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Refugees land in Phuket

SEVENTY Rohingya refugees travelling by boat from western Burma landed at Rawai Beach on Tuesday, only to be rounded up and taken to Chalong Police Station.

Duty Officer Boonlert Onklang said he arrived at the beach at about 5:30am. Within 90 minutes police had arrested 35 of the refugees who were wandering around in the area.

"When they arrived, they had not eaten anything. We provided them with food. Some of them were sick and were given medication," said Chalong Police Superintendent Vichid Intharason.

Later Tuesday afternoon police arrested 33 more Rohingya found wandering around near Rawai Tambon Administration Organization (OrBorTor) offices, at the southwestern end of Rawai Beach.

At the time this paper went to print, there were still two Rohingya unaccounted for on Phuket, Chalong Police Deputy Superintendent Narong Laksanawimon said.

'But we found a boat that looks like a large longtail on Laem Ka Beach on Tuesday. I presume that's their boat," he added.

The 68 men were transferred to

Phuket Immigration Detention Center in Phuket Town on Wednesday. The arrests come amid concern among non-governmental organi-

zations and advocacy groups over the Thai government's failure to grant the United Nations High Commission on Refugees (UNHCR) access to detained Rohingya.

Human Rights Watch (HRW) issued a statement on Wednesday urging the Thai government to give the UN access to 211 (pre-Phuket numbers) ethnic Rohingya detained in Thailand, some since 2009.

"Thailand should immediately provide access to UNHCR to conduct interviews to determine their refugee status, because it is clear that many of the Rohingya are fleeing from extreme political persecution in Burma," HRW Deputy Director Asia Phil Robertson told the *Phuket Gazette*.

"The Rohingya face continuous human rights violations by the authorities in Burma, especially in northern Arakan state where they originate. Burma refuses to recognize them as citizens, and harshly restricts their right to freedom of movement, expression, employment, and cultural and family life," Mr Robertson said.

This sentiment was echoed by Col Vichid of Chalong Police: "They are facing problems with

the Burmese government and they need to find a way out. Leaving by boat is the easiest way."

Some of the men have told police that they wanted to continue on to Malaysia, while others have indicated they came to Thailand for work, police said.

The future for the Phuket detainees is not if, but when they will be deported, Col Vichid said. Rohingya boat people have been arriving regularly on Thailand's west coast over the past month -228 since January 22.

Benjamin Zawacki, Amnesty International's Myanmar researcher, told the Gazette that although this may seem like a growing trend, it is merely a return to the norm following relative inactivity in 2010.

The cause for last year's slump, Mr Zawacki said, was likely heightened attention to the issue following the Thai government's controversial handling of Rohingya boat people in 2009, when Thailand faced harsh criticism for arresting and sending Rohingya refugees back out to sea with limited provisions.

The core issue is the Myanmar government's persecution of the Rohingya people and their refusal to grant them citizenship and the basic rights entailed with such, Mr Zawacki said.

This leaves the Thai government in the unenviable position of trying to find a way to deal with refugees without a country to repatriate them to, he added.

Key to successfully addressing the issue, HRW's Phil Robertson says, is allowing the UNHCR to determine genuine asylum seekers and allowing them to apply for resettlement to a third country.

This remains a hope as boats overcrowded with Rohingya hoping for a better future continue to drift to Thailand's shores.

One 18-year-old Rohingya detainee told the Gazette, "I want to go anywhere - anywhere except back to Burma."

Parents urge 'no revenge' over slain son

THE parents of a 13-year-old boy gunned down in an alleged gang attack last Sunday have pleaded for their slain son's twin brother not to exact revenge for his brother's death.

Surachai "Neung" Takuasook was shot dead in Thalang, just after midnight last Sunday morning while he was riding pillion on a motorbike along Thepkrasattri Road.

Speaking to the Gazette as they were making preparations for Neung's cremation in Baan Don on Wednesday, father Lertchai Takuasook, 41, and mother Saita Kongkasai, 40, described Neung as a good

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boy, who always helped them earn money for the family by working as a farmhand.

They described Song as "naughtier", saying he didn't do anything productive with his time. Both boys had completed primary education and were no longer in school.

Mr Lertchai said he suspects the killers mistook Neung for Song, given their identical appearances.

A close friend of the family told the Gazette, "Young people in Baan Plu Som Pan and Baan Don haven't liked each other for a long time. They are always fighting."

Song had once been involved in a melee with a rival gang during which he witnessed one of his friends being stabbed, she said.

"They probably remembered his face, then took revenge against the wrong person," she added.

Asked if he planned to avenge his brother's death, Song nodded silently, then looked away.

However, his parents pleaded with him o stop thinking of revenge. He has now been ordained as a novice at a local temple.

Thalang Police duty officer Krissana Junnit told the Gazette, "The killers seem to be young boys in Baan Plu Som Pan. They probably had a fight before Nueng was shot."

Thalang Police are now rounding up suspects for questioning, he added.

Marine parks face corruption probe

SEVEN marine national parks for which Phuket is a major gateway for tourists will be investigated for alleged corruption in the collection of admission fees.

Sunant Arunnopparat, directorgeneral of the Department of National Parks, Wildlife and Plant Conservation, has confirmed an investigation panel has been selected and that an impartial official from the department would be selected as its chairman.

"So far, I haven't issued any order to remove the park wardens who have been the subject of complaints during the past few months. The department needs to investigate the issue carefully," Mr Sunant said.

The national parks under suspicion include Mu Ko Surin, Mu Ko Similan, Hat NopparatTara, Mu Ko Phi Phi, Mu Ko Tarutao and Ao Phangnga.

Mr Sunant said the department would welcome any information related to ticket graft from the public.

Tsunami warning towers to go local

THE tsunami warning towers being installed in the six Andaman provinces will be handed over to local authorities on completion, opening the door to the towers' loudspeakers being used for community announcements - and possibly even advertising.

National Disaster Warning Centers (NDWC) Director Somsak Khaosuwan made the announcement at a seminar in Phuket last week.

Now in its 85-million-baht fourth phase, rollout of the NDWC warning system began after the 2004 tsunami.

Upon completion, provincial offices and local administrations will be given access to the warning towers, both to issue warnings locally and to use as public-address systems, he said.



The warning towers could soon be announcing advertisements.

Using the towers for purposes other than issuing disaster alerts would make the system more beneficial to the public and be better value for money, he said.

Apart from expanding the existing coverage area, the fourth phase-work also includes:

1. Setting up individual control centers in each of the six Andaman Provinces to enable each province to issue individual warnings using the NDWC's satellite communication system.

2. Setting up relay stations in each of the six provinces, allowing local officials to receive and transmit disaster warning information to local areas using radio frequencies.

3. Installation of public address speakers in all six provinces.

4. Inspect, maintain and repair existing towers, as necessary.

5. Installation of satellite signal receivers in each provincial hall and Radio Thailand office.

Work on the fifth point has already been completed in Phuket, Dr Somasak said.

Lucky escape as tour bus overturns

A TOUR bus carrying 17 Chinese tourists overturned on Monday after the driver allegedly lost control at the Tesco-Lotus "crossroads", colliding with two vehicles, and injuring seven people.

Phuket City Police Duty Officer Teerawat Amnartcharoenving said the bus was approaching the junction from the north and was unable to stop in time to avoid hitting vehicles waiting at the intersection.

The driver attempted a split-second left turn onto Yaowarat Road. The bus' speed, however, was too great as the bus went over the leftturn traffic island, collided with a pickup and sedan, and overturned, police said.

The force of the impact sent the pickup skidding across the road into a power pole. The driver suffered a head injury in the collision.

Five of the Chinese tourists were injured, one with a broken arm and four others with cuts. None of the injuries were reported to be serious, said police.

Police were unable to locate the bus driver at the scene of the accident. However, the guide leading the tour and Pramual Jitjaipakdee, of Vista Holiday, both confirmed that he was in hospital being treated for injuries from the accident.

They will bring him to the police station after he is released, they said. – Yodsak Jarana

Tuk-tuks: One-way out

A PROTEST by more than 100 tuk-tuk drivers last week earned them the chance to pitch their suggested changes to Patong's oneway system directly Patong Mayor Pian Keesin on Monday.

The tuk-tuk drivers arrived at Patong Police Station on January 27, calling for changes to be made to the new one-way system.

To hear their grievances, Patong Deputy Superintendent Lt Col Kittipong Klaikaew invited 45 of them into a crowded meeting room at the station.

Mardlee "Bang Lee" Sawangpon, 56, spoke on behalf of the drivers as "advising president" of an independent band of drivers who call themselves the Tuk Tuk Club.

The group is not a part of the Patong Taxi Federation run by Preechavude "Prab" Keesin.

"I have been on the road for 23 years – and, for sure, the current system is making traffic jams worse," Mr Mardlee said.

"I know the previous system

being two-way, except for Prabaramee Road and Prachanukroh Road at the northern and southern ends of Patong's central traffic area.

Patong Traffic Police Chief Lt Col Jakkawat Boontawegunsawat explained to the drivers, "The present system is in its 'test phase' for one month [starting January 15]. "After that we will have a pub-

lic hearing to get feedback from all people who use the road before making any final changes to the road system."

However, the drivers said they wanted confirmation that the current system will not remain after the test phase is over.

That plea remained unanswered at Monday's meeting.

"We have to listen to what the majority of people say. We have to conduct a public hearing with people from every sector. We cannot act on comments of some groups only," said Lt Col Kittipong.

Regardless, Mr Mardlee was happy with the meeting.

"We have submitted the draft plan of the traffic system. Mayor Pian also told us to list the names of people affected by the new system.

"Then we can submit the list of the names and the draft plan to Governor Tri [Augkaradacha] for consideration, but a date has yet to be set for that to happen," he said.

OrBorJor warns hotels over tax evasion

THE Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (OrBorJor) is threatening to take legal action against one-third of all hotel operators in Phuket for failing to pay the controversial hotel room tax.

The organization hopes an awareness-raising campaign backed by the threat of legal measures – can help it raise hotel room tax revenues from last year's 60 million baht to 70mn this year.

OrBorJor President Paiboon Upatising said he was confident the organization would hit this target because the number of hoteliers paying the tax was continually rising.

The hotel room tax, which is levied at 1% of room revenues. was introduced amid widespread opposition from hoteliers in 2000. Mr Paiboon said the OrBorJor

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

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Boy, 5, killed by dolphin statue

A FAMILY outing turned tragic when a young boy was crushed to death by a concrete dolphin at a resort in Nakhon Sri Thammarat last Saturday evening.

Police are questioning the owner of the Saikaew beach resort in Thasala district over the accident, which has devastated the parents of Warot Yotwari, aged five-and-a-half.

Dad Ekkachai and mum Linda had taken Warot to the resort as part of a large group of friends and relatives with small children.

While the adults relaxed at the resort restaurant, they let Warot and the other kids play around the swimming pool, which was surrounded with dolphin statues.

The children were pushing and climbing on one of the statues, which weighed about 55 kilograms. Suddenly the dolphin fell on top of Warot, knocking him unconscious.

The family rushed him to Thasala Hospital. Doctors struggled to save Warot, who had blood flowing from his nose and

ears. He died of internal trauma. Investigating officer Lt Col Aphithan Phumi of Thasala Police arrived at the hospital around 8pm, finding Warot's parents, Ekkachai and Linda, sobbing uncontrollably.

Warot's body would be handed over to the family for the funeral following an autopsy, Lt Col Aphithan said.

The resort's owner, Yoem Rueangdit, who is also a village headman, will be called in for questioning, he said.

Raid nets bumper haul of IT goods

MORE than 60 stolen consumer goods are waiting to be reclaimed at Phuket City Police Station following a raid earlier this week.

Police recovered 66 IT consumer goods after a drugs investigation led officers to raid a house in the National Housing Authority development in Rassada.

In the house, officers arrested Tanapol "Aon" Somnukton, 33, from Surin province, and Phuket native Abhisit "Sam" Chupak, 24.

Although no drugs were found, officers seized drug paraphernalia and discovered a suspiciously large number of IT goods, including laptops, PCs, computer screens, TVs, DVD players and digital cameras.

The men had confessed to robbing many home-offices in Muang District and Kathu, said Phuket

Provincial Police Commander Pekad Thatipong.

After the men confessed to the robberies, police were able to recover most of the stolen goods.

"We sold the stuff at cheap prices just so we could get money to buy more drugs," Sam told the *Gazette*.

So far five people have identified and reclaimed their stolen items, Maj Gen Pekad said.

"Anyone whose property has been stolen are advised to come to Phuket City Police Station to look for their belongings by asking for Superintendent Wanchai Ekpornpit," he said.

Maj Gen Pekad is even offering amnesty to people who return stolen goods they bought from the two suspects.

Reds demand ICC trial

Two Thais sentenced, PAD gives Gov three days

THE yellow shirt People's Alliance for Democracy (PAD) on Wednesday threatened to intensify its protests if the government fails to bring back Thai Patriots Network leader Veera Somkwamkid and his secretary Ratree Pipatanapaiboon from Cambodia within three days.

On Tuesday, the Phnom Penh Municipal Court found Veera and Ratree guilty of espionage, illegal entry and trespassing in a military zone. These charges carry a maximum combined penalty of 11 years and six months.

Veera was sentenced to eight years behind bars and a fine of 1.8 million riel (about 18,000 baht), while Ratree was given six years and fined 1.2 million riel.

PAD spokesman Parnthep Puapongphan said the PAD would urge the people to join a mass protest at the Makkhawan Bridge in Bangkok on Saturday to decide the government's fate if the threeday deadline is not met.

The application, prepared by Amsterdam & Peroff LLP, also

The army allegedly rehearsed the crackdown as early as February 2007 on a full-scale model of Ratchadamnoen Avenue, where some of the protesters were killed on April 10.

The application also alleged that two Bangkok hospitals colluded with the government to cremate civilians' bodies in order to destroy damaging evidence, The Star reported.

There were serious doubts about whether the ICC would accept the petition, not least because Thailand is not one of its 144 members.

But Mr Amsterdam claimed Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva had British citizenship and could therefore be prosecuted. Mr Abhisit was born and educated in the United Kingdom, which is a signatory to the Rome Statute establishing the court.

On Monday Mr Abhisit responded to the claims, denying he held British nationality.

"I am a Thai national, not a Montenegrin," he said, in a clear reference to Mr Thaksin, who has taken Monten-egrin citizenship.

The protests saw more than 100,000 red shirt protesters occupy Bangkok's central shopping district for 10 weeks to demand that Mr Abhisit dissolve parliament and hold fresh elections.

Following a violent army crackdown that ended the protests on May 19, arsonists set fire to buildings including the Central World Plaza shopping mall and the stock exchange.

A number of red shirt leaders are being held in Bangkok Remand Prison on terrorism charges.



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One-way plea from Patong

There is quite an interesting issue with the new one-way traffic in Patong. Many people are living in and around Sai Namyen, in the north part of Nanai Road, on the hill, around the municipality, near the police station, Jungceylon, and so on.

Now consider if you were one of them and you wanted to drive to the beach.

Then you will go westward on Sai Namyen until the crossroad with Rat-U-Thit 200 Pi Road.

There, you are only about one hundred meters from the beach - if you could go on Sawadirak Road across the junction, which is one way in the right direction.

But now you cannot enter Sawadirak. You have to turn left on Rat-Uthit, follow that street all the way to the south of Patong, as you cannot turn right into Bangla anymore, then turn right to the beach and take the beach road all the way back toward the north.

Doesn't that seem quite crazy?

If it can be dangerous to let people drive through from Sai Namyen to Sawadirak across Rat-U-Thit, then just put the traffic lights on. They are already in place there.

But any solution would be better than forcing ever more people to drive around Patong, polluting the place and spending unnecessarily on gas.

Nightlife swan song?

As a legally-licensed, foreign partner in a bar at a popular tourist destination on the island, Guns and gangs not child's play **Phuket Gazette**

JUST hours before this editorial was written, friends of slain teenager Surachai "Neung" Takuasook were burning his remains in the furnace of the local crematorium in Baan Don, in Thepkrasattri subdistrict (see page 1).

The shiny white coffin used to house Surachai's body until it was pushed into the fiery chamber read "Surachai Takuasook - age 17", although Surachai was just 13 when his young life ended.

The reason for the age given on the outside of the casket reflects the family's belief that it would somehow help the spirit of Surachai enjoy a longer life span during his next reincarnation.

While just one in a long line of senseless killings that have been reported in these pages over the years, Surachai's murder stands out in a number of wavs.

Although police had yet to make any arrests as this article went to print, there is a strong suspicion among both investigators and family members that his assailants mistook him for his identical twin brother, Sawng.

The pair, named Neung ("One") and Sawng ("Two"), entered the world just minutes apart, but time enough for Neung to be "number one" and always the phii (older brother), while his brother would always, by definition, come second.

Identical twins share a closeness that few people understand. While continually being

associated with each other, at the same time they have to fight to establish a unique identity for themselves in ways most people could only imagine.

Given these facts, it's interesting to reflect on whether the parents' choice of nicknames had any influence on how they ended up: with Neung the more helpful brother and Sawng decidedly more "naughty", even by their parents' own admission.

To whatever extent the name issue matters, if at all, it is a sad irony that whatever struggle Sawng underwent to establish a separate identity from his brother ended early last Sunday morning with four gun blasts, all likely intended for him.

It is difficult to imagine the thoughts that must be running through Sawng's young mind, but the Phuket Gazette was glad to see him follow his parent's advice and ordain as a novice rather than follow through on his desire to avenge his brother's death.

In the wider context, it is important that the Thalang Police investigating the murder not only find those responsible, but also work towards reducing the dangerous tensions between the youths of the Baan Don and the Baan Plu Som Pan communities.

I would like to ask the government to consider a few things in regard to the ongoing crackdown on closing times.

First, tourists come to Phuket primarily to have a good time, not to view cultural shows and things of that nature.

Even Phuket Town's "old quarter", which has been the subject of much rehabilitation and hype in recent years, is only about a century old, to the best of my knowledge. While interesting, it can

hardly be expected to inspire awe in visiting tourists, many of whom hail from countries with real antiquities dating back thousands of years.

Fuming over needless firestarters in Patong

FIRST PERSON

MOST fires in Patong start from electrical shorts, such as old wiring or people leaving appliances plugged into outlets, so it's important that every place in Patong – homes, restaurants, bars - have their own fire extinguishers.

Patong has seen, on average, one big fire a month. The biggest one happened near the Holiday Inn, causing over 10 million baht in damages.

There are 16 locations within seven different communities that are now at known risk of fire. The problems are old wiring, overcrowding and difficult access for firefighters. Some examples are along Soi Bangla, shop stalls along the beach road and the small sois along Rat-U-Thit 200 Pi Road.

I would like these communities and businesses to replace old wiring, which can easily short circuit.

We inspect all businesses in Patong when they submit license renewal applications. We make sure everything is safe, such as electrical wiring, and make sure they have fire extinguishers.

We used to hand out pamphlets about fire prevention and what to do in case a fire breaks out. We now have the idea to produce an instructional VCD to distribute.

We always make extra preparations in case of fire during special events, such as during New Year celebrations, by parking three fire trucks on Soi Bangla and two more along the beach road.

Visit Mathasoontornpoj, Chief of Patong Municipality's Disaster Prevention and Mitigation Division, has worked for Patong Municipality for 17 years, including eight vears as director. In January, four fires broke out in Patong, including the large blaze that left so many residents of 'Soi Slum' homeless. Here Mr Visit, 49, talks about the unique challenges of Patong in terms of fire prevention and firefighting.



A fire broke out last November in Patong when an air compressor shorted.

We also regularly provide trainers to educate staff and owners of local bars and restaurants on fire safety. This is done on a request basis. Meanwhile, our staff are always undergoing training often in Bangkok.

One of the reasons fires tend to cause a lot of damage is that we are informed too late. Sometimes emergency calls reach Phuket Town, not our office. If there is a fire in Patong, people should call us directly at 076-342600 or call 199.

Another problem is that we don't have good access to highquality water. At present, we get water from the wastewater treatment facility near Jungceylon. However, the wastewater damages our trucks quickly.

I propose that the mayor establish emergency water sources at various points around Patong, such as along the beach road, to improve access. This would make our fire-extinguishing speed much faster, like in other countries.

False reports hurt fickle tour industry

SOME National Marine Parks of Thailand have been affected by the recent El Nina weather pattern but nowhere near as badly as in Australia, Brazil or Sri Lanka.

However, false media reports about the parks being closed have had a much more severe impact on local businesses. Misleading articles stating that several marine parks are closed in Thailand are based upon false information.

The truth being that small areas within seven of Thailand's 21 Marine Parks have been closed to recreational activities. These dive sites make up only a fraction of each park's total area - similar to closing a campsite within a park, rather than the whole park.

The already precarious tourism industry in the region is fearing that these articles will cause a rash of cancellations, triggering closures and job loss in a region only just recovered from the devastating tsunami of 2004.

Often referred to as the "jewels" of Thailand's national parks, the uninhabited Similan Islands are home to the most famous diving and snorkeling sites in the country with many tours departing from nearby Khao Lak and Phuket.

With many thousands of jobs dependent on tourism, employers and staff alike are very sensitive to rumors – as highlighted by the recent prediction from a popular fortune teller that a second tsunami would strike over the new year holidays. Publicity of the prediction sparked a 10 per cent drop in bookings, but there was no tsunami.

Many potential and current visitors have expressed concern over the park closures reports and are **By Paul Landgraver**

considering changing their vacation plans.

Koen De Wit, a co-owner of one local dive center, said, "We are very frustrated by the misinformation that is being passed along as factual.

"The marine parks of Thailand are vast. The Similan Islands Marine Park is more than 140 square kilometers and home to dozens of dive sites.

"To say an entire marine park is closed when it's only a single dive site is like saying the Grand Canyon is closed when, in fact, only a single campground is."

The Khao Lak Dive Operators Forum support strict policies of sustainable tourism and are offering assistance to the National Park by enforcing these standards.

The Similan and Surin National Parks close every year from May 1 until October 31 and we hope that this year the no-fishing policy will be vigorously enforced to encourage further development of healthy reefs.

Please come to our office at

Rawai Municipality and fill in a complaint form.

After we receive the complaint, we will go out to check the places reported within a few days.

If we find anyone burning trash, we will give them a verbal warning.

If they continue to burn trash, depending on the circumstances, they may be fined up to 2,000 baht - but most people take heed of our warnings.

We don't know why different entrance fees have been set for Thai nationals and foreigners. We just follow the regulations set by the National Parks policy department. Any person who is not a Thai

national is to be considered a foreigner and charged the according rate for entering that park.

We charge the following entrance fees:

For adult foreigners (over 15 years old), the charge is 400 baht. For foreign children (3-15 years old), it is 200 baht.

For Thai adults (over 15 years old), the charge is 80 baht and for children (3-14 years old) it is 40 baht.

Our rates for parking vehicles are: 10 baht per bicycle; 20 baht per motorcycle; 30 baht per car (not over 12 seats);100 baht per bus (12-24 seats).

Economy excels despite turmoil

INVESTORS in "The Land of Smiles" finished last year with broad grins on their faces as the expected forecast of Asian growth, and relatively low debt, worked in the Thai economy's favor.

This was despite disruptions caused by the red shirt protests in May, the industrial estate disputes concerning the Map Ta Phut expansion, and the delayed ruling on 3G mobile network licences.

The Stock Exchange of Thailand (SET) advanced 40 per cent in 2010 making the exchange one of the world's best performers.

A combination of foreign investment coupled with a more confident local investor base drove prices higher, particularly in the second half of the year.

Thailand was not alone in attracting foreign investors. Many emerging markets in Asia and beyond had a stellar year as lower debt levels and strong GDP growth proved an enticing proposition.

Fundamentals remain strong

but equity prices, property values, bond spreads and baht exchange rates are far less likely to enjoy a bumper year in 2011.

Interestingly, the start of this year has already seen a pull-back in the SET, as well as a weakening of the baht against most other currencies.

The obvious domestic consideration that could either derail or boost Thailand this year is the ongoing political uncertainty.

Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva has vowed to hold elections this year, possibly in April, providing the security situation warrants it.

The recent resumption of street demonstrations by the yellow and red shirts is certainly a factor to consider.

If the election is held in an orderly manner, and all parties accept the results, then Thailand could potentially come out on the up.

Since the baht was floated 13and-a-half years ago, the risks and rewards of the Thai currency itself have been the major factor in movements against the global reserve currency - the United States Dollar (USD).

Now the situation is reversed.

The Thai baht is the stable currency, appreciating last year as much due to USD weakness as to any of its own inherent virtues. This is likely to remain the case in the year ahead.

Thailand has become a relative haven of economic stability, while the obsession that America's economic leaders with quantitative easing (QE) has made the "greenback" the volatile currency.

It wouldn't be a surprise to see significant USD spikes in 2011 or 2012, but a long-term resumption of the weakening trend in the USD, undermined by QE policies, is the likely outcome.

The extent to which American chickens come home to roost is more likely to determine the range and volatility of the baht versus USD this year and the direction of all other Thai assets.

The United Kingdom is also still in a fragile economic state. Just released GDP numbers for the last quarter of 2010 show the economy shrunk 0.5 per cent.

With inflation spiking to 3.7 per cent in December and the VAT increasing to 20 per cent, kicking

in last month, the prospects for a reasonable recovery are still very much in doubt.

As the *Economist* so succinctly put it this week, "The toxic mix of falling GDP, high inflation and a big budget deficit is rare amongst rich countries, but not unique, Greece suffers from it too". A warning if ever there was one.

Thailand may well be in for a more subdued performance this year.

However, the ongoing troubles in the world's developed economies is unlikely to attract investors for very long. Thailand's growth may be slow (The Bank of Thailand forecasting growth of up to five per cent this year) but it will still remain far more dynamic than others in the West.

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Domestic tourism a 'click' away for TAT

THE Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) in Phuket is planning to increase domestic tourism during the low season by introducing cheap "Phuket Phang Nga Click & Go" travel packages.

TAT Phuket will co-operate with Phuket International Airport and the island's hotels to run threeday packages, which will include round-trip flights, two nights at a hotel, plus special discount coupons for Phuket organizations worth up to 9,600 baht.

Car rental is included in some of the pricier packages. The project is targeted at tourists nationwide.

"The packages will encourage both Thai and foreigners living in Thailand to come to Phuket from places like Chiang Mai, Udon Thani, Ubon Ratchathani and Bangkok," said TAT Director Bangornrat Shinaprayoon.

"There are three different packages, each for two people. There's a 'silver package' which includes round-trip flights and a two-night hotel stay.

'There is also a 'gold package' including the same, plus car rental, and another high-end package which includes all the above plus pool-villa accommodation."

"We plan to run the project from April until the end of October. If the first project is successful, it will probably be done again in the following years. About 20 to 30 hotels are par-

ticipating in the project.

'TAT would like more people to visit Phuket in low season, as during this period there are a lot of available hotel rooms," Mrs Bangornrat said.

Final details of the project are still under discussion.



Pruksa Real Estate tout B5bn as annual target

PRUKSA Real Estate is expecting nationwide sales to be up to five billion baht this year, generated from provincial residential projects.

The company hopes its two housing projects in Phuket will generate as much as two billion baht of the projected target.

According to Mr Piya Prayong, Chief Business Officer of Pruksa Real Estate, demand for homes in Phuket now mainly comes from domestic buyers rather than foreign investors.

Therefore, Pruksa is developing residences priced in the one to two-million baht range in an attempt to attract lower-income buyers.

The company launched its first Phuket housing project, the Pruksa Ville, last year, investing about 402 million baht.

Already the company has sold 80 per cent of its total units in Phuket.

The Pruksa Ville project, located on Thepkrasattri Road, 15 kilometers from Phuket International Airport, consists of town houses in "American cottage" style.

Pruksa has announced a second housing project on the island worth 600 million baht, which will open next month, and offers both townhouses and detached houses.

Part of the company's marketing strategy is to concentrate on innovative products and new technology in order to keep up with changes in home buyers' behavior.

Pruksa is well known for using prefabrication techniques to reduce construction time and costs.

Prefabricated concrete pieces are made in factories in Bangkok before being shipped to Phuket and other provinces for the construction of houses.

Last year, Pruksa spent more than one billion baht in building its fifth prefabrication plant. – Anand Singh

New Year brings prosperity

PHUKET is reaping the rewards of a huge surge in tourists for this year's Chinese New Year.

The Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) expects revenue generated over the festival period to top the eight-billion-baht mark nationwide from both domestic and Chinese markets.

Reports from around the island point to occupancy rates in three and four-star hotels hitting the 90 per cent mark. Similar reports are coming in from Koh Samui.

Many Chinese tourists booked their New Year holidays in Phuket and Samui well in advance, Mr Prakit Chinamournphong, president of the Thai Hotels Association said.

"This has helped boost occupancy rates of three and four-star hotels during the month to an average of 85 to 90 per cent."

During the period each year, hotels in Phuket Town get a surge in occupancy, says Ms Duangduan Vichit, reservations officer at the Phuket Merlin Hotel.

"Currently, the Phuket Merlin Hotel is fully booked, with around 80 per cent of guests being Chinese holiday makers.

"There is also a significant number of domestic tourists who stay in Phuket Town but not as many as foreign tourists," Ms Duangduan said.

She also said that Phuket Town is a popular tourist attraction for Chinese tourists, who prefer to stay there during the New Year festivities because of the town's cultural charms, which make for a good atmosphere during the festival.

Phuket Town is also home to many important Chinese shrines on the island, which attracts Chinese tourists and locals.

During the New Year festival, 130,000 Chinese tourists are expected to visit Thailand, generating 3.5 billion baht from Chinese-inbound tourists alone, said Mr Sarasern Gnowrangsi, deputy head of marketing for

TAT Asia Pacific Region. He added that there were 120 chartered flights due to land at

Thai airports during February. Out of this number, as many as 80 chartered flights will be landing at Phuket International Airport, in addition to regular flights operating between China and Thailand.

MOU signed to boost MICE Industry

THE Thailand Convention and Exhibition Bureau (TCEB) and Phuket Provincial Government signed an agreement last week to develop an action plan to promote the island's Meetings, Incentives, Conventions and Exhibitions (MICE) industry.

Phuket Governor Tri Augkaradacha and Anusak Inthraphuvasak, Chairman of the Board of the TCEB, signed the memorandum of understanding (MoU) late last month at the Westin Siray Bay Resort & Spa in Phuket to initiate the "Phuket MICE City" project, which aims to develop the province as a hub for meetings, incentive tourism and regional trade shows.

Speaking at the event, TCEB Honorary Advisor Seven Smulders pointed out that developments are well underway for a convention and exhibition center in Mai Khao.

Construction on the center, which was approved by the cabinet in October last year, is expected to finish in 2015, Mr Smulders said. Further highlighting Phuket's potential as a MICE destination was TCEB Director of Exhibitions Supawan Teerarat.

She explained that Bangkok is currently Thailand's center for MICE activity, but that with the upcoming expansion of Phuket International Airport to handle more than 11 million passengers per year, along with other infrastructure development plans and the availability of accommodation and healthcare, Phuket is well positioned to become a MICE center in Asia.

According to the MoU, Phuket

province and the TCEB will "exchange information for planning purposes, including construction of infrastructure, transportation and mass transit in Phuket in order to enhance Phuket's competitiveness as a global MICE destination".

The partnership will also work at publicizing and "enhancing" Phuket's potential and competitiveness in the MICE industry.

Andy Dowden, general manager of Informa Yacht Group Thailand and organizer of the PIMEX International Boat Show, pointed to the success of his event as evidence of Phuket's potential. PIMEX, which recently wrapped up its eighth annual event in Phuket saw 90 companies representing 40 brands, 47 boats and an estimated 5,000 visitors attend, Mr Dowden said.

He said that for the past four years, the TCEB has been providing assistance with organizing the boat show and that co-operation with the TCEB was "simple and painless".

He praised their financial assistance and help with publicizing the event both throughout Thailand and overseas.


BIS hits mid-teens

ANIMAL rescue charity Soi Dog Foundation is currently embroiled in an island-wide battle against canine distemper. Last week's Phuket Gazette online report about Soi Dog's strategic vaccination of Phuket's dogs to create "firebreaks" preventing the spread of the disease has raised many questions.

Soi Dog was founded by Briton John Dalley, his wife Gill and Dutch expat Margot Homborg in 2003. Arriving on the island, Dalley was "appalled" by the conditions of its street dogs. And so began his efforts to give back to his new community, but it has not been an easy ride.

Despite Mrs Dalley losing both of her lower legs after contracting a rare bacterial infection while rescuing a dog in a flooded buffalo field in 2005, the couple continue to work seven days a week and have made the organization into one of Asia's largest and most successful animal rescue foundations. Soi Dog is registered as a charity in Thailand, the Netherlands, Australia, France and will shortly have similar status in the United States, the United Kingdom and Germany. Here, the Gazette's Nicholas Altstadt speaks with John Dalley about dogs on Phuket, animal diseases and the challenges his foundation faces in caring for them.

Nicholas Altstadt: What is distemper and how is it transmitted? Is there a similar disease in humans that it can be compared to?

John Dalley: Canine distemper is only found in dogs and one or two related species, none of which are found in Phuket. The disease cannot be readily compared to any human disease. It is an airborne virus transmitted either by a dog licking an infected dog or when an infected dog sneezes, it can be transmitted up to 20 meters. It was virtually eradicated in the West about 20 years ago.

What are the symptoms, how is it treated and how can pet owners protect their pets?

Initial symptoms are similar to a common cold in humans. It involves coughing, sneezing and discharge from the eyes and nose. Some veterinarians stock test kits that cost about 500 baht. In later stages of the disease, it affects the nervous system and brain, with death the usual result. Pet owners should have their dogs vaccinated. Soi Dog will vaccinate for free if the owner cannot afford it.

Puppies should have a full course of four vaccinations at three-week intervals between the ages of eight weeks and 18 weeks.

Can the dog's behavior be affected, making it dangerous as in the case of rabies?

Canine distemper presents abso-

lutely no danger to humans. In the latter stages, the symptoms can resemble rabies, with the dog shaking and foaming at the mouth. However, the dog is not affected mentally in the same way as rabies can make a dog violent. How many cases of distemper have there been during this outbreak and when did it start? What are the numbers compared to a "non-outbreak" period?

The current outbreak started in early December last year and despite several "false dawns", we continue to see many cases. Thus far we have seen in excess of 200 cases and must assume that there are many we are unaware of.

Distemper is endemic on the island, but outbreaks are usually localized. I have never seen anything remotely on the current scale. How many dogs, strays and

pets, are there on Phuket?

It's difficult to be accurate, but according to our estimates there are about 50,000. The numbers have reduced in most areas over the years with more than 30,000 being sterilized by us alone.

The major problem is the large number of very young puppies brought on to the island every week for sale at various locations. These puppies come from farms in the North of Thailand and are not vaccinated against any diseases, including rabies.

What year-on-year statistics or

estimates are there regarding the number of dogs on Phuket? What are the forecasts and how are they relevant to Soi Dog's efforts?

Soi Dog does an annual count in various areas. In these areas, the number of dogs has dropped significantly over the past seven years. Although this year has seen an increase in two of them.

We are looking to increase our efforts, subject to finance, by increasing our number of vets to four and employing more dog catchers. The effort is to sterilize 70 per cent of the dogs on the island, which is scientifically proven as the benchmark that would lead to a significant reduction in dog numbers. Simply removing dogs from the streets doesn't work and the wholesale killing of dogs is contrary to Buddhist beliefs.

How many dogs have you vaccinated for distemper?

We have not traditionally vaccinated dogs against distemper because of the cost factor and the fact that it is not dangerous to humans. However, following the current outbreak, we have changed this policy and as of December last year, over 1,000 dogs have been vaccinated. A further 1,000 vaccines have just been bought at a cost of over 100,000 baht, and Pfizer just donated an additional 500 vaccines.

What other diseases are of concern on Phuket?

HOUND HERO: John Dalley, founder of the Soi Dog Foundation. The biggest killers of dogs on Phuket are blood parasites transmitted by ticks. Ticks are everywhere on Phuket and pet owners should always protect their dogs against them. The number of dogs

We are increasingly working with a few of the tambon administration organizations (OrBorTor). The Livestock Department in Phuket has overall responsibility and operates the "dog pound", but this is basically a dumping ground and is

underfunded and understaffed, with no vets on site.

Visitors there are generally shocked by what they see.

What is the goal of Soi Dog in Phuket? In a perfect world, what would happen?

People may well question the effectiveness of what we do. However, with over 30,000 animals sterilized in the past seven years, they should ask themselves just how many more unwanted dogs there would be in Phuket if Soi Dog weren't active.

They should also ask themselves what effect on tourism there would be with thousands of starving, diseased dogs wandering the streets and beaches.

THE King's Speech is an insightful, inspirational, and entertaining story that has been creating muchdeserved buzz throughout this year's awards circles.

Based on actual events, although critics are slamming some of the film's authenticity, the film tells the story of King George VI, or "Bertie" (Firth), who struggled to overcome a childhood stutter as Europe was facing the growing threat of Hitler's Third Reich.

With King George V in failing health and Bertie's elder brother and heir to the throne. Edward VIII (Pearce), not wanting to take the throne, it was a tumultuous and uncertain time for England.

As Winston Churchill was at the center of mounting political pressure and the verge of war

unconventional and insists on a lack of informality in a way that initially offends the prince, but it's the refreshing approach that Bertie needs.

Lionel believes treating speech patients requires a holistic approach that is part scientific and part art. In essence, he's half speech therapist and half psychologist.

As he encourages Bertie to consider the childhood origin of his speech problem, the trust between

them grows; forming a friendship

that will earn a place in history.

Those who pay attention to film awards circles will frequently hear of The King's Speech in the upcoming months. Firth has already won the Golden Globe Best Actor Award for his role in the movie and is hotly tipped to scoop the Oscar for Best Actor in coming weeks.



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

Father and daughter are ready to hit the water for their 120-kilometer charity paddle around Phuket. Will they make it? Bank on it...

THE countdown is on for the father-and-daughter team of Les and Victoria Bird whose epic quest to paddle more than 120 kilometers in a circumnavigation of Phuket starts next weekend.

In the early hours of February 12, Ironman athlete Les, 59, and seven-time triathlon champion Victoria,11, will set out from Yacht Haven marina on the island's northeast coast. They won't return for some time.

Paddling in scorching heat during the day and cloaked in darkness at night, the Birds will have to successfully contend with boat traffic, exhaustion, unpredictable weather and tide changes to make it the whole way around.

But they are determined to finish what has been described as an "inspiration for Phuket", and it could take them five days to finish.

Anil Thadani, CEO of Symphony Capital, has donated his 38-foot vessel Blowfish as safety boat. Australian mariner Bill O'Leary will helm the boat, looking for potential dangers and pointing the pair in the right direction.

"When I read in the Phuket Ga*zette* about Victoria's aim of raising awareness for charity, I wanted to help in some way. I admire people who take on tough new challenges. This young girl is an inspiration to us all," said Mr Thadani.

The Birds will also be flanked by two veteran kayaking instructors on their trip: Ian Jones, who runs Exceptional Experiences, and Rob Ford, the Head of Primary at Victoria's school, the British International School.

The Birds announced their ambitious plans in October. Since then, the local community has been quick to lend support and cash donations. They are raising funds for the 100 Friends international foundation and Phuket Sunshine Village. So far, more than 32,000 baht has been raised and handed to charity representatives. Victoria is intent on raising much more.

First taking up kayaking 22 months ago in Phuket, Victoria completed a British Canoe Union (BCU) training course on the Isle of Wight in the English Channel in summer 2009.

Victoria's paddling progress over the past few months has left dad Les and her instructors baffled.

"It's amazing. She is a natural...she makes me look bad," says Les.

The pair will be paddling in 14foot solo Atlantis kayaks with drinks, food and their bunk-beds all aboard Blowfish.

Les said the paddle will be split into eight sections, a change from the original three.

On the first day, the Birds will set out from Yacht Haven and paddle about 30km to Nai Yang (2). Later that day (after Les has had his daily two-km swim for a "cooldown", they will head for Bang Tao (3) and stay the night on Blowfish.

The following day they plan to make it all the way to 4 Nai Harn (4) in the South. They plan to stop halfway for a quick Paton respite.

This will all be the easy part, says Les, who is more concerned with the unpredictable tidal patterns and speedboat traffic in Chalong Bay and off the coast of Phuket Town's Rassada Pier.

Day three is going to be tough. Paddling from Nai Harn, the duo plan to make it to Friendship Beach (5), then Cape Panwa (6).

On day four, en route to Boat Lagoon (7), "We'll stay away from the coastline to avoid the busy channel," says Les.

The fifth day will see the pair shoot for their final destination,





PETER Haenni moved to Phuket in 1994 from the Yverdon region of Switzerland where he trained and worked as a baker. He established bakeries on Phuket several years later and today provides pastries and delicatessen goods from his bakery in Chalong to supermarkets and other baked goods outlets around the island.

Many Phuket residents will remember that his bakeries were originally called "Flintstone".

"I liked the character of Fred Flintstone, who reminded me of myself, and I didn't think I would have any trouble using this name until I was contacted by a major law firm and told I was in copyright violation. I had to pay a big fine and change the name. Okay, now I call my bakery Flints-One, and I drew a new logo but it's still me."

Peter adapted to this change with a shrug of the shoulders, and chalks it up to the challenges of doing business in Thailand. He has succeeded as a small entrepreneur by focusing on increasing his product range and providing quality foods for his loyal customers.

"I make more than 150 different products, which include traditional Swiss pastries such as *laekerly*, a biscuit with mixed fruit inside, and a Swiss pasta, spatzli knoepfli.

"I developed a whole range of fresh frozen dinners like moussaka,



lasagna, cottage pie, and vol au vent. I make fresh tomato sauce, pork pie, pickles, fresh mango, strawberry and raspberry jams and a salmon terrine. There's the native cuisine of many European countries on offer."

Flints-One also offers a full service restaurant menu at their Chalong location, near the Fisherman Business Park, where locals go for a Western breakfast or an afternoon sandwich made with Peter's fresh bread.

Peter was born in the French region of Switzerland and took an apprenticeship as a baker. His first job was with the large Co-op Lausanne, where he worked at the company's factory from late night to early morning making a wide variety of breads.

After five years, he tired of the late hours and moved to mega-chain Migros where he made cakes all day. He stayed for seven years.

During his time as a baker in Switzerland he traveled to the United States and around Europe and played football in his spare

time. In 1991, he came to Phuket for a three week holiday and it changed his life.

"I was single then and it was a lot of fun to be on the island. A few years later, I returned with the idea of taking a year off and traveling around Thailand, but I never left Phuket."

He took a job at Le Croissant on Chao Fa East Road as a baker. By 1998 he was ready to open his own bakery and delicatessen. During the past 12 years, he has supplied his bakery products to the Deli Supermarket in Patong, the Kathu and Kamala bakeries, and Villa Market.

And for eight years he operated the restaurant at the British International School. He also opened another Flints-One Bakery in Rawai opposite the Sea Gypsy Village.

"I work all the time. There is no time to relax or for holidays as I have a lot of staff to support and it is a constant challenge to meet the needs of my loyal customers."

His shops are busy from early morning till closing, with local residents buying birthday cakes, elaborately decorated pastries and a line of designer quiche.

"I love living and working in Thailand as there's still a lot of freedom to do what you want, and, thankfully, there's a big market for what I can produce."

Life & style Sun, Sea, Surf ...and 'Singto'

THAILAND'S indie music scene remains quite the bone of contention. That is to say, there doesn't appear to be any defined "scene" as such.

On the surface of it, this country's live musical experience is a stable diet of tone-deaf karaoke yodelers screeching out Lady Gaga's latest hit, or, overexcited Thai jam bands churning out the same old predictable covers.

But scratch a little deeper and the talent is undoubtedly there accomplished musicians walking their own independent path. One such troubadour is "Singto" Numchok.

Singto's voice and mellow guitar skills have shifted thousands of copies of his self-titled debut album, yet the man himself remains the same laid-back soul who began his musical apprenticeship as a busker on the mean streets of Patong several years back.

Originally from the northern province of Biri Ram, Singto started playing guitar at the tender age of 12. He eventually moved to Bangkok, before the salty scent of the ocean steered him in the direction of Phuket, initially on a three month break from the capital. As often happens in

life, three months became three vears

"When I first arrived in Phuket I performed my music just for fun... on Soi Bangla among other places. A friend of mine owned a restaurant in Phuket Town and asked me to play music there in the evenings. It sort of took off from there," says Singto.

Phuket and Singto proved a perfect fit. Phuket was where he began to refine his music, give it direction. Island living is everywhere on his debut – an unashamed surf-fused pop record released last Autumn to critical acclaim. Think Jack Johnston's sound and you won't be too far off.

The laid-back beach music of artists like Johnson and Jason Mraz has been well received in Thailand in recent years, but it took Singto to take up the baton for the local boys.

"Thailand already has a lot of reggae and ska but not too much surf music, so I decided to have a go at it," he says.

"Surf music comes from simple pop music... it's easy for people to get it and like it.

"Everyone loves the beach in Phuket. When you've got a broken heart or feeling tired with things, you might think of the beach and it can make you happy," he adds.

Playing to an ever-increasing number of fans in the Phuket bar scene, Singto eventually got the opportunity to release a debut record, following a meeting Kij Monotone, owner of Pollen Sound.

Produced by Pollen and promoted by Believe Records, the album received positive reviews on its release last year, with latest single Ther Khue Khong Khwan (You're a gift) getting

plenty of radio airplay.

The opening track on the album, Wake Up, is performed in English, so too is jazz-scat soaked Hoo Hoo.

Acoustic guitar is prevalent on most tracks on the album, but so too is the ukulele, which gives the music a Hawaiian bent.

Singto is self-thought on the ukulele – picking up how to play through clips on YouTube.

And as it turns out, he is a natural on the instrument, scooping first prize at a national Thailand Ukulele Festival last year.

"I bought a ukulele in small music shop in Phuket Town, it was the only one they had.

"I liked the sound of it and quickly got to learning it," says Singto.

"I applied to the competition while I was still making the album. I wanted to win the grand prize of two really good ukuleles.

"I thought they might give the album something different. I sent a clip to the competition organizers and I was voted the winner," he added.

Playing live, Singto plays mostly his own songs, but does include a few covers in his repertoire. Stevie Wonder's My Cherie Amour and Marvin Gaye's What's going on (both played in Singto's own unique laid-back style) are two fan favorites.

Singto is currently holed up in Bangkok but is already making plans to return to Phuket in the next couple of months, hopefully to play a few gigs.

"There was a show planned for March in Phuket but it was canceled. I still plan to return to Phuket very soon. I've so many friends on the island and it very much feels like home for me," he says.







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Phuket Punchline Comedy Club returns this month

It started with Hicks

Sometimes there are phone calls you just have to take

FOR English comedian Nick Doody – the headline act at this month's Phuket Punchline Comedy Club – his call came on a bleak January morning in 1992 while studying at Oxford University.

Sitting on the stairs of his student house, holding a Walkman with a recording microphone bluetacked to it, racked with nerves about conducting his first interview for the Oxford University student newspaper, Doody waited for his interviewee to phone.

Around 11am the phone rang. Doody picked it up... the voice on the other end said: "Hello, it's Bill Hicks".

Universally regarded as the greatest stand-up comedian of all time, Hicks humor challenged the mainstream establishment and their beliefs of the time, aiming to "enlighten people to think for themselves."

When the impressionable Doody – an aspiring comedian himself with a dozen college stand-up shows behind him – bagged the interview in '92, Hicks

It's a remarkable interview, where 20-year-old Doody begins nervously before quickly finding his feet. By the end, he has Hicks in hysterics. The legendary American comedian was so impressed that he invited Doody to support him at his gig in Oxford the following week.

Praising his interviewer, Hicks remarks: "I'm enjoying this... you're asking some very relieving and refreshing f*cking questions," before adding, "I've never asked someone to do a show with me, but that's how good your questions are".


The chat with Hicks undoubtedly left its mark on Doody, who has since gone on to become one of the brightest, radical talents on the UK comedy circuit. Hicks would have been proud of Doody's sharp, topical and "not afraid to say what he thinks" brand of political comedy and satire, which has won fans all over the world.

Doody also writes comedy for television and radio, with credits including Channel 4's *Friday Night Project* and the Armando Iannucci's Sony Award-winning *Charm Offensive*.

He will perform at the Phuket Punchline Comedy Club at the Holiday Inn Resort in Patong on February 23.

Comedians Josh Howie and Michael Legge will also perform on the night. Tickets are on sale at venues across the island at 960 baht each until February 22.



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Building up The View

WORK on The View in Karon is underway again now that the rainy season, which delayed operations on site late last year, is over.

With foundations in place and the soft opening scheduled for December this year, builders are now busy installing the infrastructure at the site, including the 25-meter by 400m retaining wall piled in around the site.

Perched right on 60-75m above sea level, The View is the 500-million-baht brainchild of developer Alexander Grabowski.

The project will feature 53 Ocean View units as well as a panoramic ocean-view clubhouse with infinity pool, pool bar,

restaurant, children's pool, fitness room, business center, step garden and spa pavilion in the middle of the 8.03-rai project site.

The conceptual theme of the development is "ocean wave inspiration" demonstrated by the white color scheme and floor-toceiling panoramic ocean views.

Unit sizes range from 114 square meters for one-bedroom units, 145sqm two-bedroom units, 222sqm three-bedroom units and the three-bedroom penthouses roam up to 392sqm of interior space opening onto a huge sundeck.

All units have been designed with spacious terraces, private swimming pools and each unit soaks in the surroundings

through large glass windows, sliding glass doors and tempered glass handrails.

Some units even feature rooftop sundecks and entertainment areas for guests of the condominium owners.

Units throughout the development will be linked by green pathways ready for golf car transportation.

Architect and interior designer on the project are Pongsakorn Aunprdit and Borritat Sawantrat from LerThai Co Ltd, whose design experience includes working with internationally renowned five-star hotels and residences, such as the Moevenpick Resort and Spa at The Palm Jumeirah Dubai.

Hillside properties keep hanging on

LEAFING through any of the island's glossy property magazines or websites, three terms seem to crop up time and time again: "oceanfront", "absolute beachfront" and "sea views".

Although, the most exaggerated property moniker has got to be the term "luxury".

Copywriters employ artistic license by applying the word to all manner of property, from galvanized iron roofed shacks and dog houses to condos and ultra villas.

An underground movement should be established with the principal aim of banning the word "luxury" from property publications and advertising.

The leaders will live somewhere up in the hills of Phuket subsisting only on free-range geckos, home-grown high-octane coffee beans and solar-powered connections to Facebook.

Radical movements aside however, there's a nagging question By Bill Barnett

which regularly pops up in Phuket property circles: what drives toprange property prices on the island?

The strange species of luxury cliff-hanging villas is a case in point. Take a drive in California's Malibu, or perhaps Italy's Amalfi Coast, and hillside properties with awe-inspiring views and definable aspects are understandably the most sought after properties on the market.

In Phuket, when comparing the value of upscale real estate – say along Kamala's headland or in Surin, Nai Thon or easterly Cape Panwa – the common denominator is not the beaches, but privacy and viewing horizons.

In many cases, as the slope gets steeper the price gets higher. Take it from me: Seclusion sells. Of course there are exceptions. The most notable being the highpriced neighborhood just over the bridge in Natai, which offers the opportunity to step right onto a long stretch of beach.

The respective camps representing beachfront versus hillside ocean view will continue to wage war on the subject of what really defines "luxury".

Truth be known, the answer lies somewhere in between. But in terms of the broader market in Phuket, at least there is a direct correlation between the angle and pricing stratosphere.

With so little coastline left, some will point out that opportunities of high-end developments are shrinking faster than the value of the beleaguered US dollar.

However, there are still a number of premium sites left in Phuket which will ensure longevity for the cliffhanger fraternity.

Strategic alliance not a bad idea



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Police station plans inch forward

PLANS to build a new police station in Karon are progressing at a snail's pace, but work on the new Police Region 8 headquarters now under construction in Mai Khao is steaming ahead, officials were told this week.

Maj Gen Decha Budnampeth, Deputy Commissioner of Provincial Police Region 8, told a meeting on Tuesday that his office was still awaiting Treasury Department approval on whether the Karon police station project could go ahead.

Maj Gen Decha, a former Phuket Provincial Police superintendent, explained that the police station in Karon is to be built on three rai of Treasury Department land located between the Hilton Arcadia Phuket Resort and Spa and The Old Phuket Resort.

Police Region 8 had first requested to use five rai at the site, but Karon Municipality had already been granted two rai for a medical center. This left the remaining three rai to be used for a police station, he explained.

Only after the Treasury Department approved the land request can his office start construction of a road, 300 meters long and eight meters wide, to reach the

Access road will cross private land, but both landowners involved have agreed to donate the land needed for the road to go ahead,

proposed site from Patak Road.

he added. One of the parties granting access is a member of the Ekwahnit family, one of the island's largest landholders.

Maj Gen Decha expects to spend a total of 20 million baht in total on the new station, including land costs and construction.

Meanwhile, progress on the new Police Region 8 headquarters, now under construction on 185 rai of land in Mai Khao, is going gangbusters.

Fencing, an entrance sign, security guard box, helicopter hangar and other facilities have

been completed at a cost of 10 million baht.

Work on infrastructure installation including roads, water and electrical supply, as well as a Phuket Forensic Science building is to continue under a 90-millionbaht budget.

Police Region 8 received the required budget more than a year ago, but construction stalled after encountering problems with sea gypsies living there, Maj Gen Decha said.

"There are 26 families living on the land; 24 of them have accepted compensation, but just two refused the option," he said.

will resume next month and take about one year to finish," he explained.

drugs, including urine tests, and tests on weapons can be conducted here," he added.

Currently, samples and other materials to be used as evidence in Phuket investigations must be sent to a forensic science center in Trang for analysis and confirmation.

Phuket City Police chief Wanchai Ekpornpit earlier has often said the lack of a testing facility on the island was a major weakness in the local criminal justice system, allowing some drug suspects to walk free.

Police Region 8 will wait until 2012 before applying for the 110 million baht in funding needed to build the headquarters office building and the officers' accommodations, Maj Gen Decha said.

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Gardening By Patrick Campbell

DESPITE what the name suggests, Indian Rubber Vine (Strophanthus gratus) can be found in hot climates all over the world, from the southern United States, where it is sometimes referred to as climbing oleander or rose allamanda, all the way to Phuket, where it's called Yaen Pinang in Thai.

The Indian bit is misleading, since it hails from Madagascar. Also, it is neither a true oleander nor allamanda, despite coming from the same family of Apocynaceae.

Enough about semantics: what is undeniable is the vine's beauty and its value as a garden shrub.

It produces clusters of large, waxy, pink blooms which shade to a deeper pink at the edges.

The trumpet shaped flowers are allamanda-like, but they have projecting throats that are deep burgundy in color.

Some cultivars have long twisted segments that hang down from this, hence the name Strophanthus, which means "twisted cord flower". The buds are attractive too, purplish-red in color.

In full sun it will bloom profusely and more-or-less continuously. One slender stem may have as many as 10 flowers at its tip.

These will last for several days before turning pale brown and dropping, and they exude a powerful, musky fragrance, which some say is reminiscent of roses.

Moreover, the blooms can be used as decorations.

The foliage is another bonus. The leaves are large and leathery in texture.

However, they are extremely glossy, displaying a rich green when new that turns to olive-green with age.

Nicely complementing the massed display of pink blooms, they stay on the bush without looking at all scruffy for a very long time.

A natural tendency of the shrub is to be somewhat vine-like. It is scandent and can be a bit straggly without some support. After all, it

But Strophanthus is tolerant of pruning and will form a good-sized

bush if the long shoots are pruned and the plant is supported when it starts to get top-heavy.

Apart from that, it is a lowmaintenance shrub tolerant of most soil conditions and unlikely to succumb to disease. It is easy to propagate from hardwood cuttings. What's odd is that it is not more popular in Phuket.

It is most certainly a Top 20 Phuket Plants candidate.

It needs plenty of space, as the roots go down a long way, so do not put it too close to less robust shrubs.

Apart from that, its only possible demerit is that it is, in common with most members of the Apocynaceae family, highly toxic and contains a range of extremely potent alkaloids.

But even these have been used

positively to treat heart conditions. After all, every tropical garden will have its share of poisonous plants.

Strophanthus has won out over other members of this extensive genus. The so-called yellow oleander (Thevetia Peruviana) came very close to being selected.

It is more compact and bushlike, will grow to the size of a small tree and produces beautiful yellow or apricot flowers. It is every bit as hardy as its cousin.

Although Thevetia blooms for most of the year, its flowers are produced more sparingly than those of the Indian Rubber Vine.

For this reason, Strophanthus gets the nod.

Next week will be the last in this series. Then it will be time to put these Top 20 Phuket Plants in some sort of order of preference. That is going to be very tricky,

not to say, highly contentious. Readers' comments will be most welcome.

Tip of the week

Planting preparations

NOW that the wet season is supposedly behind us, it's a good time to plant new shrubs.

After all, the garden soil will still be moist and reasonably workable.

The hole for your plant should be a bit bigger than the ball of soil at the base of it.

For ease, saturate the immediate planting area with water beforehand, and, if the plant has a well established root system, water the container too.

If the soil is poor or needs conditioning, dig a larger hole and incorporate some compost or other organic matter. Only tease out the roots if they are too compact.

After positioning the plant, pack the remaining space with good quality top soil and firm down.

This will help deter predatory worms and grubs.

If the new plant requires a stake, ensure that the stake is placed in the hole first.

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
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


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
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Sport Avery flies high at PEGS tourney



Searching for defensive steel

DESPITE a complete overhaul of the FC Phuket team during the off-season, manager Surachai Jirasirichote is intent on adding two new defenders to his squad before the start of Thai League Division 1 next weekend.

Phuket begin their 2011 league campaign with an away trip to Suphanburi FC on Sunday February 13, before hosting Rajpracha FC in their first home encounter the following Saturday at Surakul Stadium.

Two recent friendly games against Premier League champions Muang Thong United last week exposed frailties in the Phuket defense, and provided enough evidence for boss Surachai that defensive cover is required before the big kickoff.

In the first match against Muang Thong, Phuket conceded three first-half goals, all from headers, in the space of 10 minutes. It exposed a soft center at the heart of their back-four, which Surachai is now working hard to toughen up with the recruitment of two new faces.

during the coming week to take part in trial games, looking to earn a contract with the club for the coming season.

Another player hoping to again pull on the green Phuket jersey is one of the stars from last year's promotion success, and fan's favorite, Nene Bi Tra Sylvestre.

The club confirmed two weeks ago they expected the talented midfielder to return before the start of the league.

However, the player from the Ivory Coast has run into visa difficulties and it remains to be seen when he will join up with the rest of the squad, as Phuket officials try to sort out the situation before next Sunday.

Hopes are high that Phuket can finish in the top four in Division 1 to make the playoffs for a chance of yet another promotion – to the Thai Premier League – later in the year.

Phuket's 2011 fixtures include two trips to Bangkok for clashes against Bangkok United and Bangkok FC, and finishes with a home game against Chainat FC.
