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More blood is needed to help

Call for blood donors to help flood victims

THE Phuket Regional Blood Center (PRBC) is asking for more people to donate blood to help flood victims.

"Due to the floods in Bangkok, the National Blood Center had a shortage of blood at the beginning of the month. The center normally receives about 1,500 units of blood daily, but it went down to less than half that about 600 units per day," said
 PRBC Acting Director Pornthip

"With the floods continuing, we still need blood and we hope that the PRBC can collect more. Many local schools and other organizations that never did so before have asked for us to set up our mobile clinics on their property. We're very thankful for that," Ms Pornthip added.

The PRBC is located at Saphan Hin in Phuket Town and is open daily for walk-in donations.

Transport chief puts brakes on negligence

PHUKET Provincial Land Transportation Office (PLTO) chief Terayout Prasertphol has announced strict new measures that will hold tour bus companies responsible for the mechanical safety of their vehicles.

Under the new measures, tour bus companies stand to have their commercial passenger permits revoked entirely, meaning the companies' right to operate any commercial passenger vehicles will be terminated, chief Terayout told the Gazette.

The move comes after two serious bus crashes in Phuket within the same week in late October. Both accidents were attributed to brake failure.

"There was a tour bus crash [on the hill from] Karon [to Chalong] on October 22 in which one Chinese tourist died and many were injured. Then on October 26, a tour bus full of Russians crashed on Patong Hill, which injured a lot of tourists," Chief Terayout told a group of more than 10 Phuket tour bus company representatives this

"Official departments and organizations in Phuket are seeing this as a very important issue. From now on, in the case a tour bus crashes, the police will now charge both the driver and the registered owner of the bus," he

Mr Terayout said his office had discovered that many bus companies were using vehicles that had not been issued their annual road safety inspection certificates.

"Bus companies often report to our office that some of their buses

are no longer in service or they simply do not present buses for their bi-annual inspection.

"The penalty for using a bus that has not been issued its annual roadworthy certificate is a fine of up to 50,000 baht. This is because doing so could cause a serious accident," he said.

Companies found to repeatedly neglect having their buses undergo the safety inspections will have their commercial passenger permits revoked.

Chief Terayout added that any bus companies found to be using drivers who do not have the appropriate license – or that their drivers had been found to have been drunk driving and involved in an accident – also stood to have their permits revoked.

"The full responsibility for keeping buses safe must be with the bus companies because they are the ones who maintain their vehicles.

"This includes tour companies and independent operators hired by tour companies to provide bus services.

Public safety boosted through CCTV rollout

THE Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (OrBorJor) will install 189 CCTV cameras throughout Koh Kaew and Rassada at a cost of 29.8 million baht.

The roll-out is phase two of the OrBorJor's "citizen safety" campaign, which will coordinate with police in providing CCTV footage of traffic accidents and other incidents, explained OrBorJor President Paiboon Upatising.

The cameras, some fixed-position and others with 360-degree views, will relay footage back to a control center at the *OrBorJor*'s hospital in Rassada.

Among the areas to be targeted by the phase-two roll-out are the Sapam local market and the area around the Phuket Rajabhat University campus.

"Phase one of our CCTV campaign involved installation of 53 cameras throughout Phuket Town, with the cameras feeding a control center set up at the Phuket Provincial Police Station. This proved very successful and very useful for police investigations," said Mr Paiboon.

"In phase three, we will install another 300 CCTV cameras that will also feed video to the control center at the hospital. We have yet to decide where and when to install the cameras for that phase. We will see what the completed phase two looks like and then decide on phase three later," he added.

In this phase, the cameras were zette that under the government contract for phase two, CS LoxInfo Plc is to complete the installations by January 19, 2012.

"The budget is 29,838,000 for the entire project, including wire installation and the control room at the hospital.

"LoxInfo will install 142 CCTV cameras at 38 locations in Rassada, plus nine cameras at six locales on Chumphon Road. In Koh Kaew, 38 CCTV cameras will be installed at eight locations," she

inspect buses. These checkpoints will be in operation twice a week," Mr Terayout said.

By the end of this month the PLTO will start holding training sessions to update bus companies of their legal obligations in providing safe transportation.

The training will include warnings of roads in Phuket known to be dangerous, so drivers can exercise extra caution when navigating those roads, said the

"I am also concerned about buses from other provinces. The drivers are not used to Phuket

roads. This might cause accidents, especially on the Patong and Karon hills," he said.

Regarding the previous two bus crashes on the Patong and Karon hills, Chief Teerayout confirmed to the Phuket Gazette, "These accidents happened because the drivers did not pay enough attention to the road. They probably were driving too fast on the hills and caused the accidents.

"Both of these buses were registered in Phuket. The cases are now under police investigation." However he said that the new strict enforcement of the law will not be applied retroactively to these cases.

Student killed in truck crash

A 16-year-old student has died and her classmate is in hospital after a six-wheeled truck collided with the motorcycle they were riding in Phuket Town on Tuesday.

Capt Thada Sodarak of Phuket City Police said officers received a report of the accident at 12:30pm.

The accident happened at the junction from Phuket Road to Saphan Hin, near the Phuket Immigration Office, said Capt Thada.

"From our initial investigation, the ice truck was heading towards Saphan Hin when the accident happened. The truck dragged the rider for about 10 meters before coming to a stop. She was killed in the accident," he said.

"The other girl, who survived the impact, was rushed to Vachira Phuket Hospital," he added.

A teacher at Phuket Vocational

College, which is about 250 meters from the scene of the accident, identified the deceased as Wiparat Ketkaew, 16, from Chumphon province.

The teacher also identified Wiparat's classmate, who survived the impact, as Panatta Panumas, also 16 years old. A nurse at

Vachira Phuket Hospital confirmed that Panatta escaped with only scratches, but was admitted overnight for observation.

"Wiparat was a first-year domestic science student. The girls had just finished morning class and assisting the school's efforts in making meals to be sent to flood victims in Bangkok," said the teacher.

"Wiparat called her mom just a few days ago and said she missed her, so her mum came to Phuket to stay with her. Last night was her first night staying with her daughter. Now her mum is in shock. She's still at the hospital," the teacher told the Gazette.

Capt Thada said the driver of the truck fled the scene, but was later arrested by police. "We are continuing our investigation into what happened," he said.

Phuket Airport ready to receive redirected flights

PHUKET International Airport (PIA) is ready to take on the role as the Airport Authority of Thailand (AoT) Emergency Operations Center if Suvarnabhumi International Airport in Bangkok succumbs to floods.

"We held a meeting to discuss the possibility of PIA becoming the alternate [main] airport in case Suvarnabhumi Airport is unable to operate," said an AoT Phuket spokesperson.

Although Phuket has already entered its tourism high season and the airport is bustling with air traffic, the spokesperson said Phuket Airport was prepared to take on the role.

Staff at the airport will prepare special areas in case of a further increase in air traffic, though they will only be able to handle additional flights at specific hours.

"The PIA can open up one spot for a Boeing 744-400 and a couple spots for Airbus 300 aircraft from midnight to 8am. A couple more spots will be available for Airbus 300 aircraft from 8am to noon," the spokesperson said.

Somchai Sawasdeepon, AoT Senior Executive Vice President and Acting General Manager of Suvarnabhumi Airport, considers the move as precautionary only as he believes the extensive dyke system installed around Suvarnabhumi will protect the airport from encroaching flood waters.

Patong plan to transform human feces into fertilizer

PATONG Municipality will apply for a 65-million-baht loan to build a treatment plant that will convert thousands of tonnes of Phuket's fecal matter into fertilizer.

The Patong Council last Friday carried the motion in favor of building the fertilizer factory, with a plan to profit from the horrendous waste.

Residents and tourists in the resort town generate up to 10 tonnes of firm organic waste a day, explained Patong Mayor Pian Keesin.

From July 2010 to September 2011, the solid waste amounted to 2,020 tonnes, he added.

"I would like to turn this sludge into valuable fertilizer," he told the council.

"Right now we are giving it away. It helps plants and trees to grow very quickly... If we turn it into fertilizer, it will make a lot of

money for us," he said.

The loan application will be filed with the 'Office of Environmental Fund' and include plans for a two-storey building covering 1,168 square meters of land at the Patong Wastewater Treatment Plant to produce the fertilizer.

The plans will also include a sixroom, two-storey accommodation block for workers.

"The loan should be approved within six months and it will take about one year for construction," said Mayor Pian.

"The fertilizer plant will be able to produce 10 tonnes of fertilizer a day. The current market price for fertilizer is about 10 baht a kilogram, but we will sell it for only

five to six baht a kilogram.

"If we follow the plan, I am sure we will be able to pay back the loan within seven years," Mayor Pian said.

Expat, wife arrested for M16 assault rifle in car

POLICE arrested a long-term expat and his wife after finding what they identified as an M16 automatic assault rifle with a loaded clip in the back of their car last Saturday.

Thung Thong Police Duty Officer Lt Col Chana Suttimard told the *Gazette*, "At 4am [last Saturday], police arrested Ivan Vaclavik, 43, from Slovakia, and 32-year-old Phuket-native Suppasa Chuyyamukkasik.

"Both are residents of Kathu. They live in a residential estate near the Loch Palm Golf Course and have two children together," he explained

The couple had just left the Isarn Return Pub and Restaurant near Kathu market and were driving towards Patong when they were arrested.

"I have yet to be informed of the full details of what happened. At this stage all I know is that the officers involved believed the couple were 'acting suspiciously', so they stopped and searched the vehicle," Lt Col Chana said.

"In the back of the car, a white Honda CR-V, they found an M16 and one magazine loaded with ammunition," he said.

The M16 is the primary service rifle of the United States Military, with semi-automatic and fully-automatic variants. Police did not provide information regarding which variant the rifle was in the

During questioning Mr Vaclavik told Lt Col Chana that he had just returned from a trip abroad on his yacht, which was at a marina at Ao Por.

"He said that his yacht needed repairs so he had to take everything off the boat while the repairs were being made. That included the M16," Lt Col Chana said.

Mr Vaclavik said he bought the rifle in the Philippines and that it was only for self-defense, as sometimes during his trips abroad he needed to sail into the dangerous pirate-infested waters off Somalia, he added.

Mr Vaclavik was charged with possession of an illegal firearm and carrying a firearm in a public place, while Mrs Suppasa was also charged with possession of an illegal firearm.

Both are being held at Phuket Provincial Prison.

Mr Vaclavik has lived in Phuket for about 15 years, police said.

Until recently, he was a part owner in the Phuket Tropical Inn resort on Nanai Road in Patong.

"He is no longer involved in the hotel. He sold his partnership six months ago," a staff member at the hotel told the *Gazette*.

THAI upholds Yingluck call for 'evacuee' flights

PRIME Minister Yingluck Shinawatra has called on Thai Airways International to reduce airfares for flights to Phuket and other destinations in Southern Thailand.

The call for assistance came late last week in response to the imminent flooding of Rama II Road in Bangkok, the main artery connecting Bangkok with Southern Thailand.

"Thai Airways International will offer airfare discounts in response to PM Yingluck's request," said Yuparit Buaklee, a Thai Airways International Information Center officer

"The special fares will start from tomorrow and last until December 10. They're good for all Thai Airways flights between Bangkok and Southern Thailand in order to help flood victims who wish to evacuate to the South," she said.

Prices for one-way travel between Suvarnabhumi International Airport in Bangkok and the South are as follows:

- Phuket: 2,015 baht
- Krabi: 1,920 baht
- Surat Thani: 1,820 baht
- Samui: 2,930 baht

• Haad Yai: 2,255 baht.

The discount prices may not be available on the Thai Airways website, but customers may call the company's contact center at 02-356 1111 to buy tickets, Mrs Yuparit said.

Discounted tickets are also available at the Thai Airways ticketing office at Suvarnabhumi Airport.

All Airports of Thailand (AoT) airports, including Phuket Intenational, will charge an additional 100-baht airport tax. Non-AoT airports will levy a tax of at least 150 baht, she added.

Struggling

BAD news moves quickly – constantly – and there is a cast of usual suspects who society likes to push the blame on, people who are "different" or somehow not representative of the whole.

Who are they? Illegal immigrants, stateless people, migrant workers and essentially any other minority group that has the misfortune of being a convenient scapegoat. One such "group" of people that is closely watched and often stigmatized in Thai society is the transgender community: katoey. The Phuket Gazette's Chaiyot Yongcharoenchai reports.

KATOEY are born, raised and registered in the Kingdom of Thailand. They are, and have been, an integral part of Thai society dating back to at least the Rattanakosin period in the 18th century. However, in the mainstream psyche, katoey are placed on the the fringes of the Thai social fabric.

Loud, aggressive and violent are all stereotypes associated with the transgender community, especially in Patong – a classic case of "one rotten apple spoils the whole barrel".

However, there are "good apples" that have chosen a different path, but not without adversity.

Toedsak "Gai" Kaipraiwan, 30, earned a bachelor's degree from a university in Sakon Nakhon, her

home province in Northeastern Thailand (Isarn).

"I got a degree in education because I have always wanted to be a teacher, since I was young. Educating people has always been my passion," Gai said.

"Dreaming about it is one demic record and great thing, but making it reality is something completely different.

"When I graduated, I couldn't fected with HIV or an STD. wait to find a job teaching, but it wasn't as easy as I thought it would be.

"I grew my hair long, like a woman, and I dressed like a woman when I went to apply for jobs. I can't remember how many schools turned me down even though I have an excellent academic record and great teaching skills," Gai recalled.

"After months of trying, I finally got a job teaching English and Thai languages at a vocational school in Sakon Nakhon.

'The students respected me for who I am, not only because I was their teacher, but because of my ability – I was good at what I was doing. The only problem I had was with other male colleagues. They treated me differently and didn't respect me.

"The worst part was that they

always thought of me as a joke – they never took anything I said or did seriously.

"The same was true with people in my hometown. I realized that they thought of me as the joke of the community, so I decided to move somewhere that I could be respected," Gai said.

Gai moved to Phuket seven years ago and took a job at the reception desk at a hotel.

"I got along well with my colleagues. Even though we didn't hang out together after work, I knew that they respected me," she

She worked at the hotel for three years before taking a position as a counselor and coordinator at the Sabai Dee Clinic at Patong Hospital. The clinic provides blood tests, coun-

> seling services and an anonymous HIV clinic for transgender and homosexual people in Phuket.

Gai is happy in her new position where she advises transgender people on how to practice safe sex and how to take care of themselves if they

"Since I am a

part of this community, I might as well take an active role in it," she said.

The organization, among other things, conducts workshops for the LGBT community around Phuket, including sex workers in Patong.

"Once a year we have a big meeting with the Phuket Provincial Health Office where we report on our work. I was really scared at first.Part of it was because of my personal experience with non-transgender people – they usually look at us in a negative way and I wasn't sure if anyone would pay attention to what I said.

"I was wrong: everyone listened," Um said.

"This job has helped build my self-confidence and I hope some day that what I, and many others like me who are professionals, am doing right now can gradually change the way people see us," she said.

Many Thai employers look more at which educational institute the applicant graduated from than they do at personal experience. However, this principle does not apply to transgender people

Sompol "Wicky" Sitthiwetch, 30, has a bachelor's degree in hotel management from a top university in Phuket.

"I realized it would be difficult for me to get a job in the hotel business, so I accepted a job from my friend who owns a company. It was as a web developer for a hotel booking website – not exactly what I wanted to do, but I knew it wouldn't be easy for me

> to get a job somewhere else," Wicky said.

"After working there for two years, I decided to challenge myself more so I went job hunting.

"After approaching many hotels and companies, I started to understand more about discrimination.

Some hotels wanted to hire me, but they asked me to cut my hair short and 'appear as a man'.

"I turned them down because I won't do anything that forces me to change who I am," she said.

Wicky finally found a job at a small hotel on Soi Paradise, an area

popular for its gay nightlife scene in Patong.

She is also a volunteer at the Sabai Dee Clinic, where Gai works.

"I share knowledge about safe sex and HIV/AIDS to sex workers on Soi Paradise, which has been easy and rewarding for me as everyone here knows me and respects me.

"The hard-to-reach people seem to be the *katoey* sex workers on Soi Bangla [in Patong] – they seem to not want to cooperate, so I get to them through their *mama-sans*, or pimps," Wicky added.

"I know there are still a lot of nightclubs in Patong that ban transgender people from entering. At first I was upset, but I kind of understand their situation. Transgender people did bring a bad image to those venues.

"I just want to encourage all transgender people to help improve our image and let everyone know that a lot of us are quality people and we belong in society as equals," Wicky said.

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Car overturned after hitting buffalo

Vehicular bovicide continues

ONE car overturned, a bus was damaged and two buffalo were killed on November 11 after a motorbike driver clipped one of the beasts as he drove past, spooking both animals and causing them to run into oncoming traffic.

Kusoldharm Rescue Foundation workers received a report at about 12:30am that an accident involving three vehicles and two buffalo had occured on Thepkrasattri Road about one kilometer north of Thalang intersection.

At the scene, rescue workers found two dead buffalo in the road, a parked motorcycle, a hotel employee transport bus with a crushed front end and an upside down Honda sedan.

No humans were injured in the accident, and no one came forward to claim the buffalo, a rescue worker said.

This is the third such incident in four months. In late July, a passenger van hit and killed two buffalo while in August, an Airport limo hit and killed one buffalo. Both incidents occurred at about 1:30am on Thepkrasattri Road in Thalang. No humans were injured in either incident.

Patong resort moves to stave off 'boulder rain'

AFTER waiting months for steps to be taken to prevent boulders from tumbling from the Guanyin construction site into their resort, management at L'Orchidee Residences in Patong have hired their own contractor.

Jean-Claude Guillet, the retired developer and the owners' representative of the resort, explained to the Gazette that the move follows months of failed attempts to get the contractor to abide by his promise to take full responsibility for the damage caused by the tumbling boulders and to ensure no other boulders roll into the resort.

He referred to an article published by the Gazette in July in which then-contractor for the site, Thanachart Pibuncharoenpol, agreed to restore villas damaged by tumbling boulders to their original condition and to remove any potentially dangerous rocks still teetering precariously high above the resort.

"Three and a half months later, nothing has been done," he said.

Wassana Yukunthon, public relations at the resort, explained that lawyers representing the villa owners had sent two registered letters seeking action be taken. Wassana said.

"So we are proceeding through a claim with our insurance company and we will seek compensation from the project owner later," she said.

Mr Guillet explained there were at least 17 boulders still precariously supported by tree trunks above the resort and possibly even more on the project site further

"Four villas remain empty as the owners are too scared to return," Mr Guillet added.

'We have sent more letters asking to have them removed, but we have received no answer," he said.

The work to restrain the boulders will cost about 600,000 baht, said Mr Guillet.

"We are trying not to have to sue the project owner. If the claim Makham village, which was inun-

is accepted, there will be no problem as there would be no reason to sue them. And we want real protection, not just people saying so," he added.

Somkiat Limpanapa, Managing Director of 11 GEO Engineering Company, which is carrying out the work, said, "Removing the big rocks is quite difficult, so we will cover the rocks that are on the steep slope with an iron net to keep them securely in place."

Repairs to one villa damaged by a boulder weighing two tonnes is underway, he added.

The repairs to the villa should be complete by the end of this month, while work on restraining the boulders began last week, he added.

Meanwhile, the cleanup at Kok

dated by a mudslide from the same project site, is now complete.

Kok Makham resident and former elected community leader Chatchapol Khamintong, 48, told the Gazette, "The project owner has already cleaned the roads and storm drains that were covered by the landslide from their project. They have also fixed some minor damages to houses."

All heavy machinery for conducting earthworks had been removed from the construction site, as the project owner Chaianan had promised in a meeting with officials on October 19, he added.

"However, we will follow up closely on whether they will keep their promise of installing concrete retaining walls to prevent any future landslides," he said.



Cops bust dealer with stuffed pants

THE arrests of two low-level Phuket drug users have led to the bust of their suspected methamphetamine dealer, who was allegedly caught with 1,400 ya bah (methamphetamine) tablets stashed in his underwear.

Narongrit Metula, Bualin anachai and Seksan Sritham were presented at a press conference at Chalong Police Station on November 9.

Tipped off by an undercover agent, a team of police officers investigated an area along Soi Mae Ampan, off Patak Road in Chalong, where teenagers supposedly met to buy and sell drugs, said Chalong Police Deputy Superintendent Narong Laksanawimol.

Narongrit, who was riding a motorbike, seemed suspicious to us. After identifying themselves as police officers, the team searched

Narongrit and found 200 milligrams of ya ice (crystal methamphetamine) on his person,

The police questioned Narongrit, which led to the arrest of Mr Bualin at a rented house in Karon about an hour

Police searched the house and found 1.34 grams of ya ice in Bualin's pockets and 185 ya bah

pills under the television table, said Lt Col Narong.

After questioning Bualin, police believed that Seksan would be delivering *ya bah* to the house and planned to arrest him on ar-

At 7:30pm Seksan arrived at the house on a motorbike. The officers then identified themselves and searched him. They found 111.6 grams of ya ice and 1,400 pills of ya bah in his underwear, he said.

A total of 113.14 grams of ya ice and 1,585 pills of ya bah were confiscated from the sus-

Narongrit, 19, and Bualin, 40, both from Nakhon Phanom province, were charged with possession of a category one illegal drug.

Seksan, 25, from Ubon Ratchathani province, was charged with possession of a category one illegal drug with intent to sell.

Floods affect HM's health

HM KING Bhumibol Adulyadej has recovered following internal bleeding likely induced by stress over Thailand's worst floods in at least half a century, Princess Chulabhorn said.

HM The King, who has worked to prevent flooding in Thailand throughout his life, recently went into shock and fell unconscious after watching footage of the unfolding disaster on television, the princess said.

Princess Chulabhorn, who did not specify the date of the incident, said the 83-year-old monarch suffered abdominal bleeding and a sharp drop in blood pressure.

The princess said doctors told her it could have been caused by concern over the flooding.

"This indicates that His Majesty the King loves his people as his own children," she said, as quoted

The princess was speaking during a visit to a flood evacuation the "monkey's cheeks" strategy to

'Big bag' wall destruction allowed

AUTHORITIES have reached an agreement with residents of Bangkok's flooded Don Muang area who destroyed part of a sandbag wall credited with keeping inner Bangkok dry last week, causing filthy water to surge into the area protected by the barrier.

The so-called "big bag" barrier had been in place for more than a week. Water on the north side of the wall was up to 70 centimeters higher than on the south side.

It had caused considerable anger among residents whose flooded homes stood behind the wall. They claimed the six-kilometer-long barrier was prolonging their misery.

On Sunday, residents in Don Muang District, also home to Bangkok's second airport, took action. They removed a 10-meter section of the barrier, allowing floodwater to surge into a previously unaffected part of the city.

The Flood Relief Operations Center (FROC), which is coordinating the authorities' response to the disaster, ordered the Bangkok Metropolitan Authority (BMA) to rebuild the barrier, saying that its removal would benefit no one.

However, on Monday, FROC and the BMA reached an agreement with the residents to allow a reduced height of 80cm for the 10-meter section. It previously stood at 120cm, The Nation reported.

'Never again' insists Thai government THE floods that have brought

parts of Thailand to its knees in recent weeks will never be repeated, the Thai government has insisted.

"We are not going to let it happen again," Deputy Prime Minister Kittirat Na-Ranong told the Wall Street Journal at the Asia Pacific Economic Cooperation Summit in Honolulu.

Mr Kittirat was filling in for Prime Minister Yingluck Shinawatra, who stayed in Thailand to coordinate the response to the ongoing disaster.

Mr Kittirat used the summit to reach out to Japan, Thailand's largest foreign investor. He met with Japanese trade minister Yukio Edano on the sidelines of the meeting, briefing him on measures to assist businesses hit by the floods.

On November 28, Mr Kittiratt will lead a delegation of Thai officials and private-sector representatives to Tokyo to update Japanese investors about the situation and the government's recovery plans.

Board of Trade of Thailand (BoT) secretary-general Vichai Assarasakorn said the Thai visit to Japan was requested by Japanese investors.

"Japanese investors want a clear explanation from the Thai

government about its plans for rehabilitation and for preventing flooding in the future, in order to restore their confidence about continued investment in Thailand," said Vichai.

Japan is the Kingdom's largest source of foreign direct investment, accounting for more than 40 per cent of total foreign investment.

However, many Japanese companies – in particular automobile producers – have been forced to suspend operations due to the floods, while many sectors participating in the supply chain have also been impacted.

Waste not, want not: Patong-style wisdom

THE plan by Patong Mayor Pian Keesin to install a fertilizer factory at the Patong Wastewater Treatment Plant must be heralded as good news (see page 3).

Just the week before Mayor Pian made his announcement, the *Phuket Gazette* received reports of yet another "chocolate plume" emanating offshore from the treatment plant and snaking its way toward Kalim.

This latest plume was just more evidence that municipal efforts are unable to keep pace with the growing strain on the wastewater infrastructure and the town's sewerage system. Any preparations to provide effective relief on the strain must be welcomed.

The motion carried by Patong Municipality to apply for the 65 million baht in budget needed to build the facility indicates tacit recognition by the authorities that the current sewerage system is not good enough. One would not expect local administrators at any holiday destination in the world to advertise that raw sewage was making its way to the beach, least of all in Thailand. But the fact that Patong Municipality is facing up to the feces is encouraging and deserves our support.

Of course there is so much more that could be done. In the *Gazette*'s 'Your Phuket' society pages last week we ran a photo of young students at HeadStart International School making "EM" ("effective microorganisms") balls to send to Bangkok to help break down the level of harmful bacteria floating in the flood waters.

EM balls are not new to Phuket's efforts to deal with waste. Some areas have been doing it for years. Patong could follow their lead, particularly in the wake of the extremely adverse, but well deserved, worldwide publicity given the fecal pollution found on the sand and in the surf at Kata and Karon beaches by a German television crew who filmed it earlier this year.

If the stink over Kata and Karon taught us anything, it was that people understand how development can outpace infrastructure, but they do not understand or forgive when nothing is done about it and those responsible lurk in silence. Only acknowledgment and action can stave off the shame.

As one *Gazette* reader recently suggested in our 'Island View' column, a nominal "environment tax" could be collected from tourists arriving at the airport. Even a painless levy of 50 baht could have raised close to 200 million baht in 2011, given the roughly four million tourists who will have arrived on our island by the end of the year. Surely an amount this size would suffice to undermine any cries of "no budget".

Corruption? Possible, but as our reader so valiantly suggests, tourists don't much care about our social ills so long as these ills don't directly affect them. Just a clean beach and a pleasant holiday will suffice to send them home with the type of experience we'd like them to tell their friends about. Patong knows this.

Travelling Thais to get new services in Phuket

First PERSON

IN ADDITION to issuing passports, we offer several other services to Thai citizens, such as validating visas for expired passports.

Another one of our responsibilities is to offer assistance to citizens who have relatives working abroad in countries facing national crises, such as Libya. If someone can't locate their (Thai) relative abroad, they can ask us and we can help find

One thing that is often requested at our office, but we can't do, is notarize documents. We plan to expand our office soon, so we can offer this service.

Once we begin offering this service, if you are Thai and come in with a Thai document, such as a marriage certificate because you want to go abroad with your husband, you need to certify it. You will need to have it translated into English (by a translation company), before we can notarize it. This will make the document a 100 per cent legal and you can use it

This same process can be used to convert English documents into legal Thai documents. Currently, the nearest Passport Office providing this service is in Songkhla province.

We issue about 100 passports a day. It takes only about 10 minutes to fill out the form and 20 minutes to take a photo, so it won't take more than half an hour to apply for a passport book from documents will also be required.

She started at the Thai Ministry of Foreign Affairs in 1994 and was promoted to her current position in October 2011. Here she gives us insight into the functions of the Passport Office.

the moment you step into my office. Just bring in your valid ID card, but make sure the photo has not started to fade.

We need to see a clear photo of you, otherwise we might ask you to get a new ID.

The fee for a passport is 1,000 baht and an additional 40 baht for postage. It takes three days to get to the Bangkok office and an additional seven days before it will arrive at your home. But due to flooding in Bangkok, their office is currently not able to receive any passports.

If any organization in Phuket. Phang Nga, Krabi or Ranong wants us to send them a mobile unit, please give us three weeks advance notice.

For a mobile unit to be sent there should be at least 20 people wanting to get a passport.

For parents who want to get a passport for a child under the age of 15, both the father and mother have to come into the office to certify it.

If you are separated, divorce

I suggest that you call our office, 076 222080, in advance, to check what documents are needed. If you come in with the proper documents, you will not waste your time or lose your temper.


Lastly, we are not authorized to issue visas or immigration work permits. Many people mistakenly come to us for these services. All we can do is suggest that they go to the proper authority.

For visas you need to go to the embassy or honorary consulate of the countries you will be visiting. For immigration work permits you have to go to the Phuket Immigration Office at Saphan Hin.

I am delighted to serve as the new chief here because I think the southern part of Thailand is interesting.

I know the northern and northeastern areas of Thailand well and it's embarrassing to tell foreigners how few times I've been down to Samui Island or Phuket.

I wish I could stay here for five years, but this is a temporary duty. I will be here for only 11 months.



Fighting for British pensions in paradise

YOUR signatures are needed to end the unfair frozen overseas pension policy of the British government.

Some of you may not be aware that when a United Kingdom state pensioner retires to live abroad in certain countries their pension is frozen and they do not receive annual cost-of-living increases. There are over half a million of these pensioners affected by this totally unjust law, mostly in the Commonwealth countries of Australia, Canada and South Africa, but also in Thailand. These pensioners made the same National Insurance contributions as those living in the UK who get the increases.

The International Consortium of British Pensioners (ICBP) is the organization representing UK pensioners living abroad and they have been very active in trying to get the government to change the legislation so that all pensioners are treated equally.

A new electronic petition on the frozen pension issue, sponsored by the ICBP, has now been posted on the government website with the aim of obtaining 100,000 signatures so that this matter can be considered for debate in the House of Commons. So come on you

At this frequency there soon won't be any birds in our village. What organization can take serious action against these people for entering a private village and stop them from stealing wild birds?

within our power to take direct action in this matter. I would suggest that the person concerned with the birds being captured come in and present a photo of the type of bird or be able to identify the type being caught for us.

If the birds are a protected species then we can pursue legal

If the the birds are not a species protected by law, then we can only ask for the people's cooperation in protecting nature, explaining that the birds are very important to nature's balance.

As I have said, we can't forbid or stop people from catching wild birds without more information on the matter. If the birds are not protected by law then I will cooperate with the community's leaders to keep an eye on the situation and draw the community together to forbid what the bird thieves are

It is illegal for someone to come onto private property to catch wild animals to sell. If you see anyone doing this please contact the police immediately. We have to catch them in the act to prove that they are doing something illegal.

Taking farang blood

Someone told me that the Phuket Regional Blood Center doesn't accept farang blood, anyone know if this is true?

Pornthip Rattajak, the Phuket **Regional Blood Center Acting Director, replies:**

Yes, we do accept blood donations from foreigners. If you have an address in Phuket that we can contact you at, you are welcome to make a blood donation.

We do not accept foreigner blood donations from people with tourist visas, because we cannot contact them if there are issues with their blood work. Our policy is that we must contact the donor if there is a possible issue with their blood. We will send them a letter to inform them that they should have another blood test. If the donor really has a problem, we will advise them to get proper treatment.

Another condition for donating blood is that the donor must not have lived in or visited the United Kingdom between 1980 and 1996. During that period of time Mad Cow disease was spreading in the UK.

Recently a lot of foreigners have donated their blood at our center. Foreigners are a great source for Rh-negative blood, which is uncommon among Thai people.

Criminal clearance

As part of a visa application for another country I must present a criminal clearance certificate saying that I have not done anything criminal in Thailand. Where can I get such a document?

The following documents must be submitted to the Royal Thai Police in Bangkok, in person: a copy of your passport photo page, visas and work permit. It will take about three weeks to issue the document.

You can then either pick up the document yourself or leave us your address so we can mail it to you. This is a free service.

Remember, you must submit the documents to us in person, because we will need your finger prints and signature.

Rajabhat to staff local hotels with flood-affected students

PHUKET Rajabhat University (PRU) is accepting applications from students nationwide, who have been affected by the flood crisis, to join its latest tourism "work-and-study" program.

The 4 R project is an extension of last year's 3 R project and is organized in collaboration with the Phuket Office of Tourism and Sports and the Phuket Tourist Association (PTA).

The four Rs stand for Rajabhat, rong ram (hotels), rong rien (schools) and this year's newest addition, *Ratchakan* (Royal Government).

The main objective of the project is to help alleviate economic hardships burdening students that have been affected by recent flooding. The project provides an opportunity for such students to gain training, education and experience in the hospitality field, while earning income and thus contributing to the economy.

In addition to providing students with practical experiences, the program aims to prepare students for the upcoming Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) Economic Community agreement set to take effect in 2015.

With an enrollment quota of 150 students, the program targets recent high school graduates, as well as 1st and 2nd year tourism and foreign language students currently enrolled at any Rajabhat University, nationwide.

Priority will be given to those who have been affected by the floods.

Director of the PRU Student Affairs office, Associate Professor Nongyao Jaihor of the Faculty of Management Science, told the *Phuket Gazette* that out of 250 PTA member hotels, about 20 are participating in the 4 R project.

Included among these are the Phuket Merlin Hotel, Patong Resort, Peach Hill Hotel & Resort, Nap Patong, Merlin Beach Resort, Bundarika Villas & Suites, C & N Hotel Patong, Blue Ocean Resort and the Kata Palm Resort & Spa, among others.

"We want to avoid using big chain or five-star hotels who already have sufficient staffing. We prefer to support local businesses by helping to fill staffing shortages at smaller hotels," Prof Nongyao said.

Students accepted into the pro-

gram would undergo interviews with human resource representatives from the participating hotels and those that are accepted would start the program by undergoing a full month of all-expenses paid training starting in March next year, explained Prof Nongyao.

"Most of the positions are in regular hotel operations, such as housekeeping, working the reception desk and being a bellboy," she said, adding that students would earn salaries between 6,000 to 9,000 baht a month plus service charges.

"After the initial training, students will sign a standard employee contract and will need to pass a three-month probation period. After that, if they still want to continue, they can enroll in weekend classes with PRU while continuing to work at their hotel during the weekdays," she said.

"Not all students end up liking this field and some decide to just work, but not study," she said, noting that out of about 60 participants in last year's 3 R program, 39 continued under the work-and-study model.

Inaugural Copenhagen - HKT flight welcomed

THAI Airway's inaugural direct flight from Copenhagen landed safely at Phuket International Airport on Saturday afternoon.

At the airport to greet the first 336 passengers aboard flight TG953 were the Governor of the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) Suraphon Svetasreni, Phuket Governor Tri Augkaradacha, Director of the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) Bangonrat Shinaprayoon, Phuket Tourist Association (PTA) Vice President Bhuritt Maswongsa and the executive board of Thai Airways.

Three direct flights bound for Phuket now depart Copenhagen on Wednesdays, Fridays and Sundays.

Arriving the next day, the flights will be served by a Boeing 747-400 and seat a maximum of 416 passengers, he said.

However, the governor pointed out that Danish tourists will not be able to fly directly back to Copenhagen from Phuket.

The return trip will require a transit flight via Bangkok, which are available from Phuket on a daily basis, he noted.

Mr Suraphon went on to highlight the growing market of Danes, siting the following figures.

"Last year 150,300 Danish tourists came to Thailand.

"Of these, 92,518 came to Phuket and spent on average

4,097 baht per day," he said, noting that the year-on-year increase equated to 7.5 per cent.

Asked about what negative impacts the flooding crisis has

had on the tourism sector, Mr Suraphon downplayed such notions, and echoed previous statements given by various officials. "Tourists coming to Thailand in the first nine months of the year increased by 27 per cent compared to last year," he said.

"During the flood months, namely October and November, tourist numbers decreased only by about two per cent, which is not much of an impact," he said.

Mr Suraphon added that the government is planning to launch a post-flood tourism revival campaign, which he said is scheduled to begin next month.

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Fiber 2U seems slow 2me

A COUPLE of years ago, TOT unveiled its as a 599-baht-per month 3BB line. Fiber 2U service in a gala presentation at Royal Phuket Marina, replete with pounding music and dancing girls – sure signs of technological superiority.

At the time, the service didn't work very

well. It went down for long periods of time, with all sorts of stalls and glitches. And it cost a fortune- two fortunes. But

we were assured it was the fastest thing since greased lightning, with advertised speeds up to 100,000Kbps. That's as fast as a typical line in Hong Kong. Imagine.

The service stabilized and it was blindingly fast. Really. So fast that we had to change the program we used to measure speeds. Fiber 2U blew up the gaudy flash speed test, and we had to revert to barebones Java. We were seeing international download speeds of 7,000Kbps - even 10,000Kbps or more. And it wasn't just one line – many people were getting great speeds. It was by far the fastest internet this island's ever seen.

About six months ago, TOT lowered its prices on Fiber 2U and more people signed up. The entry-level Fiber 2U 10/1Mbps line went down to 1,490 baht per month. The corporate line with one fixed IP address went to 5,290 baht per month. Speeds teetered a little bit – you can see it in the graph. Still, most people were seeing international download speeds between 6,000 and 8,000Kbps, which is fast enough to stream high-definition video.

But about two months ago, all of that went to Hades in a festooned handbasket. It's as if somebody turned off the light. Now, Fiber 2U customers are more likely to report international download speeds in the 1,000 to 1,500Kbps area – and some come in at 500Kbps or less. That's about the same speed

I'm not just talking about the cheapest line, although we have more reports from the Fiber 2U 10/1Mbps line than the others. We're seeing speeds dropping on the


2,420 baht Fiber 2U 20/ 1Mbps line, as well as the corporate service. A few people are still getting occasional runs back at the

old levels, but for almost all of the TOT customers, almost all of the time, the fiberoptic line runs about as fast as an AIS or TrueMove-H wireless account - at three times the cost. Believe me, that's saying something. What happened?

I don't know. What I do know is that it had nothing to do with the floods – the downward trend started long before rain started falling up North. It has nothing to do with high season – the drop came while there were very few tourists in Phuket. It isn't kids playing games in the afternoon or business demand, or a huge influx of customers. How do I know? Because the speeds are just generally lousy, 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Far more likely is that somebody at TOT decided to spend less on international bandwidth for Fiber 2U customers. It's also possible that someone accidentally hooked up Phuket's fiber customers to a slower international line. It's even possible that somebody accidentally mis-routed Phuket's fiber through the wrong switches in Bangrak, the TOT switching center.

According to the people I've talked to, TOT has fielded lots and lots of angry complaints. Surprisingly, the people I know who have complained say that the TOT staff has treated them well and worked hard to make their lines better. Sometimes they see improvements for a while, frequently they don't.



TOT Fiber 2U came roaring onto the scene last year, but lately it's not even as fast as a good wireless connection.

When TOT gets a persistent complaint, the most common reaction is to replace the router. TOT's standard router is a Welltech WG-332S, which isn't even listed on the Welltech web site. Those who complain get a Mikrotik router, which apparently works better – for a while.

What does this all mean for somebody who just wants a fast, reliable internet connection? It means, once again, that the amount you pay for internet probably doesn't correlate at all to the quality or speed of the connection. TOT Fiber 2U is still a reasonable choice, but you can probably find faster speeds for less money. Watch PhuketInternetSpeed.com to see what people are getting.

Have a fiber line and want to keep it? One company in Phuket has a great deal of experience installing, tuning and maintaining fiber systems: Phuket Data Wizards (phuket-datawizards.com).

If you aren't yet posting your international

download speeds on PhuketInternetSpeed.com, I hope this column gives you an idea of why it's more important than ever to keep everybody in Phuket apprised of how your internet connection is working. Even if you have a simple 3BB 6Mbps line, you're helping vourself – and everybody else – by regularly testing and posting your results. It takes less than a minute. Drop by the speed reporting site and sign up. If you have problems – forgot your logon ID or password, or you can't get it to work - drop me a line. It's free, fast and easy, and the connection you save may be your own.

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Jury is still out on litigation funding

ONE very exciting new asset class available to individual investors that I have been looking into is litigation funding. When I first heard about some notes attached to this I thought it sounded too good to be true and dismissed it, but as sometimes is the case, extraordinary opportunities can arise.

The asset class is currently only accessible via structured notes, but these work very differently than most other forms of investment, which I usually think are a rip-off. I have heard a fund structure is currently being put together for listing on the Irish exchange and this really excites me.

Litigation is expensive and often fairly clear-cut cases are not tried because the costs of going to trial are prohibitive. We all know the story of David and Goliath, and many big corporations often get away with misdeeds simply because it is too difficult to fight a "Goliath" team of high-paid of lawyers.

Litigation funding levels the playing and helps David. The notes I have looked into have always been commercial litigation, so it is not helping lowlifes chase frivolous cases hoping for a quick buck.

The interesting thing is that insurance companies will actually insure cases they consider to be clear-cut. The costs are included in the structure and insurance costs are even covered in the insurance. So, if the case is lost, the insurance company is on the hook and the investors have their capital protected.

I am not a big fan of guarantees, but this one appears to hold water. Insurance companies are not big risk-takers, and they only insure cases that are "sure" wins. As such, the win ratio of funded litigation is very high – and the premiums collected are pretty large as well, as insurance companies aren't charities, either.

Despite the costs of insurance and financing, the potential take from profitable lawsuits can be large, as well as participation in the award amount.

Apparently the market for un-

funded litigation is enormous. As it stands now, the cases never move forward because the companies can't afford them and the litigation funding market is still relatively small.

I am not yet convinced of the actual way this opportunity is packaged, but I am still doing my homework and waiting to see how things unfold for some people who I know are willing to be investor guinea pigs.

However, I am convinced of the concept, but in the investing world that isn't enough. You may have known computers were the future 25 years ago, but if you threw all of your money into Tandy you'd probably be kicking yourself now.

The reason I believe this asset class could become exciting very quickly is that it is completely unrelated to traditional and even almost all other alternative asset classes. It doesn't matter what is happening in the stock markets, bond markets, economy or elsewhere.

Litigation funding could be a great addition to a portfolio to lower overall volatility and in-

crease returns. I will continue to see how this market grows and will most likely be writing about this again in the future.

I would be very careful, however, of sticking a large percentage of your portfolio into a new asset class – at least "new" in terms of being geared towards individual investors, as there has been corporate litigation funding for quite some time.

I have been following a structured program of excise activities over the weeks since beginning in May. This has been combined with a sensible eating regime to achieve of my program as the count-


a weight loss of around 12kg.



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Helping children help themselves

YAOWAWIT Boarding School was founded five years ago, post tsunami, to support those affected by the disaster. Today, the school continue to provide home and education to children from families who are unable to provide emotional and educational care.

Located approximately two hours north of Phuket just outside the small village of Kapong, one of the more remote rural areas of Phang Nga Province, Yaowawit School provides a unique environment, where visitors can enjoy lunch and a chance to interact with some of the children who love to receive guests in order to practice their English.

Currently, 129 children live in the school, with ages ranging from 4 to 18 years old and around 30 staff members, ten of whom also live on the premises.

The school's mission statement is to break the cycle of poverty through inspirational and vocational education which includes sustainable practices for future employment and to provide emotional support, focusing on the children's overall well-being.

With the inclusion of English Language Studies (double the hours required by Thai Government standards), their goal is to give students more possibilities in life by providing valuable communication skills.

Attached to the school, is a small lodge with six guest rooms that provide not only sustainable income, but allows travelers to experience the uniqueness of the project. Indeed, the school provides hospitality training for the children in the understanding that this is a sustainable industry for the area. The children enjoy this unique opportunity to also learn through experience.

Other courses offered include farming techniques, music, art and craft workshops, sewing and hairdressing training - all in order to provide as many opportunities for the children as possible.

The children are happy to show visitors around the 25 hectare grounds and will proudly exhibit their fish farm, greenhouse, rice plantation and herb garden, all of which are cared for by the children under the guidance of their teachers.

Yaowawit staff members pride themselves on maintaining close personal ties with the children's families too. When the school closes, the children return to their families or extended families to enjoy and reconnect with their cultures. During



needs but their situation has improved dramatically.

this time the Family Department, headed up by Mr Attapol "Bill" Jarusathorn visits all the families to discuss the children's progress at Yaowawit and any other relevant issues. The families themselves are grateful for this support and the respect shown to them. This is a very sensitive issue as many families would ultimately prefer to take care of their own children.

The Family Department recently visited 10 children who come from Koh Payam and Koh Laow, two small "sea gypsy" communities off the coast of Ranong. This marginalized group of people struggle to meet their daily needs, but what became evident from this last visit, was that their situation has improved dramatically. By providing care and education for up to three or four children in one family,

they are now able to provide more for both themselves and their community. Living conditions have improved, as well as the health and hygiene of the children. The school acknowledges that their efforts are having a direct and positive impact on their community.

It is hoped that the children living and learning at Yaowawit will return to their communities with either practical skills or gain meaningful employment to support their communities financially.






On the Menu

OUTSIDE Central Festival last Saturday evening, a camera convention was winding up in an orgy of punters taking photos of other people taking photos of people posing for another group of people taking photos of people taking photos: It was like an Escher illustration; a digital dog chasing its own tail in a blur of camera flashes and goofy poses.

A few steps further on at the southern-facing entrance stands Urban Food, a stylish and modern yet quaint 110-seat al-fresco and air-conditioned self-styled bistro that deals mainly in Mediterraneanstyle dishes along with a good smattering of Thai/Asian cuisine.

It's spanking new and already a fave-rave venue for people looking for a cut-above-the-rest lunch as well as hungry shoppers with a penchant for something other than the nearby Golden Arches and finger lickin' food and definitely a better health option when it comes to mall dining.

Dé cor wise, the place is easy on the eye with white faux-chalk signage on black paneling, clever lighting and a spacious feel to it.

Now, generally speaking, photo menus are not exactly portents of haute cuisine but in Urban's situation and location it's almost mandatory to use them and the restaurant cunningly makes the most out of the opportunity by using an attractive, colorful and easy-to-read layout. Basically, if ordering steak, you can point to the four 'tenderness illustrations' that feature rare, medium rare, medium and well done; the same applies for the chili factor in the Asian dishes featured. It's practical, logical and, er... well done.

The Urban group is managed by French-born Frederic Garnier from Cannes. He tells me that at present there are two branches in

Patong with one more due to open in Bangkok this spring, (does that make them urbanites?) then goes on to explain that the veggies are shipped in from Phang Nga Province and that most of the restaurant's red meats are from Australia and New Zealand. With Thailand's current flood-related food supply problems, this is good news, indeed.

The 44-label wine list is surprisingly easy on the wallet and we choose a red Marius Shiraz Grenache (780 baht) that goes down well with a four-cheese pizza (220 baht), a chicken and mushroom pie (230 baht) and a rather spectacular mixed grill on a wicked-looking skewer that conjures up lurid images of Vlad the Impaler; much to the delight of our carnivorous cameraman.

The pizza crust is excellent, as is the topping, but the chicken and mushroom pie pastry crust was more than I could handle so I removed it and ate straight out of the casserole. It's was delicious. The mixed grill was a meat lover's dream and was beautifully presented as was the juicy accompanying vegetable dish.

A meal at Urban is quite a feast and everyone enjoyed it, including little three-year-old Beng who tucked into a khao phad goong (120 baht) and an orange juice.

Mention must be made of the heroically named Wanchai One-Eye (no kidding, or at least that's how he pronounced his name) whose English and waiting skills are really quite outstanding. And it's comforting to note that, on closer examination, our waiter is not a Cyclops.

Make no mistake; this is feelgood comfort food at its zenith. It's there for a reason called 'mall hunger'. Urbane it ain't but it is definitely Urban. Check it out for its fresh salad bar and wide-ranging menu.



Kor Sim Bee's new roads

THALANG Road has always been the pride of old Phuket Town because of its interesting history.

Both sides of the narrow road, lined with old Sino-Portuguese shop-houses showcase the town's unique architecture and cultural

Thalang Road was one of the first roads in Phuket Town to be renovated when Phraya Ratsada-Nupradit (Kor Sim Bee) took charge as Phuket's High Commissioner. The prominent high commissioner of Phuket was a good friend of King Chulalongkorn (Rama V) and was personally assigned by his majesty to develop the town.

Kor Sim Bee took office in Phuket in the year 1901. His first development project was to repave Thalang Road with gravel, making the surface more even and smooth for transport. He then encouraged traders and miners to demolish the mud buildings that previously aligned the old road, replacing them with well constructed brick buildings and shop-houses in Sino-Portuguese architecture. The rows of shophouses were typically connected to each other, with a sheltered walkway built in front of the shops to shield pedestrians from the rain and sun.

After the improvement of Thalang Road, Kor Sim Bee also renovated several other roads in Phuket Town and also built new ones. One of his last projects was the renovation of Dibuk Road, which runs parallel to Thalang Road. This particular project increased the length of Dibuk Road, connecting it with Satun Road on its west end and intersecting Yaowarat Road, continuing east. Although its official name is Dibuk Road (Dibuk means tin), town lo-

cals often referred to it as 'Sinlor Road', meaning new road.

Although most of the roads built during Kor Sim Bee's time were designed to accommodate horsedrawn carts, it was a time when the country's first motorcars were already being imported into Bangkok. Several members of the Thai royal family had grown to become motorcar enthusiasts and many of the country's rich and upper class wanted to follow in this new found trend. Kor Sim Bee knew that it would only be a matter of decades before Phuket's roads would have to accommodate such vehicles.

To prevent future congestion, Kor Sim Bee mandated that new roads in Phuket Town had to be built wider than usual. As such, one of the main criteria used was that the new roads must be wide enough to comfortably accommodate ten horse-drawn carts. Some of the older roads however, like Thalang Road, older sections of Dibuk Road and Soi Romanee, were much narrower in comparison. Widening these roads would require the demolition of existing buildings and would cause a lot of trouble for residents. Kor Sim Bee therefore concentrated his road building projects around the lesser populated areas of Phuket

An interesting story emerged from this period. According to the town plan, the new section of Dibuk Road, from the Yaowarat intersection to Satun Road, was meant to cut through an orchard that belonged to a Chinese man named Pae Lao Nua. Kor Sim Bee asked Lao Nua to let him build the new road through his orchard. Lao Nua, believing that the new road would increase the value of his land, agreed to let the construc-

tion go ahead. However as the new public road began to take shape on his land, Lao Nua became discontent with the width of the road, which was around 15 meters wide. He protested with Kor Sim Bee, but by then the construction had gone too far ahead and Kor Sim Bee refused to change his plans.

As expected, the value of the land around the new Dibuk Road rose rapidly as soon as the road was opened to the public. People

were offering to buy land on both sides of the lane leading to Lao Nua's house, in order to build shop-houses and other properties. Lao Nua himself built several new shop-houses along this lane and rented them out. The rental income made him quite rich so to thank the town government, he donated the lane to the municipality. The lane was named in his honor as 'Lao Nua Lane'.

One of the ways that Lao Nua made his money was by being a guarantor for someone who got into trouble with the law. He would go to the police station and court house to guarantee those he thought worthy, so that they could be released on bail. But as he gained more customers, a larger number of them also fled. He lost quite a lot of money in this way. As a result Lao Nua had to sell amuch of his land along the new Dibuk Road to cover his debts. Much of the land he sold went to prominent Phuket families, like the Tantiwit family, who built one of Phuket's most magnificent Sino-Portuguese mansions on land that used to be Lao Nua's orchard. Today the mansion has been restored to its former glory and is being used by the Blue Elephant Cooking School.

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Life & style J. Edgar, the movie

POLITICS seems to be a popular theme at the cinema these days with The Iron Lady featuring Meryl Streep as Margaret Thatcher, being released at the end of the year and this latest Clint Eastwood offering on FBI founder J Edgar Hoover.

The 81-year-old director goes deep into Oliver Stone territory with this biopic, arguably his most ambitious movie since Letters From Iwo Jima if not Unforgiven.

J Edgar explores the life of one of the most powerful, controversial and enigmatic figures of the 20th century.

As the face of law enforcement in America for almost fifty years, J Edgar Hoover, played admirably by Leonardo DiCaprio, was feared, revered, admired and reviled.

But what of the private man? Hindsight is a wonderful thing and looking back now we see that behind closed doors, he kept secrets that would have destroyed not only his image but his career and even his life.

DiCaprio is surprisingly good as Hoover despite being about as

physically unlikely to pull it off When his mother has an inkling as you can get, especially in the many sequences of him as an older man. He turns out to have been a quite canny casting move providing his own celebrity presence rather than the squat balding figure familiar to anyone who grew up in the 1960s.

Judy Dench as Edgar's overbearing mother, Annie, is another acting tour de force. Indeed the pedigree of this old-style biopic is impeccable, including screenwriter, Dustin Lance Black, who wrote the Oscar-winning script for Milk.

The gist of J Edgar is almost entirely psychological. Hoover is portrayed in stark Freudian terms as a mama's boy who fears his mother's wrath more than he fears the eight presidents he served. Indeed, most of the presidents feared him because of the secret files he kept on them.

The film inexorably turns on Hoover's alleged homosexuality based on the lifelong bachelor's 40-plus-year close friendship with his second in command, Clyde Tolson, played by Armie Hammer. His relationship with Tolson is clearly depicted as a case of repressed longing, although the movie makes it clear that there is no danger that Hoover will act on his impulses.


that her son might be gay; she tells him, "I'd rather have a dead son than a daffodil for a son".

Hoover obviously takes this warning to heart and ultimately doesn't trust anyone because, it is implied, he couldn't even trust himself.

As much as the movie tries to cover the full career of Hoover from 1919 until his death in 1972 it portrays him in fairly sympathetic terms by excluding or playing down his more noxious legacies – especially his use of FBI-paid provocateurs during the civil rights era and his hounding of Martin Luther King Jr.

The film deliberately avoids the sort of scurrilousness that Hoover himself often favored in exposing the dark or trumpedup secrets of his targets and is a lot fairer to Hoover than he was to his many enemies - real or imagined.

DiCaprio, who narrates the film as Hoover an unreliable witness, comes across as a monumentally petty megalomaniac yet for the 81-year-old Eastwood, J Edgar Hoover himself must have been a childhood hero of sorts and perhaps later a role model for Dirty Harry - a guy who would break any law to defend the law.


Harry's War by D Edward **Bradley**

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Pattanapong Aikwanich

MANAGING director of the Diamond Cliff Hotel, Pattanapong Aikwanich, is the youngest of four children born into one of the oldest families in Phuket who are also synonymous with many important business ventures on the island. Asia and Europe in an effort to entice tourists back to Phuket.



"We musn't forget that Phuket has a long and rich history that must be retold to locals and visitors alike. Those two heroines were extraordinary individuals. We wouldn't be here if it were not for them."

When he is not busy with business and charity work, he collects fine antique china. His face lights up when he talks about his prized collections of Thai Benjarong (five colors) earthenware, European crystal, and Chinese Qing Dynasty tea service.

Another passion of his is topiary. Pattanapong is a man at peace with the world if he can start the day clipping and tending his beloved ornamental shrubs, losing himself to their wonderful shapes and forms. Nothing, he says, beats being out in the open and at one with nature. "Phuket is a charming island, which most visitors can't help but falling in love with. Admittedly, tourism is our livelihood, but we should promote the kind of tourism that is sustainable and ethical." - is the parting note from this hotelier with a conscience.





Trying to help is a fruitless exercise, just stare into that little webcam, don't step over the line and for God's sake - don't offer any help. Mick and the Stones sang about time being on our side. Clearly they hadn't toured Phuket yet.

And still I wait... until the last page is slowly reached and the puzzled person on the other side of the counter starts to go through it all again, one page at a time.

There are of course so many other disastrous episodes, infomercials, virals, mini-series and sequels to the whole distorted passion play of high season that I could never cover it in just one column. Gridlocked traffic, entire families of Croc-wearing tourists walking down the middle of the street, bad tattoos, Singha beer tank tops, sexpats, knock-off designer logos on every possible wardrobe item and those screwy corn row hairstyles.

I've hit my breaking point. Hollywood often brings inspiration and the other night Escape from New York came on. My thoughts turned to retrofitting one of those Titanic-sized tour buses into a Mad Max type of flaming torpedo of massive destruction. I'd need some caffeine first. Momentary stumped how I could park the bus in front of my coffee factory Bake, thoughts turned to escaping Phuket and the nightmare of high season.

A late-night run over the bridge and keep heading north... keep going up through Yunan province in China and come to an intersection and perhaps push the limit into Russia. Suddenly the BBC weather report brought me back to reality: it's snowing in Moscow. Isn't this where I first got on this train of thought?

Guaranteed rental returns may be more smoke than mirrors

WHEN purchasing property in a managed property development, buyers are sometimes offered participation in a guaranteed rental return program.

What guaranteed rental return programs have in common is a representation by the developer that a minimum percentage of the overall investment, typically the purchase price of the property, will be "returned" to the buyer within an agreed time period. However, in practice such guaranteed rental return arrangements may vary greatly with respect to their underlying structure and ultimate performance.

When scrutinizing a guaranteed rental return program, a buyer should verify whether it's actually a sound investment or merely appears to be so, providing only a partial return of a bloated purchase price.

Therefore, a buyer should compare the asking price of a property (including the rental return guarantee) with the amounts payable for other properties (without the

rental return guarantee) having same or similar characteristics in terms of location, construction standard and legal title.

If a buyer decides that a proposed guaranteed rental return program may be beneficial and decides to opt into it, then the performance of the program will depend on its successful management which requires, on the part of the developer, a high degree of professionalism and expertise. Therefore, a wary buyer should verify what track record a developer has.

Simply put, the value of a rental return guarantee mainly depends on the experience and the ability of the developer to attract a sufficient number of rental guests, particularly in low season. The appointment of a reputable and internationally-recognized management company by a developer may be an indication that the rental scheme is well thought out and based on realistic projections securing the stated rental return which have been guaranteed to a buyer.

A buyer would be well advised to undertake a careful examination of all legal agreements required to be signed with a developer in connection with any guaranteed rental program. A professional contract review with the assistance of a law firm should help to detect deficient contractual terms unfavorable to the buyer, along with hidden costs or unrealistic projections which may ultimately reduce your actual return.

Moreover a buyer should take into account that (guaranteed) rental income may trigger tax liabilities. Therefore, an accountant or tax advisor should be consulted who can assess what tax responsibilities in connection with the investment and subsequent returns may incur.

Last but not least, a buyer should not be afraid to decline the offer of a guaranteed rental return and require a reduction of the purchase price in case that the offered terms or their underlying structure are deemed to have little prospect of success.



CHINESE Lantern is the common name for some varieties of *abutilon*. A member of the mallow family, this large shrub or small tree (here the distinction really is blurred), can reach ten feet in good conditions. Mostly South American in origin, the *abutilon* species are true tropicals, and do well in Phuket's climate.

A butilon species will tolerate light shade or full sun, and are suitable candidates for a large container. Most have slender, tough twigs and jagged-edged, lobed leaves, somewhat like the hibiscus, to which it is related. Some five-petalled, trumpet-shaped flowers are hibiscus-like, but most of the cultivars seen in gardens have pendent, bell-shaped flowers, which remind one of the orange Chinese lanterns seen at festival time.

Originally from Brazil, these lantern hybrids come in a range of colors, from white to a deep,

bronzy red. Here is a run down of some of the more widely known varieties of *abutilon*: Canary Bird has yellow flowers; Cannington Carol is a dwarf variety with dense foliage and variegated orange bloom; *Boule de Neige*, an old variety of cultivar, has white flowers flushed with pink; Ashford Red, perhaps the most widely seen, has large

leaves and brilliant deep scarlet blooms; the Indian mallow has velvety, heart-shaped leaves, which may be eight inches across. Suntense, a hybrid from another branch of the family, has intense violet-colored flowers that open up in hibiscus fashion. Since this one comes from Chile, the climate in Thailand may be a bit on the hot side for it. But there are still plenty of others to chose from.



sides not just in its distinctive pendent flowers and foliage, but in the fact that it will bloom all year round in the right conditions – a sunny position, and a well drained soil. It requires little water, though it should not be allowed to get bone dry. Pruning will reduce flowering, but will result in a more compact plant, especially when potted. The *abutilon* can be grown easily enough from hardwood cuttings, unlike the tongue-twisting *xanthorrhoea* or tree grass.

David Strachan, from Surin, wrote in recently saying that his tree grass had a spot of bother. On his balcony specimen he noticed "small white spots... under the leaves and clustered around the center of the stem". He added that he had already asked a nursery for advice and that they had provided a milky spray, which failed to improve things.

I suggested the problem might be powdery mildew, a real issue at present because of the excessive rainfall, especially for sun-loving plants that do not enjoy too much humidity. In its native habitat in Australia, xanthorrhoea inhabits rocky, stony habitats where the surface water drains away quickly. Here, and especially in a pot, xanthorrhoea can easily be overwatered. This will weaken its immune system, and render it more likely to succumb to a fungal or bacterial disease. Worse, to root rot.

After my tentative diagnosis, David, currently away, wrote back to confirm he suspected that his "maid had been watering it too enthusiastically".

But the mystery thickens. David also sent a recent photograph, white spots and all. Of course, photographic evidence can't always be relied upon, but the plant pictured has spinous, fleshy leaves, and looks for all the world like a succulent, such as an aloe vera. Moreover, the crown of the plant is already looking brown and dead. Right diagnosis, wrong plant? Maybe.

Certainly, what is bad for tree grass is worse for cacti.

Almost all succulents are desert plants, and need only an *occasional* drenching, which they would get in the wild. But every (rain) cloud has a silver lining. If David's specimen is a succulent, it can be readily replaced. Moreover, the remaining fleshy leaf-stems can be cut off and potted in sandy soil where they may take root.



Tip of the week

Monsoon Gardening

THE last few months have seen more rain than at any comparable period in the last fifty years. Phuket, by virtue of its topography has largely escaped flooding, but the impact on vegetation is marked. Everywhere the soil is saturated. Trees are growing more and more leaves, and garden plants are lush and green, especially those kept primarily for their foliage; however, many shrubs are not blooming as freely as usual – for example *oleanders* and *bougainvilleas*, as well as such potted plants as *euphorbias* (crown of thorns), *adeniums* (desert rose) and *pereskias* (wax rose).

Remember to reduce watering to a minimum for these plants, especially with potted specimens. If the mix in your containers is already moist, leave them well alone and empty excess water from the saucer under the pot. Remember that container plants are more likely to die from sodden soil, which encourages root rot, than from under-watering.






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Close calls in ITF finals

PHUKET'S first professional tennis tournament came to a close last weekend at Thanyapura Sports and Leisure Club with both singles and doubles titles decided after two weeks of exhilarating play.

The Mens Singles final was played on Saturday with the vociferous number three seed Laurent Rochette of France taking on number two seed, Jimmy Wang of Taipei, in the best of three sets match.

Rochette raced into a 5-1 lead with devastating service games and comfortably took the first set 6-4.

A more focused Wang came out for the second set, and both players held their serve for three games each until Rochette broke Wang to leave the score at 4-3.

Wang broke back immediately in the 8th game to tie the match once again, and then held his serve to lead 5-4.

A superb love service game from Rochette including three aces brought the scores level again at 5-5, but Wang once more showed great competitive spirit to take the next game and force Rochette to serve to save the set.

This the Frenchman did to rapturous applause from his support in the stands, and at 6-6 the champion would be decided by a tie-break.

Rochette again took an early lead at 3-1 and never looked back, eventually winning by four clear points.

Speaking to the *Gazette*, Rochette spoke graciously of his opponent.

"Jimmy played very well today. I thought the game was over when I broke him in the second set, but he came back and that made it a

very tough game. This was a great tournament and I thank everybody involved," Rochette said.

Wang expressed his dismay at losing, and explained that an injury kept him from competing at 100 per cent.

"I hurt my ankle in my quarter-final match against Dennis Lajola and shouldn't really have played in the final. I had to change my game and I wasn't able to move about the court as much as wanted. It was great game and I look forward to coming back again next year," Wang told the Gazette.

Rochette received his trophy to a rousing rendition of La Marseillaise from his traveling supporters, a fitting and boisterous end to a great tournament.

Unfortunately, the tournament's number one seed, Danai Udomchoke from Thailand had to retire from the tournament with a similar injury in the first round against Emilien Firmin. Danai's retirement was more precautionary than serious – ensuring a good recovery before his participation at the SEA Games in Indonesia.

"I've won the SEA Games twice and I'd like to win again, but it's very competitive this year. After the tournament in Jakarta, I'm going to Japan and then return to Bangkok for a training camp to prepare for the Australian Open," Danai told the Gazette.

The Mens Doubles final saw the number one seeded pair from Thailand, Weerapat Doakmaiklee and Kirati Siributwong, take on the number two seeded partnership of Zhe Li from China and Kelsey Stevenson from Canada.

Li and Stevenson had never before combined for a doubles event and to make the

final was a fantastic achievement in itself, but the duo wanted the title.

Opposing strategies were obvious from the beginning with the Thai team willing to sit deep and soak up the early offensive play from Li and Stevenson.

But it was the aggressive net play that paid dividends when Li and Stevenson eventually broke the Thailand twosome in the 7th game and carried that momentum through to win the first set 6-4.

The second set went with Doakmaiklee and Siributwong who forged a 4-1 lead mainly through forced errors. A brief comeback could only delay the inevitable and the Thais won the second set 6-4.

As with the singles final, a tie-break was needed to determine the doubles title. A resolute Li and Stevenson charged into a 7-2 lead losing only one more point to seal vic-

"We were very nervous going into the final as this was the first competition we've played doubles together," Stevenson told the Gazette.

Stevenson, 21, has lived in Bangkok since the age of nine, but has been honing his professional tennis career in Spain and Italy.

"It was a great competition and I'm very happy we won the doubles title in Phuket. I hope the tournament continues here," Li said to the Gazette before jetting off for a tournament in Australia.

Irish in for **Euro 2012**

IRELAND: Football fans breathed a sigh of relief on Tuesday night after the national team drew 1-1 with Estonia and secured qualification for Euro 2012 their first finals since qualifying for the World Cup of 2002 and their first European finals since 1988.

Following Ireland's 4-0 defeat of a nine-man Estonia team in Tallinn on November 11, a place in the Euro competition seemed assured, but still the boys in green looked nervous on home turf in Dublin.

But Irish nerves were calmed on 31 minutes when Wolves defender Stephen Ward pounced on a rebound from Estonia keeper Pavel Londak to score and set the Aviva Stadium alight with celebrations.

Konstantin Vassiljev equalized for Estonia on 57 minutes, but the game soon dissipated as a contest with the Irish easing through on a 5-1 aggregate score.

Ireland now join the Czech Republic who beat Montenegro 3-0 on aggregate and Croatia who also qualify on the same aggregate score at the expense of Turkey.

ABU DHABI: McLaren's Lewis Hamilton took full advantage of F1 World Champion Sebastian Vettel's retirement at the Abu Dhabi Grand Prix last weekend to claim first place and his third win of the season.

Red Bull's Vettel withdrew in the opening lap because of a puncture to his right rear tyre picked up going through the second corner and was clearly infuriated with the knowledge that his race was ended.

This was Vettel's first retirement since last year's Korean Grand Prix and ended his streak as the only driver to finish every race in 2011. It also put paid to him equaling Michael Schumacher's record of 13

Ferrari's Fernando Alonso pushed constantly for the lead, but Hamilton held off the two-time champion to win by 8.4 seconds.

"It was one of my best races. To hold off one of the best drivers in the world is very tough to do. I feel fantatstic," Hamilton said.

Hamilton's teammate and compatriot, Jenson Button took third, but had to battle Webber and Ferrari's Felipe Massa for position. Webber's fourth place ended Red Bull's run of 19 races with a podium finish.

Massa gained one place to finish fifth ahead of Nico Rosberg, who bravely overtook Mercedes team-mate Michael Schumacher after the seven-time world champion outgunned him at the start.

Sauber's Kamui Kobayashi took the final points with 10th and veteran Rubens Barrichello who started from the back of the grid, fought hard in his Williams to take 12th.

With Vettel on 374 points and waiting to be crowned as champion, second and third places are very much all to drive for and only 28 points seperates the next four drivers. Button currently lies second with 255, Alonso is next with 245, Webber has 233 and Hamilton 227, unlikely as it may be, could achieve third.

The final Formula One race of 2011 will be held on November 27 at the Autrodomo Jose carlos Pace in Sao Paolo, Brazil.

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






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Thailand World Cup hopes still alive

THAILAND Mens senior national football squad are still in the race for the 2014 World Cup, despite back-to-back losses to Saudi Arabia and Australia on November 11 and 15.

In what was a closely contested match at Supachalasai National Stadium on Tuesday night in Bangkok, the War Elephants were only narrowly defeated by the Socceroos who went ahead with a header by Bret Holman in the 85th minute.

The single-goal loss added a pinch of salt to Thailand's fresh wound following their 0 – 3 loss in Saudi Arabia the previous Friday.

Nonetheless, the Thais proved that their inferior ranking was irrelevant, putting up a fight against their opponents from down under.

Thailand restricted the visitors to few scoring chances, yet despite limited opportunities, the Australians made the Thais pay a costly price by making the most from the chances they got.

After watching the Australians stretched to their limits by his charges, just like in the first meeting in Brisbane in September when the Socceroos had to come from behind to claim a 2 – 1 victory, Thailand's 61-year-old coach, Winfried Schaefer was satisfied with his side's performance.

"I want to thank everyone on my team for putting on such a strong showing over 90 minutes. The only thing we lacked is the goal. I'm happy that we played well against the 20^{th} ranked team.

"The only difference is that they made their chances count, while we failed to do that. It's a pity that we did not score any point from this game," said Schaefer, who has had to transform the team from a disjointed unit under his predecessor Bryan Robson.

Despite the loss, the former Cameroon manager believes there is still a bright future lying ahead for the Thai team.

"Judging from our performance today, we can see that if the team have much more time training together could become a really good side. I think we can succeed in the future. The players have the ability to achieve their targets," he said.

Expressing regret about their 0-0 stalemate last month against Saudi Arabia in Bangkok, the coach said, "Had only we claimed maximum points against the Saudis at home, the chances would have become more open for us."

"Now, I want the players to continue working hard when returning to their clubs in order to further improve themselves. If we keep doing our work, we will achieve our goal. Anyway, the final game away against Oman is still important and we need to get the best possible result," said the German,

who only took over the post in July.

Following Tuesday's disappointing loss, Thailand was offered a glimmer of hope after Saudi Arabia missed their chance to seal a berth following a goalless draw with Oman on the same night.

Had Saudi Arabia won, both Oman and Thailand's chances of advancing would have been crushed.

Instead, the stage has now been set for a grand finale with all three sides vying for the remaining qualifying spot of Group D.

After five matches, Thailand are at the bottom of the group with four points. The Thais will need to win at Oman in February and hope that Australia is able to beat Saudi Arabia at home at the same time.

Even if Australia and Saudi Arabia's match results in tie, Thailand could advance if they improve their goal difference.

However, that scenario would require Thailand to beat Oman by at least three goals – on the condition that a Saudi-Oz draw does not exceed two goals a piece.

Other Asian fixtures on Tuesday saw the likes of China, Singapore, Indonesia, North Korea, Tajikistan and United Arab Emirates

(UAE) all denied the prospect to advance – even with a match remaining in hand.

Meanwhile, Jordan, Iraq, Japan, Uzbekistan, and Iran joined the ranks with Australia to secure a beirth in the final 10.

Qatar is most likely to advance as well on the conditions that they don't get trounced in their final group E game against Iran, and that Bahrain doesn't have a goal fest against Indonesia.

Considering Indonesia have conceded 16 goals in their five matches – outdone only by Tajikistan with 17 conceded – anything is possible.

And despite a strong start, Asian giants South Korea will have to earn their spot if they are going to advance following a historical 1-2 loss to Lebanon.

A Korean – Kuwaiti showdown will determine one of group B's spots while Lebanon need a draw or win in their match against UAE to advance. Even if Lebanon loses but South Korea ousts Kuwait, then Lebanon will still advance along with the Koreans.

All Asian qualifying matches are scheduled for leap year day, February 29, next year.

Meanwhile in group B, Myanmar and Vietnam comfortably sealed the other two semifinal spots.

Power is balance Tri a rest

BALANCE is one of the fundamentals to developing great ground strokes.

In today's game of power tennis, many of the players are leaping in the air to hit their forehands and backhands. This results in not only many errors but also many injuries. One of the great ground-strokers and inventor of the power game, Andre Agassi, had phenomenal balance which allowed him to strike the ball so hard. If we look at the photo you can see that Agassi has his feet a

racket's length apart before and during contact with the ball.

When you are balanced it is much easier to hit the ball with power and accuracy. Roger Federer is another player with incredible balance. A great way to work on your balance is to place your racket between your feet, pick up your racket and hit strokes without moving.

Once you feel yourself become balanced, practice by running to the ball then placing your feet at the same length as the racket before you strike the ball. Try to hit your strokes without allowing your feet to be close together.

Triathlon Tips By Jürgen Zack

MANY athletes feel insecure about their training during the week before race day.

This is a highly important time used to recover from the load of training in the previous weeks. Experts call this the "Taper Phase".

A triathlete's last long workout should be done exactly a week before the event.

For the Laguna Phuket Triathlon I recommed a 50-70km bike ride followed by a short run of 3-4km at race pace.

The following days are designed to recover. You can either have two rest days or easy days with slow and short swimbike-run sessions just to relax.

Three days before your race it makes sense to get out one more time. Ride 30-50km with some short tempo sections and run 5-8km with several one minute intervals.

Swim workouts should be short and relaxing with, again with several 25-50 meter sprints.

Going into the ocean to get familiar

with the swim course and the conditions is also a good idea.

But remember doing too liitle is preferable than doing too much.

Cruise around for a few kilometers and jog for 10 minutes the day before to loosen up.

You will need the energy on race day Having an easy week before the Laguna Phuket Triathlon will make you mentally alert.

With all that build-up of energy you will look forward to releasing that excess on race day.
