in two weeks."

But these charges and indictments never materialized and indeed, Mr Chaisak's statements were made more than a year before the accident report was released.

I can well imagine that without the herculean efforts of Bonnie Rind, who lost her brother in the crash and lobbied the US FAA, very little of this information would have come to light and the airline would have continued it's unsafe practices

private property. To maintain privacy for our guests, only people staying at the hotel are allowed to pass through the hotel to go to the beach.

If people want to go to the beach, of course they can – by dinghy or boat or climb down the hill at the side of the resort – and we will not stop them. But our security guards will preserve the privacy of the resort for our guests.

Surapong Panyawai, Mayor of Sakoo Tambon Administration Organization, replies:

There are no legal requirements that a private property owner must provide beach access to the public. This issue is beyond our authority. Mongkol Ruengwutchanapuech, a Master of Laws (Australia) and Barrister at Law (Thailand) at the International Law Office (ILO) – Phuket, replies:

"Private beach" is one of the most powerful wordings in terms of tempting a prospective guest to stay in the resort. The resort should be well aware that there is no such thing from a legal perspective.

Generally speaking, land use in Thailand is divided into two categories. The first is land for private use whereby a landowner has the right to use the land and prevent it from being encroached on by any intruder. This right is prescribed in Section 1336 of Thai Civil and Commercial Code.

The second category is land for public use, and as the name suggests it is exclusively reserved for common use by the public.

The beach is considered public domain. Consequently, no resort staff is entitled to bodily force or behave in any manner with the aim of intimidating any

THE Kamala Tambon Administration Organization (TAO) now has plans to build a road connecting Kamala and Kathu, eliminating the need to pass through Patong.

The road is about five kilometers long. It starts behind Phuket FantaSea and goes over Kamala Hill to Kathu Waterfall.

the road is completed it will benefit tourism throughout Phuket – not just Kamala.

The road will help ease traffic congestion along the Kamala-Patong-Kathu route, save fuel costs and reduce the number of accidents on Patong Hill. Travel time between Kamala and Kathu would be reduced to just 15 minutes.

For those concerned that this road would contribute to over-

development in Kamala, I would like to say, "don't worry".

I aim to develop Kamala, step-bystep, as a town for peaceful relaxation in harmony with nature; unlike Patong, which is famous for its nightlife and entertainment businesses.

Most accommodation in Kamala is of the luxury villa variety. Those who want nightlife go to Patong; those who seek peace and quiet come to Kamala. I would like to make [Kamala] different, because I know our potential [as a

night life spot] cannot beat Patong. I will focus on natural conservation tourism instead.

One new project to support this is to develop the area around an old tin mining site on Getnee Hill. There are already three tin mine lakes up there.

We are asking the provincial government for a budget to develop the surrounding area as a new tourist attraction featuring a botanical garden and observatory.

With a height of 380 meters above sea level, visitors – especially in the morning – will feel like they are in the North [of Thailand].

To preserve the environment, I have created different projects to prevent problems impacting local life such as: a new wastewater treatment system currently undergoing the EIA process, a system to use the water on Getnee Hill as a source of tap water, and a deepening of the canal running through Kamala to prevent flooding.

My efforts alone are not enough to maintain the environment and peace and quiet in Kamala. *Everyone* needs to help.



The road to safety

I HAVE to agree with the majority result in the recent *Phuket Gazette* poll: the new Transport Ministry regulations requiring all new license applicants, and those renewing licenses, to submit a doctor's certificate will not improve driver behavior in Phuket.

I could say that following the behavior of more developed nations would be a good start, but given what I have seen in the time I have been here, more specific comments are required.

Road safety starts with all motorists being required to pass a test before being issued a driver's license. Medical checkups are rhetorical and only postpone what is required.

Police need to become serious about enforcing traffic laws about lanes, helmets and reckless driving.

Officers need to actively patrol for violators, not just wait at checkpoints in an effort to collect revenue.

In addition to being fined, people found violating the law must attend a remedial educational program.

A day-long course in defensive driving would make them think twice about violating the law again.

However, accessing the beach is another question entirely. Although the only convenient way to access the beach is to pass through the resort, to be frank, the resort is not under any legal obligations to open the access way to public use.

This is a legal loophole. There is no statute and no judgment precedent that deals directly with this crucial issue.

Our suggestion is to raise this issue and discuss it with the local competent officer, such as the Phuket Provincial Administration Organization, as they have the general power to administrate the use of public places.

Can I register my ATV?

Can I register my US-imported ATV (all-terrain vehicle) here in Thailand in my Thai wife's name? The ATV has been legally imported to Thailand and we have paid all the proper taxes.

Boonmark Chai-In, an officer at the Department of Land Transport headquarters in Bangkok, replies:

Under Thai law, an ATV is not considered a car or a regular vehicle that can be driven on public roads. That means an ATV cannot be registered, as only vehicles that are to be driven on public roads need to be registered.

Driving an ATV on any public road is illegal.

Canceling TOT Internet

I signed up for TOT's internet service on September 22. After battling to get the service working and regular phone calls to the TOT office, I was able to connect to the internet about a week later.

Today is October 11 and once

again I am not able to connect or use my TOT internet.

Since October 5, when the connection stopped working, I've called TOT's Phuket branch several times every day to tell them about the problem. They keep saying they will co-ordinate with their technical department and get a technician to contact me when they have finished.

It has already been one week and I still can't use my home internet and nobody from TOT's technical department has contacted me.

I have also called TOT call center at 1177 many times. They say the same thing.

On Friday, I called the call center again and was told again that they would coordinate with their technical department in Phuket on Saturday morning.

I followed up with the call center on Saturday and was informed that Saturdays and Sundays are the technician's days off.

I am not happy and I would like to cancel my internet subscription with TOT internet.

I have had the package for about a month and have only been able to use the internet for a week.

It is not acceptable, and neither is TOT's customer service.

Can I cancel the internet service from TOT without any charge and if so, how can I do it?

If I can't cancel the subscription I would like to know why it has taken so long to not fix the problem and when exactly they will fix it.

Can I ask for TOT to not bill me while I'm not able to use the internet and if so, how do I do that?

Suporn Chuenpimolchankij, Assistant Senior Director of the TOT office in Phuket, replies:

If a customer wants to cancel an internet subscription, he/she will be exempted from the cancellation fees if the reason for the cancellation is an error from TOT, such as, when the customer cannot use the internet after the installation. However, TOT must first confirm that the customer has actually reported the problem to our call center 1177

The customer needs to bring a photocopy of their ID or passport to any TOT office to cancel the account, but it would be best to contact their local office. If they live in Kathu, they should contact the TOT Patong branch.

The customer should request to meet the branch manager and explain why they want to cancel the service. Only the manager has the authority to waive the cancellation fee.

For the billing exemption because the customer cannot use the Internet, usually we will not charge them as we can check their internet usage through our records

Any customer who wants to know why it takes so long to fix a problem should contact the manager in person for this as well.

The manager can answer and explain why it takes so long by checking their records at their local office.

Dreamliner's big ambition

Phuket's tourism industry could move into a new stratosphere of prosperity if Boeing's 787 Dreamliner commences flights.

NEW York to Phuket direct. St Petersburg, Russia to Phuket direct. These hitherto unheard of flights will become a distinct possibility when the Boeing 787 Dreamliner finally starts commercial service. Currently, it is two years behind schedule.

This is an aircraft made for a destination like Phuket. And it is a



distinct possibility that we will see it landing at Phuket International Airport, since eight airlines already servicing Phuket have either ordered or made a commitment to the aircraft.

It is made of composite materials that reduce fuel consumption by 20%, taking long haul aviation to a new level.

Aeroflot, Air Berlin, China Eastern Airlines, China Southern Airlines, Hainan Airlines, Korean Air, Qatar Airways and TUI Travel, which all fly here, have placed orders and Thai Airways International has made a commitment for eight of the aircraft, with a final decision still to be made.

Phuket International Airport, with its 3,000 meter long runway, could easily handle the B787 since it can land on runways as short as 1,219 meters.

New York to Phuket may be 14,500 km, but the B787-8

version of the B787 can take it. It has a maximum flight distance of 15,700 km. St Petersburg in Russia is 16,000 km away, but that is still within the B787-9 larger version's flight capability of 16,300 km.

This type of service through airlines like Aeroflot, which already flies from Moscow, bringing in increasingly large numbers of Russian tourists, can only be positive for Phuket's future.

Russians have proven their determination to make it to Phuket's shores: at present the shortest flight time is 29 hours from Moscow

For Australians, who prop up Phuket during the low season, a 7,020 km flight from Melbourne on the B787 would be a doddle.

The aircraft can carry up to 240 passengers at Mach 0.85. three classes and 296 in a high density economy class arrangement.

This would suit a Phuket service as most of the tourists that come here travel economy class.

A new age of comfort will be ushered in with B787, which is packed with new innovations for enhanced passenger comfort.

The cabin windows are larger than any other civil airliners in services at centimeters by 47cm and at a higher level so passengers can maintain a view of the horizon.

Auto-dimming "smart glass" instead of window shades reduces cabin glare while maintaining trans-

The presence of LED lighting makes the cabin bulb-less, and gives it 128 color combinations.

Higher humidity in the cabin and advanced cabin air conditioning systems will provide better air quality. Filters to remove bacteria, viruses

and fungi will be in operation.

Internal pressure will be increased to the equivalent of 1,800 meters altitude instead of the usual 2,400 meters which will improve passenger comfort.

It's not all beer and skittles in the sky, however. The aircraft's introduction has been delayed for more than two years despite taking in a record 847 in advance orders.

There are questions about whether the carbon fuselage will show cracks and fatigue, will shatter and burn toxic fumes in a crash and the long term effects on the fuselage of its ability to absorb moisture.

But whatever the doubts, aircraft like the B787 and the Airbus equivalent the A350, which is due in 2013, are needed.

It is estimated that airlines will need 30,000 new passenger and freighter jets worth US\$ 3.6 trillion by 2029 to meet an increase in global traffic, led by the Asian region.

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Chinese mull Bt10bn island investment

REPRESENTATIVES of Chinese investment conglomerate Shang Mao Group met the Phuket Governor last week to express their interest in investing some 10 billion baht in Thailand, likely in Phuket or Chiang Mai.

Shang Mao Group President Wang Guiyuan told Tri Augkaradacha the same thing he told Deputy Prime Minister Sanan Kachornprasart at a meeting in Bangkok: that the company has an initial investment budget of 10 billion baht for Thailand.

"I am very interested to invest in Thailand, because we believe the democratic government will open the door for us. We have two options in mind, Phuket and Chiang Mai, but have not yet decided what industry to invest in. We are quite interested in the property and hotel sectors however," Mr Wang said.

Gov Tri said Phuket generates about 100 billion baht a year from its tourism industry, but still had room for growth.

"Many foreign investors have by 2013."

come to meet the Phuket Governor in recent years to discuss possible investment in projects such as light rail transport, the Patong Tunnel, and development in the property sector and tourism industry," he told the delegation.

Gov Tri said he was pleased to welcome any groups willing to fund Phuket's development as a sustainable tourism destination. He would assist any such firms with any bureaucratic hurdles they might face, he added.

"I welcome investors who don't take advantage of Phuket's natural resources and culture. They have to help keep the environment clean. I want to find balance between development and conservation," he said.

Phuket's single greatest infrastructure need was better public transport between Phuket Town and Phuket International Airport (PIA). This is needed to keep pace with airport expansion plans designed to boost passenger capacity there to 12.5 million by 2013.

Airport officials earlier said the annual number of passengers transiting though PIA surpassed the six million barrier for the first time in September this year. The figure is expected to reach 7.5 million by year's end.

A light rail project along Thepkrasattri Road, the island's main north-south artery, appears to be the best solution, Gov Tri said.

At the end of the meeting President Wang presented the governor with a gift bottle of moutai, a refined Chinese liquor distilled from fermented sorghum.

Shang Mao Group is a powerful investment firm operating banks, hotels and property businesses in Nanjing, the capital of Jiangsu Province.

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Chasing an African devil

Chasing the Devil


A YEAR or so ago, I wrote a book review in these pages about Tim Butcher's first book Blood River in which the intrepid Daily Telegraph African war correspondent retraces the footsteps of Henry Morton Stanley's trek across

In the eastern Congo, he does this mostly on small motorcycles down bush paths infested with murderous Hutu and Mai Mai militia bands.

Now Butcher is following the footsteps of Graham Greene whose 1935 march across the Liberian bush from Sierra Leone to the Atlantic ocean was chronicled with In Journey Without Maps.

The footsteps in this case are literal. Butcher and his companion David Poraj-Wilczynski walk the whole way.

It takes them three weeks and by the end the two men are so fit that they are clocking 30 miles a day out of desperate boredom and



a fierce desire to reach the Atlantic and the end of their footslog.

His latest book is Chasing the Devil (Chatto & Windus, London, 2010, 325pp), subtitled "The Search for Africa's Fighting

Like his first book, this is a real life thriller. The civil wars that ravaged both Liberia and Sierra Leone have been over for six years, yet the devastation is still complete.

Towns have not been rebuilt and people survive in the bush on subsistence farming.

Assorted bad guys might be still lurking in the jungle and Butcher

danger, indeed he wrote often of coming alive through brushes with death," Butcher writes.

"I felt a connection to Graham Greene's attitude. For years I had reported from war zones and had tolerated danger precisely because of its sense of thrill, of personal release as you witness life at its most unvarnished, humans stripped of all artifice as they cope with the ultimate drama of conflict.

Late in life, Graham Greene wrote how coming so close to death had stirred in him a passion-

Butcher had covered the wars in Sierra Leone and Liberia and had reported on cannibalistic rituals.

These he identifies with the Poro and Bundu secret societies, the first for men, the second for women. In both, boys and girls are circumcised and kept in the bush to learn the secrets of the tribe.

Never once does he mention the word "juju" or black magic.

Whatever connection they have to secret societies, juju masters do indeed tap into the forces of evil.

Butcher's two African companions are particularly terrified by "heart men" who remove and eat the hearts of their victims.

When Foday Sankoh – the rebel group leader that had terrorized Sierra Leone by mass amputations, rapes and murders – was finally captured he was in the company of his personal juju sorcerer.

As someone who spent more

than two years as a Peace Corps volunteer in the bush of Sierra Leone and drove across Liberia by motorcycle, I can attest to the evil power of iuiu.

My own take on the horrors of the two civil wars was that the soldiers, often children, were not only crazed by drugs but by the devil.

On its surface Chasing the Devil is an adventure yarn and a cracking good one, though Butcher does have an annoying habit of dragging in extraneous stories from his reporting days.

In the end he is pessimistic about the prospect of the nation state to dominate atomistic tribal interests.

"In the case of Liberia, with twenty recognizably different tribal groups and many more subgroups, it is the failure to force the devil to cede his power that has undermined the country's development and made it prone to civil strife and, ultimately, war."



From there he was invited to manage the kitchens at Joe's Downstairs and the other Baan Rim Pa restaurants.



Since then the Bangkok Heart Hospital administrators have come to Rino's aid, significantly lowering the cost of his operation.

Dr Boomiporn, who has worked on Rino's case, is now assembling a first-class team to perform the surgery, a procedure extremely rare in Thailand.

Thanks to the many events Ritchie organized, with contributions from hundreds of friends and supporters around the world, it now looks as if Rino's broken heart will finally be fixed.

With the operation now scheduled for November, Rino is looking forward to regaining his childhood and his many hobbies.

"Rino loves sports, but will never be able to pursue a career as a sportsman, even though he wants to," says Ritchie.

"But this operation will allow him to have a long and happy life, if successful," he added.

"There is a 1% chance of things going seriously wrong...and a 40% chance that Rino could have a heart attack or stroke during the operation," said Ritchie.

Doctors will have to lower Rino's body temperature and then stop his heart while they work to attach a ring inside the faulty valve in Rino's heart.

"All of this would

not be possible if it were not for the generosity of the many donors who came forward for Rino," said Ritchie.

One of the largest contributions, about 740,000 baht, came from an anonymous Hong Kong man.

Meanwhile on Phuket, runners who took part in the "Run4Rino Charity Run" at Nai Harn Lake last week will be pleased to know that enough funds have been raised for Rino's operation.

A planned charity concert scheduled for Koh Samui on October 24 will be postponed until after Rino's surgery.

A free concert to show the family's appreciation for the overwhelming support will be planned in the near future.

Any further money raised will go towards surgery for the next child on a Bangkok list of patients awaiting treatment for Ebstein's Anomaly, Ritchie said.

Ritchie is helping to form another foundation "Power Hearts" to help other sufferers around Thailand get the treatment they need.



Getting to know 14th century friends

Looking Back

SOMETIMES history is right in front of your eyes and you don't even know it.

There is a little restaurant on Choa Fa East Road in Chalong where you can nibble on a cheese platter, slurp a glass of wine and mull over Ming pottery from the 14th century while you wait for your main course to arrive.

Run by life-long collector and historian Michael Slanina and his wife Vilasinee Thephasadin Na Ayuthaya, the pair have accumulated an impressive repertoire of antiques.

While Michael's private collection has reached over 15,000 pieces, only a fraction of these are on display at Bonzai.

Items originate from different eras and civilizations from all over the world, says Michael.

There are even examples of Chinese pottery from the Song Dynasty (10th-13th century).

After you have glugged down the last of your wine and dusted off the remains of your meal – all quite lovely – amble through the small museum at the back of the restaurant until you find a series of pots and vases dating back to the Dvaravati period in



Thailand (6th-13th century).

"When I travel to different places, I try to find genuine historical artifacts that I could possibly buy and add to my collection. Many of the pieces I own originate from China, Vietnam and Cambodia. Many of them are also from Thailand," Michael says.


Being the owner of such a large collection of historical items can be tricky though.

Michael and Vilasinee have to



register all their items with the Department of Fine Arts, who ensure that the artifacts are cared for properly and will not deteriorate in the hands of private collectors.

"It's one reason why we can only display a limited amount of pieces at the restaurant. We have many items that date from prehistoric eras, and they require a lot of care because they are very fragile. A lot of conditions have to be met to

preserve them indefinitely.

"Too much humidity for example and the artifacts will deteriorate permanently," Vilasinee

Ming pottery on the other hand is a testament to Chinese mastery in the crafts.

Michael said many artifacts had been salvaged from ancient shipwrecks. Ancient maritime trade routes in the South China Sea, the Strait of Malacca and the Andaman Sea are dotted with ageold ships that met with unfortunate ends and spilled their cargo into the sea many centuries ago.

Many of the artifacts have spent a few epochs at the bottom of the sea and even after being rescued from the seabed, many are still covered with dead barnacles to prove their authenticity.

Yet they remain intact and retain their original beauty and color to an astonishing extent.

Michael says that the extraordinary resilience of Ming pottery could be attributed to the glaze Ming potters used to coat their finished works.

The glaze gave the artifacts astonishing tolerance towards the elements. After centuries on the seabed, weathering corrosive salt water and smashing tides, the salvaged pottery and vases could still be made to look brand new after a good deal of scrubbing.

Apart from ancient pottery, Michael also owns a huge collection of historical stamps.


His collection – passed down in his family for three generations – consists of over five million stamps, including the first issued stamp from every country in the world. Many of these countries no longer exist today, or have changed name.

Notable stamps that are on display include the United Kingdom's Penny Black, the first adhesive postage stamps to ever be used in the world, and the first stamps issued by the Thai government during the early reign of King Rama V.

Finally, Michael's historical collection also contains some rather large pieces that are sure to impress motoring enthusiasts.

Parked inside the restaurant are three rare vintage cars that have been restored close to their original conditions. Marvel at a 1953 red Triumph convertible, a 1975 Rolls Royce Silver Shadow or a 1981 Rolls Royce Silver Spirit. Although the cars are old they are still road-worthy and need to be driven around occasionally, says Michael. A rare find on Phuket. Bonzai is a captivating place and well worth a look.

Bonzai Restaurant is located at 7/1 Moo 4 on Choa Fa East Road in Chalong. Look out for the bonzai trees.



Sign of things to come in Patong

CONSTRUCTION work on the nine-million-baht sign welcoming motorists to Patong is already a month behind schedule due to severe weather conditions.

"Construction work has been abandoned while the heavy rains persist," said Patong municipal officer Siwapong Chechang.

"It is too dangerous to continue work when it rains, and subsequently, the project is going much slower than expected," he said.

Before work began in April, Patong Mayor Pian Keesin said the sign would mark a border between Kathu and Patong and that it would become a famous Patong landmark.

The project is funded by the

central government's Thai *Khem Kaeng* (Strong Thailand) financial stimulus package.

When completed, the new sign will feature the words "Patong City" in two-meter-high letters on a cliff face along the eastbound lane of the Patong Hill road, about 100 meters uphill from the shooting range.

Already under construction across the street is a walkway area and lookout point that will be 4.5 meters wide and 60 meters long when complete.

Workers building concrete forms must exercise extreme caution at the hillside construction site, which has a steep drop-off on one side and traffic along one of Phuket's most dangerous stretches of road on the other.

Those aren't the only dangers. Early into the construction phase, a project engineer at the site suffered a powerful electric shock requiring hospital treatment, a source told the *Gazette*.

If all goes according to plan, the lookout will one day afford views of the entrance to the 2.2-billion-baht traffic tunnel Patong Municipality wants to bore beneath the hill to make the commute between Patong and Kathu easier.

Those wishing to enjoy the view will have to do some legwork however, as there will be no room for parking along the road.

Four six-meter tall lighted pillars will illuminate the sign at night.

Each will be crowned with a large white ball spinning in water, as reference to Phuket's reputation as "The Pearl of the Andaman".

The pillars will be decorated with large replica banana leaves made of stone.

Patong Municipality Public Works Division chief architect Supasis Utairat said the banana leaves were to represent the banana trees that were once abundant along Patong Beach – before it was developed for tourism.

"Patong means 'banana leaf forest' in Thai, he explained.

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Taking the baht on tour abroad

DAILY news headlines lately have touted – for better or worse – the growing strength of Thailand's currency.

If the current economic situation were a children's fairytale, it could easily be titled "Jack, The Bean-stock and The Baht". As most of us know, Jack climbed higher and higher into the sky, until he disappeared into the clouds.

Most local residents and business folk on the ground, though, are sleeping these days with one eye open on the escalating baht.

Insomnia aside, questions looming about how tourism and property will be affected by the market gyrations remain in the realm of "it's still too early to tell".

At a time when Asian currencies are rising and booming regional economies are taking the US dollar for a beating, watchers of all things Thai remain perplexed about the underlying local funda-

Exports remain a critical part of the larger economy, tracking anywhere from 55% to 60% of the GDP. Contrary to local wishful thinking, tourism weighs in at only 6.5%, though adding in an appropriately weighted service sector and related employment figures would see it hit double digits.

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As the baht soars, many domestic tourists are opting for holiday destination in the West.



global financial crises and some jitters from the recent and ongoing political fallout, domestically Thailand has weathered the storm in amazingly good form.

What is worrying analysts now is a huge inflow of foreign speculative investment into the country's coffers, effectively pumping up the baht like a balloon.

Long-term industrial investors are crying foul over the lack of currency controls, as mega-investments into industries such as automobile manufacturing for export are becoming less competitive by the day, given the currently unfavorable exchange rates.

From all this, two important questions have arisen. The foremost is: Will the economy be able to continue sustained growth if the all-important export GDP driver shrinks?

And of course for the local contingent of retirees who have US dollar savings or fixed income from abroad, the question is: Is it better for the baht be at 25 or 40

There are no easy answers.

For tourism, which has seen a strong shift to regional markets, the impact has been minimal as industry players also benefit from local currencies rising in value.

As Phuket has limited reliance on the long-haul US market, risk is naturally mitigated.

However, certain segments such as medical tourism, which caters to more affluent North American and European clients, is watching its "value-for-money" attraction being swiftly eroded away.

Property players might expect a pessimistic outcome. The island has always attracted strong overseas interest from Hong Kong, Singapore and elsewhere throughout the region.

Many of these potential buyers have US currency savings or investments and the state of play today might have them warming the bench longer than anyone expected. One key aspect often overlooked is the domestic market for Phuket tourism, which has continued to grow year after year despite the machinations in the nation's capital.

As the so-called middle class, or "more affluent white collar working class", see their baht grow, they are now looking to take holidays in the US or Europe, where there is simply more bang for their baht.

is expected to fuel tourism growth and now they may be re-directed to longer haul destinations.

The message is clear: Phuket is not just competing with Bali, Langkawi or Vietnam – it is competing with the world.

For a growing number of local residents who have opted to retire or invest here, the attractiveness of a value destination is shrinking and more than a few businesses have opted to close shop.

Many people are citing the rising cost of living in Phuket, but in fact much can be attributed to the number of higher-end shops and imported goods now available here.

Anyone wanting to view how base costs remain fairly constrained can simply take a trip to Super Cheap.

Even as I write this, calls for intervention is taking place at every level for the flexing currency.

Shape your home, and legal outlook

Property Legal

THERE are a few things that must be clarified when hiring a contractor to build your dream home.

A construction agreement about terms and conditions, specifying the structure, is usually required to be signed by the contractor and yourself as the employer.

When these are agreed upon, the contractor will start construction.

Typically, invoices will be sent to the employer when agreed construction milestones are fulfilled.

Ideally, the invoices should be supported by documentation showing completion of the respective construction phases.

When work on your new home is nearly finished, the contractor should notify you in writing and advise that the construction will shortly be ready for handover.

Usually this completion notice will include a date for a meeting and inspection.

This provides the employer with the opportunity to verify that the construction work has been performed to a good standard.

If the employer or appointed surveyor locates defects, they can be listed in a concise defect list or inspection report, signed by both parties, which stipulates a time pe-

riod for the defects to be rectified.

This stage of the construction process is often called practical completion and should be followed by a further joint inspection verifying that all defects as described have been rectified as agreed.

Despite practical completion, the employer should be entitled to

withhold consent to accept handover of the structure, and a considerable amount of the contract price, or retention, payable until all the construction work is completed. In particular, all identified defects, and a final acceptance of the construction work issued.

After you accept the completed

structure, delivery can then take place and the retention money released.

In the event that the contractor would fail to make good all identified defects, the employer should have the right to appoint a third party contractor and pay the occurring expense out of the retention funds. After accepting delivery of the completed structure, contractual warranties are important.

They require a contractor to fix any defects occurring within the agreed warranty period. The term of warranty may vary, but it should not be less than five years for structural and two years for non-structural defects.

Unfortunately, sometimes contractors fail to fulfill their warranty commitments, in which case a construction agreement can allow the employer to retain a reasonable amount of the contract price, for an agreed period of time, to ensure that the contractor will fulfill warranty obligations.

In the event that the contractor would fail, the employer should again have the right to appoint a third party contractor and pay the occurring expense out of the withheld funds.

To summarize, when opting for hiring a contractor to construct your dream home it is advisable to verify that the legal documentation includes provisions helping the employer with appropriate tools and instruments securing the contractor's due performance in relation to quality work and remedy of defects.

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Little red flowers with power

Next on our Top 20 Phuket plants is the Jatropa. Its unique and bright flowers can be seen all over the island. Here's why...

TODAY'S focus will be on the Jatropha, a member of the large rubber tree genus. There are at least two distinct species which deserve a mention.

Jatropha integerrima, or Patavia in Thai, is the more peregrine or spicy variety.

It is frequently grown in the tropics as it hails from Cuba. It is widely available in garden centers here.

It is a shrub that can reach three or four meters, and while it can be used as a border or hedge in street plantings, is more often seen in gardens gracing a wall.

It produces a profusion of single red, or less usually pink, flowers which appear in clusters at the end of thin stems. Its large, often lobed, evergreen leaves are light green and nicely complement the blooms.

The *peregrine Jatropha* has a very open habit, which means it can be grown close to other plants, and it will tolerate a wide range of soils.

It is an amenable shrub which enjoys full sun, but will accept part shade. Given the right conditions, it will flower all year. It also does not mind being pruned.

Propagation is by seeds, or by cuttings which need to be dried off before being put in the earth.

While it is a good-natured shrub, the *Jatropha's* Achilles heel is its lack of resistance to disease, especially fungal attacks.

Less significantly, its milky latex may irritate the skin. Apart from this, it is a good starting choice for the new garden and gardener.

The second member of the family is *Jatropha podagrica*, sometimes known as the coral plant.

It has many far-fetched names such as Buddha belly, the gout plant and Guatemalan rhubarb. In Thailand it is known as *malako-farang*.

This is a much less common plant than the peregrine *Jatropha*, and you may have some trouble locating specimens. But it's well worth the trouble.

The foliage bears some resemblance to that of the peregrine *Jatropha*, being deeply lobed, but the leaves are altogether larger and more attractive.

They may exceed a foot in diameter. The shrub itself is, however, compact and rarely exceeds three feet in height.

This makes it a suitable candidate for a container. Additionally, it is succulent and can withstand dry periods. Propagation is by seeds which take only three to five days to germinate.

Each cluster of florets normally contains at least one seed pod.

Podagrica has two very unusual features. The swollen, bottle-shaped, gray stem which resembles a small baobab tree, and terminal sprays of tiny, brilliant, scarlet flowers on long stems above the foliage, reminiscent of red coral.

Given the right conditions – plenty of sun – the shrub will produce them all year long.

While these flowers are its principal attraction, podagrica is strikingly unorthodox in every way. And it will certainly provide a talking point for visitors to your garden.

Both the plants get a vote for different reasons. On looks *podagrica* wins, but together they merit a single inclusion in the top 20.

Tip of the week

Knowing your zones

IN NATURE, climate decides the types of plants found within an area

Several climatic factors affect growth: humidity, daylight hours, season length, rainfall, temperature, even wind patterns.

However, in books on gardening, temperature is key: it is the factor that plants are usually judged against.

The United States Department of Agriculture devised a system of eleven plant hardiness zones based on

minimum temperatures.

Now accepted by most horticultural writers, the system helps the reader to select suitable plants for his/her patch.

In southern Thailand for example, you should ideally select species with a rating of 10 to 11.

Plants grown outside their preferred zonal range – say eight or nine – will probably survive in Phuket's heat rather than thrive. Anything below 7-8 is a
