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Foreigners losing homes to con men

Police warn of gang targeting wives of foreigners in bids to swindle them out of their homes

POLICE are warning Phuket homeowners they are a prime target for fraud gangs, with wives of foreigners often falling prey.

Under condition of anonymity, one victim told the *Gazette* she was approached by a man in June asking to rent a luxury home for his boss, a wealthy Chinese man.

She was surprised when the man showed interest in her offer to rent out her home out at a rate of 150,000 baht a month, she said.

She was taken to a hotel in Kata, where she met the wealthy Chinese, his "manager" and a man introduced as "a gambling expert".

After the Chinese man agreed to rent the house, she was told to wait until he came back with his wife. As she waited, the others told her the Chinese man had a gambling problem and had lost millions at gambling dens.

The men then showed her some card tricks to show how easily the



man could be duped. When he returned, an argument broke out between the Chinese man and the others, who said they wanted him to stop gambling.

Speaking harshly, the Chinese man said it was "none of their business" what he did with his money. It was a fair game of chance and he would be just as happy to play with them than in a den, if they could raise the 10 million baht stake, he said.

After he showed her a bag of cash and left the room, the others convinced her that it was better

to con the man and split the winnings than have him lose it at a gambling den. The winnings could be donated to a temple, they said. Although she had no money, she agreed.

When the card game took place, the group lost all of their money because of a mistake she had made, they convinced her.

Riddled with guilt, the woman agreed to take out a loan from a credit company using her home as collateral. It only took one hour for the men to cajole her into completing the transaction.

For months after, the others continued to contact her with promises to pay back the money. It was only when she was contacted by police in July she realized the truth: she had been swindled.

The other three men had in turn been duped by the "wealthy man", who disappeared with all the winnings. They told police to pass on the message to her.

Vegetarian Festival enters 185th year

DEVOTEES at Chinese shrines across Phuket raised their go teng poles at sunset on Monday and began reciting incantations to invite the Jade Emperor and Nine Emperor Gods to descend from the heavens.

At midnight, lanterns were hung from the poles to mark the beginning of this year's Phuket Vegetarian Festival.

At Kathu Shrine, honored as the "original home" of the 185-year-old tradition, Kathu Mayor Chai-anan Sutthikul was joined by Culture Ministry Deputy Permanent Secretary Prarop Laovanich and Pheu Thai Party spokesman Phrompong Nopparit in declaring the 2011 festival officially open.

A full program of purification, including bathing in hot oil, walking through fire, being pierced by sharp objects and – of course – adhering to a strict vegetarian diet, will be observed by the devotees for the full nine days of the festival, which will close with a bonfire at Saphan Hin at midnight on October 5.

Raging bull leaves honeymooners in tears

A UKRAINIAN couple's Phuket honeymoon turned to tragedy when a male elephant went on a rampage, attacking the elephant they were riding and sending the young bride to hospital with two broken legs and a battered body.

Artem Perepelitsyn, 24, and his wife Tetiana Meia, 26, married in their hometown of Odessa on September 2 before setting out on their "dream trip" to Thailand.

On September 12, two days after arriving in Phuket, the pair booked an elephant trekking trip with Camp Chang Kalim.

"It was the only thing we really wanted to do," a tearful Mrs Meia told the Gazette. "No one warned us that it could be so dangerous," she said.

About five minutes into the 45-minute trek in the hills above Kalim, Mrs Meia was enjoying her seat next to her husband atop a large female elephant named "Pancake" when she noticed something unsettling.

"I looked behind and I could see Captain running uphill toward us," Mrs Meia said. Captain was carrying two American tour-

ists and a mahout at the time, she added. "Captain charged with his tusks into the right side of our elephant, and then again,

and again," Mr Perepelitsyn said. On the third blow, Pancake fell onto her

left side, pinning Mrs Meia to the ground. The mahout was able to jump off the elephant, but the Ukrainians were trapped in the seat fastened to Pancake's back.

"The guy from the camp had tied a strap across our laps and when we fell, it came up and tightened, so we couldn't get off the elephant. I somehow managed to pull myself out, but my wife was stuck," Mr

"After we went down, Captain continued attacking, pushing our elephant and my wife along the ground," he said.

"We were screaming and I thought I was going to die because I couldn't feel anything and [the elephant] and I were sliding and sliding," Mrs Meia said, struggling for

"I said to Artem, 'Good-bye, I love you'," she said.

Winai dodges a bullet

THE controversial chief (kamnan) of Karon subdistrict narrowly escaped with his life early last Saturday morning when his wouldbe assassin failed to hit him after firing at close range.

Winai Chidchiew told the *Phuket Gazette* he was returning by motorcycle from a funeral on Patak Road Soi 9 when the attack occurred at about 1am.

"Along the way, I saw my friend Narong Saemin at the entrance of Soi Patak 9. We chatted there for a moment, then a pickup truck arrived and stopped for a few seconds," he said.

"I thought the pickup belonged to friends of my friend. I heard someone say 'hey', so I turned around. Then a man in the pickup lowered the window and pointed a gun at me. He pulled the trigger just once," he explained.

His assailant was only about three meters away when he fired the gun.

"Luckily, I dodged the shot by shifting my head away. I fell down on the ground. I thought that the gunman would fire again, so I hid next to the shop," he added.

Then the pickup drove off. Kamnan Winai got a good look at his assailants, he said.

The gunman was sitting in the passenger seat of the truck, a green Mitsubishi with Trang license plates with the numerical sequence

3813 and another man was driving, he said. Neither he nor Mr Narong suffered any injuries.

He reported the incident to Chalong police the next morning.

From the initial investigation, eight shotgun pellets had peppered the back of a passenger van parked at the scene, said Chalong Police Deputy Superintendent Narong Laksanawimon

"I guess it must have been an illegally made shotgun or a thai pradit (homemade) firearm. We are still not sure whether the target of the gunman was Kamnan Winai, Narong Saemin, or both. Both men are involved in activities involving the phon prayot (benefits) of others," he said.

Mr Narong is suspected of involvement with gambling, while Kamnan Winai himself has conflicts with many people in Karon, including business and hotel operators, he added.

"We are still collecting evidence. We will make a sketch of the gunman, since Kamnan Winai said that he could remember him, to try to determine his identity, Lt Col Narong said.

"As far as I can remember, the gunman has the dark skin tone typical of a southern Thai male and was about 30 years old," Kamnan Winai said.

"I can only blame myself for destroying everything my family had," said the woman, who believes the water she was given to drink at the hotel was drugged.

"I have to find 12mn baht plus 360,000 baht in monthly interest to get my house back, but I don't have any money. All I can do is hope they are arrested and some of it is returned," she said with tears in her eyes.

The woman is still negotiating for time with the loan company to find a new place for her family to live before the house is seized.

There have been many other similar cases in Phuket in recent years. In most, victims believe they were drugged, police told her.

The woman wanted to warn people there are other gangs working the same scam in Phuket, initially making contact under the ruse of wanting to rent homes.

"Some people say victims like me are stupid, but they haven't lived my experience," she said.

There may be some hope for her, as arrest warrants have been issued for three people in her case: "The driver", Prasert Rattanaruengmorn, 41, from Trang; "The manager", Thira Thavorn, 50, from Phuket; and "The gambler", Preeda "Ti Surat" Lorsuchart, 49, from Nakhon Sri Thammarat.

Still at large is "the wealthy man", known only as "Koh Kia". Police know he is from Songkhla, but no arrest warrant has been issued. His real name is unknown.

TWO young boys - Pinitchnan Na Roied, 5, and Wannawut Thanakarn, 7 - drowned late last Saturday afternoon while playing in Klong Mudong, an estuary near a popular tourist area on Phuket's east coast.

"Witnesses said they saw three boys playing in the water at about 1pm. A fisherman passing by told them to get out of the water because it was moving dangerously fast following the heavy rains.

"But after warning the boys he just went about his business," a Kusoldham Foundation rescue worker told the Gazette.

A local resident later pulled the body of Pinitchnan out of the water and onto a nearby bridge.

"After realizing who it was he rushed to the homes of the other two boys to check if they were

safe. The one boy who was home said he left the creek immediately after being warned by the fisherman. The other two boys stayed to play," said the rescue worker.

Concerned about Wannawut, who was still missing, local residents checked his friends' homes before heading back to the bridge to search for him.

"Then the villagers saw something that looked like hair floating below the surface of the water. It was Wannawut. They couldn't get his body out of the water, so they called us," the rescue worker said.

"It took our divers about 30 minutes to recover the body. The bodies of both boys are now at Vachira Phuket Hospital," he added after their recovery.

Klong Mudong has recently gained popularity among local residents and tourists as a haven away from the busy beach areas such as Patong, Kata and Karon on Phuket's west coast.

Officials investigate Veg Fest street 'meat'

OFFICIALS are inspecting Vegetarian Festival food stalls daily following reports that some vendors have been lacing "artificial meat" dishes with real meat to make them more attractive to potential diners

Meat products are strictly forbidden for those taking part in the annual purification ritual.

Vendors have over the years used tofu and other high-protein vegetable products to create dishes that mimic the texture and taste of authentic meat dishes, albeit with less protein.

Artificial prawns, hot dogs and even pork rinds are among the many manifestations of tofu used during cultural event.

With hundreds of vendors competing, it may come as no surprise that a few rotten apples have stooped to using real meat to get a leg up on the competition.

During an inspection of vendors at Bang Neaw Shrine on Tuesday, Phuket Health Office chief Sak Tanchaikul warned that violators would be immediately closed and prosecuted.

Thus far no arrests have been reported.

'Monk' hash mule nabbed

A NEPALESE "monk" was caught at Phuket International Airport (PIA) last Saturday with eight kilos of hashish in his luggage. The haul was said to be worth an estimated 800,000 baht.

The suspect, Hise Chiring Tamang, was presented at a press conference by PIA Customs Director Montira Cherchoo.

"I was informed by a detective that there would be a drug smuggler coming through PIA on September 24, so I ordered all officers here to step up random luggage checks on that day," said PIA Deputy Director Thani Chuangcho.

Dressed in monk's robes, Mr Hise arrived on a Qatar Airways flight from India. After transiting through Malaysia he arrived at PIA, where he was stopped by customs officers who asked to search his luggage.

Daycare teacher denies torture charge **Pilot survives paraglide plunge** THE daycare teacher caught on video hitting her

GERMAN national Ralph Gunper Luepke luckily escaped serious injury last Friday after plunging into the jungle behind the Royal Phuket Yacht Club while paragliding over Nai Harn Beach.

Mr Luepke, 50, better known in paragliding circles by his nickname "Nino", was reported missing at 2pm after setting off from a cliff above Nai Harn

"He was missing for a while before he was found injured in the jungle behind the Yacht Club," said Phuket Paragliding Club President Prasert Theplaong.

Mr Luepke was rushed to

Phuket International Hospital, where his only serious injury was a broken left arm.

He was discharged from the hospital last Saturday afternoon. Mr Luepke told the Phuket Gazette that he had more than 17

years experience in paragliding. "Most of that is in Phuket," he said.

Although he declined to explain exactly what caused the plunge, Mr Luepke added, "Once you're up in the air anything can happen. You have to cope with any problems that come up the best you can." – Chutharat Plerin

BKK man found living |Rampaging with mother's corpse

IN A case that bears a striking resemblance to a scene in the film Psycho, a 55-year-old Bangkok man was last month found to have been sharing his home with the corpse of his mother, who died three years ago.

Neighbors called Bang Sue Police officers to the house on Soi Inthamarra in Bangkok's Phayathai District after noticing an offensive smell in the vicinity.

They arrived to find an old wooden-concrete house in a somewhat dilapidated state.

Calling for the owner, they were met by Praphat Wongsan, 55. When they asked Mr Praphat who he shared the house with, he was confused and it became clear he was mentally ill.

They entered the house and conducted a search.

In the second-floor bedroom, they found the skeleton of a woman on the floor.

The skeleton, dressed in a round-necked sleeveless shirt, was covered with a blanket.



There were no signs of foul play.

Mr Praphat told police that the body was that of his mother, Srisa-at Wongsan, who died of "a congenital disease" at age 84 three years earlier. Mr Praphat said he had not told anyone of her death.

Mr Praphat said he didn't work, but instead lived off money he inherited from his father more than 30 years ago.

Neighbors told police Mr Praphat never associated with anyone else, but just stayed at home. As far as they knew, Mr Praphat's parents had forced him to stay at home since childhood and he had turned into a recluse.

He was strange but had never

done anyone harm, they said. Police sent Mrs Srisa-at's skeleton to the hospital to determine the cause of death.

Police believe the family had been quite well off many years ago. Mr Praphat's father had worked at the port, while Mrs Srisa-at had been a civil servant.

The couple had apparently wanted Mr Praphat to study hard and become a doctor - so desperately that they had forbidden him from leaving the house - making him stay indoors to read books all the time.

Mr Praphat became a recluse and developed a slight mental illness. Police took him to the station to give a statement and sent him to a psychiatrist for examination.

The 1960 film Psycho features character Norman Bates, who develops a violent split personality: one personality is his own and the other that of his mother, whose decomposing corpse is discovered inside his house.

THE whereabouts and future plans for Captain, the bull elephant that went on a rampage that sent a Ukrainian honeymooner to hospital with two broken legs, remain unclear amid dubious claims by the owners of Camp Chang Kalim.

Meanwhile, the Phuket Provincial Livestock Office warns all camp owners to exercise caution when using bull elephants for trekking.

TETIANA Meia was left in Phuket International Hospital with clean breaks to her left thigh bone, both bones in her lower right leg and a slew of questions as a result of the rampage.

Suspicions were aroused when the couple found a report on the *Phuket Gazette* that a bull elephant named "Captain" went on a rampage in January 2010 that sent tourists running for their lives and a Swedish man to hospital with a broken leg.

When the *Gazette* asked Camp Chang Kalim owner Witthaya "Ja" Thawiros if this was the same "Captain" involved in the incident last month, he said it was not.

"The 'Captain' we have now is registered as 'Phamorn' and is not the same as the other Captain, who was sent back to Yala [province] – where he's from," Mr Witthaya said.

Mr Witthaya also that the "current" Captain was sent off the island on Mon-

day morning to Phang Nga province, where he is now working "dragging logs". However,

Phuket Livestock Office veterinarian Chirayu Nirunwoj on Tuesday confirmed to the Gazette that

his office had no record of Captain being transferred off Phuket neither after the 2010 incident nor the most recent.

"Normally, when animals are moved off the island, the Livestock Office needs to be informed, and we will issue paperwork to be presented at the checkpoint leaving the island. But I have not heard anything from the camp about moving Captain out of Phuket," Mr Chirayu said.

When presented with Mr Chirayu's statement, camp owner Mr Witthaya responded: "As it was urgent, we did not inform the Livestock Office."

Mr Chirayu said the only information his office had on Captain was that he was registered in Phuket in 2009, had flatulence on May 24, 2009, was in musth around the end of January 2010 (when the first rampage occurred), and was given anthelmintics (anti-parasitic drugs) in April 2010. The records also show that Captain is 22 years old, weighs 3.5 tons and has never been transferred out of Phuket

since registration.

His office was not informed, however, that Captain's bout with musth in January 2010 led to a rampage in which a tourist was seriously injured.

Musth is a condition in bull elephants characterized by highly aggressive behavior coinciding with a surge in testosterone levels.

In addition to behavioral change, an bull in musth often discharges a thick secretion from the temporal glands that is easily identified by "wet spots" between the elephant's eyes and ears.

The condition lasts about one month, during which time the animal should be considered extremely dangerous to humans and other elephants, especially females.

Musth was blamed when a bull elephant went berserk on a trekking tour in Khao Sok National Park in Surat Thani earlier this year, killing one Swiss tourist and seriously injur-

"We warned [Camp Chang Kalim] owners and Captain's mahout last time he was in musth. They need to keep their eyes on him and not use any musth elephants on trekking tours," he added.

However, Captain's latest rampage was likely not due to musth, Mr Chirayu said.

"It may have been that Captain does not like Pancake [the elephant the Ukrainians were riding] and he tusked her. It wasn't related to musth – elephants are social animals, so there is a possibility they simply don't like each other," he said.

Mr Witthaya has a different version of events:

"While they were riding Pancake - who was about 10 meters ahead of Captain - a monitor lizard ran past his hind feet and scared him. Elephants are naturally afraid of snakes and lizards.

"This spooked Captain and he ran away, hitting Pancake in the front and causing her to fall with the couple sitting on her back. Pancake was trying to get up, but Captain probably thought she

would hit him back so he kept tusking her," Mr Witthaya added.

The Ukranians told the *Gazette* that Captain charged and tusked Pancake three times before she fell – and continued to tusk her for "about two minutes" thereafter.

When asked if they were satisfied with Mr Witthaya's version of events, Mr Perepelitsyn responded with a defiant "No".

"How can they claim that Captain was scared by a lizard? If they are using this elephant to trek in the jungle every day, I don't think he'd be scared – he would be used to it," Mr Perepelitsyn said.

He also pointed out that Captain charged three times before knocking Pancake over – he didn't just "bump into her" while running scared, as the camp owner claims.

Mr Chirayu of the Livestock Office echoed the sentiment: "I wasn't there, but I'm curious about why Captain would have kept tusking Pancake. If it's true that Captain panicked when the monitor lizard ran past him, he would not have intended to tusk Pancake like that."

Camp Chang Kalim agreed to pay the 300,000-baht hospital bill for the couple with their insurance, and an extra 100,000 baht on top.

"It's not enough, but it's better than nothing," Mrs Meia said as the newlyweds readied for their flight home on Monday.

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She pointed out that she will need extensive physical therapy, will miss at least two months of work and will have to have the titanium plates in her legs removed at some point in the future. The extra 100,000 baht will not be enough, she said.

Camp Chang, although contradicted by Phuket officials, claims that they are left with six elephants after Captain's alleged departure on Monday.

"Normally Captain was a nice elephant and many people liked him," Mr Witthaya said.

"He was often hired to serve for [Buddhist monk] ordination ceremonies and weddings – that day was an accident. Now we'll have to find an elephant to replace him," he said.

Pancake is now recovering from "serious wounds to her stomach" at the elephant hospital in Klong Thom, Krabi province, Mr Chirayu said.

"She's young – in her 20s – so it probably won't take long for her to get well," he said.

"To make sure this doesn't happen again, elephants need to be more than 10 meters apart when trekking," he added.


There are five hotels that have "small" elephants registered to them and about 20 elephant camps on Phuket, with a total of 189 registered elephants on the island, Mr Chirayu said.

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Santika men three years

THAILAND's Criminal Court last month sentenced two men to three years in prison for recklessness leading to the deaths of 67 people and injuries to scores more in the Santika nightclub fire on New Year's Day 2009.

The court found club owner Wisuk "Sia Khao" Seisawat and Boonchu Laoseenart, executive of Focus Light Sound System, guilty of causing deaths of other persons without intent.

Boonchu and his company were also ordered to pay 8.7 million baht in compensation to five plaintiffs.

Four other defendants, the club's employees and a singer, were acquitted.

More than 1,000 people were inside the upscale Bangkok venue when an indoor fireworks display ignited the blaze after the New Year countdown.

The fire quickly spread throughout the building, sending terrified revellers rushing to escape.

Among the dead were a number of foreigners, including three Singaporean, one Japanese and one Myanmar national.

Clive Garner, lawyer for Briton Oliver Smart, who was injured in the tragedy, told the agency: "This is a pitiful sum and is clearly insufficient to compensate those who have suffered serious injuries and the dozens of families who lost loved ones in this terrible incident," the Press Association reported.

Mr Wisuk was released on 1million-baht bail. He has vowed to appeal the sentence.

THE Goverment will seek a mass pardon of prisoners for HM The King's 84th birthday celebrations in December in a move critics say is aimed at securing an amnesty for fugitive former prime minister Thaksin Shinawatra.

Meanwhile, suspicions that Mr Thaksin is the real power behind his sister Prime Minister Yingluck Shinawatra's government are growing after he lectured Pheu Thai Cabinet ministers for two hours via Skype last week.

Pheu Thai MP Korkaew Pikulthong said the mass pardon was aimed at relieving the pressure on Thailand's overcrowded prisons. More than 230,000 inmates are being held in prisons designed to collectively hold just 140,000, he said.

But critics lambasted the plans as a thinly veiled attempt to prevent Mr Thaksin, who lives in self-imposed exile in Dubai to escape a two-year jail sentence, from going to jail.

Mr Thaksin, 62, was convicted of abuse of power in a land deal involving his former wife, Khunying Potjaman na Pombejra, in 2008.

AROUND THE nation

He maintains the ruling was politically motivated.

Suwat Apaipak, a lawyer for the People's Alliance for Democracy, said the amnesty would likely include those sentenced to up to three years in jail and/or people over 60 years old.

Meanwhile, allegations that Mrs Yingluck is merely a puppet premier for her older brother gained force last Wednesday, when Mr Thaksin joined a meeting of government ministers at Pheu Thai Party headquarters.

In a Skype phone-in from Cambodia, Mr Thaksin lectured ministers on a number of topics and gave some dressings down that lasted hours.

Ministers reportedly "squirmed uncomfortably" as the former telecoms billionaire dished out frank assessments of their "poor" performances during the first two months of the new government's term.

Democrat Party chief whip said, "It has been clearly shown who is prime minister", dismissing Mrs Yingluck as a "puppet", according to Reuters.

"Thaksin has been pulling the

strings for a while behind the scenes. Now he has decided to come out publicly," Pavin Chachavalpongpun, a fellow at Singapore's Institute of Southeast Asian Studies, told the agency.

"But he pushes too hard, moves too fast, and thus leaves too little room for Yingluck to breathe," he added.

Meanwhile, the Democrat Party attacked a group of Thammasat University legal scholars who have been calling for the invalidation of all legal decisions resulting from the 2006 coup that removed Mr Thaksin from power.

Democrat MP and deputy spokesman Atthaporn Ponlaboot said he suspected that the proposal by the so-called Nitirat ("Citizens of Law") group might eventually benefit Mr Thaksin and further attempts to win him a royal pardon.

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TWO Thai men fighting extradition to Australia for murder told a Bangkok court they would not receive fair treatment on trial in Melbourne because Australians are "racist"

Surad Seehaverchart, 29, and Thatiya Terdputham, 36, are accused of killing Luke Mitchell a 29-year-old "Good Samaritan" who was stabbed five times in May 2009 after he broke up a fight outside a nightclub in a suburb of Melbourne.

Mr Surad said he was happy to stand trial in Thailand but would not go back to Australia, where he claimed he had been called a "stupid Asian".

The pair denied killing Mr Mitchell, telling reporters the person who stabbed the Melbourne chef was a third Thai man yet to be arrested, reportedly the son of an influential figure.



Fake DSI agent on the run

A CAREER conman who claimed to be a high-ranking Department of Special Investigations (DSI) officer is on the run again after two decades of crime, arrests, womanizing and escaping justice. The *Phuket Gazette*'s Atchaa Khamlo reports.

WITCHAYUT Pansampao, the alleged conman who masqueraded as a DSI officer to defraud people throughout the South, was arrested last month in Haad Yai but has gone missing after his release on bail.

Police believe he may be in Phuket, where he has a house with his wife, registered in his name..

Praphan Areebambat, an investigator with the Haad Yai District Police in Songkhla, identified the 57year-old suspect as a resident of Singha Nakhon District in Songkhla.

Witchayut was picked up by officers as he was enjoying a bowl of *khao tom* (boiled rice) at a local restaurant in Haad Yai. He was wearing a T-shirt and shorts with a black jacket and badge identifying himself as a Department of Special Investigations (DSI) officer.

Arresting officers presented the suspect with a copy of an outstanding warrant on fraud charges issued by Ranong Provincial Court for acts committed in Kraburi District, the province's northernmost district sharing a long border with Burma. A search of the suspect found him in possession of a fully-loaded .38 caliber pistol.

Officers escorted Witchayut to his Haad Yai hotel room where they found his real ID along with a picture business card identifying him as Pol Maj Gen Witsanupong Phummarin, an officer with the Justice Ministry's DSI, the Thai equivalent of the FBI in the US.

Other evidence recovered included a variety of images of the suspect dressed as a police major general, ID cards identifying him as a member of the Phuket Police, mobile phones and birth control pills.

Witchayut continued to tell officers he was a real DSI agent as he was taken to Haad Yai Police headquarters. He claimed that he had been working in Phuket and was visiting family in Songkhla, where he was born.

After spending the night in a police jail cell, he was granted bail under the promise he would return on September 21 for additional questioning, Lt Col Prapan said.

He has not been seen since and is likely on the run, he added.

"Now I am processing documents to charge him with carrying a firearm in public, be we need to check the gun licensing center in Nakhon Sawan to see whether the pistol was legally registered. When all the evidence has been collected we will forward the case file to the public prosecutor in Haad Yai. In the meantime we will issue a summons for him to appear for questioning. If he does not appear, we will apply for an arrest warrant," said Lt Col Prapan.

The police would not seek charges of impersonating a police officer because the suspect was not using the disguise to defraud people at the time of arrest, he said. Subsequent investigation has revealed that Witchayut has a criminal history dating back 20 years, Lt Col Prapan said.

He was also a womanizer of sorts, police said.

"We think he used the ID to impress women and get them to sleep with him, then he probably used the birth control pills to keep them from getting pregnant," he added.

Kraburi Police investigator Sutham Chaosuan said Witchayut's arrest warrant was issued in 2008.

However, his station did not call Haad Yai Police with instructions to hold the suspect and assist in his transfer to Ranong to face court charges for fraud, he said.

Subsequent investigation by Haad Yai Police revealed that multiple arrest warrants had been issued for Wichaiyut by courts in Surat Thani as well as Ranong, Lt Col Prapan said.

In an effort to learn more, the *Gazette* contacted Police Region 8 Headquarters in Surat Thani, which is responsible for the upper-south region.

Investigator Mechai Nokkaew said the elusive Witchayut has been arrested "more than 10 times" over the past two decades.

One of the arrests was made in Phuket, but the case was dropped in 1993 when the victim chose to mediate a settlement. "He has been defrauding people for about twenty years. After he serves his prison sentences, he goes back out and does it again," he said.

"He works with other gang members to defraud people. They rent a room and invite their mark to discuss a business proposal, then ask them if they would like to have a gambling session. People who fall into this trap invariably lose because the gang members cheat," he said.

"When caught and convicted, penalties are typically quite light. He might spend a year in prison, while completely avoiding incarceration is some cases through the mediation process," he said.

Police records show that Wichaiyut and collaborators defrauded one party out of two million baht in Surat Thani in 1998, he said.

Victims typically get less than half their money back through the mediation process, he said.

"Witchayut has been defrauding people for 20 years, ostensibly so that he could afford to educate his child through to master's degree level," he said.

"He always carries fake documents identifying himself as a government officer of some sort.

"He will use the cards to trick women into believing he is a powerful man so that they will like him, and sometimes he uses them to deceive people into believing he is an honest broker," he said.

Phanuphong Wasasiri, Managing Director of Kwanrawee Co Ltd, who is responsible for the Patong wastewater pump station, replies:

There is a pump station in the

area you speak of that pumps wastewater to the Patong wastewater treatment facility.

In a normal situation, the pump functions properly, but there are three scenarios in which the water may overflow and drain out onto the beach:

The first is when it rains. There is no problem during light rains, but when it rains heavily – amounting to three times that of the wastewater in the pump station – it will mix with the wastewater and overflow. But, we consider this to be clean water.

The second is when there are blackouts, the pump will stop working and the wastewater will overflow. However, it will continue working as soon as the electrical power returns.

The third is when the pump malfunctions, in which case we will fix it as soon as we find out about it.

As for the complaint about "white grease", I checked the scene and only saw puddles of white bubbles caused by waves hitting the rocks.

PATA: Phuket should brace for a 'new breed of tourists'

PHUKET's tourism industry should take preemptive steps to prepare itself for a major shift in tourism dynamics, a high-powered meeting of industry players was told last Saturday.

A shift in global economics has prompted a trend for visitors to Phuket to be more likely to come from within the Asia-Pacific region, specifically India and China, said

Bert van Walbeek, chairman of the Pacific Asia Travel Association (PATA) Thailand Chapter.

Known affectionately as 'Bowtie Bert', Mr van Walbeek volleyed the caution at a Skal-PATA meeting held at the Moevenpick Resort & Spa in Karon. The event, endorsed by the Ministry

of Tourism & Sports, was the first ever held jointly by the two influential tourism organizations.

Phuket MPAnchalee Thepabutra and her husband, Korean Honorary Consul Tosaporn Thephabutra, along with Phuket Tourism Association Vice President Bhuritt Maswongsa and Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) Phuket office



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were all present to hear his address in person.

Rounding out the collection of top-end tourism players at the event were representatives from the Thai Hotel Association; honorary consuls; hotel general managers; tour operators; local business leaders and Phuketbased media.

PATA pulled no punches in making clear the importance it




including one in Bangkok.

"Skal International Phuket & Southern Thailand's warm welcome and the unique opportunity to meet and greet our Skal and PATA colleagues 'down-south' and share information about each other's valuable past, present and future contributions to the Thai tourism industry, shows that both in the public and private tourism sectors the 'one-for-all, all-forone' mentality will prevail," said Mr van Walbeek.

Light Rail bidding window drags on

THE window is still open for investors interested in bidding on the proposed construction of Phuket's Light Rail Project.

We are still waiting for the invitation letter [to potential bidders] to be approved by the Attorney-General in Bangkok. Legal details have to be considered carefully and so we can't say with certainty when it will get approval," Prajiad Aksornthammakul, Head of the Phuket Development Planning Group told the Phuket Gazette this week.

So far, twelve parties have approached Phuket authorities expressing interest. These include

1. Gold Phoenix Construction Consulting (Thailand) Co Ltd, a Thai affiliate of a Hong Kong and South Korea joint venture company, Zhi Shan Yan Construction

2. Moo Han Tech (Thailand) Co Ltd and affiliate of the Global Business Leader Group (GBL) from Korea

3. Korean firm Jung Yong Development Corp (JYDC);

4. Korean mega-project developer, Dohwa Engineering Co Ltd

5. Pan-China Construction Group, a construction and investment company from China

6. Chinese conglomerate, Ershi Sanye Construction Group

7. Korean firm, Keangnam Enterprises

Korean firm AZ Worth Trust Company

9. SPS Global Corporation Co Ltd

10. Lanna Transport Corporation Co Ltd

11. JM Westerling Co Ltd 12. Jude Trust Fund International Co Ltd

If constructed, the project could include up to three routes, and estimated to cost between 7 to 20 billion baht.

First home scheme a letdown?

THE government's new firsthome scheme is expected to boost Phuket's real-estate market, though critics say the plans do not go far enough to help low-income earners get a foot on the property ladder.

The market is likely to see a steep rise in new home sales in the short term, as home buyers who had been waiting for the launch of the scheme make their purchases.

The scheme, which applies to new condominiums, townhouses and detached houses worth up to 5 million baht, offers first-home buyers tax deductions worth up to 10% of the purchase price.

Buyers who qualify will receive 20% deductions on their income tax bill for five years.

The scheme applies to transactions made from now until the end of next year. It is expected to cost the Revenue Department about 1.7

billion baht in lost income.

The program has disappointed some buyers who had expected a more generous package that would see interest payments waived for the first five years of their mortgages.

Kasem Srirat, chairman of housing estate developer Winpro Engineering, said recently that he expected First Home to excite Phuket's property market, though it had so far had little effect on property reservations at Winpro's Chao Fa Garden project in Chalong.

Mr Kasem said he thought a scheme to waive interest on mortgages or reduce it to 1% would have had a greater effect on the property market.

Critics have attacked the government's plans, claiming the scheme will do little to help low-income groups purchase their first homes.

They argue that the government should have capped home prices at 1-2mn baht, instead of 5mn baht.

Prasert Taedullayasatit, director and chief business officer of property market leader Pruksa Real Estate, said the first-home policy would not help low-income earners save on costs because people who earn about 20,000 baht a month do not have sufficient net income to pay income tax.

"Even people who have a net income of about 4mn baht a year will get a tax benefit of only 184,000 baht over five years if they buy a first home costing 5mn baht," he said.

According to research by Pruksa, first-home buyers account for about 15% in value terms of annual residential sales, or 41.25bn baht of an estimated total of 275bn baht.

Most people buying a first home will spend between 1-2mn baht per

unit.

Pruksa estimates their yearly net income at between 200,000-300,000 baht, meaning they will save just 10,000 -20,000 baht over the course of the five-year program.

The previous Democrat Partyled government policy offered a zero interest rate for the first two years, resulting in an interest-payment saving of between 120,000-240,000 baht per buyer over the course of the scheme.

The government has also faced accusations that the policy has been designed to benefit SC Asset, the property investment firm owned by the Shinawatra family and formerly chaired by Prime Minister Yingluck Shinawatra.

Mrs Yingluck denied the claims, saying the company would hardly be affected since 90% of the property it sold was worth more than 5 million baht.

Foreign investor confidence; SET plummets to year-lows in September

TURMOIL in the global financial markets of Europe and the United States may result in a decline in foreign investment in Thailand and other developing countries, Finance Minister Thirachai Phuvanatnaranubala

"I'm warned. more worried about abrupt capiflows than the imslowdown," he was quoted as sayearlier this week.

Amidst worries

that Thailand's rice exports will decline as a result of the new rice pledging scheme set to take effect next week, Thirachai compared the lack of foreign investment to running out of oxygen, while saying a slowdown in exports is analogous to running out of food, emphasizing that the government was immediately concerned with offsetting the former. He said developing economies, particularly those dependent on exports, should boost domestic consumption and investment in order to lessen the impact of an expected

slowdown in exports. Speculations about a coming

foreign investment drought were reflected in the Stock Exchange of Thailand (SET) indices which plummeted to year-long lows in September. On


September 22, the SET closed below 1000 points for the first time in a sixmonth period. Last weekend, the SET dropped another 54 points, closing at 904 points on

Monday – the lowest close since August, 2010. While the government has acknowledged the impacts and repercussions of financial activity overseas, critics continue to point to the negative

implications of controversial domestic-stimulus policies such as the 300 baht minimum wage increase and rice mortgaging scheme.

Such policies, when implemented, are expected to dramatically drive up the cost of domestic production and services, and thus further deter foreign investment.

To compensate for the price rises, the Pheu Thai government has also promised to reduce corporate tax rates, currently at 30 per cent, down to 20 per cent over a two-year period, starting with a decrease of 23 per cent by next year. Corporate tax rates in Malaysia, Vietnam, and Indonesia are currently at about 25 per cent, compared to Hong Kong and Singapore which are at 16.5 and 17 per cent respectively.

Choosing the best wireless connection

Live Wire By Woody Leonhard

IN MY last two Live Wire columns I talked about the three general types of internet connections available in Phuket – landlines, wireless and satellite – and then gave some recommendations about landlines. This week I'll explain how to find a good wireless connection.

Wireless internet may be your best option in a number of circumstances. Of course, if the big landline companies (TOT, 3BB, True, CAT, and the Cable TV companies) won't string a wire to your house, you have no choice but to go wireless.

But even if you can get a wired connection, wireless may be better, for several reasons. If you only have one laptop or tablet to connect to the internet, going with a "3G" connection (forgive me for using the term "3G" very, very loosely) gives you a lot of mobility, because you aren't plugged into the wall. Wireless connections are generally cheaper than wired – and frequently they're surprisingly fast. Wireless has one more built-in advantage, especially here in Phuket: the connections tend to be much more reliable than wired connections, especially older wired connections.

In spite of what you might have read or heard, wireless connections can be shared among multiple co-located computers. If you have a house full of PCs, wireless combined with a MyFi box (for details see my August 6 Live Wire column by typing "is.gd/msmOoK" in your web browser) you can share one internet connection with many devices. Some phones and tablets can also share their connections with PCs and other devices, using a technique called "tethering." The exact method for tethering phones and tablets differs depending on which phone or tablet you're using, so you'll have to hunt down specific instructions. Google is your friend.

YOUR MOBILE PHONE MUST MATCH THE REQUIREMENTS OF THE WIRELESS NETWORK: The standard Galaxy S II works on both the HSDPA 850 MHz and HSDPA 900 MHz networks, which means it will work with both AIS and TrueMove-H, but it will not work with the CAT CDMA system.

Right now, the primary concern for wireless connections is whether your phone or tablet will work with a specific vendor's network. If you're going to use a USB dongle to connect to a wireless network – common with laptops – you don't need to worry: the vendor will sell you a dongle that will plug into your PC or MacBook. But if you're trying to connect your phone or tablet, you may not have any choice but to match the phone or tablet with a network that will work with the device.

Right now there are three "3G" networks that are actively marketed in Phuket. (Others are rumored to be coming. Stay tuned.) The three contenders:

CAT "3G" CDMA 1xEV-DO does NOT work with the iPhone 3G, 3GS, iPhone 4, iPad 1, iPad 2, or any of the other phones or tablets widely available in Phuket.

AIS "3G" HSPA 900 MHz does NOT work with the iPhone 3G, 3GS, or the original iPad. It DOES work with the original Samsung Galaxy S, the iPhone 4 and iPad2. TrueMove-H "3G+" HSPA+ 850 MHz does NOT work with the original Samsung Galaxy S, however, it DOES work with the iPhone 3G, 3GS, iPhone 4, original iPad, and iPad 2.

To verify that your phone or tablet will work on a specific network, go to www.gsmarena.com and look it up. As you can see in the picture above, the new Samsung Galaxy S II works with both HSDPA 850 and 900. That means it'll work on both the AIS and Truemove-H networks.

Note that True no longer offers its original "True Move 3G" network. As of this printing, they're going to be moving all of their customers over to a new network called TrueMove-H 3G+. Confused? Yeah. Me, too. As I explained in my February 3 Live Wire ("is.gd/dkm5OA"), True bought out Hutch in Bangkok, and they've upgraded, expanded and renamed their old 3G service. Bottom line: if you were using the old True 3G service, you have to change your SIM card, but you'll end up with a faster connection that works all over Phuket.

At this moment I'm having trouble getting my Android phone to recognize the new, improved TrueMove-H HSPA+ signal, but initial indications are that the service is significantly faster than AIS. Stay tuned for more details next week.

Be wary of Chinese initial public offerings

IN THE midst of the accounting scandals that are currently affecting a significant number of Chinese companies listed overseas, Eric Rosenkranz was in typically ebullient form on Squawk Box recently, warning investors to stay wary of new Initial Public Offerings (IPOs) of Chinese companies.

He explained how many firms keep multiple sets of books: "I've been investing in China for the last

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10 years and there's one thing I've learned - with many Chinese companies there are usually two sets of books, and whenever there are two sets of books, there are usually three."

The first set of books minimizes taxable profits and is designed to be submitted to the tax authorities.

The second set exaggerates earnings and is designed to be shown to potential investors or to banks.

The third most closely reflects the true information on the company and is, therefore, the one that investors really need to seek before investing.

Eric went on to suggest a checklist of three boxes that he requires to be ticked before investing in a listing:

1. Is the company listed on a "reputable" exchange such as the NYSE, NASDAQ or Hong Kong Stock Exchange.

2. Is it a new or reverse listing dangers lurk within reverse mergers that use shell companies to list. Of the 200 Chinese companies that have gone public in the US over the last four years, 75 per cent had done so via reverse listings.

3. Is the company that's listing using one of the big four accounting firms: KPMG, Ernst & Young, Deloitte and/or PWC.

Unless all 3 boxes are ticked, Eric would suggest steering clear, but the quality of the auditor is the most crucial factor. As an independent non-executive director of Focus Media

As an independent non-executive director of Focus Media si Network (a company unrelated to Focus Media China), which listed si on the Hong Kong Stock ri Exchange's GEM board in July si 2011, he was quick to point out that Focus Media Network keeps th only one set of books, had to pass the stringent regulations of the Hong Kong Exchange, and retains si Pricewaterhouse Coopers as its accounting firm.


Even the big four accounting firms are not necessarily 100 per cent reliable - Eric looked at Deloitte's role in failing to pick up sooner on the apparent accounting fraud at Chinese financial software firm Longtop Financial.

"It's not Deloitte US, it's a subsidiary of theirs which is a Chinese company, and one of the issues is US regulators are not allowed into China to look at the books. So the US regulators from the SEC have been forbidden, because of country sovereignty issues, from looking at the books," he said.

While this is fascinating, and while China looks to be of good

relative value today, we still see China exposures as a relatively small part of portfolios. The global economic backdrop is not supportive of any equity valuations right now. China is in a different stage of the economic cycle and may be entering into the end of the fat growth inflationary stage that western economies exited over a decade ago. Also, at this stage, the understandable inability of regulators to keep pace with the huge boom in all things Chinese in recent years means that, right now, we just do not trust the reliability of any numbers coming out of China - corporate or sovereign.

As Nouriel Roubini recently observed, China will be a huge opportunity on the next growth cycle, but depending on how much debt China takes on, the next bust (and, therefore, major buying opportunity) is at least two years away and possibly more. A small exposure to proven stock pickers right now at current Chinese valuations is the most that we would recommend, and even then you would need to keep your finger hovering over the sell button.

DEEP water soloing is a pure form of climbing practiced on seaside cliffs at high tide. It relies solely upon water at the base of the climb to protect climbers from injury when free falling from the generally high, difficult routes.

This exciting sport has been popular since the mid to late 1990s, but actually originated in the late 1980s on the traditional rock climbing routes on the coasts

of Dorset and Devon, UK. Trips are now offered in France, parts of Ireland, Sardinia, Majorca, Spain, and Greece.

Here in Southern Thailand, there are five main deep water solo destinations: Ko Phi Phi, Ko Yao Noi, Ko Hong, Ko Lao Liang, and Tonsai Beach.

Basecamp Tonsai, next to Railey in Krabi province, is the pioneer company for deep water soloing trips in southern

Thailand. They try rock climbing problems from as low as Grade 5 up to Grade 8a.

You don't have to be a rock climbing pro to make a deep water solo splash: "Apart from climbers of all ages who come from all over the world, we also run deep water solo trips with school

groups from Singapore, so anyone who knows how to swim and is reasonably fit can try," said Elke Schmitz, proprietor of Basecamp Tonsai.

When asked if it hurts when you fall, Elke explained: "It depends on how high you are and the position of your body when it hits the water surface. From under 10 meters, a human body can pretty much fall into the water in any position without harm. Nevertheless, you should always try to hit the water upright, press your legs together (especially if you're a guy) and body." In case there are any problems, Basecamp Tonsai is equipped with a first aid kit and rescue-trained boat driver.

All deep water soloing trips include an English-speaking guide, kayak transportation between the climbing rock and the boat, old climbing shoes, chalk, liquid chalk and chalk bags, lunch in reusable boxes, and drinking water. You need to bring swim wear,



sun lotion, and dry clothes for the ride back. The trips are environment-friendly, so please don't take any plastic bottles, chip bags, candy wrappers, or any other non-biodegradable products with you.

Basecamp - Elke Schmitz Tonsai also runs Proprietor sunset trips at Basecamp Tonsai half moon twice each month. The

boat leaves at around 2pm and they spend 4 to 5 hours deep water soloing before giving climbers time to relax on the deserted beach of Chicken Island with food and a sunset drink. There's also a great fire show after dark. Contact the shops for exact dates of these excursions.

PHUKET'S Vegetarian Festival is a yearly religious event held in honor of the nine Taoist Gods (Kiu Ong Iah), who are revered for their power to protect the island and its inhabitants.

For ten days during the ninth lunar month, the Chinese community observes a strict code of conduct to purify the body and mind: celibacy, cleanliness of the body, abstinence from alcohol and meat products.

During this time, vegetarian restaurants spring up all over the island to cater to vegetarian practices. Usually, vendors will cook up a multitude of various dishes in advance to save time for this very busy period. So what you get is mostly unappealing overcooked vegetables and soggy fries. Not so with Lotus Vegetarian Restaurant in Samkong, for every dish is cooked fresh on the spot.

Khun Pennapa 'Poom' Somnam, who has been a vegetarian for more than ten years, opened Lotus 12 years ago on Hongyok Utit Road behind Phuket Bangkok Hospital. Only a month ago, the restaurant moved to a larger premise on the same road. The new Lotus is bright and clean and fully air-conditioned. There's also a small outdoor area, which has proved popular for diners.

"Lotus or Dok Bua in Thai is a Buddhist symbol of enlightenment. Admittedly, you don't reach nirvana easily, but I believe that we should all try to at least practice the Buddhist precept of non-violence, and vegetarianism is part and parcel of this," says Khun Poom.

At Lotus, many types of mushrooms which are acquired daily from a nearby farm, are used in place of meat. There is also mock meat to please the die-hard carnivores, which is made by combining mushrooms, soybean derivatives

and herbs. It comes in many shapes and forms, such as roast duck, stewed pork and even prawns. It tastes and smells uncannily like real meat, although Khun Poom assures me that the seasonings they use are derived solely from natural products, notably the pungent shitake mushrooms and ferment soy paste.

Following the strict code of Phuket vegetarianism, where most strong-smelling herbs are forbidden, Khun Poom will not use garlic, onion, or chives in her cooking. However, pepper and chillies are allowed, so you will find a few spicy dishes here.

The meatless menu is varied, and all the usual Thai fares can be found here: yam or Thai salads, curries, stir-fries and noodles. Pla Pad Pong Curry (90 baht) mock fish with curry sauce is a cross between stir-fry and curry and has an unmistakably Indian flavor about it. Pad Thai (60 baht) is as every bit as good as the version with prawns. Try also the Kha Moo Rom Kwuan (90 baht) a kind of flavored smoked ham, or the Gaeng Ped Ped Yang (90 baht), roast duck red curry. For the purists who have an aversion to mock meat, sample instead the refreshing Nam Tok Hed (80 baht) Isaan-style mixed mushrooms salad, or the aromatic Makuer Yao Pad Prik Horapa (60 baht) eggplant cooked with sweet basil and fermented soybean. Perfect as snacks or side dishes are Goong Tempura (70 baht) battered and breadcrumbed fried mushrooms wrapped in seaweed, and Yam Pla Dook Foo (B90) crispy fish (tofu) salad with herbs.

There are various kinds of refreshing homemade herbal drinks. When it was suggested that these drinks tend to be on the sweet side, Khun Poom says she would consider reducing the amount of sugar used.

The restaurant is open daily from 10.30am to 8.30pm. Please note its unusual closing days: every first Sunday, and second and fourth Saturdays of the month. T:076 211985.

Phuket Vegetarian Festival runs from September 27 to October 5.

Amazing Thailand



THE SIGNIFICANT increase in tourist arrivals in Thailand and consequently Phuket so far in 2011 not only reinforces the impact of more direct flights, but also a number of other factors that make Thailand almost the ideal location for large scale tourism.

In January to March this year Thailand had 5.33 million visitors and from April to June, 4.35 million visitors, both considerably up on the same period in 2010, which itself was a record year. Predictions of an unprecedented 20 million visitors to The Kingdom are now being made by tourism experts.

But what about color politics, elections and uncertainty over the new government? Don't the figures defy conventional wisdom that the sight of unrest in a country scares visitors away?

Not in Amazing Thailand, apparently, and there are some good reasons for this, apart from more airlines flying directly to places like Phuket, which boosts overall numbers.


Firstly, according to research by Thaiwebsites.com, it takes just two or three months for potential visitors to resume their interest in visiting Thailand after negative

factors such as the red shirts uprising last year, worldwide recession and H1N1 (bird flu) scares. For example 2010, apart from the April-May quarter when the red shirtsgovernment confrontation was at its height, showed higher numbers than in 2009. By contrast in April this year, according to the Pacific Asia Travel Association (PATA), Thailand tourist arrivals were up 35 percent.

Economic factors also work in Thailand's favor, as well as against it. For example, the Australian dollar has consistently outperformed the US dollar in recent months. The result. Australians who traditionally come to Phuket in our low season poured in, helped by direct flights from carriers like Jetstar, Pacific Blue and Strategic. The Australian market continues to grow in importance, with Phuket tourism leaders taking a road show to the continent in late 2011 to boost the island's profile.

Thailand's geographic position also makes it very attractive for airlines to fly here. For example, the Middle East airlines, which are still relatively new on the scene quickly discovered Bangkok as a hub. Emirates, Qatar and Etihad all have a sizeable presence at Suvarnabhumi Airport.

Thai Airways membership of Star Alliance also helps with connections through Suvarnabhumi to other Asian destinations



and domestic ports like Phuket. Star Alliance has 45.9 percent of slots at Bangkok, far ahead of its alliance rivals Oneworld (4.5 percent) and Skyteam (6.8 percent) with the rest, significantly, made up of nonaligned carriers such as Thai AirAsia and Bangkok Airways. Air Berlin, already a large player in the Phuket market, is to join Oneworld, which should further boost its ability to service the island.

The impact of the non-aligned carriers at Bangkok airport is significant. According to the Australian based Centre for Asia Pacific Aviation, Thai AirAsia and Bangkok Airways were second and third, behind Thai Airways International, for seats offered per week, much more that large full service carriers like Cathay Pacific, Emirates, China Airlines, Qatar Airways, Singapore Airlines and Sri Lankan Airlines.

So there are many reasons why Thailand manages to bounce back from multiple body blows.

However, it would be wrong for Thailand to rest on its laurels. A warning about the continued use of the Amazing Thailand brand was sounded earlier this year by David Keen, CEO of KEEN, a Bangkok based branding agency, who told a PATA meeting that the brand was out of date, did not reflect the future of Thailand and was also driving tourism prices down because the word 'Amazing' was misunderstood in the international market place.

Maybe these observations are relevant, but it seems people do relate to Amazing Thailand. Attempts have been made in the past to try other slogans, but without the same success. What such branding needs is consistency - look at Malaysia's Malaysia - Simply Asia campaign, which has not changed for years.

Where Thailand has had to adapt is because of the impact of internal and external factors, some self inflicted, that requires a different message that says "Come back, it's safe now".

Boeing's first Dreamliner lands in Tokyo

BOEING delivered its first 787 Dreamliner to Japan's All Nippon Airways (ANA) this week in an historic event witnessed by executives from both firms and the international media.

The aircraft flew out from the aircraft maker's facilities in Everett, Seattle, on Monday and landed in Tokyo the following day.

The new aircraft's first passenger flight will be a chartered one from Tokyo's Narita Airport to Hong Kong.

The Boeing 787 Dreamliner is a long-range, mid-sized twin-engine jet airliner seating 210 to 290 passengers. The Dreamliner, made out of composite materials, is the most fuel-efficient jet Boeing has built so

far and consumes 20 per cent less fuel than the Boeing 767, which is of a similar size. The jet's other distinguishing features include a four-panel windshield, noise-reducing chevrons on its engine cover as well as smoother contours.

Meanwhile, Thai Airways International recently signed up for 37 aircraft through a lease and purchase deal worth 118.6 billion baht. The deal includes six Boeing 777-300ERs, four Airbus A350-900s and five A320-200s.

officer for Boeing Flight Services, told the Asia-Pacific Airline Training Symposium held in Bangkok recently that the aviation industry needed to "bring the sexy back".

Over the next 20 years, more than 30,000 new commercial airplanes will be taking to the skies, and the industry will need up to 460,000 pilots, or nearly twice the number of pilots flying today.

Of course, having a new family member, and an uneducated, totally dependent one at that, brings with it a myriad of changes to your normal routine - and consequently to your dog's routine.

Amidst all the excitement of bringing home your new baby, your dog may end up sharing most of the anxiety and less of the fun.

There's quite a bit that can be done with your dog to make the new transition easier, and with nine months to go, you've got time on your side.

The calm before the storm

It's no surprise that your dog needs to adjust to the idea of having a baby around the house because, frankly, so do you. Changes in your routine, unfamiliar noises, less recreational time. and increased stress all have a huge impact on you both physically and mentally and as such, has a big impact on your dog's state of mind too.

QUICK TIPS

1. Make sure your dog has a basic understanding of good behavior. Brush up on his training so that he will lie quietly for short periods, won't jump up, can walk on the lead without pulling and will come when called. This will make both your lives much easier.

2. If your dog is an 'only' pet, it is quite likely he is used to being the 'baby' in your family. Help him get used to being less important, by ignoring him and leaving him alone for short periods of time every day with a tasty long-lasting chew.

3. If you are planning to keep your dog out of certain rooms or areas of the house once the baby arrives, then start doing this as soon as possible.

4. Bring new items of furniture such as playpens, carry cots and highchairs into the house, so that your dog can get used to them.

5. Try to teach your dog the difference between his toys and those that will belong to the baby.

6. Develop a routine that you intend to follow when the new baby arrives and stick with it. This will help your dog cope with all the new changes in your home.

The first thing to think about is what kind of exposure has your dog already had to other animals, children, and infants? How did he react? What kind of experience was it? It's worth consulting a canine behaviorist to assess your dog too.

Don't mistake dog "breed" for safety. Sure, some dogs are promoted as "great with kids and babies", but all dogs are different, and if there's any chance he could react badly to a new baby - you need to know before it happens.

Start preparing your dog by getting him used to you holding something in your arms while you go about normal routines.

Dolls that make realistic baby sounds, while nerve shatteringly annoying, are easy to find in Phuket.

You can also take him to the area where your newborn will sleep or play and reward him for being calm. If you have already bought your push-chair, take it on your walks with you as if it's totally normal and allow your dog to get used to it.

Baby lotion, diapers, buggies, and cots will all bring new smells into the house and it's worth having them around well in advance to get Rover used to it. Once baby arrives, you can also bring home blankets that have the babies new smell and place them in the cot, or the buggy.

Exposing your dog to lots of children and babies of all ages in a safe and positive manner will also help him to learn that he can be calm and controlled amidst the commotion. Again, a behaviorist can help you further.

New baby boot camp

Having your dog enrolled in obedience training prior to baby's arrival should be given serious consideration as you will all benefit tremendously.

You'll truly appreciate the added benefits of having a dog that will sit, lie


down, go to place, leave it, or settle down, all on command. In fairness, your priority, and thus all your attention and patience, is going to spent on your newborn, not

your dog. While this is completely understandable from a human perspective, our canine friends are very much in the dark as to what all the fuss is about.

You're also likely to react more strongly to bad behavior that previously you might have been more tolerant of. Some people don't mind if their dog barks every now and then, or jumps up to say 'hello' – but if baby is trying to sleep, or you're holding baby in your arms, barking and jumping are going to cause problems.

You can take a lot of pressure and worry off your shoulders (and your dogs) by enrolling the dog in some obedience sessions.

Without the benefit of training, you need to be aware of your dog's limitations and be guarded not to "shut him out" just because he won't sit for you. You can still have a calm, baby-loving dog, but you need to manage it.

that doesn't mean he won't snap if awoken suddenly by a baby yanking on his whiskers. Having your pooch under some level of obedience control will clearly help, but you can also look to other management techniques such as baby gates or using a doggy travel crate.

The humane treatment of all animals is an important lesson for children of any age, as is respect for a healthy set of canine teeth. Having a pet in the house is by far the best way for your child to learn about how to properly handle a dog, or other animal.

Having them involved in walking, bathing, feeding or even training your dog will have immense benefits to them personally, as well as the added benefits to your pet.

WANIDA Hongyok hails from one of the most prominent families in Phuket. Her life is a rich tapestry of events and experiences, some of which were played out during the time when Phuket, due to its natural resources, was the richest province in the country.

Her grandfather, Luang Anupaskitkarn, of Chinese descent, ran a successful tin-mining business in the first half of the century. The title 'Luang' (a rough equivalent of the British knighthood 'Sir') was conferred to him by King Rama VI in 1931 in recognition of his business success and his contributions to local communities.

During the heyday of the tinmining, Luang Anupas built a row of three adjacent shop houses for his large, extended family and as a business premises. These elegant Sino-Portuguese houses still stand today along Krabi Road.

Wanida remembers that, "the houses were teeming with people coming and going. Three generations were living there, along with office workers, mine labourers, and servants. The cooks had to boil rice in a huge cast iron wok to feed us all. My siblings and I spent our days playing on the mountains of stored ore bags. They were great for hide and seek."



Having studied Business Administration in England, Wanida worked in Bangkok where she met and married her Canadian husband, Glen Dunkley.

"I was always a tomboy and naively I thought I'd never ever marry. Although I had a few suitors, I knew those men were interested because of my father's position (he was twice mayor of Phuket) so it was no go for me. Luckily my father was a liberal man and he never forced us to do anything that was against our heart. Still, when Glen proposed, my parents heaved a big sigh of relief."

She started to write for the *Phuket Gazette* in the early 1990s when the family settled down here. "Momma Duck was my Hash name given to me because I was always the last at the finishing line. I enjoyed the scenery more than the actual running. Foreign friends always asked me for advice on this and that, usually the cultural stuff. Then the newspaper thought it was a good idea to run a column featuring my friendly advice." Thus was born the hugely popular column 'Ask Momma Duck'. The Gazette ran it for ten years, and its readers were dismayed when it ended in 2001.

The column generated all kinds of questions, some weird and a few wonderful. But what Wanida remembers most was, "this farang man worrying about his Thai wife cutting off his penis while he slept. I said to him, 'we Thai women tend to have that kind of outburst, and if you have been unfaithful you should sleep on your tummy!""

Wanida now works as Vice-Chancellor for the Phuket Austrian Consulate, the job that has always been in her family. Her boss, the Honorary Consul, Khun Phumisak Hongyok, is her cousin.

"It's an honorific title, but the job is not dissimilar to Momma Duck column - service to the people, especially those lost and frustrated expats.'

During her free time, Wanida devotes herself to charity work helping homeless children. She is proud of her humanitarian efforts. "It runs in the family, I guess. The Hongyok people believe that you should return what you earn to the society. My grandfather always said, 'money will flow readily into your life when you give freely."







PHUKET and Samui continue to be described as the Yin and Yang of resort island destinations. Characteristics that they both share are that both are islands in Thailand that champion tourism as the overall economic prosperity jackpot. 

Covering a lot of ground

THE many virtues of ground cover plants were discussed here last week: their contrasting textures and colors; their capacity to act as a retaining layer by protecting the topsoil during tropical downpours, or as a natural mulch that absorbs much of the sun's heat and inhibits the growth of weeds. Most importantly, they cover bare and unsightly areas.

No ground cover plant is better than Wedelia trilobata or creeping daisy (kradum thawng). Originally imported from the Caribbean, it grows like a weed in Phuket,

rapidly covering patches that have been churned up and left for dead. But nothing stays dead for long in this part of the tropics, and Wedelia is one of the first to recolonize such places. Indeed, such is the success of the creeping daisy that it is classified as an invasive species in some Pacific regions.

A member of the aster family, it has



shiny, dark green, trilobed leaves, and yellow flowers that resemble daisies, with up to a dozen petals. The reason it spreads so quickly is due to their creeping stems – they put down roots from their leaf nodes as they explore new terrain.

If you want to grow Widelia in your own garden patch, simply pull up some rooted stems and replant them where you require cover. Since it tolerates sun or shade, and most soil conditions, Wedelia will do the rest on its own. It does

> particularly well under trees: in one area of my garden it has provided denser cover than the original Ma-

laysian palm grass. Since it has a naturally trailing habit, it also does well in raised containers. However, it can become straggly,

Nothing will cover the ground faster or more effectively than this plant. In the right conditions, it will form a dense green mat that's constantly adorned with yellow blooms.

Tithonia diversifolia, or bua thawg, is another bright bloomer that also takes up a lot space. It doesn't lie low, but instead forms spectacular clumps. Naturalized in parts of Northern Thailand, it may cover whole hillsides with its orange flowers from September to December. The flowers are huge - up to five inches across - hence its common name, Mexican sunflower. Although it's more of a screening shrub than a ground cover agent, it's definitely worth growing should you need to blot out any unsightly objects or spaces in your garden.

The same can be said of Lantana montevidensis, another hardy shrub which provides a useful cover for sunny parts of the garden. It has rough, dark green foliage, and constant clusters of pinkish-mauve flowers. Nowadays, many hybrids are available in Phuket's nurseries, often with different combinations of colors on the same plant. Since Lantana spreads by means of creeping stems, it covers the ground effectively and rapidly and needs little attention apart from liberal doses of sun and well-drained soil. It dislikes waterlogged conditions, but it's not likely to encounter this in most Phuket gardens.

Cuphea hyssopifolia is a much smaller shrub (about 50 centimeters high) with tiny, evergreen leaves and a multi-branched habit. With its low spreading growth and small mauve flowers, from a distance it looks like a heather, hence its common name, false heather. A popular plant for border edges when planted en masse, it can carpet a whole area. Don't put it in deep shade – it will die back.

What do these shrubs have in common? Well, they all come from Central America, they all provide ground cover, and oddly enough, they have all been labeled "invasive" in other parts of the

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Tip of the week

Making the most of microclimates

A MICROCLIMATE is defined as a small area which has a climate that differs from that of the surrounding area. It may be wetter, drier, warmer, colder, sunnier or shadier.

Even a small island such as Phuket has distinct climatic variations. From May to November, the prevailing winds come from the southwest from the Indian Ocean - which result in heavier rainfall on the west coast. From December to April, northeast winds arriving from China bring cooler, drier air. Since Phuket has a backbone of hills, the windward side is more affected by these climatic patterns.

Some microclimates exist because of inland water, forests, or shorelines. Urban areas are hotter than 'green' spaces because of the generation and retention of heat and carbon dioxide.

If your garden undulates, the south-facing slopes will get more sun, so you need to select plants that will tolerate its full effects, for example euphorbias, ixoras, bougainvilleas, or pereskias.

throughout much of the first half, but the score remained 1 - 0 into half time.

PTT went on the attack in the second half, but could not find the back of the net. Phuket's defense was composed and had few counter opportunities, but Watcharapong doubled their lead in the 72nd minute with a towering header off a free kick by Boubacar Issoufou.

On 79 minutes, Phuket midfielder Hossian "Sian" Nussim came off the bench to replace Jongrak Pakdee. Moments later, Phuket attacked PTT's right flank with Kone Adama driving all the way to the goal line, drawing defenders with him. His shot towards Watcharpong at the near post was parried by PTT Rayong's goalkeeper out to the middle of the penalty area where Nussim met his queue to finish and secure the final 3-0 score line.

Phuket's win avenged a 1-0 loss away to PTT Rayong earlier in the year and moved the Southern Sea Kirin up to sixth place in the TPL Div One table, ahead of PTT Rayong and Bangkok United,

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who lost an away match, with a score of 0-1 on Saturday against 15th place team JW Rangist FC. 14th placed Bangkok FC also upset the form book with a home win against 3rd place Chainat, who are only 10 points ahead of Phuket.

Phuket's next match will be against Chiangmai FC at Somphot 700 pi Stadium on Sunday.

Few FC Phuket fans are expected to make the long-haul journey as the match falls in the middle of the Phuket Vegetarian Festival.

A source in the "Hulk" FC Phuket fan club said some Phuket students studying in Chiang Mai would be there to see the Southern Sea Kirin vie for their fifth straight league win against 16th place Chiang Mai, who already have six home losses.

I started from zero, but with the right guidance I became the fastest cyclist in triathlon for more than a decade.

Over 23 years as a professional triathlete I had the chance to learn a vast array of triathlon training techniques and I was inspired by these world-class training partners over those years.

Now I am here to pass on that expirience to anybody who wants to start in triathlon or wants to be the best that they can be!

Thai teams have rarely made an appearance on the international circuit over the past 10 years, despite favorable results on the home sands of Phuket. But next year, due to the availability of sponsorship support, it has been announced that at least two teams will compete on the FIVB Beach Volleyball Swatch World Tour.

Beach Volleyball coach Petcharat Putsorn who along with the Thailand Volleyball Association is organizing the Thailand teams for the 2012 World Tour briefly outlined a two-year plan.

"The teams will use the Phuket Thailand Open as a springboard to test the local girls' competitiveness against the world's top teams. It is our target to get the Thai teams through to the second day of the main draw competition. If we can achieve this goal, then we know we have the ability to make an impact next year. easy for us in our first year on the tour. We will have to play in the qualifying rounds at most of the tournaments as our teams do not have any ranking points. It is our goal to use 2012 to gain the necessary experience and pick up as many points as possible, so that we can launch a strong challenge in 2013 with the goal of getting at least two teams into the world's top 50," Petcharat said

Thailand is hopeful of getting three teams into the main draw of the Phuket Thailand Open with pairings of Kamoltip Kulna and Varapatsorn Radarong, Jarunee Sannok and Usa Tenpaksee, and Tanarattha Udomchavee and Rumpaipruet Numwong.

One of the more senior members of the Thai team, Kamoltip Kulna is looking forward to the upcoming challenges.

"We have been training hard for the tournament in Phuket and the SEA games, so we are feeling fit and confident about our chances of causing some surprises. Of course a lot depends on the draw, but I am sure that the Thai beach volley fans will be out there cheering us on, which is a huge motivation for us," she said.

New games for Youth Games

THREE new sports have been added to the official program of the 28th Thailand National Youth Games, to be held on March 18 to 28 next year, at the request of the host province, Phuket.

Sports Authority of Thailand (SAT) executives confirmed the inclusion of fencing, billiards and snooker, and woodball at a recent meeting on Phuket attended by Governor Tri Augkaradecha and the SAT's Deputy Governor of Elite Sports and Sports Science, Somkid Pinthong.

The new additions bring the total number of sports to be contested at the "Phuket Games" to 40.

"We have prepared the stadiums that will be used for the competition and the dormitories that athletes will be staying in. I can say that we are now 80 per cent ready," said Gov Tri.

However, he added that some of the venues still needed upgrades

be made on which venues will host some of the competitions.

"We are working on finding suitable venues for the sailing, rowing, billiards and snooker, fencing and hockey competitions," Gov Tri said. The governor confirmed that

the required budget of 130 million baht had already been secured. "We will not spend too much

money on opening and closing ceremonies. The money will be spent on improving competition venues instead," said Wirach Patee, Director of the SAT office in Phuket.

Phuket has hosted many international competitions, but surprisingly we still do not have any stadiums that meet international standards, not even Surakul Stadium does," Mr Wirach added.

Phuket Provincial Administrative Organization is assigned to be in charge for the opening and closing ceremony, as well as de-

and that final decisions had yet to termining the athlete that will be the games official torch runner. "The torch runner for the

Phuket Games might be Nithi Piyapan, a former member of Thailand national athletics team, or famous Phuket badminton players, Maneephong Jongjit and Nitchaon Jindaphon," said Mr Wirach.

The previous National Youth Games were held in Utaradit province. Phuket athletes won eight gold medals, six silver medals, and 16 bronze medals, which ranked them in 15th place overall for the competition.

"Our goal this year is to win 15 gold medals from events including; golf, badminton, tennis, karate-do, and patanque. Though we want to focus on providing a good standard of stadium and fair games management. Winning medals is the least of our worries for this year." said Mr Wirach.
