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Bars fight for late trading

TWO mass protests at Provincial Hall have failed to win bar owners in Muang District a temporary reprieve from the ongoing crackdown on late trading.

About 500 bar owners and staff from Phuket Town and other popular tourist areas in the district, including Rawai, Chalong, Kata and Karon, staged a protest at Provincial Hall on Monday.

The effort, hot on the heels of a 200-strong protest last Friday, was staged to support protest leader Suratin Lian-udom in his formal request for night venues to close later than the current 1am curfew.


Mr Suratin is president of the Muang Phuket Entertainment Business Operators Club and Mayor of Rassada, which is in Muang District.

The request seeks to extend the closing time and the legal sale of alcohol to 2am for nightclubs and bars, and to 4am for restaurants offering food and alcohol.

"Tourists always stay out late in entertainment venues. They usually turn up about 11pm, after they have had dinner and a walk on the beach. If we have to close at 1am, it means we have only two hours to do business," Mr Suratin told the *Gazette*.

"The crackdown is affecting not only venue owners, but also bar staff and other people working in related industries, such as motorcycle taxi drivers and street vendors," he added.

In return for approval of their request,

Mr Suratin said bar owners would strictly follow four measures agreed to in a Memorandum of Understanding signed between bar operators and Muang District officers on December 27: to prohibit weapons, lewd

performances and entry to anyone under 20 years of age, and the use and sale of drugs on their premises.

Vice Governor Weerawat Janpen, who received the request on behalf of the governor, told the protest leaders, "The officers must enforce the law because drugs are a big problem in Thailand.

"Phuket is a 'red zone' for drugs. Many bars, nightclubs and restaurants are used for conducting drug deals, so restricting bar trading hours helps reduce crime."

Asked whether the raids would continue, V/Gov Weerawat said he did not have the authority to answer that question.

"We want to be friends with the entertainment industry, but at the same time we must do our jobs," he said.

Airport boss under investigation

PHUKET International Airport Director Prathuang Sornkham was transferred "immediately" last Wednesday pending a disciplinary investigation into two Paraguayans departing via the airport without passports.

Mr Prathuang will become a "Senior Specialist 10" Airports of Thailand (AoT) executive at AoT headquarters in Bangkok.

The move stems from an incident in October when a group of nine passengers left Phuket aboard an Emirates Airline flight. Two passengers were allegedly without passports, AoT President Serirat Prasutanond said.

An initial investigation found that five or six of its Phuket officers were involved, he said.

Narongchai Tanadchangsaeng, deputy director of Suvarnabhumi Airport, has been appointed head of the disciplinary investigation, which is expected to conclude its work within 15 days.

Blaze engulfs Patong slum

WORK is underway to provide relief to the 120 residents whose homes were destroyed by a fire that swept through a Patong slum last Sunday night.

A makeshift relief center has been set up at Soi Baan Buntham, where the fire broke out, to receive and to distribute donations.

Governor Tri Augkaradacha was at the scene the next day to hand out relief items, such as canned fish and rice, provided by the Governor's Office.

In addition, the Kusoldham Rescue Foundation gave 1,000 baht to each of the victims, mostly Burmese workers.

Tents have been pitched along the street so those who lost their homes have a place to sleep, and the Rotary Club of Patong Beach is calling for donations of clothing, bedding food and cash

The urgently required items can be left at Woody's Sandwich Shoppes across the island.

The extent of the damage caused remains unknown.

Patong officials confirmed there were no deaths and no people hospitalized in the blaze.

Tuptim survives 22-hour operation

PHUKET's Tuptim Jadngooluem, just eight months old, is recovering well at Ramathibodi Hospital in Bangkok after surviving a 22-hour operation last week.

Tuptim was diagnosed at three months with a terminal liver condition known as biliary obstruction and has spent over a month in hospital awaiting a parental donor liver transplant to save her life.

To keep her baby alive, Tuptim's mother, Nit, donated part of her liver during the operation, performed last Wednesday by Bangkok-based specialist Dr Sumate Teeraratkul.

Tuptim remains in the intensive care unit at Ramathibodi Hospital, where she is expected to stay for several weeks. Mrs Nit was discharged from hospital on Sunday and is recovering well.

Mrs Nit told the *Gazette* that herself and Tuptim's father Rattanachai "Kru Nai" are delighted with the operation's success and that their daughter is on the road to recovery.

"I've got pains in my stomach and leg, but I'm feeling okay.

We're so happy that Tuptim is recovering and the doctors say her liver is working well," she said.

"For the first time in a long time the whites of Tuptim's eyes are white rather than yellow and jaundiced. She is expected to be able to breath by herself this week."

Grainne Farrell, who headed the fund-raising campaign to save Tuptim, told the *Gazette*, "The doctor said the operation couldn't have gone any better.

"It is brilliant news and let's hope there will be no complications in the coming weeks."

Teens arrested for shooting security guard

POLICE have arrested two teenage gang members for the murder of a Phuket security guard at a municipal parking lot last month.

Phitakpong Chaetaphai and Namchok Saetan, both 19, were taken by police last Thursday to re-enact the events that led to security guard Winai Buathongkham being killed by a single bullet to the head.

According to police, on the night of the murder the two youths drove a motorbike past a government workers' housing complex near Saphan Hin when they spotted three "enemies".

Namchok, riding pillion, allegedly pulled out a home-made (thai pradit) gun and fired shots at the three with intent to kill.

Instead of reaching their intended targets, one of the bullets hit Mr Winai in the head, police said.

However, according to police, the teenagers say the bullet "accidentally went straight to the booth where Mr Winai was sleeping.

Police said that both have a history of arrests on drug and robbery charges.

Each holiday package is expected to fetch around 10,000

Donations will be accepted until January 31, with the packages sent to Sydney the following day.

Dive site closure will not affect tourism: official

THE immediate closure of many dive sites in seven marine national parks will not have a big impact on Phuket's critical tourism industry, says at least one official.

"It will not affect tourism much as we're not closing whole parks, just some parts that probably don't account for [even] 10% of each park," said Malinee Jannoi of the Center for Tourism Development, Department of National Parks.

"Tourists can go to other dive sites instead," he added.

Mr Malinee suggested more sites should be off-limits.

He explained the closures follow a failed public-education campaign aimed at protecting corals at national park dive sites.

"We are trying to inform tour guides and tourists not to stand on the corals, but we're not getting a good response. So officers should be strict and punish anyone breaking the rules," he added.

Sunan Arunnopparat, directorgeneral of the National Parks, announced the closures on January 20 – effective immediately, with no re-opening date set.

Mr Sunan said coral at the sites needed protection after huge areas were found bleached by warmer water temperatures - a

factor widely accepted as an effect of global warming.

Nipon Pongsuwan, a specialist at the Phuket Marine Biological Center, said it will take "many years" for the coral to recover; closing them for a few months will have little effect.

Surapoom Kwankajohnkit, of Dive Master Co Phuket, said, "The closing will not help the coral to recover. It will be worse because if there are no dive boats around dive sites, fishing boats will anchor and fish close to the islands."

Sea Bees Khao Lak, which runs dive tours to the Similans, saw the writing on the wall. "This has not affected us at all as we have not dived there since the beginning of the season," said manager Markus.

"It makes me very sad that divers are being blamed for damaging coral, which is absolutely ridiculous. Of course protection is needed, but logical protection. Coral bleaching is not from divers."

Police to erect shelter for tourists

THE Tourist Police in Phuket are teaming up with Coca-Cola bottler Haad Thip to build a refuge shelter for foreign tourists who fall on hard times during their stay on the island.

With millions of tourists visiting Phuket each year, inevitably some run into problems.

These include financial difficulties, having no place to stay, and physical or mental health issues, said Phuket Tourist Police Superintendent Ekachai Pramanakul.

Many of the problems are al-

cohol-related, said Phuket's Tourist Police chief.

In some cases, tourists fall prey to gangs involved in gambling, property investment scams or

With support from Haad Thip, the regional Tourist Police will build temporary accommodations near their headquarters on Yaowarat Road in Phuket Town.

The one-bedroom building will provide both tourists and expats with a place to stay in case of an emergency.

The Tourist Police will co-operate with honorary consuls based in Phuket to establish a fund which will take care of tourists in trouble and help them return home as soon as possible, said Lt Col Ekachai.

Some tourists may need to leave Thailand quickly, because they could be putting others at risk,

The presence of foreign vagrants could also have an affect on Phuket and Thailand's image, he added.

DEA 'Most Wanted' items spark craze

TOURISTS and workers along Soi Bangla pushed and shoved to get their hands on the latest craze: DEA 'Most Wanted' souvenirs.

The free handout was held from 10 to 11pm on January 19, with hundreds of people scrambling to get beer coolers, t-shirts, pens and other items emblazoned with images of the US DEA's most wanted criminals.

DEA Thailand Director Joseph Reagen said, "It is a part of a multi-city effort. We have done this in Chiang Rai, Pattaya, Soi Nana in Bangkok and now in Phuket.

"We have received clues through this form of co-operation before, and we believe we will get more from here. People in the community need to report this."

The sacred unborn baby of Village 11

FOR 10 months now, residents of a village in Suphan Buri province have been wondering when Niphawan Bunjaroen, 35, is going to give birth.

Niphawan, who lives in Village 11 in Nong Makha Mong subdistrict, claims to have been pregnant with her fourth child for a rather long time: 19 months, to be precise.

Doctors say the maybemother-to-be, whose weight has shot up from 60 to 89 kilos since she got "pregnant", has a buildup of fluid in her abdomen.

But neither Niphawan nor husband Thanonsak Saetang, 45, believe that. They insist Niphawan is with child, and not just any child. The baby, they claim, is sacred.

This strange tale came to the attention of a *Daily News* reporter who visited the couple at their home on January 20, finding Niphawan looking every bit like a woman in the final stages of pregnancy.

Niphawan, who makes a living selling chicken at the local fresh

market, said she had three children with a previous husband before the marriage ended. Since then, she has lived with widower Thanongsak, whose previous wife died about three years ago.

In 2009, the couple decided they wanted a baby together, but try as they might, Niphawan could not get pregnant. So Niphawan's sister recommended she go ask a famous mystic, Father Pu Saming Dam, to help her have a baby.

Niphawan did as her sister suggested, travelling to Kanchanaburi province to visit Father Pu Saming Dam. The medium told her she would have a baby: a holy baby that would make the family rich.

Sure enough, in June 2009,

Niphawan started to get morning sickness and put on weight and became convinced she was pregnant.

In August 2009, she went to a clinic, but the doctor there told her she was not pregnant. In fact, the doctor said, she was suffering from an enlarged heart.

Niphawan returned home and since then has got bigger and bigger. Nineteen months later, she still gets morning sickness and cannot eat any meat.

Thanongsak said that before they visited Father Pu Saming Dam, the family was very poor. But since then they have sold so much chicken that they have become rich and now have a car and a house.

They believe, just as the mystic said, that the unborn child has brought them good fortune.

Thanongsak, therefore, said he wasn't worried that his wife was still pregnant after 19 months. His child, he said, was holy and would be born when the time came.

Police slam reports on Swede's death

PATONG Police have lashed out at media reports and online postings asserting there had been any kind of party in the Patong Tower room of Jan Larsson, 53, at the time of, or during the hours leading up to, his death last week.

"The media have been very wrong in their reporting of this. There were no fights in the room, nor do we believe there were even any people [other than the deceased] in the room, at the time of Mr Larsson's death," said Sub Lt Pattapee Srichay.

"We are checking CCTV footage to be absolutely certain no one went to the room with him."

Staff at the condo building agree with Lt Pattapee, saying that Mr Larsson was a loner who often drank quite heavily.

"I have read the story in other media and it makes me angry as it is incorrect. He didn't take any-

one with him to his room before his body was found, and I am the one who found it there." one employee said.

Sub Lt Pattapee reconfirmed that police had yet to reach any conclusions as to the cause of the Swede's death but stressed they never suggested it was suicide.

"The suicide theory does not come from the police; maybe it's just forum gossip, but we reject it and take no responsibility for it," he said.

Airline hires transsexual hostesses

NEW airline P.C. Air has delighted Thailand's transsexuals after hiring three "third sex" air hostesses in a recruitment drive on January 24.

Among the lucky applicants was winner of the Miss Tiffany Universe 2007 transsexual beauty contest Thanyarat "Film" Jiraphatpakorn.

Of the 30 candidates who were selected from 200 applicants at Bangkok's Esplanade shopping mall, 17 were women, 10 were men and three were "third sex" candidates.

P.C. Air chief executive Peter Chan said his airline was the first in the world to hire transsexual air hostesses. Chan said he wanted the move to serve as an example to Thai society of respect for equal rights.

"In the past, many organisations accepted applications from transsexuals but didn't do so openly," he told *Khao Sod*.

Chan said transsexuals had to have undergone full sex-realignment in order to apply as air hostesses at P.C. Air and had to be exactly like women in every way - even their voices.

Chan said he wasn't afraid of Thai society's reaction to the move, adding that the airline may also hire disabled people in the

Ms Thanyarat said she was tremendously honored to have been hired.

PAD turns against PM

AROUND THE nation

IN A remarkable turnaround, yellow shirt protesters on January 25 began a campaign against the Abhisit Vejjajiva coalition government they were instrumental in bringing to power.

The People's Alliance for Democracy (PAD) want Mr Abhisit to take a harder line in a border dispute with Cambodia, vowing to continue the protest "indefinitely" until their demands are met.

The evening before the protest began, police seized bombs and ammunition and arrested several men allegedly planning to sabotage the rally.

The Manager website, owned by PAD leader Sondhi Limthongkul, claimed the men were red shirts. Others claimed the incident was a ploy by the yellow shirts to "save face" because of the low attendance of their protest.

The PAD wants the government to revoke a memorandum of understanding with Cambodia on border demarcation, withdraw from the United Nations World Heritage Committee and evict Cambodians from disputed border areas.

The demands relate to the ongoing dispute over control of Preah Vihear temple, which is claimed by both countries.

The recent arrest and trial of seven Thais for trespassing into Cambodia has also inflamed tensions. Five of the group including Democrat MP Panich jail sentences and fines and returned to Thailand January 22.

Somkwamkid and his secretary Ratree Pipatanapaiboon have been

charged with espionage and remain in Phnom Penh awaiting trial. If convicted, they face 10 years in jail.

Mr Veera is one of the leaders of the so-called Thai Patriots Network, a hard-line nationalist group that also began a protest close to the PAD rally on the same day.

The group supports the PAD's demands but wants Abhisit to step down over his weak stance on the border issue and the trial of the seven Thais in Phnom Penh. Also rallying is the Santi Asoke Buddhist sect, which supports the PAD.

The same day, red-shirt-aligned groups began a counter-rally, claiming the yellow shirts were trying to provoke a military coup.

In 2008, PAD protests against allies of former prime minister Thaksin Shinawatra culminated in the occupation of Bangkok's airports for eight days.

The crisis ended when a court dissolved the ruling People Power Party, aligned to Mr Thaksin. Mr Abhisit was then able to assume the premiership after assembling a Democrat Party-led coalition government.

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Ukranian man claims 14-year slave ordeal

A UKRAINIAN engineer claims a Thai-owned oxygen factory held him captive and forced him into slavery for 14 years.

Anatoliy Vdovychenko, 57, lodged a complaint against the Pathum Thani company with the Department of Special Investigation (DSI) on January 24.

Mr Vdovychenko is demanding the owner, whom he described as an elderly Thai-Chinese woman, pay him 14 years of unpaid wages.

He eventually escaped from the ordeal January 11 after a Burmese colleague who left the company wrote to his family in Ukraine. They alerted Interpol and the Ukrainian Embassy. Consular staff then visited the factory and threatened to call the police.

Mr Vdovychenko said he arrived in Thailand in 1996 as a specialist in oxygen equipment installation and the factory promised him a full-time position with 30,000 baht a month and other benefits.

He said that when he demanded 600,000 baht in back pay in 1998, the employer confiscated his passport and refused to let him leave.

The DSI said it was investigat-Vdovychenko's ing Mr accusations. The factory owner has admitted to employing the engineer, *The Nation* reported.

Playing host to unlucky tourists

PLANS by the Tourist Police to build a shelter for foreign tourists who fall on hard times in Phuket is laudable and long-overdue, as evidenced by the number of hard luck cases whose travails have been chronicled in these pages over the years.

Exact details of the plan have yet to be revealed, but Ekachai Pramanakul, chief of the Tourist Police office in Phuket Town, said the shelter will provide temporary refuge for foreign tourists who would otherwise have to go without (see News pages).

It's hard not to find this approach commendable and much thanks is due to Haad Thip for providing the funding.

The sight of unwashed vagrants panhandling, lying drunk or being stepped over as they lay unconscious on sidewalks across the island is depressing sight to all but the most callous of souls.

Despite the best efforts of the staff at the Mitr Maitree homeless shelter in Rassada, the harsh reality is that the homeless problem in Phuket continues to worsen. Unfortunately, under its charter Mitr Maitree can only accepts adult Thais, not foreigners.

Allowing well-intended guests to our country to fall into a state of vagrancy through no fault of their own is simply unacceptable, especially given Thailand's world-renowned reputation for hospitality.

Homelessness of course comes in many forms and develops for a wide variety of rea-

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sons. There are even people who willingly adopt this lifestyle, opting to become "urban huntergatherers" rather than trying to keep up with the rat race that many more conventional employment opportunities offer.

Obviously, the types of tenants the Tourist Police expect to take up lodging in the new facility will not fall into this category.

Lt Col Ekachai has been quoted saying that the facility will be earmarked for "good" foreign tourists whose misfortunes are not self-inflicted, such as victims of crimes, scams or greedy temptresses. There will be no room at the inn for "bad tourists": foreigners who engage in criminal activity will be prosecuted, same as before.

Tourist arrival figures to the island continue to grow, with 3.5 million arrivals at the airport higher than ever before in 2010.

The island's complement of 16 honorary consuls do their best at the thankless task of helping compatriots who get into trouble here, but many are already at the breaking point – and the number of cases continues to rise.

Properly run, the completed shelter should go a long way to solidify the Tourist Police motto: Your First Friend.

After all, as the famously ambiguous saying goes: "a friend in need is a friend indeed."

Is she entitled to be paid for holidays or not? They say she is not.

It depends on whether she handed her employer a letter requesting the leave.

This is a common condition of employment. Any leave must be approved by the employer before it is taken.

Special leave is different from other forms of leave; such as sick leave and annual leave. According to employment regulations, employers can cut an employee's salary for taking sick leave.

However, she should have been paid her normal day's salary or given a day off in lieu of any public holidays she worked. If she has not, she can sue the company.

Please note that if a complaint is filed against the employer, the investigation will look into both sides

Foreigners owning homes in own names

I am retired in Chalong and just finishing building a house here.

The land on which the house is built is in my Thai wife's name, but I would like to have the house registered in my name.

I believe that this can be done through a "yellow" *tabien baan* (house registration document), but I would like to know how and where to do this.

An officer at Muang District Office, replies:

A yellow tabien baan, also called a Tor Ror 13 or a house registration document, does not provide any proof of ownership of a property or dwelling.

All a yellow *tabien baan* does is provide proof of where a foreigner lives.

You will need to contact the Phuket Provincial Land Office (PPLO) in Phuket Town to secure

Price rises run foul by the chicken or the egg?

First PERSON

WE ARE currently facing an egg shortage in Thailand, which has led to high prices.

I have heard that in response to the rising prices, the government will begin testing the idea of selling eggs by the kilogram in some markets in the Bangkok area.

If this policy is introduced in Phuket, I don't think it will work.

Every customer I have spoken to disagrees with this idea. They said it's complicated and it would affect everyone.

I don't see any good points in this policy at all. The method is complicated and difficult. Customers will spend more time in selecting the eggs they want to weigh.

Restaurant owners will also have problems calculating their costs as they will now know how many eggs they will receive from each order and some dishes require consistency in egg size to maintain quality.

I put a tray of 30 "size zero [largest size]" eggs on a scale and the weight was 2.2 kilograms. Under the current "pay-by-the-egg" system, the total price is 105 baht for the 30 eggs.

However, if we followed the government's plans charge 52 baht per kilogram, the 30 eggs would cost 114.4 baht – that's a 9.4 baht increase in price. So, I'm won-

dering who stands to gain and who stands to lose here.

The government said that it may just be that the public needs time to get used to the new method, but it's not like that. Why do they need to bring us problems? I don't think this is going to work.

If the government wants to solve the problem of high egg prices and help reduce farmers'

costs, they need to lower the price of chicken feed.

I used to raise chickens and I know that feed is the main cost in running a farm. The current price of chicken feed is very expensive.

Has the government ever tried checking what the real cost of chicken feed is?

Once feed prices are reduced, farmers and consumers will benefit – eggs will be cheap as well.

'Steering you in the wrong direction'

WITH the huge number of motorcycles operating in Phuket, more riders should be aware that one of the most important maneuvers to master when operating a motorcycle is correct turning technique.

Turning requires you to lean the motorcycle in the direction you wish to turn. To do this safely, there are certain actions required to make it turn when and where you want.

A motorcycle will steer in the direction it is leaned, but what many new motorcycle riders do not understand is the effect of "counter-steering".

Counter-steering means turning the handlebars in the direction opposite to the one you want to turn the motorcycle. If you are riding at moderate or high speeds and you turn the front wheel to the left, the normal reaction of the bike is to lean to the right, causing the bike to turn right. This happens because the force caused by the wheel shifting left, forces the bike to lean and turn right.

If you try to turn left and lean left all at once, it will usually force you straight ahead – or possibly even over the handlebars if the front brakes lock.

The simple counter-steering technique requires no strength or no shifting of body weight on the seat – you can do it with the tips of your fingers.

Learning how to counter-steer properly should be one of the basics of how to operate a motorcycle safely. It applies to

sports bikes, sit-ups, cruisers, choppers – basically all bikes over 250cc, where simply shifting your body weight will not be enough to control the turn.

For lighter weight mopeds, counter-steering is less important, but should still be taught to help get riders around obstacles on the road and prevent accidents.

Every big bike owner I've met in Phuket has laughed at me when I've tried to educate them about counter-steering. However, a simple demonstration of the technique at low speed in the carpark proved my point.

Counter-steering allows you to turn the motorcycle sharply and safely. It is very simple to do and makes riding a motorcycle far less scary, and much more fun.

proof of ownership of your home.

PPLO Chief Paitoon Lertkrai, replies:

Any foreigner who signs as the applicant for the building permit that is filed with local *OrBorTor* (Tambon Administration Organi-

zation) or municipality is automatically registered as the owner of the home being built.

The Land Office is not the correct authority for issuing that document. All we can do is officially recognize a rental agreement involving a foreigner.

A lawyer at Arunrat Legal Consultant, replies:

A foreigner can own a house legally in his own name by buying the house and leasing the land from his Thai wife – through legally binding contracts.


This way, a foreigner can have legal rights over the house.

For example, if a foreigner passes away, the house can be included as part of the estate to be inherited by his family.

Under this arrangement, the foreigner can rent the house out to other people.

The land lease agreement can be for either the 30-year legal maximum, or limited for the term of the natural life of yourself (as the lessee) or your wife (as the lessor).

To do this, you and your wife must apply at the PPLO in person. You must take with you the original plus photocopies of the land title deed, the building permit issued by local the *OrBorTor* or municipality, your passport and your wife's national identification card



Currencies worth saving in

Retirement Years

HERE'S a common question in the retirement world: "Which currency is best to save and invest in?"

If committing to future cash outflows, such as a mortgage or setting up a savings plan, you want to match the currency you earn with that you commit to, if possible. That's the easy part.

The trickier part is which currency to make investments in, especially if you are uncertain about your future.

I am a believer in keeping options open. A metaphor Dale Carnegie uses in his book *How to Stop Worrying and Start Living* is helpful in this situation.

Mr Carnegie says keeping one's supply lines open in a war is best. If you do, you can keep fighting until the very last moment and then make your escape.

In other words, if you keep relocation options open, you will not be trapped somewhere with no escape plan.

Trying to predict which currencies are going to outperform others in the future is not advisable. Short-term currency plays may be beneficial, but long-term speculation is best left to industry professionals.

The best way to achieve savings that will hold their global value and purchasing power is to diversify across all major currencies. This can be done by investing in funds that are denominated in different currencies and trying to keep the mix evenly spread while maintaining desired asset allocation.

For example, if there were six funds desired for investment, they should be allocated proportionately.

It will be easy to find funds denominated in US Dollars, Pounds Sterling, and Euros, so the first thing to look for is if any of the desired funds have a series denominated in another strong currency, such as Swiss Francs, Australian Dollars, Singapore Dollars or Japanese Yen, and invest in a few of these.

When you are down to the final three funds you can put one each into dollars, pounds and euros. If you have a larger number of funds to invest in, and can't find other currency options, you could also place small currency hedges against proportional chunks of your portfolio.

This is more complicated, but most banks should be able to get you hedged via forward contracts.

Another way to diversify would be to invest in funds that have already diversified their underlying holdings. The funds themselves will still be denominated in a single currency, and therefore subject to some foreign exchange risk, but the underlying product will be diversified

At the end of the day, it is impossible to eliminate risk. Many investors end up accepting some risk factors, rather than being

bothered too much by it.

Those who have moved substantial savings into Thailand over the past five years have been lucky. Other investment issues aside, they have gained as the baht has strengthened.

Conversely, those who have ignored exchange rate risks and left their money in the UK, have felt their purchasing power diminish.

Unfortunately, even my recommended approach would only have lessened this. This is one of the "taxes" of living in Phuket.

Keeping cash savings of 50 per cent in Thailand and 50 per cent in a diversified basket of currencies can help you stay protected whether you relocate or stay forever. But the downside of hedging is that whichever way the baht goes, you will experience a loss on one half of your savings.

This is the cost of hedging. It is essentially an insurance premium to avoid a much bigger loss should the worst transpire.

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Getting tough on tax

THE Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (*OrBorJor*) is threatening to take legal action against about 30 per cent of hotel operators in Phuket who fail to pay the controversial hotel-room tax.

The organization hopes an awareness campaign – backed by the threat of legal measures – can help it raise hotel-room tax revenues from last year's 60 million baht to 70 million baht this year.

OrBorJor President Paiboon Upatising said he was confident the organization would hit this target because the number of hotels paying the tax is on the rise.

The hotel-room tax, which is levied at one per cent of room revenues, was introduced amid widespread opposition in 2000.

The *OrBorJor* would launch a campaign to emphasize the importance of paying the hotelroom tax and the benefits it brought to the tourism industry, Mr Paiboon said.

The *OrBorJor* invests the tax money into developing the island and its tourism industry, he said.

If hotels fail to pay the tax after this campaign, the *OrBorJor* will take legal action, he warned.

Nevertheless, Mr Paiboon said he was confident that those operating outside the system would be tempted by the privileges that came with compliance. For example, hotels who pay get first choice on booths in *OrBorJor*-organized tourism roadshows.

The *OrBorJor* chief said that this year the organization had allocated 60 million baht to boosting tourism. Of this, 20 million baht will be spent on road shows, both within Thailand and abroad, that will emphasize Phuket's readiness to welcome more tourists.

Aside from this, the *OrBorJor* will expand installation of CCTV cameras and continue to fund the provision of lifeguards, he said.

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Network switch service coming

FIVE Thai mobile phone operators will provide a mobile number portability service in Phuket and four other provinces from next month.

The service was launched late last year and at present is only available in Greater Bangkok.

Mobile number portability allows subscribers to keep their existing phone numbers even if they switch to a different network.

The five mobile operators -Advanced Info Service (AIS), DTAC, True Move, CAT Telecom and TOT – are expanding the service to Phuket, followed soon after by Phitsanuloke, Rayong, Ayutthaya and Udon Thani. In the

next few months, it is hoped the service will go nationwide.

Operator AIS has been given a quota of 300 switches per day from February onwards.

Each AIS branch in Phuket has been allocated a quota of 20 switches per day, in order to ensure smooth service.

Customers who wish to use the service will be dealt with on a first-come, first-serve basis.

In order to request the mobile number portability service, users need to have their old SIM card and official proof of identity.

Most mobile phone users will be eligible for the service if they have been with their existing provider for at least three months.

Provided users have cleared all

existing charges and obligations owed to their current provider, they can switch networks and keep existing numbers.

After users request to change providers, the process takes three working days.

In the meantime, AIS will allow customers to use their old SIM cards until they have received an SMS confirmation that the switch has been successfully made.

Mobile operators plan to charge customers a one-time fee of 99 baht per switch.

Since its launch on December 5 last year, about 20,000 mobile phone subscribers have already requested the service, The Nation reports.

Commercial banks follow BOT and raise interest



commercial banks to raise rates.

COMMERCIAL banks have moved to raise interest rates after the Monetary Policy Committee decided to raise its policy rate by 25 basis points, to 2.25 per cent, earlier this month.

The raise comes after The Bank of Thailand (BOT) increased the policy interest rate due to rising concerns over inflation, The Nation reports.

While the BOT raised its policy rate by 25 basis points, Bangkok Bank, Siam Commercial Bank and Kasikorn Bank rates vary between 12.5 and 37.5 basis points.

Thanapong Tumpen, Head of Sales and Business Cash Management at Siam Commercial Bank, Chao-Fa Road branch, said the increase will have a minimal affect on investment in Phuket.

"Banks have chosen to increase their rates differently, according to their operational costs. However the rate increase should not affect investment borrowing in Phuket significantly, because investors tend to plan ahead before embarking on large projects.

"If investors have already planned out their projects, they are unlikely to change them now following rises in interest rates," he said.

"Many mega investment projects in Phuket, including real estate, yield high returns to investors. This is also one of the reasons why investors will not likely be deterred by the latest round of rate increases," he added.

However, small and mediumsize businesses on the island may be affected by the policy rate

Mr Thanapong says small borrowers are not in a strong bargaining position with banks, compared to larger investors.

Therefore they may have to bear the brunt of increases in lending rates.

People who borrowed to finance purchases of cars and houses may also be affected.

In the coming months, it is expected that BOT will increase the policy rate again.

Mr Thanapong said this is not a major concern because hotels and real estate businesses in Phuket are more sensitive to tourism trends than policy rates.

It may even prove positive if the current monetary measures are able to keep inflation in check, especially in the face of rising food and energy prices, which may in the long run hinder Phuket's competitive advantage.

Most analysts now agree that the BOT will raise its rates steadily over this year, with some pauses The Nation reports.

Eventually the BOT rates will have to be raised until they match the inflation rate.

At the moment, banks' interest returns are lower than inflation, which means that savers are actually losing money by depositing with banks.

Life & style Killer coconut beetles attack

Thailand's coconut industry is under threat as the coconut hispine beetle infests southern plantations

THAILAND'S coconut industry is under attack from an enemy of the most meager proportions: Brontispa longissima, commonly known as the coconut hispine beetle.

The tiny stature of the insect however, speaks nothing of its ability, in numbers, to devastate an entire industry.

Making its appearance in the middle of a two-year drought, the beetle has managed to severely damage or destroy more than 150,000 rai (about 35 per cent) of coconut plantation in Thailand's southern Prachuap Khiri Khan province, according to Samri Chankird, a researcher with the provincial Agriculture Extension Office.

The effects of this fullscale attack are being felt not only here in Phuket, but across Thailand as the wholesale price of coconuts has risen from seven baht in July 2010 to 20.5 baht this month. Market vendors and retailers across the country are struggling to keep coconut-based products on their shelves and are being forced to import from neighbors

such as Indonesia to stave off the nationwide shortage.

Prachuap Khiri Khan is known as the "coconut basket" of Thailand as it is by far the largest producer of coconuts in the country. The Ministry of Agriculture estimates last year's coconut pro-

duction for the province at over 425,000 tonnes, nearly double that of Chumphon province, Thailand's number two producer. This year's figures are expected to be much

According to the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO), Brontispa longissima is native to Indonesia and was spread throughout the Southeast Asia-Pacific region in ornamental palm shipments. The pest attacks more than 20 species of palm, with coconut being "the most favored host", the FAO says. The beetle feeds on seedlings and the young leaves of mature coconut palms and can quickly destroy an adult tree.

At the forefront of the fight against the infestation is a research team from Kasetsart University in Bangkok. Team leader, Assistant Professor Kosol Charernsom, has been testing a number of biological methods to combat the infestation over the past two months.

One such method is the use of Beauveria bassiana, a fungus that has proven effective as an insecticide. When the beetle comes into contact with its spores, they germinate and grow inside the insect, killing it within days. The fungus then emerges and spreads from the carcass.


Another weapon in the assault is Eocanthecona furcellata, a predatory "stink bug" being introduced by Prof Kosol's team in "nurseries" throughout Prachuap's coconut plantations to kill off the beetle.

A third method being used by the team is the parasitic *Asecodes* hispinarum insect, which is a natural enemy of the beetle, attacking it in the larval stage.

The team is having success in the testing phase and they are confident that the methods being used will eliminate the pest, enabling trees to recover and farmers to plant the new Coconut Sawi Number 1 hybrid, which is more resistant to drought and infestations, Prof Kosol said.

The hybrid, however, does nothing for the short term. "We could plant this new hybrid, but each tree takes five to eight years to mature. It's more drought and insect resistant, and has better yields, but that will not help us now. We need to get rid of the beetle first and have adequate rainfall, or the new trees will experience the same fate as the ones now," he said.

Indeed, the short-term does

not look good for farmers, sellers and consumers alike. Supermarket giants Tesco Lotus and Big C both told the *Phuket Gazette* that their orders for coconut milk a main ingredient in many Thai foods, especially desserts are not being filled.

Ittipol Klasuk, dried food manager at Big C Phuket said, "We order coconut milk from Amphol Food Processing [distributors of Chao Koh and Roi Thai products] every three days, but they often cut our order. For example, we order 100 and get 25. And when we do get product on the shelves, people come and buy it up quickly, in bulk."


The price of coconut milk in supermarkets has yet to reflect the increase in wholesale prices, both Tesco Lotus and Big C report. This has not been true for small vendors in public markets that rely on fresh coconuts to make products.

Narunat Mongkol, head of public relations and marketing at Amphol FP, told the *Gazette* that they are currently unable to source enough coconuts domestically to fill orders and have begun importing from Indonesia.

"We have had to increase the price four baht per 50ml box of coconut milk since November 2010 and I can say that the price will go up again, as there is a shortage in Thailand and we are having to import from Indonesia I just don't know how much the price will go up and when," he said.

Meanwhile, Prof Kosol and his team, with assistance from Amphol FP and the Ministry of Agriculture, continue their efforts to save Prachuap Khiri Khan's coconuts. The fight is a personal one, Prof Kosol says.

"Thailand is a factory for food production. If we have to order raw material from producers in other countries, that is a shame. I'm a coconut farmer. I have farmer's blood, so I must find the best way to treat these trees so they can survive."

Having never been to utopia, I wasn't in the position to judge how close we were, but it is fair to say that East 88 offers nightly delights combining buffet dinners, DJs, great a-la-carte dishes and a well-chosen wine selection.

We were happy enough in the company of a dry vodka martini at the Babu Bar while the "Coconut Head" band set up and sound checked for a night spent resurrecting Marley's ghost.

The resort's F&B Manager, Stephan Bowman soon arrived to scold the bartender for serving a dry cocktail with the sugar count of a triple margarita.

The bar and restaurant are separated by a swimming pool and the whole affair is beachfront, looking over to Koh Lone. Being early, we were able to secure very comfortable beachside seating, which was a definite plus.

A rocket (arugula) salad (320 baht) kicks things off in fine style with fresh leek soup (230 baht) nicely following up.

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Maestro strikes a chord in Phuket

DURING a time of political instability, Mom Luang (ML) Usni Pramoj is using classical music to unite Thailand. Having composed a strikingly original string quartet inspired by last year's riots in Bangkok, he has taken his composition on the road. His most recent stop was Phuket.

Earlier this week, ML Usni graced a crowd at Mom Tri's Villa Royale in Kata with his talent, having already performed at The Four Seasons Hotel in Bangkok and Chiang Mai.

ML Usni is a Thai National Artist, recipient of the ASEAN Award for the Performing Arts and the cofounder of the chamber orchestra which we now know as the Bangkok Symphony Orchestra.

ML Usni has also played jazz alongside His Majesty King Bhumibol Adulyadej and serves as a Privy Councilor.

Despite his remarkable talents and achievements, he remains down to Earth.

"I gave up playing music for 10 years. I went scuba diving instead," he says casually.

A qualified barrister and the son of a Prime Minister, ML Usni explains that music and art are his true

key to ending violence.

"Art tames the beast inside, it helps make people delicate and less crude in their thinking. Art is a good thing to have.

"If we were all musicians, the most confrontational thing anybody would say is 'you're out of tune or time'," he said.

With these sensibilities, it is no wonder the riots in Bangkok last year affected him so, and crept into his composing.

"I was very troubled at that time by what was happening... Suddenly there was this

huge divisiveness in Thai society.

"I don't live in a vacuum, nobody does. I was writing this music while it was happening, so it would have been unnatural if it did not come out in the music," he said.

Last Monday a sold-out audience had the privilege to experience ML Usni's piece - entitled String Quartet No 1 – in a beautifully intimate concert.

Playing the viola, ML Usni was accompanied by three talented

and Siripong Tiptan on violins and Kittkhun Sodprasert on cello.

ML Usni's piece was preceded by Joseph Haydn's String Quartet in F Major, Op.77, No.2, a technically difficult and "classically classical" piece of music, executed to perfection by the group.

The tone was in stark contrast

to ML Usni's original piece that followed.

His quartet was more contemporary in style, with each movement presenting and embodying a different aspect of the Bangkok riots.

The initial movement, with oriental tones and melodies, used traditional techniques such as plucking to portray the simplicity of rural life and the dissidence rising among rural people.

The second and third movements juxtaposed more frantic and energetic play, representing the rage of the protesters, with the calm and melodic tones of the government's attempts at peaceful negotiation. The sounds of marching, chanting and bullets could be felt through the music.

The final movement was more melancholy and poignant, expressing grief and hope at the same time.

The Phuket concert was a success, with both the crowd and musicians enjoying themselves.

"The community here are hungry for something cultural, people crave something like this and were really appreciative," she said.


The concert was part of the Baan Kata Arts Festival, which

Raven rant doesn't fly

The Petting Zoo

By Jim Carroll

THE words of F Scott Fitzgerald "There are no second acts in American lives" are perfect for our author in question this week, Jim Carroll.

He was a basketball star at an elite New York Catholic high school who descended into heroin addiction and male prostitution.

He kept a diary from 1963 to 1966 when he was 16 and, based on this, published a memoir called original bird that Noah let loose

The Basketball Diaries in 1979.

The book was a huge success, later made into movie starring Leonardo DiCaprio.

Carroll then coasted on his fame as a minor poet and musician and died last year at 59. His first fiction novel The Petting Zoo (Penguin Group, New York, 2010, 327pp) was his attempt at a second act. Unfort-

unately, it's an abject failure.

The Basketball Diaries was fast-paced, fueled by the youthful anger and rebellion of the mid-1960s, but The Petting Zoo is turgid, narcissistic, cliched, pretentious and cluttered with fancy verbiage. The plot is ridiculous.

At 38, Billy Wolfram – the main character - is a rich and famous New York painter.

When aged 13, he was masturbating on a toilet to a magazine photo of Barbra Streisand in a bikini when his mother burst in to tell him that President Kennedy had just been assassinated.

Boom! He's impotent for life. The rest of novel is taken up with his search for the "meaning of art" with the help of a talking raven.

He met a bird – a raven to be precise – at the Central Park petting zoo after suffering a mental breakdown when viewing a Velazquez exhibition.

He's taken to a mental hospital where he has a long conversation about spiritualism and art with his Chinese psychiatrist. It's really a monolog, 10 groaning pages long.

"I did look at those huge canvases...with each one I looked closer and deeper. The first two simply filled me with awe, but

certainly I've experienced that before. By the third one, however, the work lost its wholeness. I watched it break down into its separate elements.

"The canvas was reduced to its flux, flow, and vibration, and the movement was too fast, leaving me in this swirling haze. I felt nauseous, and stood back a few steps in case I heaved."

This is followed by another conversation on the same subject with the Hindu limo driver who is taking him home.

Then another on the telephone with his childhood friend and rock star in California, and another with the raven on his windowsill.

Better still – the raven was the

in search of land, still alive after all these years! Who knew?

These conversations are endlessly soporific, huge fat paragraphs clunking along one after the other.

Wolfram goes into seclusion for three weeks to recapture his "art" and the innocent spirit of his Irish Catholic

childhood. You want to just chuck him out the window – anything to stop his artsy yammering.

There is no humor in this book, no characterization beyond what is going on in the head of the narcissistic artist, no worthwhile descriptions of New York, nothing but this sort of thing:

"Maybe he'd lost that divine spark, the scintilla vitae, of anamnesis, which propelled him with such ease to clarity in his intuition. His greatest fear was losing the inner register, which had served him so well.

"Billy also had to wonder whether the problem was not in his work, but in the jaded cultural atmosphere in which he lived, where the cult of celebrity stripped the artist of all dignity and put him or her on the same aesthetic level of a fashion model."

The book ends with another 10page monolog, by the raven this time, about art and the life of the spirit. Billy is on the floor dying and unable to contribute much.

The raven proves that he can be just as much of a stupefying, longwinded bore as the poser of an artist who at last, thank God, dies.

Heed my advice - run, don't walk, from this book.

Chinese New Year to lift island spirits

RED LANTERNS and banners line streets around Phuket this week as the island prepares for Chinese New Year on February 3.

Starting at 4pm on Thursday will be a full roster of high-quality free entertainment at Sanamchai Field, opposite Phuket Provincial Hall.

Highlights will include gravity-defying stunts of Chinese acrobats from Kuyang, China; a Kung Fu demonstration by the world-renowned Xiaolin Warriors and a "Lion Gives Birth" performance never before seen in Thailand.

There will also be musical performances by Ruth The Star, winner of The Star reality TV series, Beck Palitchoke and the G20

The fun doesn't end there. February 8 to 10 may be the best time to catch some Chinese New Year activities in Old Phuket Town and ring in the Year of the Rabbit.

Phuket City Municipality and the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) will host the 12th Phuket Old Town Festival on these dates. The festival, which will take place in Old Phuket Town and Queen Sirikit Park, is to one billion baht in held by the Phuket Peranakan Association, The Phuket Old Town Community and the Old Phuket Foundation.

From 7 to 10pm daily, performers from Suining City, China, will entertain visitors along Thalang and Phang Nga roads, which will be closed to traffic to create a "walking street" with local food and and handicrafts, street performances, exhibitions, games and more.

A sacred image of the Chinese bodhisattva Guan Yin will be on display in Queen Sirikit Park during the festival.

Also exhibited there will be sacred objects on loan from Guangde Temple in Szechuan Province. Local people will be able to pay homage and make offering to bring good luck in the coming year.

Other activities to pay respect to the Chinese goddess will be in the form of a 'pilgrim tour" on a local bus (songtaew).

From 9am to 5pm daily during the festival, a 99-baht tour will take pilgrims to nine famous shrines in Phuket Town to pay respect to Guan Yin.

The festival is expected to draw a huge number of guests to island, generating up

revenue, says the Phuket Tourism Association (PTA).

PTA vice president Bhurit Maswongsa told the Phuket Gazette last week that January booking rate for Phuket hotels is about 90 per cent and may rise to 100 per cent in February as Asian tourists - especially from

Chinese New Year.

However, Mr Bhurit said that the predicted average daily amount spent by each tourist is about 3,600 baht, down from about 4,200 baht last year.

Moseying on down to Phuket's old quarter

IT WAS the American philosopher Henry David Thoreau who once said, "A morning walk is a blessing for the whole day."

With this in mind – and in light of Phuket Town's recent bid for UN Heritage status – I forwent a line-in last Saturday morning in favor of making friends with my feet to go explore the old quarter of Phuket Town.

Everywhere in Old Phuket Town is within walking distance, if you have the time, and my couple of hours spent in this fascinating neighborhood had me tickled pink.

I've always found thoughts come clearly while I walk, and strolling down Thalang, Dibuk and Krabi roads, it was difficult not to muse on the districts unique blend of traditional and modern... the European-styled architecture fused with the weighty Chinese influence.

Elaborateness commingles with simplicity in the darling Sino-Portuguese shop-house buildings, with the pastel-colored architecture on Soi Romanee a definite highlight.

Old Phuket Town's busy art and culture scene should not be overlooked, particularly the four excellent shop-front galleries on Phang Nga Road, and several

more along Yaowarat Road.

The old quarter boasts numerous Chinese antique and boutique shops, a first-rate secondhand book shop (selling books in several different languages), plus several cozy cafes to unwind.

Chinese herb and garment shops, and an old printing factory, add to the district's traditional atmosphere.

A couple of hours isn't enough time for Old Phuket Town to reveal its true beauty and quaintness, but it still represents a splendid way to spend a lazy Saturday morning.

Josh Lee

JOSH Lee arrived in Phuket from his native Australia in 1997, thinking he would be sailing his 35-foot sloop to Europe. But when he realized there were few marinas between Thailand and the Mediterranean, he gave up the idea and decided to sell the boat.

"In 1997, there weren't many options for selling a boat on the island. It was the beginning of the internet age and with my digital camera I was able to create a business online. I went down to the Ao Chalong Yacht Club and asked for members who wanted to sell their boats, and with that offering I launched Lee Marine."

Today, Lee Marine is the largest marine brokerage in Thailand, providing some of the world's most luxurious power boats to a growing market of enthusiasts who find the waters around Phuket the ideal place to recreate and relax.

Josh was born in Brisbane and says he was not a motivated student but was keen on water sports. His family suggested he take vocational training. He enrolled in a local college that offered an Elementary Seagoing Skills course. Part of the course required that he do an intership. He was accepted as a water taxi deckhand working around the Whitsunday Islands.

"I took some additional courses and became the youngest Master

Class 5 Captain in Queensland. My 24 meter ferry carried 150 passengers. I worked on the ferry for four years before deciding to accept an offer to study derivatives trading in Hong Kong."

When he was not guiding ferries around the Whitsunday islands, he was offshore racing, competing in the Sydney to Hobart yacht race and other sailing events around the Asia/Pacific region.

Josh moved to Hong Kong in 1995 and spent two years as a researcher for Global Oriental, an offshore company that offered investment opportunities primarily to Cathay Pacific pilots. He passed the Bar at the Hong Kong Futures Exchange and became a qualified floor trader. When the handover occurred in 1997, the company moved to Singapore and the young Josh decided to go sailing instead.

"I really liked the Boat Lagoon Marina and we opened our office in 1997 by offering secondhand boats. We followed the market and as the demand for bigger and newer boats developed, we moved in that direction. When we had our first client wanting a new boat, we sold him a high-end Riviera, a motor yacht perfect for a family."

Josh says he took a cautious approach to developing Lee Marine.

"We could have grown faster but we wanted to go step by step as the market developed. We sold secondhand boats such as the Maid Marion, a 115 foot New York steamship built in 1925.

'We decided to focus strictly on sales rather than service for the secondhand boats. When we began to offer new boats, service became a big priority to attract buyers."

Josh continued with his entrepreneurial instincts and opened a Bakery at the Boat Lagoon in 1998, then one of Phuket's premier restaurants, The Watermark, in 2003. He also opened a Lee Marine office in Pattaya in 2007.

"I needed a place to eat as there wasn't much around then. Also, these bistros became an extension for Lee Marine, an upscale place to entertain my clients.'

He spends most of every summer at the high-end boat shows in Monaco, Cannes and Genoa, and visiting the boatyards where he can supervise the work on custom boats ordered by his buyers.

In his free time, Josh enjoys golf, swimming and being with his dog, a Staffordshire, at home.

Taste is the biggest issue here. With a plethora of beautiful beaches on the island, finding one to suit can be tricky. Being parents, and plainly getting on in years, probably best to keep clear of the hoards and go-go bars of Patong and some of its neighboring beaches. Safer bets include the more serene sands of Ao Yon, Ao Sane and Ya Nui beaches.

NIGHT MARKET MADNESS

The weekend night market, located just outside Phuket Town, is an interesting way to spend an evening. It's a place where you can literally find anything you want, from retro fashions to remote controls, and there's plenty of tempting food stalls dishing out noodle and rice dishes, meat on sticks and even fried insects. If shopping isn't your bag, just take a seat, grab a beer, and watch the world whiz by.

CATCH THE FOOTIE

There has hardly been a better time to get down to Surakul Stadium to catch a FC Phuket game following their promo-

tion to Thai League Division 1. Decent football and a great atmosphere (you can also bring your own beer into the stadium!) make this is a low-cost activity daddy will appreciate.

OLDIES IN TOWN

There's rule of thumb which states "parents like nice places", and nowhere on the island is nicer for an afternoon stroll than Phuket Town's old quarter. Life flows a little easier in this part of town. Its attractive Sino-Portuguese buildings make it feel like a different part of the world, while the sprinkling of shop-front art galleries and pleasant cafes make it the perfect place to relax and unwind.

BIGGING UP THE BUDDHA

It's hard to miss Phuket's Big Buddha sitting up in the hills overlooking Chalong and Kata. The towering monument is 400 meters above sea level and offers sensational vistas of both sides of the island, making it one of the best sunset viewpoints. The hike up to the Buddha is a bit of a mission, but good exercise and worth it to see the Big Buddha up close.



ITCHY TRIGGER FINGER

Phuket need not be all sipping piña coladas on the beach at sunset. Why not escort your folks to one of the island's two shooting ranges for an experience they won't forget in a hurry.

Phuket Shooting Range is popular with tourists and fully equipped with a variety of firearms and bullets. There is also a shooting range in Kathu. Just remember to keep some distance when mummy dearest is lining up her 9mm!

TOP TEMPLES

There are some cultural gems to be found in Phuket, including several impressive Thai and Chinese shrines. Constructed 200 years ago, Put Jor Chinese Temple is Phuket's oldest Chinese temple and well worth a visit, while a tour of Wat Chalong is a peaceful way to spend an afternoon.

LOVELY LAGOONS

The east coast (about 10 kilometers from Phuket Town) is home to the Royal Phuket Marina and the Phuket Boat Lagoon. Entering either is like stepping into a different

world. This is Phuket's French Riviera and is a pleasant place to go for a stroll and stop off for coffee and cake. Even if you're not into sailing it's a good chance to see how the other half lives.

MOTHS AND CROCS

Strange bedfellows, yes, but both on show in Phuket. The Phuket Butterfly Garden is an agreeable way to spend a few hours, showcasing dozens of exotic butterflies and moths in a colorful garden setting. If your parents get snappy looking for a bit more bang for their baht, why not try the Chana Charoen Crocodile Farm. This impressive outdoor farm is home to hundreds of crocodiles and alligators.

TRANSGENDER THEATRICS

Even for the most reserved, Patong's world famous Simon Cabaret is a sight not to be missed. The dazzling "ladyboy" performances include elaborate stage designs and costumes and is popular with tourists from all walks of life. Amari building on 'excellence'

AMARI Estates, one of the leading resort property developers in Thailand, will be expanding its business in Patong this year, introducing their new "hotel-serviced" condominiums concept to the area.

The CEO and President Yuthachai Charanachitta recently revealed the new investment plan for Patong in a press conference held at their existing hotel the, Amari Coral Beach Phuket.

"Amari Estates will still maintain our focus on development of resort and property projects including condominiums and hotels, particularly in major tourist destinations such as Hua Hin, Phuket and Pattaya, which have potential for strong growth and high demand from both Thai and foreign consumers," he said.

Amari Estates develops resorts and properties based on a mixeduse, hotel-serviced concept which is fairly new on the market and includes condominiums along with hotels providing a range of amenities, excellent service and convenience.

After the success with Amari Residences Hua Hin, where more than 80 per cent of the units were sold within the first year, they decided to start construction of the Patong project by the end of this year.

A name for the Amari Estates Patong development has not yet been chosen and final details are being added to the master plan.

The first phase of the project will be located on about 19 rai of the total 60 rai area on the left hillside entrance of Amari Coral Beach Phuket. With scenic views of the

surrounding sea, the project will feature 197 condo units and 10 pool villas, which will be fully furnished by Chanintr Living.

Prices of the units range from 10 million baht for the smaller 50-square-meter units up to between 30 and 50 million baht for larger pool villas.

Sales of the units and villas will begin by December this year and construction is due to start at the end of next year.

The target demographic is mixed, and Amari are hoping to fill 40-45 per cent of the project with Thais and 55 per cent foreigners.

"We don't want to set the start

price too high because we would like to offer an opportunity to the white-collar market who are looking for a condominium resort to use as a relaxing spot or as for investment," Mr Yuthachai said.

Mr Yuthachai's estimated budget for this project is more than two billion baht. The project will be operated by the Onyx Hospitality Group, which is a Thailand-based hospitality firm operating four other hotel brands, namely: Saffron, Amari, Shama and Ozo.

Mr Yuthachai is also responsible for other firms belonging to his family, playing the role of Executive Director at Italthai Industrial Co

Phuket's very own A-Team



VIEWING those glossy architecture books in villas or upscale bookshops you often come across a myriad of titles about Thai-style design.

Oddly enough, the "show ponies" in most cases are foreigners or overseas firms who have adopted an alter-ego and now proclaim their newly found "Thainess".

It has taken Asia decades to emerge from a colonial "inferiority complex".

During the many years I have lived here, the two-tiered system of domestic products versus imported was the norm with, amazingly, the harshest critics of domestic products being Thais themselves.

As Asia has become "the factory of the world", brand name or not, consumers have seen a graying of the lines.

Nowadays, the "Made in Thailand" seal doesn't automatically relegate a product to a bench warming position while imports run the field.

One example that stands out from the crowd in Phuket is Pakhin Aunggulsant's Able

Architects firm.

The firm is part of the AEP Group umbrella organization, lead by Mr Pakhin, which also includes Edifax and Prodigy One.

The three companies work together to cover integrated solutions for architecture and design, landscaping, 3D animation, project management, surveying and structural engineering. There's a lot going on here with this "A-Team".

A new offshoot of the industry offered by AEP Group is property "brand management" to integrate a client's product vision with the actual execution and completion of products.

It's the next logical step in property development.

At the forefront of AEP Group developments are residential condominiums, hotels and villas including: Surin Park Condo-

minium, Kamala Falls Residential Resort, The Sky 2 serviced apartments in Rassada, Absolute Sansabai Resort & Spa in Patong, and the upcoming Kameha Natai hotel in Phang Nga.

Perhaps the most high-profile design job has been their awardwinning Orang Laut (sea gypsy) Cultural Center here in Phuket. The use of vernacular architecture. natural thermal ventilation and overall "eco" focus on the natural mangrove habitat have earned accolades both at home and abroad.

At Mr Pakhin's office there is a large workforce of talented Thai staff working on projects ranging from in-house designs to collaborations with overseas firms. It's a lively intersection of East meets West with the best of both worlds.

While sustainability efforts in the West lead to "going local", preconceptions and the lack of familiarity are creating roadblocks to such developments in Thailand.

It's still tough for Thai companies to compete on a level playing field in certain sectors.

Brand Phuket, however, and its sizable collection of design options and prolific architectural firms -Roof Group and Naga Concepts to name two more - continues to amaze.

So, next time you care to start matching up many of the top structures you pass by every day, do a bit of research and see how many of them have been completed here by – yes, you guessed it – Thais themselves.

Based on data from Quarter three last year versus 2009, residential land is now US\$1,600 per square meter.

The country saw property prices skyrocket over a five-year period between 2004 and 2008. Once the global financial crises hit, declines started to creep into the marketplace.

Other requests considered by the committee included requests to establish juristic entities to develop new housing projects, construction permits for public utilities and changes to approved

After the meeting, Gov Tri asked all developers to proceed with construction in strict accordance with the terms specified in permits.

For projects "with problems" or which had been taken over by new investors, he asked developers to follow recommendations made by the committee following site visits in order to bring the work to completion.

Gov Tri commented that the new projects, which range in size, represent continued strength, investor confidence and high demand in the Phuket real estate market.

However, he stressed that during construction, developers must minimize the impact on surrounding communities, such as by not allowing soil run-off to clog storm drains and cause flooding.

Construction of new residential estates, especially in heavilysettled areas, was a common source of complaints received by Provincial Hall, he said.

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Smelling swell for centuries



JASMINE'S scent has inspired poets for centuries and the Persians didn't give it the name "gift from God" for nothing.

It's a must for our Top 20 Phuket Plants list, and while Jasmine is not the most spectacular beauty in the tropical garden, it is one of the most fragrant.

Around the world, many different variations of the plant exist today.

Ask Europeans about Jasmine and they will probably reply that it is a flowering shrub with rows of single yellow flowers sprouting from leafless stems, often the first splash of color in the drab days of winter. Its Latin name Nudiflorum gives the game away.

This however, is a far cry from the tropical varieties. Take the Murraya paniculata (also known as Orange Jasmine or Chinese Box) for example.

Not strictly a Jasmine, the Chinese Box is usually bracketed in this family because of its many similarities

It is deservedly popular in Thai gardens, on account of its evergreen, glossy foliage, and small but powerfully perfumed white flowers with curved petals.

Like Wrightia religiosa, it is often grown by Thai shopkeepers in containers fronting yards or patios, in order to provide a floral and sweet-smelling screen.

Sometimes Murraya is culti-

vated as a substantial hedge, since it will grow to three or four meters in height.

A good-natured, spineless plant, the Orange Jasmine will tolerate a range of conditions, though it is happiest in full or filtered sun and with an adequate supply of moisture. It naturally assumes a compact shape, but will withstand some pruning.

Remember though, that clipping inevitably reduces the number of flowers. And it is good at flowering. In the right environment, it will bloom year round.

Propagation, from hard-wood cuttings or by marcotting, is straightforward. It can also be grown from seed.

Unlike the Murraya variety, some Jasmines are climbers. In Thailand the most popular vine is Jasminum sambac, or Arabian jasmine, known in Thai as mali. It is a climber that covers fences and walls in countless gardens.

Jasminum sambac was probably the first variety to be grown here. It has dark green, deeply ribbed leaves which are evergreen, and clusters of single or double flowers that are white or cream in color.

Intensely fragrant, the flowers are employed in many religious rites, worn in the hair by Asian women, and used to flavor tea and food.

In Thailand, the buds are threaded on leis and garlands along with the longer-lasting Indian Milkweed (Calatropis gigantica) and hung inside vehicles, both as a gesture of good luck and as a natural perfume.

Hang one from your driving mirror, close and open your car door, and the smell will be pervasive and delicious.

The so-called common Jasmine (Jasminum officinale) is more widely distributed, occurring throughout the Middle East and China.

The shrub is grown here, but it is close to the limit in Phuket as far as temperature goes, and is happier in somewhat cooler climates.

In ideal conditions, it will sprawl and twine up to 30-feet high. The flowers are powerfully scented, and are white or pale pink.

There are now a variety of cultivars available with variegated leaves, of which the best known are the cream-edged Argentovariegatum and the gold blotched Aureum.

On the other hand, Jasminum rex is native to Thailand. The virtues of this variety (also called Royal Jasmine) are different: while it has virtually no scent, it produces much larger, star-shaped flowers that are more conspicuous than the blooms of other Jasmines.

Multiflorum or Star Jasmine also blooms more liberally than

Tip of the week

The root of the matter

WHEN selecting a small tree at a garden center, ensure the plant has one strong central stem.

This indicates healthy growth and means the tree should develop a single straight trunk.

Avoid plants with two leaders, or a damaged or discolored one. Shrubs, on the other hand, should possess a number of strong-growing stems.

Check to ensure they are not root-bound (too long in the planter bag), and not in a very loose soil mix (recently re-potted and therefore not properly settled in).

It is usually better to buy smaller plants as these will establish more rapidly.

Always water before planting. Most plants are now sold in plastic planter bags or

However, if you do buy bare-rooted plants, make sure that they are not damaged or cut, and plant quickly before the roots dry out.

Not strictly speaking a Jasmine, Trachelospermum Jasminoides is a fast grower and particularly popular in the US, where it is known as Confederate Jasmine.

So the choice from the family of Jasmines is huge.

More than 200 species exist, and most of them are denizens of warm climates. In every way, apart from the unspectacular appearance of its flowers, it is a Top 20 must.
