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Roadwork begins on Big Buddha hill

Work starts after accident leaves six dead, 14 injured

WORKMEN on Wednesday began recalibrating the notorious 'death bend' on Big Buddha hill, three days after one the island's most lethal road accidents claimed the lives of five people, including two Burmese sisters: Cheet, age 13, and Nanja, just four years old.

Fourteen people were injured in the accident, seven severely.

Eyewitnesses recounted to the *Gazette* the head-on smash, between a pickup carrying about 20 Burmese and a Siam Safari bus carrying tourists up the hill.

Australian tourist Alessia Nuccitelli, 19, told the *Gazette* that morning that she saw the pickup speeding downhill toward the safari bus.

The two vehicles collided, launching the Burmese out of the back of the pickup.

No tourists travelling on the bus were seriously injured, but the impact left the Burmese scattered

among the debris on the road. Many were lacerated by shards of glass.

"It was horrible. I saw at least three people dead. One was just oto: Christian Mouchet
a little baby," said Miss Nuccitelli.

The Australian tourist said the pickup was carrying far too many people.

"The driver was drunk...

People here could smell alcohol on his breath," she added.

The Burmese workers, from the Thanason project at Baan Borrae in Wichit, were returning from paying respects to the giant Buddha image, which was built by Burmese laborers, when the accident happened.

In addition to Cheet and Nanja, a report by the Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation office in Phuket (DDPM-Phuket) named the other deceased as the driver, 41-year-old Thongdaeng Piwjun, and three other Burmese passengers: Mr Bee, 25; Mrs Nor, 25; Miss Yen, 25.

The report identified brake failure and overloading as the causes of the crash, which occurred about 11am.

A truck carrying felled rubber trees ran off the road on the same bend the next day.

The driver of that truck reportedly escaped with only light

Seven dead on Phuket roads over Songkran

THE accident on Big Buddha hill brought Phuket's road toll during the "Seven Days Of Danger" roadsafety campaign to seven dead and 52 seriously injured.

Last year, two people died over the same period.

However, the 43 accidents reported this year marked a 28.3% fall year-on-year and the number of people requiring hospital treatment from road accidents was down by 18.6%.

Police inspected 60,000 cars at checkpoints, with 4,207 people charged or fined.

The most common infraction was unlicensed driving, with 2,597 failing to produce a license. Forty-five people were arrested for drunk driving.

The most dangerous day was April 13, when Songkran water play was at its height. There were 11 accidents reported on the day but, remarkably, no deaths.

Task force targets taxi, tuk-tuk blockades

A TASK force of top provincial officials expects a long-term solution to local taxi drivers repeatedly blockading the Phuket Deep Sea Port to be in place by mid-May.

A meeting headed by Phuket Vice Governor Weerawat Janpen on Wednesday marked the first gathering of representatives from 17 government agencies and private sector groups which are to establish a formal committee to deal with tuk-tuk and taxi issues that are harming Phuket's reputation among tourists.

Thai Hotels Association special adviser

Methee Tanmanatragul told the meeting at Provincial Hall that two transport-related issues were tarnishing the island's tourism industry: the blockading of the Deep Sea Port by Ao Makham taxi drivers and the physical assault of tourists.

"From now on there can be no more blockades at the Deep Sea Port. Right now the reputation of Phuket is absolutely ruined, as we can see from various websites," Mr Methee said.

Phuket Tourist Association Vice President Bhuritt Maswongsa said, "At the beginning of March, 120 people from tour agencies held a meeting at the Grand Centara

[hotel] in Karon. A representative from Travel Spirit, one of the five biggest Australian tour companies, was hit on the head by a taxi driver at the hotel entrance. He [the driver] did not know the man's company brings about 450,000 tourists to Phuket each year."

News of the assault has been sent to Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva, and Phuket Governor Tri Augkaradacha has expressed concern about it, he said.

Mr Bhuritt said an internet search of "Phuket" and "taxi" leads to at least 40 websites with negative remarks about Phuket.

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Warehouse gutted in Phuket Town blaze

A WAREHOUSE blaze took firefighters over 30 minutes to extinguish early on April 11.

Phuket City Police at 2:30am received a report of a fire a few doors down from the Lotus Express shop on Wirat Hongyok Road.

By the time Phuket City and Wichit Municipality firefighters arrived, there was little they could do to save the warehouse, which had been filled with stored documents and other flammable materials.

Thanathip Kienphomart, owner of the Srisorndaeng Restaurant, said staff closed the restaurant at 2am and were preparing to leave for home when they noticed smoke coming from the warehouse, located behind the restaurant.

The restaurateur rents the land from event-organizing firm BIC Phuket, owner of the warehouse.

Restaurant staff tried to put out the blaze with fire extinguishers and managed to pull some computer equipment from the structure before it was engulfed by flames.

Phuket City Police duty officer Ekkasit Pinkaew suspected an electrical short started the fire.

That would need to be confirmed by officers from the Forensics Police office in Phuket Town, he said.

Tanet Kianpoteeramatr of BIC Phuket told the Gazette, "I still don't know where the fire started because I was not there at that time. Police are still investigating the cause," he said.

"The items in the storage build-

ing were all used materials. It is where we kept documents and other items related to events that have already taken place.

"The building was insured. The insurance company representative came to photograph the damage," he said.

Mr Tanet said he could not estimate the financial cost of the damage.

"Right now tour groups from Scandinavia have already stopped coming to Phuket, opting instead for Khao Lak in Phang Nga," Mr Methee said.

The situation has deteriorated to the point where Phuket faces losing tourists to rival destinations such as Malaysia and Singapore,

In the short term, local taxis will be given access to 50 per cent of tourists disembarking at the Deep Sea Port, as agreed to in an emergency meeting following the blockade of luxury cruise liner Silver Spirit earlier this month.

To establish a long-term solution a committee will be set up to consider all the issues involved. Possible solutions might include requiring all black plate taxis to legally register and to set up a management system like the one at Phuket Airport.

Mr Methee said the long-term management plan would take a few months to develop.

"But at least it's a start," he said. V/Gov Weerawat asked police to monitor taxi drivers in Karon.

The problem of taxi drivers harming tourists occurs much more frequently in Karon than in Patong or Phuket City, he said.

Hanged man believed 'suicide': Police

FAMILY are accepting as suicide the death of a man found hanged in a dense patch of jungle off Soi Nakok in Chalong on April 15.

Duty officer Chianchai Duangsuwan of Chalong Police arrived at the scene at 10:30am to find the body of 47-year-old Samer Wongmuang hanging from a tree.

Tied around his neck was his pah kao mah, the traditional Thai waistcloth worn by men.

Near the body police found a blue carry bag and a small plastic bag containing clothes, a salary slip, a packet of Mama instant noodles, canned fish and some mechanic's tools.

Police say their questioning of those who knew Mr Samer did not reveal any known disputes or conflicts with people, and there were no bruises on his body or indications of fighting at the scene.

One of the dead man's fellow workers said he spoke to Mr Samer two days earlier as he walked into the same patch of

jungle, Lt Chianchai said.

Mr Samer said he was going to drink alcohol in the undergrowth because it was cool there.

The workmate said this was not unusual as Mr Samer often went into the area to relax on his days off, as it was near where he

The workmate added that Mr Samer recently slept at his workplace instead of returning home each night.

Other fellow workers of Mr Samer concurred that he had personal issues that could not be resolved, said Lt Chianchai.

They all believed he wanted to end his life, the policeman said, adding that Mr Samer's family members agree that suicide was - Yodsak Jarana



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Soldier faces court martial over pub shooting

THE Thai soldier who opened fire in a Phuket pub early on April 14, killing one person and injuring four others, has been handed over to Military Police to face a court martial in Narathiwat.

The news was confirmed by Deputy Commissioner of Region 8 Police Pisan Chuldilok, who arrived in Phuket to personally oversee the handling of the case.

"We will continue our investigation into this as a murder case, but we will look into his claims of acting in self-defense," Maj Gen Pisan said.

Sgt Wisut Duongkaew, 27, will be charged with possession of his Army-issue gun when not on active duty, he added.

Sgt Wisut is stationed at the 1st Infantry Battalion Camp in Joh-Irong District, in his home province of Narathiwat.

Joh-Irong is renowned as one of the hot spots in Thailand's troubled Deep South.

Officers explained to the *Gazette* that the shooting at the Return Pub, across the road from Cherng Talay Witthayakom School, ended an argument between Sgt Wisut and the five people shot.

One of the men with the group of five apparently "accidentally" bumped into the table where Sgt Wisut was sitting with five female friends, all friends of his girlfriend.

The man allegedly slammed his hand down on the table before apologizing and

stumbling back to his own table to rejoin his friends.

As the staff were collecting the bills to close the bar, a war of words broke out between Sgt Wisut and the four men, police said.

One of the men allegedly walked over and smashed a bottle over Sgt Wisut's head, before his three male friends joined the attack, police quoted Sgt Wisut as saying.

That's when Sgt Wisut pulled out his gun and opened fire, police said.

Suthin Suekpamkij was shot in the head and Weeradet Sanohkham, 27, from Surat Thani, was shot several times, one of his wounds in the chest. Kusoldharm Foundation rescue workers rushed all five wounded, including one woman – Sumaporn Tontarn, 25 – to Thalang Hospital.

Mr Suthin and Mr Weeradet were later transferred to Vachira Phuket Hospital in Phuket Town, where Mr Weeradet died.

The two other men, Songwut Decharat, 38, and Aran Jantawong, 24, suffered minor injuries.

Officers at the scene reported that Sgt Wisut did not try to escape.

Instead, he waited for officers to arrive at the pub so he could surrender, police said.

Phuket raises B12.6mn for Japan, South

THE Phuket provincial fund-raising effort for victims of the Japanese earthquake and tsunami and the flooding in the South totaled nearly 13 million baht.

The handover, held at the Royal Phuket City Hotel on April 10, was chaired jointly by Phuket Governor Tri Augkaradacha and Anchalee Vanich Thepabutr, Secretary-General to Thai Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva.

Representing Japan at the gathering was Japanese Embassy minister Takashi Okada.

At 10pm, all present moved to the nearby Queen Sirikit Park to open a concert entitled "Spirits of Phuket to Japan and the South", which was broadcast nationwide on state-run Channel 11.

Yuki Masahiko of Japanese rock band Lucifer performed as special guest, along with Thai performers including Blackhead, Jetsetter, B Peerapat, and others.

After the concert, Gov Tri handed over a total of 5.5mn baht in funding to Minister Okada.

Gov Tri also presented a cheque to MP Tossaporn Thepabutr in the amount of 6.1mn baht.

The funds will be distributed to victims of floods and landslides in other provinces throughout southern Thailand.

The remainder, one million baht, was used to pay expenses incurred in organizing and staging the fundraising drive.

Patong to stage random emergency-response drills

PATONG Hospital will soon start co-ordinating random drills so that emergency response personnel from a variety of different agencies will be better prepared to deal with accidents.

The announcement follows a review of the handling of the tour bus crash on Patong Hill last month in which one man died and many others were injured.

The review was conducted on March 11 at a meeting of the main agencies involved in providing emergency aid, including Kathu Police, Kusoldham Foundation, the Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation divisions at Patong Municipality and Phuket City Municipality, as well as Bangkok Hospital Phuket and Vachira Phuket, Thalang and Patong Hospitals.

Leading the meeting was Dr Wiwat Seetamanotch, Deputy Director of the Phuket Provincial Health Office.

Dr Wiwat Seetamanotch was instrumental in co-ordinating the full-scale tsunami evacuation drill in December, which required co-ordination of no less than six different organizations.

Identifying crowd control as one of the biggest problems at the bus accident scene last month, he called on local police to be first

on hand to help keep onlookers clear so emergency crews can quickly attend to accident victims.

"The situation [in Patong] was different from the bus accident in Malaysia on December 20 last year, where only officials involved in rescuing people could access the accident site," Dr Wiwat said.

"Their officers restricted access to the accident scene, which made co-ordinating the emergency response crews flow very well. It was orderly and well-managed.

"The big difference between the bus crash in Malaysia and the accident in Patong was that in Patong only about five percent of the people at the scene were emergency crews actually responding to the accident," Dr Wiwat said.

Patong Hospital Director Dr Phumin Silapunt agreed.

"The important thing is crowd control. When accidents happen, people like to come and see what is happening," he said.

Dr Phumin confirmed that ran-

dom drills will be conducted to improve co-ordination among emergency-response crews.

"It will be different from the past, when they [emergency crews] were instructed beforehand about what type of emergency they would be dealing with and specifically what to do to best handle the situation," he explained.

"Each team is trained by their own organization, but when a real situation occurs they need to work together with members of many different organizations," he said.

"There should be just one commander to co-ordinate everything. The commander should be the head of the local authority, such as the president of the local *OrBorTor* [subdistrict administration organization], the mayor or district chief," he said.

"If such a person is not able to perform this duty, then it should be someone that person has assigned, someone in a high position of authority," he added.

Dr Phumin confirmed that all relevant organizations will be involved in the random rescue drills.

"But we're not sure when we will start conducting them," he said.

Although the drills will at first be in Patong only, they are likely to be extended to other areas in Phuket in the future, he added.





Tourist pays B180,000 Insurance for repairs to jet-ski

BRITISH tourist Nicola Ross Morton in Phuket to celebrate Songkran on April 13 agreed to pay 180,000 baht for damages to a jet-ski he rented out in Patong.

The settlement came after negotiations with police and the jet-ski owner, and discovering that the controversial jet-ski insurance scheme doesn't cover all repair costs if a jet-ski is badly damaged.

Mr Morton was among three tourists who rented jet-skis from 54-year-old Sucha Petnuan-ong, said Patong Police information officer Somsak Nguanson.

The three paid 1,000 baht each for 30-minute rides, he said.

Mr Morton's jet-ski first collided with another jet-ski, ridden by 31-year-old American Christine Marie Gordon, before crashing into rocks off the coast of Kamala,

Ms Gordon's jet-ski was lightly damaged, but the entire front of Mr Morton's jet-ski was torn apart

by the impact and its engine was almost completely dislodged.

Mr Morton suffered a broken leg in the crash, according to a British woman who was riding with him at the time.

Patong Police described his injuries as "minor", however.

Ms Gordon went to Patong Police Station the following day

to negotiate a settlement for both parties, who assumed the cost of repairs would be covered by the insurance agreement they signed upon renting out the jet-skis.

Patong Police called in a mechanic, who estimated the total cost of repairs for both jet-skis at 320,000 baht – far more than the maximum 50,000 baht in damage coverage specified in the insurance agreement.

"I made a deal for the tourists by negotiating with the jet-ski owner that Mr Morton would pay 180,000 baht. They seemed happy with that," officer Somsak said.

Ms Gordon had to pay an extra 7,000 baht: 3,000 baht for each of the two days the jet-ski would be out of service plus a 1.000 baht deductible charge on the damages.

Jet-ski owner Sucha Petnuanong, 54, said repairing the machine would cost almost as much as buying a new one.

"I will be at an absolute loss as a new jet-ski chassis alone is about 270,000 baht," he said.

NOW in its second year, the insurance scheme set up for the Phuket jet-ski rental industry is in danger of collapse, the head of the Phuket Provincial Insurance Office has admitted.

The scheme, the first of its kind in the world, was launched amid great fanfare in late 2009.

The launch followed many complaints by tourists about systematic extortion by jet-ski operators who made them pay excessive "damage fees" and threatened them if they fail to comply.

So widespread was the scam that news of it took on international dimensions, with the Australian government leading the way in calling for action.

Video footage of jetski operator Winai "JJ" Naiman allegedly threatening British servicemen with an air gun were broadcast in the television series "Big Trouble in Tourist Thailand" that aired in the UK in September 2009.

All the resulting negative publicity led to the creation of what was initially described as a "mandatory" insurance for all 219 registered jet-skis in Phuket.

The first set of 185 insurance policies were effective from November 17, 2009 to November 14, 2010, during which time the "loss ratio" to insurance provider Ayudhya Insurance PCL climbed to just over 80% due to the high number of claims paid out.

"Loss ratio" is defined as the ratio of total losses paid out in claims, plus adjustment expenses, all divided by the total earned premiums.

This means Ayudhya Insurance paid out 80 baht in claims for every 100 baht in premium payments it collected in the first year. This is considered very poor performance, as loss ratios for combined property and casualty insurance packages typically range from 40% to 60%.

Despite the poor performance, Ayudhya Insurance continued to offer the insurance for a second year, beginning on November 17, 2010. But despite the high number of claims paid out in the first year, the number of operators opting to pay the second-year premiums dropped significantly.

Ayudhya Insurance adjuster Jakkarin Noonrod told the Gazette that as of March 22 only 162 jetskis were still covered. Even worse for the company, the loss ratio stood at 23.6% by that date,

> indicating it is on track to grow to near 80% again by the end of the year.

Given drop-off, the Gaasked Bhuripat Therakulpisut, chief of the Ma-Transport Region 5 Office in Phuket Town, if a paid-

up jet-ski insurance policy was actually a required document for operators applying to renew their annual jet-ski registrations.

"It is a required document. Now they cannot renew their registrations at offices in other provinces as they did before because Marine Department Director-General Thawanrat Ornsira already sent a letter to every branch office instructing them not to renew registration for jetskis registered in Phuket.

"This forces them to take out an insurance policy if they want to provide a legal service, but this is not mandated by law. We simply ask for their co-operation in improving our image as a tourist destination.

"And we have limited the num-

ber of jet-skis in Phuket at 219, with no new registrations," he

With only 162 of 219 jet-skis carrying the insurance in the second year, there could be as many as 57 eligible boats operating with neither insurance nor up-to-date registrations.

Mr Jakkarin said most of those

operating without insurance were in the Bang Tao Beach area.

One such operator told the Gazette on the condition of anonymity that lack of enforcement in the area gave illegal jet-skis there an unfair competitive advantage, which was why he chose not to renew his jet-ski registrations in the second year.

The man, who operates four jet-skis, said, "Illegal jet-skis [with no insurance or registration] remained in service. Why should I pay more with no additional income? If I want to take out a second policy, I have to pay 6,000 baht more than the first policy due to my claims history.

"By the way, there is no government officer in charge coming to check whether jet-skis in the area have legal papers," he said.

"If government officers want to set things right, they should turn this measure into an actual law or regulation, or whatever to force jet-ski operators in every province to be insured. Here it seems they only paid interest in the scheme at the outset," he said.

Suwimon Sae-lim, director of the Phuket Provincial Insurance Office, said the lower number of operators taking out policies in the second year, coupled with the high loss-ratio, makes her fear this could be the last year Ayudhya Insurance will offer the policies.

"This jet-ski policy was the first of its kind in the world, but it is still just voluntarily, not required by law.

"Ayudhya Insurance was the only company interested in offering this insurance because they wanted to improve Phuket's image. But last year the loss ratio reached 80%, which means they had to pay out 80% of income on damage claims.

"The remaining 20% isn't all income for the company, but needs to be used to pay the costs of the adjusters in processing the claims.

"If the loss ratio remains very high, the company might be forced discontinue it next year. I can say there is a definite risk of that happening," she said.

Ms Suwimon asked the Gazette to tell readers to rent out only jetskis bearing the second-year sticker (inset, on opposite page) to show they still carry the insur-

This is important not only to keep the scheme going, but also to protect people from scams or in the event they do have an accident while aboard a jet-ski, she

The insurance not only pays out for damages to jet-skis, but also covers medical treatment to injured riders and passengers, as well as to aggrieved third parties. (see table).

"For example, last year two Chinese [honeymooners] died in a crash and insurance company paid out two 50,000-baht claims to their relatives.

"I would like tourists to ride only jet-skis with insurance policies. This is for their own benefit. So please look for the new insurance sticker to make sure the jet-ski is covered by a policy."

"I would like every sector and agency to pay more attention to this. Hotels and tour companies should tell their customers. Jet-ski operators should be more co-operative and authorized government officers should follow up the result.

"If this measure is successful, Pattaya may follow us," she said.

Brit arrested in Patong coke bust

POLICE arrested 43-year-old Briton Paul Hanna for possession of cocaine at his home on Nanai Road in Patong on April 11.

He was arrested at 4:45am with 33 packages of cocaine weighing 0.9 grams each.

The arrest followed a police complaint by a Thai woman claiming to be Mr Hanna's wife.

She told Patong Police he had beaten her and was in possession of "lots of drugs".

When officers arrived at the home it took them some time to wake the suspect because he was quite drunk, Patong Police Inspector Akanit Danpitaksat told

A urine test for drug use proved positive, he said.

Mr Hanna had been under investigation since January, he added.

The cocaine was found in a black garbage bag in a bedroom cabinet, said Lt Col Akanit.

Mr Hanna told Patong Police Superintendent Arayapan Pukbuakao that he was living with his wife and son.

He sourced the drugs from about eight months, he said. Thai men on Soi Sansabai for 2,500 baht per bag and resold them at 3,000 baht each, he said.

He was unable to provide the names of the Thai men he bought the drugs from.

Mr Hanna, who operates a bar on Soi Bangla, said he was just supplying friends and did not sell to customers at the bar.

He had been living in Patong for

A former partner in the bar who returned home four or five months ago introduced him to the trade, he claimed.

Mr Hanna now faces charges of possession of a category 1 drug with intent to sell.

His wife would raise money for his legal fees and find a lawyer to fight his case, he told Col Arayaphan.

Phuket tourist plays 'To Catch a Thief'

GERMAN tourist Damian Skrzypietz didn't start Songkran on April 13 dousing fellow revellers in water fights.

He started his Thai New Year chasing a burglar who had just robbed his rented house in Cherng Talay, tearing down the street after him barefoot and dressed only in his boxer shorts.

"I was sleeping in the bedroom when my girlfriend woke me at about at 5:30am saying someone was inside the house," he told the Gazette.

"I went out of the bedroom to check and found the front door open and the outside light on.

"My girlfriend spotted a man outside. When I looked at him, he looked back at me and then he started running. I ran after him a long way down the soi.

"He threw my black bag at me, but I kept chasing him.

"He then ran into the bushes along the side of the road, but I caught him and dragged him back to my house and told my friend to call the police.

kept wai'ing us and saying sorry, but I told him not to apologize to us," said Mr Skrzypietz.

"Before the police arrived, he

28, in possession of about 35 euros and 2,960 baht in cash, two mobile phones, a lighter, a small flashlight and a set of house keys.

Sen Sgt Maj Suvarin Maudmuang of Cherng Talay Police told the Gazette that Mr Khuanchai had been arrested previously on drug charges and only recently released from serving one year in jail for attempted rape.

Mr Khuanchai, who lives with his family at Surin Beach, apparently confessed to police that he had committed many break-ins in Kamala and Cherng Talay.

Navy sailors lend Krabi a hand

OFFICERS from the Royal Thai Navy Third Area Command in Phuket distributed relief packages to flood and landslide victims in Krabi from April 12 to 17.

Group Captain Parinyatham Pulpitaktham, head of the Disaster Mitigation Center's civilian affairs and public relations department, led the effort to badly hit

locales. Areas that received assistance included Nong Talay, Tab Prik, Klongya, Klonghin, Ao Luek and Plaipaya.

The servicemen also installed toilet facilities for homeless victims taking refuge at a temporary shelter set up near Chong Mai Reservoir in Klonghin subdistrict, Ao Luek.

Suthep vows to target tourist cheats

Deputy Prime Minister Suthep Thaugsuban, who is also responsible for national security, has vowed to save foreign tourists from being cheated during their visits to the country, including, specifically, Phuket.

Deputy PM Suthep said after attending meetings with the Tourist Fraud Prevention Committee that the problem needs to be elimi-

There are many forms of cheating, starting with Thais cheating foreign tourists, foreign tourists teaming up to cheat other foreigners, and Thais and foreigners working together to cheat foreign tourists, he said.

From the year 2007 to 2010, around 6,000 Thais were arrested for cheating tourists, and 517 foreign gangs were arrested, Deputy PM Suthep added.

Meanwhile, Mr Suthep said that the recent mob of taxi drivers in Phuket province, who blockaded the Phuket Deep Sea Port to prevent tourists from using pre-booked tour company vans, was done to express their dissatisfaction over "unfair tour agencies". The taxi and tuk-tuk drivers claimed the tour agencies tend to provide large buses for tourists, leaving taxi drivers with no passengers.

Mr Suthep has also set up four subcommittees to work on eliminating fraud.

He has assigned the Tourism and Sports Permanent Secretary Sombat Kuruphan the responsibility of preventing tourist fraud in Bangkok and at Suvarnabhumi Airport.

At the same time, Interior Permanent Secretary Deputy Pranai Suwannarat will be in charge of towns frequented by tourists, such as Phuket, Pattaya, and Chaing Mai.

Chavalit resigns Pheu Thai chair

THE chairman of the opposition Pheu Thai Party, Gen Chavalit Yongchaiyudh, has resigned just weeks before Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva has proposed to dissolve parliament to pave the way for national elections.

Gen Chavalit, a former Thai prime minister himself, did not give a reason for his resignation as both chairman and member of the party.

It has been speculated that his exit stemmed from his opposition to the party's close association with the red-shirt movement.

TNN Cable TV, which broke the story, quoted a source as saying that Gen Chavalit resigned out of his uneasiness that red-shirt leaders mentioned the Royal Family during their recent rallies.

On Wednesday, red-shirt leader

Kokaew Pikulthong rebuked the claims, saying the general had stepped down because he was disappointed that the party would not endorse him as the prime ministerial candidate.

"The real reason Chavalit is departing the party is because Thaksin [Shinawatra] has made it clear he will endorse an individual close to him and this is a case of a heartbroken old man," he said in an interview posted on Matichon online.

Earlier this month, Army Chief

Gen Prayuth Chan-ocha lodged lese majeste complaints against three red-shirt leaders over remarks they made during a rally in Bangkok on April 10.

One of the three, Pheu Thai MP Jatuporn Prompan, said he would lodge a counter-complaint against Gen Prayuth for libel and lese majeste, denying he had insulted the monarchy.

The Department of Special Investigation has since served summonses on 18 red-shirt leaders to face lese majeste and sedition charges in connection with the April 10 rally speeches.

DSI director general Tharit Pengdit said the 18 suspects would face indictments based on Articles 112 and 116 of the Criminal Code.

Brit trainee teacher dies in holiday waterfall plunge

A BRITISH woman training to teach English in Thailand was killed on April 15 when she slipped on submerged rocks and was swept off a 300-foot water-

Sarah Crutchley, 30, was wading through shallows at Ton Nga Chang falls in Songkhla when she lost her footing and was swept towards the drop. She managed to grab a rock for a few seconds

before she was swept over the cliff by a torrent of water.

Mrs Crutchley, originally from Bournemouth in the UK, was studying TEFL at a school in Haad Yai. She was on a day trip to the beauty spot with four British friends from her course.

Chris Penny, 21, witnessed her death. "Sarah was

just swept off her feet by the water. She grabbed hold of a large rock and hung on for about two or three seconds," he told Britain's Daily Mail.

"I tried to get to her but I also slid and fell and grabbed on to another rock. She was about one or two feet from the edge but didn't say a word.

"I cried out for help and then the current of water was just too strong for her and she lost her grip.

"She slid about 10 meters down the rocks and then fell over the edge. It must have been about a 100-meter drop.

"It was just horrible to watch. I think she was knocked out cold during the first fall and she wouldn't have known anything about it. She didn't stand a - Phuket Gazette / Agencies

Greed, thuggery threats to tourism

ISSUES affecting tourist safety and welfare in Phuket and other popular destinations in Thailand have rightly dominated the news pages in this issue of the Phuket Gazette.

It is difficult to overestimate the importance of tourism to the Thai economy. The Tourism Authority of Thailand recently announced that it plans for a record number of tourists, over 17 million, to visit the Kingdom in 2011. In recent years, about a third of these have included Phuket in their travel plans.

The TAT estimated that Phuket generated 800 million baht in tourism industry revenue over the Songkran holidays alone.

Former Phuket Governor Pongpayome Vasaputi once famously compared the tourism industry to glass, saying it could easily shatter. Yet the Phuket tourism industry continued to grow even after the 2004 tsunami disaster, and despite political turmoil, last year saw a record number of tourist arrivals to Phuket: more than seven million.

But Phuket now faces a serious threat as one fiasco after another stains its international reputation. First are the illegal blockades of the Phuket Deep Sea Port by a collection of self-entitled taxi drivers at Ao Makham who demand - and are thus given – access to passengers disembarking there.

The fact that the majority are unregistered "black plate" taxis seemed to make little difference to the negotiations. Once again, mob rule trumped the rule of law in this land of protestocracy.

The losers, as usual, are tourists and those who

cater to them in honest, hospitable fashion - something sadly lacking in much of the transport sector.

Another very serious issue is physical assault, including allegations of rape, of tourists by tuktuk drivers in Karon. These drivers seem to share a similar mindset to their counterparts in Panwa and have developed a reputation for thuggery that has exceeded even that of their counterparts in Patong.

When tourists are not being beaten or extorted on fares by the transport syndicates, they are taken advantage of in other ways. Many tourist attractions on the island, most notably jewelry shops, pay drivers handsome commissions on sales of lowquality, shamelessly overpriced adornments.

Then there are the infamous jet-ski scams. The laudable effort to introduce "mandatory" insurance to prevent unscrupulous jet-ski operators from demanding extortionate damage claims is now also at serious risk due to lack of compliance and insufficient enforcement [see pages 4-5].

The Gazette fully supports Suwimon Sae-lim, director of the Phuket Provincial Insurance Office, in urging all tourists to use only registered jet-skis, otherwise the plan will fail and the situation will simply revert to the pathetic status quo of the past that has done so much damage to the island's reputation.

Overfishing helping lionfish to coral buffet

First PERSON

MUCH has changed in Phuket, Phang Nga and Krabi over the past 30 years, with tourism evolving from handfuls of backpackers sleeping in shanty bungalows in the 1970s to today's mass tourism with luxurious hotels and resorts of up to hundreds of rooms to cater all tourists from all over

Feeding fresh seafood to these millions of tourists and local fishermen looking to feed their families have led to intensive fishing all along the Andaman coast.

Many local fishing boats were destroyed by the 2004 tsunami and many European countries helped rebuild the fleet and the fishing industry.

The result was the fleet ended up better equipped and more efficient than before. They can now fish deeper waters further out to sea, putting far too much pressure on local fish stocks.

Now that large schools of fish are quickly disappearing, many fishing boats are more frequently coming inside marine national parks to poach at night and during the monsoon period when parks are closed to the public.

Many fishing boats use large fish traps inside the parks, often placing 10 to 20 traps side by side to simulate large reefs.

This intensive fishing around coral reefs has led to overfishing of certain species, including grouper and sharks, which are natural

predators of lionfish. Without the "normal" number of grouper and sharks around to keep the number of lionfish in check, the lionfish are now out-eating the number of juvenile coral reef fish.

Their aggressive behavior and population explosion at some reefs give lionfish the potential to become the most disastrous marine invasion in Thailand. By drastically reducing the number of coral reef fish, they leave behind a devastated ecosystem.

lionfish are voracious and effective predators. They herd and corner their prey using their pectoral fins, then quickly strike and swallow their prey whole.

It was not unusual to observe a lionfish consuming prey up to two-thirds its own length. Experiments have shown that lionfish significantly reduce the net population of coral reef fishes by an estimated 80%.

In studies on controlled plots, scientists at Oregan State University determined that lionfish reduced juvenile fish populations by 79% in only five weeks. One large lionfish was observed consuming 20 small fish in just 30 minutes.

Efforts to reduce densities of lionfish at key locations may help to reduce their ecological impact. Recovering and maintaining healthy populations of potential native predators of lionfish, such as large grouper and sharks, may also help reduce the deleterious effects of these voracious invasive predators.

Steps must be taken to protect grouper, sharks and other lionfish Protected by venomous spines, predators from overfishing.

Can I get insurance for sidecars?

Ten years ago, the Gazette posted an Issue & Answer asking "Are sidecars legal?"

The answer then from Somjit Boonchaoy at the Phuket Provincial Transportation Office was, "Yes, it is. There is no Thai law that allows a motorcycle with a sidecar to be legally registered. This means they cannot be legitimately insured. Therefore, all motorcycles with sidecars are illegal. Motorcycles are the only two-wheel vehicles that may be legally registered and be legitimately insured."

Now Tiger motorcycles have introduced a retro-style motorbike with sidecar. Tiger is a Thai company. These new motorbikes with sidecars are made and sold in Thailand.

Has the law changed? If so, are motorbikes with sidecars now legal on Thai roads?

Titima Yukuntorn, chief of the **Vehicle Registration Unit at the** Phuket Provincial Transport Office, replies:

The Department of Land Transport will not register motorbikes fitted with sidecars or any attachments if the sidecar and/or attachments are not made by the

original manufacturer or do not pass Department of Land Transport safety standards.

We do not allow the registration of rot salaeng (motorcycles with privately-made sidecar trays commonly used for transporting goods or people) because they are not safe for the driver or passengers.

However, if the sidecar conforms to our safety standards and passes an inspection by our engineers – then we will allow it to be registered.

Sirima Koonkit, Insurance officer at the Viriyah Insurance Phuket office, replies:

We used to offer insurance for motorbikes, but we stopped offering policies for any motorcycles last year.

We now refer customers seekng insurance for motorbikes to the Road Accident Victims Protection Co Ltd Phuket office located at Phun Pol Night Plaza in Phuket

Pakpon Thongbaipetch, Insurance officer at the Road Accident Victims Protection Co Ltd Phuket office, replies:

Our company was set up by the government to ensure that all vehicle owners have some form of insurance.

[The company is better known by foreigners as the "government insurance office" using the letters

"RVP" to identify itself – Ed.]

When we insure a motorcycle with a sidecar, we simply insure it as a motorcycle.

As such, motorcycle insurance premiums are calculated according to engine size: Class A) 1cc-70cc, premium is 161 baht per year; Class B) 71cc-125cc, premium is 323 baht per year; Class C) 126cc-150cc, premium is 430 baht per year; and Class D) greater than 151cc, premium is 645 baht per year.

However, before we can insure any motorcycles with sidecars, the applicant must have a certificate from the Land Transport Department verifying the vehicle passes all required vehicle-safety standards.

This usually requires an inspection by engineers at the local Land Transport Department office.

Phuket to click with software alliance

SOFTWARE Park Thailand has virtual office via technology, initiated a collaborative project to bring local software parks throughout the country together as the Thailand Software Park Alliance, in an effort to strengthen the software industry.

The alliance aims to facilitate the flow of software-development resources and work among software parks located both in Bangkok and in regional areas.

It will also encourage a flow of software development and jobs to the Asia-Pacific region through Software Park Thailand's regional network, the Asia Oceania Software Park Alliance.

Software Park Thailand's director Thanachart Numnonda said the objective was to pool local resources and build up the core competency of local software development to serve both local and regional demands.

The concept of the collaboration is focused on four main pillars: technology transfer, business matching and co-branding

In part, the alliance will follow Software Park Thailand's mission, which includes facility management services (office rental, training-and meeting-room rental and park clustering); technology-enabling services (providing technology platforms, collaborating with stakeholders to provide the latest technology to alliance members); IT advisory (improving the standard of local software companies to international level); technology transfer (promoting the transfer of relevant technologies for the software industry on both professional and management levels); and software-business enabling (business matching, promoting the use of IT to all sectors, collaboration within the industry and creating an environment conducive to software business).

The local software parks to be included in the alliance are E-Saan Software Park, Korat Software Park (Thailand), Chiang Mai Technology and Outsourcing Centre and Software Park Phuket.

Thailand's software market is expected to grow by 16.3 per cent this year to reach a value of about 84.23 billion baht.

Within the overall software market, embedded software and mobile applications are expected to see high growth this year, of 96.1 per cent and 54.8 per cent respectively. However, enterprise software will remain the largest contributor, representing 63.5 per cent of the software market.

It is also expected that total spending on software-as-a-service in Thailand this year will be around 2.56 billion baht, representing growth of 22.9 per cent. - The Nation

Gov urges control over hillside construction

GOVERNOR Tri Aukaradecha voiced concerns over construction projects that have been planned on hill slopes on Phuket.

During a meeting with the Phuket Housing Committee on April 8, Governor Tri said that recently there have been many cases of disasters causing substantial property damage and loss of life. He mentioned the recent floods and severe landslides in the south of Thailand, as well as earthquakes that have recently occurred in New Zealand, Burma and Japan.

The governor urged the committee to be more cautious when approving projects that have been planned on hillsides, especially projects that require extensive deforestation. Governor Tri urged the committee to be more careful when issuing building permits for such sites.

"With severe weather becoming more common, landslides can become a major problem causing severe public damage. The Ministry of Interior is also concerned with this problem", Gov Tri said at the meeting.

During the meeting two new housing projects were announced to the committee. One of them was The Heritage project located in Kathu. The Heritage, still in its early stages of construction, will consist of 58 land plots spread across 23 acres of land. Sitharom Properties will also be starting a new project soon.

In January 2011, six housing projects were approved by the Phuket Provincial

Geological experts have questioned whether Phuket buildings are ready to withstand strong earthquakes, a phenomenon that is happening more frequently in the

Amnart Tantitamsopon, a prominent Phuket geologist and a member of the Phuket Environmental Impact Assessment Committee, notes that Phuket lies in an earthquake risk zone. Private constructors should keep that in mind when planning and constructing buildings.

"Buildings that stand 12 meters or higher should be engineered to cope with earthquakes that are stronger than a magnitude 6. Unfortunately there are very few specialists here in Phuket who can advise constructors about building earthquake resistant structures," Mr Amnart said.

"High rise buildings here are often not 'geologically engineered'. Geological-engineering means doing a carefully study of the underlying geological formations to determine the required stability. This often requires advanced scientific techniques like remote sensing. A lot of the buildings here do not go through such a study before construction starts because constructors lack the resources and knowhow", Mr Amnart explained.

"To make buildings earthquake resistant, foundation pillars have to be longer and dig deeper into bedrock. Such procedures ensure more safety against natural disasters, but they also increase the overall construction costs," Mr Amnart said.

'Fortunately many private businesses and constructors agree with us and they are willing to change their plans to make buildings safer. But the main problem is the lack of know-how and experts who can advise constructors about building for earthquake resistance," he added.

Current Thai law, effective since 2007, requires buildings that are more than 23 meters in height to have earthquakeresistant design. However the law only applies to five provinces in Central Thailand.

Capital flows out in greater volume and at a faster pace, and any fund that has used leverage (borrowed money to get a better return during the good times) will be forced to liquidate first.

and return their investors' funds with however much of a loss they incurred.

To be clear, I am not predicting gold funds are going to go bankrupt in the next year. In fact, my personal belief is that there is a good chance gold prices will shoot up to levels I can't even dream of before the

above scenario plays out.

This may happen a lot sooner than some people think, though, this is no problem if you have some sort of a "stop loss" or "trailing stop" to allow you to get out before the panic.

Unfortunately, many people will not have educated themselves enough to understand this, and will believe that gold is "safe" and will end up wondering, "How could this have happened?"

Real estate and money markets are two very relatively safe asset classes where investors in funds have been burned by failing to understand how capital outflows on a massive level can affect the fund they were invested in.

Gold is likely to be another asset class to burn people in large numbers at some point in the

Gold is an exchange-traded commodity, and such commodities' prices are subject to the

pressures of supply and demand, behind which are the decisions of human beings whose emotions swing back and forth on a pendulum from extreme greed to extreme fear, causing booms and

An easy way to avoid problems is to think about what would happen to a fund if suddenly everybody lined up to get their money at once. This is how even banks can get into trouble, because they can't just call in all of their loan portfolio on a day's notice.

Some funds are less susceptible to liquidity issues than others. If a fund manager is trading across many markets (currencies, commodities, stock markets) and not dealing in a significant amount of the overall volume in any of them, then he can get out of his entire portfolio very quickly, without being forced to liquidate at fire-sale prices.

The more concentrated in one

asset class, or especially in a single geographic area, the more likely capital outflows are to cause losses not in line with the risk level typically associated with the underlying assets.


The real reason any market moves up or down is the collective action of all the market participants. The reasons for their actions do not need to be grounded in any logic, and human's natural herd instinct often causes markets to do things that seem to completely defy logic.

Understanding this is the starting point to understanding how markets really work and protecting oneself from the consequences of this herd mentality.

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

What's all this 3G mumbo jumbo?

I DO NOT like – and try very hard not to use – the term "3G". The scientific-sounding "3G" rates as a marketer's dream come true. It reeks of sizzle and bling.

And, the way it's being tossed about, it means absolutely nothing.

You would presume that 3G is better than 2G and not as good as 4G, yes? It ain't so. It's not true in Thailand, and it's not true in the rest of the world, either.

The photo in Live Wire last week showed a CAT CDMA dongle – a USB "modem" that you plug into a computer that lets you connect to CAT's CDMA/EV-DO signals.

The dongle is emblazoned "3G".

Only one teensy-tiny problem. CDMA isn't 3G. At least, not according to the definition that's widely accepted in the fragmented and inscrutable communications industry.

Look at the graph on this page, and you'll get an idea of the speeds you should expect from a 3G connection.

Some people say there's no 3G in Thailand. That isn't true. There are two stable, reasonably fast HSPA networks in Bangkok; one is owned and operated by TOT, the other is owned by CAT but operated by True and DTAC and a handful of smaller companies including iFox.

"But, but, but..." I can hear you say, "the Thai government has been trying to auction off 3G service, and there are lawsuits and competing governmental agencies that have blocked the auction.

"Thailand's the laughing stock of the international communications industry – the only country with no 3G. Right?"

Well, no. That's wrong. To understand why, follow along with the rest of the story online, at W: PhuketGazette.net/LiveWire.

The Thai government owns TOT and CAT, both of which derive a very large part of their income from mobile phone concessions. When you pay your mobile phone bill to AIS, DTAC or True, a very large percentage of what you pay goes to either TOT or CAT.

The very high concession rates were established many years ago, when governments could demand a whole lot of money for using the mobile airwaves.


CAT and TOT don't want to lose their highly lucrative mobile phone concession. That's likely to happen if HSPA takes hold. But that's only a small part of the problem.

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Stuff soap and save your skin

JOHNSON and Johnson might not want to hear this, but I am now two months into a personal hygiene experiment that has led me to one simple conclusion: soap and shampoo are generally bad for the skin.

Each one of us is the end product of millions of years of evolution. Throughout that entire evolutionary process how did our ancestors keep themselves clean? They just used plain old water, the universal solvent.

Your skin, which makes up virtually all of the human interface with the environment, protects itself with natural oils that are perfectly designed to keep your skin soft and supple. They will do a great job of this, provided you don't continually strip them away with the harsh offerings of the multi-trillion dollar "beautycare" industry.

The skin is its own little biosystem, one largely designed to take care of itself. If you accidentally cut yourself, the blood soon

coagulates and you scab up. Provided you don't pick the scab, minor skin wounds will generally disappear with almost no scarring. Your are, to a certain degree, born with some Terminator-like qualities.

But soaps, shampoos and all this other nonsense that is endlessly touted in TV commercials are really just the agents of a relentless, low-level assault on a natural and highly complex cooling and excretion system that is designed by nature to interact only with clean water.

Even here in the tropics, all you need to do to keep your skin clean and healthy is to avoid too much exposure to the sun, maintain a healthy diet and wash yourself thoroughly several times a day with clean water. A shower will do, but if you have access to a pool (non-chlorinated water is best) or bathtub, total immersion is better. Why is it that only the Japanese people seem to understand that?

All you need to keep any funk from setting in under your arms is a potassium alum-based deodorant applied once a day after your morning bath or shower. These all-natural products are made in Thailand, cost about 30 baht a stick, and last about a year. You can buy them at Supercheap and some pharmacies, but the other major retailers don't stock them probably because they want you to buy more-expensive deodorants laced with noxious chemicals.

What's best is they are true deodorants. Odorless themselves, they stop bacteria that cause body odor in their tracks without imparting that sickeningly sweet chemical smell that seems to be constantly around us in products ranging from air freshener sprays to WD-40.

Soap and shampoo are like napalm-light for your skin. Most of us know this deep down. We are all quick to accept that we need to buy special "mild" soap formulas for our newborns, ones that are effectively half-strength, but cost twice as much.

I suffered from dandruff for decades - until I stopped using

shampoo. I suffered from dry patches on my skin for years, but they are now almost completely gone after just a few months without soap.

What I am writing here will sound like blasphemy to some, especially the female readers who have been so thoroughly brainwashed by TV advertising. Yet I invite one and all to give it a try for yourself – what have you got to lose? Certainly not money: you will save lots of it. And you will find all the time wasted sourcing and applying this stuff can be for more productively used elsewhere. Another advantage is that the amount of household waste you produce will be significantly reduced.

Best of all, your skin will improve, natural balance will be restored and you will smell as nature intended - not like a car air freshener.

THE IT industry abounds with Type A prototypes: ambitious, impatient, hostile, hard-driving professional workaholics. Raise your hand if that describes someone you know.

The 1960s-vintage Type A/Type B paradigm has all sorts of holes in it, not least of which is its ability to predict heart attacks.

For example, a University of Michigan study shows that, statistically, Type A

people don't have more heart disease than Type B, never mind the problems associated with characterizing an individual as one of the binary types. Detailed and knowledgeable reviews of studies prove inconclusive.

Some research

theorizes that the hostility component of classic Type A behavior raises the chances of heart disease, but proof lies mired in a thick web of definitions and fuzzy observations. One person's angry, hostile techy is another's quirky knight in white armor, eh?

Now comes a study you can hang your hat on. Or at least your neck.

The American College of Physicians' prestigious Annals of Internal Medicine just published a report (PDF; US\$15) called Using Additional Information on Working Hours to Predict Coronary Heart Disease: A Cohort Study that includes several disturbing results. An earlier version of the article, covering much of the same

ground and from most of the same authors, was published last year in the European Heart Journal (PDF; free).

You have to understand the context of the study to see exactly what's been discovered.

Back in 1948, researchers started watching 5,200 men and women in Framingham, Massachusetts, using both medical exams and lifestyle interviews, correlating observations over many decades with outcomes - originally, heart attack and strokes.

Boston University and the National Heart,

Lung and Blood Institute have continued the study over the years, adding many more participants and other outcomes.

If you want to see how you stack up against the averages, the

Framingham Heart Study site includes numerous interactive calculators and downloadable Excel spreadsheets that you can use to predict your chances of coming down with various forms of cardiovascular disease, diabetes, hypertension, and much more.

Those calculators and spreadsheets are all based on statistics derived from the Framingham study, which you can see in great detail on the site.

The Framingham Heart Study measures many things, including physical activity, but it doesn't take into account the number of hours a person works. That's where these reports shed a lot of light.

The study follows more than 7,000 Brit-

1991. Like the Framingham study, it involves detailed medical exams and questionnaires, and long-term outcomes.

Unlike the Framingham study, the questionnaire asks participants (among many other things) how many hours they work, on average, per day. Respondents can tick "No overtime hours (7-8 working hours/ day)", one hour overtime, two hours overtime, or three-four hours of overtime

After 10 years, the researchers found that people who reported they were working three to four hours of overtime per day were 56 per cent (in the European Heart Journal) to 67 per cent (in the AIM) more likely to have Coronary Heart Disease (CHD) events – primarily heart attacks or strokes.

Those who reported two hours of overtime, on average, came up with a 45 per cent higher chance of CHD "after accounting for the effects of demographic

factors and several known risk factors for CHD. Similar association was found with an outcome comprising only coronary death and nonfatal [MI 9 heart attack]. No significant association was found between overtime work and all-cause mortality.'

If you've been concerned about your glycerides and sugars, diet and exercise and stress, now you have one more thing to worry about.

Fifty years after it first hit the talk show circuit, Type A comes back into play. If you factor out Type A behavior,



Type A behavior pattern...can be a risk factor for CHD."

> It's important to understand what the study doesn't say. In spite of what you may have read in the popular press, it doesn't say that working more hours will give you a heart attack or stroke. There's no cause-and-effect. There may well be other factors at play.

> Notably, the study in the two reports didn't take into account diet, activity levels, the kind of work undertaken, or family history of CHD.

What it does say is that if you think you're working a lot of overtime, you're more likely to have a CHD event.

Don't know about you, but I think I'm going to take the rest of the day off.

THAI Airways International's announcement of a 15 per cent price reduction on fares to Phuket comes a year after a surprising and widely condemned – 59 per cent increase in Bangkok-Phuket fares in April last year, highlighting how increased competition is forcing the national carrier to completely rethink its fare strategy.

Leading THAI's revival is harddriving President Piyasvasti Amranand, who, now approaching 18 months in the job, has shown he intends aggressively to reclaim a significant share of the Bangkok-Phuket route back from low cost carrier (LCC) competition, in particular, Thai Air Asia, the Thailand subsidiary of Malaysian based AirAsia, arguably the world's most successful LCC.

THAI once had a near monopoly 80 per cent share of Thailand's domestic market.

Domestic flights at Phuket International Airport account for 42 per cent of all flights, so the market remains highly important to THAI Airways.

The whopping fare increases last year were, predictably, very unpopular, but THAI held them.

Now it has signaled the gloves are off against Thai AirAsia with the lower fares effective March 15 to September 30.

THAI has also been hit in recent years by increases in direct flights to Phuket, bypassing its ability to pick up passengers for the Bangkok-Phuket flight through its Suvarnabhumi Airport hub.

Currently THAI has 10 daily Bangkok-Phuket and 13 Phuket-Bangkok flights.

AirAsia has eight flights each way. Other, smaller airlines, such as Bangkok Airways and Nok Air (a THAI subsidiary), make up other flights.

In addition to slashing airfares, THAI is attacking AirAsia through a "pincer" movement of creating a joint venture with Singaporebased LCC Tiger Airways.

THAI lost six billion baht in revenue (US\$186mn) in 2010 because of the red-shirt unrest, so it has been forced by such circumstances, as much as anything, to move more quickly to redress an imbalance in its domestic service route network.

THAI Tiger would be the fourth domestic airline serving Phuket.

According to Mr Piyasvasti, the new venture will have "enormous potential" as only six out of 65 million Thais have flown before.

"Low-cost is the fastest-growing market and we want to take part in this market. We have been losing market share to low-cost airlines and we think there is a lot of opportunity for us," he said last August when announcing the joint venture.

THAI is going to need an increase in its domestic flight contributions, which accounted for 12 per cent of its total 200billion-baht revenue last year.

For example, 70 per cent of outbound package tours from Japan to Thailand worth 3bn baht

for the April-September season have been cancelled because of the devastating earthquake.

Japan is usually fifth or sixth in

total tourist numbers to Thailand.

One area in particular that will be affected by the earthquake fallout is Phuket's meeting, incentive, convention and exhibition (MICE) business, which hosts around 40,000 Japanese visitors per year.

The Japanese are also, traditionally, big spenders compared with arrivals from Western countries, spending as much as 70,000 baht per trip.

Still, Phuket – and for that matter THAI – are not holding back in attracting tourists to the island.

At Berlin ITB 2011, in addition to HRH Princess Ubol Ratana Rajakanya gracing the event with her presence, Phuket was represented for the first time by its governor, Tri Augkaradacha.

Also attending was Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (OrBorJor) president Paiboon Upatising. In total, 28 Phuket hotels were represented.

Such high profile presence at the world's largest travel market is to be encouraged.

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Airlines cut services and hike surcharges

AIRLINES have announced revised short-term strategies to cope with climbing oil prices. They have opted either to apply fuel surcharges or to simply discontinue some costly routes. The price of jet fuel has increased from US\$114 (3,435 baht) per barrel last year to more than US\$130 (3,917 baht) per barrel at present.

Many airlines, including THAI Airways International, Singapore Airlines and Air New Zealand, have announced increased fuel surcharges to offset higher fuel costs. Thai AirAsia has decided to stop flying its costly route between Bangkok and Taipei.

An aviation industry source said THAI Airways International would increase its fuel surcharges on most international routes starting from Monday. The airline made its last adjustment to fuel surcharges on February 17 this year. THAI will raise fuel surcharges on services from Bangkok to destinations in Europe and Johannesburg from May 2. Charges on domestic routes will remain unchanged.

According to the International Air Transport Association, an average jet-fuel price of US\$123.10 (3,709 baht) per barrel meant airlines faced the need to shoulder jet-fuel bills amounting to US\$53 billion (1,596 bn baht). - The Nation 18 PHUKET GAZETTE April 23 - 29, 2011

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Dr Thurman on China and a free Tibet

IN A second installment from American Buddhist scholar Dr Robert Thurman, Phuket Gazette News Editor Stephen Fein finds out what the first American ordained into the Tibetan Buddhist order has to say about the Tibetan people's struggle for independence from China. He is one of the world's bestknown advocates on the subject. The two met at a Buddhist retreat at the Thanyapura Mind Center in Thalang recently and discussed Tibet's current relationship with China.

DEFIANT: The monks in Tibet, seen here demonstrating back in 2009, have been at the forefront of the region's independence mover

Stephen Fein: Now that China is becoming so economically powerful, has that changed the Tibetan people's struggle?

Dr Thurman: Not really. I am not a believer in the economic power of China, personally. I think China is kind of the ultimate bubble of the unsustainability of industrial capitalism. In a way they moved all the polluting industries over there and they destroyed the unions and the middle classes in the developed countries by getting these slaves, basically.

Companies like Walmart and all the computer companies, Foxconn that makes all the Apple computers for example, with millions of employees paid two dollars a day instead of twenty dollars an hour.

That export mercantilism has

built up a lot of cash, but they've wrecked their environment. Then you have the corrupt internal system of the Communist Party, where the banks are owned by The Party, and they led to their party relatives and they waste the money, or steal it and send it to places like Hong them, which is not good. In the Kong or Swit-'In the Tibetan

zerland. I think there is going to be a big reckoning with China, frankly. And the

people there are tired of it. They want a share, and the party is holding them captive and crushing down any form of self-expression.

I am not a big investor in China. I think it's a big con job, personally. Especially the destruction of the environment there, which is very serious.

OVADIA Shicartzy is the courtly owner of The Family, Phuket's signature Mediterranean restaurant, located next to Tesco Lotus on the road to Rawai. It's an oriental restaurant with a menu that offers not only favorites such as falafel, humus and mousaka, but also such exotic dishes as harime, a fresh fish served with Moroccan sauce.

Ovadia came to Phuket in 1999. He planned to work as a tour leader for Israelis who wanted to make dive trips around the island. He became a partner in the dive boat Colona VI, which he supervised the construction of in Ranong. At

the same time, he encouraged his new Thai wife to learn to make a traditional falafel. Under his supervision, she became an expert.

"We opened our first restaurant across from the Chalong police station in 2000. It was a small place but we soon began to attract both residents and tourists so we were able to expand. We stayed there until 2007 when we were forced to move due to redevelopment. We were fortunate to find this new location next to what would become a major shopping center in Rawai."

Ovadia was born in Baghdad as part of the Sephardic Jewish community. In 1951, his family decided to immigrate to the new State of Israel which had been established in 1948.

"We were part of 130,000 Jews who moved to Israel. We lived in a tent community for seven years. Finally the family bought a house near Tel Aviv in 1958.'

He remembers the difficulties that immigrant Jews had when settling in their new homeland. Sephardic and their Ashkenazy

Jewish cousins spoke different languages and often competed for the same jobs and education.

Ovadia served in the Israeli army and became an instructor in the use of machine guns. He lost two fingers during a training mishap but learned to shoot heavy artillery using his legs. He then completed a two-year mechanical engineering course.


He worked from 1976 to 1999 in the copper cable industry as a maintenance technician in a mine built by the Germans. When it closed in 1999, he began his new life by traveling to Asia, including Phuket.

Ovadia has a very big interest in music.

"My first wife, an American, brought a lot of rock 'n' roll music from the States to Israel, which I found very exciting. Later, another girlfriend introduced me to the Blues. Now, I never miss a concert. I've seen Joe Cocker five times, BB King three times, and just recently went to see Eric Clapton live for the third time in Bangkok."


Ovadia's The Family continues to grow due to his reputation for the authentic taste of his cuisine.

"I import almost all the spices that I use from Israel. It gives my food the right taste. And we make our own products such as pita and sell them around the island."

Phony classic a roaring bore

THE three classic pillars of Modernist literature are Ulysses by James Joyce, Remembrance of Things Past by Marcel Proust and The Magic Mountain by Thomas Mann. Recently I've seen three critical articles taking potshots at *Ulysses* as being clumsy, overblown and humorless.

I would like to take a blunderbuss to the phony masterpiece The Savage Detectives (Picador, New York, 2007, 648pp).

Critics routinely call the author Robert Bolano "a genius". But this sprawling novel about Mexican poets is sloppy, self-indulgent, meandering, turgid and terminally boring.

It starts out okay. The first section "Mexicans Lost in Mexico (1975)" is a 138page journal kept by a young poet, Juan Garcia Madero in Mexico City. A 17-yearold law student, he is invited to voice the "visceral realists", a group of poets headed by Ulises Lima and Arturo Belano.

Madero promptly quits school, leaves home, shacks up with a waitress and devotes himself to poetry, journal-keeping, cafe-hopping, booze and marijuana. We are also introduced to the other members of the visceral realists, who oppose mainstream poets like Octavio Paz.

Of these, two of the most prominent are sisters Maria and Angelica Font, daughters of Quim Font, an architect who is slowly going insane. Madero stumbles into a romance with Maria, sharing her bed in a cabin behind the main house: "Then everything turned into a succession of concrete acts and proper nouns and verbs, or pages from an anatomy manual scattered like flower pedals, chaotically linked."

One of the symptoms Quim Font has is

an infatuation with a prostitute named Lupe who takes shelter in his home in fear of her knife-wielding pimp


Alberto. On New Year's Eve, Lupe escapes north to Sonora in the family Chrysler, accompanied by Madero, Ulises Lima and Arturo Belano.

The next 540 pages are entitled "The Savage Detectives (1976-1996)". Now the narrative torture begins in earnest. This section is told in a series of interviews with perhaps a hundred characters, each marked with a street address, a city, a country and a date.

After they return to Mexico City, Ulises Lima heads off to Barcelona and Arturo Belano to Paris. The interview motif is a very clumsy one, each character being required to tell his or her lengthy back story before reaching the point when they encounter either Lima or Belano. This outside-looking-in perspective has the added disadvantage of distancing the reader from the two characters who are supposed to be carrying the novel.

The narrative advances through two

decades of separate trails to Israel, Vienna, Nicaragua, Los Angeles, Rome, Angola and Liberia. Each poet returns at one point to Mexico City, where they discover that they have long been forgotten on the trail from ardent youth to bitter middle age.

The one constant, returned to again and again, is a long tequila-fueled night in 1976 when the two poets interview the aged poet Amadeo Salvatierra. They are on the track of a poetess from the 1920s, Cesarea Tinajero, who eventually disappeared in Sonora.

And then we come at last to the novels conclusion, again taken up in Juan Garcia Madero's journal in the car trip to Sonora in the last 55-page section called "The Sonora Deset (1976)". Their mission now is not only to keep Lupe from her pursuant pimp Alberto, but to find the long-lost Cesarea Tinajero.

The narrative strands come together in one final spasm of violence and the reader thinks: I endured all these meandering plot twists for this?

To be fair, there are some rewards. The story of how a hapless Ulises Lima is shanghaied on a plane full of leftist poets to Nicaragua to attend a "solidarity" meeting with Sandinista poets is richly comical.

And the concluding pages of the detective section, when a terminally ill Arturo Belano finds a new life in Africa, are rewarding. The section on the Liberian civil war elevates the novel with traits that had previously been lacking: Action, plot, dialogue and vivid description. A pity you have to wade through so many pages to get there.

Before his death in 2003, Belano produced another novel 2666, weighing in at 1,100 pages. I will give this a wide berth.

Behold the royal jewels in a book

THE first Thai book about the Royal Family's jewelry collection - most of it from Faberg and Cartier – is an opulent eye-popper.

Changthong Luang Haeng Phramahakasat ("The King's Royal Goldsmiths") by Rattakorn Mongkolthum traces royal gems since the reign of King Rama V in a series of beautifully illustrated articles.

"I have great respect for our monarchy, which inspired my book," says Rattakorn, who earned official access to the collection.

"I'm particularly impressed by Her Majesty's profound interest in art, as reflected in her Silpacheep initiative to support craftsmen."

King Chulalongkorn (Rama V) appointed Faberg and Cartier as official Royal goldsmiths. Over the years, the Siamese court fostered distinctive designs that combined Western and Eastern styles.

Rattakorn knows his subject well. He studied in France, obtaining a bachelor's degree in archeology and a master's in art history with a major in the history of jewelry from the Sorbonne.

"The royal jewelry collection reflects Siam's drive for modernity," Pharani writes.

"Faberge and Cartier [jewelry pieces] were like the cultural symbols of the Western superpowers. And with their jewelry in its possession, Siam itself was sending out a message that it was joining their ranks.

Rama V was the first Siamese monarch to visit Europe, making two trips, in 1897 and 1907. While forging diplomatic links there, he acquired many exquisite works of art, including jewelry from the House of Cartier in Paris and from Peter Carl Faberg in St Petersburg.

Along with his own purchases, there were the gifts of jewelry from European royalty, among them Tsar Nicholas II of Russia.

Nicholas II's gifts piqued interest in Faberg gems among other members of the royal family, so much so that Karl Faberg was invited to visit Siam in 1904. His representatives were even on hand to help celebrate King Rama's 40th anniversary on the throne.

In 1911 Faberg mounted an exhibition at the Oriental Hotel in Bangkok. There was an array of remarkable items made for Rama V, including enameled pigs and elaborate Buddha statues and finely detailed bowls for his son.

Rattakorn reports that it is difficult to find any Cartier pieces in the royal collection now, probably because they were dispersed among Rama V's many descendants.

However, says Rattakorn, King Chulalongkorn's fine gold-enamel work can be viewed at the Vimanmek Teak Palace.



The prize for non-fiction was awarded to The Emperor of All Maladies: A Biography of Cancer by Siddhartha Mukherjee.

The Guardian writer notes: "He calls this great and beautiful book a biography, rather than a history, because he wants his reader to understand his subject not just as a disease, a scientific problem or a social condition, but as a character – an antagonist with a story to tell through its eerie relationships to the wider biological and animal world that is also, inexorably, our story.'

The Spy uncovers a fresh food gem

IT'S easy to drive past this boutique restaurant without ever noticing it. A make believe suburban cottage almost hidden by abundant foliage, it stands whimsically aloof, unmindful of the busy traffic on Chao Fa Road West.

At the front gate a green oval nameplate, evocative of a sense of wellbeing, announces it as Chanya Healthy Cuisine. Inside, it exudes a feeling of privacy with comfortable old style furniture, paintings of epic scenes and a small collection of antiques such as His Masters Voice gramophone and a grandfather clock.

You are cordially greeted by the owner cum chef, Atiporn (Toey) Jittanonta, 24-year-old daughter of Dr Suchon, who runs the Phuket Animal Hospital across the road.

Commenting on how as a graduate in multimedia design from Silapakorn University in Bangkok, she drifted into the noble art of cooking, Toey says "Our family had difficulty finding a decent Thai food place around here. Most Thai food tends to have MSG, sugar and coconut milk and is cooked mainly in palm oil."

So she started Chanya to cook mainly seafood and organic vegetables using rice bran and cold press extra virgin olive oils, soymilk and a minimum of sugar.



Her transition to chef was easy, as she modestly claims to have learned everything about good cooking from her mother Waraporn. Even more modestly she explains the restaurant is named after her great grandfather who was the governor of Phuket in 1957.

An incredibly talented young Phuket chef, Toey cooks ever dish herself. From the 60-item menu, almost everything priced under 100 baht, we ordered mushroom spring rolls as a safe starter but were lucky to also choose the more exotic shredded coconut shoot salad with fried shrimps.

Two separate vegetables - red organic spinach and assorted Japanese mushrooms stir fried with olive oil, green curry with homemade fish balls and soy milk and yellow curry with shrimps formed out main meal with every dish cooked to perfection.

Alas, we had not left enough room for Toey's signature desert of chocolate lava with homemade vanilla ice cream. But it was a delight to have discovered a place with a most friendly ambiance, unpretentious prices and superb food.


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Pierre-Yves Cousteau is coming to Phuket.

Cousteau here all week to eye marine matters


GUIDING the legacy of famed oceanographer Jacques-Yves Cousteau is his youngest son Pierre-Yves who will visit Phuket from April 25 to 28 to promote the Cousteau Divers global initiative.

Cousteau Divers global initiative.

Pierre, 29, has taken the reins of his father's work to further drive environmental awareness of our oceans. While in Phuket he will meet with local divers, dive companies that promote marine resource awareness, schools and others interested in marine preservation.

Known as the "Commander", his father Jacques, pioneered new levels of marine exploration by introducing new technologies such as the Aqua-Lung, which he developed with Emile Gagnan. Before he died in 1997, he made over 120 documentaries, wrote 50 books and established an environmental protection foundation with more than 300,000 members so that future generations may enjoy our planet's largest unexplored area.

In this exclusive interview with the *Phuket Gazette*, Pierre-Yves answers questions about key issues facing the Phuket diving community: coral bleaching, the killing of sharks, artificial reefs and pollution.

Phuket Gazette: What is the purpose of your trip to Phuket?

Pierre-Yves: I am spearheading a worldwide program to unite divers for the protection of the oceans (www.cousteaudivers.org) using divers as active agents for the study and preservation of marine life which will allow us to obtain a near real-time diagnosis of the health of oceans worldwide and to react to environmental alerts – much like an immune system for the oceans. I come to witness the state of the diving community of Phuket, to explore potential partnerships, and I must admit, to have fun diving.

Are you familiar with any environmental issues relating to diving in Phuket? If so, what?

There are a number of environmental issues related to diving that apply virtually everywhere. Divers want to see a healthy marine environment during their dives, and the business of diving directly benefits from the health of the seas. Hence, it is in the interest of Thailand's multi-million dollar recreational diving industry to create and enforce marine protected areas such as 'notake zones', where all kinds of fishing is strictly prohibited.

Beginner scuba divers regrettably, can pose a threat to ecosystems. Poorly trained or inexperienced divers who cannot properly control their buoyancy can cause serious damage to the delicate benthic (lowest level of a body of water) organisms, such as corals.

One aspect of particular concern to divers on Phuket is the killing of sharks for shark fin soup. What is your position on this matter?

Today, over 80 million sharks are killed each year for their fins, to provide this delicacy to the Asian market. That's 200,000 sharks a day. At that rate, needless to say, it will not be long before they become extinct altogether. Divers will go out of their way to dive with sharks. Fishing and marine products play an important role in the livelihoods

and economy of the Asian community. It is in their own interest to protect sharks, which help keep the ocean healthy and drive a lot of money to the recreational diving industry each year.

Eating shark fin soup is a cultural behavior. It has no nutritional value, and I have been told is quite tasteless. The reason why this tradition is having such a profound impact on global shark populations is because so many people are repeating that tradition. With seven billion people living on this planet, we must ask ourselves which elements of our cultures and everyday lives have nefarious environmental effects when millions, or even billions, of people repeat them each day.

'The more people, the more power, the more hope,' my father once said. The more

people with raised awareness of our planets beauty and fragility, the more power to impose the interest of our well-being and ultimately survival, the more hope for a golden future of prosperity and harmony with our environment.

Another issue is coral whitening because of warm seas. Thai authorities are planning to close some dive areas in national parks. The diving community would like to see more artificial reefs

> created to help offset this. Are you supportive of such a move?

> Closing dive sites in national parks can help the recovery of benthic organisms. However, there are examples of sustain-

able and economically interesting exploitation of dive sites. Creating artificial reefs can help marine life develop in some areas. The most important thing is to create these reefs under supervision of qualified scientists, after assessing the potential environmental impacts.

Both pollution of the seas around Phuket with run-off from the land and plastic bags from tourism and shipping are problems. What solutions would you suggest for this type of issue?

Eliminating throw-away plastic is a step


forward that the whole world needs to make in the very near future. Pollution and sewage from cities, industries and resorts must be treated and re-used with industrial ecosystem applications before going to the sea. The ocean is no longer a bottomless well that we can throw everything we don't like into. In searching for ways to 'close the loop' on our waste products, we can discover respectful ways of living in harmony with nature. Environmental consciousness is an engine of innovation.

What other issues would you like to raise awareness about while in Phuket?

The importance of Marine Protected Areas for the resilience of marine ecosystems. Scientists tell us that we need to have 20 per cent of the world's oceans declared 'notake' zones (where fishing is not allowed) in order for the oceans to recover from all the pressure we are putting on them (pollution, fishing, global warming, etc). Today, less than one percent of the oceans have such a protection. Our survival depends on that of our oceans. They provide us with 50 per cent of the oxygen we breathe, with proteins that are vital to hundreds of millions of people living off the sea and with climate regulation.



els are an indication of an acid, neutral or alkaline soil. Soil conditions in Phuket are likely to veer towards alkalinity (a pH of 7 or higher), especially if the property is newly constructed and the planting area has not been redressed with some top soil.

One of the good things about this very thorough kit is that it also provides a list of more than 400 plants and their pH requirements. Top of the acid soil needy list are: azaleas, rhodendrons, hydrangeas, heathers, most lilies and orchids, mountain laurel, camellias, magnolias, cardinal flowers, hybrid tea roses, and some ferns. None of these will enjoy soil with a pH much higher than 6.0, and will react adversely if there is lime in the soil, especially if it is present as a result of cement spoil or other waste that has been buried underground by the builders.

Most of these plants are from temperate climates anyway, many originate in North America. So if you do decide to cultivate them in Phuket, they will generally do bet-

ter in containers which can be maneuvered around to change their sunlight ration, and where you can ensure that the potting mix is suitable. Moss or sphagnum peat, by the way, is highly acidic (about 3.5) so it is particularly useful stuff to have around.

Among tropical plants, insectivorous ones such as the pitcher plant and the venus-fly trap are acid loving. So too are certain trees such as mangoes, pomegranates and figs. Even the humble potato prefers a lime-free environment. And if you think about it, most tropical shade plants such as those in the Dieffenbachia genus are partial to such conditions, since they replicate the moist, humus-rich ones in the rainforest undergrowth area.

First, the pH kit was tried in border soil near the swimming pool, where the test reading was 7.5. Definitely on the alkaline side. But this was a predictable result, since here, cement-laden water from the construction of the pool's

raised walls had inevitably run into the surrounding soil. The addition of plenty of top soil had probably reduced the alkalinity somewhat, but it was, and still is, no place for any of the plants mentioned above.

Other results were more unexpected. Phuket has a reddish, clay-based subsoil that is not very supportive of plant life. Usually a few inches below the top soil, it sometimes - and especially after the excavations of building work – lies on the surface. Tested, this sub-soil gave a reading of 7.0. Neutral, but with a pH still not ideal for many shrubs. And of course, it lacks much goodness.

But the really unforeseen result came from one of those proprietary bags of compost we all use. Instead of being acidic, it had a pH of between 6.5 and 7. So this stuff won't significantly lower the alkalinity of your soil. Surprising. Next week we'll learn more about testing for nutrients.

FC Phuket rebounded from two tough away losses to demolish Chiang Mai FC by a score of 4 – 0 at Surakul Stadium last Sunday.

Crowd favorite Sarach Yooyen, returning to play after a suspension, got the scoring underway at seven minutes after a deft pass from Rapeepan Poonsawat.

Just before the end of the first half, Nirun Phunthong set up Nene Bi Tra Sylvestre, who found the target with a close-range header to put FC Phuket up 2-0.

Despite the comfortable lead, FC Phuket continued to press and stayed on the offensive at the start of the second half.

Chiang Mai were unable to

capitalize on the few chances they had to counterattack, and Nitirot Sokuma, who had just stepped on the field to replace Sarach, scored another from close range at 77 minutes.

Watcharapong Jun-ngam, sent in to replace Kone Adama at 75 minutes, concluded the rout by heading home the final goal three minutes before the end of full

Despite being the only FC Phuket player to pick up a yellow card, left wing Nirun Phunthong was named man-of-the-match. Two Chiang Mai players were also yellow carded in the match, which was relatively clean, but once again marred by excessive simulation of injury and stoppages on both sides.

The win moved the Southern Sea Kirin into fifth place on 14 points, but with a game in hand due to the cancellation of the Songklha match due to flooding.

The two top teams, Big Bang Chulalongkorn University and Buriram FC, both collected three more points on home wins last Sunday.

Hard-luck RBACFC earned their first points of the season by drawing at home to Bangkok United.



Young shows his mettle at Sepang Circuit

PHUKET'S Formula One (F1) hopeful Dylan Young reacted well to technical problems in his first JK Racing Asia Series event in Malaysia and is raring to get back in the drivers seat.

In his first practice session on the Sepang International Circuit in Kuala Lumpur on April 9, the 22-year-old Australian lost all power his car when his master switch turned off after running over a curb. The mechanical failure meant he could complete only two laps.

"I was pretty frustrated, but I quickly regrouped and mentally prepared for the afternoon qualifying session," Dylan said.

Despite the disastrous start, Young qualified in 14th place on the grid for both races out of 18 top caliber drivers from countries which included Malaysia, Russia, Switzerland, Austria, India and Korea.

Dylan got off to a flier in race one, but an error later in the first lap caused him to drop several positions. Dylan drew on his experience, and with a spirited drive, finished in 15th place.

"I got off the line well, but was cautious to avoid contact. After that, I just put my head down and passed a few drivers. I'm starting to feel more confident now that we have more seat time," Dylan said.

The next day, prior to the Petronas Malaysian Formula 1 Grand Prix, F1 bosses watched Dylan in action for race two. Again he accelerated well from the start, but jockeying for positions ahead of him caused Dylan to lose ground near the end of the lap. Dylan picked his battles, and methodically worked his way through the field to finish a fine performance in 13th position and

just over half a second from a top 10 position.

Although his season did not have an ideal start, Dylan is still positive. Race data analysis shows his performances consistently improved.

"I closed the gap on the leaders each time, so we are getting better. Seat time is crucial and looking at the data after each session indicates where we are gaining. We have to find the budget to keep improving. I am confident we can crack the top 10 pretty quickly and then we will be pushing for podiums as the season goes on," Dylan said.

Sponsored by EMCT Romania, Dylan is also very proud to have adorned his car with the Phuket logo for the race, but is still searching for a major corporate backer.
