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Tuk-tuks agree to set fares

IN A landmark move for Phuket tourism, the Patong Taxi Federation has agreed to a range of set fares to charge passengers.

The federation represents about 85 per cent of all passenger vehicle operators in Patong, including taxi, tuk-tuk, motorcycle taxi and minivan drivers.

One of the key fares agreed to is a maximum fare of 200 baht for any tuk-tuk or taxi ride within Patong.

Federation president Preechavude "Prab" Keesin told the *Phuket Gazette*, "We have agreed to these fares because if drivers keep overcharging, then tourists will stop using our services altogether and we will lose customers.

"By agreeing to these fares we are helping to save our drivers' jobs. We need to change to make sure everyone survives." said Mr Prab, who is also the son of Patong Mayor Pian Keesin.

The new fares are the result of a provincial committee set up by Phuket Governor Tri Augkaradacha to mediate among stakeholders what fares should be

standardized and at what rates. The fares will come into effect after the official agreement is ratified in writing by Governor Tri.

However, Mr Prab said nearly all his member drivers were aware of the new fares and may begin charging them immediately.

Maximum fares for journeys within Patong will be 200 baht for up to four passengers, with a maximum extra charge of 50 baht per passenger exceeding four.

At the meeting on Tuesday when the fares were announced,

Vice Governor Weerawat Janpen said, "These are the fares that drivers normally charge tourists – we've just made them standard and professional.

"At first, some drivers may have problems following this announcement, but I believe that in the end everyone will adhere to these fares," he said.

The standard fares will be posted on official signboards and leaflets to be handed out in Patong. See also page 9 for our new "Letter from the Governor".

Medical center planned for Karon

THAWEE Thongcham, the mayor of Karon Municipality, has confirmed that plans are afoot to build a medical center on two rai of land between the Hilton Arcadia Phuket Resort and Spa and The Old Phuket Resort.

The site is part of a five-rai plot currently under responsibility of the Treasury Department.

Royal Thai Police Region 8 have already requested permission to build Karon's first police station on the remaining three rai.

Mayor Thawee explained that Karon Municipality has applied to the Treasury Department to use the land, but has yet to receive a reply.

If all goes according to plan, he expects construction of the facility to start at the end of this year or at the beginning of next year.

A municipal budget would be combined with corporate sponsorship by local businesses to fund the building and medical equipment, Mayor Thawee explained.

He declined to provide an initial cost estimate, saying draft plans have yet to be drawn up.

Medical staff are to be provided by Patong Hospital or Vachira Phuket Hospital in Phuket Town.

"We have yet to decide which hospital to sign a memorandum of understanding with. The center

should be run the same as Vachira Phuket Hospital 2 in Phuket Town," Mayor Thawee said (*see page 2*). The medical center in Karon, with 10 beds, would provide emergency outpatient services.

Mayor Thawee said he expects the facility, once completed, to help save tourists rescued from drowning at Karon, one of Phuket's most dangerous beaches during the rainy season.

"It will be for emergencies such as small injuries and especially people rescued from drowning.

"Normally, patients are taken to Patong or Vachira Phuket hospitals, which take time to reach.

"This new medical center would help save time and lives," he said.

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Vachira expands outpatient services

VACHIRA Phuket Hospital, the largest government hospital on the island, has opened an off-site outpatient clinic in Phuket Town to reduce the workload at the main facility.

"Vachira Phuket Hospital 2 was set up to help reduce the number of patients at Vachira Phuket Hospital, which is now up to 2,000 a day," explained Hospital Director Dr Jessada Chungpaibulpatana.

"It will also help reduce waiting times for patients," he added.

The center, located literally on the corner of the Yee Teng Complex at the Slaughterhouse Intersection, where Chao Fa Road meets Patipat Road, opened quietly on January 4.

It can serve 100 patients a day with staff treating patients daily from 8:30am to 4pm.

"We provide only emergency medical services, ordinary health checks and a dental clinic.

"Patients needing surgery or intensive care are transferred to Vachira Phuket Hospital," Dr Jessada said.

However, the center will soon have its own an x-ray machine, pre-natal clinic, family planning center and Thai massage spa, he added.

"The center is currently on trial. There are about 60 patients a day. If we receive positive feedback from the public, we might open this one 24 hours a day and open similar outpatient centers in Sapam, Chalong and Karon," Dr Jessada said.

Thai Public Health Minister Jurin Laksanawisit is scheduled to attend the official opening in April.

Hazardous waste trade booming

AN INNOVATIVE project that allows people to exchange toxic household waste for pharmaceuticals is going strong in Phuket Town.

The Phuket Safe project, a collaborative effort of Phuket City Municipality, the Phuket Drug Store Club and the Phuket Pharmacists Association, allows anyone to exchange toxic waste items for a variety of non-prescription medications at any of 12 participating venues.

Tiensak Santikayawakul, secretary of the Phuket Drug Store Club, said 24 kilograms of hazardous waste were collected in the first three months of the program, which started on September 15 last year.

"Most of waste collected between September and December comprised flashlights and dry bat-

teries. We brought them all to Phuket City Municipality for proper disposal," he said.

Mr Tiensak added that he was pleased with the response from the public and thought the project would continue.

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Drug stores want to support the local community, not just in terms of dispensing medication but also in maintaining a healthy living environment, he said.

The medications provided under the program include common remedies such as paracetamol, mentholated oil and lozenges for sore throats.

"People who buy medicine from pharmacists can feel safe in the knowledge that they can receive important usage advice," he added.

There is plenty of room to expand the network because Phuket has more than 300 registered pharmacies, Mr Teinsak said.

"Our aim is to have every drug store join, if possible. Any store that is ready can join right away," he said.

Drug war crippled by slow test results

PROCEDURAL problems in drug testing are crippling efforts by the Phuket Police to suppress narcotics use on the island, a provincial committee on drug suppression was told last week.

At the first annual meeting of the committee, held at Phuket Provincial Hall, Phuket Governor Tri Augkaradacha said central government policy on drug issues was straightforward and progress easy to evaluate.

There are currently 27 different anti-drug projects on the island under an 11.4-million-baht budget earmarked for drug suppression at the start of fiscal 2011, he said.

The heads of various sub-committees should submit progress reports every 10 days so that strategies can be reviewed and changed if necessary, he added.

The committee was told that the use of ya ice (crystal methamphetamine) was continuing to increase despite its high price and there was a continuing rise in illegal drug use among Phuket youth, especially students.

There are currently 1,500 people in the province undergoing court-ordered drug treatment programs, the committee heard.

Police continue to claim that verification of the results of urine tests administered in Phuket takes too long.

In a meeting on that issue on Friday, Phuket Provincial Police

Deputy Komol Wattarakorn urged the Forensics Police Bureau in Bangkok to establish a certified drug testing center in Phuket.

Currently, police conduct random urine tests at nightclubs and other night entertainment venues around the island.

They also test in several hotels that have agreed to take part in the police 'white hotel project', under which staff agree to be tested.

However, samples need to be collected and sent to Vachira Phuket Hospital.

From there, they are forwarded to regional Forensics Police testing centers in Surat Thani or Trang for verification.

Often the samples are too old by the time they are tested for verification and the results don't match those of the original test, Col Komol said.

Repeat trafficker snared in accident

MORE than 1,000 marine animals, including 260 specimens of protected species, were seized after the pickup being used to smuggle them collided with a motorbike in Wichit last Saturday

One man died from injuries sustained in the accident.

The driver of the pickup was Pichit Bangjark, 34, a Rawai sea gypsy who has been charged with trafficking protected marine animals before.

His pickup collided with the motorbike in front of Baan Nabon School on Chao Fa East Road about 1am last Saturday.

Two men and one woman thrown from the motorbike were rushed Vachira Phuket Hospital in Phuket Town.

One of the men, Kiangsak Songnu, 28, died in the hospital.

Chalong Police arrived at the scene to find 350 starfish, 45 sea urchins and 390 hermit crabs in water-filled plastic bags packed into boxes in the bed of the pickup.

Stashed among the haul were 30 pipe fish and 230 six-spotted gobies – both protected species. Pichit was charged with reckless driving causing death and

injury, and for being in possession of protected marine animals.

On March 7 last year, Pichit and three minors were arrested for smuggling protected marine species in the same pickup involved in the accident last Saturday.

Legal proceedings for last year's incident were already completed before Pichit's arrest last weekend.

The punishment for smuggling protected marine animals is a jail term up to one year, or a fine up to 100,000 baht, or both.

Conservation center officer Prajuab Mokrat said the pipe fish and six-spotted gobies were "very rare" and commanded high prices in the illicit trade. Both are found around coral reefs.

"Marine animals such as these are always trafficked for private collections. Pipe fish are usually used to produce an aphrodisiac,' he said.

Of the marine animals that survived the accident, some will be kept at Phuket Aquarium. The remainder will be released into the sea after the case is closed.

Aldhouse back in court March 1 Body blown across the bay

PHUKET "kickbox murder" suspect Lee Aldhouse appeared in Westminster Magistrates Court in London on February 2 for an extradition hearing following a request from the Thai authorities, the UK Home Office has confirmed.

Aldhouse will remain in custody in the UK until at least March 1, when he is scheduled to return to the same court for extradition proceedings, Sam Eversden of the UK Home Office told the *Gazette*.

Aldhouse, originally from Birmingham, is wanted for the stabbing murder of 23-year-old US Marine Dashawn Longfellow in Rawai in August last year.

Aldhouse was able to escape Thailand via Cambodia. An international manhunt of almost two weeks failed to find him, but he was arrested on arrival at Heathrow Airport in London.

He was wanted on an outstanding warrant issued after he fled the UK while out on bail for a previous offense.

Intranee Sumawong, Executive Director of International Affairs at the Office of the Attorney General in Bangkok, told the *Gazette* that the British authorities have yet to tell her office how long the extradition process will take.

THE body of a man found floating off Koh Racha, about 25 kilometers south of Phuket, remains unidentified.

Chalong Police Duty Officer Tianchai Duangsuwan said the body, discovered by passengers on a dive tour boat, looked as if it had been in the water several days.

This in mind, he believes it might have been blown across Phang Nga bay from Phi Phi Island or even from Koh Lanta.

"We estimate the man died about four days ago. He was about 40 years old. We cannot be sure whether he was Thai or foreign," he said after the discovery.

Couple spend retirement in the dog house

NAKHON Pathom resident Champa Tangsombun is crazy about dogs – so much so that it's ruining his wife's retirement.

The piggy bank bust

A WOMAN who saw her piggy bank being carried past her house in Chalong by a neighbor knew something was amiss – especially since the piggy bank was stolen from her home a month earlier.

The woman called the police, who followed up on the tipoff and arrested a young couple who have since confessed to robbing more than 30 homes around the island.

Chalong Police deputy superintendent Narong Luksanawimol identified the pair as Boonyod Atthatham, 21, and his female companion Chadawan Prateep Na Thalang, 24. Both were arrested at Chalong Circle on Monday.

Police have since recovered a wide range of items from local secondhand shops and an apartment rented by Mr Boonyod near Rang Hill in Phuket Town, as well as less valuable items seized in a search of a home rented by the couple on Soi Kloom Yang, where Ms Chadawan was spotted carrying the piggy bank.

The pair confessed to targeting homes and apartments in many parts of the island in spree of more

than 30 break-ins dating back five

or six months, Lt Col Narong said. People who believe their homes have been robbed by the pair are urged to visit Chalong Police Station to see if their belongings are among the recovered loot.

Recovered items included Buddha images, jewelry and electronic devices including laptops, mobile phones, hand-held video recorders and digital cameras. Lt Col Narong expressed concern about how poor parenting seems to be contributing to a rise in crime and drug use among young people on the island.

Ms Chadawan and Mr Boonyod both finished their studies after three years of high school.

Many youths leave school early and fall into peer groups that lead them into drug use and other criminal activities, he said.



Man slaughtered on palm plantation

THE body of a Burmese man with a half-severed head and intestines spilling out was found on a Phuket palm plantation early last Sunday morning.

Thalang police were informed of the gruesome discovery at about 8am. The body lay in the Anchalee Plantation, just south of Heroines' Monument, off Thepkrasattri Road.

The victim, identified by a document on the body as "Yoe", age 37, was found face down with 11 stab wounds, police said. According to the document, he

lived in Rassada subdistrict. Near the body police found the

victim's socks, a tobacco pouch and a hat.

Thalang Police Duty Officer Patiwat Yodkhuan speculated that Mr Yoe may have known the killer,



The body was found a short distance from Thepkrasattri Road. who possibly lured him into the secluded plantation behind Wat Tha Ruea to kill him.

Another scenario could have been that Mr Yoe was killed while trying to fend off robbers, Lt Patiwat said.

Where have the Rohingya gone?

THE saga of the plighted Rohingya arrested on February 1 in Phuket continues as scores of them seem to have disappeared.

Phuket Immigration Superintendent Panuwat Ruamrak told the *Phuket Gazette* on Tuesday that all 68 Rohingya refugees detained in Phuket were transferred on Monday to Phang Nga Immigration due to overcrowding at facilities in Phuket.

However, an official at Phang Nga Immigration, who declined to give her name, told the *Gazette* on Wednesday they were unaware of any such transfer or arrangement.

Sen Sgt Maj Sanpetr Janthai of Immigration Region 6 headquarters in Haad Yai on Thursday told the *Gazette* their office received a message from Phuket Immigration dated February 4.

The message stated Phuket Immigration detention facilities were overcrowded and that they would contact headquarters to "communicate any further action", he said.

Phuket Immigration, which operates under the command of Region 6 headquarters, has given no further notice of action, he added.

This has raised concerns among international human rights organizations and within Thailand. Both Human Rights Watch (HRW) and the Lawyers Council of Thailand have released statements over the past two weeks demanding government action and transparency in dealing with Rohingya refugees.

The head scratching over the whereabouts of the Phuket 68 quickly turned to concern as reports emerged of 91 "starving" Rohingya refugees landing on India's Car Nicobar Island on February 3.

One report quoted Campbell Bay Police as saying the men were adrift for 15 to 20 days.

The concern stems from 91 Rohingya who landed in Trang province in January. They were arrested but were eventually "unaccounted for" as the United Nations High Commission on Refugees (UNHCR) pressed the

government to allow access to the refugees. The Thai government, however, ignored the UN agency.

Amnesty International (AI) Myanmar researcher Benjamin Zawacki told the *Gazette* that although it cannot be proved at this stage that the Nicobar arrivals were the same men who were detained in Thailand, the number was "awfully coincidental".

He also said that AI had confirmed the men were Rohingva.

"Some of the men, who are now in India, claimed that they did land elsewhere [before Car Nicobar] and were essentially cast adrift without provisions and a functioning engine," he said.

"This, of course, brings to mind events of early 2009," Mr Zawacki added, referring to an incident about two years ago when Thailand faced harsh criticism for arresting 190 Rohingya refugees and towing them back out to sea with limited provisions.

Human Rights Watch Deputy Director Asia Phil Robertson said, "Thailand is not being transparent in its handling of Rohingya.

"They are playing the game of find the pea under the coconut shell'," he said. Although Thailand is now in the spotlight over possible human rights violations and its alleged mishandling of Rohingya refugees, the root of the problem is firmly planted in Burma, experts say.

The Rohingya have the unfortunate distinction of being near, if not at the bottom rung of the global social ladder: the world's most unwanted people.

Decades of human rights abuses have forced them to flee their homeland at all costs.

The Rohingya are a Muslim minority originating in northern Arakan State in Burma and parts of Bangladesh.

The Burmese government formally stripped the Rohingya of their citizenship in the 1982 Citizenship Act, HRW's Phil Robertson said.

"The Burmese government has engaged in revisionist history to claim the Rohingya are not citizens. The Rohingya have lived for many generations in Arakan State, including well before Burmese independence from the British in 1948, and so they have clear, legitimate claims to Burmese citizenship," he said.

The Rohingya need government permission for everything from domestic travel to marriage. They also face systematic religious persecution, Mr Robertson said. The Burmese military also en-

gages them in forced labor and physically abuses them, in some cases killing or "disappearing" them, he added. Not surprisingly, many flee to Bangladesh, Mr Robertson said.

"The government [there] refuses to grant new arrivals any legal status and [like Thailand] prevents any sort of refugee status determination by the UNHCR," he said.

HRW estimates that as many as 300,000 Rohingya are believed to be living in Bangladesh, many in makeshift camps where they are not permitted to work and face violence and discrimination by local authorities and communities.

"Their situation [in Bangladesh] is like the old Thai saying, 'Fleeing the tiger and running into the crocodile'. It's not surprising they are taking such huge risks and such a dangerous journeys in these rickety overcrowded boats – trying to get to somewhere they will be safe," Mr Robertson said.

"The rest of the nations in the region recognize these facts and now they need to forcefully demand that the new Burmese government accept this and end their systematic discrimination and abuse against the Rohingya.

"Only then will the Rohingya refugee crisis come to an end," he said.



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'Mangrove Rd' finally gets green light

AFTER more than a decade, the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environment (MNRE) has finally approved an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) for a controversial road through a mangrove forest in Phuket Town.

News that the EIA of the Klong Koh Phee Road project had been approved was announced on Monday at a project committee meeting chaired by Phuket Governor Tri Augkaradacha.

During the meeting, Phuket City Mayor Somjai Suwansupapana said an expert committee from the MNRE approved the application on December 1.

The approval followed an aerial survey of the site by visiting Deputy Prime Minister Sanan Kajornprasart in November.

The application was the fifth submitted for the project, which involves construction of a 600-meter elevated road connecting Saphan Hin with Sakdidet Road Soi 7.

The stumbling block for over a decade was the effect the project would have on nearby mangroves.

The big break came on July 30 last year when the MNRE issued an exception on its 2003 blanket ban on public use of mangrove forest land. However, the exception stipulated that any such projects could only go forward with cabinet approval.

The cabinet request should be filed with the Ministry of Interior by the end of the month, the committee was told.

As soon as cabinet permission is granted, the Phuket City Municipality will submit a formal request to the Forestry Department to use the reserve land.

Farewell to a 'class

IT WAS as Mick Tonkin would have wanted it - no fanfare, his friends bidding farewell by raising a glass and with fond memories in their hearts.

Although respectful of local customs, Mick was always true to his roots where the celebration of life meant everything, never standing on ceremony.

And so it was on Tuesday when more than 150 friends attended Mick's funeral at Wat Phra Thong in Thalang, followed by a wake at the Black Cat restaurant in Cherng Talay, a favorite eating haunt.

Early Wednesday evening last week, Phuket lost one of its "good guys" after Mick collapsed at Suvarnabhumi Airport in Bangkok on his way home from a business trip.

Efforts by paramedics and doctors failed to revive him. A post- mortem examination revealed he had died following a massive heart attack.

Michael John Tonkin's pragmatic and unassuming attitude to life was perhaps honed by his own beginnings. He was brought into the world in south London during the Blitz in World War II.

He often joked that his mother put a tin basin on her head during the bombings, hoping it would save them in the event of a direct hit.

Young Mick excelled in his studies, winning a scholarship to grammar school.

But the family's financial situation meant he could not go on to university; instead he took an apprenticeship in instrumentation engineering.

His mathematics and physics skills were quickly recognized when, at the age of just 22, he was sent to India as the only foreign electronic engineer on a massive

dam project.


Mick then worked in a number of industries until the late 1970s, when he discovered his addiction to computing.

Later, he opened the world's first Apple Centre in London and won awards for his accounting software. About this time he met his partner Carol Fryer.

They moved on to develop their own businesses in the financial services and software sectors.

In the mid-1990s the couple relocated to Phuket, successfully establishing A++ Software, providing Thai companies with the first dual-language accounting packages that allowed them to bypass expensive foreign alternatives.

Mick had passions beyond computing – among them a love

the first day of the annual Formula 1 racing season.

Mick, indicative of his wry sense of humor and desire to support the community.

The online postings since his death sum up Mick's reputation in the international, expatriate and local communities: "a great guy", "what an extremely decent and wonderful guy", "we would like to say farewell to the best boss anyone could have had. Mick was a pleasure both to work with and for, and we are all deeply saddened by his premature departure", "we miss his humor already", "one of life's true gentlemen", "we honor you and all you have done for so many" and "a class act" among them.

And one that said everything: "So sad and too early."

Farewell Mick Tonkin, you are gone but not forgotten. We have raised a glass, as you would have hoped, in your deserved honor.

Tensions high

Fighting on Cambodian border intensifies, conflict draws UN attention

FIGHTING between Thai and Cambodian troops in the border area surrounding the disputed Hindu temple of Preah Vihear has killed at least seven people and sparked growing concern among the international community.

UN Secretary General Ban Kimoon on Sunday said he was "deeply concerned" by the conflict, which has prompted the evacuation of thousands of villagers from surrounding areas.

Fighting broke out last Friday, with both sides accusing the other of firing first. Troops exchanged fire sporadically for at least four days, with an uneasy peace holding from around 11am Monday.

Cambodia on Monday said the fighting had killed five people and wounded 45. At least one soldier and one civilian have been killed on the Thai side.

The Cambodians also claim Thai shelling has damaged the disputed temple, resulting in the collapse of one of its wings.

AROUND THE nation

temple have been high since Unesco granted it World Heritage status in July 2008 following an application from Cambodia.

In 1962 the World Court ruled that the temple belonged to Cambodia, although Thailand claims 4.6 square kilometers of territory around it.

The temple stands atop a steep cliff face, making it accessible only from Thailand.

The latest fighting followed the recent arrest and trial of seven Thais for illegally entering Cambodian territory.

Five were released with suspended sentences last month. Two of them, Thai nationalist Veera Somkwamkid and his secretary Tensions over the 11th century Ratree Pipattanapaibul, were con-

victed of espionage and sentenced to eight and five years in prison respectively.

The convictions have ratcheted up political tension in Bangkok, where the nationalist People's Alliance for Democracy is holding a protest attempting to push the government of Abhisit Vejjajiva to take a harder line in the dispute.

While Prime Minister Abhisit's government is keen to resolve the conflict bilaterally, Cambodian premier Hun Sen has written to ask the United Nations Security Council to intervene.

Hun Sen has asked the UN to send peacekeepers and demanded an emergency Security Council meeting to "stop Thailand's aggression", according to United Press.

UN Secretary-General Ban Kimoon called for "maximum restraint" on both sides. "The secretary-general is

deeply concerned by reports of repeated armed clashes," his office said in a statement.



Dangerous shortcut to mangrove loss

THE long-awaited approval of the Environmental Impact Assessment for the "Klong Koh Phee Road" project [see News pages] comes as great news for all sides and represents a reasonable solution to an infrastructure hurdle that has needlessly wasted untold thousand of hours of commuter time over the years.

To review, the project first came into being at around the time the Chalermprakiat School

was built at Saphan Hin over a decade ago. So sure were planners at the time that approval would be given to complete a 600meter stretch of road connecting Saphan Hin to Sakdidet Road that the school's main entrance was built fronting the mangrove forest. Then, like the scene out of Sleeping Beauty, something strange happened and everything came to a mysterious halt.

Long viewed only as a convenient source of material for charcoal production, Thailand's dwindling mangrove forest reserves finally gained the legal protection they deserved through a 2003 Ministry of Natural Resources and Environment regulation that mandated a blanket ban on any and all public projects on mangrove reserves.

The landmark statute was no doubt inspired by Royal Patronage projects that raised public awareness of mangroves. Mangroves are important ecosystems in their own right and also play a key role in incubating marine species that live offshore. Among their other important roles, mangroves are a first line of defense against sea erosion and - as tragically revealed in 2004 - tsunami inundations.

Despite MNRE protection, a combination of rising property prices and corrupt (or indifferent) officials led to continued attacks by encroachers.

Such developments have left vast swathes of former Phuket mangrove reserves little more than muddy plains covered with tin shanties, resorts, fish farms and floating restaurants in recent years.

Yet despite this widespread destruction, several rai of degraded mangrove land needed for this crucial development project remained as if frozen in time.

Enter former Phuket Governor Wichai Phraisa-ngop, who made road building his prime gubernatorial priority during his brief stay in office.

Although the Gazette disagreed with his initial plan to cut a low-budget road straight through the low-lying area, it was no doubt tMr Wichai's raising of the issue at the highest levels of government that led the MNRE to clear the way for the exception that should now end with a "mangrove overpass road" across Klong Koh Phee.

That's the good news.

The bad news is that we must now all hope that the ability to grant such exceptions does not end with Cabinet joining their local counterparts in failing to provide our remaining mangroves the protection they deserve.

Tackling tuk-tuk and parking issues

LETTER FROM THE GOVERNOR

SINCE I learned that I would be serving as Phuket governor, the first goal I set in mind was to fix the problems with parking in Patong – especially along Thaweewong Road [beach road] - and overcharging by tuk-tuks and taxis.

I made these issues my top priorities because they have been happening for ages and nobody has fixed them. They have been brought up at every quarterly honorary consuls meeting.

I have heard many complaints from tourists saying it is hard to find parking spaces in Patong because they are all filled with service vehicles such as tuk-tuks, taxis, rental cars and rental motorbikes – and if you are lucky enough to find a space, your car may get scratched or damaged.

Actually, this happens not only in Patong, but everywhere. I started managing parking only along Thaweewong Road first because if I do so everywhere all at once, those who are disadvantaged may rise up and protest we must go step-by-step.

On the beach road now, rental vehicles are allowed 24 per cent of the parking bays and the remaining 76 per cent is for tourists. This new parking management began on December 30 as a New Year gift for everyone.

The next issue, which I am now working on, is tuk-tuks and taxis

overcharging fares. Many people question why the fares are so expensive and tourists are not charged standard fares, despite Phuket being a world-class tour-

ist destination. I set up a provincial committee to work on these problems, and as with the parking, we will start in Patong and extend to other areas of Phuket later.

The committee members agreed to set standard fares among members of the Patong Taxi Federation which comprises about 85 per cent of service vehicles in Patong.

For example, there could be a maximum fare of 200 baht for every kind of service vehicle - not only tuk-tuks – to travel within Patong, allowing passengers and drivers to negotiate rates for shorter journeys.

The standard fares will be in place mid-February.

Some may ask why we don't install meters in every tuk-tuk and taxi. The reason is that the law requires only vehicles registered

as meter taxis to install meters - it does not affect other taxis and rental cars.

tuk owners, for example, would have to agree to change their registration to be a meter taxi and they would have to buy new vehicles, because the regulations require that only sedans less than two years old and no more than 20,000 kilometers on them can have meters installed. After that, the meter can be used for nine years.

That is why no one wants to change their registration to be a metered taxi. What we have done is registered illegal "black plate" sedan taxis so that they are now "green plate" commercial passenger taxis.

The next target is to have all black plate taxis registered as metered taxis, but this process should proceed gradually. We cannot force them quickly, as it may lead to protest. Right now we are considering how to find the ideal solution for this change.

If the land were our responsibility, we would definitely fix the problems.




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Scrambling to avoid risking your nest egg

Retirement Years

A PENSION scheme is technically a specific type of retirement fund, but topping up your nest egg can come from many sources, with many risks in tow.

This includes bank deposits, real pension schemes and even rental properties, among other things.

Certain asset classes are appropriate for providing for an "income for life". Others are unsuitable because they either carry the risk of being lost in one swoop, or they are volatile and may take too long to recover to provide for the retiree's lifestyle requirements.

Obviously, no one wants to

lose their life savings or the income they need to get by. Private eq-

uity investments, investments into a new venture of any type (which usually have about a 90 per cent failure rate), non-diversified stock or corporate bond investments are all not suitable for retirees for this reason.

Holding all of one's funds in a single bank account – unless backed by a government guarantee – is also a big no-no, even though the odds of this leading to ruin are much smaller than the previous examples.

The second type of investments to be avoided are those that are likely to sustain a large drawdown at some point, such as stock market investments, or in today's low interest rate environment even bond portfolios.

Now that interest rates are returning to historical values, the principal on a portfolio of bonds stands to drop significantly.

This could cause a serious decline in one's standard of living. Most investors do not need to be reminded of the volatility of the stock markets.

We have had two crashes already this decade, with declines as high as 40 per cent in some of the major developed world indexes, though they are now recovering.

The main thing to consider when determining whether an asset class is too risky is historical recovery times.

If a portfolio has historically always recovered from a 10 per cent or 20 per cent drawdown within a year or two, and you aren't drawing out a huge percentage of the funds every year (or do not need the funds for a few years), then you can feel a bit more secure that your future

lifestyle will most likely not be hampered by the inevitable poor ompany any in-

periods that accompany any investment.

For example, even if your pension is in a few apartments that do not have a written track record the way a fund does, you can probably speak to a few long-time owners of some of the units to determine how often they realistically have been unoccupied.

Another option of course is to mark down the rent, as even 50 per cent of your annual rent yield is better than 0 per cent if there happens to be an serious oversupply temporarily.

If you are currently already drawing funds, set aside a decent chunk in a bank deposit.

Even though you are not paying much in returns right now, you will be guaranteed that the money is there for you to spend while the rest of the pot can recover from any spells of bad performance.

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South sees 200% investment increase

INVESTMENT in seven southern provinces increased by a whopping 200 per cent based on yearon-year figures for January, the Thailand Board of Investment (BOI) Region 6 reports.

The region's largest investment in January was the 350room Fisherman Harbour resort project in Phuket, currently under construction. The investment budget for the project was placed at 1.684 billion baht, according to the BOI. The project created 109 new jobs for Thais in Phuket.

In 2009, investments in Phuket that received Bank Of Thailand (BOT) support was more than three billion baht, creating a total of 552 new jobs for Thais.

Apart from Phuket, there were also two agricultural projects in Krabi that received BOI support in January 2011, with a total investment budget of 446 million baht.

Four investment projects in the region received support from BOT, with a total investment budget of over two billion baht.

Mr Suwit Chuavichien, head of the Thailand BOI Region 6, said that one of the main factors driving investment in the region was high yields from the agricultural sectors, thanks to rising prices of agricultural products. This has led to increasing investment in the agricultural sector.

At the same time, substantial investments in tourism and hospitality industries are also driving overall investment in the region, she said.

Investment projects that receive support from the BOI are entitled to tax-based incentives, which include exemption or reduction of import duties on machinery and raw materials. Companies may also be entitled to corporate income tax exemptions.



ordered a committee to be established to select the entries from Phuket to be entered in the Creative City contest.


The committee will comprise representatives from the Phuket Tourism Association, Phuket Office of the Tourism Authority of Thailand and Phuket Rajabhat University.

The first round of the Creative City contest requires representatives from 30 selected cities to present their ideas in Bangkok to a panel of judges comprising key figures from government agencies and the private sector.

The final round will be held in June, with the 10 finalists privy to marketing, design and investment workshops led by experts in their respective fields.

The 10 finalists will also promote their ideas at an exhibition in Bangkok and have their concepts publicized through governmentsponsored media promotions.



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Life & style Napoleon of the Desert

DAVID Lean's Lawrence of Arabia is one of the greatest films of all time. The director took considerable liberties with the truth but T.E. Lawrence's real exploits of courage and endurance were even greater as a new massive biography reveals.

Hero (Harper Collins, New York, 2010, 762pp) is subtitled "The Life and Legend of Lawrence of Arabia". The author is Michael Korda. At 77, he once was the bad boy of American publishing, editor-in-chief of Simon & Schuster and author of the 1975 screed Power! How to Get it, How to Keep it.

But he proves to be a surprisingly graceful and insightful biographer. And he knows his military science, having written biographies of Ulysses S Grant (subtitled "The Unlikely Hero") and Dwight D Eisenhower (Ike: An American Hero).

Lawrence was a very odd duck. He didn't drink or smoke or eat meat except in an emergency. He hated being touched and died a virgin.

Korda constantly compares him to Napoleon Bonaparte, though this is a stretch as Lawrence's military career lasted only two years and he commanded an army that was a tiny

fraction of Napoleon's.


Nonetheless, he led his Arab tribesmen in their only pitched battle with Turkish regular troops and defeated them resoundingly with his far-sighted tactics.

Like Napoleon, he was also small: 165cm tall, weighing on average 49 kilograms though by the end of his war he was down to 40kg from punishing camel treks and sleepless nights.

He had been training himself for his desert ordeals since childhood, testing how long he could endure without food, water or sleep.

He came from an odd family. His Anglo-Irish father came from landed gentry who gave up his vast estate in Ireland to run away to England with his daughters' Scottish nanny. They lived under an assumed name and raised four sons.

Lawrence's mental skills were forged at Oxford University, where he earned a brilliant "first".



Archeological digs in Syria gave him his Arabic skills and easy leadership of men.

He was many things to many people. An earlier biographer noted: "Lawrence seems to me to be like an oyster which has, through pain and suffering, all through life developed into a pearl which the world is trying to evaluate, taking it to pieces layer by layer, without realizing the true value of the whole."

He became the first media star of World War I thanks to Lowell Thomas, the American journalist whose traveling show - movies, slides, lectures, dancing girls was the Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show of its day.

He fled fame but only after writing a literary masterpiece of a memoir The Seven Pillars of Wisdom and developing deep friendships with Bernard Shaw and Winston Churchill. He then slipped into anonymity, enlisting in the Royal Air Force under an assumed name.

His life was ultimately a tragedy for though he led the Arabs into Damascus to claim an independent Arab nation after the expulsion of the Ottoman Turks, the British and the French split the Levant between them at the Treaty of Versailles.

As Lawrence ruefully observed in The Seven Pillars of Wisdom: "We lived many lives in those whirling campaigns, never sparing ourselves yet when we achieved and the new world dawned, the old men came out again and took our victory to remake in the likeness of the former world they know".

By the cruelest of ironies, Lawrence had long been aware of the imperialist plans of the British and French and yet he still encouraged the Arabs to rise up against the Turks for their freedom.

Thai film in the running for Asian Film Award

ELATION gripped the Thai film industry last week as news filtered through that one of this country's most promising directors has been nominated for a gong at the 5th Asian Film Awards (AFA).

Apichatpong Weerasethakul's Uncle Boonmee Who Can Recall His Past Lives is in the running with six others for the Best Film Award at the AFA, penciled in for March this year in Hong Kong.

The film, which scooped the top Palme d'Or prize at the Cannes Film Festival last year, will have to fend off stiff competition from other box office heavy hitters from the past year.

Batting out of the Chinese corner, will be two of that country's largest grossing movies in cinematic history: Let the Bullets Fly and Aftershock. Both films reportedly raked in more than 600 million yuan (nearly three billion baht) at the Chinese box office. Rounding off the Best Film shortlist are: Confessions (Japan), Peepli Live (India) and Poetry (South Korea). The first AFA was held five years ago and it has grown in stature since.

Fancy a dip? If you order food at the restaurant you can work it off in the swimming pool (0 baht) and make use of the sun loungers (0 baht). Refreshingly different from most other island eateries. Friend factor: You'll never feel lonesome here, staff – kitchen, bar and resort – smile so much it must hurt, mind you, when you work at a resort on the beach as stun-

ning as this, there isn't much to be down about.

Starr status: American Starr (with double "rr") Farish acquired the resort nine years ago after he came here to retire, but found himself twiddling his fingers with boredom and in need of a hobby. Since then there's been a dramatic turnaround

at Friendship with better facilities and a detox center added to the resort. "The hobby gets more interesting each year... looking to the future, we're going toward a more healthy vegetarian menu, expanding the detox center and improving the entrance," says Starr.

Chef Charlie: Executive Chef Charlie Maurer is a man who knows his trade and how to make and maintain high standards in service and flavorsome food. He

crafted his trade at the Culinary Institute of America in Hyde Park, New York and won the Seattle Barbeque Cook-Off back in 1995 for his Baby Back Ribs (310 baht at Friendship). Topping off his skills, he's also the American Northwest Chili (no beans) making-champ of 1989. His Chili (245 baht) is still of prize-winning caliber at Friendship. Did we mention he works six days - sometimes seven - and serves as a freelance food consultant around the island? Busy man, but the demand is for a reason, he's great at what he does.

Water theater: On blustery days kitesurfers crisscrossing the bay yards away from where you eat will keep you entertained. If the tide is out, then expect to see locals collecting clams and crabs below the waterline, couples kayaking or yachts and speedboats zigzagging from Rawai round to Chalong Pier. There's always something to lay your eyes on here, and the view out to Koh Lone, Coral Island and Cape Panwa isn't half bad. In fact, the views are so good, you'll be

camera – so maybe bring it. **Fresh juice:** The juice bar here is chock full of sweet-tasting, lowfat fruit and vegetable shakes and juices: Wheat Grass, Beetroot, Applemint Zinger, Beach Baby (all 120 baht) are worthy mentions. Tex-Mex to Thai to fries: Buried in the menu (more like a book) are Thai, American, French, English, German and Mexican dishes. With so much to choose from, it's a wonder anyone can order at all.

Bring on the music: Belting out classic rock and blues as well as some pop favorites, the house band (Fridays and Sundays) and the resort's Live Music Extravaganza nights lure in locals from far and wide. Keep your ear to the ground for the next music night. Easy access: At the end of Soi Mittrapap. Remembering August 31, 1987 when a Thai Airways flight crashed into the sea off Phuket. Lest we forget ...

PHUKET International Airport (PIA) is in the heady days of a sustained tourism boom. Already the secondbusiest airport in the country, PIA today is the midst of a huge expansion to allow it to annually accommodate 12 million passengers passing through its doors, with construction scheduled for completion by the end of next year.

Minor air incidents involving the airport are often punctuated by excited reports in the media with quotes from nervous passengers and the mandatory term "emergency landing".

Major air disasters are rare in the airport's history, but they have happened.

Nearly everyone remembers the crash of One-Two-Go flight OG269 on a wet and blustery Sunday afternoon, September 16, 2007. The crash claimed the lives of 90 people, including 45 foreign tourists.

But fewer can recall the day back in 1987 when a THAI Airways flight crashed into the sea just eight miles off Phuket, killing all on board.

The disaster sparked a nationwide campaign by the government to improve air safety throughout the country.

On that Monday morning, August 31, 1987, Thai Airways flight 365 was flying to Phuket from Haad Yai. The passenger aircraft,

a Boeing 737-2P5, was carrying 83 passengers and crew - 37 of them were foreigners.

About 3:30pm, the aircraft approached Phuket airport from the east and prepared for landing. According to reports from the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO), flight 365 descended to 3,000 feet and was 13 miles from Phuket.

Ahead of it was Dragonair flight 203, an international flight arriving from Hong Kong also preparing for landing. The Dragonair Boeing 737 was a mile ahead of the Thai aircraft and closer to PIA, but not by much. The proximity to the runway and the fact that it had already descended to 2,500 feet meant the Hong Kong carrier was given priority for landing.

The ICAO report on the incident stated that the Thai crew hurriedly reported a false position to PIA air traffic control, claiming they were in fact eight miles away from landing, ahead of Dragonair 203.

Back then the airport was not equipped with radar, so Air Traffic Control (ATC) had to use the pilot's reported positions to regulate traffic, and thus gave the Thai aircraft landing priority at 3:35pm.

From the falsely reported position, the Dragonair crew soon came to realize that both planes were in a precarious position. Flight 365 was ahead and would be allowed to land first, but it was flying at 3,000 feet. Dragonair was reportedly further away, but flying at 2,500 feet.

To be able to land, the Thai aircraft would have to slow down

and, upon descending, cross into the Dragonair flight path, risking mid-air collision.

The Dragonair pilots protested with the ATC over radio, saying that THAI 365 could not be given land-

ing priority. The ICAO report stated that the conflicting information may have confused the Thai crew,

who had already reduced speed to 163 knots and lowered the Boeing's landing gear.

By the time the Thai pilots realized they had to abort their approach to avoid collision, the aircraft was already sending them warning signs that the airspeed was dwindling dangerously. The Thai crew retracted the

aircraft began to stall badly. There was little that the crew could do. Seconds later, Thai Airways

365 fell from the

Dragonair 203 made its landing safely and reported the crash to Phuket ATC. The airline's officials later released a statement in Hong Kong, which assured that the Dragonair aircraft had nothing to do with the crash, The New York Times reported at the time.

The New York Times also reported that foreign passengers on the doomed Thai aircraft included Malaysians, Americans, Japanese and several Europeans.

Prayoon Thavisang, manager of PIA at the time, said after the crash that the Thai aircraft had followed a landing procedure that had never caused any problems in the past.

Shortly after, the Thai government mandated that all major airports across Thailand must be equipped with radar to prevent similar accidents from happening again.

"The Thai stock market has huge underlying strength. I never follow the herds when it comes to investment. Now is the time to buy."



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Saving heritage

Old Phuket Foundation President Kawee Tansukatanon speaks candidly about preserving the island's traditions, community values and unique heritage

SMARTLY dressed and upbeat, Kawee Tansukatanon, exhales and furls his lips in a smile as he recalls his childhood growing up in Phuket in the 1960s.

He remembers roaming the mottled streets of Old Phuket Town with his friends, being surrounded by family members, and a strong sense of community ties and traditions. These were instilled in him from an early age, although now at the age of 49 he admits they weren't such a high priority for him in those early years.

But with age has come wisdom and a change in values, and today, as President of the Old Phuket Foundation, Mr Kawee's priorities have shifted. Preserving local traditions and restoring faith in the customs of bygone eras are not only his personal goals, but a job requirement.


Having taken up the role seven months ago after a 16-year stint working as a Phuket City Municipality officer, Mr Kawee finds effectively promoting his traditionalist message demands a high level of commitment, research and outreach work within the local community.

A major boon for heritage preservation may soon be on the cards for Phuket following the announcement last month that the Senate Committee had asked the Culture Ministry to secure a coveted United Nations heritage listing for buildings in Old Phuket Town.

The help of property owners in the area play a big part in keeping the architectural heritage of the area in town, Mr Kawee said.

"Current property owners in Old Phuket Town have agreed to preserve their Sino-Portuguese houses, as best as they possible can, to the way they were when their grandparents lived in them," he said.

"The community has really started to realize how important the architecture is," he added. That some of the dwellings have been turned into guesthouses is a positive development because both foreign and domestic tourists love to stay in the area, he added. Although his grandparents migrated from Fujian, China in the early 20th century, he thinks of himself as a local through and through and points to future generations as the next stewards of history.

"If Phuket's tradition disappears, the younger generation may not know who their ancestors were or where they came from. It is about history and educating the young," he said.

"If we keep pushing our message through cultural events, we have a chance of preserving our heritage for future generations – but we need help, from everyone.

Life & style Words of wisdom shared in Phuket

Anthropologist, author and Buddhist Joan Halifax Roshi shares her insight "learning" from being by the side of those who are dying. on cultivating compassion

FRESH off the plane from attending the World Economic Forum (WEF) in Switzerland, where she mingled with the likes of Bill Clinton and Bill Gates, Joan Halifax Roshi arrived in Phuket last week for some downtime – and to share the wisdom that has made her the spiritual leader she is today.

Reality is boundless, vow to perceive it" was the principal message she delivered to her attentive audience during her talk at Phuket International Academy's (PIA) Mind Center last week.

By this she means not being afraid to experience all aspects of life – including death, inadequacy and suffering.

She related this articulately to her audience, drawing parallels with everything from world politics to individual's personal lives. At just four years old Joan lost

her sight and was partially paralyzed for two years from a viral infection. This was when she discovered she had an "interior life" and decided to spread the word.

"Bad circumstances can produce good results, it can make you stronger, whilst comfortable circumstances can make you into a complete sloth," said Joan, who originally comes from the southern United States.

This attitude has fueled her remarkable life, and seen her work closely with the Dalai Lama, the terminally ill and prisoners on death row.

She has authored numerous popular books, and her wisdom is recognized by the likes of the Tony Blair Foundation, where she serves as an advisor and The Library of Congress, where she's a scholar.

Her most recent book, Being with Dying: Cultivating Fearlessness and Compassion in the Presence of

Death, documents 40 years of "learning" from being by the bed-

"Serving dying people is an extraordinary privilege, one fraught with difficulties but also intense inspiration," Joan says.

She also spoke about several issues addressed at the WEF, including religious fundamentalism, poverty and disease in countries such as Haiti, highlighting the importance for people not to avoid these issues.

This is why, she said, "We must internally stop in our busy lives and train our mind not to ignore sentiments of suffering, death and conflict that characterize our world."

At the talk at PIA Joan asked the audience to sit perfectly still, close their eyes and concentrate on trying to feel the rage of the protesters in Egypt, the silent agony of an abused child, the defeated regret of a prisoner on death row, and the sadness of someone who is dying.

All of this, she explained, had to be done with an open, recep-

tive and non-judgmental mind in order to feel pure empathy and avoid slipping into the cynicism, hatred and delusion that is the "default position of people today".

Joan's next stop is Burma, but her unpretentious and poignant message will undoubtedly stay with those who were in the Phuket audience that night.







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February 12 - 18, 2011 Life & style Has Phromthep Cape been ruined?

Following criticism in the British media over the state of Phromthep Cape, The Gazette finds out how islanders feel about the identity of this southern tourist hot spot.

BRITISH TV personality Phillip Schofield revealed in a recent *Daily Telegraph* interview that he thinks Phuket – in particular Phromthep Cape – has been ruined by tourism.

Recounting a recent trip to Phromthep Cape with his wife, Schofield told the newspaper he was shocked by how much the place has changed for the worse since he visited in his youth.


Schofield said he remembered the Cape was once a magical place where local families would bring food and everyone was invited to share, but now "nasty shacks selling awful food" and the "worst kind of commercialism" had destroyed the popular sunset viewing point.

In recent years Phuket has experienced substantial development as its reputation as a tourist destination has skyrocketed.

Phromthep Cape, or Laem *Phrom Thep* in Thai (which can be roughly translated as "cape of the pure gods") is located on

south-



ernmost tip and remains one of the island's top tourist attractions.

On weekends the Cape draws big crowds that visit to appreciate the area's stunning natural beauty.

There is also a shrine, a light-

house and a museum to enjoy, as well as the food stalls and souvenir shops Schofield refers to in the interview.

Responding to Schofield's comments.

Director of the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) Phuket office, Bangornrat Shinaprayoon, said, "People don't have the same tastes. Mr Schofield probably prefers local lifestyles. Times have changed and everything has changed with it.

"He can choose other spots in Phuket to go to, such as Nai Yang Beach which is still full with local

"I really would love for it to go back to being what it used to be, but that seems impossible.

"If my house were not in Phuket, I would not live here." she added.

Nicklas Nilsson, a 42-year-old Swedish expat, agreed.

"Phromthep Cape is not like it was eight years ago. At that time there were not so many businesses and only small food stalls," he said.

He went on to say the pace of the development will eventually hurt tourism, as Phuket will no longer have a local influence, which will put tourists off visiting.

Mrs Bangornrat said there are some positives to take from these comments. Better organization in terms of appearance at many of the island's tourist attractions was one issue Mrs Bangornrat highlighted as needing addressed immediately.

"We want tourists to be impressed, not put off, when they visit Phromthep Cape," she added.







Focusing on Andaman infastructure

INCREASING sea transport and construction of a rail line connecting Phuket and Surat Thani province were two ideas put forward to improve trade and tourist links in the Andaman region, a meeting at Community Hall heard earlier this month.


Delegates from The National Economic and Social Advisory Council (NESAC) heard suggestions from Phuket officials on possible projects to improve transport links between Phuket and neighboring provinces.

Director of Planning and Budgeting of Phuket Provincial Administration Organization, Mr Satean Kaewpraprab, put forward the idea of a rail link between Kiriratnikom in Surat Thani province and Ban Thanoon district, located just over Sarasin Bridge in the Phang Nga side.

"There should be a railway from Kiriratnikom to Ban Thanoon. The State Railway of Thailand constructed a rail line to Kiriratnikom, but did not connect Phuket.

"If the government makes an investment on this I think it will be worth it, because the railway can be used to transport goods between east and west in the South," said Mr Satean.

"Once the train stops at Ban Thanoon the goods can be eas-

"We still use trucks and trailers to transport goods, which keeps costs high and uses a lot of energy. We should use technology to fix this rather than construct more roads," he added.

Another idea put forward to save energy and decrease vehicle numbers on Phuket's roads is to increase sea travel options connecting tourist destinations across the Andaman coast.

The introduction of more sea travel received a favorable reaction from members of the NESAC, in particular the use of a hydrofoil boat network linking

tourist hot spots around the Andaman. "The committee studies both

land and water transportation, and after listening to the ideas put forward, I think sea transportation is very important and closely related to tourism and the economy," said Mr Suphot Pruksananont, a

NESAC committee member. "We will discuss how we can proceed with all the suggestions put forward.

"It's important to connect provinces in the South, and I think it has been beneficial to come to Phuket to listen to ideas," he added.

Previously a Vietnam vehicle for the integrated destination resort Laguna Hue project was funded via a Banyan Tree Indochina Hospitality Fund, which raised a reported US\$283 million.



Laguna rebrands Sheraton

OPERATIONS of the Sheraton Grande Laguna Phuket, one of the island's longest-established luxury hotels, will transfer on June 30, from Starwood Hotels & Resorts Worldwide Inc to Angsana Hotels & Resorts, a division of Singapore-based Banyan Tree Hotels & Resorts.

The 419-room hotel, part of the Laguna Phuket destination resort in Bang Tao, will be closed from July 1 for extensive renovation work. The refurbishment is expected to reach 500 million baht and the resort will reopen as the Angsana Laguna Phuket on December 1 this year.

The resort has been operating under the Sheraton and Luxury Collection brands of Starwood Hotels & Resorts since 1992, in an operations agreement between Starwood and hotel owner Laguna Resorts & Hotels.

Upon approaching the management contract renewal date, the owner and operator mutually agreed to end their operations agreement, after discussion and re-evaluation of their strategies for the future.

Raimon Land ease on price

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The low-down on living the high life

IF YOU'RE a foreigner and want to purchase a condominium unit in Thailand you may appreciate that it is actually a straightforward process, and has thus enjoyed continuing popularity both as a promising investment or a private residence.

There are, however, a few things to consider when buying a condo unit to ensure smooth registration of title transfer.

Foreign buyers typically want to verify whether or not purchase of the condo unit would be in excess of the foreign freehold quota.

The foreign ownership ratio in condo projects is usually limited to a maximum of 49 per cent of the sellable area within the project, thereby restricting foreign buyers to jointly acquire majority interest in the common properties, particularly the project land, together with their rights to the individual condo units.

Therefore, a foreign buyer would be well advised to find out if purchase of the condo unit would be in compliance with the foreign freehold quota requirement before entering into any form of binding agreement, or putting down a nonrefundable deposit.

Such investigation can be done by contacting the condo's juristic

person and clarifying the status of the foreign freehold quota.

Foreign buyers may also appreciate that despite the fact that purchasing a condo unit is usually relatively simple, acquisition of registered ownership to a unit demands compliance with "personal" requirements.

"Qualifying" as a foreign buyer of a condo unit is usually achieved by remitting a minimum amount foreign currency from abroad into a Thai baht bank account in Thailand which is equivalent to the price of the unit.

When these funds arrive in the account, the account holder is required to collect proper documentation to prove the remittance and subsequent conversion of the currency into Thai baht.

The documents should detail whether the amount is equal to the price of the condo unit, the conversion of foreign currency into Thai baht (automatic upon transferral), the condo purchase as purpose of the fund remittance, and the name of the buyer as the person who remitted the funds.

The documentation which is usually required by the land department to apply for or register the transfer of condo unit ownership to a foreigner is a Foreign Exchange Transaction Form (FET) and includes all the above details regarding remittance.

The FET is issued by the Thai


It's important to understand that Thai banks can only issue a FET with all the relevant details if the foreign buyer provided his or her bank abroad with the proper information when initiating the transfer.

Otherwise, the receiving bank

in Thailand will be unable to

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Don't be awkward, get with the orchids

Last but by no means least on our Top 20 Phuket Plants list is a bloomer with ravishing good looks

SO, SOME 20 weeks on, we reach the conclusion of our Top 20 Phuket Plants list. And boy do we finish with a bang, sprouting the virtues of one of the most exotic and most-loved plants on the on the planet: the orchid.

It came close to not making the list at all. Obviously not on account of its ravishing looks, but because most tropical varieties subsist on tree trunks or rock crevices, which means they are epiphytic rather than terrestrial, possess aerial roots, and do not actually grow in conventional garden soil.

But in the end, it seemed churlish to exclude a won-

derful flower on such grounds, and so the family of *Orchidaceae* gets its chance after all. And a huge family it is too.

And what a family it is, in the region of 25,000 strong, and constantly being added to as more and more hybrids are produced to satisfy the global demand. Phuket has its share of orchid specialists developing these new cultivars.

Interestingly, many island gardens include rows of orchids suspended from roof trellis or trees, often in a spectrum of colors granted to few other flowering plant.

If you acquire an orchid without blooms, it may take a long time to produce flowers. However, once it does, it will brighten your garden for an eternity. Orchids can be notoriously difficult to categorize. Some are monopodial (single-stemmed), others are sympodial (with a number of shoots).

One of the simplest divisions is between shade-lovers and sunlovers. Sun worshipers tend to have broad, leathery leaves, which resist evaporation better, while shade-hogger has thin foliage.

Of the latter, the Moth Orchid, or *Phalaenopsis*, is perhaps the most popular. It is a large orchid, with a thick central stem and wiry flowering stems which can carry up to 20 large

Gardening blooms. From a distance, the

> flowers seem to float independently. P. Amabilis has white flowers flushed with yellow, while other cultivars have white, rose or pink flowers. The plant must be kept moist at all times.

> Slipper Orchids, or *Paphiopedilum*, need protection from the sun and from heavy rain. Indeed, they do better in cooler conditions. This is why they are generally grown in cool-climate greenhouses and are known to many Europeans as exotic house plants.

They possess mottled, leathery leaves, and dramatically spotted petals. The modified petal often resembles a delicate slipper. Hence its popular name, "Lady's Slipper".

On the other hand, Vanda, Oncidium and Cattleya orchids require plenty of sun. Vanda is the orchid you are most likely to see on sale in plastic cartons at Phuket international Airport.

In common with most orchid varieties, it lasts well as a cut flower, while in the wild, it has blue-mauve flowers.

Often crossed with other orchids, the shades of blue survive in many cultivars. Miss Joaquim – a natural hybrid discovered in Singapore – has deep pink outer petals and a center with orange to yellow shade. It is spectacular, and it's little wonder its Singapore's national flower.

Oncidium orchids come from the New World. The flowers are small and have a distinctive fiddleshaped lip, and are usually found in shades of yellow or orange-brown. They are profuse bloomers with as many as one hundred flowers on a single plant.

The Cattleya genus, with its characteristic large petals and tubular lip, is perhaps the best known and most hybridized of all orchids.

It comes in a wide spectrum of colors – from pure white (Queen Sirikit) to deep purple (Lucky Strike). And like most orchids, it prefers to be suspended in a porous container packed with loose coconut fiber, pot shards or charcoal, so that moisture passes rapidly through.

Word of warning, don't let its roots dry out completely and remember to feed the growing plant on a regular basis. With plenty of tender loving care you will be rewarded with a visual display few plants can rival.

Tip of the week

Dealing with pests


MOST plants are trouble free and successfully operate their own immune systems. While some damage is inevitable, plants normally recover, often with the help of natural enemies of pests, such as birds and other insects.

Chemical remedies have been considered in these columns, but prevention is always better than cure. Stressed plants will succumb more easily.

Thus young plants with small root systems should be well watered in dry periods, fed a balanced fertilizer, and treated with a mulch to conserve moisture and suppress weeds.

Practice garden hygiene by removing diseased leaf litter, dig up and burn badly affected plants, and, where possible, choose varieties bred with stronger resistance to disease.

It is better to plant a diversity of plants in a flower bed; a collection consisting of one species is more likely to be overrun by those pathogens to which they are most susceptible.



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
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
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
