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Pirates plea for 'iustice'

A THRONG of pirates from Kata and Karon staged a protest in Phuket Town on Wednesday to fight rising opposition to the sale of illegal wares.

The protest leaders went to Phuket Provincial Police Station, where Deputy Commander Chalit Kaewyarat received the letter of complaint on behalf of Phuket Provincial Police Commander Pekad Tantipong.

The crowd of about 60 vendors then moved on to Provincial Hall, where Vice Governor Weerawat Janpen received a letter on behalf of Governor Tri Augkaradacha.

the police have been raiding our stores and seizing our pirate goods every day now for more than a month. We are in financial trouble and some of us need to borrow money," said one protest leader, who asked not to be named.

"Why do the police raid only the shops in Kata and Karon but not those in other areas, such as Patong and Kamala? We feel we are being targeted," he said.

"We have been running our shops for 20 years now," he

The protester explained that before raids began, warning letters were handed to each operator.

Governor Tri Augkaradacha. The warning letters said that "We are asking for justice as the Royal Thai Police and the In-

tellectual Property Department have a joint policy to suppress the sale of pirate products, which they said was damaging the country's economy and reputation, he said.

The letters were marked as issued by Provincial Police Commander Pekad, he added.

"They want us to sell only OTOP [One Tambon One Product program] and local products, which [many] other shops are already selling.

"The police said that it is possible to earn a living by doing so.

"But we have already invested in our businesses so action like this is causing big problems for us – now most of our shops are closed. That's about 1,000 shops in Kata-Karon going out of business," he said.

One shop selling pirate goods

makes about 5,000 baht a day, he explained, adding that this means 1,000 shops are making about five million baht for Kata and Karon.

"But the warning letters said we are destroying the country's economy," he argued.

The protest leader also complained about the cost of constantly posting bail for employees arrested, including migrant workers

TT cautions over oil rigs in the Andaman Sea

A TOP official at PTT Exploration and Production Public Co Ltd (PTTEP) on Tuesday expressed his concern that tapping any oil reserves found in the Andaman Sea off Phuket will become a "national issue".

PTTEP Vice President Visit Coothongkul voiced his concern at a meeting to update Vice Governor Somkiet Sangkaosutthirak and other local authorities on the status of oil and gas exploration off Phuket.

"I do not think it will be an easy task as I believe the decision to drill in the Andaman will definitely become a national issue. We have to know whether or not the locals approve of this," he said.

Mr Visit explained that PTTEP hired TDI-Brooks International (USA) to conduct seabed geochemical exploration in order to find any traces of oil in the area.

The team collected samples of seabed soil and rock at 35 sites between May 17 and 26 this year, he said.

"We are now trying to find out whether there are oil reserves in these areas. The samples are being analyzed and sent to the US. We expect the results to be submitted to the PTTEP at the end of August," Mr

However, even if the tests do return positive results, the PTTEP would have to then conduct a seismic study before selecting where to drill, he added.

Mr Visit explained that PTTEP testing for oil in the Andaman was the result of limited

"We have drilled about 8,000 to 9,000 boreholes in the Gulf of Thailand. Some of theses are producing oil, but we have yet to find any new oil fields.

"We have run out of places to look. So the Department of Mineral Fuels, under the Ministry of Energy, is looking at unexplored areas in Thailand.

47 injured as express train slams into truck

AN EXPRESS train from Bangkok to Surat Thani, commonly used by travellers heading for Phuket, plowed into a truck at a crossing in Ratchaburi on Tuesday afternoon, injuring 47 passengers on board.

"At about 10:30am, there was a big accident between an express train from Bangkok to Surat Thani and a truck at Moo 3 Pak Tho, Ratchaburi," Lt Col Somboon Murapan, duty officer at Pak Tho Police Station, told the Phuket Gazette.

"The train had more than 100 passengers bound for Surat Thani on board. Luckily, none of the passengers were seriously iniured," he added.

However, the driver of the truck, reportedly fully loaded with rubber sheets bound for processing, was not so lucky.

"The truck driver and the train driver were the only people reported so far to have suffered serious injuries.

"The train driver suffered a broken arm, and I have yet to be

informed of the injuries sustained by the truck driver," Lt Col Somboon said.

He explained that the rail crossing where the truck was hit by the train did not have any gates to prevent traffic from crossing the rails while a train was approaching.

"The crossing has no boom gates. Only people living in the neighborhood know there is a railway there. The area is very dangerous even though there is a sign indicating it is a railway crossing," he said.

"However, I have yet to complete my investigation of the accident. At this stage I do not have the full details about what happened," Lt Col Somboon said.

Police deem 'Bagged American' a suicide

THE American man found dead Mr Weitz brought an oxygen tank with a plastic bag over his head committed suicide, say police.

"After forensic investigators examined the body, it was determined that our initial suspicions were true. The man intended to commit suicide due to business problems and his American girlfriend leaving him to return home," said Chalong Police Superintendent Wichit Intorrasorn.

"There was no evidence of a struggle, looting or an attack found within the room in which he died," he added.

The owners of the apartment have been informed by staff that

and other items that could be used to inflict self harm into his room a few days before his body was discovered, Col Wichit explained.

His body was taken to Vachira Phuket Hospital, where his blood was tested for drugs.

The police were still awaiting test reults as the Phuket Gazette went to press

'We sent a letter informing the US Embassy of the case. The medical report will be made available to them in the future if they have any further questions," Col Wichit said.

Mayor protests bus termi

THE Mayor of Rassada Municipality is set to file a complaint with the Administrative Court if the Thepkrasattri Road median strip is broken to accommodate the yet unopened Phuket Bus Terminal 2.

Mayor Suratin Lianudom told the *Phuket Gazette* of his plans following an announcement made by Phuket Land Transport Office (PLTO) Chief Teerayout Prasertphol that the median strip in front of the terminal would be broken to allow bus operations to begin

"I, along with other residents, live opposite Bus Terminal 2 and disagree with this decision. It will cause more traffic problems. We are just a small group but we should receive fair treatment," Mr

struction? It isn't right to look for a solution to traffic problems [in front of the terminal] after construction is completed," he added.

We already filed complaint letters with the transport office and Governor Tri Augkaradacha on the behalf of villagers. If they insist on altering the median strip, I will not hesitate in filing a complaint with the Administrative Court," Mr Suratin said.

Phuket Provincial Highways Office Chief (PPHO) Arun Sanae said on the same day that the plans for altering the median strip were already finished and they were waiting for budget approval from the PPHO director-general by the end of this fiscal year.


"We have already submitted the layout plans and need about three million baht to complete them. We should receive the money from this year's remaining fiscal budget and aim to start the project before October 1," Mr Arun said.

PLTO Chief Teerayout explained that Thepkrasattri Rd was under the authority of the PPHO and it was not within his right to organize a public hearing. He echoed Mr Arun's statement that the project was being pushed for a pre-October start.

Korea steps up trade support for ASEAN tourism

ABOUT 50 staff from Phuket tourism businesses this week attended a three-day intensive training course with the aim of providing better services to inbound Korean tourists.

The course, held at the Hilton Phuket Arcadia Resort & Spa from Tuesday through Thursday, was part of the "ASEAN Tourism Human Resources Development Program" organized by ASEAN-Korea Center (AKC) in cooperation with Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT).

AKC Secretary General Young Jai Cho said that Thailand – especially Phuket and Chiang Mai – and the Philippines were now the most attractive destinations for Korean tourists among the 10 ASEAN countries.

"The number of Koreans visiting Thailand grows every year. When I flew here from Korea last night, the flight was full. There was not a single available seat, and most of passengers were families traveling together," he said.

Pattamat Wongpattanasiri, Executive Director of the TAT's Product Promotion Department, said the number of Korean tourists grew last year by more than 30 per cent, to 805,445.

"Tourism operators should learn more about Korean behavior in order to provide quality services and to expand Korean market," she said.

Dolphins take 'top priority'

THE heads of two non-government organizations were in Phuket last weekend to announce the start of a partnership campaign to halt plans to build a "dolphinarium" as part of a resort and tourism complex in Rawai.

Mark Berman of the US-based Earth Island Institute and Edwin Wiek of the Wildlife Friends Foundation Thailand (WFFT) stopped by the *Phuket Gazette* offices today to drop off a copy of the Academy Award-winning documentary *The Cove*, which they plan to translate into Thai and distribute among the local media, schools and government agencies.

The pair said their two groups would work together domestically and internationally to fight a plan by Canadian investor Daniel McDaniel to build a tourism attraction that would include a dolphin show.

Both men feel it is unethical to keep dolphins in captivity and that dolphin shows are dying out in the West as more people learn about how the mammals are captured in the wild.

Mr Berman said he plans to return to Phuket with former dolphin trainer Ric O'Barry to encourage Thais to attend free showings of *The Cove* in order to raise local awareness of the issue.

Mr Wiek, a Dutchman who has lived in Thailand for over two decades and is fluent in Thai, will lead the fight locally in Phuket, preparing a version of the film with Thai subtitles and using the media to spread the message.

The development planned for Rawai is not the first time people have tried to import dolphins as part of a tourism related business, he said. "I understand that some people think that zoos and dolphinariums are still a thing of this time, but scientific research has not proven that it works. I don't know what this gentleman's argument is that it will be good for Phuket.

"From a financial point of view I am sure it could make a profit, especially with so many tourists coming in from Russia and China, but from an ethical point of view I don't think it's right to take animals from the wild and put them into tanks to entertain people," Mr Wiek said.

As for claims that as many as 1,000 jobs could be created, he said most of those would probably go to low-wage workers from Burma who build the project.

Mr Berman said the Earth Island Institute would call for a boycott on Thai tourism as well if the import of dolphins is allowed.

Mr Wiek was less enthusiastic about this approach, saying such a call might be impractical and cast his group as obstructionist.

His group would rather work at the local level to raise awareness about the issues involved, he said.

Dane found dead in Kamala

A 62-year-old Danish man was found dead in a resort garden near his Phuket hotel room early on Tuesday morning.

Police identified the man as Preben Thomsen Schmidt.

Staff at the Print Kamala Resort discovered the man's body at about 6:30am and called the police immediately, said Lt Col Anek Mongkol.

"His body was found in gardens beside a walkway that joins bungalows. His right arm had wounds we believe were sustained in a fall," he said.

However, Lt Col Anek did not speculate what may have caused contusions to the man's face.

"We have sent his body to Patong Hospital for further examination. We are still waiting for the

results," he said.

Hotel staff told the police that the man booked a hotel room for four nights, although police say his passport shows that he entered Thailand on June 27.

"He was last seen by a hotel

security guard at about 1am. He was drinking in front of his room, but the guard paid no attention because he had seen the man spending much of his time drinking," one police officer told the *Gazette*.

Planning chief calls to heed zoning rules

THE chief of the Public Works and Town and Country Planning office in Phuket has called for all developers and local authorities issuing building permits to heed the new zoning regulations that came into force on July 7.

"The application form for building permits remains the same and requires submission at local Administration Organizations for processing and issuing," said Vongsagorn Noonchookan.

Building permits issued before July 7 remain under the previous regulations, even if construction has not begun at the site, but applications filed after July 7 must adhere to the new rules, he added.

illegally selling goods in a shop, and not performing the work as prescribed in their work permits.

"We have to pay 20,000 to 30,000 baht to post bail for each person arrested, while our products – which we bought from Pratunam, Sampeng and Pahurat in Bangkok – were seized every day," he said.

"We want to know why the police are being so unfair, and whether there is something else behind this. We would like the Phuket Commander to leave Phuket," said one of the protest leaders.

Col Chalit said he will pass the letter to Maj Gen Pekad, who was not in Phuket on the day.

V/Gov Weerawat said a com-

mittee would be tasked with finding a practical solution to the problem.

"Actually, this problem started with Karon Subdistrict Chief [Kamnan] Winai Chitchiew collecting money from us then 'not being fair to shop operators', so we stopped paying him," said one shop operator.

"Then he complained to every related organization to instigate the raids on our shops. This might be why the commander [Maj Gen Pekad] is doing this.

"The commander could choose to compromise instead of just using the rules to force people to change. If he wants to enforce the rules, he has to do so across the whole island, not just in select locations," he said.

"I've been raising them for almost 10 years," Mr Awiroot, 45, told Kom Chad Luek.

named Ngern (Silver) and Thong (Gold), from Nakhon Sawan MP Pinyo Nirote for 3,000 baht each when they were about two years old, he said.

"We raise them just like other pets. If they're hungry and hear us making noise in the kitchen, they come to us and we just give them some food. Then they go back into the house.

there, I just tell them to leave," the youngster said.

All Thai children aged seven to 14 years old – about eight million people - are now required by law to get a national ID card. Is the process worth the stress?

Officials have cited several justifications for the new mandate [see First Person on page 9], one of which claims that the scheme will protect Thai nationality from being obtained illegally by alien children. The Phuket Gazette's Steven Layne reports.

ADVOCATES of the new national ID card scheme for children argue that the benefits of a comprehensive and universal E-gov (electronic government) system, ultimately outweigh any drawbacks or inconveniences in the process.

Niran Kanlayanamit, directorgeneral of the Interior Ministry's Department of Provincial Administration was quoted in various news reports as saying, "Issuing children ID cards will help protect Thai rights from being taken advantage of by aliens."

There have been cases of immigrants committing identity fraud reported in Thai media.

In one such incident in Chiang Mai in 2007, an 18-year-old Burmese immigrant and his Thai stepfather were arrested for allegedly purchasing the identity of another Thai man's son, two years prior, for a fee of 20,000

When the identity seller's son turned 15 and applied for an ID as

required by law, database query returned an identity duplicate, alarming officials who then alerted police.

In that case, the media focused on the suspected buyers, though it wasn't mentioned whether the seller was nunished

There are less risky, yet more expensive methods for illegal aliens to obtain an ID card.

One involves buying the identity of a deceased person whose death was not officially reported.

According to one report, this apparent failsafe method would cost an immigrant - or Thai criminal seeking a clean slate anywhere from 300,000 baht to one million baht.

As the electronic national database system continues to evolve, aiming to implement finger scanning technology in the future, the potential for fraud is decreasing.

In October of last year, Parliament voted in favor of a controversial law that would have required Thais aged one year and older to obtain an ID card.

That legislation became the topic of heated debate and was never officially ratified.

The law would have required a massive budget and likely caused a meltdown in the system, as a two-year deadline was given for all children to be registered.

Furthermore, academics argued that the plan would have actually opened routes for identity fraud, not closed them.

For one, kids' heads and faces change dramatically from birth making it easier for another [alien] kid use the same ID without being detected.

Moreover, younger kids have a high risk of losing cards, which could potentially lead to a "lostand-found" ID card market.

The current law, which was signed in May and went into effect on July 10, was a compromise on the original.

However, the question remains: How will issuing ID cards to children from the age of seven address identity fraud?


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
"If this has been done in Phuket, there's really no way we would know about it. However, with the new ID card system, the verification process will allow us to confirm if a child's parents are consistent with the information on their birth certificate. I'm confident it will filter out frauds," he said.

A maternity nurse working at the Vachira Phuket Hospital maternity ward who asked to remain anonymous disagrees that hospitals are the source of such fraud.

"It would be extremely difficult for an illegal migrant worker to pose as a Thai to get their child a birth certificate.

"Both parents need to present

no high-profile Thai identity fraud arrests involving alien children in Phuket. The only incident even close to identity fraud was in 2006 when a Burmese man and a Thai woman were arrested in Phuket for forging the Kanchanaburi governor's signature to issue fake hill tribe identity cards to illegal Burmese immigrants in the south-

Whether or not identity fraud involving immigrant children is rampant remains to be seen.

However, the issue of migrant children living in Phuket and the rest of Thailand is in plain sight.

In his re-election campaign for Phuket constituency two, Phuket MP Raywat Areerob promised to solve this problem by sending [the immigrant children] back to their country.

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Gunfight at temple raises security fears

THE gunfight at a temple in Surat Thani province early last Monday morning that claimed the lives of a local official and a five-year-old girl has sparked security concerns at temples in Phuket.

Six men armed with pistols entered the Suwanpadit temple just after midnight and opened fire on local administrator Songwut Noppakhun, killing him.

Mr Songwut was handing out awards to children that had performed in a talent show at the temple as part of celebrations to mark the beginning of Buddhist lent (Khao Phansa).

His assistants returned fire, sparking a shootout that left 11 wounded, including five-year-old Pornicha Thammasangwan, who died on her way to hospital.

In reaction to the tragedy, Abbot Phra Wisutthithammakhani, the highest-ranking abbot in Phuket, today voiced his concerns over the incident.

"Of course it's not a good thing,

regardless whether it happens in Thailand or anywhere else in the world. We have do our best to stop anything like this from happening again," Abbot Phra Wisutthithammakhani told the *Phuket Gazette*.

"Normal people don't do terrible things like this. [These are the actions of] people who are mentally disturbed. Sadly, now this has happened, so we should check to make sure people do not carry weapons into temples," he said. However, the 60-year-old abbot held firm that the attack was an isolated incident that would not deter people from visiting temples.


"This will not stop people from going to temples. This type of thing is not happening across the country, so people will understand," he said.

Chalong Police Superintendent Wichit Intorrasorn was exasperated by the attack.

"It was a terrible thing. As any Buddhist already knows, the temples are sanctuaries of life," he said.

Chalong Police were forced to cope with a similar incident in 2009 when 37-year-old tour company boss Chalermpol Pranweerapaiboon was gunned down in broad daylight in the parking lot of Wat Luangpoo Supha on Makha Bucha Day, one of Buddhism's holiest days of the year.

Since then, Chalong Police have provided security at temple fairs, but only at the request of temple organizing committees, Col Wichit

explained.

"Right now we provide security at temple fairs only, but of course if any temple in our area requests our assistance we would be willing to help," he said.

"At temple fairs, we often coordinate with organizations, such as civil defense volunteers, local organizations and temple committees, like those at Wat Kata and Wat Karon, to protect against crime. This seems to work very well.

"Our officers stationed at temple entrances [to provide security at temple fairs] always manage to seize some weapons from people entering temple grounds," he said.

Americans called to STEP up

THE US embassy in Bangkok is calling for all Americans in Thailand to register with its Consular Section so it can better provide assistance to US citizens.

"If you are an American citizen in Thailand – either a long-term resident or a visiting tourist – please consider enrolling with the US Embassy's Consular Section via the Smart Traveler Enrollment Program [STEP]," said Tim Swanson, Chief of US Embassy Bangkok's American Citizen Services (ACS) Unit.

"Using this system, you can enter information about your trip abroad so that the Department of



State can better assist you in the event of an emergency," he said.

The range of emergency services offered by the ACS Unit includes assistance regarding arrests, missing persons, medical emergencies, death, crime and lost or stolen passports, he explained.

"You can enroll online in a few

minutes at http://travelregistration. state.gov. After you've enrolled, you can use STEP to enter and update your contact information at any time, allowing you to keep your travel and contact information current.

Kristofor Graf, Consul at the embassy, confirmed that the next ACS outreach service clinic in Phuket is still scheduled for September 16, though a location has yet to be set.

More details will be announced closer to the event date, he added.

TWO of Phuket's major international hospitals will be providing discount breast and cervical cancer screening packages in August.

Urairat Atiset, president of the Phuket chapter of the Business and Professional Women's Association (BPW) of Thailand, on Monday announced that Bangkok Hospital Phuket (BHP) and Phuket International Hospital (PIH) will be offering breast and cervical cancer examinations for 3,000 baht.

The cancer-awareness campaign is being held in honor of HM Queen Sirikit's birthday on August 12 and Thai Women's Day on August 1, she explained.

The normal prices for the combined examinations are 5,200 baht at BHP and 4,100 baht at PIH.

At a conference held to promote the campaign, BHP Deputy Director Dr Bodin La-ied said the hospital now has the latest digital mammogram technology available.

"It is a fast and highly accurate machine. We conduct an average of 100 exams a month and of those about five require surgery for breast cancer," he said.

Dr Bodin was also confident in the hospital's method of detecting cervical cancer: a pap test developed by ThinPrep that he described as the "most accurate method in the world".

"Each year we find about 300 cases of early-stage cervical cancer, and there is a 100 per cent cure rate for such cases.

"According to National Cancer Institute statistics from 2000, breast cancer starts to appear in women aged about 35 to 40. We suggest every woman over the age of 40 is screened each year," said Dr Attawut Chuathong, a surgical oncology specialist at BHP.

Dr Manop Janthanaphan, an obstetrician and gynecologist at PIH, said, "I suggest any woman to have a screening done after three years of having sexual intercourse for the first time. After that, they should go for a screening every year until they are 70."

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ICJ ruling boosts peace hopes

An International Court of Justice ruling creates a new demilitarized zone on the Thai-Cambodia border

THE International Court of Justice (ICJ) on Monday ordered the creation of a demilitarized zone around the temple of Preah Vihear on the Thai-Cambodian border, raising hopes of a permanent ceasefire between the two countries.

The ICJ ordered both countries to immediately withdraw troops from the area around the temple, which was the center of clashes in February that killed soldiers and civilians on both sides.

"[The court] finds that both countries must immediately with-draw their military personnel," said Boris Heim, information officer at the court, via the *Phnom Penh Post*.

"We have defined a zone around the temple in which we said that both parties must withdraw all troops."

ICJ President Hisashi Owada said in reading out the verdict that "having noted that the temple area had been the scene of armed clashes between the parties and that such clashes might reoccur, the court decided that, in order to ensure that no irreparable damage was caused, there was an urgent need for the presence of all armed forces to be temporarily excluded from a provisional demilitarized zone

around the area of the temple."
The decision was hailed by both

sides.
Outgoing Foreign Minister Kasit
Piromya, who led the Thai delega-

Piromya, who led the Thai delegation to The Hague, called the ruling "fair for both parties," Bloomberg reported.

"We will urgently initiate negotiations with Cambodia for the troop withdrawal," he said.

Outgoing Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva said he was satisfied with the verdict since it had no effect on Thai sovereignty.

Meanwhile, Cambodian Foreign Minister Hor Nam Hong also welcomed the decision.

"This provisional demilitarized zone means there will be a permanent ceasefire.

"It will be tantamount to the cessation of aggression by Thailand against Cambodia," he told reporters.

Mr Abhisit said Thailand would not pull its troops out of the zone until it had consulted

with agencies and Cambodia on how to comply with the order.

He said the Joint Boundary Commission, a bilateral body working on delineating the 800km border between the two countries, was the

best forum to continue negotiations.

In April, Cambodia had requested that the ICJ order the withdrawal of Thai troops from the area. It also asked that the court reinterpret its 1962 decision

awarding the temple to Cambodia, a request that the Thai side asked the ICJ to throw out.

Both sides claim a 4.6-square-kilometer patch of land adjacent to the temple as their own.

Germans seize Royal aircraft

A DIPLOMATIC spat erupted between Thailand and Germany last week after German liquidators seized a Boeing 737 at Munich Airport used by HM Crown Prince Vajiralongkorn.

"This is a great mistake stemming apparently from false information provided to the German judicial system by the plaintiff," Reuters quoted Foreign Minister Kasit Piromya as saying.

German insolvency liquidators impounded the plane on July 13 in a bid to force the Thai government to resolve a 30-million-euro (1.26 billion baht) debt to a nowbankrupt German firm.

The company, Dywidag, which later merged with now-insolvent Walter Bau, helped build a tollway road to Bangkok's Don Muang airport 20 years ago. The firm claimed the Thai government had reneged on an agreement by refusing to raise tollway fees sufficiently.

The Thai government has submitted documents to a German court purporting to prove that the craft is the personal property of the Crown Prince and should not have been impounded.

The Royal Thai Air Force said earlier it presented the jet aircraft to HRH the Crown Prince in 2007 for his personal use.

EC gives nod to Yingluck, Abhisit

THE Election Commission (EC) endorsed Prime Minister-elect Yingluck Shinawatra and outgoing prime minister Abhisit Vejjajiva MPs on Tuesday, putting to rest a week of speculation that a "judicial coup" was in the offing.

At the time of writing, the EC deliberation was still in progress and expected to conclude shortly on how many additional MPselect would be endorsed, *The Nation* reported.

Of 500 MPs-elect, 139 have have had their endorsement delayed due to campaign-related complaints.

The previous week, the EC endorsed 358 MPs out of the 500 House seats.

Yingluck and Abhisit, as well as several leaders of the red shirt anti-government protest movement, were not among the candidates endorsed last week, leading to speculation that the EC was refusing to endorse Yingluck in a bid to derail the formation of the Pheu Thai government.

However, the EC is required to investigate complaints of electoral malfeasance before endorsing candidates.

The commission was investigating a complaint that banned politicians were heavily involved in her campaign.

One politician the complaint focused on was Mrs Yingluck's older brother, fugitive former prime minister Thaksin Shinawatra, who lives in self-imposed exile.

The complainants cited the Pheu Thai party's slogan "Thaksin thinks, Pheu Thai does" as evidence.

A case was also lodged against Mr Abhisit claiming he indirectly bought votes because the Commerce Ministry held a trade fair on the day of advance voting.

The new Parliament is expected to convene in early August to elect the 28th prime minister of Thailand.

With the Pheu Thai Party having announced a six-party coalition comprising 300 MPs, Mrs Yingluck is expected to be elected the country's new leader.



Business goes on

THE armed attack by six gunmen at Suwanpadit temple in Surat Thani just after midnight last Sunday has of course brought much consternation.

The men, armed with pistols, entered the temple and opened fire on Songwut Noppakhun, an official serving with the Surat Thani Provincial Administrative Organization (*OrBorJor*).

Mr Songwut died at the scene and five-year-old Pornicha Thammasangwan died en route to hospital after being hit by a stray bullet.

Although the despicable attack took place in Surat Thani, the incident is quite relevant for Phuket.

Beyond the outrage over the deaths, injuries and the venue of the massacre, the call for weapons checks at temple entrances on major Buddhist holidays is a development that almost no-one wants.

But the call is likely to have little effect. "Honor among thieves" is rare enough, never mind "honor among killers". And Chalong Police Superintendent Wichit Intorrasorn has told the *Phuket Gazette* that police checks at temple fairs always result in weapons being seized, meaning that they do not act as a deterrent.

More relevant for Phuket was that Mr Songwut knew someone was coming for him. The rapid return fire of the armed "assistants" at his side makes that a dead giveaway. But the question remains as to why the assassination was ordered. What was Mr Songwut involved in – or what did he refuse to be involved in – that triggered his assassination?

Here, speculation is rife, but police have already indicated the likelihood of a "business dispute". And in this neck of the woods, "business dispute", more often than not, means "land".

Police would impress this newspaper if they managed to apprehend all the killers, unless the assassins were among the 11 injured. It's not difficult to arrest patients in hospitals.

Even with the investigation into the 2003 murder of Pongtorn Hiranyaburana, the man appointed to lead the Thaksin-ordered investigation into "suspect land titles" in Phuket, the police have failed to bring the killers to justice.

That said, the hit squad assigned to Mr Pongtorn's demise seemed a touch more professional. They shot him while he was driving home from Phuket to Surat Thani to see his wife and children. They didn't wait for the car to stop en route; they nailed a moving target.

Run-of-the-mill intimidation and standover tactics are pretty much considered part of the territory in provincial Thailand. Indeed, the *Gazette* would love to hear from anyone in business in Phuket for more than five years who has never been threatened, intimidated or asked for a gratuity for anything to which they were already fully entitled, as enshrined in law.

Here in the boondocks, this is just business as usual – unless, of course, it spills over onto temple grounds.

Heaven help anyone who stands between an unscrupulous man and more money than he has ever seen in his life, even if the sum appears rather unimposing to many of our readers.

Child IDs will lessen burden for parents

First PERSON

Issuing ID cards to children will not only make it more convenient for parents and their kids to benefit from and prove their identity as Thai citizens, the new system will also teach families more responsibility.

The reason for issuing ID cards to children is not really different from why we need to issue them to adults. The cards are similar.

The cards must be renewed every six years and cost the same as adult ID cards, and when the system is in full swing, the benefits will also be the same.

The only new change is the additional work officials have to do to meet the deadline for issuing IDs to all the kids in the country aged seven to 14.

Having an ID card will allow kids to instantly show who they are without any confusion like before. Now it won't be necessary for them to carry documents and evidence to prove their identity.

All their information will be stored on the one smart card.

In the past, when applying for or using services that require personal information to be verified – whether it be schooling, health care, insurance or flying domestically – parents had to bring and carry vital documents such as a child's birth certificate and their house registration to verify their identity.

In some cases a lost or damaged birth certificate would cause

even more inconvenience, because you'd have to go back to the original district registrar to have the documents reissued.

The smart card system doesn't require this and, just like adults, you can apply anywhere in the country.

For example, I have a child who is from Phuket. If we went to Songkhla and wanted or needed to apply for a new card, we wouldn't have to come back to Phuket. Any district or municipal office in the country has the authority to issue

cards since all information is stored on the national database.

It might be inconvenient for many parents to do walk-in appointments during weekdays due to work. That's why many district and municipal offices are coordinating directly with schools directly.

Teachers will have the same authority as parents in the issuing process, and responsibility will fall on schools and government offices, though parents can take still take their kids if they prefer to.

VAT invoices on domestic flights

I frequently travel for business on domestic airlines but when I ask for a tax invoice their staff tell me that they can only issue a receipt. Are airlines exempt from issuing VAT invoices?

frequent flyer Koh Samui

Sanchai Rattanasangoun, chief of the Phuket Regional Revenue Office, replies:

Domestic airlines receive no exemption from issuing tax invoices. I too travel frequently and have received an invoice after every request. Most airlines will issue one to you right at their counters when requested.

A ticketing officer at Nok Air replies:

I am able to issue tax invoices to our customers. You may file your request via our website, through call centers or at ticketing counters. The process may Send us your queries and we'll ask the right people to respond to them.

A ticketing officer at Bangkok Airways replies:

We are able to issue tax invoices to customers at our ticketing counters. At Phuket International Aiport, the Bangkok Airways counter can be found on the 3rd floor

Please bear in mind that we are only able to issue an invoice if you booked your ticket directly from Bangkok Airways. If your reservation was made through an agency, you must make a request with them.

How can businesses have highway signs?

I have seen many white signs posted along major roads in Phuket that feature the names of private companies.

How can a private business put its name on a government sign?

Which department approves these signs, and how can I have a sign of my own?

Arun Sanae, Director of the Department of Highways Phuket office, replies:

The Department of Highways allows private organizations to have roadside signs featuring the organization's name and directions to its premises.

Among the types of places featured on these signs are: stadiums, shopping malls, markets, OTOP centers, hotels, tourist attractions, schools, hospitals, religious places, industrial estates, foundations or charity organizations,

housing estates or condominiums and even political offices.

The cost of having your own roadside sign varies depending on its size and color.

For example, a white sign measuring 2.4 meters wide by 75 centimeters high erected on poles 1.5m tall costs 10,000 baht a year.

A green sign measuring 2.4m wide by 2.3m high on poles 5.5m tall costs 50,000 baht a year.

Please be aware that this does not include the cost of actually making the signs, which must be made according to precise specifications.

We do not make the signs, you have to organize and pay for that yourself – but we can recommend businesses that do make signs to our specifications.

To have such a sign for your business you must first obtain permission from the Highways Department.

Application forms are available at our office on Narisorn Road in Phuket Town.

Attached to the application must

be a copy of the company's certificate of incorporation and a copy of the house registration document (*tabien baan*) and the ID card of the applicant.

Foreigners must provide a signed copy of their passport face page.

The application must specify which size and color the sign will be and have a map showing precisely where the sign is to be posted.

Our office will check the application and decide whether the proposed location for the sign is safe for motorists.

After we have vetted the application, we will send it to our regional office in Surat Thani, which will forward the application to the Department of Highways head office in Bangkok for approval.

The process should take no longer than 45 days.

If the application is approved, the appropriate fee must be paid in advance.

For the sake of health and safety

THE new workplace health and safety law that came into effect last Saturday will have little effect on employers, but does place greater responsibility on building owners to make premises safer, says Phuket's Labor Protection chief.

The Safety, Occupational Health, and Working Environment Act BE 2554 came into force on July 16.

"Employers do not have to change much because much of this new act was already covered by the existing law, the Labor Protection Act BE 2541," said Kittipong Laonipon, chief of Phuket Provincial Labor Protection and Welfare Office.

The new legislation reinforces the legal obligations of employers and employees to practice health and safety procedures prescribed by law, he said.

However, the new law gives employers greater power to modify rented work areas in order to comply with safety provisions, he said.

"Building owners must now allow business operators renting the premises to change and modify the building for safety reasons. The building owners cannot refuse them the right to do this anymore," said Mr Kittipong.

Section 19 of the new act has been drafted to specifically address this issue.

It reads: "Whereas an Employer rents a building, premise, tool, machinery, equipment or any others to be used in an establishment, the Employer shall have powers to carry out an operation on occupational safety, health and environment involving with the rented building, premise, tool, machinery, equipment or any others in accordance with the standards as prescribed in the Ministerial Regulation issued under Section 8."

In the past, business operators claimed they could not break walls to install fire escapes because they did not own the building, explained Mr Kittipong.

"This was a way of refusing to be held responsible in case of fire, but with this new law business owners can no longer make such claims," he said.


A provision was included in the new legislation to protect employers from landlords wanting to sue them for damages to the property, Mr Kittipong said.

"The owner of the buildings cannot sue the business operators [who rent the buildings] because they have to make the changes for safety reasons," he added.

The new law also brings into effect harsher penalties for noncompliance.

"Previously, under the Labor Protection Act BE 2541, the maximum penalty for one breach was one-year imprisonment or a fine of up to 200,000 baht, or both," Mr Kitipong said.

"But under the new act, the maximum penalty is up to two years' imprisonment, or a fine of up to 800,000 baht, or both," he said.

Call for return of Tourism Minister

LEADING Phuket tourism business analyst Bhuritt Maswongsa has voiced his approval for the Tourism and Sports Ministry portfolio to go to the newly-formed Palang Chon Party.

Mr Maswongsa, who is the Phuket Tourist Association's Vice President for Marketing, said the Palang Chon Party's de facto leader Sonthaya Khunplome understands the developmental needs of tourism provinces because of his experiences in developing his home province of Chon Buri.

Mr Sonthaya served as Tourism and Sports Minister under Thaksin Shinawatra. He is among the 111 former executives of the Thai Rak Thai party nearing the end of

a five-year political ban for electoral fraud after the party was dissolved in 2007.

Now serving as an adviser to Palang Chon Party, Mr Sonthaya has appeared on television recently outlining the ways he would improve the ministry if he were appointed minister.

Describing Thailand as "amazing", Mr Buritt said anything was possible when it came to Cabinet appointments in Thailand, but added that change at the top of the Tourism and Sports Ministry was

"It's too soon to predict anything because Thailand is one of these amazing countries. If you are a politician you are somehow deemed qualified to be the minister of any of 18 ministries," he said.

However, Mr Sonthaya appears retirement age.

A variety of special events are also likely to boost tourist numbers this year. One example is Phuket Seafood Fiesta 2011, set to take place throughout August. About 60 restaurants are participating in the campaign, which will use the fresh seafood characteristic of Phuket cuisine as a selling point to draw in Thais and foreigners alike.

Other events set to draw in visitors in August include the Six Senses Regatta, which is expected to see the participation of about 100 vessels.

TrueVisions to expand Phuket HD services

Managing director Thiti Nantapastsri said recently that the company until now had operated three HD channels - Reality HD, HBO HD and True Sport HD - as a pilot project via its digital fiber-optic cable

The service has now been expanded to 11 channels, offering a wide range of information, knowledge, music and entertainment programs.

The eight additional channels are TrueSport HD2, National Geographic HD, Discovery HD World, Star Movies HD, Fox Family Movies HD, AXN HD, KMTV HD and iConcerts HD.

The service area for the HD channels now covers Bangkok and surrounding areas, as well as Phuket,

Mai, Songkhla, Lampang, Nakhon Sawan and Ubon Ratchathani provinces.

Chief Commercial Officer Ongard Prapakmol said the company expected the HD service to be available in 19 provinces by the end of the year.

Though the new service remains limited to subscribers to the fiber-optic cable network, it will also be available to satellite customers next year, with the goal of covering more than two million households within the next two years, he said.

The service expansion would help the company achieve its revenue target of 10 billion baht this year, which would represent a 20 per cent annual increase,

In the first quarter, the company generated 700 million baht in revenue from spot advertising, he added. - The Nation

THAI resumes regular flight operations to Japan



THAI Back on track to Japan.

THAI Airways International has resumed its normal schedule to and from Japan to the levels served prior to the earthquake and tsunami on March 11.

"THAI has resumed all its regularly operated services on routes from Bangkok to five airports in Japan, back to the same level served prior to the Great East Japan Earthquake on March 11. Passenger traffic to and from Japan is regaining normal levels," said Pandit Chanapai, THAI executive vice president of commercial operations.

Beginning November 16, THAI will operate three additional flights per week on the route Bangkok-Osaka (Kansai) utilizing the retrofitted Boeing 777-300 aircraft. With the introduction of these three additional flights, THAI will operate a total of 17 flights per week to Osaka (Kansai), making it more convenient for passengers with flight connections to Europe.

The winter traffic program will also reflect adjustments to flight scheduling for easier connections into Phuket.

Rise of the Russians as arrival figures soar and 'more growth' on the horizon

THE RUSSIAN tourist market is one of the fastest-growing segments in Thailand's tourism industry. Currently, some 600,000 Russian tourists visit Thailand every year, with a growth rate of 20 to 100 per cent each year.

The number of Russian tourists in Phuket surged during the last few years. In 2008, around 100,000 Russians checked into Phuket hotels throughout the year. In 2009, that figure reached 178,000 and in the year 2010, despite the global economic slowdown, Russian check-ins for Phuket's hotels jumped 28 per cent year-on-year to 230,000, according to statistics from the TAT.

Mr Andrey Snetkov, contract and marketing manager of TEZ Tour, believes that Russian tourism still has a lot of growth potential within Thailand.

"In the coming months we will be getting a mix of quantity and quality tourists from Russia. Central Russia and Eastern European markets have a high paying ability but the market is already developed," Mr Snetkov said.

"The main market addition for this coming season will be from

emerging tourist markets like Siberia and Far East Russia. However, these are low-income regions therefore the focus will be on quantity and budget tourism," he added.

Mr Snetkov explained that unlike Pattaya, which is a budget destination, Russian tourists who visit Phuket range from middle-to-high income groups. Many of them are business-people,

office workers and retirees.

"Phuket is also emerging as a deluxe destination for Russian VIPs. There has been an extremely high demand from this group, but they also have high expectations," Mr Snetkov said.

"They are willing to pay high prices to stay in hotels with people of the same social status and are very sensitive to it. They often choose Phuket or one of the nearby islands as their holiday des-

tination. Sometimes they may also choose to holiday in Koh Samui or Koh Chang. But this group usually travels from the end of December till the end of January, never during the low season," Mr Snetkov added.

Mr Snetkov concluded that there is a need to raise awareness of Phuket as a tourist destination among Russian travel agents. Ninety per cent of trips to Thailand are still arranged by Russian travel agents and yet many Russian travel agents do not have first-hand experience of Thailand, therefore their recommendations to clients are frequently illinformed.

"Familiarization trips for travel agents are an important way to remedy this," he added.

According to data provided by TEZ Tour, 31 per cent of Russian tourists visiting Phuket choose to stay at five-star hotels. Forty-four percent choose the four-star hotel segment, whereas 25 per cent choose to stay in three-star hotels or lower. Phuket also has the highest proportion of Russian tourists staying in fivestar hotels, compared with other destinations such as Pattaya, Samui and Bangkok.





AIS rolls out 3G coverage

Finally, it's here! 3G has arrived on Phuket and will be available later this month

AIS marketing and sales manager, Paiboon Rinsakul, gave a ground-breaking presentation at the Computer Clinic meeting last Sunday. Mr Paiboon demonstrated AIS's new HSPA 3G service, with full internet access over AIS's about-to-be-released connections in the US and Europe. wireless network.

In front of 50 observers at the meeting, Mr Paiboon ran the group's standard international speed test to Los Angeles (phuketinternet speed.com). AIS's 3G clocked at 1.8 Mbps download speed from LA - by far the fastest wire-

less internet connection the group has ever seen.

BREAKING NEWS: AIS has 3G working throughout Phuket. You'll be able to sign up for service starting July 28.

By comparison, most wired connections in Phuket are running at 0.6 to 1.3 Mbps. Yes, that means the wireless AIS 3G service. right now, is faster than most wired ADSL connections. It's also faster than most 3G

Of course, measuring the download speed on a beta test connection is a bit like measuring commute times on an empty

freeway, but the number is still quite impressive.

Mr Paiboon revealed that AIS postpaid-GSM and prepaid 1-2-Call will roll out HSPA 3G to towers covering about 95 per cent of the internet usage areas on the island by the end of the month.

Full details - including pricing – aren't yet finalized, but AIS will probably offer several levels of service.

AIS is also extending coverage throughout the island. The True signal is only available from nine towers on the west coast of Phuket and in Samkong, although - as I explained in Live Wire last week – True pledges to get more towers up and working in short order.

The new 3G AIS service will run at 900 MHz. Your phone, tablet, or PC dongle has to be able to work at 900 MHz, in order to

hook into the AIS network. So, for example, AIS 3G will work on an iPad 2, but not on an iPad 1. It will work on an

iPhone 3 or 4, and on most (but not all) Android 3G phones sold in Thailand.

The only way to know for sure if your phone, pad or PC dongle will work with AIS is to check the specifications: it has to support HSPA at 900 MHz. Specification checking can be done at gsmarena.com.

The AIS roll-out has several smart aspects. Foremost among them: the AIS (GSM or 1-2-Call) SIM card you have right now will work on the new 3G network. If your phone, pad or dongle can handle 900 MHz 3G, all you need to do is drop by an AIS counter sometime after July 28 and

Dozens of people have written to me over the past 24 hours, saying that their phones or pads are suddenly picking up a 3G signal. If you're experiencing the same, it's a good sign that you'll be able to get AIS 3G using your current SIM card and phone number when the service goes live on July 28.

Until then, you may think you're running at 3G speeds, but you aren't: AIS is automatically dropping you back to EDGE/ GPRS, until you sign up and pay for the new feature.

In theory, all of the AIS shops, including Telewiz shops (AIS's authorized dealer) and select mobile phone shops on the island,

> will be able to set you up with 3G starting on July 28. There may be a bit of confusion at first, so don't get too excited.

AIS will have a booth, staffed with engineers who know what they're talking about (really!), at the IBAP Business Fair, July 30 and 31, in the Homeworks mall opposite are Central Festival. You're cordially invited to drop by and learn the details, particularly on the afternoon of the 31, when AIS will have its official opening (time to be announced).

If you get AIS 3G working, please go to the Internet Speed Reporting site mentioned above and report your speeds. AIS will be monitoring the site to see if there are any problems. You can also drop your suggestions, complaints and – it must be said – compliments when you post your speed.

The game is afoot.

Will this be the last interest rate rise for China?

CHINA recently raised interest rates again by 25 basis points (bps) to 6.65 per cent, the fifth time since initiating rate rises in October last year.


This is a result of rising inflationary pressures and unofficial earnings estimates made by security analysts set the Consumer Price Index (CPI) in June at 6.2

Rising inflation has been a problem in China for a while now, with the graph indicating that real rates are actually negative when food prices are included.



Many now feel that the Chinese central bank has done enough and that this will be the final rate increase for the year. Views on this differ though.

If I had to hazard a guess, I'm inclined to believe we are near the end of interest rate tightening, if not the end itself. Why do I make this bold statement given that most

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economists usually get these things wrong?

First and most importantly, raising rates is not the only tool that the Chinese have in their arsenal when it comes to controlling the supply of money. What they seem to prefer to do is increase the Required Reserve Ratio (RRR) of the banks.

Currently this sits at 21.5 per cent for the big banks and 18 per cent for the small banks, which effectively means that it has become a lot more difficult for banks to lend money.

This difficulty in lending is seen in the amount of lending dropping from an official 7.95 trillion last year to current levels of 6.7 trillion. This, coupled with evidence that the housing market appears to be rolling over, as seen by inventories in China's biggest cities which are set to rise to over six months' worth of supply by the end of this year, and transaction volumes that continue to tumble - they're down over 15 per cent Year To Date (YTD) in major cities such as Beijing.

Secondly, given that the central bank is loath to raise interest rates that are already high, if inflation does continue to rise, the central bank can increase the RRR again, because this attracts hot money as investors await the inevitable Reminbi appreciation.

With the latest rate increase, does that mean we are worried about a hard landing in China? We do not believe another 25 bps is the tipping point, but overall this cannot be good for economic growth. However, Gross Domestic Product (GDP) growth rates are still much higher than nominal

interest rates, so it's hard to believe this latest rate rise will make much of a difference.

It's how much the banks are able to lend, rather than the cost of the debt that matters. In this respect the latest interest rate rise does not make much difference.

For now we remain sanguine about China's growth rates. But should we see a further increase in reserve requirements, we will start being a little more cautious about global growth and start being a lot more nervous about commodities and commodity currencies

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Horribly relatable tale a surprise hit

TIMES are right for a movie about disgruntled laymen attempting to kill their unbearable bosses. With the worldwide economic "recovery" never seeming to reach as far as reports claim, many working professionals still feel fortunate just to be earning a salary.

Some bosses (we've all had at least one) prey on this dependency. We all condemn violent thoughts in public, but anyone who won't admit to listening to a horrible boss while thinking of throwing them out the window is, well, probably lying.

In rough times, dark comedy often finds a welcome audience.

That is exactly what *Horrible* Bosses is. Quite possibly the most surprising sleeper hit this year, the film is wittier, raunchier, and far more entertaining than one would expect. It's been a long time since a film provided such a steady supply of laughs from beginning to end with such enjoyable charac-

knows that in comedy, timing is everything just as it is in executing your boss.

The tone of the film is spot on for this kind of subject material. Although people

struggling in the job market may connect with the movie, it's never too serious. Horrible Bosses is one of the few films that makes outrageous comedy work, thanks to a screenplay that takes matters beyond absurd and its playfully immoral characters.

It grows increasingly implausible as it progresses, yet it never feels like the filmmakers were selling out to earn cheap laughs. As the characters slowly reveal themselves, it becomes apparent that they are right at home in a dark, comic world.

The premise is straightforward: three buddies, not necessarily overworked and underpaid so much as just plain abused by their bosses, plan to kill the one boss that's making their lives unbearable. They are Nick (Bateman), Dale (Day), and Kurt (Sudeikis),

and their daily ritual includes frequenting a bar to share beers and stories of ill-willed abuse from their bosses.

The film does a perfect job of making audiences hate the three horrible bosses. In some form or another, you will see the personas played by each of the three bosses and think of some miserable, mean, schmuck you've actually met.

Nick's boss, played by Kevin Spacey, is a narcissistic sociopath who genuinely prides himself on causing misery for others. Kurt's boss (Farrell) is a prostitute-loving coke addict who inherited his dad's company in the wake of an untimely death.

Dale's boss is a nymphomaniac who could care less about Dale's engagement, relentlessly attemptters. Director Seth Gordon clearly ing to molest and seduce him

As you might have guessed, Nick and Kurt don't have much sympathy for Dale – whose boss is played by Jennifer Aniston in a role that

could become the boost that her career needs. She's over-the-top sexually aggressive towards Dale, who has every intention of remaining faithful to his fianc . For Aniston – whose name has solidified past films' status as clich d and contrived – it's a breakthrough role, even if she plays the crudest female character to grace the silver screen since Sharon Stone crossed her legs in Basic Instinct.

Adding to Aniston's surprise role is an absolute all-star cast. For a film that received very little hype prior to its release, *Horrible Bosses* abounds with cameos and smaller roles by top actors, some of them placing a fresh spin on their usual roles by taking on comedy.


Colin Farrell, for instance, is almost unrecognizable as the cokeaddict golden boy, and shows he has a talent for comedy. Jamie Foxx proves that he still has the comic touch as the mysterious gangster with a tattooed head full of advice for amateur assassins.

And Kevin Spacey is as perfectly cast as the boss who will



stop at nothing to ensure his ego rules at the expense of everyone else's happiness.

The three leads are spot-on in playing their characters with a sense of excited stupidity. In the hands of another director and other actors, the screenplay for *Horrible* Bosses could have easily become contrived and mundane, but these filmmakers clearly know how to find the humor in hardship.



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Opening the door to a spiritual path

Uncovering the significance and sacred celebrations of two of Thailand's most revered religious holidays

LAST week's full moon heralded the official start of the rainy season in Thailand marked by back-to-back Buddhist Holidays, Asaha Bucha and Khao Pansa.

For non-Buddhists, the long "dry" weekend to welcome the "wet" season served as ample opportunity for relaxation, if nothing else.

For most devout Buddhists, however, there is much deeper meaning and purpose to July's holy weekend.

Here is an explanation of the holiday, its roots and customs.

ASAHA BUCHA DAY

Marked by the full moon of the Thai lunar calendar's eight month, Asaha Bucha was designated to celebrate and perpetuate the first sermon that the two-month-enlightened Buddha gave to his first five followers over 2.500 years ago.

The word "Asaha Bucha" derives from ancient Pali language and

literally means "worshiping fourth month".

The fourth month of the ancient Indian lunar calendar is equivalent to the eight month of the Thai lunar calendar.

It is for this reason that in Thai, Asaha Bucha is also referred to as wun

pen deuan bpad – the full-moonday of the eighth month.

It is one of three lunar-based Buddhist holidays in Thailand.

The other two are Makha Bucha Day – typically a full moon in February, sometimes in March -

commemorates the Buddha's ser-Visakha Bucha Day – typically a full moon in May, sometimes April - celebrates Buddha's birth, enlightenment and death all in one day.

Celebrations and ceremonies in

temples are generally the same for all three days.

After the offerings, blessings and sermons during the day, there is a climatic moonlight candle procession during which participants carry a lit candle, three joss

sticks and a lotus flower and encircle the temple's main Buddha hall three times.

The number three in Buddhism refers to the "triple gem" and symbolically represents the Buddha, his teachings (Dharma) and the clergy

(Sangha). This is the reason for cirmon to 1,250 followers; and cling a temple or crematory three times and also prostrating three times in veneration of the Buddha or a senior monk.

THE ULTIMATE TRUTH

The intricacies of custom and tradition all too often cloud underlying meanings and purposes.

Contrary to popular belief, to understand the essence of Buddhism and benefit from its philosophy, practitioners do not have to be versed in ancient mantras and spells, nor need to seek the protection of a magical tattoo or amulet. In fact, many of the practices we see today are contradictory if not irrelevant to what Buddha actually taught.


We turn to his first sermon, the real point of Asaha Bucha day. Buddha's first and fundamental sermon explains that the Dharma Wheel – an analogy for our life cycle – comprises the "spokes" of birth, illness, death and rebirth.

The wheel turns relentlessly; life is a constant cycle of suffering caused by our desires, dependencies and attachments.

In order to break free from the cycle of pain and suffering that is life – not to be reborn again into the same cycle – and thus obtain the ultimate truth of enlightenment, detachment and renunciation of the unessential and harmful things in life must be practiced.

At the same time, it is important to avoid extremes and instead seek a middle path, willfully and consciously living by the basic five precepts: to abstain from killing, stealing, lying, drinking and sexual misconduct.

That said, Buddha is not a god to be worshiped, but rather a teacher to be honored.

KHAO PANSA

The day after Asaha Bucha is Khao Pansa, literally the "Rains Retreat". This is the traditional time for laymen to ordain as monks

For this three-month period, monks traditionally retreat to temples because the rains make it difficult for them to meditate in the forest or ask for alms in the village on a regular basis.

To ensure the monks are able to sustain themselves, laypeople make larger-than-usual offerings during Khao Pansa.

Aside from food, large candles have been the customary form of offering, a practice dating to times before the invention of electricity. Today, large

candles are still offered but this is largely a tradition now as most temples have a continuous supply of electricity.

During Khao Pansa monks stay in temples, disciplining themselves by following hundreds of precepts which dictate that they abstain from everything from growing eyebrows to even singing. This is in contrast to the five basic precepts that laypeople attempt to follow as outlined in the Buddha's principle sermon.

Khao Pansa also sees an increase in social awareness through media campaigns on Thai TV, newspapers and radio, the most common echoed in the nationwide alcohol abstinence slogan: "Khao Pansa Ngote Lao".


He is currently working on his first novel and is continuing his studies online with the National Council for Training Journalists in the UK.

That said, the Labor Protection Act is a must-read for all foreign teachers employed in Thailand, and free English translations are readily available on the Internet.

Here are a few highlights: Once you start a job, the

maximum period of probation allowed is 120 days. Related to this, your employer cannot ask you to pay a security deposit as a condition of your employment. If your employer tells you they are going to withhold any money from you as a guarantee towards concept in Thailand, and in the event that you

While under contract, you are entitled board's like better than to throw a party, is to paid leave in observance of Thailand's 13 official holidays.

Set at 30 days, paid sick leave is substantial, so long as you don't call in sick three days in a row, employers cannot

demand a written doctor's note. But taking advantage of this probably won't do you any favors when it's time for your contract to

be renewed.

Pregnant teachers are entitled to at least 90 days of maternity leave (45 paid) and employers cannot terminate employment on the basis of pregnancy.

Up until the not-so mandatory age of retirement, employees are entitled to health insurance. Some employees are able to choose their hospital, while others might not be given

that option, so you should check with your school to see if you have a choice. If you do have a choice, you cannot change it, so choose wisely.

Worker's compensation is not a foreign

are injured at work, you are entitled to ask your employer to help cover the costs of any medical treatment sought as a direct result of on-the-job injuries.

Unless you've committed one of the acts defined in Section 119, any employee who's been fired or laid off is entitled to severance pay. The amount of severance is dependent upon the length of employment.

If an employee feels the employer has violated any portion of the LPA, he or she is entitled to lodge a complaint with the local Labor Inspector who is obliged to make a ruling on the complaint within 60 days of it being filed.

The good news is that Thailand's Labor Court is notoriously pro-employee, no matter where the employee is from. If you feel you have a case against a school, it might be a good idea to investigate the validity of any grievances.

Better yet, have a read over the LPA before you sign your next employment contract.

Although there is plenty of research that can be done through the Internet, it's always good practice to consult a lawyer if you think your employee rights have been violated in any way.

Local school bonds with Australian college

EARLIER this month, Srinagarindra, The Princess Mother School Phuket (SWPK), became a sister school with Billanook College in Victoria, Australia, and signed an agreement with the Center for Education and Re-

search in Environmental Strategies (CERES) so the two schools can exchange ideas about environmental issues.

SWPK School Director Nachai Keimnipatt and Eric Bottomley, team leader of CERES Sustainability Projects, signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) on the Building of Partnership Through Sustainability.

'We could learn about mangrove forests from your school, and maybe you could learn about energy conservation, such as the careful use of air conditioners from our schools – especially the schools in Northern Australia where they have to rely on air conditioning as much as you do in Thailand," he explained.

"The support of the Australian-Thai Business Association in Darwin and the Australian government, enabled us to come to Asia and locate a school that was interested in environmental issues,'

This is our first collaboration with a foreign country, he said.

"In the future, we would very much like to expand this network to include schools in China, the Philippines, and Malaysia," he

Steve Lingard, Director of International Student Programs at Billanook College, added that in the future the collaboration between the two schools may focus on other areas outside of environmental sustainability.

"It may be possible to have teacher exchanges, student exchanges, study tours and other activities," he said.



Strong roots make Bonsai a hit

Bonsai restaurant is a fascinating venue that sets itself apart from other eateries in its market segment.

From the Chao Fa East Road -Bonsai's entrance lies meters south of the turn to Palai – all that's visible is an unassuming two-story building and a gravel parking lot. The building is in fact

the kitchen and the restaurant hides behind it.

The first thing you notice are the large tamarind trees and potted bonsais that fill the space. Despite the fact that the bonsais number about 500, they don't clutter

the restaurant but instead add an endless point of interest. The tamarind trees have wide canopies, offering shade during the day, but as Vilasinee Thephasadin Na Ayn, Bonsai's owner, points out, it is after dark that the space comes to life.

Mrs Vilasinee, her husband Michael, and son Manun led the way past a 1976 Rolls Royce and a 1957 Triumph parked inside a pavilion near the entrance. This is the first sign that Bonsai restaurant doubles as a museum.

Ceramic pottery displays hug the perimeter walls.

Much of it is from the Chinese Ming, Song and Qing dynasties.

A 100-yearold wooden house transported from Uttaradit holds yet more art and first issue stamps from

around the world. This represents just a portion of the family's vast collections.

The resident Rolls Roys.

Michael's passion is the bonsais, which require loving care and a lot of maintenance. Bonsai trees are extremely sensitive. They often die when new designs are attempted or when they are moved too hastily. The oldest bon-

sai tree at Bonsai restaurant has been around for 180 years.

Dinner was served as darkness set in. The dishes Mrs Vilasinee selected were placed onto one of the unrefined, chunky wood tables. The restaurant doesn't have indoor seating or air conditioning, and nor should it. The outdoor setting and the decorations define the restaurant's character.

As the meal began, the family described each dish. Chili dips with shrimp paste served with boiled vegetables (150 baht) is an awardwinning dish that they are particularly proud of, though it may pack

a punch for those not used to spice.

Their paradise spring rolls (150 baht) are a flat concoction of minced shrimp, ham, cashew nuts and Chinese gai-lan that have a fantastic western taste despite the ingredients.

white snapper fried with herbs and tamarind sauce (350 baht) made from Bonsai's own trees.

which translates to "folk clay pot", is a clear, sour soup with generous

portions of fish.

Mrs Vilasinee surprised the Gazette by ordering crocodile stir-fried with red chili herbs, black pepper and herbal vegetables (150 baht).

It complemented the other dishes well. Both the texture and flavor

Venison was another pleasant surprise. After being stir-fried with herbs and black pepper chili (150 baht) the venison was added to a spicy herbal soup.

Bonsai also has a sizable wine list, but for this particular meal Michael ordered the South

African house wine (750 baht/ liter, 120 baht/glass), saying that the lighter taste would complement the food. He was most correct. His wine selection was an ideal way to round off the meal.


The quality of the presentation is impeccable, and the prices are worthy of praise for this caliber of restaurant. What makes Bonsai's stand out even more are the large portions. Comparing price to quantity, Bonsai is far ahead of the competition.

In the middle of the meal, a live folk band arrived to play light music, adding yet another dimension to the atmosphere.

Mrs Vilasinee did not let the meal end without dessert and strongly recommended the homemade ice cream topped with amaretto. Delicious servings of banana and vanilla were brought in tall glasses.

Bonsai deserves high marks for its food alone, but the entire experience is more memorable because the owners share their hobbies and interests with customers. If you're in search of a special evening, this is the place.



In brief...

Construction suspended on 78 projects in Capital

CONSTRUCTION has been suspended on a total of 78 housing projects in Bangkok with 17,750 units worth more than 30 billion baht, according to a survey by the Agency for Real Estate Affairs (AREA).

Of those 78 projects, 23 have failed to win bank approval for project loans, while 21 are in locations unattractive to buyers. Ten projects have not passed an environment impact assessment, five have changed from residential to commercial buildings, 10 are contemplating price adjustments, and six have suffered construction delays because they are far from infrastructure links. The remaining projects do not have primary entrances from any main road.

However, AREA believes that the property market shows signs that it will be oversupplied by 2013, if property firms continue to launch residential projects at an average of 100,000 units a year, agency president Sopon Pornchokchai told a news conference this week.

Anantara replace Banyan Tree in Abu Dhabi deal

SINGAPORE-based Banyan Tree has been replaced by Thailand's Anantara brand for the management of the Eastern Mangroves Hotel & Spa in Abu Dhabi.

With an opening date of early 2012 on the table, the move comes after a series of reported operator and owner disagreements.

Banyan Tree's Angsana brand was to have adorned the property, but a difference of opinion led to the chain moving out of the agreement, which paved the way for Anantara to be appointed.

Minor International's Anantara Hotels and Resorts are continuing to pursue a rapid growth footprint both domestically and abroad.



PHUKET continues to ramp up visitor numbers faster than a shopaholic running up credit card debt, and what motivates tourists to visit the island is well-known.

Our island is one best known for its white sand beaches, coconut trees and soothing tropical breezes. Value comes into play, as do leisure activities such as golf, yachting and of course nightlife. But at the heart of the matter, the single biggest demand generator remains the dream of a beach holiday.

Cultural tourists these days have long ago abandoned Chiang Mai

for more exotic locations and Brand Thailand today is mainly about affordability, easy access and mass numbers.

So what about out island's cultural heritage treasure – the one that features Sino-Portuguese design and Chinese influences? Of course,

I am talking about Phuket Town.

We have all been to various events that promote the area, experienced the hype, and seen the cosmetic changes that brought about the rebirth of Phuket Town. But the revival is arguably due to the commercial burnout of what used to be the island's retail hub.

Hypermarts, community malls and frenzied urbanization are pushing development into every nook and cranny around the island.

It's true that most hotels in town have enjoyed commercial success, but that hasn't translated into the kind of international branding experienced in other parts of the island. Accor's Novotel raised its international flag for some time, but once things came to a crunch the numbers just didn't add up.

Visitors were primarily Thai, with a smattering of foreigners who seemed to believe all of Phuket was a beach and were left wondering what time was high tide on Deebuk Road.

The question for many remains how can the area attract cultural

or niche tourists who are not of the mindset that "life's a beach" and want some culture.

Penang certainly has been a focal point of the Sino-Portuguese and historical building preservation movement. Thumbing an article in a recent edition of *Travel* + *Leisure* I see names of restored boutique properties such as Hotel Penaga, Muntri Mews, Moon Tree 47 and Yeng Keng Hotel.

Another big buzz is the restoration of Campbell House, built in 1903. These guys are getting it right. Why can't Phuket?

We've all seen the public relations attempts to gain UNESCO status for Phuket Town, but presently this seems to be something along the line of a gastro-eating fest destination. While there are some very nice local eateries there, I'm not sure that this is the right tactic.

It takes money, planning and long-term strategic initiatives for projects like Georgetown in Malaysia to take root and prosper. I've often wondered why hotels at Cape Panwa or Koh Sireh don't open up shops or restaurants in town, using their proximity to add an attraction for guests.

Instead, they are hellbent on trying to imitate resorts Bang Tao, Mai Khao or Kata, vying for the very same guests rather than venturing into new territory.

Singapore's well-documented love of boutique hotels in its own older quarter is a welcome change for many visitors, but for Phuket our fascination seems to only focus on the new and glossy versus the more challenging process of upgrading with love, respect and a sense of tradition.

New is not always better. For Phuket Town the clock is ticking if it is to take the progress of the past few years forward into something more tangible and long lasting.

While all that glitters may not be gold, Phuket Town's treasure trove of cultural attraction remains buried for the moment.

In brief...

New planning regulations issued

NEW town planning regulations for Phuket were issued July 6. The most significant changes have been to land areas located on hillsides and forest conservation areas.

For developers of condominium and land development projects, there were limited revisions. Those most affected will be upscale villa or luxury hillside projects.

Low-price living coming to Laguna

THE upper-scale property areas of Bang Tao, Cherng Talay and Laguna are being infiltrated by the low-end price segment of the market.

Two Villas and the Erawana Group have built detached homes and condos in the Baan Don and Layan area.

Next up is the 59-unit Baan Tak r Kard, which according to the developers, has sold close to 50 per cent off plan.

Semi-detached units range from 108 square meters up to 125sqm of living area. Entry prices start at 2.69 million baht.

CBD developers flock to Phuket

INTENSE competition and escalating land prices are motivating property developers in the Central Bangkok District (CBD) to relocate projects to greener pastures.

Most acquisition prices range from three-to-five million baht per rai, with a focus on larger inland parcels.

At the same time there has also been a surge of interest from overseas investors wishing to develop land, mainly from Singapore and Hong Kong groups.

During the global financial crises of 2008, the smaller villa projects were hit the hardest in Phuket.

Nai Thon lux villa sales top US\$20mn

PROPERTY sales in Phuket are experiencing some breakthrough transactions at the top end of the market. Nai Thon's "Golden Mile" has seen transactions in excess of US\$ 20 million over the past few months. Istana just sold a six-bedroom ultra villa for US\$ 6mn through Phillip's Real Estate. Meanwhile, at nearby Malaiwana, four properties have been sold since April.

Emerging upscale addresses at Nai Thon includes Malaiwana, Istana, Trisara and the Pearl of Nai Thon. New hotels under development include ACCOR's Pullman brand and InterContinential's Hotel Indigo.

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Ever Changing Designs

The low-down on renting in Phuket

RENTING a villa or apartment long-term is becoming very popular in Thailand, especially in resort areas such as Phuket, Pattaya and Koh Samui. Many would-be buyers are deciding to hold off on buying and instead rent for a year or more while they get to know the area and learn the ways of Thailand.

Renting long-term is cheap compared to Europe. You can find a two-bedroom villa with a swimming pool for as little as 20,000 baht (440 Euro) per month. But there are a few things you need to know before signing on the dotted line...

Using an agent: It is highly recommended that you use a reputable real estate agent to ensure you get the right advice, property selection and assistance in viewings. They will also help you negotiate the best rate possible. Going it alone is not advisable.

Rental prices: These range from as little as 10,000 baht per month up to 300,000 baht for luxury high-end villas with stunning ocean views and staff to cook and clean and provide a first-class service. The average three-bedroom pool villa in quiet areas such as Rawai and Nai Harn go for about 35,000 to 50,000 baht per month.

Rental term and utilities: A long-term rental is usually one year, but the tenant is expected that to stay in the property for a minimum of three months. Of course, this can be negotiated with the owner. In most cases the rent in-

cludes maid service, pool cleaning and a gardener, but utilities such as electric, water, cable or UBC TV and Internet are normally paid by the renter. Check with your agent or owner at the outset.

Internet: Most villa apartments have Internet, but not always broadband, so you should check what types of connections are available if it's important to you.

Rental payment: Rent is due on the first of each month in advance, and must be deposited in the owner's account as agreed at the time of booking. Failure to make payment within seven days of the due date is grounds for immediate eviction.

Security deposit: The owner will require a security deposit on booking which is normally two months' rent, and is held by the owner until checkout. As long as all the utilities and other bills have been paid, and there is no damage to the property, then the deposit will be returned in full, usually within 21 days of departure. This delay is caused by the owner having to wait for the latest utility bill.

Inventory: When checking in, the owner should provide an inventory list for you to check, agree and sign. We strongly recommend you inspect the furniture, take photos and inform the owner of any damage or scratches at the outset to avoid any disputes on checkout.

Lease agreement: Before you move in the owner should provide a standard lease agreement. The cost of this agreement is usually shared between the parties.

Insurance: It is recommended that you take out full insurance cover prior to occupation.

Misuse of the property: The owner reserves the right to interrupt service and evict the tenant without a refund due to noise complaints or any type of property abuse. Illegal activi-

ties will be cause for immediate eviction by local police.

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Gardeners' question time

READERS may or may not be familiar with an English radio program called Gardeners' Question Time.

Questions are launched by the public to a panel of experts, with invariably helpful results. While I don't pretend to possess their consummate gardening knowledge, I am always happy to solicit questions and provide informed answers.

One recent query concerned buying lilies. I responded that few varieties of lilies grow happily in southern Thailand. However, no mention was made of the one species that does indeed



grow well here, spathiphyllum cochlearispathum, commonly known as the peace lily. Technically, it's not a lily, but with its long-lasting snow-white spathes (hence the Latin name), it has much in common with the temperate arum lily.

The plant has two useful functions. One, it provides attractive ground cover in shady areas where it will spread rapidly.

Secondly, the *spathiphyllum* is an adaptable and hardy plant, one that graces many offices around Phuket. It's widely-available in local nurseries. This takes us to the next query about local garden

"Trying to find your suggested plants in Phuket proves difficult," a reader recently opined. "I appreciate you may not want to favor particular nurseries, but can you include more information as to where to find the plants featured?"

Always go to a garden center armed with a picture of the plant you are looking for. It's even more helpful if you know the Thai word for the flower or shrub in

Sadly, few books offer phonetic pronunciations for Thai. But one book that does is A Field Guide to Tropical Plants of Asia. Written by Engel and Plummai, it is published by Cavendish, and is currently in print.

The Thai workers in the nursery are far more likely to point you in the right direction if you ask for a leelawadee or puttaraksaa, instead of a *plumeria* or *canna*. So it's even better if you take a Thai friend along. He or she may even be able to negotiate a better price.

On the subject of individual nurseries, it would be instructive to hear about our readers' preferences. As always, your views are most welcome, and they are likely to be published in these columns. Share and share alike.

Searching for a recommended Thai nursery is further complicated by the fact that few nurseries advertise their names and even fewer do so in English.

A favorite of mine has a colorful sign written in Thai that's pronounced "gi-ra-sak". It offers good value, especially Chao Fa East. It's not cheap – on average, each plant costs about 150 baht but the shrubs are mature and the selection is much greater than in the average establishment.

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Tip of the week

Natural air conditioners

WE ALL appreciate that outdoor shrubs and especially large trees do a great job of absorbing carbon dioxide and releasing more healthy oxygen into our atmosphere.

But it's not universally known that many house plants act as air cleaners. How many gardeners know the specific virtues of certain indoor plants?

One of the most useful indoor plants is the peace lily (spathiphyllum). It goes silently bout its business, removing environmental contaminants and pollutants from the air. No wonder it's so popular in Phuket's corporate offices.

Another plant, the feston rose, a variety of lantana, also acts as a natural air purifier. Plus it produces lots of aromatic orange and red flowers.

Other beneficial plants include aglaonema and philodendron, which remove formaldehyde, and gerbera, which tackle benzene, a known carcinogen.

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




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Voodoo and Miss Saigon win Multihull

THE fourth South East Asian (SEA) Property International Phuket Multihull Championship reached an exciting conclusion on Sunday with David Liddell's *Miss Saigon* winning the inaugural Corsair Cup, and *Voodoo* skippered by Ian Coulson taking the Firefly 850 One Design Class.

Performance Multihull Class (PMC) was an extremely tight contest over the three days.

On the first day, Paul Larsen skippered the Andaman Cabriolet *DaVinci* off to a great start, but Alan Carwardine's *Sidewinder* reduced the gap and led around the top mark.

As the winds died, Sidewinder's lead disappeared, but Miss Saigon managed to pick up a breath of air which took her over the line in first ahead of DaVinci in second position.

Seven Fireflys began their challenge shortly after the PMCs got underway. Andy Pape in *The Frog* triumphed in race one with John Newnham's *Twin Sharks* close behind in second, and Roger Kingdon's *Moto Inzi* taking third.

Consistent 8-10 knot rainless conditions on day two allowed Race Officer (PRO) Simon James to run three races and get the Regatta back on track after the previous day's weather problems.

Sidewinder took line honors in all three races, but could only convert the final race into a handicap win. Miss Saigon won two races and placed second in race three, which put them in first according to the PMC points system when added to their first day victory.

A second and two third places for *DaVinci* earned them second overall. A second, third and first place from *Sidewinder* saw a good progression up the table, but that disastrous fifth place on the first day kept them in third overall.

Firefly 850 One Design Class day two saw *Voodoo* claim two wins, a third place, and hopes for an overall victory.

Moto Inzi's first two races achieved only second and fourth places, but a victory in the third race drew them level with Voodoo on points.

The Frog placed fifth in the first race, but followed with two second places to earn a share of first with Moto Inzi and Voodoo in a three-way tie on 10 points going in to the final day's racing.

With all to race on day three, PRO Simon James chose Island Course nine to decide proceedings. *Da Vinci* took a tack out to



oblivion, but managed to recover on the approach to Bon Island while *Sidewinder* led the fleet around the course.

Miss Saigon could not be shrugged off and eventually picked up the handicap win to have their name engraved on the very first Corsair Cup. DaVinci placed second just three seconds ahead of Sidewinder in third place

The Firefly contenders were given two chances to settle the final outcome on day three. In the

first race, *Voodoo* surged across the line ahead of Andrew Marshall's *Pink Lady* and *The Frog*, with only one minute separating the first five boats.

The second race saw *Voodoo* seal a resounding victory and become the undisputed champion while a second place for *The Frog* was enough to earn them second in the final standings. *Moto Inzi* battled into third place and was awarded third on the podium.



FC Phuket win five-goal cup thriller

A THRILLING five-goal encounter kept supporters from both FC Phuket and Sri Racha on edge when the teams met in Chonburi on July 13 to decide who would progress to the Toyota League Cup quarter finals.

Following the first leg 1-1 draw at Surakul Stadium on July 6, a game highlighted by a Nene Bi Tre Sylvestre penalty miss, Phuket traveled to Suzuki Stadium aware that a 0-0 draw would be enough to advance Sri Racha into the quarter-finals based on the away-goal rule.

Sri Racha's coach Dusit Chalermsaan said before the game that the pressure of sitting on a draw would be too great and his team would look to score and hold the advantage. It was imperative that Phuket score, and score first.

With substantial home support, Sri Racha were certainly the better side early in the

game. A cross from the left by Yodrak Namangrak gave Suphaporn Phompinit an early opportunity, but his attempt missed the target. Phuket's Kone Adama fouled Justin Moose moments later which earned the big Ivorian a yellow card from the referee.

Phuket had a chance of their own in the 11th minute when Niran Funtong's free kick from the right found Abdoul Coulibaly who sent his shot wide.

The second half exploded into life after just two minutes of play when Phuket's Ronnachai Jinakate barged his way from halfway to put Kone Adama through with a perfect pass. Adama made no mistake with his shot and watched as it ricocheted off the post into the goal to give Phuket the lead and a crucial away goal.

Seksit Srisai doubled Phuket's lead in the 50th minute, silencing the Sri Racha fans. The possibility of Sri Racha advancing with a scoreless draw evaporated in the space of three minutes, and was replaced by the

realization they needed to score three goals in less than 40 minutes.

Hope for a Sri Racha recovery was ignited in the 75th minute when Kroekrit Thawikan delivered a cross from the right and Phornsak Porntong drilled home his shot to put the score at 1-2.

The home crowd erupted with excitement when Aron Da Silva capitalized on a pass from Luis Eduardo in the 85th minute to bring the teams level at 2-2.

Phuket still had the advantage with two away goals and allowed Sri Racha to move forward in search of the win. The visitors soaked up the pressure, waiting to prey on any mistakes from the Sri Racha side who was desperate to score. In the 93rd minute Phuket's patience paid off. Using his strength to bundle Sri Racha defender Robert Diego off the ball, Adama sent a shot screaming past their goal keeperer Lucas Daniel to steal victory in the final moments.

A 3-2 score on the night gave Phuket a 4-3 aggregate win over their Sponsor Thai Premier League opponents and moves them into the quarter-final where a Toyota League Cup semi-final berth beckons.

Coach Sompong Wattana was delighted with the win and felt confident that if they kept this is form, they could beat any team in the Thai League.

Phuket's next league match against Ratpratcha FC is on July 30 at Mahidol Salaya Campus. Kickoff is scheduled for 4pm according to Siam Sport.

Sheffield football clubs for sale in Bangkok bar

AN UNDERCOVER investigation has revealed that the United Kingdom's two Sheffield-based football clubs were touted for sale in the back room of a Bangkok bar.

A group posing as Indian and Chinese businessmen were reportedly offered ownership of Sheffield United and Sheffield Wednesday by Thailand-based football investment fund London Nominees.

Channel 4's Dispatches program secretly filmed the meeting in Bangkok's Manchester United bar. Those involved included Former Thailand football manager and former Sheffield United manager Bryan Robson, who was seen as advising the London Nominees representative.

open to a takeover, were offered by Bangkok Manchester United bar owner, Joe Sim, to the undercover team as the 15 million main deal in the one-hour program.

Sheffield United Chairman Kevin McCabe's son Scott McCabe was pictured with Sim and members of the consortium on the pitch at Bramall Lane.

United confirmed they had met Joe Sim of London Nominees Football Fund as a potential buyer.

"We can only strongly repeat what was said by director Scott McCabe in the Dispatches program. The potential for any deal died a death," a representative insisted.

"Our owners, as good custodians of the Blades, would always insist that any potential sale of the club would be the subject of full due diligence checks. They are as concerned as anyone about the concealment of football club ownership and the issues of dual ownership. The McCabe family have a great love and affection for the Blades and will always have the long-term interests of the club at heart," they added.

"As far as Sheffield Wednesday is concerned the content of the program is irrelevant. The timeline of the investigation was March this year. Wednesday was taken over by Milan Mandaric in December last year," a Sheffield Wednesday spokesman said.


The program reported Sim as being the real power behind the fund and an alleged close contact of Sir Alex Ferguson and Mohamed bin Hammam, the man who tried to go for FIFA's top job, but was suspended pending an investigation into alleged violation of FIFA financial regulations.

At one point the investigative team also proposed that Robson would have to be manager of Sheffield Wednesday for any deal to go through.

However, one voice said off camera "no problem". "That would be difficult. I am now working as a global ambassador for Manchester United," Bryan Robson said.

Later, Robson and his associate said that Sheffield Wednesday has gone now and that they were taken over six months ago.

The London Nominees group

later denied it was offering ownership of two clubs – against Football League rules – but said it was offering an investment in a group that would put funds into the clubs.

Barnsley FC were also mentioned in the program when an investigator discovered the club was registered to Oakwell Holdings. Confusing matters was the fact that all Barnsley shares are registered to a Manchester solicitor who said he did not own the club, but could put the investigators in touch with the people who were.

Greg Clarke, Chairman of the Football League admitted he is not confident that he knows who the owners of every club in the Football League are, and said the complex ownership structures of many clubs made that virtually im-Source: The Star possible.



Pariwat shines in America

Pariwat Pinsawas, 14, from Phuket claimed a share of second place in the Callaway Junior World Golf Championships at Riverwalk Golf Club in California, United States, earlier this month.

A two-under-par third round of 70 secured Pariwat a final score of 211, and joint-second place in the 13-14 year age category with two other players: Americans Danny Hopoi and Corey Shaun.

The three young golf stars each finished on five-under par for the tournament.

Zecheng Dou from the US was the outright winner of the tournament. His consistent play earned him an eight-underpar 208 final score, three shots ahead of the trio in second place.

Pariwat deserved to stand alone in second having not exceeded 72 in any of his three rounds. Twice he shot under par: 69 on the first day, level par 72 on the second day, and birdies on holes 15 and 16 earned him a score of 70 in his last round at the San Diego course.

Hopoi shot an exceptional third round of 67 after a two-over-par 74 on the first day and 70 on the second. Shaun was slightly more balanced than his compatriot, card-

ing 69, 73 and 69 on respective days.

Another Thai player, Thanyathorn Saengpongnapa, placed ninth with a final score of 216. A disappointing finish for the youngster after he blew away the field in the first round with a stunning eight-under-par 64.

Well-known Phuket golfer Prachuab Subcharoen is Pariwat's grand uncle and coach.

"His mother, father, family and friends are very pleased with Pariwat's performance at these Junior World Championships. This was a great experience [for Pariwat] and he has learned a lot from playing against the best young players in the world," Prachuab said.

Prachuab had initially set his protege a target of finishing in the top three, and with this success the young golfer has returned to Thailand and joined the national squad at a training camp in Khon Kaen.

British Honorary Consul Martin Carpenter is a close friend of Prachuab and also a co-ordinator for the foreign youth players in the south of Thailand qualifying events, for which he generates sponsorship.

Martin is also involved in golf through his company, Phuket Concierge, who are distribution partners for Fenix, apparel


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
