Police volunteers to combat street crime

Police struggle to find the manpower to stem growing tide of crime infiltrating the island

CHALONG Police are boosting public safety on the southern streets of Phuket by enlisting the help of local government officers and volunteers, including island residents and business people.

Chalong Police Deputy Superintendent Lt Col Narong Laksanawimon told the Gazette that more than 20 officers from Rawai Municipality and local residents are joining police efforts in patrolling the streets, reporting any suspicious activities they see directly to officers on patrol at the time.

A "neighborhood watch center" has also been set up in the Khok Tanode community in Chalong. The center, located near Ladthiwanaram Temple (Wat Tai), has 10 volunteers, supervised by police. "We will ask for more officers from Chalong Municipality to join the campaign," Lt Col Narong said.

"After just two weeks, it already seems as if the number of robberies in the area is decreasing. So far the center's efforts have led to arrests in five cases," he added.

The move to enlist civilian help aims to curb rising crime in the area. One recent incident involved a couple being robbed in Soi Sammakee 2, in Rawai, on June 29 by a man wielding a machete.

"The man was robbed last Friday near Lion Muay Thai by a guy and a girl who approached him on a motorbike. He thought might know them," the Gazette was told by one local resident.

"They then put a machete to his throat, slightly cutting his face, and he just gave them everything...

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Court issues warrant for prison guard shooter

AN ARREST warrant has been issued for the prime suspect in the shooting and subsequent threemillion-baht robbery of Phuket prison guard Danunun Teepapan near Wat Chalong on June 27.

Chalong Police Deputy Superintendent Narong Laksanawimon presented to the press the arrest warrant issued by the Phuket Provincial Court for 35-year-old Narongsak "Man" Dang-ngam, who is now wanted on charges of attempted murder and illegal possession of firearms.

"Mr Danunun and Mr Narongsak had some conflict over a business they ran together. When they could not settle the issue, Mr Narongsak [allegedly] came to shoot Mr Danunun and then fled," Lt Col Narong said.

At about 8:30pm, Chalong Police received the report about the shooting from a concerned local resident, who explained that despite injuries sustained the victim had driven his vehicle to a relative's house a short distance away.

Superintendent Col Sirisak Warasiri led police officers to the relative's house in Soi Guan Yu Shrine in Chalong.

At the scene, police officers found a black Toyota pickup truck

belonging to Mr Darunun.

Mr Darunun was not at the house when police arrived, as the same resident who reported the incident had taken him to Phuket International Hospital for treatment to his neck and shoulder.

An examination of the vehicle revealed a bullet hole in the driver's side window and bloodstains on the driver's seat.

"We collected all of the evidence

we found at the scene. Later, we found an abandoned black fourdoor Isuzu pickup truck believed to have been used in the attack," Lt Col Narong explained.

The truck, discovered in Tak Daed Village, was then towed to Chalong Police Station to serve as additional evidence in the case.

Police are also investigating the identity of a Burmese man who allegedly assisted Mr Narong.

Chinese tourist drowns during night swim along Patong Beach

A 19-year-old Chinese tourist drowned on June 30 at Patong Beach, on Phuket's west coast, after going for a night swim with a female friend.

Sakhon Chaithong, chief lifeguard at Patong Beach, told the Gazette that the two Chinese tourists were pulled from the surf near Laem Petch, at the north end of Patong, at about 7:30pm.

Foreign tourists spotted the two in distress and rushed out to pull them back to shore, he said.

"It seems they went for a night swim," Mr Sakhon said.

"The woman was saved, but it was too late for the man," he added.

Chinese national, Tianqi Li, 19, was pronounced dead on arrival at Patong Hospital.

Mr Tianqi's female friend was

she suffered no serious injuries.

Mr Tianqi's body remains at Patong Hospital pending further action by the authorities and instructions from the Chinese Embassy in Bangkok.

His death comes three weeks after American student abroad Joshua Shane, 21, drowned at night at nearly the same location where Mr Tianqi drowned last Saturday.

"He filed a police report and a policeman told him there's a gang operating in the area," said the resident.

Chalong Police Deputy Superintendent Lt Col Narong Laksanawimon told the *Gazette* that police were aware of the incident. "We know who the man is. He is known in the area for being involved in drugs. We believe he is no longer in Phuket, but we are working towards his arrest," he said.

The "machete mugging" follows the fatal stabbing of Australian tourist Michelle Smith on June 20, which gained international media attention and prompted Australian Ambassador

James Wise to call for an islandwide weapons ban (see page 7).

It also prompted Provincial Police Commander Chonasit Wattanavrangkul to order all police stations in Phuket to make

officers available for patrols in key tourist areas from 9pm to 4am each day (see page 3).

Yet the extra patrol officers offer little respite for the Chalong Police, who have the three subdistricts of Chalong, Rawai and Kata-Karon to protect and serve.

"Before [Maj Gen Chonasit's order] we had only 12 patrol officers, but since the announcement we have six more...

"But that means we have only 18 patrol police in total to cover Chalong, Rawai, Nai Harn, Kata and Karon. That means only two officers in each subdistrict per shift," explained Col Narong.

"The tourist areas of Kata and Karon [where Mrs Smith was stabbed] should have more patrol officers," he added.





Police chief calls for island-wide integrated CCTV system to increase island safety

PHUKET Provincial Police Commander Chonasit Wattanavrangkul on July 2, revealed plans to ask the central government to fund a project that will see all CCTV cameras across Phuket feed live footage into a single server.

Speaking at the monthly 'Governor Meets the Press' meeting at Provincial Hall, Maj Gen Chonasit said that CCTV footage had provided essential information in solving recent criminal cases, such as the stabbing of Australian tourist Michelle

"We will present our project to the

Phuket provincial government," he said.

Maj Gen Chonasit said that CCTV could alleviate the decade-old problem of not having enough police officers being assigned

"We will set more checkpoints and assign officers from the Phuket Provincial Police to join local police efforts, but the number of police officers in Phuket is based on its registered population.

"Phuket has only three [administrative] districts and the number of residents registered as living here does not match the actual number of people living here. That is why we need more officers," Gen Chonasit explained.

"We will not ask [the central government] for a big budget for this project because we will use the thousands of CCTV cameras that have already been installed in Phuket, by both government offices and private businesses," he said.

Gen Chonasit did not make any reference to the call by OrBorJor President Paiboon Upatising last month for the central government to provide 2 billion baht to interconnect 10,000 CCTV cameras in - Chutharat Plerin

Special operations unit on tourist night patrol

PHUKET Provincial Police Commander Chonasit Wattanavrangkul has ordered all police stations across Phuket to take part in the formation of a "Special Operations Unit" in order to boost patrols in key tourist areas from 9pm to 4am.

Maj Gen Chonasit announced the news on June 28 at a meeting of the Regional Peace Keeping Council, Phuket Office, headed by Phuket Governor Tri Augkaradacha.

"I have to admit that we do not have enough police officers here to be able to monitor all areas closely," Maj Gen Chonasit explained.

That is why I have asked for special assistance from all police stations in Phuket to designate officers to help with the formation of a 'Special Operations Unit' so we can patrol main tourist areas, such as Kata, Karon, and Patong," he added.

Maj Gen Chonasit said he had also ordered officers to co-ordinate with local people in each area to

assistance to tourists in need.

"This will help tourists feel safe during their visit and it will help to restore their confidence in Phuket help prevent crime and to provide as a tourism destination," he said.

Maj Gen Chonasit pointed out that southern Phuket was suffering from higher crime rates than elsewhere on the island.

"I looked at our records and

found that most of the crimes committed in Phuket have been in the areas that Chalong Police Station is responsible for," said the police chief.

Governor Tri stressed the importance of how the many negative incidents in Phuket directly affect Phuket's reputation as a tourism destination.

"This is one of the most important issues that everyone has to discuss together: how we can better improve our public safety. We need to regain tourists' confidence, as well as that of local residents. Perhaps, we should be more stern in enforcing the law as part of our safety measures," said Governor Tri.

"Phuket is a popular holiday destination and a lot of tourists come here all year round. We can generate a lot of money for Thailand through tourism alone. But if we let tragic incidents like this happen again, no one will want to travel to Phuket," he said.

Phuket MP petitions Yingluck, Chalerm for more police

ONE of Phuket's two Members of Parliament is appealing for the Government to take immediate steps to shore up the island's image following a highly-damning report by a Singapore-based website that brands Phuket: "The Crime Capital of Asia".

The report which includes images sourced from the Gazette, without permission, describes Phuket as: "one of the worlds [sic] most dangerous destinations for foreign and local tourists and businessmen".

Phuket MP Raywat Areerob has sent two letters to top government officials requesting that steps be taken to restore the island's positive image among tourists in response to the web article.

One letter was addressed to Yingluck Prime Minister Shinawatra requesting government help in regaining the positive image of tourism in Phuket.

The other letter was issued directly to Deputy Prime Minister Chalerm Yubamrung, and requested he help provide Phuket with an extra 600 police officers to increase the safety of local residents and tourists.

Foiled tourist abduction comes amid police 'media blackout'

THE Royal Thai Police have ordered a "media blackout" for Phuket, with only the local police superintendent authorized to release information to the media, the Gazette has learned.

News of the blackout follows yet another disturbing report, this one of an attempted abduction of a female tourist in Patong at about 4am on July 4.

The Gazette tried to contact case officer Maj Prathung Pholmana of the Patong Police, but were told that under a new policy set by Royal Thai Police headquarters in Bangkok, only the superintendent was allowed to release information to the media.

Kathu Police Deputy Superintendent Lt Col Kittipong Klaikaew confirmed this, saying the new media blackout policy was recently issued due to the fact that media too often publish false information.

"When the media publish false

or misleading information, it makes our work more difficult and sullies the image of our province,"

Both Thalang and Chalong Police also declined to release information to Gazette reporters, citing the same policy.

The Gazette was eventually able to contact new Patong Police Superintendent Jirapat Phochanaphan, who confirmed that the attempted abduction did take place, and that the perpetrator had been


"As [the woman] approached the hotel, a man parked his vehicle in front of the hotel and got out. He then tried to grab her and pull her into his car. She resisted him and screamed for help," he said.

"Fortunately, a Japanese man came to her rescue. He suffered minor injuries during the struggle, but I can't confirm the exact nature of his wounds," said Col Jirapat. - Orawin Narabal

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Oil spill threatens wildlife at Krabi mangrove forest Belanger

KRABI authorities have launched a massive cleanup operation after a boat struck rocks and spilled a large volume of oil into the sea, resulting in extensive damage to protected mangrove forests in Neua Khlong District.

The spill was first reported at 9am on the morning of June 30.

How much oil was spilled is not known, but one local in an affected area in Khlong Khanan subdistrict reported oil lining 10 kilometers of coastline, with an estimated 1,000 rai of mangrove forest affected.

"This will affect wildlife and cause a lot of trouble for the environment and local residents. Government departments must do something to solve this problem immediately," said Leb Chonlatee, 49, of Laem Kruad village.

Krabi Governor Prasit Osathanon ordered local authorities to act quickly on the spill. "This could endanger or even kill animals in the mangrove forest," he said.

"The Krabi Provincial Electricity Authority cleaned up some of the oil floating on the sea, but there

is still oil in the mangrove forest. I have assigned the relevant departments to inspect and clean up the affected areas," he added.

Surasak Mongkolchaiyasit of the Marine Office in Krabi said

The boat, Aor Somsak, is now in Phuket for repairs. The owner has been identified and told to report to this office by Thursday,"

"The owner must pay for the

damage caused to the environment," said Mr Surasak.

The boat owner faces a fine up to 10,000 baht if officers find that the boat has been used for any purpose other than that stipulated in its registration documents.

"Allowing oil to leak into the sea carries a fine of up to 60,000 baht, up to three years imprisonment, or both," Mr Surasak added.

THE lack of information publicly released on the deaths of Canadian sisters Audrey and Noemi Belanger on Phi Phi Island last month prompted the sisters' father, Carl Belanger, to accuse the Thai authorities of covering up the true circumstances of their deaths.

The leading investigators in the case have now refuted the allegation. The Phuket Gazette's Chaiyot Yongcharoenchai and Orawin Narabal report.

THE international media spotlight shone intensely on the deaths of Canadian sisters Audrey and Noemi Belanger on Phi Phi Island last month. Their deaths, by apparent poisoning, were quickly branded as mysterious as local authorities failed to provide the media with quick, convenient and clear identification as to what caused the deaths.

In a decisive move, Krabi Governor Prasit Osathanon named only one police officer, Krabi Provincial Police Commander Jamroon Ruenrom, as the sole official authorized to publicly comment on the case.

Yet, Maj Gen Jamroon handed

the responsibility over to one of his deputies: Col Boontawee Toraksa.

The lack of information forthcoming from the Thai authorities gained widespread criticism, and resulted in the sisters' father, Carl Belanger, accusing the Thai authorities of a cover-up in an interview in the sisters' home province of Ouebec, Canada.

Col Boontawee has refuted the allegation. "The official autopsy results have not been released yet. We are continuing to contact the Forensic Institute of Ramathibodi Hospital in Bangkok for the final results. What we had been informed of were just the unofficial results, which do not include all

Police crack Kamala motorbike chop shop

PHUKET Police arrested a member of a motorbike theft ring in Kamala, seizing 15 stolen bikes and other evidence valued at 900,000 baht on June 27.

Provincial Police Commander Chonasit Wattanavrangkul presented the suspect, 19-year-old Athiwat Aunruean of Kamala, at a press conference at provincial police headquarters June 28.

Kamala Police Superintende Natthapakin Kwanchaipruk and his team led the investigation after more than 20 motorbikes were reported stolen in Kamala over the past two months.

All of the recovered motorbikes, many of which had been stripped for parts, were presented along with stolen license plates.

Mr Athiwat confessed to being a member of a three-member gang, identifying his accomplices as "Dul" and "Kee".

Mr Athiwat and his conspirators tended to prey on less vigilant bike owners – people who did not


lock them properly or left the key in the ignition. They also sought out bikes left in remote areas. Once stolen, many of the bikes were stripped of parts, which were then sold off to raise money to buy drugs, police said.

Investigators are now working to return the stolen bikes - or what is left of them - to their rightful owners. They are also trying to track down "Dul" and "Kee", whose full names are not yet known.

"I would like to warn motorcyclists to use the security locking system [that prevents the wheels from spinning after the ignition key is removed] every time you park. Also, try to park your motorcycle in well-lit areas," said Col Natthapakin.

the details," he told the Gazette.

"They are now conducting in-depth tests to search for any possible cause of death, which will take a long time and I don't know when the [full] results will be released," he added.

Col Boontawee explained that, unlike most autopsies requested by police, this time they did not request for any specific tests to be conducted, "We basically asked them to test for everything."

DARK HISTORY

The unexplained deaths of Audrey, 20, and Noemi, 26, saw questions resurface from similar deaths on Phi Phi Island in 2009.

Norwegian tourist Erik Liuhagen, 48, died on April 1 after being admitted to hospital with severe diarrhea. He had been staying at Phi Phi Villa. A month later, on May 3, 26-year-old American tourists Ryan Kells and Jill St Onge both became ill and were admitted to Krabi Hospital. The pair had been vomiting for some time before going to the hospital. Ms St Onge died later that day. Mr Kells survived the illness.

According to police, the pair were engaged to be married and had been staying at Laleena Guesthouse, which is about 1,500 meters from where Mr Liuhagen had stayed.

On May 4, Norwegian Julie Michelle Bergheim – who had also been staying at Laleena guesthouse in the room adjacent to Ryan Kells' & Ms St Onge's room – died after becoming mysteriously ill with severe vomiting. She died in hospital while talking to police, a short while after being admitted.

Extensive tests failed to provide any conclusive evidence as to what those three tourists died of.

"The unexplained deaths of the Norwegian and American tourists in 2009 were good case studies for us. [In the Belanger case] We followed the exact same procedure that we conducted in 2009," Col Boontawee said.

He also dismissed rumors that no autopsies were conducted in the 2009 deaths. "We have autopsies conducted in every single case of an unexplained death," he said.

"In the Belanger case, we collected body tissue, stool samples and vomit samples and submitted them to the Institute of Forensic Medicine at the Police General Hospital in Bangkok.

"But then the Canadian embassy and [senior] police [officers in Bangkok] requested us to have the autopsies conducted by the Forensic Institute at Ramathibodi Hospital in Bangkok, since they have specialists who are able to conduct tests that cannot be done at any other hospital," he explained.

"I can't reveal what specific tests they [the Canadian officials] requested, but I can tell you that the autopsy being conducted is to look at every single detail," he added.

TRANSPARENCY

Col Boontawee expressed his disappointment over the foreign media who have reported police action in the Belanger case. "The Canadian media have exaggerated the situation. We have tried our best in order to determine the cause of death. I can't say much since it may affect the case," he said.

"We worked as quickly as we possibly could. As soon as we found out about the deaths, we immediately sent the bodies for an initial autopsy... We are not trying to hide anything from anyone. In this case, we are not specialists in all fields, such as public health or environment. That is why we have so many people from other units involved in the case.

"All we can do now is to wait for the result to come out, then we can continue with our investigation. We didn't want any of this to happen. I just want everyone to know that the way we work is transparent," Col Boontawee concluded.

THE EXPERTS

Dr Pasakorn Akarasewi, Director of the Bureau of Epidemiology at the Ministry of Public Health's Department of Disease Control, heads the team called in by police to assist in the investigation.

"We went to inspect the area as per the request from the Krabi Police. The Krabi Police said they had experts for dealing with drug cases and murder investigations, but they had no specialists in public health. That's why we went down there – to offer some help," he told the *Gazette*.

"We cannot tell the police the actual cause of death, but we can provide evidence for them to consider in the investigation," he said.

The public health aspect of the investigation focuses on possible food poisoning, contaminated water or any disease that may have spread on Phi Phi, Dr Pasakorn explained

"After collecting samples of nearly everything, we came back [to Bangkok] and had those samples examined in the lab. We found nothing wrong with any of the samples we collected," he said.

Dr Pasakorn was also involved in the investigation into the unexplained deaths on Phi Phi in 2009.

"We sent our team from the Bureau of Epidemiology to collect samples just like we did with the Canadian sisters' case, but the situation of those deaths were not exactly the same as this latest case," he said.

"In 2009, we received a request from Krabi Police to assist their investigation. They said they suspected that the cause of death may have been food poisoning. But the test results weren't what they expected, and the police were unable to determine the cause of death," he explained.

"When we went down to Phi Phi again this year, we also wondered why such a similar incident had happened on the same island again... and again, the results from tests in this latest incident have revealed no connection with public health aspects to deaths of the two Canadian sisters," he added.

Dr Passakorn noted that the four deaths at the now-demolished Downtown Inn in Chiang Mai also faltered on the public health front. "We believe the deaths may have been from the same cause, but we were unable to determine what the cause was," he said.

As for the Belanger case, he said, "The autopsy results from Forensic Institute of Ramathibodi Hospital will be the main report

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Call to end tuk-tuk violence

NEW Patong Police Superintendent Jirapat Phochanaphan will soon hold a meeting with all taxi and jet-ski operators in Patong in an attempt to resolve the problems arising from their "interactions" with tourists.

Col Jirapat took over on June 15 from Col Sermphan Sirikong, who served just two months as police chief of Phuket's premier resort town.

Patong Police Deputy Superintendent Kittipong Klaikaew broke the news this week, after a tuktuk driver was fined 3,000 baht and received a three-month suspended sentence for striking an Egyptian tourist in the face – twice.

Col Kittipong identified the driver as 40-year-old Sirapob Ngamriab.

Patong Police were notified of the assault, in front of the Jungceylon shopping complex on Rat-U-Thit 200 Pi Road, at about 8pm on June 26.

According to the police report, when officers arrived they found 35-year-old Egyptian Ahmed Taha Taha sitting on the busy road, obstructing traffic. He refused to seek medical treatment until he had a chance to give his account of what happened to police through a translator.

Police eventually convinced him to move to the sidewalk. After telling police that he had been struck in the left eyebrow by a tuktuk driver, he was escorted by officers to Patong Hospital, where doctors closed the wound with eight stitches.

From there he was taken to Patong Police Station to file a report of the incident.

Before the assault, Mr Taha Taha hailed a tuk-tuk to take him and his family back to their accommodation at the Centra Ashlee Patong Hotel, a distance of about one kilometer.

When asked how many people would be travelling, he told the driver "six"; they then agreed on a fare of 300 baht.

But noticing that more than 10 people had piled in, Mr Sirapob raised the fare to 400 baht, according to the official report.

An argument ensued, in which Mr Sirapob lost his temper and struck the Egyptian in the face twice before fleeing on foot, read the report.

Mr Sirapob came to the police station at about 11:30pm that night to give his version of events.

He told police that Mr Taha Taha refused to pay him 400 baht, berated him and approached him in an aggressive manner. Mr Sirapob confessed to losing his temper and striking Mr Taha

Taha before quickly running away to avoid retribution from the tourist's family.

While at Patong Police Station, Mr Sirapob apologized to Mr Taha Taha and his family, offering to pay him compensation.

The Egyptian accepted the apology, but refused any compensation. He also said he did not want to press any charges against Mr Sirapob, Col Kittipong told the *Gazette*.

However, as assault against a

tourist is a noncompoundable offense under the Thai Criminal Code, it cannot be privately resolved between the parties concerned.

Mr Sirapob was thus charged with assault, whereupon he confessed and was sentenced by Phuket Provincial Court to three months in prison,

suspended for two years, and a 3,000-baht fine.

Col Kittipong urged tuk-tuk and taxi drivers to be patient and to exercise restraint when conflicts with tourists arise.

"We often have meetings with taxi operators to ask them to exercise self-control. Some of them are not very well-educated; they do not quite understand that when they harm tourists, they will have to suffer the consequences, or that it will damage the tourism industry that sustains them.

"However, now they have a better grasp of the fact that if they do bad things, such as assaulting tourists, they are 'smashing their own rice bowl'," he said.

Col Kittipong said that, in his experience, tourists were more often than not the instigators of conflicts with tuk-tuk and taxi drivers.

"They are usually drunk and quick to lose their temper, often pounding on tuk-tuks or shaking them, but I also accept that sometimes taxi drivers overreact and assault tourists," he said.

"I would like taxi drivers and jet-ski operators to be good hosts... Calling in police to help resolve disputes amicably is the best solution," he said.

Drug suspect caught after year on the run

A MAN wanted in connection with a police bust involving 9,600 ya bah (methamphetamine) pills last year was arrested on the evening of June 29 while walking along Wiset Road in Rawai.

The warrant for Kriangkrai "Fad" Mahasod, 24, was issued by the Phuket Provincial Court on September 19 last year.

It followed a spate of arrests in Phuket which led to drugs with a street value of more than five million baht being seized.

Mr Kriangkrai's associate, 19year-old Thawatchai "Em" Jokkaew, was arrested during a raid on a house in Rawai in which the *ya bah* pills were recovered.

The court issued the warrant pending charges being brought against Mr Kriangkrai for possession of *ya bah* with intent to sell and possession of an improvised firearm.

Mr Kriangkrai spent a year hiding in his home province of Krabi, but returned to Phuket about two months ago to work on a boat.

At the time of the arrest, Chalong police found two grams of *ya ice* (crystal methamphetamine) on his person.

Seven injured as fishing boat explodes

SEVEN people were rushed to hospital after an explosion aboard a fishing boat queued up to take on ice at Por Pichai Company wharf in Rassada on July 1.

Police were notified of the explosion at 8:10am and attended the scene along with Kusoldharm Foundation rescue workers.

At the scene, rescue workers found the *Sathaporn 7* half sunk and seven men injured.

The captain, Prawai Tongmee, 52, and a man identified as "Mr Nikorn", 37, suffered severe burns. Five Burmese crewmen were also injured in the blast.

All seven were rushed to Vachira Phuket Hospital.

From their initial investigation, police believe that after the *Sathaporn 7* finished unloading its haul of fish at the nearby Fish

Marketing Organization wharf the previous day, it queued up to take on ice at the Por Pichai wharf for its scheduled departure.

While waiting in the queue, a crew member turned on the gas cooker, which might have had a

leaky gas hose that fuelled the explosion, said police.

The blast damaged the engine room and holed the hull, causing the boat to list and partially sink into the shallow water.

The *Sathaporn 7* was salvaged, but the owner estimates repairs will cost 2 million baht.

Norraset Roay-utara, 39, who owns the *Sor Chock Anada*, which helped salvage the *Sathaporn 7*, said, "It took us a while to salvage the boat, since it is big. We just tied buoys to the boat and let them float it to the surface.

"Then, we patched the hole and dragged it back to the wharf to be repaired," he told the *Gazette*.

Police are continuing to investigate the case to determine the exact cause of the explosion.

No more weapons in paradise

Australian Ambassador calls on all police to rid the island of all firearms and knives

AUSTRALIAN Ambassador to Thailand James Wise on June 29 called for police to launch an island-wide crackdown on weapons, including those carried by tuk-tuk drivers.

Speaking after a high-level meeting at Phuket Provincial Hall, Amb Wise said the recent fatal stabbing of Australian tourist Michelle Smith had put a spotlight on public safety in Phuket.

"There has been massive media coverage of this in Australia and it will have an effect on some people who would otherwise have come to Phuket – that is only human nature," he said.

Amb Wise said the Australian authorities were very pleased that the Thai police were able to find the suspects. "They have been charged and they will now face the courts of Thailand, as they should, but that of course is really not much comfort at all for the family of Mrs Smith," he said.

"I would hope that – given the nature of the crime – the police will move very quickly to confiscate knives and guns and other weapons which people are carrying in Phuket. I understand tuk-tuk drivers quite often have weapons. They shouldn't have weapons. They don't need weapons to drive a tuk-tuk," he said.

Amb Wise suggested that one way authorities could encourage tuk-tuk drivers to stop carrying weapons was to not only to confiscate the weapons found, but also impound the tuk-tuks.

He pointed out that ever since his installment as Ambassador to Thailand in 2010, the authorities in Phuket have been calling for stronger support from the central government in Bangkok.


He explained that he and other ambassadors had met with senior officials in Bangkok several months ago to discuss such issues and that another meeting was scheduled for July 11.

"At that meeting we will also be drawing to the central government's attention our concerns, but also conveying to the central government the very strong wish of the authorities here in Phuket for strong support from the central authorities," he said.

Amb Wise pointed out that most Australians who visit Phuket have trouble-free visits.

"Overwhelmingly, the Australians who come here have a wonderful holiday and many of them come back again. Phuket remains a very attractive destination for Australians, but the case of Mrs Smith last week – the very, very tragic murder of Mrs Smith – does put the spotlight on the security situation here in Phuket.

"I think it provides an opportunity for us in the diplomatic community, for local authorities here and for local people here to say, 'Look, enough is enough'. We need to fix some of these problems that we have been talking about for years — but let's take this opportunity to deal with these issues, to fix these issues, not just talk about them," he said.



Phuket Tourist Association blasts officials for inaction over island's foreign mafia

PHUKET Tourist Association Vice President Sarayuth Mallam on June 27, lashed out at local government heads for failing to see the importance of solving tourism issues and succumbing to the pressures of "foreign mafia".

"Department heads are not placing the proper importance on solving these problems. Even at this meeting, for example, many heads of the relevant organizations are not here, such as the Phuket Police Commander, the Tourist Police Superintendent and the Immigration Superintendent.

"Instead, they send their subordinate officers to represent them," said Mr Mallam at a meeting headed by Phuket Governor Tri Augkaradacha.

Mr Sarayuth explained that it was necessary for the heads of relevant offices to listen to the meetings in their entirety. "Many of them would like to work in Phuket, but some of them don't know anything [about Phuket]."

Mr Sarayuth said that mafia in Phuket, especially those headed by foreigners, were having deepreaching effects on public safety.

"The presence of foreign mafia in Phuket is more frightening than local mafia. They are not afraid of the police," he said.

Mr Sarayuth cited for Governor Tri the example of a staff member of a Patong timeshare company attacking a tourist.

"The tourist reported the attack to the police and the timeshare worker was questioned at Patong





Police Station. However, the company called a powerful policeman from outside Phuket, who cleared the case. All the Patong Police could do was issue him a warning," he explained.

Mr Sarayuth is already very familiar with suffering violent intimidation tactics. In 2002, he was attacked from behind and hit in the head with a hammer after leaving an appointment at Phuket Provincial Court.

Phuket Vice Governor Chamroen Tipayapongtada pointed out that at a recent meeting in Bangkok, Deputy Prime Minister Chalerm Yoobamrung ordered provincial governors to send reports to Prime Minister Yingluck Shinawatra every 30 days, especially provinces that have issues with jet-ski rentals, black taxis and tourists being taken advantage of.

Creepy craft spooks Chiang Mai zookeepers

THE managers of the Chiang Mai Zoo Aquarium recently had three ancient boats moved off their premises after a series of ghostly goings-on had staff scared stiff.

After the boats arrived at the property, weird things started happening, including ghostly sightings and sounds – and the boats were held responsible.

Narithat Charoensetsin, deputy chairman of Chiang Mai Zoo Aquarium, said he bought the three boats, which were carved out of extremely hard Malabar ironwood, for 70,000 baht from some villagers in Lamphun Province.

Airport director Prathuang hails anti-cheat measures a success

SECURITY measures taken at Phuket International Airport to prevent airport service staff, and the likes of illegal taxi drivers, from taking advantage of tourists were declared successful by Airport Director Prathuang Sornkham on June 30.

The announcement follows police joining forces to launch a campaign in March to put a stop to illegal taxi drivers overcharging people and to stop tour guides and touts from harassing arriving passengers before and after they leave the airport building.

"Though sometimes people tried to cheat tourists or steal their belongings, we did our best to control and eliminate the problem, so as to make tourists feel 100 per cent safe while they are at the airport," Mr Prathuang explained.

He added that the airport was critical in providing new arrivals with a positive image of Phuket as it is the first place they see when - **Phuket Gazette** arriving on the island.

Waterspout destroys five houses in Krabi

FIVE families are seeking refuge at a local public health clinic after a waterspout demolished their homes in Krabi on June 27.

The waterspout struck the small waterfront community of Khlong Kanan in Nua Khlong District, which comprises about 100 stilted homes raised about 15 to 20 meters above the water.

Jira Butraha, 30, said her seven-year-old daughter saved her from being caught inside her home as it collapsed.

"I was cooking in the kitchen when I suddenly heard a sound like a very heavy storm outside. Then my daughter came running in, yelling at me to get out of the house," Mrs Jira said.

"So I ran outside and stood in front of my home. Less than a second later, the whole house collapsed into the sea. Luckily, no one was injured," she added.

The water spout destroyed four other homes belonging to Mrs Rorpia Tawamak, 50; Mr Jumnien Boonyarat, 65; Mr Soonthorn

Labsaeng, 48; and Mrs Saorada Ryatalay, 49.

Talengsak Puwayannapong of the Krabi Office of the Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation (DDPM-Krabi) led a team of officers to inspect the site and render assistance.

"Local villagers said a 'tornado' rose up from the sea. It blew toward the houses, causing a lot of damage. Our initial estimates put the damage at a minimum of 1.5 million baht," Mr Talengsak said.

The DDPM-Krabi will provide 30,000 baht cash and a household "survival kit", including rice, cooking oil and bedding, to each family.

NASA climate project shelved

A PROPOSED project that would see the United States' National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) use U-Tapao airbase for a climate research project has collapsed amid political squabbling and recriminations.

Members of both the government and the opposition Democrat Party accused each other of failing to properly manage the request for the project.

In an open letter, Thai scientists implored the government to facilitate the collaboration, which would have investigated the hypothesis that Southeast Asia during its monsoon season is the primary place and time when near-surface pollutants are pumped high into the stratosphere, with potential environmental effects for the entire planet.

"I think this project is essential for Thai people because it is concerned directly with the atmospheric environment of the country," said Associate Professor Serm Janjai of Silpakorn University's Department of Physics.

"We are in the zone where aerosol pollution creation is intensive due to agricultural waste burning,

especially in Thailand and neighboring countries. These pollutants affect clouds and, consequently, rainfall distribution, which is vital for this region. The mechanism of interaction between aerosols, clouds and rain is currently unclear," he explained.

But the project will have to be shelved for some time. Parliamentary squabbling between the government and opposition meant the project could not start in time to take the required measurements during the height of the monsoon season, NASA said.

"On June 26, 2012, NASA cancelled the SEAC4RS mission, which was scheduled to begin in August 2012, due to the absence of necessary approvals by regional authorities in the time frame necessary to support the mission's planned deployment and scientific observation window," the NASA

website announced.

NASA planned to launch the project for two months in August and September, but stiff opposition in the Kingdom over the issue barred the Thai government from granting timely approval for the project.

The opposition Democrat Party

accused both governments of having hidden agendas. Members of the party claimed the research had a secret military purpose to contain China in the Asia-Pacific region in exchange for a US visa for former PM Thaksin Shinawatra.

The argument baffled some

observers, who noted that U-Tapao airbase was already being used by US military planes as a transit point for operations in Asia.

The base was one of several Thai sites used by the US during the Vietnam War to bomb Laos. Cambodia and Vietnam.

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Firm presses forward with controversial Mekong dam

THAI engineering firm Ch Karnchang is pressing ahead with the development of the controversial Xayaburi Dam on the Mekong River despite bitter opposition from villagers' and environmental

Opponents of the project say the US\$3 billion structure will devastate communities and ecosystems downstream in Cambodia, Laos, Thailand and Vietnam.

The company's actions allegedly fly in the face of a decision by the Mekong River Commission, which comprises water and environment ministers from the affected countries, to ban further construction on the project until the results of an environmental impact assessment are released.

Ch Karnchang claims it is only doing "preliminary construction", though critics claim that work such as the building of roads goes further than that.

Ten die in Surat Thani horror smash

SIX tourists and four others have died, 17 more were seriously injured, when an inter-provincial bus left the road and crashed into an electric power transmission pole on Tuesday.


The driver lost control of the first-class, air-conditioned Transport Co Ltd vehicle and it crashed into a divider strip and then slammed into the power pole on the Surat Thani - Nakhon Sri Thammarat Road in Kanchanadit district.

Among those killed were the driver and Amit Jain,

an Indian national. Five other bodies had yet to be identified and were sent Surat Thani Hospital.

Another 17 passengers, including both Thais and foreigners, were injured and being treated in local hospitals.

The bus, carrying 24 passengers, the driver and two bus attendants, left Bangkok at 7:50pm on Monday evening en route to Surat Thani. The passengers' ultimate destination was Koh Pha-ngan, an island off Samui known for its infamous "full moon" parties.



Time for tourism bodies to act on surf safety

A recent *Phuket Gazette* online poll revealed that readers were evenly divided on which was the best of six possible approaches to minimize the number of lives lost to drowning during the monsoon season now underway.

As noted by many readers who commented in our readers' forum, the results seem to indicate that perhaps there is no single best solution to this very serious problem and that a multi-tiered strategy combining all the approaches is needed.

As argued in this space before, however, the *Phuket Gazette* continues to believe that in-flight warnings, either spoken or in video format, would be the most effective and easy-to-implement strategy for educating tourists about the dangers of rip currents.

Putting up more signs in more languages would be a fine idea if our beaches weren't so cluttered with obnoxious signage already. Lifeguards face a similar signal-to-noise problem; tourists are so bombarded with touts, propositions and other unwanted attention that they naturally tend to "tune out" anyone who approaches them – even if that person might come bearing critical information that may save their lives.

The idea of getting police involved might likewise save some lives, but it is hardly rational to expect law officers to help keep beach tourists out of the water if they can't even keep motorists on the correct side of the road.

In-flight warnings would be far more direct and effective. For a start, airplane passengers are the very definition of a captive audience. People may tune out when the flight attendants go into their pre-takeoff safety spiel, but they are far more likely to pay attention if they are at 30,000 feet and the captain comes on and speaks to them in their own language about safety issues.

A short video explaining the dangers of rip currents in a matter-of-fact way would probably be even more effective, and the *Phuket Gazette* would be happy to provide the necessary footage to any airline willing to show it to passengers.

The *Gazette* has already attempted to persuade one of the most popular inbound carriers to spread this information, but without success.

We were told that the request "had to come from local tourism authorities".

For this reason we plead that the Tourism Authority of Thailand, Tourist Police, the Thai Hotels Association Southern Chapter, Phuket Chamber of Commerce, Phuket Tourist Association, Phuket International Airport, Honorary Consuls Association and related agencies and groups work together to draw up a memorandum of understanding (MoU) for presentation to each and every carrier with scheduled and charter services to Phuket.

It may be impossible to cut the number of monsoon season drownings to zero, but we are morally obliged to try.

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

We presumed that once the storm-water pits had been completed on our road, the next stage would be to repair the existing road surface, curb and gutter; thus giving the residents of our street some relief from the mess we have to endure.

Cleaning up Patong Stop saying that is about good timing

FIRST PERSON

WE HAVE a clear trash-collection system established in Patong to keep it beautiful. The people of Patong must cooperate with us by not leaving garbage bins out during the daytime, but by placing them at specifically designated places by the side of the road by night.

People must place their garbage bins and trash bags at set locations for collection between 8pm and early the next morning, during which time our seven garbage trucks are out collecting trash around town. During the other hours of the day we only have one truck out collecting rubbish.

If we catch people putting out their trash during the day, which is unsightly, we will issue them a warning. If they do it again, we will fine them up to 1,000 baht each time they do it. This is in accordance with the Public Health Office's ordinance for disposal of sewage and trash.

We will also keep a list of repeat offenders.

The project, now about two years old, was originally started along just two roads, Nanai and Phra Baramee. However, every year we run a campaign to boost support and awareness of the project. This year's campaign will be held for the entirety of next month.

The beginning was a struggle, because not many people cooperated with us, but more people are starting to understand the importance of the project.

The campaign next month, costing about 300,000 baht, will be conducted in Thai and English. We run the program in English as well as Thai because there are so many foreigners living in Patong.

The well-known Rat-U-Thit 200 Pi Road will be our focus for the next fiscal year.

Patong produces the second highest volume of trash in all of Phuket, just behind Phuket City. The town generates about 100 tons of garbage a day during the high season and 96 tons a day in the low season. It's expensive to deal with that much rubbish.

Patong Municipality provides more than 59.6 million baht for garbage management in the fiscal year, but it's still not enough, as we have to pay a fee to have the trash burned at the incinerator last year we spent more than 17.8 million baht in incineration fees.

We also have many other expenses, such as paying the salaries of the 96 employees who collect the trash.

I am applying my management

experience from my previous jobs here and it is working well. However we do have some problems when new people and tourists visit Phuket. They often don't know anything about the project. To prevent them from causing issues with the project I think it would be best for hotel and guesthouse staff to inform their guests to dispose of their rubbish properly, inside their accommodations.

IT IS dumfounding to me that government officials, from police duty officers to the very top in Phuket, all come out with the same business-based phrase to justify their pursuit of wrongdoers: this could have a negative effect on Phuket's tourism image.

Perhaps some of the fault lies with media outlets that propagate this phrase as a standard side one, track one. But unless English-language media sources across the nation are truly twisting the words of officials, the government should bury that particular phrase.

In their defense, officials are stating the obvious: yes, the senseless and horrific slaying of Michelle Smith, the unknown cause of death of the young Belanger sisters and even the Cherng Talay motorbike chopshop gang are all bad for Phuket's image. Unless the tourism industry shoots for a very different and morbid market, the killing and robbing of tourists will not be good for it.

When police explain to the world that they are searching for a criminal because what they have done was "bad" for Phuket's image, the message many will receive is that "destination branding" trumps the rule of law on these shores.

Such pronouncements certainly do more harm than good, ultimately creating the impression that officials care less about the tourists themselves than potential lost revenue if Phuket's image is tarnished.

Police officials running the halls crying about the most recent murder will not save lives, nor will their babbling on about how it will affect the tourism image. So let them stay away from the extremes and play the game by the book and

instead say: "A person committed a terrible crime against another person. We will do our best to arrest them and see that justice is served".

However, I was disappointed to find out that despite meeting the criteria of legally working here and raising the child in Thai culture, I, as a single male, cannot adopt a countries have different age Department replies: Thai child. Has anyone any advice on this matter?

Nalin Thantong, Social Development Worker of Child Adoption Center in Bangkok replies:

Being a single male foreigner should not disqualify you from legally adopting a child.

Because you are a foreigner living in Thailand and want to adopt, you must contact our office in Bangkok. We will need to know personal information, including your nationality, because different Send us your queries and we'll ask the right people to respond to them.

Once we have that information, we will be able to inform you what documents you need in order to request certification from your home country's embassy in Thailand confirming that you are qualified to adopt a child.

Then you can return to our office with the document and begin the interview process.

Can I bring deli goods in my suitcase?

When I return to Thailand, what can I bring back with me in my suitcase? I am mostly concerned about importing "delicatessens", such as cheeses, for personal consumption. Also, where can I find a list of restricted items?

An officer at the Thai Customs

You are allowed to bring cheeses and other delicatessen products with you, but you must first obtain a permit from the Thai Food and Drug Administration before you enter the country.

After obtaining the permit and arriving at the airport, go through the Goods to Declare channel. Be sure to inform Customs officers of all the controlled items that you are carrying and present your import permit.

If the items you are bringing have a combined value more than 10,000 baht, you will have to pay import taxes and duties at the

customs counter.

If you have any questions, call us at 076-351124 during office hours or call our 24-hour-call center at 1164.

Thanet Klinming, Food Technical Officer at the Thai Food and **Drug Administration, replies:**

To import food into the Kingdom, you will need to contact the Food and Drug office in Bangkok and the officer will need details

about the food, such as the brand name, type and amount.

The officer can then explain which documents will be needed for the import permit.

If you have friends or relatives in Thailand, the documents can be sent to them along with a statement of Power of Attorney, and they can process and receive the import license from the Bangkok Food and Drug office for you.

However, if you don't have any friends or relatives in Thailand, you can inform the Thai FDA in Bangkok of which items you intend to bring with you and the flight details of when and where you will be arriving in Thailand.

That way, if your permit is approved, we can have it waiting for you at the Thai FDA office at the airport when you arrive.

Sunken Deep Sea Port upgrade project resurfaces at meeting

TRANSPORT Minister Charupong Ruangsuwanm has told a consortium of Phuket officials and the operator of Phuket's Deep Sea Port that he will raise the problem of the stalled 100-million-baht plan to develop the facility with Cabinet.

However, Mr Charupong said the project must clearly provide benefits for local people if the plan is to go ahead.

Mr Charupong was in Phuket on Saturday to hear in person what the expansion plan entails. His visit follows that of Deputy Transport Minister Kittisakdi Hathasongkorh in December, who vowed to support the plan to expand the port, which has run aground over its environmental impact assessment (EIA) report.

Wathanachai Raunglertpanyakul, Director of Chaophaya Terminal International Co Ltd, which has the government concession to operate Songkhla and Phuket Ports, explained in December that not one local resident surveyed as part of the EIA agreed with the expansion project.

"The residents are afraid that the runoff from the construction

and extra activity will affect the water so much that it will impact their making a living. Not one person has agreed with the project, and so the EIA has not been approved," he said.

Mr Wathanachai explained that the project, to cost more than 100 million baht, includes extending the dock by 60 meters

so two large ships can dock at the same time.

"This involves dredging about 4,000 square meters of underwater earth. We will also install two large mooring poles in the bay," he said.

"The main objective of the expansion project is to enhance the capability of the port to be able to handle ships from 9,000 to 20,000 Dead Weight Tons.Big ships should easily be able to dock at the port to load or unload goods or passengers," said Mr Wattanachai.

The plan aims to expand the facility to cover 106 rai of land.

"The port will be able to handle ships 210m long, but not more than 27.5m wide, and the ships'draft cannot be more than 9.4m. The port will be equipped with one 1,600-horsepower tug boat, 10 forklifts able to lift three tons of goods and eight forklifts able to lift five to seven tons," Mr Wattanachai told the minister.

If the plan goes ahead, the port will be able to handle 360,000 tons of goods and 300,000 passengers per year, he added.

"In 2010, 203,652 tons of goods were exported via the port, rising to 211,578 tons in 2011. Most of the goods were MDF [Medium Density Fiberboard] wood and rubber being exported to America and the Middle East," he said.

However, it has been the rising number of cruise liners bringing tourists to Phuket that

is fueling the need for expansion, said Mr Wattanachai. "A lot more cruise liners are coming to Phuket, about 150 to 200 each year. In 2010, 164,422 passengers from both Asia and Europe passed through the port. In 2011, that number rose to 200,559 passengers," he said.

He repeated his explanation that the Phuket Deep Sea Port was originally designed to be a cargo port only, and that [the addition of passengers] was

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Island Investor

WHEN we talk about financial markets, to say the last few years have been a struggle would be a little bit of an understatement. First it was the US housing market, which then led to the credit crunch, and now we're seeing banks remain in financial trouble and Europe on the whole in dire straits.

I mentioned a few weeks ago, that even though markets are seeing unprecedented levels of volatility, there are opportunities to be had. European stocks do look cheap, but there is another way of benefiting from the peaks and troughs of an uncertain market place.

Anyone who saves on a regular basis will probably have seen their portfolio values drop in recent times, but should this be something to be concerned about? Well, this all depends on how long an investment time frame you have.

If you have regular savings investments maturing within the next 12-24 months, then it will probably be hard to get back into positive territory, not saying that it's impossible – though in many cases it is.

For those that have regular savings plans with 24 months or more left to run,

then this could be just what's needed.
You may think, "what is he talking about, how can markets that are down be a positive thing?"

Well, it all comes down to something we call dollar-cost averaging. It is a very simple concept really, and it helps smooth out the ups and downs of financial markets.

No doubt this will be teaching many people how to suck eggs, but for a new investor or even an experienced investor who may be a little disgruntled with how their portfolio is performing, then this could be a good refresher. Perhaps it may give you a little more confidence and help you to see that it is not all doom and gloom.

The art of dollar-cost averaging

THE BASIC philosophy is that when markets drop, you begin to purchase units at a lower price, meaning that over the long term when markets do stabilize and begin to rise, you are in essence holding more units, which should in turn produce

a higher profit margin.

As I said, this is dollar-cost averaging in its very basic form, and there are many considerations to take into account, such as, are you invested in the correct funds and is the policy being actively managed?

Also, when discussing dollar-cost averaging, what we need to take into account is the amount of funds that have already been built up inside the portfolio.

A two pronged strategy needs to be adopted when viewing a regular savings plan, dependent on your attitude towards risk. For funds already built up inside the policy it is prudent in times of economic uncertainty to take a more defensive view, while maintaining on-going contributions. Find a strategy that fits your appetite for investment risks, this ensures a certain degree of capital consolidation while at the same time bringing dollar-cost averaging into play with future contributions. The illustrations to the right give a brief overview of the dollar-cost averaging technique:


With Investment A: You would have purchased a total of 23,740 units, at a closing price of US\$ 2.99 per unit, giving you a market value of US\$ 70,983.21.

With investment B: You would have purchased a total of 42,530 units, at a lower closing price of US\$ 2.25, giving you a market value of US\$ 95,692.70.

This is certainly dollar-cost averaging in its most basic form, and again there are numerous factors that would need to be taken into the equation. However, this is certainly one means of smoothing out the market swings we are seeing.

This, however, will only work hand in hand with a portfolio that is regularly reviewed. Certainly even though things are tough at the moment, once again, there are still opportunities to be had.

Automobile tyre sales up in Southeast Asia

Consumer research indicates that after last year's floods there is now a boom in the sale of pneumatic tyres for cars

DEMAND for replacement car tyres in major cities of four emerging markets of Southeast Asia saw a surge of 14% in the first quarter of this year over the previous quarter, research by GfK has revealed.

According to the global leading research firm's tracking data covering bustling cities in Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines and Thailand – where vehicle ownership is highest – some 2,557,600 car tyres were replaced in the first three months of the year (Q1).

The findings attributed most of the positive growth in Q1 to demand boosts in the Bangkok metropolitan area as well as Malaysia's Klang Valley, which registered incremental sales volume growth of 38% and 16% when compared to the closing quarter of 2011.

"While the healthy sales performance of replacement car tyre in Malaysia was driven by seasonal demand brought about by the festive Chinese New Year period in January, the sudden sales spike in Thailand was an exceptional occurrence. A result of the flooding disaster, which took place at the end of third quarter last year," highlighted Ms Jasmine Lim, Account Director at GfK Asia.

"As a result, replacement car tyre sales fell by 26% in quarter four last year, but pent up demand drove sales up considerably in the following quarter," she added.

Cities in Indonesia covered by the survey included Jakarta, Bodetabek, Surabaya, Medan, Bandung and Makassar, while the Philippines metropolitan area covered the National Capital Region.



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Scratch that, CAT's back



THREE weeks ago, I lamented the imminent passing of CAT's EV-DO service – the original high speed wireless "AirCard" that ushered in a new, faster way of surfing the web without getting plugged in.

At the time, I was told that EV-DO would continue to work through the end of the year. Today, I found out differently. CAT's going to dismantle its entire EV-DO network, at least in Phuket, by August 31. The end is near.

If you currently have CAT EV-DO, you need to figure out what you're going to do with that soon-to-be-useless USB dongle, and how to move on to the next version of wireless internet.

Fortunately, there's a good alternative. CAT. No, really. Even while they're pulling up their old service, they're rolling out a new one, called My Click. I can't say much for the branding, but the service itself is compelling.

Keep in mind that CAT is using the TrueMove-H network. (I guess, officially, TrueMove-H is using the CAT network, but that's kind of a political hot potato at the moment.) That means CAT has a well-established, functioning HSPA+ network, here in Phuket – available at a very good price.

I had a chance to talk about the service at length with the folks at the CAT office in Central Festival (opposite the Apple store), and I was amazed at what they told me.

First, coverage. The CAT HSPA+ network hits just about

everywhere in Phuket, up to Kao Lak, over to Krabi town, Koh Lanta, Ao Nang, and Phang Nga town, with other locations coming on quickly.

That matches my experience. I was astounded to find a 3G signal (from TrueMove-H) north of Kao Lak several months ago, at the ferry terminal for Koh Kao Khao. Believe me, that's off the beaten track by a kilometer or two. CAT's rolling the equipment out everywhere.

If you live in a spot in Phuket that may be iffy, all you have to do is leave your address with the folks at the CAT counter in Central. They'll check your actual location and let you know if the signal is strong enough to reach. They have people who go out and check every weekday.

CAT has a Google map of coverage areas at: W.mybycat.com.

Note that you don't need to have a laptop or tablet computer to take advantage of wireless broadband: you can stick a dongle on any USB port on your desktop computer, too.

You may find the reception's better if you have a USB extension cord, and can twist the dongle around a bit. And, yes, USB dongles work on Macs, too (although you need the "3G" version of an iPad to get the CAT service – a WiFi-only iPad cannot connect).

It gets better. If you go to Bangkok, or travel through much of central Thailand, you can use your CAT dongle (or CAT SIM card in your phone or tablet) to get on their HSPA+ network everywhere that TrueMove-H has coverage – which includes

almost all of the urban areas in Thailand. The trick: you have to choose roaming with TrueMove.

Although you're theoretically roaming, there's no roaming charge – something about an agreement that TrueMove has with CAT.

If you do have an EV-DO "AirCard," there isn't much you can do with it. You have to buy a new USB dongle.

At this moment, CAT's run out of dongles, but they're

readily available at JIB and Banana IT for about 1,300 baht. Almost all dongles these days will work with the CAT network, but if you have any questions, be sure to look for HSPA coverage at 850 MHz. That's the magic combination.

Once you have a USB dongle for your computer, or a new SIM card for your phone or iPad (cost: 99 baht), you have to sign up for one of CAT's service plans. The best deal, by far, is their "unlimited" plan which gives you up to 4 GB of data per month – enough for almost everybody except those who upload or download lots of videos, or run torrents for movies or TV shows.

After you hit 4 GB of usage, the line gets cut down to a much slower speed, until the month's up and you go back to

The speed reporting site at www.phuketinternetspeed.com shows download speeds between 600 Kbps and 1,400 Kbps – which is comparable to many wired connections on the island.

I've tested the TrueMove-H connection in Patong, Sam Kong, Sai Yuan, and inside Central Festival, and consistently see speeds of 450 to 650 Kbps. That's downright decent for a wireless

connection, although the CAT EV-DO service has been running around 850 to 900 Kbps. Much depends on your line-of-site proximity to a CAT tower.

CAT's "My Click 590" package is 590 baht per month, which is quite a bargain, even by international standards. No wonder they're selling a ton of them. They're competing directly with TrueMove-H, which offers pre-

The prepaid service is quite reasonable. The last time I checked it was 399 baht for 15 days "unlimited" which is, in fact, throttled after you hit 4GB of data traffic.

The 800 pound gorilla sitting in the CAT office is the long-anticipated auction of new "3G" spectrum, which may or may not happen this year.

If the government finally gets


its act together long enough to attract bidders and allow them to start building out their systems, we may be treated to some much faster wireless internet speeds. Some day. Maybe.

In the interim, right now, you can get decent wireless access for about 1,300 baht plus 590 baht per month. Even if you switch in six months (or a year, or two, or three) that's a good deal.




cisely the same service for 799 baht per month.

If you're Thai, take your ID card to CAT and they'll sign you up. If you have a work permit, take a copy of your passport or work permit to the CAT office. (You might want to take your computer, too.)

If you don't have a work permit, you have two options: convince a friend with a Thai ID card to go along with you – realizing that they're on the hook, financially, if you don't pay your bill; or, get a prepaid card.

Seeking out the Phi Ta Khon festival in Loei province

VISITING Udon Thani, a civilized, integrated and respectable city in the Northeast, we joined in the merry and colorful festivities of the traditional Phi Ta *Khon* festival, in Loei province.

The festival teaches us to be interested in history and to pay respect to tradition. We also planned some fun activities to do during the trip.

Our group flew with AirAsia to Udon Thani from Phuket. We arrived in Udon Thani by late

afternoon and visited the legendary temple, Wat Phothisomphon, which was built in the late reign of King Rama V about 106 years ago, before checking into our hotel in the city.

Udon Thani is full of religious relics. There are many temples, shrines and city pillars. The people of Udon Thani and Thai tourists still believe that the sacred items which reside there, will bestow blessing upon them.

Wat Phothisomphon's pagoda, which contains royal holy Buddha relics, was completed nearly four years ago. We were very impressed by the towering paintings, hung high above on an octagon wall, which surrounded the room at the pagoda's third floor, where the holy relics are kept. The paintings each tell a part of the Buddha's story. We can see the artists' professionalism, since the drawings appear to be slightly three dimensional.

Keadtipong Kotchawong, Assistant Director of the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) Udon Thani Office, told us over dinner that Udon Thani Airport is a hub for tourists who want to cross the border into Vientiane, Laos. According to Nong Khai Immigration statistics, more than 300,000 tourists, nearly 200,000 Thais and more than 100,000 foreigners, cross into Vientiane each year.

The next morning, we left Udon



Thani for Dansai district in Loei, to join the Phi Ta Khon festival. It took us three hours by van to reach our destination.

Before reaching Dansai, we stopped for lunch and decided to have some fun on an exciting river rafting adventure in the Phurua district of Loei. We divided into two groups, each with a raft.

Unfortunately for us, the water level was very low because at the time not much rain had fallen for a month or so. We made it only 4.4 kilometers of the 13 km total route. However, we still enjoyed our river adventure, rafting past large rocks, small cliffs and lush forest.

Our two rafts were often struck by rocks, and the staff on each raft worked hard to push us away from the rocks – we could see how exhausted they were. It took more than an hour for us to complete a trip that normally takes about 20 minutes, when the water level is normal.

> Every time the rafts struck rocks, we had to cooperate with the raftguides and move ourselves forwards and backwards, to pry the raft free of the rocks.

Only one man in our canoe did not fall out at some point. Parts of the river have such a strong current that the raft would need to be maneuvered abruptly to avoid passing rocks. (Each time someone fell out, the other people on the

canoe seemed a bit pleased.)

San River Co opened for rafting tours in September of last year and is open from June though November every year.

When we finally reached the end of the route, some villagers, who live next to the river, mostly children, welcomed us back with their smiles. Young boys swam



near our canoes. The village did not get many tourists as we could sense that the villagers were a little excited when strange new faces appeared in their area.

After a short meet and greet with the local people, we took two pick-up trucks to a local Thai restaurant. Sitting in back of the truck we felt crisp cool weather and admired the beautiful sky and mountain-side view.

After warming ourselves with a hot beverage, we headed to the

After we got off the main road and onto a small dirt road, we were seemingly deep in the forest. Obviously, not many vehicles traveled this road and we were quite relieved when the welcome sign for the resort came into view. Beyond the sign there was a small lake with a pedal boat in the shape of a white swan.

The resort seemed to have been there for many years, since their bungalows were not new, but we were pleased to stay overnight amidst the fresh air and among the abundant trees. It felt calm and peaceful. We didn't need air-conditioning, since the air temperature was around 25 degrees at night and in the morning.

We woke up early the next morning for the Phi Ta Khon festival in Dansai town. We joined in the procession on the second day of the festival. The streets were crowded with people, both foreigners and Thais – though mostly Thais.

According to local legend, the Phi Ta Khon mask is made from coconut husks, soft wood and woven bamboo.

Our guide told us that Phi Ta Khon (which means ghosts that follow people in Thai) reflects the story of a past life of the Buddha, known at that time as Phra (prince) Wetsandorn. In the story, King Sancha and Queen Phutsadi, Wetsandorn's father and mother, invited Wetsandorn and his wife Matsi to return to town after they had been sent away. The ghosts of the parade are meant to be following Phra Wetsandon back to the town.

Characteristic of Phi Ta Khon festival, participants wear costumes made of rags and colorful scraps of clothing.

They hang tin cans and a makka-lang around their necks or waists to create rattling sounds when they move and dance. A mak*ka-lang* is a traditional wooden bell worn around the neck of cattle and buffaloes, which creates a tinkling sound, enabling their owners to keep track of them.

Some of the Phi Ta Khon figures carry symbolic weapons made from soft reeds with a splash of red paint on the tip. The figures carrying these phallusshaped objects often interact with the crowd who are highly amused by their antics.

The traditional merit ceremony of Phi Ta Khon has been passed on from generation to generation.



Phi Ta Khon is part of Bun Luang festival, which is the most important celebration of the year, to the people of Udon Thani. The people of Dansai have combined two festivals, Bun Phra Wet - the festival of the fourth lunar month, and Bun Bang Fai - the festival of the sixth lunar month, commonly known as the bamboo rocket festival.

Bun Phra Wet is a religious ceremony where local people congregate to listen to as many as thirteen continuous Buddhist sermons. It is believed that participants will "make merit" and be brought closer to meeting lord Si-Ariya, the next lord after lord Buddha, in their next life. Bun Bang Fai festival is held to worship spirits, the protectors of the village, and to ask for sufficient rain to arrive in time for the coming season.

This year the festival was held from June 22 - 24.

The procession started with traditional Thai dancing from Loei students, followed by various parades, consisting of many people disguised to be Phi Ta Khon. Most participants were students, walking alongside vehicles beautified in traditional Thai styles. More than a thousand people participated in the procession.

Hundreds of photographers and cameramen, both amateurs and professionals, hurried about taking photos, while groups of people alongside the road stood admiring the delightful procession.

Even though it was not well organized, those who attended were filled with joy to see the cheerful parade.


Cheap products from the festival were available for purchase along the road, including clothing, food and souvenirs.

The long and splendid procession moved slowly to Wat Phon Chai (Phon Chai Temple) where the Phi Ta Khon museum is located. There a film was shown explaining the history of the Phi Ta Khon ceremony, and one expert demonstrated how to make a Phi Ta Khon mask.


According to the Loei Provincial office of Tourism and Sport, last year 45,000 tourists, including foreigners, joined in the Phi Ta Khon festival. Annually, it brings more than 23 billion baht in revenue to the province. This year, 30,000 tourists spent approximately 21.6 million baht.

It took around three hours for us to reach the Udon Thani Airport and fly back to Phuket.

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Art Dinners designed to expose local artists

MICHAEL Earle is an architect and local magazine publisher with a mission to expose and support Phuket's local artists.

"I moved to the island three years ago after working as an architect in Spain for many years. I immediately noticed a great number of interesting art galleries operated mainly by local Thai artists in Phuket Town. They were

not getting much exposure or recognition for their work from the international community."

While wanting to actively support this local art community, Michael, with his partner, Trisha Miller, decided to first launch an

international-style art magazine, now known as Think Design. Their first issue appeared in January,

He has been very busy these past two years promoting his upscale magazine to an island not generally known for sensitivity to a beautiful or interesting environment. He hopes to change that by supporting intelligent and ecofriendly design.

He writes most of the articles in Think Design based on research and his vast knowledge of the history of art and design and has

> never lost his interest in the Thai art community. Last December, he produced one of Phuket's largest art festivals at the Royal Phuket Marina, which was a showcase mainly of local painters with some interna-

tional artists represented.

"It then occurred to me that we could produce art dinners on a regular basis promoting one Thai artist at a time. This would be a great way to expose the local talents and provide an entertaining evening for those who care about painting. The objective of these art dinners is to encourage artistic cross pollination of art through different mediums."

He began to produce these art dinners earlier this year at such prestigious locations as Andara, Centara Grand, Le Meridien Phuket and at upscale beach clubs as Up at Nai

His formula for the evening is quite unique. He chooses a local artist that he believes deserves the exposure and then chooses six of their paintings. Then he gives them to the Executive Chef at the venue who visualizes and designs an artistic six course gourmet dinner inspired by each painting. The meals are joined with wines to match.

Before each course, a painting is presented and Michael describes the techniques and the influences drawing upon his vast knowledge of art. Then the chef describes how the painting influenced his choice of each entrée by ingredients, shape and color. It makes for a stimulating environment where what the eyes see and what the tastes experience are meant to combine for an extraordinary marriage of arts.

Last week, the Think Design Art Dinner was held at the Kata Beach Resort, featuring painter Inthira Plangklang, who has a studio at Surin Beach. Inthira has been painting for more than 10 years, working at learning her craft with other painters as well as some university training. She is drawn to abstract paintings, but ones with a meaning.

"I wanted to paint about my feelings about the flooding in Bangkok, so I read the media and government reports and then made a painting to express my sadness about the effects of the floods on the local people. First I covered the canvas in gold leaf and then wrote about the floods in Thai language. I then used rather dark, basic colors to cover both the gold leaf and the words."

To match her painting, Executive Chef Soonthorn Ratchpol created a dish he named Oyster

The painting entitled 'Bangkok Floods' was paired with this oyster tower.

Tower, which reflected her use of gold leaf and used a marine theme.

Italian Chef Massimo Marcato, who is part of Chef Soonthorn's team at Kata Beach, provided half of the menu's cuisine including the dessert finalé named The Balance which imitated Inthira's painting of swirling figures and bright colors.

The six paintings ranged from softly muted meditations on loss to celebrations of Thai culture with the references to rice fields and elephants culminating in a six -


panel explosion of dancing redand-orange design motifs cut through by a stripe of gold leaf.

The cuisine produced at Kata Beach Resort, hosted by General Manager Andrew Sawatpakdi, was equally exciting with courses such as the Naked Prawn, the Flooding Scallop and a Lobsterlamb duo accented with a tomato reduction.

SATURDAY is usually a fun day for everyone. It is the beginning of the weekend and most people are looking forward to spending time doing what they want and being with the ones they love.

Saturday, June 30 was an especially happy day for students of the Head Start International School (HSIS). It wasn't just a regular Saturday but the day when students could celebrate the end of the school year and the beginning of their summer break.

Each year, HSIS holds a special event to mark the last day of a long and hard year of school.

Today is the end of year performance for our foundation. students performing are in kindergarten and primary school. It's a nice way to end the school year. It's a great opportunity for students to take some time to perform for their parents," said Head Start International School Director Jazon Edouard.

"They have been preparing songs, plays, and sketches. Now that examinations are all over, and all the hard work for the year is done, this a nice and pleasant way to end the year. The children have been looking forward to it for a long time," he added.

"They have been preparing for this the whole semester, but most of them go into high-gear when exams are over. For the last two weeks, a lot of classes have been putting on works in the performing arts, including drama," he added.

Mrs Miki Edouard, wife of Head Start International School Director Jazon Edouard, also attended the event to support students, as well as the administrative team of Head Start International School.

"All of the children's performances are the highlight of the day. They will be smiling, singing and dancing. For them it is very special to be on stage with the lights and music," said Mrs

"We don't only pick the gifted students or those who have a special talent for performing to be part of the show. Everybody gets to perform on the stage equally. I think it is very good experience for them to learn to be in front of a crowd," she added.

Head Start International School was founded in 2005. The school is a unique educational institution in that it provides well-rounded learning from pre-school through to the secondary level.

"Our school started right here in Phuket, and our target from day one has always been to provide quality international edu-

cation at affordable prices in a setting, which is ideal for the local community. Sixty per cent of our students are Thai and the rest are foreigners," said Mr Edouard.

"It's very important to us that the education we provide to the children lets Thai children keep their identity as well as their culture," he added.

Besides the year end party, in which students and teachers celebrate together, the school also has one other special reason the celebrate this year. That reason, is the achievement of students who scored well on the Cambridge international standardized test.

"We are the only school on the island to actually use the Cambridge progression examination and check point examination from year 3 all the way through year 12 to test the students," said Mr Edouard.

"Testing is only a small part of their education, and education is not only about papers, textbooks or tests. There is a lot more than that. However, the examination is an important indicator, which helps parents and the school see whether a students' education is on the

right track," he said.

"Nevertheless, standardized testing is an important part of being an international school like we are. We have 364 students from 37 different nations. It is essential to have a strong benchmark. That is why we use the Cambridge test. What we saw was a comparison of our school's average result with Cambridge's world wide result, and we have been very pleased with the result," he explained.

"Education is an ongoing process, it never stops. So, our next step is to continue what we are doing. Our team will continue to work hard to make sure that we improve the results of the next examination," he added.

Head Start International School will be the first and only school in Phuket that offers the Cambridge curriculum to students.

"We are going to start the 'A Level Program'. We will be the only school on the island that offers that program. It is an after high school certification program, which leads students towards university enrollment. It takes place over their last two years at school: years 12 and 13," said Mr Edouard.

"For the students who've already finished year 11 this year, they will continue on to the A Level next year. Our school is the only school on the island that offer Cambridge curriculum all the way to year 13," he added.

Mr Edouard emphasized that the school doesn't just focus on academics, students are also encouraged to have fun as part of their learning process.

"We have a very good team here, who work very hard at their job. The performances aimed to show that the children are not only working hard learning, but are also having a good time," Mr Edouard concluded.







Indo jet crash shines light on Russian record

THE mysterious crash of a Russian-built Sukhoi Superjet 100 into an Indonesian mountain in early May not only spoiled President Vladimir Putin's election celebration party, it also has implications for Phuket – although there is certainly no need to panic.

The Sukhoi Superjet 100 crashed on a demonstration flight in Indonesia, one of the few countries outside of Russia, Cuba, Iran and parts of Africa to express interest in buying it.

While Myanmar, Pakistan and Kazakhstan were also on its visiting schedule, Thailand was not. Thai Airways International, for example, has expressed no interest in buying any Russian-made aircraft.

However, there is a Phuket connection through Orient Thai Airlines, which in 2010 signed a memorandum of understanding to buy 12 Sukhoi Superjet 100-95s to replace its aging McDonnell Douglas MD-80s and four Boeing 747s. Delivery was set for 2011-2014. Orient Thai Airlines regularly flies to Phuket.

The airline certainly needs a replacement for the MD-80s. The average age of the six aircraft in its fleet is 23.7 years, ranking 52nd in the world of 74 airlines still operating this type of aircraft. The new (introduced for commercial use in April, 2011) relatively cheap (USD35 million) Sukhoi air-



craft, looks to be an ideal fit for Orient Thai's network.

The Superjet 100 is highly unlikely to fly long haul from Russia to Phuket. It is a single aisle, up to 95 passenger aircraft, with a maximum range of 4620 kilometres. The distance between Moscow and Phuket is 7488 kilometres (4653 miles). But it would be an ideal fit for an airline servicing domestic Thailand and regional routes.

However, with Russian tourism in Phuket increasing by 57 per cent, to 1,014,000 persons in 2011, up to fourth place from eighth in 2010 (Malaysia, China and Japan are ahead of Russia), driven by continued increases in air traffic between Russia and Thailand, the types of aircraft Russian airlines are using becomes of some interest given the somewhat chequered history of Russian aviation.

The two Russian carriers flying to the island, Aeroflot (via Bangkok) and Transaero (direct) use mainly Airbus and Boeing aircraft in their fleets.

Transaero has no Sukhois in its 82 aircraft fleet. Aeroflot has been receiving the Superjet 100 since 2011 and aims to acquire a total of 126 Russian-built aircraft of various types through 2020.

In fact, Sukhoi is best known as a military aircraft manufacturer. In 2005 it was reported in Russian media that Thailand was to buy 12, two-seat, Sukhoi SU-30MK fighter jets – but this deal never seemed to materialize.

The Sukhoi Superjet 100 is intended to replace the aging Tupolev Tu134 and Yakovlev Yak-42, two Russian built short and medium range aircraft. Its main competitors are the Brazilian built Embraer E-Jet and the Canadian Bombardier CRJ. Sukhoi claims the purchase price and operating costs of the Superjet 100 are considerably lower than its competitors.

At last count, there were 122 Sukhoi Superjet 100s on order, 30 of them to Aeroflot and the rest to small airlines servicing Russian and nearby state destinations. No aircraft had been sold to any major Western airline.

Unfortunately for Sukhoi, it will now have more difficulty in marketing the Superjet 100 outside of Russia until the cause of the fatal crash is determined. Of note, however, is that Pakistan's Indus Air allegedly showed an interest in purchasing eight of the aircraft, the day after the Indonesian crash.

The other types of Russian aircraft are the Illyushin, a turbo prop

designed for shorter local routes and the Tupolev-Tu 334, a medium range aircraft. They could not be used on a long haul route, such as between Moscow and Phuket.

For the Russian airline industry, which has struggled to make an impact internationally, the Indonesian crash merely underlines a history of fatal crashes involving Russian-built aircraft dating

back to 1990.

The vast majority of aircraft involved were Tupolevs of various designs and virtually all the crashes were within Russia or nearby states.

The Indonesian crash only occurred there because the Sukhoi Superjet 100 was on a demonstration flight to try and increase its international sales.

Thai Smile's new Airbus takes off

THAI Smile, the new brand airline under Thai Airways International, has taken delivery of its first A320-200. The new jet will serve the airlines' Bangkok-Macau route from this Saturday.

Thai Smile plans to have 11 aircraft in its fleet by next year and increase this number to 20 by 2015. By the end of this year, three new A320-200 jets will be delivered.

The new airline, which will still fly under the TG banner, was set up to respond to changes in the regional airline industry that will be caused by the launch of the Asean Economic Community in 2015.

Thai Smile will concentrate on some domestic routes and key cities within a three-hour flight time of Suvarnabhumi Airport. The airline will focus on new travelers, especially younger people, tourists, businesspeople and government officials.

With ticket prices 10-15 per cent lower than THAI's, its advantage over rivals, especially low-cost airlines, is that passengers can collect air miles under the same system as THAI.

Thai Smile plans to offer passengers "a trendy, friendly, and worthy service," managing director, Woranate Laprabang, said.

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Boorman bores right to the end

I HAVE recently read and reviewed three rather grim novels and I needed a break, so I turned to my old faithfully funny friend Charley Boorman.

Back in 2004, Charley and actor Ewan McGregor rode 750cc BMW motorcycles for 20,000 miles from London to New York, via Russia and Alaska, and made a BBC documentary and book called Long Way Around. They followed this with Long Way Down from Australia mainly by motorcycle – to Scotland

Capetown. A year later, Charley took off on his own from Ireland to Sydney. using a widely mixed bag of local transportation in By Any Means.

Now Charley appears on a small appendix of a puddle-hop journey from

Sydney to Tokyo. It is, perhaps, a journey too far.

In Right to the Edge (Sphere, London, 2010, 317pp), you get the feeling that there was no compelling reason to make this journey, except for money.

Charley is his usual lovable self, a shambling figure in paunchy tshirt, cargo shorts, long matted hair, scraggly goatee and a devilish gleam in his blue eyes. He is always full of enthusiasm, his two main expressions being "Amazing!" and "Incredible!"

But you can become bored with an endless litany of them

BMWs, Triumphs and Kawasakis interrupted by plane journeys in a Spitfire and a Cessna outback cattle stations, a snake farm, and remote northern islands.

At the snake farm, a grizzled keeper tosses a highly poisonous snake at him. The

snake hits him in the chest, as Charley nearly dies of fright, then falls to the floor, motionless, made of rubber.

A boat trip to Papua New Guinea falls through, as do nearly all their boat trips, so Charley and his camera crew fly to Papua New Guinea. The motorcycling is magnificent.

"The country was stunning like the highlands in Ethiopia, only this was rainforest with water tumbling in runaway rivers and palm trees soaked by torrents that came down so hard whole tracts of land had been

washed away. The mountain tops lay hidden in mist."

Here they face what had never happened to them in all their journeys through Africa and Asia: the threat of violence.

Charley is in a caravan of offroad Yamahas, bashing through jungle-covered mountains, when they are stopped by a barricade and a machete-wielding gang demanded US\$150 for passage. Suddenly there's a lot of angry shouting.

"For a moment I wondered if it would all kick off. These guys had weapons, but in our body armour and helmets we looked like a bunch of stormtroopers from Star Wars.'


The thugs back off. Days later, they are stalled at a flooded river crossing and face a nighttime mob of violent drunks.

Denied entry to Irian Jaya, the Indonesian half of New Guinea, they fly off for more motorcycling – this time aboard 1994 Road King Harley-Davidsons – in Sulawasi.

By the time they fly to the Philippines and link up with another club of Harley-Davidson enthusiasts, Charley's itinerary has pretty much settled into the tourist track.

So it goes through Taiwan. Then he's off on another flight north to Japan. Charley is sobered by visits to Okinawa and Hiroshima but shakes off his thoughts of wartime mayhem by paragliding from the foothills of Mount Fuji.

"Now the adrenaline was

pumping. With the chute inflated, the instructor ran me right to the edge and pushed me off. The next thing I know I was paddling the air with my feet, the exhilaration of take-off stopping the breath in my throat.

I was floating. I was flying. I was an eagle, a hawk, I was a hayabusa – a Japanese falcon – it was fantastic."

This journey often bored me, but it's too early to swear off Charley Boorman.

A prospect is being floated that he will link up with Ewan McGregor again to bike from the southernmost tip to South America to the northernmost tip of Alaska: A Long Way Up.


Music

THE late John Martyn is a musician's musician and his albums often included input from the likes of Phil Collins, David Gilmour and Eric Clapton.

Starting as an acoustic "folkie" the 1960s, his later music included jazz, blues and rock with progressive and even funk elements, while some of his songs in the 1980s veered towards mainstream pop. He died in 2009 leaving behind over 40 years of great music all of which is reflected in Ain't No Saint, a wildly varied, well-packaged 4-CD collection, first released in 2008 to celebrate his 60th birthday.

Much more than a retrospective on John's career this is a high value release for his fans like myself as it is packed with out-takes and previously unavailable live performances. Carefully mixed and mastered by



Paschal Byrne of The Audio Archiving Company, sound quality is simply outstanding.

There are 61 tracks here, including one song from each of his 22 studio albums, along with rarities and out-takes and more than 30 previously unreleased recordings that range from overextended experimental pieces to patches of sheer brilliance.

The set starts with Fairy Tale Lullaby, an almost naive story of pixies and goblins that appeared on his first studio album in 1967, and ends with one of his last performances of Over the Hill (with John Paul Jones of Led Zeppelin joining him on Mandolin) performed at the 2008 BBC Radio 2 Folk awards, where he received a lifetime-achievement award

His output in the intervening years, though erratic, has constantly relied on the strength of his live playing represented here by his workings of favorites such as May You Never, or the rousing I'd Rather Be the Devil from the mid 1970s.

This 312-minute collection was released a year before John Martyn passed away in 2009, but now stands as a testimonial to the musician's great talent. Whether you're a John Martyn connoisseur or not, this release deserves four stars as the definitive Martyn compilation.

Life & style Janpim Aewpoo

A GLEAMING black Mercedes Benz pulls in front of the sales office of Chic Condo in Karon. Janpim Aewpoo, in smart, light gray dress, steps out from the driver's seat and greets me.

Janpim, 36, is one of the island's successful young property developers who's riding the success of the thriving real estate market here.

Back in the 1970s, Janpim's parents had a small construction business in Phuket Town, but she was in no way interested in the world of commerce at a young age. All that changed, when, having finished her high school education, she embarked on a course in finance at a reputable institution in Bangkok.

"I just thought that I might have a better chance of getting a job if I had a degree in finance. During the course, however, I developed a liking for this field. Finance is all about analyzing the present so that you can predict the future, and the whole thing fascinated me. From a girl who was doing so-so in school, I became one of the top students."

Having obtained a degree in finance, Janpim went on to study business administration, adding an MBA to her qualifications. After a few years working as a finance officer for Krung Thai Bank in Bangkok she transferred to Phuket.

While at the bank in Phuket Town, Janpim met a client who would change her life. The



gentleman, who was impressed with Janpim's poise and brains, had two things in mind: to persuade her to work for him and for her to meet and marry his son.

His foresight proved correct, when Janpim eventually met his son Vaiyavit, fell in love, and the couple married in 2006.

It just so happens that Vaiyavit's family runs a successful business, Chalong Concrete, or CLC, that produces construction materials. Now joined by a capable Janpim, forming a formidable team, they've set forth developing various properties in town. Their well-known brands are large modern housing estates like Phuket Topland (two branches) and Tawan Place in Bang Tao.

After much success in these housing projects, the company branched out into developing condominiums, and built Good Condo in the Gugu area, north of Phuket. CLC's latest project, Chic Condo, named by Janpim herself because "it's easy to remember," features smart apartments, complete with modern amenities. The project is currently under construction and is expected to be completed in 2013.

As an astute businesswoman with a sharp analytical mind, Janpen is an important part of the company's success.

"I love the challenge that comes with each project, which are all very different in nature. My father-in-law gives us a location, and we have to work out the form and concept of the property from the ground up. Then comes the planning, marketing and finance. When I worked in finance, it was all about figures. Managing a real business is a whole new game, which has its own contributing factors and problems to solve."

Calling herself a "property lady," Janpim believes the future of Phuket is in high-rise buildings. The business here is lively, she says, with many big players from Bangkok taking part. She also reveals that 98 per cent of her clients are foreigners, with Russian buyers leading the pack.


When asked about environmental concerns, that are an inevitable part of over-development, Janpim admits that there are some foul plays. The existing building regulations, she says, are quite adequate and "it's up to the authorities to take a closer look and exercise tighter control over 'rogue' constructions.

'We still sell, we still make a profit, therefore the property market is still going strong," she says with the confidence of a savvy and fearless entrepreneur.





The Allan Zeman effect: second act



THERE is little doubt that the effect Allan Zeman has had on Phuket remains great bedside reading for the success-oriented – counting multi-million dollar villa sales beats counting sheep any day (or night).

Zeman's play is hard to fault especially when some are wondering if Phuket has lost some of its glittering shine, down on Millionaires Mile.

Andara's second act, the 13 villa ultra estate tagged as Signature, launched some six months ago. Since then, five properties have been sold, and two more are on offer. What's more notable is that pricing remains strong with units ranging from US\$6.6 to 8.2 million.

In a sector which typically sees average monthly take-up rates at .15 to .25 (meaning it takes four to six months to trade just one villa) Andara has again set the gold standard of performance.

Looking at the historical resales of Andara villas over the past two years, there have been five secondary transactions and all traded at well over 100 per cent of the acquisition price. Calculating the cash on cash return on purchase, annual appreciation for total resales is up over 30 per cent. Any investor in today's market who can get that return, please take a place at the front of the line.

I recall, in the early days of the initial project launch, speaking to Allan about his philosophy when developing property and he had the poignant saying "always leave money on the table for the next buyer." That coda has proven successful in retaining clients and keeping forward momentum.

Phuket is a small place and the social circles of high net worth individuals from places like Hong Kong is amazingly small. Whispers about money made or lost can spread like wildfire and the ultimate marketing tools remain word of mouth and satisfied investors.

Added to the mix has been the attached hospitality-led product 'the residences'. Positioned more as an investment return and usage model, there have been two resales within the past year, with gains in double digits.

Bringing in respected hotelier Daniel Meury, after a long stint at the well known Chedi (now Surin), resort turned out to fit like a glove, in terms of the client mix and market experience. Rental pool revenue for the first quarter in 2012 achieved a remarkable growth factor of 50 per cent over the same period last year.

Twinning 'Brand Phuket' and Allan Zeman has proved that the island continues to be a draw card for the rich and famous. High net worth individuals are still in the rink and the mid-term report card on Andara Signature is looking to deliver its promise.

And as for the Hong Kong entrepreneur's commitment to the local real estate trade, he's opting to build up the project irrespective of sales, with a timeline of 24-30 months to completion. One can only wonder what will be the next Andara-inspired project in Phuket?

Another golden boy facing the elements

"HELIOTROPISM" – now there's a word to conjure with, but what does it mean? Don't use big words if you don't explain them.

Well, for the uninitiated, heliotropism is a plant's diurnal motion, its capacity to slowly and imperceptably turn towards the sun. (*Helios* is the Greek sun god, *trope* means turn in Greek).

By doing this, a plant derives maximum benefit from the sun's beneficent rays. There is even a cool-climate plant called the heliotrope, so named on account of its capacity to pivot both flowers and leaves towards the light over the course of a single day.



Of course, some plants detest sunshine and do their very best to avoid it. If these shade lovers are over-exposed, they will, like fairskinned people, literally get sun burnt. The result: scorched foliage and dried-out leaves.

But most plants in the tropics revel in the endless sunshine. One such plant is the sunflower (helianthus annuus). It is associated with the sun for a range of reasons. First, its name.

Second, its appearance. With its huge deep orange flower heads and flame-shaped yellow petals – yes, it's another golden boy – the flaming *helianthus* is so akin to a floral sun that it was used by the Mexican Aztecs as an emblem of their solar deity.

More recently, it has been celebrated in a still-life painting by Van Gogh, and a poem by William Blake. Third and last, the sunflower is – and here's that word again – heliotropic. Its leaves and buds turn from east to west in order to follow the sun's motion across the sky, and thereby promote the life-enhancing business of photosynthesis.

As the botanical epithet (annuus) implies, the helianthus is an annual – but what an annual. It will, given fertile soil and plenty of sunshine, grow to two or even three meters in a single year.

The flat, heavy blooms, in reality a mass of tiny, densely packed flowerets fringed by golden yellow petals, are huge – up to a foot in diameter. Since it grows tall and straight, it is an ideal plant to command the back of a herbaceous border, or stand in serried ranks at the front of a garden wall.

Just remember that it is, in common with all fast-growing plants, a voracious feeder and will need plenty of phosphate-rich fertilizer and regular watering to give its brilliant best. And at its very best, it has been known to reach eight meters in height – a giant among annuals.

Moreover, the sunflower is not only beautiful but exceedingly useful. You may have seen a field

of sunflowers – a sight to behold here in Phuket. For, the *helianthus* is not only planted in local gardens for its massive visual impact, but is also cultivated for its seeds.

The flower heads – which quickly turn to seed – produce an oil, particularly rich in unsaturated fats, which, together with soy and palm oil, is used worldwide as an ingredient in cooking.

The seeds are also made into a bread that is popular in Germany

and, as Thais well know, they make a delicious and nutritious snack. Little is thrown away: even the leaves and discarded flower heads are used as cattle feed.

That's the beauty of plants: they can be life-enhancing, gorgeous, and utilitarian – all at the same time.

Tip of the week



Pot luck

GROWING your very own plants in pots, gives you the benefit of eating ultra-fresh vegetables untainted by contact with pesticides.

Herbs such as basil, chives, spring onions and mint, are always a good option, but you can also try

more substantial vegetables. Chinese kale (*kai-lang*), *pak choi* and some varieties of lettuce should be okay, even some varieties of aubergine (eggplant) or okra.

Use a potting mix that is not composed solely of commercial compost. This has little nutritional value and should be supplemented by decent top-soil.

Plant your veggies in containers with drainage holes (those for water plants have none) and remember to water regularly, if not excessively. If you are growing from seed, you can find packets in supermarkets or, even better, at the shop that specializes in fertilizer on Thepkasattri road, south of Super-Cheap.



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


















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

VETTEL knows how to celebrate victory, but he is a bad loser. After the race at Valencia, he said the safety car which took away his lead was not needed. Vettel (and Grosjean) retired because the Renault alternator failed. Renault has no answer yet as to why they failed, but the two cars had different faults. Unless the alternators failed because of their time behind the safety car, Vettel has little cause to whinge.

Vettel's comments were exacerbated by Helmut Marko who said "Vettel was too far ahead and so the field was brought back together." This hints at Red Bull feeling that they are the paddock's target.

Who is Helmut Marko? Since 2005 he has been advisor to the Red Bull Racing F1 Team. From 1999 he has overseen the Red Bull driver development programme, which inter alia nurtured Sebastian Vettel. He is a doctor of law who owns two Austrian Hotels.

Gerhard Gribkowsky is the Ger-

man banker who took bribes from Bernie Ecclestone in connection with BayernLB's 2006 sale of F1 shares to private equity.

Gribkowsky says Bernie bribed him, and Bernie says Gribkowsky blackmailed him. This has led to a review of Bernie's affairs both by Her Majesty's Revenue & Customs and The Serious Fraud Office. The private equity firm has been reducing its F1 interest, and may itself have a case to bring. F1 requires Sponsors, Governments, Fans, Teams and Circuits. A corruption scandal could scupper sponsorship deals, with sponsors already suffering in the global economy. It could also endanger government subsidies if it becomes a national Cause Célèbre.

The 2013 Concorde Agreement is a contract between the Fédération Internationale de l'Automobile (FIA), the Formula One Teams and the Formula One Administration. It agrees the terms by which teams compete and share television revenues and prize

In 2004, Bernie offered £260,000,000 over three years in return for unanimous renewal of the then current Concorde Agreement.

After many negotiations all the teams agreed until December 31, 2012. But it is now urgent to conclude a new agreement.

So a strong captain is needed, and while other names have been

touted, no-one has emerged to take-over Bernie's role.

AF: I go and hang out with my surfing buddies at world famous surf breaks like 'Uluwatu' and 'Chengu' in Bali, 'Macaroni's', in the Mentawais Islands off the coast of Sumatra, 'Cimaja' in West Java and 'Cloud 9' in the Philippines.

PG: Tell us a little about what it's like to be on tour.

AF: "It's really good fun, I get to travel with my dad, surf these incredible waves, and during competitions there are only four girls on the wave, so it's heaps better than free surfing.

PG: How do you keep up with your homework?

AF: I take some class notes with me, but it's pretty hard to concentrate on maths when the waves are pumping and the sun is going down, and to be totally hon-

est with you, my dad's a bit of a pushover, so mostly I just catch up with schoolwork when I get back. Last year, I had to attend summer school over the holidays and re-sit the exams I missed.

PG: What was the best place you surfed this year?

AF: I'm a goofy foot, so for me – Macaroni's in the Mentawais was definitely the best.

PG: What's a Goofy Footer?

A Goofy Footer is a surfer who puts their right foot forward, so if the wave breaks left, your left foot is back, and your chest faces the wave. This means turns are easier and it's more fun...and Macaronis is a left.

PG: The most beautiful place you've been to?

AF: Cimaja in West Java. It has

PG: What's your routine when you visit a new break?

AF: I watch the water first, look for the currents and rips, where to go out. I talk to everyone, and when I go out into the water, I ride the smaller waves first and then get bigger ones as I get more comfortable. Eventually you get right out the back...and I try not to think too much, just watch the wave and wait 'till a good one comes and I try and catch it.

PG: Do you ask for advice when you're out on the water?

AF: Well, usually people talk about everything. Everyone knows each other so there's a lot of joking around. There's always one surfer, who's a local, who'll be giving everyone advice about where to sit and what to look out for.

PG: We hear that you are doing well on your second year with the ASC tour.

AF: Yes, I'm really stoked, I'm Annissa is the youngest competitor in first. Bonne Gea is right and current leader of the ASC tour.

Two local squads tread Road to El Clasico

A TOTAL of 165 goals were scored in the Phuket playoffs for the "Chang Road to El Clasico", an unprecedented 4-aside national football tournament.

Held at the Phuket Soccer Arena in Phuket Town, the provincial showdown consisted of two divisions - Under 20 and general - each with 16 determined homegrown squads.

With all their heart and passion, players battled through 10-minute matches, keeping their eyes on the ultimate prize: a visit to Spain to watch live one of the oldest and most famous football rivalry matches on the planet: Real Madrid vs Barcelona.

The teams who won their divisions in Phuket will go on to play in a regional final held on July 28 at the soccer field in front of Big C, Surat Thani. The winners of this tournament then go on to national finals in Bangkok, hoping to claim the once in a life time prize.

Representing Phuket for the U-20 category will be The Hulk and in the general category Talad Yai; both teams finished the tournament undefeated to be crowned champions.

over Portrait FC, the pressure will also be on for Talad Yai later this month in Surat Thani.

The two teams from Phuket will face the respective champions from Haad Yai, Nakhon Sri Thammarat and regional hosts, Surat Thani.

The Southern champion from each division will be awarded 15,000 baht in cash, a trophy and one final shot in the national championship against other regional champions on August 5 at Crystal Football Club in Bangkok. The final round will be the last hurdle on the Chang Road to El Clasico.

In addition to round-trip airfare between Thailand and Spain, as well as tickets for the Barcelona vs Real Madrid match – worth an estimated 180,000 baht – the winning team will also be awarded a trophy and 30,000 (U-20) and 40,000 (general) baht in cash.

Runners up will receive a trophy and an appropriate cash prize.

This popular sailor's regatta is unique in that it's only for multihull yachts; crews that normally sail on monohull boats get the chance to try multis – often for the first time.

The event will take place in Chalong Bay, under the auspices of the Ao Chalong Yacht Club (ACYC). The fifth annual Multihull Regatta has 3 new sponsors this year, and consequently, new party venues.

After registration on July 12, racing will be held to a tried and true formula. The event will consist of two races on both Friday and Saturday, with a final race to be held on Sunday. All races to count.

In addition, there are a number of well-sailed Corsairs and other local multihulls who could steal the show – remember what happened at the Bay Regatta!
