Karon surf claims another tourist life

THE body of 27-year-old Chinese tourist Ruging Lin was found washed ashore Kata Beach last Saturday morning.

Mr Lin disappeared in heavy surf at Karon Beach just before sunset three days earlier.

"A hotel security guard found the body at about 5:30 am," said Karon Municipality Sea Rescue Center Chief Supachai Junphet.

"Mr Lin's identity has been confirmed and his family are communicating with the Chinese

consulate " he said.
"I believe they plan to cremate his body – now being kept Vachira Phuket Hospital - in Thailand, and probably just bring his ashes back to China," he said.

Mr Lin disappeared at about 6pm while swimming with his parents and girlfriend

He and his family apparently ignored red flags and entered the dangerous surf.

The drowning follows that of Australian tourist Jennifer Laidley, who disappeared in heavy surf at Karon Beach on July 5.

Drownings prompt beach patrol boost

LIFEGUARDS have boosted their patrols on Phuket beaches to help counter the rising number of tourists needing to be saved from dangerous surf and strong rip tides.

The move also comes in the wake of two tourists drowning at Karon Beach in recent weeks.

Uten Singsom, head of the Phuket Lifeguard Club contingent assigned to patrol Kata-Karon, said his lifeguards were posting extra red flags in danger zones to warn tourists.

However, he added that many swimmers were ignoring the warnings and entering the surf.

"We rescue seven to eight people from rip tides every day at Kata Beach, and about the same number each day at Karon Beach," he said.

"We are doing the best we can. We are posting more red flags in danger areas and clearly marking where it is safe to swim with yellow-red flags.

"We are also continually asking tourists to move and swim in the safe zones, but many tourists ignore our warnings and go swim-

ming where it is not safe," an exasperated Mr Uten said.

Tourists going swimming after dark is another key concern.

"Some tourists go swimming after 7pm, when it is dark and there are no lifeguards on the beaches. Last night [July 26], three Russians went swimming right where a rip current was marked with red flags, at about 7.30pm. It was the exact same spot where the Australian tourist Jennifer Laidley drowned," he said.

Two of the swimmers that night were caught in the rip current.

"Luckily, we had not yet left for the night and a big wave pushed them up onto a sand bar, so we could get them back safely on shore in about four minutes... If the wave had dumped them in a channel, I am not sure they would be all right," said Mr Uten.

Considering the current dangerous trend for tourists going night swimming in dangerous surf, he said lifeguards now kept their emergency radios on at all

Local taxi drivers were also helping to keep a watchful eye out, he added.

"Taxi drivers working in the area at night will inform us by radio if they see anyone needing help. We have rescue equipment ready near our lifeguard stations so we can attempt a rescue if needed.

"But it is difficult – and dangerous - attempting a rescue in the dark," he added.

Mr Uten cautioned all swimmers to obey the warning flags and to swim in clearly marked safe areas. "The waves will stay strong right through until the high season arrives," he said.

In the meantime, the beaches will remain generally open, Mr Uten said.

"It's not possible to close the beaches as it would have a big effect on the vendors who rely on the beaches for their income," he

Hotelier dies after early morning sidewalk crash

SWEDISH hotelier Lars-Goran band was driving his motorcycle, Salomonsson, 54, died early last Tuesday morning after sustaining injuries in a motorcycle accident in Patong.

Mr Salomonsson owned the Lars-Lita guest-house and restaurant in Patong with his wife, Lita.

After hearing the sound of a loud crash around dawn, witnesses found Mr Salmonsson lying in a pool of blood on the footpath of Soi Haad Patong near the Club Andaman Beach Resort.

Nearby was a broken concrete bench. His Honda Phantom motorcycle was lying on the road.

"A witness said that as my hus-

a fast-moving van approached from behind and passed him closely. He probably saw the van in his mirror and was frightened and quickly swerved to the right causing his foot peg to hit the curb," Mrs Lita said.

This caused Mr Salomonsson's bike to be tossed, throwing him into a concrete bench and onto the footpath, she said.

Rescue workers rushed Mr Salomonsson to Patong Hospital. He was later moved to Vachira Phuket Hospital in Phuket Town.

Mr Salmonsson died at about 11:30am that day.

High-speed crash kills two foreigners

TWO survivors of the car crash near Central Festival Phuket that killed two foreigners early last Friday morning have been released from hospital care.

Staff at Vachira Hospital Phuket told the Gazette that Russian national Alena Klimova, 28, was released after stainless-steel pins were inserted in her left leg and her right leg was fitted with a radial gutter splint.

Ms Klimova suffered two broken legs after the car she was travelling in slammed sideways into a power pole.

Fawaz Mubarak, 25, also from Kuwait, suffered minor injuries in the accident and was released from hospital last Saturday.

However, two of their companions were not so lucky.

The driver of the car, Lithuanian Tamara Latvijas Rabo, 31, died instantly in the crash and Kuwaiti Waleed MHH Alostad, 37, the front-seat passenger, later died at Phuket International Hospital

(PIH), said Police Duty Officer Kittiphum Tinthalang.

Police have confirmed that alcohol was not a factor in the accident. Capt Kittiphum said that Ms Rabo had not been drinking but was driving at a high speed

along a slightly downhill section of the road.

When she reached a set of orange "traffic poles" marking a U-turn area, she swerved, causing the car to spin before slamming into the power pole, he said.

Student denies chicken drug drop

THE university student caught delivering KFC chicken laden with drugs to an inmate at Phuket Prison on Monday has denied the charges against her.

Sathiya Jindakaew arrived at Phuket Prison on Monday to hand the chicken pieces to prisoner Teerawoot Kaengkhan, who is currently serving a drugs sentence at the jail, said Phuket Prison Chief Rapin Nichanon.

"We found 10 ya bah [methamphetamine] pills and 0.99 grams of ya ice [crystal methamphetamine] in small tubes pushed inside the pieces of chicken," he

However, Miss Sathiya denied any knowledge the drugs.

"I had no idea there were drugs hidden in the chicken. A man asked me to bring the chicken to Teerawoot, who is my brother's friend," she said.

Chief Rapin said the case had been handed over to the police for

further investigation.

Capt Tada Sodaruck of Phuket City Police confirmed to the Gazette that MIss Sathiya was charged with possession of ya bah and ya ice with intent to sell.

Prison Director Rapin said there were many instances of people trying to smuggle drugs and mo-

bile phones into the prison, either by throwing them over the prison walls or by hiding them among items to be passed to prisoners.

"Many visitors try to hide drugs in items to be handed to prisoners. We catch a lot of them, but some of them get through," he







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Patong tunnel plan inches ahead

RESEARCH consultants tasked with conducting a feasibility study on the controversial Kathu-Patong tunnel released the planned route for the project on July 20.

The proposed route would start from Soi Bang Thong on Phra Barami Rd near the Go-Kart Speedway in Kathu, tunnel through the hills and connect with Phang Muang Sai Kor Rd in Patong, explained Anurak Srisawaeng, one of the study panel members.

Mr Anurak explained at the public meeting that the total length of the proposed route is 3.07 kilometers.

"The route from Kathu will start with a four-lane, ground-level road about 625 meters long.

"The road will lead to twin tunnels, about 1,600m long, through the Nakkerd Hills," he said.

"At the end of the tunnels, the route will continue on a 504m elevated road which will become a six-lane road connecting to Phang Muang Sai Kor Road," Mr Anurak

Study project manager Pongchanit Chuwiruch said that public opinion will be taken into consideration, but the final deci-

sion will ultimately belong to the Ministry of Transport.

"Generally, projects do not need to have 100 per cent agreement [by all stakeholders] in order for construction to be approved," he


"But we definitely have to listen to opposition as well, and take suitable measures for them," he

One earlier concern had been safety and the need for evacuation routes, a contingency now addressed with the tunnels showing exit passages for people trapped inside.

However, several local residents repeated their concern over receiving inadequate compensation for land needed for the project.

Regardless, Mr Pongchanit said, "If everything goes well, without opposition or obstacles, the tunnel could be completed within six years."

Land reform checks stalls villagers claims

FEARS of land claims encroaching on protected forest land in Phuket have stalled local villagers being issued Chanote titles for plots they say they have full rights to.

About 200 residents from Patong, Kamala, Pa Khlok and Mai Khao appealed to the Phuket Governor on Monday to expedite their Sor Kor 1 land deeds being elevated to Chanote status.

The villagers say they want to develop the land for their children, but the Sor Kor 1 deeds they currently hold allow for agricultural use only, with no development of the land allowed.

Santi Sariya, subdistrict chief (Kamnan) of Kamala, pointed out that the villagers filed their applications two years ago after a policy laid down during the last Thaksin government.

The villagers, wanting to avoid court involvement, filed their applications before the two-year deadline, he said.

They have been waiting for Patong claims," he added. news from the Phuket Provincial

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Land Office (PPLO) ever since, he added.

However, Governor Tri Augkaradacha pointed out that many of the claims needed to be investigated to ensure the plots applied for did not extend into protected forest, and that at least five government agencies needed to agree on whether or not to issue a Chanote for any such plots.

Puchit Piddum, who took up the position of Phuket Provincial Land Office (PPLO) chief on July 19, said he needed time to look into the claims.

"Over the weekend, I looked briefly into the cases in Kamala. There are about 229 land plots being requested that still do not have land ownership documents issued.

"Most of the claims for plots in Kamla are either in reserved forest areas or adjoining them," he

Drug bust links to 'Bangkok Hilton'

POLICE made one arrest and seized over 17,000 ya bah (methamphetamine) pills in what they say is a major breakthrough in stopping a drug delivery chain from Bangkok to Phuket.

A provincial anti-drugs task force together with Border Patrol Police from Takuapa in Phang Nga arrested Prapan "Ae" Nammali during a sting operation in Saphan Hin Village last Sunday night.

A subsequent search of his house uncovered 17,300 ya bah pills and 150 grams of ya ice (crystal methamphetamine).

Mr Prapan, 36, told police that he collected drug shipments from "Mr Bas", who delivered them personally from Bangkok by bus.

The most recent delivery, his third shipment received, totaled 30,000 ya bah pills and one kilogram of ya ice with an estimated street value of more than five million baht.

Mr Prapan said he was hired as a distributor after police arrested "Mr Aod", who was found in possession of 30,000 ya bah pills on May 12.

After he sold each shipment, Mr Papan contacted "Mr A", who he named as the ringleader behind the deliveries.

Mr A would organize for money to be transferred to Mr Prapan's bank account: 30,000 baht for each of the first and second shipments, and 40,000 baht for this latest delivery.

Mr Prapan said Mr A was currently serving a prison sentence at Bang Kwang Prison in Bangkok, also notoriously known as the "Bangkok Hilton".

Mr A is allegedly serving a drugs sentence following his arrest in Phuket in 2005.

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Heavy rains trigger fatal trench collapse

A BURMESE migrant worker was buried alive at a Phuket construction site on July 25 when a large pile of dirt slid into the trench he was working in.

Min Hla Thein, 45, was working on a large drainage system at the Phuket Villa 5 project in Wichit when the landslide filled the 2.5-meter ditch, police said.

Phuket City Police Capt Somchai Nuubun arrived at the scene to find Mr Min's body placed in front of a backhoe next to the trench. His body did not have any visible injuries, he said.

Other workers were unable to dig through to Mr Min in time and he suffocated. Two of his coworkers had exited the trench only minutes earlier, Capt Somchai said.

Police suspect that recent rains contributed to the landslide, but are also investigating the contractor's decision to place piles of dirt alongside the trench.

The incident comes only days after new legislation came into effect to enforce stricter employer





Predicting

CHANGES in climate and misuse of land have increased the risk of landslides in Phuket, Phang Nga and other provinces, the Department of Water Resources warned.

"In recent years, we have seen an increase in heavy downpours of rain focused on specific areas – not distributed over wider areas as in the past," Wiwat Sojoeiya, Director at the Department of Water Resources, said at a public hearing in Phuket Town on July 20.

"Housing and hotel construction projects on hilltops and near water sources are also contributing to the increased risk," he added.

The hearing was held to announce progress and collect feedback on the government's campaign to implement a nationwide landslide early warning system, a project that began in 2005.

Director Wiwat explained that the project's objective is to alert villagers one to two hours before a landslide occurs.

"After [automated] stations have been setup in areas at risk from landslides, rain and soil measurements are sent to hydrologists for further analysis.

"When a risk is determined, station officers will coordinate with local and relevant organizations such as the Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation (DDPM) to organize a timely evacuation of the affected villages," director Wiwat said.

A booklet released by the DDPM lists two types of early warning stations. The first type is built near a water source – such as a lake or pond – and is designed to collect and analyze rainfall measurements

Equipped with an automated

rain gauge, soil moisture sensor, thermometer, warning light, speaker set and an equipment cabinet, each station can service villages within a radius of about five kilometers.

The second type is setup at or near a bridge, along a stream or river and is designed to monitor water level fluctuations. Optimally, it can give up to three hours warning to at-risk villages downstream.

Its facilities comprise an automated water level measuring device, rain gauge, thermometer, equipment cabinet, warning light, speaker set and a water level indicator post installed near the station.

Other measurements collected at the stations include soil temperature and moisture levels. Data is forwarded via GPRS to the Water Resources Department in Bangkok, which serves as the national data collection and monitoring center.

Director Wiwat said, "The system automatically sends data to the monitoring center every 15 minutes. Our officers work on rotating shifts to closely monitor the data 24-hours-a-day, especially during the rainy season.

Local representatives are responsible for monitoring and maintaining equipment at the stations. In the event of equipment malfunction, they can inform us to come and fix it. We [Department of Water Resources] coordinate with the DDPM to train the local reps."


As for the primary warning mechanism, stations are equipped with a loud speaker and a three-light system: green, yellow and red.

"A green light means monitoring is in progress, yellow is to give warning to people to collect their important belongings in preparation for an evacuation, while red tells villagers to migrate out of the

area and up to a safe place as quickly as possible," Director Wiwat explained.

Analyses conducted by the department has identified 2,370 landslide-risk village areas nationwide, 40 of those are in Phuket and 58 in Phang Nga.

"1,567 villages are already under early warning coverage, while the other 803 – including a remaining 15 in Phuket, and 21 in Phang Nga – will be under coverage soon.

"This year, 268 data collection stations will be built to bring the remaining villages in 37 provinces under coverage," Wiwat said.

"Using a budget of about 155.6 million baht, the stations will be installed mostly around hillsides in the northern, western and southern regions of Thailand.

"However, our analyses is still ongoing. The number of risk areas across the country is expected to increase as a result of deteriorating ecological conditions," he emphasized.

"The project contract is due to expire on April 1, 2012. The [remaining] equipment and facilities will be ready by the end of this year, after which they will need to go through a test phase before being fully operational," he said.

Documents provided by the department show that there are plans to build three data collection stations with coverage of fifteen risk villages in Phuket.

The first station will cover seven at-risk villages in Phuket's Rassada, Koh Kaew and Wichit municipalities.

The second will be built in Rawai and the third in Sakoo municipality in Thalang, each will cover four villages.

Phuket's six existing stations

which cover 25 villages – were built in Sri Sunthon, Karon, Mai Khao, Kamala – Cherng Talay, Thepkrasattri and Chalong-Wichit.


The documents also list 10 stations to be built in neighboring Phan Nga province, identifying 21 risk villages in the following districts: Koh Yao, Ta Kua Tung, Mueang Phang Nga, Tai Mueang, Takua Pa and Ka Pong districts. Phang Nga currently has 14 stations covering 37 atrisk villages.

"Before proceeding, we would like to get feedback and opinions from the people living in the risk areas as to achieve maximum benefit," Mr Wiwat told the *Phuket Gazette*.

"Actually, we would prefer to make improvements in [maintaining] ecology and water sources in forest areas to make the ground more firm to hold tree roots," he said.

"It is our opinion that a preventive approach would be more beneficial than an early warning system," he added.





Wind power heading offshore

KOH Lone School will receive their first free wind turbine in August thanks to a joint initiative by a Japanese manufacturer and the Phuket Provincial Energy Office (PPEO).

PPEO Chief Jirasak Tummawetch along with representatives from A-Wing Co Ltd, the Thai affiliate of the Japanese small wind turbine manufacturer, made the announcement at a meeting with Phuket Vice Governor Somkiet Sangkhaosutthirak.

A-Wing set up operations in Thailand to lower production costs and better supply the ASEAN region with their products. The planned turbine has a production capacity of 1,000 watts and will be a step toward relieving Koh Lone, located off Phuket's southwest coast, of its electrical supply shortages.

"Each Koh Lone household currently pays about 2,000 baht a month to run their generator, but this only provides them with four hours of electricity per day. They are having trouble," Mr Jirasak said.

"We are drawing up a plan to request 18 million baht from the

Ministry of Energy and a Swedish fund in order to install wind turbines, solar panels and hydroelectricity generators on the island so that residents have access to a continuous supply of electricity," he added.

Mr Jirasak explained that one small wind turbine could generate enough electricity to supply a single household.

"This wind turbine can start generating electricity at wind speeds as low as 1.5 meters per second... I think wind energy can be harnessed to supply power for streetlights and small hotels," he added.

Arine Thongsthit, business coordinator at A-Wing explained that the company is aiming to bring electricity to areas where there has been no previous supply.

"A-Wing International donated four 500-watt wind turbines to Koh Paluay in Surat Thani in February as part of the Ministry of Energy's Green Island project," she said.

V/Gov Somkiet expressed his support for the project, saying, "In the future, it will be possible

for people to use wind turbines to generate their own personal electrical supply, especially those who live in houses on hillsides or residents who live far away from main power supplies."

Big Buddha Hill was a potential site for the next wind turbine installation, Mr Jirasak said.

"Wind speeds there reach about six meters per second, which is quite strong when used for producing energy. I think we should support the temple with wind turbines because it is still relying on generators," he said.

Dane's death 'accidental': Investigation

THE Danish man found dead at a Phuket hotel Tuesday last week likely died as a result of diabetes and heavy drinking and smoking, police said.

The body of 62-year-old Preben Thamsen Schmidt was found in the gardens of the Print Kamala Resort early in the morning. He had wounds to his face and arms and was last seen drinking in front of his hotel room at 1am.

Lt Col Anek Mongkol of Kamala Police said there would be no medical examination, as Mr Schmidt's wife is certain he died as a result of a combination of his illness and addictions.

"His wife said she has no doubts about his death being a result of behavior and the diabetes," Lt Col Anek said.

"Our initial investigation indicates that his death was an accident. He was drunk and fell," he said.

"We assume that the wounds on his face were caused by rocks or other solid objects when he fell off the [ground floor] walkway. We do not think this case involves violent crime," he said.

Debt blamed for woman's suicide

POLICE believe an unpaid debt of 6,000 baht was the catalyst that prompted a 40-year-old woman to commit suicide last week.

Phuket City police responded to an early afternoon report last Wednesday, arriving at a home in Rassada to find Sangob Ratpan hanged by a scarf tied to water pipe in her bathroom.

"Ms Sangob's sister told us that three female friends of hers came to the room and asked for 6,000 baht she had borrowed," said Lt Col Ekkasit Pinkaew.

"They argued for a while after Ms Sangob was unable to pay, then the friends left. Her sister entered the room about an hour later and found a suicide note on a table and

Ms Sangon's body in the bathroom," he added.

Lt Col Ekkasit explained that Ms Sangon was from Thung Song in Nakhon Sri Thammarat and that no wounds or signs of a struggle were found in the room.

"The suicide note indicated that she killed herself to escape the 6,000 baht debt and other problems she faced.

Mother shoots child, self over hauntings

A POLICE investigation into a mother's suicide after attempting to murder her infant daughter took a bizarre turn when a "curse-cleansing" ritual was held at the local police station.

Last week, Siripat Kongkla, the 31-year-old wife of Nonthaburi City Police Officer Kongcham Kongkla, reportedly shot their five-year-old daughter using her husband's 9mm handgun before turning the weapon on herself.

Mr Kongcham said he was taking a shower when the incident occurred.

After realizing what happened, he rushed his critically injured daughter to the hospital and alerted rescuers to help his wife.

Mrs Siripat was later pronounced dead at the hospital while their daughter, Prapilai "Beam", was unconscious and in critical condition.

Police questioning of both Mr Kongcham and his neighbors of the Kongklas indicated that there were no apparent disputes or warning signs in the time leading up to the shooting.

However, relatives revealed that Mrs Siripat had been complaining about the police station's banyan tree spirit haunting her dreams.

The hauntings began when the family moved into police housing a month earlier when Mr Kongcham was promoted.

Mrs Siripat interpreted the dreams as warnings that something bad would befall the family



if they didn't move.

This led her to believe that the police station was cursed by past misdeeds and depression when she was unable to persuade her husband to move to their other home in Bang Bua Thong.

As her mental state deteriorated, she threatened to take their daughter and leave Mr Kongcham.

The revelations incited fear among the policeman's colleagues and other residents in the building. Nonthaburi city police officers took time off duty last Thursday to make mass offerings and perform rites to appease the revered guardian spirit.

Banyan trees are known as a sacred fig throughout Thailand and South Asia, believed to be the home of guardian spirits.

The trees are easy to spot due to the small shrines that are commonly attached to their multi-sprouted trunk.

Offerings are made to appease guardian spirits and bring good fortune, but any harm, misdeeds or evil acts – to the tree itself or occurring within its immediate proximity – are believed to have the opposite effect.

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Yingluck under fire over Cabinet selection claims

Shinawatra has come under fire from critics who claim her family is deciding who will take seats in her Cabinet.

New opposition MP Chuwit Kamolvisit said the allocation of Cabinet seats was being dominated by Yingluck's brother Thaksin, another brother Payap Shinawatra and sister Yaowapha Wongsawat.

The accusations helped fuel the perception that Yingluck is the nominee of her

PRIME minister in waiting Yingluck brother Thaksin, who once described his younger sister as his "clone".

"Instead of making colorful comments, just you wait and see my Cabinet first," said Yingluck.

She said the filling of ministerial portfolios would be vetted and approved by the Pheu Thai executive board, denying the involvement of Thaksin or other members of the Shinawatra clan.

Thai law states the Parliament must con-

vene its first meeting within 30 days of an election. It cannot convene until 95 per cent of MPs are endorsed by the Election Com-

As of July 24, 402 of 500 MPs had been endorsed, with several key red-shirt leaders on Pheu Thai's party list yet to be

EC chairman Apichart Sukhagganond said last week that he was confident the EC would make the endorsements in time.

Democrat 'star' faces corruption charges

DEMOCRAT Party star Apirak Kosiyodhin's campaign to become the party's next secretary-general has been dealt a blow after the National Anti-Corruption Commission (NACC) filed graft charges against him and four other men.

The charges relate to the 6.68billion-baht purchase of fire trucks and boats from Austrian firm Steyr-Daimler-Puch during Mr Apirak's tenure as governor of the Bangkok Metropolitan Administration. The equipment was reportedly worth only 3 to 3.5 billion baht.

Also facing charges are former interior minister Bhokin Bhalakula, former deputy interior minister Pracha Maleenont, former commerce minister Wattana Muangsuk, and former director of the BMA Fire and Rescue Department Pol Maj Gen Atilak Tanchukiat.

The NACC has accused the five men and the Austrian company of abusing power and colluding to arrange the deal.

Mr Apirak is accused of negligence for signing a letter of credit for the deal in 2004, despite knowing that the project was mired with irregularities. He stepped down as BMA governor in 2008 to take responsibility for the scandal.

Army chopper crashes spark spooky rumors

AROUND THE nation

THREE helicopter crashes on the Thai-Burma border killing 17 people within nine days have left Thailand searching for answers – with the superstitious blaming the tragedies on angry jungle spirits.

The first accident happened on July 16, when a Huey (UH-1H) crashed in jungle in Phetchaburi's Kaeng Krachan National Park, killing five soldiers.

The chopper had been making sorties to take a team of soldiers and journalists hunting encroachers out of the forest.

Three days later, a Black Hawk, one of just seven owned by the Royal Thai Army, disappeared while on a mission to recover bodies from the first crash.

Hopes were high that those on the second mission were safe until July 22, when the wreckage of the Black Hawk was discovered. All nine passengers, including Channel 5 cameraman Sornchai Kongtannikul, were killed.

Then on July 24, a third helicopter crashed in the same area

while attempting to retrieve bodies from the second accident. Three of the four soldiers on board were killed, bringing the death toll to 17.

"I am so sorry for what happened. Three more lives were lost," said Thai Army aviation commander Maj Gen Pitaya Krajangwong.

The first two crashes seemed to have been caused by bad weather, while the third resulted from a faulty tail rotor, he said.

Sgt Pattanaporn Tonjan, the

mechanic who survived the third crash, was quoted as saying that the two engines suddenly stopped working at the same time.

But some observers believe there is something more sinister at play, blaming the crashes on "bad omens".

"The guardian spirits here are very fierce," one local villager was quoted as saying.

The sequence of tragedies has put the Army on the defensive, with questions being asked about the safety of its helicopter fleet.

Army chief Gen Prayuth Chanocha reacted angrily to media reports and academics who questioned the decision making of the Army's senior leaders.

He called on them to show responsibility for causing a drop in the morale of army aviation per-

Gen Prayuth attended the funeral in Kanchanaburi of Maj Gen Tawan Ruengsri, the highest-ranking casualty, among others. He traveled from Bangkok by road, instead of taking a helicopter.

Mr Schneider argues that the plane is the property of the Thai government. The government insists it is the Crown Prince's personal property, arguing it was given to him by the Royal Thai Air Force in 2007.



Taking a slide

ANOTHER rainy season in Phuket, and yet another death from a landslide. The trench collapse on Monday that killed Burmese laborer Min Hla Thein came just nine days after new workplace health and safety legislation came into effect.

Among the main aims of the new regulations was to make employees legally liable for not following safety requirements laid down by law and company policy. Anyone in the construction industry would not have to look far to discover that when digging trenches in questionable earth, the first priority is reinforcing the walls to ensure that workers are not crushed by a cave-in.

Whether the lack of reinforcement of the trench walls will be unearthed by the "investigation" into this latest incident remains to be seen, but the news of a landslide-related death should not have come as a surprise. Phuket's safety record for landslides on construction sites speaks for itself.

Last year project foreman Thawisak Nukaeo and a laborer identified only as "Neung" died while – in a bitter irony – they were building a retaining wall for a resort under construction on Soi Sang Krasee off Nanai Road in Patong.

The other worker caught by the landslide, identified only as "Sorn", escaped death but was rushed to hospital for injuries.

In 2008, three Burmese were crushed by landslide at a construction site on 50 Pi Road. In 2007, a landslide off Nanai Rd Soi 9 left buildings hanging precariously while smothering a Burmese laborers' camp below, trapping an 18-month-old child. Luckily no one was seriously injured in that incident.

And earlier this month guests and staff at the Orchidee Residences in Patong escaped almost certain death when boulders hurtled down from a road construction project high in the hills above them, crashing into the building, uprooting trees and bringing tons of earth along with them.

And all this follows year after year of public warnings and landslide "preparedness" training exercises. How much more warning do we need to stop any more people from needlessly dying?

One common denominator throughout all these landslides over the years is that the first in line to suffer is the ubiquitous Burmese worker, the unsung hero of Phuket's construction boom. At least this year there seems to be something new: we have a person's name to report, not just a nickname or a no-name somebody who just paid the ultimate price for developing a "Greater Phuket".

Perhaps now with a new death fresh in people's minds, contractors might exercise more caution. Considering that building any resort or hotel in Phuket in less than six months would be a magnificent feat, the least contractors can do is to build the retaining walls and any other reinforcement barriers first and get on with the rest of the work thereafter.

Whether the island's scrupulous developers and contractors will start doing this as an "industry standard' – with or without any pressure from the authorities – remains to be seen.

has a special team at Suvarnabhumi Airport. They cooperate with drug enforcement bodies from many countries in exchanging information and to block drug

It is now a concern that traffickers will use Phuket as a new point of entry into Thailand. I plan to set up a team at Phuket International Airport to stop this from happening. We will begin when the new government has finalized their drug enforcement

Tourists visiting Phuket should not be concerned about this. The team will only check travellers who raise suspicion.

Tourism development should be another issue on the new government's agenda. I have already met with the Pheu Thai Party's economic team and discussed projects in Saphan Hin. They have asked for an initial report and aim to build a hotel, IT center and improve infrastructure to help develop Phuket to a standard that is equal to Singapore.

The economics team also con-

firmed that the budgets approved by the previous government for the Klong Phee Road project, Phuket International Convention and Exhibition Center (ICEC) and the expansion of Phuket International Airport will remain intact.

These projects will take time because the budgets are not managed by Phuket officials, we only coordinate with the relevant offices. The Highways Department is in charge of the Klong Koh Phee Road project, the Treasury Department is responsible for the ICEC and the Ministry of Transportation is overseeing the airport expansion.

Moving on to the minimum wage increase, I think Phuket consumers will be the hardest hit by this change. At this time, the minimum wage is at a peak of 224

The new government should gradually increase the minimum wage to 300 baht over the course of four years, not all at once. This keeps their promise and gives businesses time to manage

"HOW dare those conniving migrant workers steal our rights, identities and jobs – they need to be dealt with, pronto!"

This is the type of nationalistic sentiment that is perpetuated by both politicians and civilians alike.

It is not limited to Thailand either. A similar dilemma has spurred the ire of "patriots" in the United States where migrant workers are used as a scapegoat for everything from the low standards of education and health care to rising unemployment rates.

It's true that most employers in the US now prefer, if not require, applicants who can speak English and Spanish, and that schools and hospitals are struggling to accommodate the swelling population of alien children. Let's be fair, most Americans can't be bothered to do the back-breaking labor for the same wages and hours that immigrants are willing to accept.

Moreover, those who think that fundamental health and education services are exclusive rights to be determined by immigration status have a lot of catching up to do.

These points do beg the question, however, whether the livelihoods of Americans and Thais are really threatened by alien laborers.

Let's recall the underlying reason why there is even a demand for a migrant workforce in the first place. Does anybody really believe someone wakes up one day and has a revelation: "Today I'm going to cross the border and steal my neighbor's job, and while I'm a lot of jobs.

Four tennis courts are available for public use at the Saphan Hin Sports Center, which is open daily from 6am to 9:30pm. The facilities are closed during New Year and Songkran holidays.

Monthly membership costs 250 baht per adult or 150 baht per month for people under 25 years old.

Making room in Jungceylon

BUSINESSES and homeowners who are having trouble finding storage space now have the option of using a unique storage facility located in the compounds of Jungceylon shopping mall.

With a fire-resistant building equipped with advanced access systems, My Storage is the only service in Phuket that offers dedicated storage space for households and businesses. Robert Akerblom, general manager of My Storage, said that the idea for the storage facility came to him out of personal frustration.

"When we first came to Phuket we had a lot of personal belongings with us. After quite an extensive search for a suitable place to temporarily store our belongings, we found a local company offering storage. However, when we finally came back to collect our goods and move into a new home a number of months later, most had been damaged due to weather, water leakage and vermin," Robert explained.

Phuket's real estate sector has seen much growth in the last decade, with many new houses, villas and condominiums being built and rented out. According to Robert, the industry's continued growth has prompted new demand for storage services.

"A number of expats are relocating to Phuket, either temporarily, seasonally or Some people store them in the house itself,

permanently. Expats make up a large proportion of home renters in Phuket. Some of these foreigners, however, spend only a few months each year in Phuket," Robert explained.

"When they leave to go abroad, they often have problems with personal belongings. but many want to sublet their empty houses to other renters. Therefore they need a separate place for their belongings," Robert added.

In August 2010, My Storage rented a concrete building next to Jungceylon shopping mall and fitted it with 255 storage units of different sizes, ranging from one cubic

meter lockers to 25m3 storage rooms. The main entrance to the storage units is accessible with a PIN code. The individual storage units are locked using the customers' own locks. Unit rental costs range from 995 to 16,250 baht per month, depending on the size of the storage area.

"Most of our customers so far have been foreigners, as expected. There are still quite a few Thais who are unaware of our service. However, we have only been open for a year and our services are gaining awareness not just from expats and home renters, but from businesses for inventory storage as well," Robert said.

When asked about security for the facility, Robert said that the company guarantees the safety of customers' belongings.

"It is our job to make sure that customers' belongings are safe around the clock. Our facility is fitted with state-of-the-art security systems, including an advanced access system, 24-hour CCTV monitoring and an intruder alarm system," Robert explained.

"If, for any reason, our customers' belongings are damaged or destroyed in our care, we will compensate our customers for the loss. For customers who rented out locker units, we are able to compensate up to 100,000 baht in damages. For larger storage units, we are able to compensate up to 500,000baht," he added.

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Phuket receives B3.6bn in BOI investment

THE upper-southern chapter of Thailand's Board of Investment (BOI) continues to sponsor more investment projects in Phuket. June this year saw BOI-sponsored investment in Phuket increase by 1.8 billion baht month-on-month, bringing the total investment in

Phuket for the first half of 2011 to more than 3.6bn baht, according to BOI statistics.

In comparison, during the same period last year, BOI-sponsored investment in Phuket reached about 1.7bn baht. Investment projects sponsored by the BOI created 659 new jobs for Thais on the island during the first half of this year. In the same period last year, BOI-sponsored projects created 288 new jobs for locals.

Total BOI-sponsored investment in Phuket reached 3bn baht by the end of last year. This year, it has reached 3.6bn baht in the first half, or 62 per cent of total BOI-investment in the upper-southern chapter.

In June, the BOI sponsored a 150 million baht investment in the Phuket Air Catering Company. The company supplies packaged food toThai Airways and other major airlines operating from Phuket International Airport. The company's expansion will create an additional 350 new jobs for Thais.

Since the beginning of this year, two hotel projects have been sponsored by the BOI. One of them is the construction of a 350-room hotel in Patong. The project is being headed by the Fisherman Harbor Company, with a total investment of almost 1.7bn baht.

The second project that has recently been announced is the construction of a 50-room hotel, located on Laem Nga Cape on Koh Sireh. The total investment approved for this project is around 1.8bn baht, but a source within Cape Nga Development Company said that the project is still in its initial planning stages and construction of the project has yet to begin. Once completed, the project should create up to 200 new jobs for local Thais in Phuket.

According to the BOI, the investment climate for the second half of 2011 should be even better than the first half. Throughout the uppersouthern chapter, which includes Phuket and six other provinces, there are 22 projects that are still in the pipeline waiting for BOI sponsorship approval. The total investment for these projects is projected at more than 7.8bn baht. Most of the investment is within agricultural and service sectors.

Construction companies lament increase in wages

CONSTRUCTION companies in Phuket are bracing themselves for the nationwide increase in the minimum wage rate to 300 baht per day.

Many of Phuket's construction firms have voiced concerns that the wage increase, which is set to become mandatory at the beginning of next year, will adversely affect Phuket's construction industry, which relies heavily on cheap labor.

Khanicha Chamklang, general manager of Indo-Construction Thailand said that at the moment, the minimum wage in Phuket's construction industry is 221 baht per day. Should the wage increase be implemented, construction companies will see their labor costs rise by around 35 per cent.

"This is going to be a big problem for construction companies on the island. This is because contractors sometimes have to sign binding agreements with customers several months in advance before construction can go ahead," Ms Khanicha said.

"Before signing contracts with customers, including price agreements, construction firms have to take into account the cost of fuel, labor and raw materials.

"It is the duty of construction firms to anticipate slight changes in costs and factor them in when pricing," Ms Khanicha explained.

"However, such drastic increase in labor costs, from 221 baht to 300 baht per day is not

something that construction companies are prepared for. Because we cannot alter the contracts which have already been signed, many construction firms are going to face losses on existing projects that have already been started," she added.

Indo-Construction Thailand is a large constructor of condominium and villa projects in Phuket.

The firm has been operating on the island for more than five years. Ms Khanicha said that the increase in wages is going to lower profit-margins for Phuket's construction industry. Much of the cost increase will likely be passed onto customers, leading to increased construction prices, which may hinder demand for new construction projects and negatively affect foreign investment on the island.

"Labor costs are likely to increase across the board, even for employees that currently earn higher than the minimum wage rate.

"This is because if we radically increase wages for the lowest income laborers, then more skilled laborers and employees are likely to demand a wage raise," Ms Khanicha explained.

"The increase in minimum wage is therefore likely to lead to a much higher increase in labor costs for construction firms in Phuket," she added.

According to an earlier report from the *Phuket Gazette*, the construction industry is the largest employer of low-wage laborers in Phuket. Most laborers working in the island's construction industry are alien workers from Myanmar, Cambodia or Laos.

As of April 2011, construction companies in Phuket hired 16,224 foreign workers, or around 51 percent of the total alien workforce in Phuket.

New Starbucks logo reveal will be in Central



The new logo has no lettering.

COFFEE shop chain Starbucks Coffee will introduce a new branding logo at its Central Festival Phuket branch, and plans to introduce the logo nationwide.

"Starbucks at Central Festival will be the first branch in Phuket to use the new logo," said Starbucks Coffee Operation Director Somchit Vutiputanunt.

"The logo is more modern and simple and does not include lettering. Consumers will see the logo and know it's Starbucks right away," he added.

"We can not change the logo in all 143 branches nationwide at once. It will take many years and a huge budget, which has already been set. From here on, new branches being built around Thailand will use the new logo. Shops being renovated will also use the new logo."

The Central Festival Phuket branch recently reopened on July 21 after being renovated for a month. The new logo had not been put up at the time this newspaper went to print.

There are eight branches in Thailand's southern region, seven in Phuket and one in Ao Nang, Krabi. Phuket branches include five in Patong one at Central Festival Phuket and one in Kata.

Surprise island internet speeds

the method for measuring internet speeds, as reported on PhuketInternetSpeed.com. Be-

fore that point, we were measuring international download speeds using a technique that was prone to caching - Internet Ser-

vice Providers, using tools that are actually beneficial to customers like us, automatically bypassed the speed testing regimen. So we switched to a speed testing site that can't be cached. (To see the details of how and why we changed, start at www.phuketgazette.net/ computers and look at the Live Wire columns for June 8 and 16.)

The results, at least to me, are stunning. Ready to bust some myths?

Based on this early data, True's Ultra 10 Mbps service – the one that uses Cable TV style coax cables and a technology known as DOCSIS (see July 7 Live Wire), gives the fastest all-around speeds on the island. I didn't see any significant benefit in Ultra 20 Mbps over 10 Mbps, but we don't have enough reports yet to say for sure.

Surprisingly, TOT's 5, 6 and 8 Mbps lines pull in next – but they all run international downloads at basically the same speed, so there's no reason to pay for a faster line. (TOT has just announced a marketing program called "Net Zing" that has lines at 3, 6, 9, 12 and 15 Mbps. We'll be tracking those in the future.)

True pulls up the next couple of slots, with its 6 Mbps ADSL line garnering faster reported speeds than its 10 Mbps line. 3BB has fallen from its number one spot as the fastest service on the island, a couple of years ago, to dead last place. CAT's wireless EV-DO (which they call "3G" but, in fact, won't work with 3G phones or iPads) shows a respectable 1 Mbps. The new AIS

A little less than two months ago we changed and True 3G services will both have a hard time keeping up with that pace.


service from the graph for two reasons. First, the numbers we're seeing would have skewed the graph so it would be

impossible to read - as you can see at www.PhuketInternetSpeed.com, Fiber 2U lines at 20 Mbps and 10 Mbps are running consistently in the 6 to 9 Mbps range, blowing everything else out of the water. But dig a little deeper and you'll also see people reporting outages, frequently, all over the island. Here's a typical comment: "I am very disappointed with the quality of the service. It only works now and then, and normally I have to request a download of a web page three or four times."

It looks like much of the problem with TOT Fiber 2U lies with the routers (you might call them "modems"). I'm hearing reports from many people that the standardissue TOT Fiber routers don't work worth beans, but they can and will install better routers if you're insistent. By the time you read this, it's entirely possible that they've fixed the problem. We'll find out on the next speed summary.

A note on the methodology. Khun Roger, who's one of the regulars at the Sunday morning Computer Clinics, pulled the numbers together. We dropped any service that only has one person reporting the speeds. We also dropped the "zeros" - which indicate no service at all. TOT Fiber, 3BB and True all had multiple reported outages. Surprisingly, in spite of anecdotal evidence to the contrary, TOT ADSL service was pretty stable over the past two months.

part of the story. Caching, which wreaked havoc on the speed reports, is a good thing - it makes your internet faster. If you're using sites that have server farms in or near Thailand (including, perhaps surprisingly, Gmail/Google and Hotmail/Microsoft), these numbers don't apply. If you're downloading torrents, international download speeds only tell part of the story. Location can make a huge difference.

Most of all, this isn't a scientific study: it's self-reported, non-replicable and far from random. So understand that the numbers here are indicative, not definitive. That said, I think the numbers speak volumes.

If you aren't yet reporting your internet speeds, head over to PhuketInternet

Speed.com and sign up. The more reports we get, the more accurate the information will be – and the more likely Phuket's Internet Service Providers will stand up and take notice. You're welcome to download the information on the site – there are easy ways to filter and download the data – and analyze it any way you like. Putting yourself in the shoes of a money manager

Some managers lack the incentive to earn you a positive investment return

THERE are many types of funds out there, and many types of fund managers. For simplicity, let's divide the managers into two camps: those who can consistently make money and those who can't.

If you place yourself into both of their shoes and consider the types of investment fund structures out there, you can learn a lot about which types of funds are likely to provide consistent returns.

ager wants to make as much money as possible. I know you are probably thinking; "Never. Money managers want to do a great job for their investors and protect their investors' hard-earned capital". But in this case, just give me the benefit of the doubt.

Consider that fund managers generally fall into two types, one where the majority of their income is received as an incentive fee for Let's assume every money manthe profits earned by their clients,

and one where there is no incentive fee and their entire income is derived as a per cent of the assets under management.

Next, let's look at the way the performance of these funds are compared. Strangely enough, the funds which don't charge incentive fees almost always compare themselves to a benchmark that has had many losing years, and will often proudly announce that it has "outperformed the benchmark by x per cent" when, in fact, it has lost significant amounts of money.

Incentive-driven funds often use 0 per cent as their benchmark every single year, and they don't collect an incentive fee until they get their fund back above the highest value its ever been at, which is known as a high water mark.

Getting back in the shoes of a money manager, if you were to open a fund tomorrow, what type of structure would you set up? Well, assuming that you want to make the most money for yourself, the answer depends on how confident you are that you can earn a consistent profit.

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If you can, you will make the most money out of an incentivedriven structure. If not, you'd probably just open up a mutual fund that is the flavor of the month so it will be easy to market, and hope to lose less than the index when the next bear market comes.

If one under-performs in the market, that fund can be scrapped in place of a new one. This, contrary to popular belief, is a widespread practice by the big banks.

Having an incentive-driven structure is, however, no guarantee either. In fact, it often leads to fund managers taking excessive risks. Plenty of research into a fund manager's overall strategy is recommended, including the leverage they use and the markets in which they trade.

A long track record, while n guarantee, is much better than investing in an upstart manager with no experience. A properly-diversified portfolio can further protect you from any one fund manager's mistakes, and can be offset by the continued success of the other managers in your portfolio.

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

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Culinary delight at Amari

THERE was a decidedly cigar-laden Germanic presence last Friday evening at the Rim Talay restaurant in Amari Coral Pearl. The get together was organized to showcase Executive Chef Thomas Vanderlieb's culinary chops along with the wines of Julien Barthe of Francois Lurton Wines, a finewine exporter with 70 labels sourced from five different regions worldwide.

Prompting pre-dinner tipsiness, a crisp Argentinean Chardonnay is served to the assembled guests.

Rim Talay means 'by the sea' in Thai, and the setting is nothing short of fabulous. We're allocated seats and swiftly tuck into stuffed quail-on-herb salad with bacon vinaigrette. The perfect-textured and delicious appetizer is served in a bowl made out of ice, which although inventive, is somewhat difficult to eat from. This is accompanied by a fruity Spanish white wine, which has a character and body to rival Penelope Cruz.

A trio of oyster, sole and monkfish follows - washed down with a French Sauvignon Blanc. The salty tangs of the seafood troika cleverly counterpoint the white wine. The wine also begins to break down barriers between neighboring diners, who are discovering that they enjoy the same music, and that the world's a fine place with a belly full of wine and lashings more to come.

A lentil soup with a fillet of rabbit portents a rather noisy late evening organ recital, but luckily Chef Thomas has gauged the cooking time just right, and the Portuguese dish is helped along by a red wine

from the same country, with cloudy hints of port in its make up.

If a bathroom break is in order, you'll be in for

a pleasant surprise, since a blindfolded person could easily find their way to Rim Talay's restrooms purely by following the gorgeous and heady scent of lemongrass that exudes from them.

Next on the menu, is a vegetable sorbet he handed me a 10-liter carafe, he laconically

consisting of tomato granite infused with herbs, served in another orb of ice. Those boys and girls in the kitchen have been busy overnight, that's for sure.

> The climax of the evening arrives in the form of slow-roasted beef tenderloin, forest mushrooms, a celery puree and

potatoes. This peerless dish is crowned with an Argentinean red from Mendoza, a winegrowing region on the eastern slopes of the Andes; a place where I once timidly asked a wine grower for a sample of his wine and, as

added, "Is that all you need?" Mendoza stands out in my travels as the place where I have tasted the best and the worst wine in my life.

But this wine's a winner – a deep-red 2004 vintage with great legs, body and delivery – a fitting companion to the tender meat and clever pure arrangement. But wait; all is not over.

THE courage of independent restaurant owners who risk it all on a venture is admirable. Equally, those who have risen through the ranks of a corporate structure to make a stamp on the hide of the behemoth, also inspire admiration.

But what about a mixture of both? Philip Seiffert is a man who has been there and done that corporate thing, and is now totally independent, recently taking over and reopening Pizza 2000 on 'upper' Karon Road.

Pizza 2000 is an unpretentious restaurant with simple d cor and atmosphere – a fan-cooled place that delivers tasty and fresh Italian and German dishes prepared by Chef Goong. Philip, from Hanover, is keen on delivering the best quality at the lowest price.

Happily, he succeeds in his goal, not least because during his "market research" he dined at pretty much every noteworthy restaurant in Phuket and imparts an almost Holmes-like interest in the other island culinary ventures.

For all that, or maybe because of that, Pizza 2000 has a modest, yet alluring menu consisting of Italian dishes – pastas, lasagna and pizzas – with Teutonic touches such as wiener schnitzel. And there are some nifty German beers to boot.

We dine on a glorious lasagna al forno (190 baht) and various pizzas – all excellently prepared – and all within the 190-199 baht price range. Pizza 2000 is popular with local hotel patrons who find the prices and quality irresistible. Our meal is washed down with red wine – also attractively-priced. To be base, one can get sloshed here for the same price as buying a long-opened, twoglass serving of a Californian wine at a five-star hotel. And the food deserves equal merit.

Considering we ordered at the same time as three other tables and were served at the same time as them, there must be some magic going on in the kitchen. And, Khun Mek, who was our server, couldn't have done a better job.



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Tin man with a heart of gold

Looking Back

THE Hongyok family have one of Phuket's most prominent and prestigious names. They have made their mark as a successful business family and established a strong presence in local politics. The Hongsyoks are indeed a big part of Phuket's inspirational history.

Luang Anuphasphuketkarn is the member of the Hongyok family whose life story resonates the most. The local nobleman of Chinese descent was the son of Tan Chek Ut, a Hokkien Chinese immigrant who settled in Phang Nga province during the 19th century.

Luang Anuphas was born in November 1888 and given the Chinese name Tan Chin Guan. He was schooled at Wat Monkolnimitr, an important Buddhist temple in Phuket Town, during his early years and taught by th revered monk Wisutti Wongsajarnyarnmanee.

At 14 years old, Chin Guan was sent to China to study the Chinese language. When he returned, he took an active role in the family's tin mining business, which at that time was managed by his brother Chin Hong.

In 1913, during the early reign of King Rama VI, the 'Surname Act' was passed, which mandated all Chinese immigrants in Siam to adopt Thai surnames. That same year, the king also passed a law that


allowed Chinese immigrants to receive Thai citizenship.

Tan Chin Hong, who was the eldest in the family, chose to use the Thai surname 'Hongyok', which translates 'Phoenix'. Chin Guan, his younger bro-ther,

also used the new surname from title of Luang Anuphas Phuketkarn. then on

for some time, Chin Guan left to set up his own tin mining operation. In a joint venture with his friends, he purchased a high yielding opencast mine. However, he soon realized that the business would not provide the vast returns he had expected.

Chin Guan spent a lot of time researching different mining methods in order to improve efficiency. When he learned that a new mining method, known as gravel pumping, was becoming widely used in British Malava, he traveled there to study the technique. Chin

Guan then introduced the process of gravel pumping to his Phuket mine in 1927.

Still, this new technique did not yield the results he wanted. Undeterred by previous failures, Chin Guan began to tweak the gravel pumping system he had in operation. He replaced the reciprocating diesel engine that powered the pump with a generator that was commonly used on ships. The modification paid off, and in time it proved to be a cost saver.

Chin Guan decided to use the generators to build a new power station for his mine. He formally opened the refurbished mine in January 1930. The opening ceremony was presided over by Prince Paripatra Sukhumbhand, Prince of

Nakhon Sawan. To commemorate the occasion, the prince named the mine 'Muang Chaofa', which in Thai means 'prince's mine'.

In 1931, in recognition of his charitable work, Prince Paripatra granted Tan Chin Guan the noble

Despite the successes of his After working with the family mining businesses, Luang Anuphas was still determined to adopt better mining techniques and improve efficiency. He made frequent trips to Penang, which was one of the most advanced tin mining centers in the region during that period.

In 1938, as his Chaofa mine became more successful, he bought a dredger in order to mine tin offshore in Phang Nga Bay.

Luang Anuphas also tried his hand at a number of other related businesses. He established a smelting plant, a sawmill, a lumber mill, a rice mill and an ice plant to support his mining operations. He also established a brewery and several rubber and coconut plantations.

Up until the Second World War, nearly all of his businesses were proving highly successful and he had amassed a fortune for himself. In Malaya, many Chinese business people even called Luang Anuphas the 'Lord of Tin'.

In 1939, he founded Anuphas & Sons and distributed the company's shares to his wife and children. Today Anuphas & Sons has grown into a group of companies, operating petrol stations, real estate projects, several car dealerships and a golf course in Phuket. The company's strong presence on the island is a tribute to its remarkable founder.

The recently opened road link-

Chaofa tin mine. A renowned philanthropist, he performed extensive charitable work for Phuket's poor and under privileged. He donated land for the construction of the Baan Suan Mapraw School in the Mai Khao sub-district in Phuket's north. The school has since been renamed Hongyokbumrung School to honor its patron family.


Luang Anuphas also donated land in Kathu for the construction of a Buddhist temple, Wat Anuphas Krisdaram, and donated another plot of land in Phuket Town for the construction of the Mission Hospital.

Luang Anuphas had nine chil-

dren, many of whom were notable figures in Phuket's political scene. His eldest son, Wirat Hongyok was elected as president of the Phuket Provincial Council and later served as Mayor of Phuket Town. Wirat-Hongyok road in Phuket honors his name.

Lt Phummisak Hongyok, one of Luang Anuphas' grandchildren, is also a well known businessman and politician. He served as the Mayor of Phuket Town and presided over its transition from 'town' to 'city' status.

In October 1962, Luang Anuphas Phuketkarn fell ill and passed away at the age of 74, leaving behind a large business empire and a legacy as one of Phuket's most prominent historical figures.

MANY expatriate writers publish a good first novel about Bangkok. After that, the rest tend to get worse and worse. Such is the case with John Burdett who wrote an entertaining first novel entitled Bangkok Eight. The plot

was outrageous but fastpaced and Burdett's sense of place was superb.

The second, Bangkok Tattoo, carried forth his

main characters Sonchai Jitpleecheep, a former monk-turned-honest-police-detective; Colonel Vikorn, his venal, but charming superior, and Nong, Sonchai's mother who runs a bar in the Soi Cowboy area, and conceived Sonchai from the first of her many liaisons with foreign men.

In Bangkok Tattoo, however, the author has given the narrator, Sonchai an insufferably superior tone. He directs his remarks toward a nameless farang, which is good as a tool that explains a lot about Thailand, but also bad because everything about the West is horrible and the only true wisdom resides in the smug persona of Sonchai.

His third novel, Bangkok Haunts (Corgi Books, London 2008, 329pp) deserves some credit for a sharp opening line: "Few crimes make us fear for the evolution of our species. I am watching one right now."

What he is watching is a snuff film in the company of his good friend and FBI agent Kimberley Jones, who describes it as "five point seven megabytes of distilled evil".

Both are reduced to tears, Sonchai more so since he was once in love with the victim. Damrong, a hooker from his mother's bar.

It turns out that Damrong is nearly 30 vears of distilled evil, and woe betide the man who falls in love with her.

"She wasn't a woman, she was a disease, a disease that infected the blood of half the

men she ever serviced," Sonchai observes.

Besides Sonchai, these include Daniel Baker, Damrong's American ex-

husband who has degraded her into pimp and pornographer; Tom Smith, a high-powered British lawyer; and an all-powerful Sino-Thai banker strangely named Tanakan (the Thai word for "bank").

They are the immediate suspects in the snuff film which appears to involve The Parthenon – an exclusive sex club. Others include a hi-so advertising executive Kosana, his ladyboy and artist girlfriend Pi-Oon and the Parthenon's mamasan, Nok. These last three are bumped off early.

Helping Sonchai with his investigation is his assistant Lek, who is a ladyboy with ambitions to become a transsexual. Improbably enough, the FBI agent Kimberley Jones falls in love with Lek amid much tortured blather of how hard it is to be a single woman in the hideous moral sump-hole of America. Here's a sample, addressed to Sonchai:

"You think the Western mind is some Frankensteinian product of botched religion and a bunch of ancient Greek pedophiles, the same unholy combination of schoolboy logic, lust for blood and glory, we-knowbest, and destroy-to-save that slaughtered three million in Vietnam, most of them

women and children, all in the name of freedom and democracy, before we ran away because it got too expensive. Right?"

And here's a sample of Sonchai: "We are tiny figurines hanging from the charm bracelet of infinity."

There's also a mysterious monk who is seen haunting internet parlors on Soi Nana and who finds pretexts to give the three big fish in the snuff film's plot – Baker, Smith and Tanakan - bracelets made of elephant hair.

Sonchai undertakes a sidetrip to Phnom Penh to investigate the suicide of the American porn star, Stanislaus Kowlovski, who was Damrong's murderous partner in the snuff film. Another diversion takes him to Damrong's home village in Khmer-speaking Surin to learn how the sordid details incest, child prostitution, Khmer black magic - of how she became so evil. Except for the love of her younger brother, there is absolutely nothing good about Damrong. Even Hitler liked dogs.

Readers stagger onward to the climax in a borderland wilderness, a witless farrago of kidnapping and murder, former Khmer Rouge automatons laughing maniacally, the

transmigration of a soul from one body to another, and a murdered elephant - intertwined with yet more clunky paragraphs of pompous exposition.

Take Bangkok Haunts to the beach, if you want to ruin your day.


She has also been working at the Six Senses Sanctuary spa on Koh Naka Yai where guests spend extended time working on personalized detox and healing therapies.




About Expat Gallery







NEW ZONING REGULATIONS: Stricter controls govern land use in Phuket.

PROPERTY New zoning includes zette beaches and islands

NEW zoning regulations governing land use in Phuket came into effect on July 7. Legal firm Baker & McKenzie issued an English language summary and an analysis of the new regulations, which both alter and expand on the previous regulations that were set in

The most notable changes made in the Ministerial Regulation to Implement the Phuket Province Town Planning Regulation BE 2554 (2011) are an increase in the number of types of land utilization zones from 13 to 16, as well as stricter controls governing land use within each type.

The additional zones allow governance of the small secondary islands that are part of Phuket province but were not included in the 2005 regulations.

The new zones include empty land for environmental preservation, tourism and fishery (shown in blue on chart), empty land for recreation and preservation of coastal environment (blue with white stripes), and empty land for preservation of natural resources and coastal environment (blue with brown stripes).

"Practically, the changes will

have the most effect on the islands surrounding Phuket and coastal land within the province. The effects on residential areas will be minimal," Vongsagorn Noonchookan, chief of the Department of Public Works And Town & Country Planning office in Phuket, told the Phuket Gazette.

small islands. Now they cover the entire province. In fact, the new regulations are what will allow the planned convention cen-

ter to be built in Mai Khao, which was not possible before," he

Under the previous regulations, the percentage of land permitted for purposes other than that prescribed in its zone was applied to each individual land plot. The 2011 regulations now stipulate that these percentages apply to each zoning area.

Percentages themselves have fallen, becoming more restrictive on what land can be used for within each zone type. For example, 15 per cent of commercial and high-density residential zones (red) can be used for purposes other than those allowed under the regulation. This is down from 70 per cent in 2005.

Residential and commercial use of rural and agricultural areas (green) have become more restrictive. The rules now cover loopholes that may have previ-


ously allowed for waterfront construction. Structures and storage on environmental and forestry reserves (light green and

green with white strips respectively) are also governed more strictly than before.

Baker & McKenzie have recommended that all developers carefully consider these new regulations which govern all types of development and land utilization to ensure their projects adhere to Thai law. Consultation should be sought even if land or construction permits were acquired before

Property Watch

IT'S been two years since the well-documented Sri Lankan civil war ended. For over two decades the Tamil Tigers were regular fixtures on the world's evening news.

Time travels fast in today's world and I've just returned from a "boots on the ground" visit to the island where I explored the emerging property market.

Truth be known, resort villas have been a fixture on the southern end of Sri Lanka for over 20 years now, coinciding with the emergence of the sector in Bali and Phuket. While the country lacked the critical mass or scale of the Southeast Asian counterparts, it did attract a similar market of upscale early settlers from Hong Kong and Singapore. Owners were typically British long-time

expats, who were familiar with the region and often held top positions at multi-national firms or were wealthy entrepreneurs.

There remains an intrinsic link between the three destinations through the

influence of legendary designer Geoffrey Bawa on modern-day tropical villas.

Needless to say, dropping Bawa's name in Colombo with a respectful hushed tone always lends credibility through what has become an iconic brand legacy.

The southern coastline has been a long-term tourism and property magnet. Starting with resorts a short distance from the capital city, Negambo and Bentota quickly became key areas to develop. Today these are legacy markets, not unlike Phuket's own Kata and Karon areas. Older hotels define

> the marketplace, which is popular among long-haul European tourists

who come and bask in the sun.

Next stop is Hikkaduwa which is famed for its surf and gathers a large contingent of board riders from around the globe, highlighted by Australians who have been coming for years.

Further away, the historic old city of Galle carved out a niche with its historic Portuguese links, similar to Goa, Penang, Malacca and Hoi An. With a scenic harbor, fort and gateway to long stretches of beaches, today the area serves as the hub of resort-based real estate.

Trek down the coast and you find what is termed the "golden mile", in Thalpe, with villas and hotels dotting the beachfront. Traveling the south, much of the terrain and access is similar to Phang Nga's Natai area, where the close proximity between the main road and the ocean allows ideal resort home lots to be constructed utilizing minimum land parcels. It's all about the location here and living on the sea.

Further along are Weligama, Matara, Dickwella and Tangelle. This is the growth area for both hospitality and property in the short to medium term and the main focus of current development. A new toll road which is set to link Colombo and Matara by the end

of this year will cut travel time in half and is a lead indicator of growth

If you think Sri Lanka is about roughing it, think again. There are two Aman resorts, Amangalla and Amanwella, which have helped lure the chain's famed 'Aman junkies' over the past few years.

Rounding out the area is the emerging "second city" of the country, Hambantota. Home to the current president, the region is seeing a massive influx of investment especially from mainland China. A new deep-sea port has been built, while an international airport that will cater to overseas markets and provide direct flights debuts in 2013.

Other key developments include a new international convention and exhibition center coming on stream before the end of the year and Hong Kong's Shangri-La group is building a mixed-use resort and golf course. I often write that 'airlift' remains a key catalyst for a positive forward trend, and the new airport is a leading demand generator.

Luxury estates are just in their infancy in the country. The one I visited in Mirissa named Nisala was designed by Hong Kong architect Jill Cheshire and is a leading example of overseas investors coming in and purchasing ultra villas.

Expect new hospitality-led residence launches by Six Senses through a joint venture and another by a Shanghai-based hospitality firm later this year on the southern coast.

While it is still early days for Sri Lanka and the market lacks many of the perks and benefits of Phuket, it is increasingly appearing on the global property radar. An attractive retirement visa package is offered by the government, which is spurring interest.

Perhaps, after the decades of fighting, there is a new sense of optimism for our Andaman Sea neighbor.

Thai developer marketing east coast homes

THE Phanason Group has brought a 142-unit project to market on the East coast's Laem-Hin area.

Hainan Island set to challenge Phuket and Bali

CHINA'S Hawaii-style Hainan Island is gearing up to become a major beach destination in the Asian region.

According to Lodging Econometrics Spring 2011 Update there are currently 60 hotel projects with an astounding 25,431 rooms in the development pipeline. This amount of new rooms equates to over 50 per cent of Phuket's total existing inventory.

Eighteen of these new hotels will open between now and the end of next year.

With gaming on the horizon and a flock of international brands operating, expect the destination to be increasingly competitive in the next few years.

Conrad and Inter Continental Samui opening dates

KOH Samui hotels are enjoying a resurgence in hotel operating metrics to date this year.

Two banner international hotels are set to open their doors in the second half of the year. Conrad will debut on September 1, and Justin Phillips has been announced as General Manager.

The project impresses with unique food and beverage outlets, and stunning views over the picturesque Five Islands.

Arnaud Girodon, former General Manager of Indigo Pearl, is now heading up the InterContinental in nearby Baan Taling Ngam.

The hotel is closed for a US\$ 30 million upgrade with Thai design icons P49 handling the creative side.

Opening is set for December 5, and will see the room count increase from 77 to 81 keys.

Expectations are also high that an international chain will soon be appointed at the Gurich Resort – formerly Langham Place – in Lamai.

Buyers: better safe than sorry

Property Legal

WHEN purchasing property overseas, many buyers are in fact making a large investment subject to laws and local practices that are more or less unknown to them.

Therefore, a buyer should always seek the advice of seasoned professionals who are intimately familiar with the applicable laws, local customs and regulations before deciding to buy – and certainly before signing any documentation or making any purchase payments.

Once a buyer has found a property that they wish to purchase, they should immediately retain legal counsel to perform all necessary due diligence regarding every legal matter relevant and important to ensure safe property acquisition.

Depending on the type of property the purchaser is considering, the professional services of land surveyors, property inspectors, engineers, accountants and the like may be required to ensure that the buyer's interests are professionally represented in all matters relating to the transaction.

A buyer's legal counsel should be able to make such referrals or may employ other such

professionals whose expertise is necessary or desirable to the transaction at hand.

When employing the services of any professional, a buyer must be comfortable with the level of subject knowledge, experience, and expertise of the person or firm to be employed. Further, and just as important, a buyer must be satisfied that any professional

working on his or her behalf is fully independent and has no conflicts of interest. Professional advice should always be sought from persons or firms that have no relationship to the seller.

Unfortunately, for various reasons, buyers often choose to rely on advice that's given by people who do not solely represent the buyer's interests. Clearly, advice

provided by any professional who has a conflict of interest is suspect at best, and may prove irreparably damaging at worst.

To avoid such situations, all professionals used to provide any services for the buyer must be dedicated solely to the buyer's interests, wholly unrelated to the seller of the property, and have no conflicts of interest that may give

rise to even the mere appearance of impropriety. The all too common mistake of relying upon advice given by the seller or those related to the seller in any way, shape or form, has led to the financial downfall of many unsuspecting buyers.

Everyone contemplating a property purchase or investment in an unfamiliar location or within an uncertain business environment must go the extra mile to insure their interests.

Such buyers need to take a proactive approach towards research, including networking with others who may have been in a similar situation at one time.

While no real estate purchase comes without some degree of risk, these [risks]can be minimized. A buyer who rolls up his sleeves and does his homework, and is well represented by competent and independent counsel, as well as other necessary professionals, will always have chance in their favor.

So when buying a property abroad, refer to the old adage: "It is better to light a candle than to curse the darkness."

How much is too much?

ESTABLISHING a dialogue with readers is always gratifying. A recent query from reader Tony Jeffs reads: "One question that has always bothered me is about underwatering versus overwatering. How do I know when a plant is suffering from one or the other?"

In answer to his question, much depends on the circumstances. Variables such as soil conditions, seasonal variations, the type of plant, and whether it is planted in the ground or a container come into play here.

Pots are a special case teso let's tackle them first. The first rule is

when they need watering, always give them a good long drink. Once water comes through the bottom of the pot and fills the saucer, you know that the deepest roots have been saturated. Such watering will encourage bottom root development.

Try not to let the pots get completely dried out. If they do, the soil will become hard, and nearly impenetrable. This is more likely to happen with clay soils than with sandy soils.

One solution is to make holes in the soil with a pencil, so the water can penetrate the soil and

be absorbed. You can check its state by pushing a finger into the soil. If your finger comes out dry, then watering is the order of the day. Some containers, such as terra cotta or coir (coconut fiber) allow more rapid evaporation, and in the dry



season these plants may need watering on a daily basis. The tell-tale signs will be wilting and drooping of the foliage. In extreme cases, the plant will collapse.

Overwatering is also a common problem, and in the case of container plants it's often responsible for fatalities. In this case, the water accumulates, especially in glazed or plastic pots that have poor drainage, and the sodden root system literally drowns. To detect this problem, watch for yellowing leaves.

It's more likely for root-rot to happen to potted plants that prefer a dry environment – plants that are accustomed to a desert-like natural habitat. Two of Phuket's most popular potted plants are the *adenium* (desert rose) and *euphor-bia millii* (crown of thorns).

Besides their intrinsic good looks, they are popular because they are low-maintenance shrubs that require relatively little water.

You should know these characteristics: what kind of soil you have, which parts of the garden are drier and which are more moist, and which plants require a lot, or a little, water. Plants from naturally damp environments, such as heliconias and most varieties of zingerber will only thrive if given regular supplies of water. The same goes for those fleshy herbaceous plants such as dieffenbachia and agloanema, and all those shade lovers from the rainforest understory such as philodendrons, anthuriums, caladiums, spathiphylums and colocasias.

Be especially mindful of small or newly-transplanted plants – almost all of them will appreciate a daily watering.

There is one golden rule for watering: Never water in the heat

of the day lest you traumatize the plant. If you do, droplets of water form on the leaves, and act as tiny magnifying glasses, resulting in scorched foliage. So soak the earth and not the leaves. Morning is the best time to water because the plant has all day to absorb the moisture. While evening watering is okay, the practice means that moisture may stay overnight on the leaves and encourage mildew.


Automatic watering systems

SINCE Phuket has frequent dry spells, a watering system is essential for your garden. .

One suggestion is to use sprinklers which spray in a fixed pattern, or rotating sprinklers that spread water over an extensive circle of ground. These are especially useful if you have large areas of lawn. They also ensure a fairly even distribution.

Irrigation systems can be installed with a system of pipes extending – usually at, or just below, surface level – to all the key areas of the garden. Usually these systems have valves which control water usage, and spray heads set at intervals along the pipes. Simpler versions called "drip emitters" have small holes in the pipe at regular intervals.

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
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Six out of six for Pryde's Team Premier

"It has been four days of incredible racing, and five nights of great parties and socializing with all the participants, spectators and sponsors. We made a few alterations to the schedules which have worked very well and we're already looking forward to the 2012 event," he said.

This was Prude's second visit to Raceweek, having finished as runner-up to Ray Roberts' *Evolution Sails* in 2009 by a single point.

Roberts, the reigning Asia Yachting Grand Prix (AYGP) circuit title holder, did not register for this year's Phuket event, effectively handing Pryde a great opportunity to take early points and a good lead in the AYGP, if of course he could fend off his other Raceweek rivals.

Determined sailing over three days from the crew of *Team Premiere* gave them overall victory in IRC Racing series with 15 points and a clean sweep of six wins in six races

With the series bagged, *Team Premiere* did not compete in the fourth and final day of racing, leaving Ricky Pointon's *Jing Jing*, Ben Copely's *Katsu* and David Ross' *KukuKERchu* to slug it out for second and third positions.

Jing Jing eventually took second place from Katsu with less than a minute separating them in each of two very exciting final races using corrected time.

After an uncertain start to the series, Mark Chapman's *Piccolo* triumphed in IRC 2 class with a total of just nine points from Cdr Pornprom Sakultem's *Royal Thai Navy 4* on 17 points, and *Team Sea Bees* with Rob Meiz placing third on 19 points.

Two first-places on day four secured IRC 3 class for Jim Ellis on *Remington*, with Jim Kane on *Linda* in second place. *Linda* came close to losing the runner-up position to Rob Azzopardi's *Dreamtime* by finishing fifth in the final race.

Enjoying time away from his attempt to break the world sailing speed record in Namibia, Paul Larsen on *DaVinci* seemed to have employed his recent experiences with a trio of opening wins in Multihull class. Alan Carwardine on *Sidewinder* picked up the gauntlet

handed to him, and responded with five back-to-back victories to take the series. A solid performance from David Liddell's crew on *Miss Saigon* earned them third position.

The Firefly 850 Sport class went down to the wire when Ian Coulson and Clarence Tayong's *Voodoo* claimed victory in the first race of day four while Peter Dyer's *Team Land and Houses* could manage only third spot. A final showdown in race eight ended with Voodoo in fourth, but *Team Land and Houses* placed first to take the overall title. Third position in the series was won by John Newnham's *Twin Sharks*.

Competition for Classic honors played out in classic style with the series lead changing hands between the two protagonists each day, until Mark Myking's *Idiom* defeated Khun Bao's *Seraph* in the last race to earn overall victory.

FC PHUKET put in a solid performance in their third-round FA Cup match against TOT SC, but were unable to stop the Thai Premiere League team from advancing on a 1-0 scoreline.

This match was the very first match to be played at TOT's new stadium. The home side automatically qualified for this stage of the

competition while Phuket earned their position with a 7-3 demolition of Bangkok Christian College Football Club on

TOT dominated for the opening minutes of the match, but Phuket had

the lion's share of scoring opportunities throughout the first half.

Kone Adama narrowly missed an opening score for Phuket when his header looped over the crossbar from a Niran Funtong corner in the 24th minute.

On 30 minutes, Phuket's French goalkeeper, Jonathan Matijas, kept his team in the game with an outstanding save. A 25-

yard strike looked destined for the top right corner, but Matijas flung his right hand high, and clawed the football away.

Adama turned provider for Funtong in the 38th minute, but the TOT goalkeeper got down well to keep Funtong's half-volley out.

Thirteen minutes into the second-half, Adama crossed from the left to Sarach Yooyen, who weaved through several defend-

> before blasting a shot high over the bar.

TOT began to put more pressure on the visitors as the clock ran down to the final 10 minutes.

On 83 minutes, TOT fans celebrated the

first goal at their new stadium when Cheick Abib Fofana was given a free-header from a Wichan Nantasri corner. His finish justly punished Phuket for dreadful defending.

Two minutes later, Phuket looked to have equalized when a hopeful shot by Seksit Srisai ricocheted off a post into the path of Kone Adama. His thundering re-

tort found the TOT net, but the referee's assistant had his flag raised for offside. Protests from players and management were unnecessary as at least two Phuket players failed to get back on-side before Seksit's first shot

Somchai Subpherm, coach for TOT said that he was relatively satisfied with his team's performance. "The team followed our game plan. I'm glad we were able to record a win in the first match at our new stadium," he said.

Phuket coach Sompong Wattana said that he was proud of the team's performance.

'We were able to hold our own against a strong opponent from the premiere league today, so I can confidently say that everyone played to their limits. It's alright that we lost today, we still have our Toyota Cup and league matches to focus on," he said.


As this edition of the Phuket Gazette was going to print, FC Phuket were making their official (July 27) announcement of five new additions to their lineup.

Game for the love of tennis

Travis Bertram, 30, from Seattle, USA is the new tennis director for Thanyapura Sports and Leisure Club. Speaking to the Gazette, Travis talks about his hopes for tennis in Phuket.

What drew you to tennis?

My parents used to play a lot of tennis in the 80's, and my younger brother got into it first. We started watching Wimbledon and the professional game caught my interest. I liked the variety of styles because it reminded me of snowboarding and how each snowboarder has their own signature style.

Did you play any other sports?

I enjoyed all sports growing up including basketball, soccer, Tae Kwon Do and skateboarding, though my dream was to be a professional snowboarder. I was really into snowboarding and skateboarding. I fell when I was snowboarding and dislocated my shoulder and hip and so I was told not to participate in any sports because of the nature of my injuries. I had to be really careful.

What was the first competition vou won?

My first tennis tournament win was in mixed doubles in college. My friend and I won the open division. I always enjoyed mixed doubles because of the male/female dynamic and I thought it was fun to play mixed sports.

Any memorable matches you have played in or been coach

I've had many memorable matches but it's always the ones you lose that you learn from the most. Winning is such a fleeting moment. Two that stick out. I had to play my best friend in the quarter finals of an open tournament. I had never beaten him. With a swollen shoulder and ankle I lost to him 6-4, 6-4. I only lost by four points, but it will be my most memorable because I fought hard, pushed my injuries aside and used my tactical skills to push the match when I could have defaulted.

Where has your tennis career taken you?

I played for the tennis team in college (Western Washington University) and got a job at a local tennis club stringing rackets, booking courts and eventually became a certified tennis instructor. After college, I discovered Peter Burwash International (PBI) and made it though their rigorous 450hour training program. During my training I worked with an ATP and WTA coach for a month while we trained some of the top ITF junior players After that, I became the Head Pro at Carmel Valley Ranch in California, and then became tennis director at The Ritz-Carlton, Half Moon Bay, also in California. I also worked at Four Seasons in Costa Rica and in Punta Mita, Mexico for holiday seasons. Before coming to Phuket, I was the executive junior tennis director at the Willingdon Sports Club in Mumbai, India.

What are your hopes for Tennis

I hope to run a successful program at Thanyapura by satisfying the needs of our members. I want tennis to be one of the social hubs of the club. The hope for junior tennis is for the kids to learn how to enjoy tennis first. From there we will get avid players that are thinking of a competitive future. Obviously I will also be hunting for talent.

Any future talents?

We have several players that are showing a lot of potential. I am really impressed with the athleticism of all the kids. Several kids had never touched a racket at the beginning of the month and now they are already playing points. It's certainly one of the fastest progressions I've seen. The children of athletic parents are the ones I'm really keeping my eye

We have two ITF tournaments on the books and planning several more.

How important are tennis academies?

They are crucial for the game's growth. Sadly, there are only a few good tennis academies in the world. The academy environment is key because of the element of competition. Competing against peers is vital to the mindset of any athlete. Junior tennis players not only need to train hard but they must learn a variety of subjects from stroke production to strategy as well as basic knowledge of the game.

What do you think of Phuket

We came to Phuket in April this year to see the TSLC site and we fell in love with Phuket.

My wife Kelsey and I both love the laid back lifestyle, and especially Thai food. It's a treat to go to the local street markets. Thanyapura is such a highlight. It's so cool to be in an environment like Thayapura' s because it' s really a haven for athletes and I' m excited to share what I' ve learned. When I go to work I feel like a kid going to the playground.
