Election alcohol bans to hit Patong venues

Mandatory ban on sale of alcohol to cost nightlife industry 5mn baht a night

ENTERTAINMENT businesses in Patong will be subjected to alcohol bans on four nights within nine days at the end of this month in order to comply with election law.

The forced prohibition will cost the industry at least 5 million baht a night, said Patong Entertainment Business Association (PEBA) President Weerawit Kurasombat.

"I know that there will be a big impact on the night entertainment industry, but we understand that elections are also very important," he told the Gazette.

Mr Weerawit was grateful that the elections were being held during Phuket's tourism "low season", reducing the effect the bans will have on establishments' overall annual

"If this happened during the high season, night entertainment venues would suffer twice as much," he said.

However, Mr Weerawit added that so far 2012 was not a good year for the entertainment businesses in Patong.

"This year, we are not doing as well as we did during low season last year, but we are still doing okay. Normally, tourists start to return in large numbers at about the end of November. That is when the tourism industry high season usually starts in Phuket," he said.

Mr Weerawit told the Gazette that he had received no updates from the central government on whether the Thai Cabinet would consider making Patong a Special...

Patong Police escorted Ms Bamford to Phuket Immigration Headquarters in preparation for her return flight. The officer escorting her said Ms Bamford was scheduled to board a flight home with her boyfriend. Ms Bamford was detained at the Baan Bang Jo Detention Center in Thalang for 15 days after confessing to having falsely reported being raped by tuktuk drivers.

Phuket Provincial Prison Chief Rapin Nichanon confirmed to the Gazette that Ms Bamford was released from the Bang Jo Detention Center on July 18, as scheduled, and driven to freedom by a member of the Patong Police.

Loan Shark hunters put 11 in crosshairs

TWO suspected loan shark operations in Phuket were shut down by Crime Suppression Division (CSD) Police on July 19, putting eleven suspects behind bars.

"CSD police searched the two houses because we received reports from locals of loan shark operations running rampant. We also recently heard that a man who vouched for a loan was attacked by a group of loan sharks," explained Col Watcharapol Thongluan.

A Rassada council member on July 17 made a public plea to the police to crack down on loan sharking on the island in the wake of his younger brother's claim of being beaten the previous week by a large group of loan sharks after vouching for an ex-employee.

Police took action, obtaining search warrants on three buildings suspected of housing major loan shark operations: two in Muang district, one in Thalang.

At 8:30am, Col Watcharapol Thongluan led CSD police, Chalong Police and police volunteers in a search of rental house 12/9 on Chao Fa East Road, then moved on to house 11/57 in Moo 8 Pa Khlock, Thalang.

"We could only search two houses because there was nobody in the third house," explained Col Watcharapol.

"The house in Chalong was operating as a loan sharking office, with guards securing the area," Col Watcharapol said.

All eight suspects arrested in the Chalong operation, including one woman, were sent to Chalong Police Station for processing.

Police arrested three men at the house in Pa Khlock.

The suspects were sent to Thalang Police Station.

"We seized a lot of evidence today. Eleven suspects were charged with engaging in business investment transactions for illegal loans with inflated interest rates," Col Watcharapol said

"The groups we arrested today were major loan sharks in Phuket," he added.

Col Watcharapol explained that loan sharking was more serious in Phuket than other provinces in Region 8. He blamed this on the nature of the tourism industry.

"So many operators in Phuket need quick, easy loans," he said.

Loan sharks typically make loans to local vendors at markets, as well as night entertainment workers, he said.

"Many debtors are threatened, attacked and have their property seized. Police have been working on ridding the island of this issue, but it's difficult," he added.

Counterfeit UK banknotes passed along

THE owner of a currency exchange booth in Kata fell victim to a pair of unidentified foreigners that systematically passed off a series of counterfeit British £20 banknotes.

Kanyarat Tiewsakul, 48, who owns the exchange booth and the massage parlor and spa next door, said that twelve counterfeit £20 notes were exchanged by the couple on July 17 and 18 for 11,436 baht.

"A member of my staff told me that a woman came to the booth at about 5pm on July 17 and ex-

changed the British banknotes. Later that day, a man came and also exchanged some UK currency.

Altogether we took eight notes that day," Ms Kanyarat explained.

The next morning the couple allegedly appeared together at the booth and exchanged five more banknotes.

"Only the top banknote was real," said Ms Kanyarat. "The others were fake."

Ms Kanyarat said that her shop was not fitted with CCTV equipment and it was very unlikely that the CCTV system at the hotel across the road had any footage of the front of her shop.

Administrative Zone. Such a move, which has even been publicly supported by Pheu Thai Government Spokesman Prompong Nopparit, could provide a way for authorities to relax the rules in key tourist areas.

Mr Prompong voiced his support for the "Special Admin Zone" initiative while literally standing on Soi Bangla in January in front of a crowd of polite protesters from Patong's nightlife industry. The protesters were calling for extended trading hours within Patong's designated Entertainment Zone".

The sale of alcohol will be banned across Phuket on August 26 and again in Patong on September 2 as voters go to the polls for local elections.

The August 26 island-wide alcohol ban will come into effect as residents vote in the upcoming Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (OrBorJor) council

"It took a while to set the constituency boundaries for this election because of changes in the population [distribution] on Phuket. We had to reset the boundaries for each voting district," Mr Kittipong explained.

"The OrBorJor council election comprises 24 seats to be contested, 15 for Muang District, six for Thalang District and three for Kathu," he added.

One week later, residents in Patong will go to the polls to vote in the upcoming Patong Municipality mayoral election.

Phunsak Naksena, Chief Administrative Officer at Patong Municipality, told the Gazette, "Patong Municipality has set the election date for September 2."

Candidates can register from August 6 to10, from 8:30am to 4:30pm.

The polling stations will be open from 8am to 3pm on election day.

In accordance with the Election Act, the sale of alcohol will be prohibited within the boundaries of Patong Municipality from 6pm on Saturday, September 1, to midnight Sunday, September 2.

Brit, 47, drowns at Patong Beach

AN ENGLISH tourist who ignored warnings not to swim in strong surf at Patong Beach on Tuesday became the latest monsoon-season drowning victim on the island.

Patong Police received a report of the incident at 8:15am.

Pol Sub Lt Thawatchai Srimai told the Gazette that by the time he and his superiors arrived at the scene, it was too late; lifeguards had already pulled the victim's lifeless body from the water.

He was later identified as UK citizen Peter Cook, age 47.

Sakhon Chaithong, chief lifeguard at Patong Beach, told the Gazette that there was no lifeguard on the beach at the time the incident occurred.

The lifeguard arrived on duty at 9am, two hours after a beach vendor tried to warn Mr Cook about the rough seas, said Mr Sakhon.

"The beach vendor said he used a stick to help pull the daughter back to the beach, but could not help the

man," Mr Sakhon explained.

An initial examination gave the cause of death as "respiratory impairment from immersion in water".

It was the third drowning death at Patong Beach since the onset of the monsoon season in May.

No HFMD outbreak in Phuket

DESPITE deadly outbreaks of Hand, Foot and Mouth Disease (HFMD) in the region [see page 9], the situation in Phuket is under control, public health officials say.

Phuket Public Health Office (PPHO) Chief Dr Sak Tanchaikul said on July 25 that more than 10,000 cases of the disease have been reported in Thailand from the beginning of the year to July 22.

PPHO statistics for the same period revealed 246 reported cases in the province, he said.

"The PPHO is focusing its efforts on preventative measures. We met with representatives of kindergarten and primary schools and instructed them to conduct weekly

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Another push for Patong Heading special admin zone status

THE continuing push to designate Phuket's top tourism town of Patong as a "Special Administrative Zone" received much positive support at a public meeting on July 20.

The meeting, held to gather feedback from local residents, was headed by Pridi Chotechuang, Deputy Secretary General of the Political Development Council and fellow PDC member Jinda Boonjun.

The PDC is an independent "think tank" within King Prajadhipok's Institute that conducts academic and field studies to assist in the formulation of government policy.

Also at the event was Preechavude "Prab" Keesin, who heads the Patong branch of the PDC. Mr Prab is also son of Patong Mayor Pian Keesin and head of the Patong Taxi Federation.

"We held the seminar to give Patong residents the opportunity to share and exchange their opinions about Patong possibly being designated a Special Administrative Zone," said Mr Prab.

"Patong faces so many problems because it lacks necessary funding for development projects," he explained.

At previous seminars on the topic, Mr Prab found that the majority of Patong residents believed the change would help Patong's development.

"Patong really should be designated a special administrative zone like Pattaya, since both are major

tourism cities. This would provide the necessary funds for infrastructure and development in Patong,

"Patong would become a modern city and have its own budget to spend on developmental projects, which would directly benefit the city," he added.

The meeting followed a seminar in March held to explain the concept to the public and describe what becoming a Special Administrative Zone would mean.

IN THE wake of several highprofile violent crimes that have rocked Phuket over the past few months, Phuket Police are moving ahead with their plan to set up "safety zones" in key tourist areas, starting with Patong.

Phuket Provincial Police Commander Chonasit Wattanavrangkul delivered the news to more than 800 people from different walks of life in Patong, all gathered at the Phuket Graceland Resort & Spa on July 21. Among those present were representatives from taxi groups, hotel businesses, jet-ski operators and beach umbrella operators.

Joining Maj Gen Chonasit announcing the plan were Patong Mayor Pian Keesin superintendents from every police station in Phuket.

"We are setting up a safety zone in Patong first, and then in Kata-Karon," Gen Chonasit said,

describing safety zones as "zero crime areas".

The general also laid out his sixpoint plan in the fight against street crime: "To ensure tourists are confident they are safe in Phuket, we will 1) set safety zones; 2) be stricter in law enforcement; 3) have more police checkpoints; 4) have more police patrols; 5) use new technology; and 6) work with local people to prevent crimes from happening," he explained.

The Patong Safety Zone will be bordered by north-south roads Thaweewong Road (the beach road) and Phang Muang Sai Kor Road and east-west roads Phra Barami Road and Prachanukhro Road.

A total of 100 officers from the Patong Police, Tourist Police, Marine Police and Patong Municipality will patrol the streets and man checkpoints set up throughout the Safety Zone, Gen Chonasit said.

Twelve officers will patrol six small

zones each shift, meaning that at any time of the day officers will be able to respond to any incident in their patrol area within minutes,

Separate teams of officers will also patrol the three main roads into Patong: from Patong Temple to the Chinese Shrine atop Patong Hill; from the Laem Petch Circle to the Thavorn Beach Villa & Spa in Kalim; and another patrolling Sirirat Road, leading to Karon,

further south.

Checkpoints will be set up in front of Wat Suwankiriwong (Patong Temple), Kalim Junction (Laem Petch Circle) and at the four-way intersection at Sirirat Road.

"Police will also regularly patrol areas where troublemakers, such as youth gangs and known drug offenders, are known to hang out," Gen Chonasit said.

SPOT CHECKS

Anyone stopped by officers on patrol are likely to be subjected to a spot check made possible by two mobile ID card reading devices provided by the Phuket Provincial Office.

"The police will know instantly whether or not the people they are checking are wanted outstanding arrest warrants," said the general.

There are more than 3,000 arrest warrants still outstanding for crimes committed in Phuket, he

explained.

"Most of them are for robberies, but some are for drug crimes and some are for more serious crimes," he said.

'We also expect more machines to be provided to the police in the future," he added.

COMMUNITY

Gen Chonasit rated cooperation with local people and business owners as the most important factor in making the project a success.

He explained that police manpower in Phuket was limited, with one policeman per 7,000

people on the island.

"It's really hard work so police need cooperation from local people," said one officer.

Police plan to regularly communities and discuss problems with local people to try to solve the 7,000 residents, security is problems specific to each community.



to have the system up and running by the end of this month," Patong Police Superintendent Jirapat Phochanaphan told the Gazette.

Once the system is in operation, anyone will be able to log in and view live CCTV footage through their computers, iPads, tablets and even mobile phones.

"People will need to contact Patong Police Station first to set up a log-in account and password, but after that they will be able to monitor the CCTV footage via their phones from anywhere," Gen Chonasit explained.

"We want people to help us prevent crime. It would help us a lot, with many people watching CCTV cameras instead of only two police officers watching the monitors.

'We will ask organizations both private and government – to help fund the the costs of installing CCTV cameras in appropriate places. Business operators such as hotels can help us by installing good-quality CCTV cameras in

front of their hotels so we can running within a week. monitor the roads," he added.

Local Patong businessman Preechavude "Prab" Keesin, who is the son of Patong Mayor Pian Keesin and head of the largest taxi driver association in Patong, said asked operators entertainment venues along Phang Muang Sai Kor Road to install a total of 20 CCTV cameras to set up a network that will cost 400,000 baht in total.

By sharing the cost, the bar owners could afford to set up the system. "Some local business owners helped by donating a few thousand baht each or paying for the installation, which helped reduce the cost for the bar owners," he said.

Using his mobile phone, Mr Prab showed Gen Chonasit live images from the CCTV cameras already installed and working.

Mr Prab explained that all 20 cameras had been installed two weeks earlier, with 12 already streaming live video and the other eight expected to be up and

THE PAYOFF

Gen Chonasit explained plainly that ensuring the personal safety of tourists was a top priority for the government.

"The government plans to boost the number of tourists coming to Thailand with the goal of earning 2 trillion baht in tourism in the year 2015 alone. Phuket made 111 billion baht last year, so Phuket is expected to earn 222bn baht in 2015.

"However, the most important part of this is local people cooperating to provide security to tourists who really need it during their travels," he said.

"The Safety Zones will be in place until 2015. After then, we will follow up and evaluate how effective they have been."

In closing the meeting, Gen Chonasit and Patong Police Superintendent Col Jiraphat each donated 100,000 baht to the

17 murders in the first half of 2012

of 2012 revealed a 70% year-onvear increase in heinous crimes committed in Phuket in the first half of 2012.

Heinous crimes comprise five subcategories: premeditated murder, mugging, gang mugging, kidnapping and arson.

The rise was led by an increase in reports of premeditated murder, of which 17 were reported in the first half of 2012. This number is compared to the 10 incidents over the same period in 2011, an increase of 70%.

There were 14 arrests in the 17 reported cases this year.

Most of the other heinous crimes reported were group muggings, of which there were two arrests in four reported

CRIME statistics for the first half cases. There was also one reported arson attack.

> Crimes against the body, sexual assaults, dropped 8.6%, despite the rise in the murder rate.

> Sixty-nine general assault cases were reported in the first half on 2012, down 2.9%.

> There were 14 also cases of rape or sexual assault, down 22.2%.

Reports of attempted murder were down 80%, with 11 arrests in 15 reported cases.

Crimes against property are up by 19.8%, led by a 25.5% increase in general theft cases. A total of 270 such thefts were reported, resulting in 162 arrests.

Motorbike theft also rose by 12.5% year-on-year, with 24 arrests in 54 reported cases in the first half of 2012.

Half of the respondents who identified themselves as local foreign residents chose harsher

sentencing, making it a clear favorite to any other solution for that demographic. In a similar show of strength for harsher sentencing were tourists, with 42%.

This compared with just 11% of Thai respondents, who saw more police checkpoints (30%) and better lighting on walking streets like Bangla Road (29%) as the preferred options.

While Phuket Police and officialdom continue to push for ever-greater CCTV coverage of "risk areas", only about 15% of readers in all three groups saw this as the most effective approach.

'Pink Panther' sets goals

Re-elected OrBorJor President Paiboon Upatising outlines some term objectives

PHUKET Provincial Administration Organization (OrBorJor) President Paiboon Upatising was re-elected to a second term in early April, after resigning his position to force an early election for the presidency.

Phuket Gazette chief reporter Chaiyot Yongcharoenchai recently met up with President Paiboon to discuss a wide range of issues in the run-up to the election for OrBorJor council seats on September 2.

Phuket Gazette: As OrBorJor President, are you happy with the new Phuket Bus Terminal 2? Does the *OrBorJor* have any plans to take over operation of the terminal?

Paiboon: We are not going to take over the operation of the bus terminal. The Phuket Land Transport Office managed everything on their own from the outset. They bought the land, they constructed the terminal building, and they managed the traffic in that area by themselves, without discussing [their plans] with anyone. So whatever problems they encounter they will have to solve them on their own, before handing it over to us. We are not going to solve problems they created.

However, we have offered them some help by providing a new Po Thong (pink bus) route to shuttle passengers between Bus Terminal 2 and Bus Terminal 1. These buses operate daily from 7am to 8pm.

Is the official English-language name of the new OrBorJor hospital "Phuket Provincial Hospital"?

Could you update us on progress of the facility in building up a client base?

Yes, "Phuket Provincial Hospital" is the official English name of the OrBorJor Hospital. Many foreigners have a hard time pronouncing "OrBorJor" Hospital. Also, the full name "Phuket Provincial Administration Organization Hospital" is too long to remember. Therefore, I think the best name for foreigners to use for the hospital is "Phuket Provincial Hospital".

We have a lot more patients coming in for treatment every day; we now treat 400 to 500 patients daily. With this increase in patients. we are providing more specialists in different medical fields to best meet our patients' needs.

We currently have 129 beds for in-patients. By next year, we will add another 20 beds to support the increase in patient numbers. Our hospital is designed to accommodate up to 200 in-patient beds. We also have a lot more patients enrolled in the government's Social Security program joining, as well as groups of patients who have private coverage by major insurance companies.

Some people have expressed concern that the OrBorJor will cut down virgin forest on Toh Sae Hill in order to improve views from the new recreational sites the OrBorJor has built there. What is the plan?

We want to create more recreational areas for people, giving the

public more options. We want people in all parts of Phuket to have more places to exercise or have a picnic. Since the objective is to make places people will enjoy, I can say that I won't destroy the natural beauty. I will try to develop each area for recreation, with as little impact on the environment as possible.

Most of the people who walk up Toh Sae Hill like it quiet, the way it is now. Is there a plan to restrict traffic after the work is complete: it could be a traffic mess if a lot of people start going up there... will tour vans, buses, and so on be allowed?

Even though we are developing Toh Sae Hill as a brand-new recreation spot, I don't want to overdevelop it. We won't widen the road, but we will pave the existing surface to make it smoother. I don't want big buses or vans to be able to go up there, since we are trying to keep the hill as pristine as possible.

We will also create a jogging track on the road up the hill, so that people who love exercising can use the track [without worrying about vehicles].

What is the status of the projects to create recreational facilities at the Bang Neaw Dum and Bang Wad reservoirs?

These projects are in the design phase, which includes the environmental impact study process. I believe we can push them forward soon.

Are there any other projects you want to introduce to our readers?

I would like to introduce our new "Indoor Sports Complex" project. We are going to renovate the existing building at Saphan Hin to be an indoor sports complex. Once it is completed, Phuket people will have a complete new indoor sports facility to use as a place to exercise.

Our News Editor asked if it would be okay to give you the nickname "The Pink Panther" for fun; are you okay with that?

No problem. You can call me "The Pink Panther".

The OrBorJor could provide 30 million baht a year for new garbage trucks to [haul trash] to the incinerator as the organization has a budget of more than 900 million baht a year," he said.

OrBorJor President Paiboon Upatising said he had yet to receive any such request – and if he did he would flatly reject it.

"The *OrBorJor* can provide advice and suggestions, but funding is not our responsibility," he explained.

Police bank B100,00 PTA reward

THE Phuket Tourist Association (PTA) earlier this week awarded 100,000 baht to provincial and regional police for bringing the killers of Australian travel agent Michelle Smith to justice.

The handover was made at a small ceremony at the PTA office on the bypass road in Rassada on July 17.

PTA Vice President Bhuritt Maswongsa stressed that although the stabbing was an isolated incident, it nevertheless raised serious concerns about the safety of Phuket as a tourist destination.

"It was due to the excellent cooperation among the Phuket Provincial Police and Police Region 8 investigation departments that the suspects were arrested within five days," Mr Bhuritt said.

More than 400,000 Australian tourists visited Phuket in 2011, the vast majority enjoying their stays without incident, he said.

PTA President Somboon Jirayus admitted that intense media coverage of the killing and subsequent investigation in Australia had "put a great deal of pressure" on the Phuket tourism industry and that of Thailand as a whole.

"However, the quick arrests in the incident reduced the pressure a lot. We have received many emails from Australian travel agents asking us to thank the police," he said.

Chalong drug checkpoint rounds up 27 youths

suspected drug users over the evening of July 17 at a checkpoint set up on Soi Nakok in Chalong subdistrict.

Soi Nakok, adjacent to the TOT compound on Chao Fa West Road, is home to the housing estate where drugged-up burglar Kittikhun Wonghajak strangled 17-year-old Sunisa "Nong Som" Saiyoy on July 10.

Suwat Buppapo, chief of the Muang District Security Unit, said that the aim of the checkpoint was to stop and identify drug users "so that they may be given the opportunity to attend a future drug rehabilitation camp".

Official checked urine samples provided by

POLICE and district officials rounded up 27 160 people stopped at the checkpoint. Of the samples taken, 27 turned tell-tale purple, indicating a preliminary positive result for methamphetamine.

> Most of those testing positive were teenagers. Chief Suwat said he wished to make the Nakok area "a drug-free zone".

> "I have received many reports indicating this area has many drug abuse problems."

333 beachgoers rescued in wake of lifeguards return

OFFICIALLY back on the beaches from May 28, after another contract signing saga, Phuket lifeguards saved 333 people in the following 31 days, according to an announcement made by Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (OrBorJor) President Paiboon Upatising on July 18.

"Despite the work of the lifeguards, four people have drowned this year. They drowned because they either ignored the red warning flags or went swimming at night," President Paiboon said.

"I'd like to ask all people and organizations connected with tourism to warn tourists of the potential dangers [on the coastline]. I'd also like for local government officials and beach vendors to coordinate better with lifeguards when it comes to warning tourists.

Under the conditions of the new contract, Phuket Lifeguard Service Co Ltd is able to employ 106 staff, both lifeguards and management, at 33 stations on 13 beaches on the island.

"We have three lifeguards in - *Chutharat Plerin* | each station working from 9am to

7pm watching for swimmers in trouble," said Phuket Lifeguard Service Co Ltd manager Wirote Sawaengphol.

This year, lifeguards have increased the number of red flags that can be flown three-fold.

Red flags, meaning "No Swim-

ming", are placed to inform potential victims that dangerous currents, submerged rocks and other threats lurk offshore. A yellow flag indicates the area is not supervised by lifeguards, so one should swim with caution. Flags which are yellow and red planted in the sand tell swimmers that lifeguards are on duty in the area between the yellow-red flags.

"In both monsoon season and high season, we can't guarantee swimmers' safety," said Mr Wirote.

"Having lifeguards on duty is really the last ditch effort to saving someone's life. We're trying to solve the problem at the wrong end. The best way to warn tourists [and prevent drownings] is through the tour agencies and hotels; they have a closer relationship with the tourists," he said.

Phuket Lifeguard Club President Prathaiyut "Nut" Chuayuan told the Gazette on July 17 that they were now working on the new warning signs to be installed on Phuket beaches.

The signs will carry warnings in 11 languages: Thai, English, Chinese, Japanese, Korean, German, French, Russian, Arabic, Italian and Hindi.

"As soon as we get the wording checked by native speakers of each language the signs will be ready for use. We intend to place the signs next to the red warning flags," he said.

'Mobile Siam' museum in town

SAPHAN Hin in Phuket Town is known to attract all manner of interesting vehicles, but this week marked a first for the park as it hosts the "Muse Mobile", a mobile museum project created by The National Discovery Museum Institute (NDMI).

The free admission event started Thursday and runs to October 31 at Saphan Hin.

The exhibit takes its guests back about 2,000 years, to a time when Thailand was called Suvarnabhumi "The Land of Gold", explained Suppakorn Poonyarith, acting head of the NDMI's Network and Knowledge Development Department.

"The content for the Muse Mobile was drawn from some of the exhibitions currently on display at Museum of Siam in

Bangkok," he said.

In addition to four exhibits, Mr Suppakorn explained there would be interactive activities for guests to learn more about Suvarnabhumi and the ancient forebears of many present-day Thais.

Water: Dam it, store it

THE lack of necessary water storage facilities at hotels and resorts was highlighted as a major contributor to the annual water woes of Phuket during a meeting at the Phuket Provincial Office of Natural Resources and Environment on Monday.

"New hotels are going up, but local administration seems to forget the more buildings, the more water is needed," said Nutthakrit Polpetch, a specialist with the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environment office in Phuket.

Mr Nutthakrit noted that supply shortage had little to do with a lack of water in Phuket, which enjoys over 3,000mm or rainfall annually.

"What I am presently trying to work out with local authorities is how to implement a central policy requiring new hotels to construct their own water storage facilities before they are given a license to operate. If this were so, then residents wouldn't face a water shortage in the dry season," said Mr Nutthakrit

Phuket Vice Governor Sommai Prijasilpa, who chaired the meeting, explained that Israeli Ambassador to Thailand Itzhak Shoham offered help during his June 19 visit to Phuket.

'We discussed Phuket's water shortage issues and he provided me with some information about desalination, turning sea water into fresh water," V/Gov Sommai said.

Mr Nutthakrit also pointed out that reclaiming wastewater could be part of the solution, especially if experts from Prince of Songkla University (PSU) were to help.

"If PSU's research into water management technology leads to a low-cost wastewater management system it would be very

useful," he said.

Pun Thongchumnum, Assistant Dean of PSU's Research and Development Department, said that he and his team were ready to provide support in terms of research and know-how.

"If Phuket needs us for anything, we have the equipment and researchers – we are ready."

Lese majeste case against Thai Kiwi

THE Rak Phuket Club rallied against improper gestures made by a Thai expat in Bangkok last week by filing a letter of complaint to Prime Minister Yingluck Shinawatra and Deputy Prime Minister Chalerm Yubamrung on July 19.

The club has asked for action against the Thai expat, Thitinant Kaewchantranont.

Mrs Thitinant, 63, resides in New Zealand. However, she was in Bangkok on July 13, at which time she allegedly made improper gestures towards an image of HM King Bhumibol Adulyadej.

Original reports of the incident alleged that Mrs Thitinant was mentally unstable. However, her ability to post pictures and other personal information on Facebook is being used to cast doubt on such claims.

Aussie expat found hanged

POLICE on July 23 responded to a report of a suspected suicide at a luxury home in Pa Khlok.

Police were notified of the death by the wife of the victim, 38-yearold Australian Daniel Cruwys.

The late Mr Cruwys was found hanged by the neck from a nylon rope tied to a ceiling fixture in the home's CCTV monitoring room.

A note written to the wife of the deceased indicated that they had a daughter together.

A review of CCTV images showed Mr Cruwys entering the home at about 5pm the previous day and fashioning the noose he used to hang himself.

Ex-cop dies in Phuket hotel

A FORMER police officer from Ranong was found dead in his Phuket Town hotel room on July 18. Police say there were no signs of a struggle and believe the officer died of natural causes.

The late Lt Col Chokchai Charucharee had recently retired from service at Suk Samran Police Station, where he was a deputy superintendent.

Reversal of Patong one-way traffic circuit stalled

THE plan to reverse the direction of one-way traffic flow in Patong, expected to take effect in June, has been delayed as work to complete a new roundabout at the north end of the beach road has fallen behind schedule.

The 4.2-million-baht Laem Petch Circle project was delayed due to the need to remove utility poles in the area. It is now scheduled for completion by August 12, said Phunsak Naksena, Chief Administrative Officer (Palad) at Patong Municipality.

However, it will still be several months after the circle has been completed before the flow of traffic will be reversed. Under the current regimen that went into effect in mid-January 2007, southbound traffic is routed along Rat-U-Thit 200 Pi Road, while northbound traffic travels along Thaweewong Road, better known to many as "the beach road".

Fishermen debate new crab trap regulations

LACK of compliance with a regulation on crab trap design established in late June was a hot topic of debate at a meeting of the Traditional Fishing Preservation Group on July 18.

The group recently filed a complaint with Provincial Hall over lack of compliance with the new regulation, which mandates that the netting of crab traps must allow adequate space for juvenile crabs to escape.

In the end, the group resolved to ensure that the word is spread among all small-scale and coastal fishermen that they must comply with the new rule.

Recently, fisherman working off the Krabi coast were caught using crab traps that did not meet the new regulation. Officers seized the traps and fined seven fishermen 2,500 baht each.

"They usually work at night as they know there are fewer patrols," said Chief Charoen Aomanee of the Krabi Management Center, Andaman Sea Fisheries.

Myanmar president over HFMD outbreak makes historic visit

THEIN SEIN, the president of Myanmar, made an historic first official visit to Thailand earlier this month, holding talks with Prime Minister Yingluck Shinawatra on boosting economic ties between the two neighbors.

The two leaders signed three Memoranda of Understanding (MoU), including one on developing the Dawei Special Economic Zone on Myanmar's west coast.

The three-day trip by the Myanmar leader had been postponed twice. A scheduled visit in May is believed to have been cancelled because opposition leader and democracy icon – Aung San Suu Kyi was also visiting Thailand.

The talks come as Thein Sein's reforms transform the international community's relationship with Myanmar, for many years a pariah state under military rule.

In November 2010, the country held national elections and implemented a new parliamentary system, though critics say the Myanmar constitution still reserves too much power for the military.

Those reforms have led to an easing of sanctions by the West and a flood of investment, with fierce competition to capitalize on the country's potential.

Thai companies are among those aiming to benefit from the new developments.

Chief among those is developer Italthai, which is planning to develop a large deep sea port and industrial complex at Dawei.

Italthai's plans for the US\$8.6

billion Dawei project would include a link to Laem Chabang, port around 80 kilometers from Bangkok, which would join Myanmar's western Thailand's eastern seaboards.

At the press conference after the signing of the Dawei MoU, Mrs Yingluck said Thailand was committed to the project, with both countries seeing mutual benefits of linking the two ports.

In the second MoU, Thailand offered Myanmar assistance in four key areas: human capital; Myanmar's preparation to chair the Association of South East Asian Nations (ASEAN) in 2014; economic reform; and infrastructure development.

Another MoU dealt with the establishment of an "Energy Forum".

The discussion also covered

employment of Myanmar workers in Thailand and drug suppression.

As many as two million Myanmar workers are believed to live in Thailand, many vulnerable to exploitation: most of the ya bah (methamphetamine) in Thailand is smuggled into the country from Myanmar by rebel groups seeking to finance their lifestyles and operations against the Myanmar military.

FEARS are growing over the current hand, foot and mouth disease (HFMD) outbreak in Southeast Asia, though the Thai government continues to insist it has the situation under control.

In particular, the death of a two-and-a-half year-old girl from the disease has prompted concerns that Thailand's outbreak may mirror that of Cambodia, where dozens of children have died in recent weeks.

This year, HFMD has infected more than 13,000 people in Thailand. However, common strains of the disease are not very dangerous.

"What everyone should learn from this case [the 2-year-old girl] is that patients should be brought to doctors before their condition becomes really serious," said Disease Control Department (DCD) director general Dr Pornthep Siriwanarangsan.

Public Health Ministry permanent secretary Dr Paijit Warachit said if parents find their children suffering from high fever and vomiting for two days, they should take them to a doctor as quickly as possible.

Ramadan bomb injures eight

A BOMB blast in Thailand's restive Deep South injured eight people in an attack apparently timed to mark the start of the Muslim holy month of Ramadan.

In the Narathiwat attack, the device, which went off around dawn in Sungai Kolok district on July 20, was concealed in a pickup truck.

The explosion damaged an elecical appliance shop, starting a fire that spread to nearby buildings.

Among those injured were four people trapped on the roof of a burning building.

On July 19, a villager was killed and his companion wounded by a roadside bomb in Yala Province.

The men were hunting squirrels at the time.

Meanwhile, insurgents are plotting more attacks in key areas of Songkhla's Haad Yai and Muang districts, explained Songkhla Governor Krissada Boonraj.

"I have received information from reliable sources," Governor

Krissada said.

He said he had instructed district chiefs to convene meetings of local kamnan and village heads to press for strict monitoring of strangers arriving in their areas.

New guidelines needed for tourism

ONE chronic tourism-related problem that periodically bubbles to the surface of the local media here in Phuket is that of illegal foreign guides conducting tours for fellow countrymen.

While the problem originally centered mainly around illegal Korean guides, its scope has expanded over the past decade with robust growth in the inbound markets from both Russia and China.

The issue was raised once again at a meeting in Phuket earlier this month, when Phanomphon Thammachartniyom, adviser to the Senate Standing Committee on Tourism, said he had been trying to stamp out the problem for more than 10 years, but to no avail.

In response to claims by the Tourist Police that their investigators had been unable to find any evidence of illegal guides working in Phuket, Mr Phanaphon pointed out quite rightly that: "If you spend three days at some of the popular tourist venues, such as Wat Chalong and Laem Phromthep, you would find a hundred of them." As any long-time resident of the island is well aware, Mr Phanomphon is right.

From a broader perspective, the illegal guide problem falls squarely into the wide range of "illegal-yet-common" practices in Phuket that can only continue if law enforcement officials are either too lazy to take action, or are "actively encouraged" to look the other way.

While a payoff here and a payoff there might seem innocuous enough, especially to those on the receiving end, the cumulative effect of this "culture of corruption" manifests itself as a cancerous growth on our society. Even the environment that sustains us all is at risk, as clearly demonstrated by the vast plunder of our forest reserves at the hands of rich "investors" and the officials whose palms they grease in order to steal these reserves from future generations.

While Thai labor law is notoriously vague in defining what actually constitutes "work", it is nevertheless quite specific about the circumstances under which foreigners can be issued work permits. Chief among these is "when qualified Thais cannot be found" to perform such work.

The lack of Thai guides with the mastery of Korean, Chinese and Russian languages is clearly demonstrated by the number of illegal guides from these countries in Phuket. But despite this, the "tour guide" profession remains one of the many reserved for Thais under current law.

We suggest that the government consider changing this law to allow qualified foreign guides from these countries – those who have sufficient knowledge of Thai history and culture – to be issued work permits. These guides could then join the ranks of law-abiding, tax-paying foreigners who have done so much to help develop the Thai tourism industry over the years – rather than serving to further enrich corrupt or lazy officials.

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
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Beach trash hits high-tide mark

Community safety on the home front

LOCAL people need to play a significant roll in the safety and security of the people who live in their neighborhoods and I believe that Village Security Volunteers are better at preventing crime than CCTV cameras. I really believe that manpower can't go wrong in the same way technology can.

As soon as we have our target number of volunteers for a village, we can ensure the security of that

The Village Security Volunteers, also known as the *ChorLorBor*, is a group of people from each village who are willing to volunteer and safeguard their own community. Although they are not government officers, ChorLorBor volunteers work under the Ministry of Interior's Department of Provincial Administration.

The framework of the Village Security Volunteers is a very similar to the Civil Defense Volunteers, except that we get absolutely nothing material in return for our services: no monthly compensation or any other special privileges.

When people become volunteers, they become the eyes and ears of the community. However, many people are still too busy with their personal lives. I think people began to realize how important the volunteers are after the tragic killing of Nong Som [the 17-year-old girl murdered in her home in Chalong on July 10].



Chalong Tambon Chief (Kamnan) Charoen Tawabutta. 58. has worked with local administrations for more than 20 years. As Kamnan, he is by law the head of the Village Security Volunteer team in his ambit.

Here, he explains the importance of community members becoming a part of the Village Security Volunteer team to protect their communities and ensure the safety of loved ones.

Chalong at the moment. Our goal is to get 10 volunteers from each village. Chalong has 10 villages, which means we need at least 100 people to help us protect the com-

There are also Village Security Volunteers in other areas of Phuket, such as Rassada, but they have a different a setup. Their main responsibility is to guard Bus Terminal 2. They work full time and are paid monthly compensation from the Rassada Municipality.

In Chalong, we all have day jobs and then patrol the village at night, or help police set up checkpoints to search for drugs.

It's important for members of our team to be close to the community and they must be respected by the people in their neighborhoods. I ensure this by meeting potential volunteers – I'm really the first step of the screening process. I select only people who I know can be trusted.

I'm hoping we can get a bigger budget from the Chalong We have about 20 volunteers in Municipality, so we can get more people to join our team. Foreigners can even volunteer, but of course we prefer people who speak Thai fluently.

Though we can't provide financial compensation to our team, we try to help cover the costs of gasoline for night patrols. Sometimes we are even able to provide a little money for a meal while on duty, a flashlight to use, a uniform or even a weapon, such as a gun.

Unlike Civil Defense Volunteers, ChorLorBor volunteers are allowed to carry weapons and we receive basic training from the police on how to handle situations. But the most important part about being a Village Security Volunteer is to work closely with the community to ensure the safety and security of the village, especially their loved ones.

Having them as part of the community offers everyone greater peace of mind.

No matter how rich or poor you are, a safe and secure environment is the most important factor in making a place feel like home.

Eventually we'll all pay the price

RECENT headlines about encroachment on Phuket's national parks has caused me to reflect a little on the last time I visited a national park in Phuket. I believe it was when I had to visit someone who lived near the Gibbon Rehabilitation Center and was stopped on the main road near the Bang Pae Waterfall.

Thai dual nationality

Does Thailand allow its citizens to have dual nationality?

For instance, can a Thai national keep her Thai citizenship and acquire a foreign one?

If so, can that person then have two passports?

Worrawan Pakamas, Phuket **Passport Officer responsible for** checking nationality and identity, replies:

Yes, Thai citizens are allowed

to have dual nationality and own two passports.

If you are born in Thailand and have at least one Thai parent, you automatically have Thai nationality and can apply for a Thai passport.

However, if you are only half-Thai and were born and raised abroad, and do not have Thai nationality, you can still apply for a Thai passport. You must first contact the District Office that your Thai parent is registered at and have your name added to the Thai House Registration list.

Lt Col Napat Nusen, Head Supervisor of the Phuket **Immigration office, replies:**

Although you are allowed to own two passports, you must leave Thailand on the same passport you used to enter The Kingdom.

New trade surplus high

Import – Export

THREE-QUARTERS of the way into the government's current fiscal year, international trade in Phuket is thriving, with this year's trade surplus already surpassing last year's record high.

Phuket Customs House' records through June 30 show that the value of exports in the 2012 government fiscal year (October 1, 2011 to September 30, 2012) is now at 12.06 billion baht – just 440 million baht shy of the previous year's total.

Meanwhile, the combined value of imports is up to 1.67bn baht, compared to last year's full-year total of 2.12bn baht.


With three months still to go before the fiscal books are finalized, the island's trade surplus of exports over imports – 10.39bn baht – has already notched past last year's full-year figure of 10.38bn baht.

Indeed, the prospects for another record breaking year in trade in Phuket is looking bright, with the total value of trade - the sum of exports and imports now clearing 13.7bn baht, and looking likely to surmount last year's full-year figure of 14.6bn baht.

To nobody's surprise, the island's top export this year, by far, has been block rubber, with exports of the commodity currently valued at 8.6bn baht.

This is followed by rubber fiberboard (2.03bn baht), motorboats and related components (1.1bn baht), live sea fish (103mn baht) and frozen sea fish (87mn baht).

Topping the list of the island's imports, by value, is cargo vessels, worth a total of 545mn baht. This is followed by chilled sea fish (466mn baht), sports and leisure vessels (443mn baht), frozen sea fish (149mn baht) and boiler components (40mn baht).



PROSPEROUS: This year's trade surplus reached a new high, with still three months left in the fiscal year.


As for export receipts, Customs reported collecting 1,071 bills of lading (b/l) so far this year -97% of last year's full-year figure of 1,101.

In contrast, a total of 737 b/l were collected on imports, about 85% of the 863 b/l collected last year.

Revenue collected by Customs from trade so far this year is just over 36mn baht.

This comes from 26.2mn baht in Value Added Tax (72%), 7mn baht from Customs fees (19.4%) and 2.96mn baht (8.1%) from Import duties.

FDI jumps 66 % in first six months

THAILAND'S Board of Investment (BOI) has reported that the value of Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) projects registered for investment promotion during the first six months of this year, was just under 280 billion baht.

Secretary-General of the BOI Atchaka Siboonruang disclosed that during the first half of this year, there were a total of 692 FDI projects worth 278bn baht, requesting investment promotion privileges.

Both the number and the value of the projects increased, respectively, by 32.6 and 66.5% from the same period last year, when there were 522 projects worth 167bn baht.

The industry that attracted the most investors is machinery and metal products, with 240 projects worth 109bn baht.

The electronics and electrical appliance industry came in 2nd, accounting for 134 projects

worth nearly 60bn baht.

This was followed by services and public utilities with 130 projects, and the chemicals, paper, and plastics sector, which had a total of 97 projects.

Ms Atchaka expressed confidence that Thailand will be able to emerge as the investment hub of Asean.

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THE Commerce Ministry (MoC) is planning to inspect foreign

shareholding in Thailand by Director-General of the Depart-

ment of Business Development (DBD) Banyong Limprayoonwong, said that the Commerce Ministry has been drafting a set of regulations on the management and inspection of foreign shareholding in Thai companies.

The move is part of a bid by the MoC to more strongly enforce the Alien Business Law of Thailand.

Shareholding

Mr Banyong conceded that the MoC's probe into suspicious foreign shareholdings has been limited and lacked depth.

Such flaws have made it less effective to take legal actions against those who have broken the laws, said the DBD Director-General.

He added that the DBD is set to make the term "Nominee" more definite and clarified, and look

more thoroughly at the amount of shares held, the influence of foreign shareholders and other policies of the company.

According to Mr Banyong, there are more than 27,000 companies in Thailand with foreign shareholdings, all of which will be scrutinized by the DBD and MoC.

He stated that any company found to be in violation of the laws will face further investigation by the Department of Special Investigation.

Meat suppliers clear inspection

OFFICIALS last week conducted a random, cleanliness inspection tour of some of the island's leading frozen food retailers, concluding that most of their targets were up to standard.

The inspections were aimed at checking quality and hygienic standards for frozen food products including beef, pork, duck and chicken.

Leading the inspection team were Phuket Vice Governor Somkiet Sangkaosuttirak, Phuket Livestock Chief Weerasit Phutthipairote, who were accompanied by a number of officers from

the Phuket Office of Public Health, as well as representatives from Phuket City Municipality Office.

The stores inspected were: Saha Farm Store in the Talad Nua market, Betagro company, Makro, Big C Supercenter on the Bypass road and Tesco Lotus hypermarket in Kathu.

The main purpose of the inspection was to check whether the operators were following the rules and regulations as set by the Livestock Office regarding quality control of frozen meat.

Some of the things looked at were the appropriateness of the storage areas, temperature control, and the level of hygiene and sanitation at the factories where the meat came from.

A secondary purpose of the inspections was to boost confidence among consumers in the quality of frozen meat being sold on the island.

Following the inspection, Vice Governor Somkiet Sangkaosuttirak told the press: "We randomly inspected the market places that sell frozen food products to ensure that all stores follow the requirements on hygiene and food quality.

"We focused on the overall

environment of the market place, temperature used for the frozen meat and fresh meat and hygiene of the personnel who work at the stores," said Mr Somkiet.

"We found that most of stores we inspected had followed the rules and regulations required by the Livestock Office.

"Some stores have some problems with their license and cleanliness. Some stores don't provide enough sinks for people who work there or customers to wash their hands," he explained.

"Phuket Livestock Office will continue to inspect all stores in Phuket randomly without giving advance notice. This is so that tourists and residences can be assured that the food they are consuming is clean and safe," he concluded.

Shrimp price stabilization a success

THE Ministry of Agriculture and Cooperatives has declared the "Shrimp Price Stabilization" project a success so far, with nearly 9,000 tons of shrimps sold in the first month of the program.

Minister of Agriculture and Cooperatives Theera Wongsamut disclosed that the Fisheries Department has been instructed to put the "Shrimp Price Stabilization" project on a trial basis for three months. The first month program was a success, with the Fisheries Department acting as mediator between farmers and cold storage firms.

Over 8,800 tons of shrimp are on the trading agreement, of which 6,000 will be shipped to the South and 2,000 to the East.

The program encompasses traders in 18

provinces, and currently there are 886 shrimp farmers taking part in the program.

Meanwhile, Wimol Jantrarotai, Director-General of the Department of Fisheries said that the price of shrimp in the market has moved up 5 baht per kilogram since the beginning of July, and is expected to rise further by the end of July. The expected rise was cited to the increasing demand of shrimps in foreign markets during Christmas time.

As a result of its initial success, the program will be extended by one more month, effective from July 19, after which an extension will be considered on a monthly basis until the shrimp price recovers.

Bangkok top tourist city in Asia, again

GOOD news for the Phuket tourism industry comes from a recently-released report by MasterCard that has Bangkok nestled into 3rd place on the credit card giant's list of major cities with the most tourist arrivals.

The MasterCard Global Destination Cities Index report by economist Yuwa Hedrickarrivals in the Thai capital at 12.2 million, behind only global leader London (16.9 million) and Paris (16.0 million).

"Bangkok is again the number one destination city in Asia, a reflection of its strong and abiding appeal to tourists from the rest of the world," the researcher wrote in his summary.

The report covered 42 cities in Asia-Pacific.

The figures for Bangkok, which will retain its 3rd place status from last year, project a 6.5 % increase in tourist arrivals from

2011, when 11.5 million people visited – despite massive flooding that devastate the city in the last quarter of the year. Rounding out the top five were fourth-place Singapore (11.8mn projected visitors in 2012) and Istanbul (11.6mn).

Despite its relatively low cost for accommodations, Bangkok also ranked 3rd in terms of total Wong projected 2012 tourist tourist spending after only London and New York. The report predicts a 16.6% rise in total tourist expenditure to 598 billion baht by year's end. The researcher noted that the high expenditure was the result of longer stays by tourists compared to other cities that made the top twenty.

The main source cities of tourists arriving in Bangkok were listed as Tokyo, Singapore, Hong Kong, Seoul and Kuala Lumpur.

The biggest spenders come from Hong Kong (74,431 baht per visit) and Tokyo (70,215 baht).

The report predicted the top ten destination cities in Asia-Pacific in 2012 as: Bangkok 12.2mn; Singapore 11.8mn; Hong Kong 11.1mn; Kuala Lumpur 8.1mn; Seoul 8.0mn; Shanghai 7.5mn; Beijing 6.2mn; Taipei 5.4mn; Tokyo 4.3mn; and Jakarta 2.8mn.

Phuket was not among the 42 cities in the Asia-Pacific region covered in the analysis, although some have projected that the current banner year for tourism could see total passenger traffic at Phuket International Airport surpass the 9 million mark this year.

Meanwhile, a report released by the Tourism Authority of Thailand yesterday reported a 31% year-onyear increase in tourist spending from 2010 to 2012, with total earnings of 776 billion baht.

The figures show that Thailand has recorded clear increases in both quality and quantity of visitor arrivals. The growth in total number of visitors is being

matched by increased average length of stay and average-daily expenditure, further underscoring the role of tourism as one of the most important economic sectors and contributors to job creation and nationwide income distribution," the report reads.

Thailand recorded 19.23 million international visitors in 2011, up by 20.67% over 2010, with an average length of stay of 9.64 days and an average daily spending of 4,187.12 baht per person, according to Ministry of Tourism and Sports figures.



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How Windows 8 will roll out



EVEN if you have no intention of getting Windows 8, there are currently forces at work in the computer industry that will have an enormous impact on what kinds of computers are available in the near future, and how much they will cost.

If you're thinking about buying a new computer, you need to understand what's about to happen.

Sometime in the next week or two, Windows 8 will be complete. In Microsoft-speak it's known as "RTM" or "Release to Manufacturing." Shortly after Windows 8 hits the RTM point, Microsoft will ship copies of Windows 8 to computer manufacturers like HP, Dell and Lenovo.

MS will also ship copies to its major corporate customers. And it will post full-fledged copies of Windows 8 on its MSDN and TechNet web sites, where subscribers (who pay US\$200/year for the privilege) will be able to download and use a copy.

On October 26, a day Microsoft has marked as "General Availability" day, Windows 8 will be made widely available to the world.

That's going to change the nature of the PC business in several ways. First, hardware manufacturers are going to be stumbling all over themselves to get "Windows 8 Compatible" computers into the market stream. Last week, Intel said there were 140 different Ultrabooks poised to be released in short order, and 40 of them will be

touch sensitive, thus fully qualified to run Windows 8.

Yes, you read that correctly. 140 new models of Ultrabooks will be coming out by October 26. That doesn't include new models of laptops or desktops. Just the little

MacBook Air-wannabe Intel Ultrabooks. Intel's projection is that the typical price of an entry level Ultrabook will drop from US\$1,000 (roughly comparable to a MacBook Air) to US\$700 by the time the holidays get here.

Let me translate that for you: now is the worst possible time to buy an Ultrabook. The market's going to be absolutely flooded with them by Christmas. And I bet three-quarters of those new models are discontinued or superseded by February.

This unleashing of so many models, so dependent on Windows 8 (which, I don't expect to sell well at all to the Ultrabook crowd), means that prices will drop like a rock around Christmas time, if not earlier.

You don't need to worry about buying a computer with Windows 7 on it, if you're afraid that the only PCs available next year will run Windows 8. Ain't gonna happen. Windows 7 is going to be around for a long, long time.

But it does complicate matters for those of you who are still running pirate versions of Windows. It's going to get harder and harder to find "real" copies

> of Windows 7. I've written about getting genuine copies of Windows 7 several times in the past three years. You can still pick up a copy for 1,200 baht (US\$40) if you have a friend in the States, and you buy three at a time.

The great unknown at this point: Windows RT. Microsoft has two very different flavors of Windows 8, one called Windows 8 (D'OH), and the other is called Windows RT. There's a small chance that Windows RT might actually take off. A little bit.

> Unlike Windows 8, Windows RT really does go head-to-head with the iPad. It's a locked-down system, just like the iPad, which means you can only install apps that have been pre-approved by Microsoft. Windows RT runs the Metro interface, which looks a little bit like the iPad and a lot like the Microsoft Phone (which hasn't sold much either).

The Windows RT machines that are due to come out on October 26 are based on a different kind of computer chip, designed by a company called ARM, which are quite different, internally, from the Intel PCs we've come to know and swear at.

They're fast and light and don't generate much heat. They batteries last eight or ten or more hours. And they should be as cheap as an iPad. "Should" being the operative term.

Windows RT tablets will have one big advantage over iPads and various Android tablets (including the new Nexus, which I hear is stunning). Windows RT comes bundled with a copy of Office that's built for the touch interface. That's quite an accomplishment, actually, and one that makes a difference for people who have to work with Word, Excel and PowerPoint documents.

Microsoft's biggest problem with selling Windows RT machines? Their basic applications, at this point, aren't worth the powder to blow them to Cupertino. Mail, Calendar, People (the Windows 8 contacts manager), SkyDrive and Photos don't hold a candle to the iPad counterparts. The Metro Music and Video apps are just extended advertisements, trying to sell you more music and videos.

Nothing comes close to, say, the iPad Mail app, or iPhoto, or iPod. And the Windows Store isn't anywhere near as compelling as the Apple AppStore or even iTunes.

All of that will probably change in a year. Microsoft's pouring a lot of money into Windows 8, and it's been known to back questionable horses for a long, long time. (It's still losing something like half a billion dollars a quarter to the Bing search effort.) Whether Microsoft can get a little bit of market share back with Windows RT remains to be seen.

On a personal note: last week work well with nice screens (at I finished the initial edits on Win-1366 x 768 pixels and up). Their dows 8 All-In-One For Dummies. It's the thickest book I have ever written, at well over a thousand pages. Putting it together was hellacious, particularly with Microsoft changing things in midstream. I was planning on spending three to four months on the project; ends up it took more than five. Anyway, I have one more intense editing period coming up, when we get the final version of Windows 8. But, at last, I can see light at the end of the tunnel, and life should be returning to almost normal before

The Olympic legacy of G4S

SHOWTIME is fast approaching for the greatest sporting event on Earth. The runners are ready and the UK seems geared up towards putting on a major sporting spectacle.

However, not all has been plain sailing, even though the construction of the Olympic village and the refurbishment of the area surrounding the Olympic village seems to have gone unhinged. Not everyone has come out of this situation smelling of roses.

As the eyes of the World focus on London one company has emerged with a tarnished image from the Olympic saga – G4S.

This event could have potentially catapulted G4S and made the security company a household name. What has happened has been quite embarrassing for the "top dogs" at G4S. The company's failure to employ enough security guards (10,400 as promised) for the Olympic Games has severely damaged its reputation.

If we look at the security company as an operation, it has consistently made profits and overall the business model of the company looks good. Has the Olympic saga caused irreparable damage to the company's reputation? Will G4S be able to recover or is this a prime example of a buying opportunity?

Make no doubt, when it comes to the outsourcing industry reputation is everything and what you are essentially asking other corporations to do is to trust you to run part of their business.

This Olympic failure will likely cost the company in the region of 50 million pounds sterling just purely on the loss on the contract itself and of course there is the unmeasurable reputation cost.

Is G4S worth dipping your toe into? If we have a look at the figures and background of the company we will see that it has been a very successful business.

It is the world's top provider of security for governments and businesses. It could be doubtful that it will provide security solutions to the UK government or major UK corporations after this. The UK market accounted for 20% of G4S's 7.5 billion pounds sterling revenues for 2011. Year-on-year profits and return on capital have been very attractive as the attached graph points out:

Up to this point the business has been very stable exploiting opportunities to buy smaller businesses and build from there. In the last five years dividends have grown by 75% and the company has generated large amounts of surplus cash.

The money invested in the business has also provided profit margins of 7% and a return on capital of around 14%, which has all the hallmarks of a successful business. Can this now be maintained? What does the future hold?

Without having the much sought after financial crystal ball, no one can really tell what the future holds for G4S. Some argue that after what has happened with the Olympics, the major corporative deals, especially in the UK, are off the table for the moment.

If we also look at the outsourcing industry, this is not a dying trend and especially in Asia. The market for this keeps growing, around 30% of G4S sales deride from this region. The company also believes that it can increase its profits by 10% per year, and dividends tend to grow in line with profits.

As of writing, shares are currently traded at just 9.8 times the 2012 forecast, with a potential dividend yield of 3.8%. All in all this does not look like a bad stock to get into if it can live up to its promises. Obviously there are many risks to an investment like this but if you can take a long term view of the stock then there could potentially be profits in it.

Finance minister confident

FINANCE Minister Kittiratt Na-Ranong has expressed his confidence in Thai economic conditions and the policies implemented by the central bank of Thailand.

He also noted that the Bank of Thailand's foreign exchange and monetary policies have been appropriate.


Concerning the rise in Liquefied Petroleum Gas (LPG) prices, Mr. Kittiratt affirmed that the current price of industrial use already reflects the real market cost, while prices for the transport sector will have to be raised gradually.

Prices will be calculated by taking into consideration probable effects on goods prices, inflation and the cost of living. He also noted that the LPG price for food, business and household use will soon be increased little by little.

The Deputy Prime Minister added that local LPG prices should be adjusted during the next 2 years to accommodate the realization of the ASEAN Economic Community in 2015.

Sad, because the Mövenpick Resort and Spa most certainly does believe in reclamation - hence its subsequent decision to give this separated waste to accred- Green as in green papayas.

ited recycling programmes, and to fruit trees, and bougainvilleas utilize its own organic refuse, transformed into compost in its own plant nursery, for use on its flourishing lawns and trees.

The business of making money and accepting responsibility for environmental stewardship rarely go hand in hand. The Mövenpick Resort at Karon is an honorable exception; it is at the forefront of efforts to protect and sustain the natural environment in Phuket. To this end, its stated watchword is: "committing today

to do the right thing for tomorrow".

That the resort's management team mean what they say, is borne out by their recently awarded and much prized "Green Globe' certificate, an award conferred by an organization that not only demands the standards

> sustainability practices within the industry, but requires its resorts and spas to improve their performance by 3 per cent every year. Quite an undertaking.

And the visual evidence is everywhere. Though the Mövenpick has 362 rooms, the main building is barely visible from the road, so spectacularly green is the approach, with rows of royal palms, evergreen

ablaze on the terraces that flank the main entrance.

In the magnificent gardens beyond are literally hundreds of varieties of trees and shrubs, acres of lush Malaysia grass lawn, secluded thatched villas half hidden by palms, swathes of lilies and foliage plants, and a lake that looks so natural it might have been there forever. Twenty two acres of verdant gardens designed by a famous landscape artist, and maintained by eight gardeners. The

aesthetic appeal is instant. But consider too all the rich, oxygenated air that is being released into the atmosphere. And all the birds and butterflies that can call this home.

Of course, the main contributions to sustainability are less visible, but they are even more crucial. The resort has launched a number of enterprises. For example, it boasts its own water treatment plant. Sewage, instead of going straight into the mains (where it can often pollute other water systems), is used for drip irrigation in the gardens, an effective method that is activated in the cool of the day to minimize evaporation. The shrubs and tress certainly appreciate it.

Inside the rooms, many initiatives help optimize energy consumption. Energy-saving LED lighting is the order of the day, and in bathrooms toilet water is conserved by the use of dual flushing cisterns. The water pressure in all sinks and showers is deliberately reduced to keep consumption below eight liters per minute.

Exterior lights are on a timeswitch, and both air conditioning and electricity are controlled by the key card to the room. The temperature is set at a conservative 23 degrees. No wastage there. In addition, guests can make their own sustainable decisions as to when the bed linen or towels should be changed. All these initiatives have had a marked effect: in the last two years, energy consumption per occupied room has dropped by seven per cent. The extra cost to the resort, Hansruedi assures me, is negligible.

It is not just the guests who are the beneficiaries. Suppliers take back their delivery containers; "green" cleaning materials are given preferential use. The use of fluorocarbons (CFCs) that destroy the ozone layer is not permitted.

The Mövenpick resort makes many contributions to the local economy. Needy people in the community have benefited from gifts of clothing; flood victims of the recent inundations have received contributions of money. Staff of the resort, who are constantly educated to think in the Mövenpick way, have even taken

part in a "clean-up" of Karon Beach, and a mini-marathon aimed to highlight the dangers of drug abuse. Disadvantaged children are treated to an annual fun day in the grounds of the hotel.

There are 460 employees and, in keeping with Mövenpick resort's policy, the staff are almost all recruited from the neighborhood. In addition, local products are promoted, local charities supported, donation schemes initiated.

The list of positives is endless. Indeed, it is hard to think of an area where the hotel is not making a positive contribution to the environment, and reducing its carbon footprint. And not just within its own grounds, but further afield: in the local community, and even in a national



Raise a toast to a Phuket coffee roast

Find out why local coffee experts Hock Hoe Lee are setting their sights on expansion, and why they have been creating a stir with bean lovers for more than 50 years

EACH cup of coffee served at Hock Hoe Lee has more than 50 years of history steeped inside. It's a taste to be savored.

Three generations of one Phuket family have worked tirelessly to create the coffee served up today at Hock Hoe Lee, which has shops in town and in Rawai.

Back in 1958, when Chinese migrant Cheng Long arrived in Phuket by junk from his native land, he had a mat to sleep on and knowledge of how to roast coffee beans. That was all.

He scraped together enough money to rent a small ramshackle shophouse in the heart of Phuket Town's downtown market.

It wasn't long before inquisitive Thai-Chinese locals wandered in to sample Mr Long's coffee, sniffing the plumes of sweet-smelling smoke pouring from the shop. They were hooked and word soon spread of the Chinaman's magic beans.

He bought his beans from a friend in Penang, Malaysia. To suit demand, he roasted his beans with sugar and started selling cinnamon sticks too.

Hock Hoe Lee, meaning "Lucky" in Chinese, was the moniker Mr Long gave to his shop. As luck would have it, business spiralled and he ventured to Chiang Mai and Ranong to find homegrown beans.

After Mr Long died, his son Somboon took over his father's business with great success. Today, locals know Hock Hoe Lee as "Boon's shop", the best place in town to buy coffee.

Although the roasting process has been moved out of the original shop to a site nearby, the place still holds much of the charm it did fifty years ago, with bags of fresh coffee piled high, the clang of machines sounding out all day and workers hurridly bagging beans in bulk. It's typical of Phuket Town hustle-bustle.

Today, the original shop in town still attracts locals who buy Hock Hoe Lee beans by the bagful, but the brand has sprouted another shop in Rawai and more are planned.



Fifty years of history in every cup.

In 2010, Somboon's daughter Jutamas and her husband Ruengrit decided to build upon the family's coffee success and opened a new store in Rawai.

Sandwiched between Friendship Beach and Serenity Terraces, the modern shop is pulling in a different clientele: expats and tourists.

"We thought it was time to start making coffee to cater to

foreigners," Ruengrit said.

"The feedback has been great. Thai people walk into the new shop and are surprised to see we are serving expresso coffee and not just Thai coffee."


"We use the same beans for our Thai and Western coffee, it's just we roast Thai coffee on a much higher heat, with lots more sugar."

Ruengrit said that due to the success of the new shop, more shops are planned for the near future.

The secret to the coffee's flavor is also due to Hock Hoe Lee's selction of the beans they buy. As far back as 1958, the family has been personally inspecting the farms they use, and the processes the farmers use to keep the beans fresh. They've been getting it right for a long time.

For great homegrown coffee with a Phuket history, get down to Hock Hoe Lee in Rawai. Prices are fair and there's a great snack menu too. Beans by the bag are also on sale.

Getting ready for the rains' retreat

A look at two of Thailand's most revered Buddhist holidays

THIS weekend's full moon heralds the official start of the rainy season in Thailand, marked by back-to-back Buddhist Holidays, Asaha Bucha and Khao Pansa.

For non-Buddhists, the long "dry" weekend to welcome the "wet" season is a good opportunity to relax, if nothing else.

For most devout Buddhists, however, there is much deeper meaning and purpose to July's holy weekend.

Here is an explanation of the holiday, its roots and customs.

ASAHA BUCHA DAY

Marked by the full moon of the Thai lunar calendar's eighth month, Asaha Bucha was designated to celebrate and perpetuate the first sermon that the two-month-enlightened Buddha gave to his first five followers over 2,500 years ago.

The words "Asaha Bucha" derive from ancient Pali language and literally means "worshiping fourth month".

The fourth month of the ancient Indian lunar calendar is equivalent to the eight month of the Thai lunar calendar.

It is for this reason that in Thai, Asaha Bucha is also referred to as wun pen deuan bpad - the fullmoon-day of the eighth month.

It is one of three lunar-based Buddhist holidays in Thailand.

The other two are Makha Bucha Day – typically a full moon in February, sometimes in March – which commemorates the Buddha's sermon to 1,250 followers; and Visakha Bucha Day – typically a full moon in May, sometimes April which celebrates Buddha's birth, enlightenment and death all in one.

Celebrations and ceremonies in temples are generally the same for all three days.

After the offerings, blessings and sermons during the day, there is a climactic moonlight candle procession during which participants, carrying a lit candle, three joss sticks and a lotus flower encircle the temple's main Buddha hall three times.

The number three in Buddhism refers to the "triple gem" and symbolically represents the Buddha, his teachings (*Dharma*) and the clergy (Sangha). This is the reason for circling a temple or crematory three times and also prostrating three times in veneration of the Buddha or a senior monk.

THE ULTIMATE TRUTH

The intricacies of custom and tradition all too often cloud underlying meanings and purposes.

Contrary to popular belief, to understand the essence of Buddhism and benefit from its philosophy, practitioners do not have to be versed in ancient mantras and spells, nor do they need to seek the protection of a magical tattoo or amulet. In fact, many of the practices we see today are contradictory if not irrelevant to what Buddha actually taught.

The real point of Asaha Bucha day is to honor Buddha's first and fundamental sermon, which explains that the Dharma Wheel - an analogy for our life cycle comprises the "spokes" of birth, illness, death and rebirth.

The wheel turns relentlessly; life is a constant cycle of suffering caused by our desires, dependencies and attachments.

In order to break free from the cycle of pain and suffering that is life - not to be reborn again into the same cycle - and thus obtain the ultimate truth of enlightenment, detachment and renunciation of the unessential and harmful things in life must

At the same time, it is important to avoid extremes and instead seek a middle path, willfully and consciously living by the basic five precepts: to abstain from killing, stealing, lying, drinking and sexual misconduct.


That said, Buddha is not a god to be worshiped, but rather a teacher to be honored.

KHAO PANSA

The day after Asaha Bucha - this Friday, August 3 – is Khao Pansa, literally the "rains retreat". This is the customary time for laymen to ordain as monks.

For this three-month period, monks traditionally retreat to temples because the rains make it difficult for them to meditate in the forest or ask for alms in the village on a regular basis.

To ensure the monks are able to sustain themselves, laypeople make larger-than-usual offerings during Khao Pansa.

Aside from food, large candles have been the customary form of offering, a practice dating to times before the invention of electricity. Today, large candles are still offered but this is largely a tradition now as most temples have a continuous supply of electricity.

During Khao Pansa monks stay in temples, disciplining themselves by following hundreds of precepts which dictate that they abstain from everything

from growing eyebrows to even singing. This is in contrast to the five basic precepts that laypeople attempt to follow as outlined in the Buddha's principle sermon.

Khao Pansa also sees an increase in social awareness through media campaigns on Thai TV, newspapers and radio; the most common of these is echoed in the nationwide alcohol abstinence slogan: "Khao Pansa Ngote Lao".

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Siam Society Journal free for all

THE Journal Of The Siam Society (JSS), the oldest and most prestigious academic publication in Southeast Asia, has made all of its contents available free online.

A total of 99 volumes with more than 2,000 articles running to over 30,000 pages can now be perused, free of charge, by ordinary members of the public.

The Journal was the first to publish English-language translations of the Sukhothai inscriptions, the Ayutthaya and Burmese chronicles, King Chulalongkorn's letters to one of his daughters, the testimonies of Siamese war captives taken to Myanmar, plus excerpts from a host of foreign-language accounts of Siam such as that by the Dutchman Jeremias Van Vliet.

The pages of this periodical have

at times hosted fierce academic controversies over such subjects as the transliteration of Thai into English (with King Vajiravudh as a contributor) and the authenticity of the Ramkhamhaeng Inscription.

Its early issues contain fascinating pieces by foreigners about adventures they had in Siam and discoveries made about Thai culture, including articles by G.E. Gerini, Erik Seidenfaden, Reginald Le May, W.A.R. Wood and Francis Giles.

The great administrator/historian Prince Damrong Rajanubhab was a major early supporter and contributor. as were other intellectual royals such as Prince Dhani Nivat, Prince Wan Waithayakorn, Prince Naris and Prince Prem Purachatra.

Readers can trace the develop-

ment of Thai history in the pages of the JSS with contributions from Kachorn Sukhabanij, Michael Vickery, David Wyatt, Thamsook Numnonda, Hans Penth, Yoneo Ishii, Michael Smithies and many others.

Bilaibhan Sampatsiri, president of the Siam Society, had this to say: "This is a big step for such an established journal. Today, academic articles must be on the web.We want to make JSS accessible to everyone, not just those with a university affiliation."

JSS first appeared in 1904 and is still going strong. The current issue and all back issues, published over a period of 108 years, can now be accessed via W:siam-society.org/ OJS/index.php/JSS/index.

Yesterday's breakfast Phuket Po-Cha-Na upholds old traditions

ON a busy stretch of Wirat Hongyok Road, amidst run-of-the-mill modern shophouses, the quaint Phuket Po-chana Café stands out like an oasis of calm. Its wooden structure and charming interior, made up of marble-topped tables and old-fashioned household items, lend an incredible air of the Phuket of yesteryear. A bicycle parked haphazardly in front completes the picture.

Run by Isaan-born Tawee Mancharoen, Phuket Po-cha-na, is open for breakfast and lunch and serves Chinese-style food featuring khao tom - rice porridges noodles and a variety of steamed dumplings known as dim sum.

A typical breakfast here would be made up of a bowl of rice porridge (topped with fish, minced pork or shrimp - 35 baht) and a few bamboo baskets of dim sum, all washed down with fragrant red tea and lots of condensed milk. This is what my friend, Phuket-born

Wanida Hongyok, usually likes to order.

Actually, there are no rules concerning breakfast. Maybe a steaming bowl of noodle soup, instead of rice porridge, is a good idea, but don't stop there. Try bak kut teh, the full-flavored stewed pork ribs in Chinese herbs and shitake mushrooms, a dish praised by locals for its natural health-

giving properties. A tantalizing variety of steamed dim sum in bamboo baskets can make up a

whole meal in itself, if you so wish. The most popular ones are har-gao, pleated parcels filled with pork and shrimps, and pao or sala pao – those steamed white buns with roast pork fillings. Wanida's favorite dish is the melt-in-your-mouth chicken feet, steamed in five-spice sauce.

Then there's the usual fare such as Pad Thai, Hai Nan chicken rice and roast char sieu pork on rice.

A new addition to the breakfast menu is the popular rice noodle dish, kanom *jeen*, which can be had with a variety of sauces – fish flake curry or the fiery southern fish curry gaeng tai pla, served with the usual selection of fresh herbs and pickled vegetables.

No breakfast in Phuket is ever complete without the famous *cha boran* – that traditional tea with condensed milk. It's an addition that may raise your blood sugar but is an essential ingredient, because cha boran without condensed

milk is simply not the real stuff. There's also freshly brewed coffee as well as a variety of iced drinks, all at 20 baht each.

All this can be enjoyed in an open veranda-styled setting, backed by a pleasant garden. The eating area is sectioned into three zones named after the three Amphoes of Phuket Province: Thalang, Kathu and Amphoe Muang.

Gear and skills part the waters

Diving

WHEN was the last time something truly fresh hit the dive market? Yes, every year we get niftier regulators, more swanky dive watches and new fin designs that we can't resist at least window shopping for. But, when was the last time something was put on the market for recreational divers that really parted the waters – changed the way we thought about diving?

In an activity that is becoming more and more relaxing and accessible to the general public, those wanting to "push the limits" without doing the heavy lifting of tech-diving books, have found themselves at a loss.

Those of us with full time non-dive industry jobs still want that sense of discovery; that want to end up in the

footnotes of a history book, or at the very least want more than 50 minutes down on a dive trying.

This year PADI has finally gotten the ball rolling with the launch of three new specialty diving courses: recreational rebreathers, sidemounts and selfreliant diving.

But, this isn't tech diving.

Kevin Black from Kiwidivers in Chalong, one of only four recreational rebreather dive instructors currently in Thailand, explained that PADI was bringing the "Wow" factor back to scuba diving The new certifications let recreational divers safely push the boundaries of what they consider sports diving.

The only closed-circuit rebreather currently available on the recreational market is the Poseidon's MKVI. This is one of those bits of gear that guys piecing together their tech kits in their garage years ago would have dreamed of, and now it's here. safe and actually designed for sports divers.

Before sitting down with Kevin my understanding of rebreathers was fairly simple -

they don't make bubbles.

Well, I wasn't wrong, but I was missing just a little bit of the point too. Yes, they don't make bubbles as the air you breath out is cycled and scrubbed through a closed system and then has pure oxygen from one of the two tanks on the kit automatically blended with the oxygen depleted air, making it good for another breathe, time and time again. Sounds complicated, but I was assured that they were dummy proof – so I wouldn't have any issues.

However, by only focusing on not blowing bubbles and disturbing the fish, I missed the point. Rebreathers don't just add a couple more minutes to your dive, as I thought. They don't just double your dive time. They actually can turn a one hour dive into a three hour dive, Kevin explained.

That means, you are the first to jump and then after everyone has come up, had lunch, geared up, booked a second dive,

to 40 divers on Phi Phi who attended the event this was there first time strapping a tank under each arm for the sidemount

configuration and feeling the new diving "flow". Sidemount configurations have been around for a long time, first reportedly being used in England for cave diving, and subsequently used all over the world for cave diving and penetration dives.

The weightlessness and balance that sidemount divers gloat about is enough to make me sign up for the course, just to join the club. And the redundant gas supply and reduced lower back strain are both advantages that I'm looking forward to.

Though the course is geared towards recreational diving it also provides a nice view of the techdiving world. It's a little step that leaves you totally comfortable when

you start shooting for your ultimate goals, from exploring cave systems to just feeling like your part of the ecosystem when you hover above the corals and snap a stellar photo.

Different from the recreational rebreather course and the sidemount course, the PADI self-reliant course isn't about becoming comfortable with new equipment, it's about becoming comfortable with yourself.

PADI has, since time immemorial preached (and perhaps rightly so), that divers should never dive without a buddy. Though that philosophy has not changed, PADI is now willing to admit that it does happen, either intentionally or unintentionally. And let's be honest, who is a dive instructor relying in an emergency when they are taking two "Discover Scuba" divers on their first dip into the big blue?

PADI position is clear in the following released statement: "Diving without a Dive Buddy, by choice, while not advocated, is something which PADI recognizes to be occasionally either necessary or preferred by some divers."

This recognition is in many ways a new frontier for experienced recreational divers (100 plus dives is necessary to take the course). Those who have only been loosely following the buddy system or ignoring it completely while taking photographs, spear fishing or lobster hunting

can come out of the closet.

Not only can they now stop hiding in some murky underground social circle, but now they have the opportunity to be trained in "self rescue", to be tested so that they can at least engage in a more risky activity in the safest possible way.

"One of the key things you learn is how to deal with running out of air when you don't have a buddy to rely on. You also learn a lot about calculating just how much air you use in different cir-

cumstances and how to plan dives around your estimated consumption," Kevin explained to me.

Yes, I'm stoked about this and over the next several months plan on taking the opportunity to check-out these courses, log some stunning dives and shoot for the foot notes of someone else's history book.

This is part one of the four part series on PADI's new specialty diving certifications.



Plan B revels in the flames of London 2011

BETWEEN August 6 – 10, 2011, several London boroughs and districts across England suffered widespread rioting, looting and arson. Thousands of people took to the streets.

Rapper/Singer/Songwriter Plan B, famous in Britain and gaining exposure abroad, is the first major artist to give voice to this movement – largely condemned in the UK.

In his new album titled Ill Manors, musician and director Benjamin Drew (Plan B) marks his third major album release. His last album, The defamation of Strickland Banks, was a soul record that went straight to number one in the UK charts.

The Ill Manors album accompanies Drew's latest film of the same name. Both the film and the album discuss the London riots of 2011. Drew paints a picture of harsh life in London's ghettos and of a generation bored out of its mind and getting out of hand.

The film, set in Forest Gate, London, revolves around the lives of eight characters and features six original songs by Plan B, which act as narration for the film (like Pink Floyd's *The Wall*).

The first night of rioting was on August 7, after a peaceful protest in Tottenham, following the death of Mark Duggan – a local man shot dead by police on


Riots, protests and social unrest have historically played muse to great artists. The student shootings at Kent State in Ohio, the riots in Belfast, Ireland

One hallmark of a great writer, I'm told by friend of the Gazette Dr Patrick Campbell, is the ability to carry a metaphor throughout the entirety of a piece. In this passage Drew carries forth the already established metaphor of people as safari animals.

"We got an eco-friendly government, they preserve our natural habitat. Built an entire Olympic Village around where we live without pulling down any flats. Give us free money and we don't pay any tax, NHS healthcare, yes please, many thanks."

One thing that is interesting about Drew's political perspective is that he isn't necessarily siding with rioters or the police. He just enjoys reveling in the flames – shining a spotlight on an out of control situation.

In order to promote the film and album, Plan B is a part of a growing list of artists to be featured in the YouTube Livestream Concerts series that broadcasts performances simultaneously around the world.

Plan B performed for YouTube on July 23rd and the concert can be viewed by searching "Plan B Livestream". Ill Manors the film is in select theaters now and the album can be purchased through Amazon for 8.97 pounds sterling, approximately 440 baht. *Ill* Manors was released on July 23rd to accompany the Livestream.





of his office to greet me. He is wearing a bright blue cotton shirt with batik pattern fringe, attire not commonly associated with a hospital director – or with a doctor, for that matter.

But as the soft-spoken director of Patong Hospital explains this is the uniform shirt for all personnel, and even if he is the boss he wears it to show he's part of the team.

The team spirit ethos is something Dr Phumin, a trained surgeon, takes seriously. Five years ago, the post was entrusted to him with a request to "come back and help your father's land," referring to Phuket, his father's birthplace.

The top job came with its own inherent problems and to solve them this young doctor (34 at that time) had to win the hearts and minds of his new staff, some of whom were much older than him. It was this very team spirit, he says, that has won him the staff's regard and made Patong Hospital the respectable institution it is today.

It's a widely held belief, in Thai medical circles anyway, that surgeons make the best hospital chiefs. Was this why he got the job? He laughs, and says:

"Perhaps.General surgery requires dexterity, patience and creativity. It's art if you like, but must be practiced with decisiveness and boldness. Most of the time you don't have a second

chance – the job must be done and done well. All that in the context of complex medical situations of course. It's multi-tasking and an administration job is like that too."

Dr Phumin (whose nickname is Art) says his virtue is being patient – jai yen – and under his leadership Patong Hospital has prospered and passed the tough quality test by the Healthcare Accreditation Institute of Thailand, one of the only two Phuket hospitals to receive such award, the other being Bangkok Hospital Phuket.

Apart from running Patong Hospital, Dr Phumin holds a surgeryclinic every Wednesday afternoon at Phuket Vajira Hospital. His skills are now directed at performing arteriovenous fistula operations for patients with kidney complications.

Dr Phumin is the only surgeon in Phuket qualified to perform such an operation, in which an artery and a vein are connected to allow for application of dialysis treatment.

When asked to comment on the fact that many expatriates now regularly use the hospital's facilities, he answers:

disadvantages for admitting foreign patients. Expats make up 20 per cent of the hospital's intake and because they pay (as opposed to Thais who are subsidized by the state), the hospital benefits. However, there are problems with drunk and disorderly night time patients. Then there are also those who can't afford to pay.'

The latter, he says, poses a problem and a headache. "I just don't understand how tourists are allowed to enter the country without any health insurance. Something must be done to correct this or else many government hospitals will end up picking up the bill for treatment and sometimes even funeral fees."

Dr Phumin's working day is typified by a series of meetings both at his hospital and at government offices in town. Apart from the Wednesday surgery clinic, he is also head of the Phuket Patong DMAT (Disaster Medical Assistance Team) responsible for quick deployment in case of local and national crisis. As such he has had to undergo constant training.

He is also a devoted father and always has time for his two daughters, eight and seven, helping with homework and ferrying them to sport activities over the weekend.

Dr Phumin is married to Dr Suntree Thantong, a radiologist attached to Bangkok Hospital on Phuket.





Will Phuket be hit by a property bubble?



I AM a big fan of the Martin Scorsese movie *Casino*. One of the most telling lines is from Robert De Niro's character Ace Rothstein who waxes poetically: "In the casino, the cardinal rule is to keep them playing and to keep them coming back. The longer they play, the more they lose, and in the end, we get it all."

In many ways Phuket's broad property sector has been hit again with a gambling-like mentality. A strong wave of new low-priced products have hit the market over the past 18 months, which looks to alter the playing field of real estate far into the decade.

These offerings priced from 1-2 million baht have a sustained surge in transactions and it's been hard to feed the beast of overwhelming demand. Somehow the trend makes the hair stand up on the back of my neck as it reminds me of another era.

In the old days, about 10 to 12 year ago, Phuket moved into growth mode and Chalong played home to some of the early domestic-oriented housing projects – the multi-phase Villas 1, 2, 3 and now I've even lost track how many there are. Then came Land and Houses with a pocketful of attached to semi-attached and detached houses, which offered something for every budget.

These projects were aimed mostly at domestic Thai buyers but they also saw pick up from foreigners. Mostly folks were end users, who would live in these units, raise families and had roots in the community. Coincidentally, at the same time the overseas market was picking up. Along coastal areas lifestyle migrants from Hong Kong, Singapore and elsewhere were buying second homes or eventual retirement havens. Again the common thread was buyers who wanted to use the property.

As the 'greed is good' days of the mid 2000s arrived, the foreign market ramped up with a case of halcyon-induced euphoria and investors flocked to our shores, looking to double their money overnight.

Somehow the big Bangkok listed property developers were so entrenched in the nation's capital they forgot about the upcountry market of Phuket. Domestic offerings were mostly attached or semi-detached homes on inland plots of land.

We all know what happened to the foreign market after the financial crisis – oversupply, flat demand and the all encompassing secondary resale market.

While after the crisis a steady flow of listed Thai firms made inroads to Phuket, property for the most part has been a domestic storyline. Somehow supply and demand were kept in check but the rising affluence of an increasing middle class, and readily available credit multiplied the catchment of willing property investors.


Today there are well over 5000 entry level condominium units in the development pipeline on the island, which will be completed over the next 24 months.

Typically, buyers are Thai rather than foreigners, and in many cases they have purchased multiple units.

Like a casino, the game is to make a small down payment on launch, speculate that project pricing will appreciate during the development phase and flip the unit prior to registration of the condo. This forestalls either doling out cash or else raising bank finance. In theory strong market sentiment has worked in their favor over the past year.

Now, the question is how deep the buying pool is and what will happen when all of these completed units are transferred on. Inevitably the tables will turn as those unable to flip, will be forced to rent. This effectively will displace possible buyers of new launches, as renting will become cheaper. Secondly, there will be a resale market with considerable inventory.

One can almost overlay the same situation, which happened in the resort grade foreign sector five years ago and it's likely that a similar scenario will occur. Cycles are a fact of business life. As Phuket grows, its real estate industry will fractionalize into

new sales, resales and rentals.

While pundits may point out that domestic growth can continue unabated, as it has done in Bangkok, there remains a limited population base here and saturation will come inevitably.

There is also a possible mismatch of product. While the shoe-box influx of units that are 20 - 30 square meters is aimed at a certain demographic, it will not attract Thai couples who want to have kids or those with families already.

Geography is another issue. While Bangkok has these flats along key transportation lines like the BTS and bus routes, traffic in Phuket is getting worse. Businesspeople and employees are increasingly drawn to being closer to their work

so where the largest build of these units are, may be less desirable in the years ahead.

That given, the trend is not all bad. Planned estates, reasonable scale and a rise in the quality of domestic products are good things. But the concern is the voodoo-like spread of inexperienced first time investors who are only prepared financially for the upside and not the possibility of market volatility.

Buy a good product, pick a strong location and be willing to ride out the storm and your investment should provide a reasonable return.

Resort-property sales lag behind tourism

THE hotel business in Phuket is booming as tourists flood the island, but sales of resort properties have failed to benefit, according to CBRE Research's Phuket Property Report.

"Despite healthy increases in tourism arrivals [for now we are not] seeing a proportional increase in sales in the resort property market. Rising tourism numbers are mainly from Asia, whose tourists have yet to become resort property buyers," said David Simister, Chairman of CBRE Thailand.

According to the report, Phuket welcomed 594,999 local and 730,667 foreign visitors in the first quarter (Q1) of this year.

Despite the global economic uncertainty, tourism continued to grow, with the expansion coming from Australia, China and Russia.

The Q1 average occupancy rate improved to 82.7 per cent from 80.5 per cent in the Q4 of last year. High-end hotels were the best performers with average achieved room rates of 22,835 baht for

luxury hotels – up 6.8 per cent year-on-year, and 7,425 baht for first-class hotels, up five per cent.

Currently 13,171 rooms are in 83 existing upscale hotels, and 5,471 are under construction in 30 hotels due for completion by 2014.

The new supply is not confined to the West coast, but shows a wider geographic footprint, including Koh Siray, which is east of Phuket Town.

A new residential market has emerged – non-beachfront, non-resort condos – developed by

Bangkok listed developers such as Sansiri and Supalai. New off-plan projects have been successfully selling condos inland aimed at local island residents. They are mainly studios of 29-37 square meters AT an average price of 1.5 million baht.

Based on the company's survey in the Q1, 60 resort villas were sold. Sales were spread across all price ranges. Villas below 15 mn baht made up half of sales, but at the top end, two sales were recorded in

The Sava across the Sarasin Bridge in Phang Nga province has reportedly sold all seven villas at prices ranging from 62 to 180 mn baht, three of which were sold this quarter.

In the resort condo market, 84 units were sold. Sales were concentrated in five projects with mostly one-bedroom units at an average price of 5.9 mn baht. There are about 3,700 completed resort condos in Phuket.

Landowning in the name of a company

Property Legal

By International Law Office

THE purchase of land in the name of a Thai Company, (a "company ltd" is the preferred corporate form as its liabilities are limited) is thought by many to be impossible when it involves the inclusion of foreign shareholders and/or a foreign director in the company.

However, if one follows the rules of the Company Registration Office (CRO) regarding company registration and the regulations and requirements of the Land office, the lawful registration of a Thai company – that includes foreign shareholders and/or directors – may be accomplished.

Generally, for a Thai landowning company that has a foreign director and/or shareholders, the CRO will require evidence that Thai shareholders have made actual capital contributions into the company.

This may be demonstrated by submitting copies of the records of their respective bank accounts for the previous 6 month period that indicate each of the Thai shareholders independently possessed sufficient funds for their respec-

tive investment in the company.

In addition, the Thai shareholders must provide evidence of where such funds originated. Examples of the above include savings from their salaries, inheritances, funds received through the sale of properties or received through a bona-fide loan.

Shares in a Thai company may also be issued or transferred to Thai nationals in compensation for their 'special' contributions made to the company that may take the form of skills, knowledge, experience or property.

In this instance, the Thai Shareholder must pay income taxes on the amounts representing their contributions of skill, knowledge or experience based upon the value of their shares, or based upon the value of the property transferred into the name of the Thai company.

A Thai landowning company must be set up according to the land department rules, which require at a minimum one Thai director with full signatory powers (along with the foreign director) and which require that all company shares issued to foreigners represent no more that 39 per cent of all company shares issued. The minimum

number of shareholders in a Thai Company Ltd. is three, and there must be more Thai shareholders than foreign shareholders.

Once the company has been registered for the purpose of owning land, and/or to conduct the business of real estate transaction (to purchase and/or sell land or rent out such properties) the company, through its directors, may apply at the land office to purchase the target land and must submit all the necessary supporting documents.

Further, a company purpose for the land purchase must be declared (office, or commercial use, etc.). At this time, the Thai Director and all Thai shareholders must be present at the land office to show evidence of their financial investment and to sign a declaration that such shareholders are bona-fide shareholders and not mere nominees.

If all the documentations and evidence as presented is correct and accepted by the land official and the land title clear, the land official will commence with the registration process for the purchase and transfer of ownership of the land into the name of the Thai company, and the officer shall





issue the official Purchase/Sales Agreement for the property in the name of the company. Upon registration the officer will also collect all registration fees and taxes due and payable on the transaction.

Although the process seems difficult, a lawful Thai landowning company can easily be formed notwithstanding the presence of foreign directorship or foreign shareholders. The advantage of incorporating such a company correctly is that the government, through its officers at the land office and the CRO, has given its stamp of approval for the underlying land transaction having verified the legitimacy of the company, its directors and shareholders.

Upon having registered the Thai company as legal owner of the property, the Thai company should commence its business promptly as yearly audited accounts have to be filed with the CRO and Revenue Department. This requirement is independent as to whether or not the company actually has income. An accountant and/or auditor should be contacted for such purpose.

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Trumpeting their virtues

WHEN I started this column, one of the first plants to be given the seal of approval was tecoma stans, commonly known

Readily available in Phuket plant nurseries,

as yellow bells or the trumpet tree. It thawng urai, you may find therein a newreceived a rave review because one was already prospering in my garden, an amiable small tree that always seemed to be in bloom, and was capable of coping with poor soil and relatively little moisture.

If the trumpet tree has one minor disadvantage, it is that it is deciduous and, because it has a fairly open crown, it produces highly visible bunches of seed pods after the manner of most of the bignonia tribe. A small price to pay for a colorful shrub whose smooth grey branches are liberally bedecked with lots of large, yellow, trumpet-shaped flowers.

Originally from tropical America, tecoma stans behaves here like a seasoned native, apparently immune both to disease, and to the vagaries of the Thai climate. It will rapidly reach five or six meters, but pruning will both improve its shape and thicken the bright green, toothed foliage.

Moreover, if you want a constant display of these campanulate blooms, you will

need to remove the beanlike seed capsules.

where it is known as ish hybrid with flowers of an even richer

golden hue. Propagate from the papery seeds or, more reliably, from plant cuttings taken from the previous year's growth. Tecoma capensis, sometimes known as the

cape honeysuckle, is another member of the genus. Equally adaptable and tolerant of saltspray, drought and wind, it has a tendency to climb and sports large, glossy leaves.

The flowers are orange-red or scarlet and although they have the characteristic bell shape of most bignonias, they are tightly tubular, and are borne as racemes at the end of branches. Hence the "honeysuckle" tag. Aurea, a modern cultivar, has golden yellow flowers. It is worth looking out for.

Also seaside hardy is the yellow poinciana (peltophorum pterocarpum). Although often upstaged by the flame tree's dazzling array of orange blooms, this particular poinciana is deservedly popular both for its shade and its flowers.

Less spectacular than delonix regia it may be, but its erect yellow spikes of flowers, produced at the same time as the handsome, fern-like leaves, are both attractive and fragrant. Indeed, it is sometimes planted in company with flame trees along Indian avenues, creating a colorful parade of alternate scarlet and yellow. Surely a practice worth repeating here. Unusually, the young branches are covered with rusty red hairs. Flat, leathery pods mature during the dry season.

Known as non sii in Thailand, it's probably a bit big for the average garden, since it can grow to thirty feet or more, and has spreading branches. While it dislikes

drought and will become deciduous in bonedry conditions, *peltophorum* is normally evergreen, given sufficient moisture. In Phuket, it is found growing wild in a variety of damp habitats – from the margins of mangrove swamps to flood plains, but, as an ornamental addition, it is occasionally seen in parks and gardens.

Placed by some botanists in the cassia sub-group of the legume family, it has more than its golden color to link it to other members of this clan. P. dasyrachis, for example, is a relative. Another substantial tree with characteristic brownish-red, tomentose shoots and ferny foliage.

Synchronizing the appearance of its blooms with the new leaves that appear in March in Thailand, it goes on to produce seed pods that start red and turn



black as they mature. One difference is that the clusters of fragile yellow florets hang down in racemes rather than pointing skywards. The result: a greater dramatic impact.







Local lad heads to London

THE London Olympics began on July 27 with the opening ceremony held at Olympic Stadium in Northeast London. The ceremony was dubbed 'Isles of Wonder' and highlighted the wonders of Britain through artistic expression.

This is the third time London has hosted the Olympics, having hosted it before the First World War in 1908 and just after the Second World War in 1948.

Her Majesty the Queen attended the opening ceremony, joining other heads of state from across the world. The athletes entered the ceremony nation by nation with the Greek team coming first as the founding nation of the Olympics. As host nation, the British team entered last, while the other nations formed the procession in alphabetical order.

London is in party mood and the streets are lined with giant globes, and flags of the 204 competing nations. Even the Mayor of London is getting in on the act, launching Discovery Trails that encourage people to explore London by walking round the city to find life-sized London 2012 mascots: Mandeville and Wenlock.

Tower Bridge has giant Olympic Rings hanging from it; all the bridges along the River Thames are lit up come nightfall and another set of giant rings will float down the River Thames during the games.

Over a thousand athletes arrived into London Heathrow on July 24 and 10,000 athletes have been filtering into London over the last few weeks, including Thai athletes.

Thailand sent 37 athletes to London to compete in 19 different events: wrestling, volleyball, track and field, cycling, boxing, tennis, rowing, shooting, swimming, taekwondo, sailing, wind surfing, archery, equestrian, clay shooting, fencing, table tennis, badminton and weightlifting.

Phuket will be represented by

The pair have been put in Group B with fourth seeds and world No 4, Ko Sung Hyun and Yoo Yeong Seong from South Korea; Polish world No 21 Adan Cwalina and Michal Logosz and world No 6 Mohammad Ahsan and Bona Septano from Indonesia.

Thailand's Manepong and Bodin

are ranked No 19 in the world.

The badminton mens doubles starts on July 28 and if the Thai hopefuls navigate their way out of a tricky group, they join the quarter final games, which start on August 2.

Viggins wins France

AFTER a lack-luster performance in the 2009 Tour de France, Bradley Wiggins admitted: "That's for someone else. Kids from Kilburn don't win the Tour".

Wiggins still doesn't look the part; a lanky figure with skinny limbs, a gaunt face with unfashionable sideburns. But his achievement in winning the 2012 Tour de France is the stuff of schoolboy dreams, an achievement so epic, so prodigious, it is being trumpeted as the greatest performance in the history of British sport.

What is so remarkable is that Wiggins is already an Olympic champion at the four kilometer pursuit. An out-and-out sprint. And now this.... Not four kilometers, but 3,497 kilometers, a lung-bursting twenty stage race with grueling mountain ascents. Has there ever been an athlete, in any sport, who has displayed such versatility? In a world dominated by specialist sportsmen, it's like asking Usain Bolt, the world record holder for the 100 meters, to go out and win a marathon - or a steeplechase. Utterly inconceivable.

Moreover Bradley has done it with panache. Articulate when interviewed, he has displayed a chirpy and sometimes cussed Englishness as palpable as Blackpool rock. Even the French have

In a country where the Tour de France has an almost mystical significance, an historic race in existence for 99 years, Wiggo charmed the French in part with his modest, knowledgeable comments; more by two time-trials in which he destroyed the opposition and perhaps most of all by his gallantry in slowing down the "peloton" to allow riders who had punctured, to rejoin the race.

Certainly, and Wiggins has been the first to acknowledge it, there have been contributory factors in helping him claim the tour title: the superior unity of Team Sky, the management of Dave Brailsford, the guru of British cycling with his meticulous attention to "marginal gains", Chris Froome's emergence as a great climber and ally.

But at the end of the day, the 22nd day, it was Wiggo's own lanky legs that did the talking and carried him to victory – the same level of success he hopes to achieve at the London Olympics.

Alonso on track in F1 series

FERNANDO Alonso continued his dominant season with victory at Hockhemheinring. The Spaniard started on pole and led the majority of the race, losing his position once after the first of two pit stops.

There was no repeat performance of the 2010 controversy as Ferrari's Felipe Massa crashed on the first corner of the race with Romain Grosjean in Lotus and Bruno Senna in Williams.

Two time world champion, Sebastian Vettel, finished second in the Redbull car but was penalized

20 seconds for an illegal overtaking maneuver on Jenson Button, which dropped him down to fifth, moved Button up to second and Kimi Raikkonen third.

Alonso leads the current standings with 154 points, Webber is second with 120 points and Vettel is third with 110. Alonso has admitted that the title race is wide open.

Hamilton managed to unlap himself from Vettel, who accused him of ruining his chances of catching Alonso. Hamilton started to chase Alonso down in order to

unlap himself before mechanical problems forced him to retire with 11 laps remaining.

This weekend's grand prix is in Budapest, Hungary. Jenson Button will be aiming to kick on from a positive race in Germany that showed the Mclaren is starting to race a bit quicker and the car could be in contention over the remaining 10 races.

Alonso has won 3 races so far this season, and with 25 points left to go for first place, there is still so much to race for.





Heads up: Islanders reinforced

Seven quality players added to payroll to help Phuket FC climb up the league table in season's second half

PHUKET FC fans, players and executives are all looking towards the second half of the 2012 season, with the onset of a strategic mid-season overhaul, highlighted by a series of transfers and new signings.

The Islanders concluded the season's first half last Sunday with a scoreless draw at home against Songkhla FC, leaving some 2,100 fans at Surakul Stadium content, yet ever eager for the ensuing changes.

The highly anticipated makeover follows three back-to-back losses early in July that

settled the squad firmly into the five-team relegation-zone of the Thai league's first division (Thai Yamaha One).

Coach Milos Joksic's subsequent resignation in mid July was followed by departure announcements from former team captain Suphat Angthong and star Brazilian keeper, Alonso Da Silva.

Suphat returned to his home town to play for league leaders Ratchaburi Mitrphol FC, while Alonso announced his intention to sign with struggling premier league side, Samut Songkhram FC.

Also joining the Islander's outgoing list, with relatively lesser fanfare, were a handful of midfielders including Ivorianr Bamba Messi, Korean Kim Wonsup and Thais, Rachapak Duang-Fa and Supanon Prang-jun. Nonetheless, Phuket's new coach,

Narong "Noi" Ajarayut, a former national team defender and coach, was determined to prove himself in his first two matches this past week – in home and away fixtures against Southern powerhouse Songkhla FC.

In the moments leading up to the home fixture on Sunday, striker Wacharapong Jun-ngam was announced as the new captain, while the new coach, along with four of the seven new signings were introduced to Phuket's eager fans.

These include Wanmai Setthanun, defender from SCG Muangthong United, Kampol Pathom-attakul, goalkeeper from SCG Muangthong United; Roland "Pato" Vargas, a Bolivian midfielder who last played for PTT

> Rayong, and Boas Chun, midfielder from Korea, formerly with Patthalung.

The new players did not officially debut until Wednesday's awayfixture, played at Jira Nakorn Stadium in Haad Yai, when three additional signings were revealed. These include Nontaphon Jiensathawong Nawaphon Tontrasenee,

Thai defenders from Muangthong, as well as midfielder Yutthana Jongnok, formerly with Suphanburi FC.

But even without the new reinforcements on Sunday, the Islanders faired okay.

Indeed, it was hard to tell that the 15th placed Islanders were the underdogs against 8th placed Songkhla. Both current keeper, Da Silva, and former Phuket keeper, Jonathan Matijas, now playing for Songkhla, were put firmly to the test, managing to
