National Park gets '10 for 10'

Parks chief threatens to demolish 10 resorts on Phuket's west coast if they cannot prove land was legally acquired

NATIONAL Parks, Wildlife and Plant Conservation Department (DNP) Director-General Damrong Phidet on Wednesday led raids on 10 resorts alleged to have encroached on national park land on Phuket's west coast.

The raids started in the afternoon with Mr Damrong leading 10 teams of investigators brought in from 10 different offices of the Royal Forest Department (RFD) from across Thailand.

Mr Damrong refused to allow any officers from the RFD office in Phuket to take part in the raids.

In total, 400 to 600 rai of land is under investigation, all bordering – or encroaching on – Phuket's Sirinath Marine National Park.

The 10 teams simultaneously raided the 10 resorts, with Mr Damrong personally leading a team of officers from the RFD Chiang Mai office to inspect the boundaries of the Trisara resort, north of Layan Beach.

Mr Damrong asked to see the *Chanote* title deeds for the 140 rai of land that the resort is built on.

Trisara Human Resources Director Nares Srinark explained that he did not have the title deed on hand at that time, but said that he remembered that the *Chanote* title...

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deed for the entire plot was issued

To this, Mr Damrong replied, "The National Parks, Wildlife and Plant Conservation Department stopped issuing *Chanote* titles for land in this area after 1964. Any land that has a Chanote issued after 1964 we consider to have been illegally obtained."

Mr Damrong said the Trisara management company, the Three Dolphins Company Limited (Trisara Resort), had 30 days to present to the Phuket Provincial Court documentary evidence to prove that the Chanote in question was legally issued.

"If the evidence provided is found insufficient to prove that the Chanote was legally issued, we will order the buildings to be removed because it is on national park land," he warned.

Seemingly put on the spot by the unspoken question of why the Chanote for the 140 rai was issued in 1994. Trisara's Mr Nares told the Gazette, "I cannot give the exact answer at this time. The Chanote itself shows it was issued in 1994, but I am not sure when the resort owner bought the land."

Mr Damrong has built a reputation for taking the demolition of

long-established resorts seriously. On July 28, he ordered an estimated 3,000 DNP officers to demolish nine resorts deemed to be within the boundaries of Thab Lan National Park in Nakhon Ratchasima and Prachin Buri.

However, he is now facing an inquiry into the demolition of those nine resorts. The results of the inquiry are due to be released within the coming week.

Among the other resorts, villa developments or management companies under investigation for allegedly encroaching on Sirinath National Park were named in Thai as: Phuket Peninsular Spa & Resort (under investigation by the Sri Racha RFD); Central & City Development Co Ltd (Surat Thani RFD); Landstate Co Ltd (Nakhon Sri Thammarat RFD); Suchada Sangsuwan (Songkhla RFD); Andaman White Beach (Nakhon Rachasima RFD); Suree Samlit Co Ltd (Khon Kaen RFD); Pavilions Beach Resort Co Ltd (Phitsanulok RFD); La Colline villa development (Phrae RFD); and Layan Phuket Co Ltd (Trat RFD).

"All of the resorts investigated today are now officially asked to cease all construction for 30 days... If any of the resorts continue with any building, I will file for a court order to suspend all construction," Mr Damrong said.

Police close case on death of German expat woman

POLICE have closed their investigation into the death of German woman in Phuket last Friday following the request of the husband, who has accepted that she died from cardiac arrest.

Angelika Geibler, 60, was found dead by her husband at their home in Rawai on Friday morning.

"She was retired and had been living in Phuket with her husband for years," Lt Col Ekkasit Pinkaew, an Inspector with the Chalong Police, told the Gazette.

"In his statement to police, the husband explained that the couple went out with friends on Thursday night."

"They went to bed as usual," said Col Ekkasit.

Officers found no signs of struggle or robbery, he said.

"Her husband told us that Mrs Geibler had been suffering from an ongoing medical condition... We have yet to receive a report from Vachira Hospital establishing the cause of death, but her husband has accepted her death as being caused by a heart attack. He has no questions about it," Col Ekkasit explained.

"Since he has no questions about her death, there will be no autopsy," he added.

Old Town facelift 90% done

PHASE two of the 39-million-baht project to bury central Phuket Town's electricity mains cables is more than 90 per cent complete, said Phuket City Municipal Mayor Somjai Suwansupana on Monday.

Provincial Electricity Authority (PEA) has already finished burying the electricity mains cable on Krabi and Deebuk Roads. They are now focused on burying the mains supply along sections of Thepkrasattri and Phuket Roads, after which the obsolete concrete poles will be removed.

"PEA has just removed the power poles on one side of Thepkrasattri Road, but the main power poles haven't been removed yet... As soon as the PEA finishes their work we can start paving the road," explained Mayor Somjai.

Once phase two of the plan is completed, the PEA will begin bury-

ing the mains along Yaowarat Road.

'We have already improved the scenery on many roads. As soon as the whole project is done, Phuket Old Town will look more beautiful and will attract more

tourists," said Mayor Somjai.

The project to bury Old Phuket's electricity supply is jointly funded by the PEA and the Phuket City Municipality.

FOLLOWING the July 31 highprofile raid on a resort under construction on Rang Noi Island, off Phuket's east coast, the Natural Resources and Environmental Crime Suppression Unit (NREC) has pressed charges against the developers for encroaching onto protected forest land.

Kan Krao Company and Bridge Rang Noi Company were both charged on August 9 with "possession [of] forest [land] without permission".

Superintendent of NREC Region 5, Pol Col Watcharin Pusit, on August 10 told the Gazette, "At the expiry of the seven-day deadline, neither company had presented to us any documentary evidence to support the validity of the Chanote title deed covering the 15 rai of land in question.

"The charge against the two companies is that, contrary to the Forestry Act of 1941, they have 'misappropriated' about four rai of forest land that is not included in the Chanote'," explained Col Watcharin.

Homesick Burmese thief caught with stolen gold

POLICE arrested a Burmese man on August 9 who robbed a gold shop in Karon the previous evening and made off with nearly two kilograms of solid gold, despite being shot by the shop owner.

Burmese national Lacheman Kumar, 19, was arrested at his home in Patak Rd Soi 10 in Karon, where he lived with his father, mother and girlfriend.

The arrest came after police officers keeping the house under surveillance spotted Mr Lacheman returning home on foot at about 11am that morning.

In his statement to police, Mr Lacheman confessed to the robbery

which he carried out at about 7:30pm on August 8. He said he planned and carried out the crime alone.

"I went to watch the gold shop twice on Tuesday [August

7]; I just wanted the money to go back to Burma," he said.

Mr Lacheman explained that after the robbery, he drove to a rubber plantation in Rawai, where he dumped the motorbike and hid among the trees until about 5am the following morning.

"When I saw no one around I started walking home," he said.

"My girlfriend rented the motorbike, but she had no idea I was going to use it to rob the gold shop," he added.

Chalong Police Superintendent Sirisak Wasasiri thanked the Nepalese community for their help in catching Mr Lacheman.

"Without their help we might not have caught him within 17 hours of the crime," he said.

A search of Mr Lacheman revealed that he was carrying just one of the many necklaces he made off with from the Thong Thai Gold Shop in Karon.

Still missing are necklaces comprising 10-bahtweight of gold (a Thai standard of one bahtweight equaling 15.1 grams of raw gold) valued at about 245,000 baht.

Shop owner Papan Aummaratta on the night of the heist told police that Mr Lacheman came into his shop and asked to see items graded as having five-bahtweight in gold.

"The man said he was shopping for a marriage proposal gift for his

girlfriend, but he asked to try on too many items at once, which made me suspicious," Mr Papan explained.

"So without him knowing, I pressed

the button to remotely lock the door. Soon after that, he demanded that I give him the gold, and he reached into his backpack. I thought he was going to pull out a gun, so I shot," said Mr Papan.

"Then I fired another shot as a warning," he added.

Mr Lacheman begged Mr Papan for his life and to be set free, but as Mr Papan put down his gun, Mr Lacheman escaped with two trays of necklaces totaling a 1.963 kilograms of solid gold.

Spilling gold from the trays as he fled, the injured Mr Lacheman managed to get to his motorbike only to realize he was unable to

drive and carry the two trays at the same time.

Leaving one tray behind, he rode away with the other carrying items comprising 453g of gold.

Police at the scene were able to hand back to Mr Papan the 1.51kg of gold that had either fallen from the trays or been discarded by the thief in his attempt to get away.

With Mr Lacheman in custody,

police learned that the teenager suffered only a minor injury to his right wrist.

Evidence recovered from the scene consisted of a hammer and a backpack, both belonging to Mr Lacheman. A search of the backpack revealed a knife, a replica gun and a Myanmar Ministry of Labor - Overseas Worker identification card in the name of Lacheman Kumar, age 19.

Swedes murder trial postponed

SWEDISH nationals Johan Sebastian Ljung and Tommy Viktor Soderlund, who confessed to killing Maksim Schantz by stabbing him in the neck on August 1 last year, appeared at Phuket Provincial Court on Tuesday.

However, as multiple witnesses necessary to the case failed to present themselves at the court. the judge reconvened the trial for 9:30am November 2. Prosecutor Aeknara Luangsanam told the Gazette on Wednesday that he would be applying for subpoenas to bring in witnesses for the next trial date.

After the adjournment was handed down, Ljung and Soderlund, who are being held at Phuket Provincial Prison until the trial concludes, were immediately returned to the prison.

The pair on August 2 last year confessed to attacking and stabbing Mr Schantz, but claimed they did not intend to kill him.

The men earlier in court pleaded not guilty to the charges of conspiracy to murder and robbery, said Mr Aeknara.

esort workers, locals in Phi Phi Island cleanup

ISLAND residents and local resort staff on Koh Phi Phi Don teamed up for a mass beach cleanup on August 12, removing more than 100 trash bags worth of rubbish that had washed ashore.

Local residents together with more than 45 staff from the Holiday Inn Resort Phi Phi Island tackled the rising tide of trash at Lanah Bay, one of the key beach attractions in the area.

One of the resort staffers explained to the Gazette that the trash was first noticed about two months ago, and was steadily getting worse.

Other picturesque sites affected by the "foul flotsam" are Maya Bay on Phi Phi Lei Island and Nui Bay.

"We learned about the extent of the problem from guests, and some of our team members had already seen the amount of trash washing ashore firsthand," said the resort staffer.

Asked what equipment was used to carry out the huge cleanup effort at Lanah Bay, the staffer replied: "Hands. Lots of hands. It took a lot of manpower."

The Holiday Inn resort on Phi Phi Don was given permission to burn off all combustible natural debris, but all plastic, including plastic bags, as well as glass and other non-combustibles were taken back to the hotel.

"All the trash [that could not be burned off] will be shipped to Phuket on our oncea-week garbage boat run for separation and recycling at the Phuket Incinerator," the staffer explained.

'We do not know where the rubbish is coming from. People say it is seasonal, with the trash arriving in May through October," she explained.

"Local people say that more and more trash washes ashore each year. We have even seen a vortex of oil and dead fish with bags, sponges, shoes – all sorts of rubbish mixed in.

"Some people say the trash is dumped overboard by boats, some say it is washed

from beach to beach, others say it is local villagers dumping it into the sea," she added.

According to local reports, there is no municipal trash site on the island, "only a couple of privately owned incinerators", the Gazette was told.

Despite the huge effort last Sunday, it was impossible to remove all the trash from the sands.

"Some items, especially plastic bags, have been buried under the sand by the waves and changing tides. So despite our best efforts, we could not remove every item of trash from the beach," the resort staffer added.

PMBC renews efforts to halt oil dumping at sea

THE Phuket Marine Biological Center (PMBC) has put dumping oil into the sea back at the top of their agenda after two oil-soaked turtles were rescued in the past two months

Kongkiat Kittiwattanawong, head of the Marine Endangered Species Unit at the PMBC, has called on all involved organizations to step up their efforts to identify the source of the oil and put a stop to it being dumped.

"Once dumped in the water, the oil spreads and prevents sunlight from penetrating the water's surface. This factor alone has a significant, negative impact on the marine ecosystem," Mr Kongkiat explained.

During the past two months alone, PMBC officers have res-

cued two Pacific Ridley turtles that landed on beaches in Phuket and Phang Nga. Not only were these turtles suffering injuries from fishing nets, they were also covered in oil

"The oil covered the animals' entire bodies and was in their mouths and covering their gums," he explained.

Mr Kongkiat called on fishermen to cooperate with his office's efforts to preserve the marine environment and stop pouring used engine oil into the ocean.

The renewed call by the PMBC comes in the wake of a large oil spill damaging several kilometers of Krabi coast last month, and the recent oil staining of one kilometer of Lo Dalam Beach on Koh Phi Phi.

Chinese Envoy: Stop the drownings

THE drowning deaths of two Chinese tourists in just two days last week has prompted Wu Xiufeng, the Songkhla-based Consul of the People's Republic of China, to appeal for tour companies to exercise greater caution and take more responsibility for the safety of their customers.

The call for an improved attitude towards the safety of tourists follows the deaths of Huang Pei Ying, 58, and Ji Xiaqions, 41, on August 7 and 8, respectively.

Both women were found dead, floating face down, while snorkeling with other tourists. Ms Huang was on a snorkeling tour off Koh Racha Yai, about 25 kilometers south of Phuket, while Ms Ji died during a snorkeling tour off Koh Hei (Coral Island), about 5km south of Phuket.

"Tour agencies must take care and teach customers how to use snorkeling equipment properly," Mr Wu told the *Gazette*.

"We have posted warnings on our website. Chinese tourists must be careful when playing or doing any activities in the sea," he said.

"Also, elderly people and tourists with health issues should not go into the sea to prevent taking any unnecessary risks," Consul Wu added.

Chalong Police Deputy Superintendent Boonlert Onklang told the *Gazette* that his officers will not be continuing their investigations into the death of Ms Huang.

"The tour guide, Somjit Saetun, told me that she noticed the Chinese woman [Ms Huang] was not moving, so she went to check on her, but she was already dead," Lt Col Boonlert told the Gazette.

"A rescue foundation workers brought her body to Vachira Phuket Hospital to verify the cause of death. The doctors there determined that she died as a result of drowning," said Col Boonlert.

"I asked other tourists on the same snorkeling trip and they said they didn't notice anything unusual. They thought she was snorkeling because she was floating face down," Col Boonlert explained.

"No one said they knew anything about a pre-existing medical condition and no one reported seeing anything suspicious where they were snorkeling," he added.

Regarding the death of Ms Ji, Chalong Police Inspector Aekasit Pinkaew said, "The victim's relatives told me that the woman had a medical condition and that she suffered from low blood pressure. Doctors believe that her body went into shock while she was snorkeling."

The deaths of Ms Huang and Ms Ji follow Chinese snorkeler Jin Giuping being found floating face down by her husband during a snorkeling tour near Koh Racha Yai on July 7.

However, quick action by tour guides and the Royal Thai Navy resulted in a helicopter rescue that saved her life.

On June 30, 19-year-old Chinese tourist Tianqi Li drowned at Patong Beach after going for a night swim with a female friend. His female companion was saved.

In February, 57-year-old Xianmei Wang was found floating off of Koh Hei after drowning.

Also in February, tourist Wang Fang drowned while snorkeling with friends off

the Hong Islands (Koh Lao Bileh) in Krabi.

Thailand is experiencing a surge in the number Chinese tourists visiting the Kingdom, which now tops the list in terms of the number of visitors a year.

According to the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT), 1,124,234 Chinese tourists visited Thailand between January and June this year, up 28.9 per cent compared with the same period last year.

Kritcharoen Roogmongkolnam of the Phuket Tourist Association's Chinese and Taiwan marketing committee estimates that more than 400,000 Chinese tourists visited Phuket last year.

This year that figure has already been surpassed.

"We presume that by the end of this year it will be more than 700,000," Mr Kritcharoen said.

New UK Ambassador Mark Kent starts work

AMBASSADOR Mark Andrew Geoffrey Kent has taken up the position of British Ambassador to the Kingdom of Thailand and Non-Resident Ambassador to the Lao People's Democratic Republic.

Mr Kent succeeds Asif Ahmad, who relinquished the post on August 10. He is returning to the United Kingdom to prepare for his next, as yet undeclared, diplomatic service appointment.

Ambassador Kent joined the Foreign and Commonwealth Office in 1987 and has spent a considerable amount of his career involved in diplomacy within Southeast Asia, Latin America and the European Union.

On confirmation of his appointment in February Mr Kent said, "I am honored to be given the opportunity to serve again in Southeast Asia. Relations with the rising powers of this region are important for the UK's future prosperity, Thailand is the second largest economy in Asean and trade and investment will be high on my agenda."

Mr Kent insisted that consular work with UK tourists and residents will also be a priority.

Speaking of his diplomatic mission, Mr Kent reiterated that the UK aims to play a constructive role with both countries in "helping to create a political, social and economic environment which is

conducive to fostering further growth in trade, investment, tourism and enhancing our wider relationship, as well as encouraging a strong role within Asean and on wider global issues."

Mr Ahmad, at his last official function, spoke at a dinner in Pattaya held by the British Chamber of Commerce.

The outgoing ambassador expressed his concerns about Thailand becoming a "Costa Del Crime" for certain elements of the British expatriate community.

"While British police are gearing up to deal with villains who are re-settling here there's little they can do about those who commit crimes against fellow countrymen here and who rely people of 'local influence' to keep them out of Thai jails," he said.

Drunken takraw match turns deadly

A DRUNKEN takraw match, the game of "foot volleyball" using a rattan ball, got out of hand in Rayong last week after construction workers bet their own wives during the game.

A fight broke out and one member of the group pulled out a gun, which went off, hitting a 27-year-old woman in the neck. Wassana Thianthaisong died later in the hospital.

Around 7.30pm on August 11, Inspector Thanit Seniwong Na Ayutthaya of the Rayong Police received word that someone had died in Bangkok Hospital Rayong after being shot.

He rushed to the scene, a workers' camp behind the Banyan Terrace condominium building under construction in Nernphra Subdistrict. At the scene he found four 9mm bullet casings next to the project office. He also found 49-year-old Khamphon Manirat, managing director of the company developing the project, holding a gun. He was deathly pale.

Mr Khamphon told police he had killed Mrs Wassana, who was his niece and worked for the company in the accounts department.

Before the incident, the project's electricians and plumbers were playing the builders at *takraw*. Mr Khamphon said the workers were very drunk and had bet their wives as "prizes" for the winners of the game. He said that he thought the "bets" were too much and suggested that the losers of the game have a fight instead.

An argument broke out and the construction workers moved to attack him, so he pulled out a gun.

He fired two shots into the air to scare them off, but one electrician, 30-year-old Tan Bunthong, tried to pull the gun off him.

In the melée, the weapon fired again, hitting Ms Wassana in the neck as she sat working in the office. She was rushed to hospital but died of her injuries.

Ukrainian child pornography suspect faces 500 years jail

THE trial of a Ukrainian man arrested in Phuket and recently extradited to the United States for his alleged involvement in the international distribution of child pornography over the internet has been postponed to November.

Maksym Shynkarenko, 33 at the time of his arrest, was taken into custody at his luxury villa in Chalong in January 2009 through the collaborative efforts of the Phuket Tourist Police, the US Immigration and Customs Enforcement Agency (ICE) and the US Department of Homeland Security (HSI).

Since his extradition, however, the District Attorney's Office of New Jersey has reported that Shynkarenko was charged with 32 federal offenses, including advertising child "adult content", running a child exploitation enterprise, and money laundering.

According to the Indictment, Shynkarenko handed over tens of thousands of pictures and videos containing images of children, ranging in age from infants to teenagers, being sexually assaulted and abused. The images were submitted by subscribers to his child hardcore sex sites.

"Shyknarenko's extradition from Thailand to a New Jersey courtroom is a milestone in one of our most important fights 'keeping our children safe from harm'," said US Attorney Paul Fishman.

Shyknarenko allegedly operated a network of websites with names including "Illegal.CP," "The Sick Child Room," "Hottest Childporn Garden" and "Pedo Heaven".

Though the websites allegedly had customers worldwide, the investigation has already led to 560 convictions in the US, making it "the most successful child XXX content investigation in the nation's history."

US ICE and HSI agents first located the site Illegal.CP in October 2005.

"The banner page of the site identified it as 'Illegal.CP,' featur-

ing more than a dozen images of minors engaged in sexual acts with other minors and adults, and proclaimed, '[n]ow you are in [sic] few minutes away from the best children porn site on the net!' and '[i]f you join this site you will get tons of uncensored forbidden pics... forbidden stories, and, of course, many videos'. The page also featured purported feedback from a self-described pedophile who praised the website," read a New Jersey District Attorney's Office press release.

Upon accessing the "Illegal.CP" website, the initial page warned

subscribers as follows:

FAQ, Please read. "Our site is considered to be illegal in all countries.... Even if you ever have problems with police, you can always say that someone had stolen the information from your credit card and used it. It is very difficult to establish that you were the person to pay."

The subsequent investigation of subscribers to "Illegal.CP" led to the arrests of numerous individuals who were actively molesting children, read the press release.

Federal authorities say those convicted included teachers, clergy, law enforcement officers, lawyers, doctors, coaches and others who came into regular contact with minors.

"Distributors and consumers of child pornography create a market for sexual assaults on children, where the victimization of those children is refreshed with every download," US Attorney Fishman said

Shynkarenko has entered a plea of not guilty to all charges against him. Foreign Ministry spokesman Oleksandr Dikusarov said on June 12 that Ukrainian investigators "did not find anything" that would constitute a crime in Shynkarenko's actions, reported AP.

However, if Shynkarenko is found guilty on all counts, he faces more than 500 years of imprisonment and millions of dollars in fines.

Fireball engulfs Yacht Haven Marina workshop

POLICE believe that children playing with fireworks may have accidentally started a fire that destroyed a workshop at Yacht Haven Marina on Monday night.

Prai Junnoo, a 33-year-old security guard at the marina, reported the fire at about 9pm.

Firefighters from the Mai Khao Tambon Administration Organization and the Thepkrasattri Municipality fire brigades arrived swiftly and took 30 minutes to extinguish the blaze.

A strong overnight breeze

fanned the flames, hampering their efforts to extinguish the blaze.

Adding to their woes, 500 liters of gasoline stored in the workshop exploded, the fireball destroying the building and everything within it, including electronic marine items, engine oil and yacht ropes.

The *Gazette* was told that the building would also have contained oxygen cylinders and other materials used for welding.

Police estimate the damage at about 5 million baht.

No foul practices at chicken, pig farm

AN INSPECTION of a chicken and pig farm led by Phuket Vice Governor Somkiet Sangkaosuttirak has resulted in several recommendations for the farm owners to follow, but otherwise found nothing untoward other than the foul odor emanating from the site

The inspection follows residents at the The Valley 2 housing estate filing a group complaint with the Damrongtham Center (Ombudsman's Office) at Provincial Hall about the stench from the farm and allegations that the

farm's operations were contaminating local waterways.

After receiving the complaint, Vice Governor Somkiet and officials last Tuesday inspected the Thaweephan Phuket Farm in Srisoonthorn.

Accompanied by the farm's animal caretaker, Joompol Rook-karungsri, the inspection team were shown around the facility, which included tours of the pig breeding section, chicken farm, animal slurry and bio-gas processing plant.

After the inspection, officials

retired to the cleaner environment of Srisoonthorn Municipality offices to discuss the findings.

Thaweephan Phuket Farm manager Wutthichai Boonkua, said, "We have been working on animal stool problem. We pulled down the farm that was near the road and closed parts of the chicken farm. There are now only two open-shed farms.

"Once the chickens are no longer laying eggs, those two farms will be decommissioned. Only the pig farm will remain."

THE Phuket Pineapple Fair running daily until August 22 kicked off at 5pm on Wednesday at Saphan Hin Park in Phuket Town.

"It's not just pineapples. There are all kinds of fruit, flowers and other agricultural products," Phuket Agricultural chief Winai Khankaew told the *Gazette*.

In addition to venders selling a variety of produce, the fruity festivities will include an agricultural product competition.

Though produce and vendors have rolled in from neighboring provinces, the vast majority is coming from Phuket, specifically Thalang, said Mr Winai.

Phuket safe from Sumatra smog, say officials

AN EXPERT at the Phuket Provincial Health Office on Wednesday confirmed that no health warning has been issued for Phuket following Sumatra fire-related smog covering Southern Thailand.

"Phuket is not affected by the smog from Sumatra, so we have yet to issue a smog warning," Health officer Walapa Jeenloy confirmed to the *Gazette*.

"There are some other provinces effected by the smog, such as Satun, Songkla, Yala, Pattani, but Phuket is safe," she added.

The news follows the Public Health Ministry on Tuesday warning residents of the four southern provinces to temporarily stop exercising outdoors.

Although, air quality in the southern provinces is now considered acceptable, children, elderly people and patients with allergies, heart disease and asthma were cautioned to be careful.

If they needed to go outdoors, the ministry urged them to wear clinical masks or cover noses and mouths with slightly wet cloths.

Public Health Minister Witthaya Buranasiri said the ministry had delivered 50,000 clinical masks to the four provinces affected, as well as Phuket. Each was given 10,000 masks to hand out to their residents.

Protest pressures police to re-open crash probe

A PROTEST staged in front of Chalong Police Station on Monday has prompted Chalong Police to reopen their investigation into a traffic accident in which a 16-year-old boy died the previous day.

About 20 people, including the aggrieved father, Sompong Saemin, friends and family, gathered in front of the police station at about 10am.

According to the police report, Weerachat Sae-min, a first-year commerce student at Phuket Technology College, died "as a result of his motorbike hitting a roadside power pole" near the PTT gas station south of Chalong Temple on Chao Fa West Road.

One of Weerachat's friends survived the accident, and is now recovering from his injuries at Vachira Phuket Hospital.

Mr Sompong told the press that he refused to accept the results of the police investigation.

"First of all, my son's friend said that my son did not die because he hit a power pole. He died because his head hit the road.

"He told me that a pickup truck cut them off, causing my son to lose control of the bike. That's what caused them to fall on the ground and my son's head to hit the road," Mr Sompong said.

The police questioned the pickup driver, but let him go, saying that the driver had nothing to do with it, Mr Sompong alleged.

"I spoke with a witness, a motorbike taxi driver, who confirmed he saw a dent in the

pickup, so he wrote down the license plate number. That's how the police even knew which person to bring in for questioning about the accident," Mr Sompong explained.

He added that if his son's motorbike hit the power pole, the headlight would show some sign of damage. However, the only significant damage to the bike was a buckled front wheel.

Lt Col Boonlert of Chalong Police, the investigating officer in the case, told the *Gazette*, "We questioned the pickup driver, but the man was adamant that he did involved in an accident.

"As we had no legal reason to hold him, we let him go," he said.

"But now that we have heard from an independent eye-witness, we will investigate these claims by questioning the boy who survived the accident, and we will bring the pickup driver back in for more questioning," Col Boonlert said.

"We will also contact the Phuket provincial branch of the Office of Forensic Science for assistance in our investigation," he added.

"If we find evidence that the driver did cause the accident, we will press charges."

However, Col Boonlert did not name the driver and did not offer an explanation as to why police were now investigating further when they were aware of the independent eye-witness during their initial investigation.

Also, Mr Sompong did not confirm whether or not his son was wearing a helmet at the time of the accident or if he was carrying a valid motorbike driver's license.





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Helmet saves man's life on death bend

A HIGH-quality crash helmet is credited with sparing a minibike enthusiast from critical injury after he lost control and crashed at one of Phuket's most notorious traffic accident blackspots late evening of August 9.

News of the crash was reported to Phuket Kusoldharm Foundation rescue workers at 11:30pm.

At the scene, on Thepkrasattri Road northbound in Srisoonthorn, they found a 150cc Kawasaki minibike on the pavement, with 29-year-old local resident Noppon Petchluan lying on the median strip nearby covered with blood.

Mr Noppon was taken to Thalang Hospital, where doctors discovered that his most serious injury was a fractured left arm.

Friends of Mr Noppon said they were out for a late-night ride on their minibikes when they realized Mr Noppon had dropped behind.

When they went back to investigate, they saw that he had crashed and immediately called for help through the Narinthorn Andaman emergency call number: 1669.

A rescue worker at the scene said it was quite likely that the high-quality, full-face crash helmet Mr Noppon was wearing at the time probably saved him from very serious injury, or possible death.

The site of the crash was just meters from where 15-year-old Kajonkietsuksa student Wanchai Saeksan died in a similar crash in early July. He was not wearing a helmet at the time.

Officials silent over baby elephant DNA test results

DNA test results expected to determine the legality of three baby elephants seized from camps in Phuket, said to be announced in the first week of June, have yet to be released, confirmed the Regional Natural Resources and **Environment Crime Suppression** Division on August 10.

On May 31, Watcharin Phusit, the superintendent of the regional Natural Resources and Environment Crime Suppression Division, told the Gazette, "We were informed by the general inspector that the results of the DNA tests will be revealed next week."

The results will determine who the baby elephants' mothers are, which will help prove if the baby elephants were legally obtained or not.

On August 10, however, more than two months after the expected announcement, Col Watcharin told the Gazette that he was still waiting on the DNA

Col Watcharin had previously told the Gazette that he "had no idea" what was causing the delay. He explained that his depart-

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

Powering Phuket to 'fossil fuel free'

FIRST PERSON

AS PHUKET relies on tourism, it is important to keep the island beautiful. However, if we are unable to control the amount of pollution on the island, its magnificence will fade.

I started the "Phuket Green" project as soon as I took office as the Phuket Provincial Energy Office chief more than three years ago. The project has three main focuses: environmental protection, alternative energy production and fossil-fuel usage reduction.

At the moment, we are focusing our efforts on making the smaller islands of Koh Lone and Koh Racha Yai fossil-fuel free.

Once we have alternativeenergy projects established on these islands, we can bring our projects ashore to Phuket. Just those two islands running on alternative-energy sources would make our province Thailand's number-one producer of alternative energy.

The "Fossil Fuel Free" project was started about two years ago and was approved by the former Minister of Energy Wannarat Channukul, who came to Phuket and signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Phuket Provincial Office.

There are only about 50 households on Koh Lone, which are able to produce only four hours of electricity a day with generators. One generator is generally shared by four households, which have agreed to use it between 6pm and 10pm. Even this costs each household about 2,000 baht each month.



Jirasak Thummavet, aged 58, is the chief of the Phuket Provincial Energy Office. Originally hailing from Phang Nga, Mr Jirasak has a master's degree in Public Administration from the National Institute of Development Administration (NIDA). Here, he talks about his push for alternative energy projects in Phuket.

Seeing this, we realized that we needed to find a way for them to produce enough electricity to allow them usage all day. This would allow students to take part in the Distance Learning Program, which is a program from the Ministry of Education that provides satellite-fed education programs to rural areas.

Already, we have two solar panels on the island. And with the 2-million-baht budget provided this year by the Phuket Provincial Office, we will install two wind turbines and another two solar panels.

Recently, we identified a water source on Koh Lone that could be used to produce power with a hydroelectric dam.

We had officers from Department of Alternative Energy Development and Efficiency survey the stream and draw up a plan.

However, we didn't have the budget for the project so we asked for donations from private companies, which helped by raising 1.7mn baht.

With villagers volunteering their time, we are going to start building the dam on August 27.

Sometime next fiscal year we will install hydroelectric generators, which will produce six kilowatts of electricity a day.

We have requested an additional 18mn baht from the Ministry of Energy to complete the project.

We are also establishing projects on Koh Racha so that island can be included in our "Fossil Fuel Free" concept.

We will request that some funds from the Energy Conservation Promotion Fund be invested in the project and then we will have the hotel owners on Koh Racha Yai repay us.

There is an expected investment of about 300mn baht in Koh Racha's alternative energy project, which will eventually produce two megawatts of electricity a day.

Another interesting project we are working on deals with the channel under Sarasin Bridge. We have requested the Phuket Marine Department Office conduct a year-long survey of the current in the channel to see whether or not it's feasible to produce electricity from it.

Support a cure for cancer that works

MY AUNT-IN-LAW's cancer – initially thought cured – has returned with a vengeance, spreading to multiple vital organs at an ever-worrisome rate.

When tests late last year first detected the cancer in her abdominal region, she was immediately transferred from Phuket to Haad Yai. There she underwent radiation therapy, yielding a hopeful prognosis; the cancer was gone, so everyone thought. But late last month, when she was overcome by fatigue and migraines her doctor decided to immediately send her back to Haad Yai.

The cancer has now spread to her lungs and parts of her brain, and doctors don't seem very confident that the current radiation sessions will be effective, let alone

if her body will even survive such sustained radioactive trauma for a second time.

Like many others, at first I was skeptical to learn that there is and has always been a natural cure for cancer. This cure, I found

out, is administered orally in the form of an oil extracted from one of the most popular yet controversially illegal flowering herbs. Unfortunately, the cannabis plant has been illegitimately criminalized throughout much of the world for the last eight decades.

What the Harvard Division of Experimental Medicine and others in the scientific community are just starting to openly concur as being an effective treatment and preventative line against cancer – not merely just pain relief – has in fact been used to cure and prevent all types of illnesses for

Sharing a bespoke physiological bond with humans, this herb is the only known source on the planet of special compounds called cannabinoids that, when introduced into the human endocannabinoid system (our body's super regulatory system that maintains homeostasis in other systems), have the ability to terminate cancerous cells, while protecting and preserving healthy cells. Mayoral election is over, but yesterday's faces remain

Kittipong Thiengkunakrit, Phuket Election Commission Director, replies:

There are no such regulations that give a deadline for the removal of election signs.

If the candidates do not remove their own signs after the election, it becomes the responsibility of the Local Administration Organization (*OrBorTor*) or municipality to remove them.

Med visas for Middle Easterners to have no impact on local sector

A NEW regulation to allow medical tourists from six Middle-eastern countries to enter Thailand on a 90day Visa-On-Arrival (VOA), will have little impact on Phuket's medical tourism industry, representatives from two international hospitals on the island have concurred.

Upon ratification of the amendment, recently approved by cabinet, 90-day VOAs will be available to nationals of Bahrain, Kuwait, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates, provided the patients can show proof of their medical appointment in Thailand.

The intention to amend the visa laws, which previously allowed 15-30 days for nationals of said countries, was initially announced by the Interior Ministry as part of the government's latest efforts to promote medical tourism.

Government Spokesperson Sansanee Nakphong, who last week announced cabinet's approval of the measure, noted that the VOA will also extend to up to four companions accompanying the patient.

Asked to comment, the Director of Bangkok Hospital Phuket Director Narongrit Havarungsi said: "This new regulation will be a blessing for Middle Eastern tourists who need to come to Thailand to get treatment for complicated ailments such as heart disease and cancer, which require longer periods of treatment and recovery.

However, Dr Norngrit explained that such patients tend to go to Bangkok, whereas the Middle Eastern medical tourists

that come to Phuket tend to seek Australia and Europe. out less complex procedures.

"The third quarter [July-September] is the peak time for them [Middle Eastern tourists] to come to Phuket, and they are mostly getting treated for fevers, stomache aches and minor accidents - requiring relatively less time for recovery."

Dr Narngrit pointed out that Phuket's medical tourism niche is for cosmetic surgery, eye operations and dentistry, of which the primary source markets are in

"We do not cater to the Middle East market in Phuket," he said.

At the time of comment, Peter was in in Australia coordinating a roadshow to promote medical tourism in that market.

"My hospital and our partner agencies are currently placing around 15,000 hotel room nights per year, not a small amount," he added.



THAI cancels LCC plans

PLAGUED by financial losses, Thai Airways International (THAI) has decided to drop plans to establish a low-cost carrier (LCC) airline by 2013.

The chairman of the board, Ampon Kittiampon, confirmed on August 9 that, given the company's recent financial under-performance, launching a LCC would not be included in this year's strategic busi- THAI suffered heavy losses ness plan.

Dr Ampon told the press that he was unhappy with the airline's performance, which recorded a loss for the second quarter of 2012.

"From now, THAI will spend more time improving its financial performance so that it returns to profitability after suffering losses of 10.2 billion baht last year," said Dr Ampon.

For the remainder of this year, THAI intends to focus on its sister company THAI Smile, which was launched early last month.

After three to six months of



operation, they will evaluate THAI Smile's performance, he said.

THAI Smile claims that its Bangkok-Macau route has a cabin factor satisfaction rating of more than 80 per cent.

One area of contention and a likely cause of friction among board members is the possibility of a restructuring of board membership.

However, the threatened reshuffle has not been welcomed by some factions of the board who are keen that their objections are taken seriously by the new leadership.

The board will also consider downsizing the firm's public relations department.

Looking further into the future, THAI's acting president and executive vice president, Chokchai Panyayong, said that it was essential for the national carrier to launch an LCC.

"Domestically and internationally the low-cost carrier market has seen continuous growth, a trend predicted [to] increase once ASEAN 2015 comes into being. Furthermore, the sister airline would strengthen the airline's role in the aviation industry," Mr Chokchai said.

THAI currently plans to task Nok Air, an LCC in which it holds a 49 % stake, to conduct research to identify potential business opportunities. If those findings are favorable, a THAI-Nok Air joint venture would be the next step, with THAI procuring a larger stake in Nok Air. - The Nation

Midyear tax filing deadline nears

Companies and individuals who generated income in Thailand during the first six months of 2012 – regardless of where or how payments were made – have until August 31 to file their midyear tax return. The *Gazette*'s Steven Layne reports.

THE Revenue Department website states: "A company [or individual] is obliged to estimate its annual net profit [or net income] as well as its tax liability and pay half of the estimated tax amount within two months after the end of the first six months of its accounting period. The prepaid tax is creditable against its annual tax liability."

In last week's Tax Tips article, we outlined the basic regulations and procedures for filing and paying income tax in Thailand, covering both Personal Income Tax (PIT) for individuals and Corporate Income Tax (CIT) for companies. In this follow-up, we will talk about Witholding Tax and move onto brackets for PIT and CIT.

WITHOLDING TAX (WT)

Most types of formal income in Thailand are subject to WT at source. This tax serves as a prepayment, later to be credited against tax liability upon filing their returns. Companies and individuals are required to pay or verify these withholdings to the revenue department twice a year. WT rates are based on the following:

For personal income, WT rates for general employment is 5-37%, depending on the amount; property rental and prizes 5%; ship rental charges 1%; service and Professional fees 3%; public entertainer renumeration 5% for Thai resident and 5-37% for non-resident, while WT for advertising fees is 2%.

For corporate income, the rates are: dividends 10%; interest 1%; royalties 3%; advertising fees 2%; services and professional fees are subject to 3% WT for companies with a permanent branch in Thailand and 5% for those without a Thailand branch; prizes is 5%.

Witholding tax certificates should be kept, copied and submitted when filing the half-year prepayment form (PND 94 for PIT and PND 51 for CIT). The midyear filing deadline is August 31, 2012, while the full year tax returns are due by March 29, 2013. Note that if one fails to file their midyear tax return, they will be subject to paying a small fine upon filing their full-year tax return.

TAX BRACKETS

Once you have determined all of your deductions and allowances, you are now ready to calculate how much of your income is taxable and which rates to apply. To determine which tax bracket you should apply, you have to calculate your Taxable Income (Ti) by subtracting the sum of Deductions (D) and Allowances (A) from one's Accessible Income (Ai). In other words, Ti = Ai – (D+A).

Tax rates in Thailand range from 0 to 37%. For PIT, the rates are progressive, To demonstrate, lets say that after subtracting all deductions and allowances, your Ti is exactly 500,000 baht. In Thailand, the first 150,000 baht of your Ti is exempt.

Therefore, only the remaining 350,000 baht would be subject to the bracket rate of 10%, or 35,000 baht. If less than this amount was withheld as shown on the respective PND or WT certificate, you will owe the difference. Likewise if more was withheld, you can expect the revenue department to write you a cheque equal to the amount of the surplus.

Moving up brackets, let's say your Ti is 600,000 baht. Accordingly, the first 150,000 baht is exempt, and the next 350,000 baht would be taxed at 10%, while the remaining 100,000 baht would be subject to a 20% rate, or 20,000 baht. In this example, the total tax

owed would be 55,000 baht (0+35,000+20,000).

Calculating CIT is similar. Though the rate is set at 30% for large companies, such as those listed on the Stock Exchange of Thailand, the tax rate is progressive, based on profit volume and the company category. For example, small companies are subject to only 15% CIT on their first million baht of net profit, 25% on the next two million and 30% on any net profit over three million baht.

Remember, for this midyear filing, you'll need to show or make payment for only half of your expected net income/profits.

When you are ready to file, no formal appointment is required at the Revenue Department. However, it is suggested that you get there early and allocate enough time for any potential delays. Finally, be sure to bring with you all the originals and copies of all your PND and/or WT certificates, as well as vital identification and verification documents.

ICT deals to generate B100mn

THE Software Industry Promotion Agency (SIPA) said it expects software developers to seal deals with local tourism operators worth as much as 100 million baht.

With an aim of stimulating the tourism industry through the integration of cutting edge Information and Communication Technology (ICT), the deals are anticipated to result from SIPA's Software Exhibition Roadshow that recently visited Phuket and eight other tourism 'hot spots' in Thailand.

The exhibition, titled "Cloud Studio: Tourism Solutions", was held

at the Royal Phuket City Hotel on August 8, with representatives from 20 tour operators participating.

The event featured seminars about cloud computing, networking and software demonstration exhibitions, allowing developers and operators to exchange knowledge.

Similar seminars were also held, or are scheduled to be held in Koh Samui, Bangkok, Khao Yai, Pattaya, Chiang Mai, Kanchanaburi and Udon Thani.

SIPA Deputy Director Prinya Krajangmol commented that the tourism industry is one of several primary industries which the Thai government aims to develop by integrating the latest in ICT to increase competitiveness and future revenue.

"The developers will demonstrate the capabilities of their software to tourism operators – the target group. When the operators are aware of all the benefits and practicalities, they can decide to apply the ICT solutions to increase their competitive potential as well as develop and improve their administration and service. This will lead to the tourism [industry] being more efficient," he said.



Goodbye to ol' Hotmail



IF YOU have a Hotmail account, you're in for a big surprise. Microsoft is throwing away Hotmail completely.

That's quite a comeuppance for one of the best-known brands in the world. Imagine Toyota throwing away the Camry brand, or Louis ditching Vuitton.

Once upon a time, Hotmail blazed new ground as the first major free web-based e-mail service when Sabeer Bhatia (a native of Bangalore and a graduate of Caltech and Stanford) spent US\$300,000 to launch it in 1996.

On December 31, 1997, Microsoft bought Hotmail for US\$400 million, and the service has never been the same. Microsoft struggled with Hotmail for many years, adding new users like flies, but always suffering from severe performance problems and crashes heard round the world.

Ultimately, Hotmail was shuffled under the Microsoft Network (MSN) wing, its free services were clipped, and its user interface was subjected to more facelifts than an aging Hollywood actor.

What happened? Just like Windows, Hotmail's been losing market share. Once the dominant email provider - with Yahoo Mail and AOL hot on its heels - Google's Gmail came along about ten years ago and blasted Hotmail out of the arena. Why pay for 20MB of Hotmail email storage, when Gmail give away 1GB for free? Gmail's taken a lot of market share and mindshare, with superior services and a much better interface, all for absolutely no cost.

Right now, Hotmail has about a third of the online email market. That's a precipitous fall from its old domination. Gmail has a third, and it's increasing rapidly. Yahoo Mail, perhaps surprisingly, also has about a one-third share, with

its user base a flat line for years.

While email as a whole isn't an endangered species, it isn't growing very quickly. Social networking sites are starting to pick up a substantial portion of traditional one-to-one email traffic, and IMs, SMSs and VoIP/Skype calls eat away at the numbers.

So Microsoft decided to throw out the Hotmail baby with the bathwater, and replace it with something called, of all things, Outlook.com.

Everybody's going to find the name confusing. Outlook.com doesn't work anything at all like the real Outlook, which is part of Microsoft Office. It doesn't work like the Outlook Web App either, which is primarily for corporate email users on the go, or Outlook Express, the email program in Windows XP.

In fact, Outlook.com works pretty much like Hotmail, and Microsoft has added several new features that really do make Outlook.com competitive with

Also, in addition to@hotmail.com and @live.com IDs, which have always worked with Hotmail,

left are basically useless, as far as I



Excel, PowerPoint) to edit a file that's been emailed to you. Individual messages can be flagged by clicking on the flag silhouette on the message summary line (second column). A flagged message is automatically placed at the top of the Inbox list.

Outlook.com has one unique feature called Sweep, which lets you

> move all of the mail from a particular email address into a single folder, or delete all of the mail from a specific email address. Sweep is an old Hotmail feature that's been brought into the new Outlook.com.

My #1 tip for Outlook.com users is the same as my #1 tip for old Hotmail users:

create a folder called Save, and don't create any other folders.

As you go through your mail, move any interesting mail to the Save folder. That way, you can search for it easily, and don't need to worry about Outlook.com throwing it away after 30 days.

Gmail users don't have to worry about making a Save folder. Gmail already has one, called Archive.

A month ago, based on the recommendation of a friend who also writes "For Dummies" books, I decided to try Gmail as my only, full-time email program. I migrated all of my email addresses over to Gmail (a process that's surprisingly easy), and kept using all of my old email addresses.

After a month of intense use, I actually prefer Gmail to Outlook 2010 (never thought I'd say that).

There are some tricks, but once you get the hang of it, Gmail's capable of handling a lot of email. Searching for mail in Gmail takes one-tenth the time, and creates onetenth the headache, of searching in

The big downside: When my internet connection goes down, I'm dead in the water.

I also tried Outlook.com for a few days, and ultimately went back to Gmail. Why? Three reasons. First, it's much easier to archive mail in Gmail, and I use the archiving feature a lot.

Two, Gmail sorts my mail automatically into two lists: Important and Everything Else.

The sorting isn't infallible, but it adapts to my recommendations, and it saves me an enormous amount of time scanning incoming mail.

Third, I just prefer the layout of the Gmail screen. Instead of Outlook.com's four columns, with ads taking up the fourth, I prefer having a single ad at the top, and seeing the rest of the screen devoted to mail. After all, that's why I use an email program!

So say goodbye to Hotmail. It's been a good ride. Let's see if Microsoft has any better luck with Outlook.com.

The NBTC has yet to give its final approval to True's proposal that the installment period should be extended to five years.

The NBTC intends to auction nine slots of the 2.1GHz spectrum in mid-October. Each slot will contain 5 megahertz bandwidth, with a reserve price of 4.5 billion baht per slot. It will allow each bidder to vie for a maximum of 20MHz bandwidth of the spectrum. – *The Nation*

Falling into the side pocket

Retirement Years

ONE feature of funds, which can cause headaches for investors who are unaware, is the use of a so called "side pocket".

Basically, a side pocket refers to a fund manager segregating a certain investment as circumstances of illiquidity make it impossible or undesirable to cash in an underlying holding, or to reasonably assess the value, for purposes of calculating the fund's performance.

The mechanism whereby the fund segregates the illiquid assets from the main portfolio of the fund via issuing investors a new class of interests or shares, which participate only in the assets in the side pocket.

Those interests/shares cannot be redeemed by the investor. Once the fund is able to sell the side pocket assets, the fund will generally redeem the side pocket interests/shares and pay investors the proceeds.

You may have noticed that all of the features of funds, which can lead to potential delays in the return of funds, usually have to deal with the issue of liquidity in some form or another. This is an extremely important distinction you need to be aware of between funds, and one which most investors overlook because of a favorable track record.


The problem of funds with illiquid assets, is that they always look amazing on paper and by their track record, right up until the day things go horribly wrong. At that point it is too late to do anything about it. This is what I refer to as a binomial fund. Things will either continue chugging along just nicely or they will go completely pear shaped.

One thing to look for to avoid getting caught in a fund with illiquid assets is that the underlying assets are exchange traded and the fund's holdings ought to be no more than something in the ballpark of 20 per cent of the daily trading volume in any given instrument. This way the entire fund can be unwound quickly, without serious losses due to slippage or price movement as the result of one's own buying or selling.

I found out the hard way about this extra risk within a fund of funds, that even if an underlying fund trades these types of assets, if one fund within the fund of funds blows up, this can lead to it becoming side pocketed while the dust settles.

Specific types of funds may also use side pockets in the ordinary course of their business. A fund investing in insurance products, for example, may routinely side pocket securities linked to natural disasters following the occurrence of such a disaster. Once the damage has been assessed, the security can again be valued with some accuracy. I personally shy away from such funds.

Again, as with normal notice and redemption periods, the ability to side pocket bad investments is a fairly standard feature and one should not shy away from a fund simply because of this. It is just another reason why one needs to diversify, keep a significant cash reserve for emergencies and plan ahead carefully when re-balancing a

portfolio. It should also help you think David Mayes MBA lives in Phuket and critically about the unseen risks that may be involved with a given investment, as it broadens the horizon of the "what could go wrong?" analysis.

German economist warns about ASEAN+3

MECHANISMS need to be in place for crisis prevention and resolution before the next economic crash, and this means the Southeast Asian regional financial structure needs to be reformed, warns Ulrich Volz, a senior economist at the German Development Institute.

Giving a public lecture at Chulalongkorn University on lessons learned from the current European crisis, Volz said there

were five lessons to be drawn for regional monetary and financial integration in Southeast Asia.

These are: don't rush with monetary integration; rethink costs and benefits of international financial integration; bolster crisis prevention and resolution mechanisms before crises hit; strengthen surveillance and monitoring of regional financial markets and recapitalize banks swiftly after any crisis.

that financial integration was not a necessarily bad thing.

"There is still a strong case for monetary and exchange-rate cooperation, but over-ambitious monetary and exchange-rate integration schemes will backfire," he said, referring to the threat of collapse of the Euro. He said Southeast Asian countries were not ready for a regional exchange-rate system, let alone a monetary union.

A high level of political agreement and commitment is needed among countries to pursue successful monetary integration, as well as close macroeconomic and fiscal coordination, he elaborated.

The current European crisis advanced monetary integration brings, in the face of economic and political divergences, he noted.

Volz said the European crisis highlighted once again that international financial integration will not automatically lead to efficient allocation of capital, and that it contributes to the development of unsustainable imbalances.

International financial integration increases contagion risk. East Asian countries should be careful about liberalizing financial markets too fast, he warned.

"East Asia should pursue a

He added that he did not mean very gradual approach to monetary integration that allows for much flexibility and room for adjustment."

> Volz reminded the audience that since Asia has strong links to the US dollar, it creates a problem of high exchange-rate volatility for the region.

> He suggested managed floats guided by currency baskets as one option to keep relative intraregional exchange-rate stability.

> He urged Asean +3 (the 10member bloc plus Japan, China and South Korea) to increase efforts to improve financial architecture.

An emergency credit-line agreement known as the Chiang Mai Initiative Multilateralization is a credit line of US\$240 billion (7.56 trillion baht) and each member can highlights the dangers that draw only 30 per cent of its allotment in the fund, beyond which it must ask for assistance from the International Monetary Fund, he said.

> He also encouraged the region to strengthen the surveillance and monitoring of regional financial markets. More resources need to be devoted to the Asean+3 Macroeconomic Research Office, a regional financial-surveillance body, he urged.

> In regard to the banking sector, he suggested that policymakers respond immediately to banking crises with swift recapitalization. He blamed European

leaders for acting too slowly to clean up the banking sector, as Japan did in the past, which contributed to that country's "lost decade".

A PHUKET student who was forced to turn to charity to fulfill his dream of becoming a doctor has graduated as one of this year's top honors graduates from Prince of Songkhla University in Nakhon Pathom.

Thirawat Jewpakanon won First Class Honors, was named as a top-ten student in a class of 190, led his 30-member intern rankings at Haad Yai Hospital and won the prestigious Gold Medal for being the outstanding student in Geriatric medicine studies.

Jiew – as he is known to friends – is now practising as a junior doctor at the Vachira Phuket Hospital.

But it could have all been very different. Just over six years ago he had completed his secondary schooling at Phuket Wittayalai School, being top-of-class for the previous three years.

He took the entrance examination for medicine and was offered a university place, but that came with a considerable financial cost.

"It was not that long after the 2004 tsunami and my parents' business was suffering. They operate a small food vendor stall in Phuket Town," Jiew, at 24 the second of three brothers, recalled this week as he took a break from work in the neurology ward.

"The expenses associated with studying medicine are high and they simply could not afford it. My elder brother had actually given up his job in a bank to help the family, so I knew they were not in a position to help me."

He cast his net for support, quickly finding a sponsor in the

Phuket International Women's Club (PIWC), which chose him as its first ever medical undergraduate in a history of supporting students from underprivileged backgrounds.

In its 23-year history since inception, the volunteer-only PIWC has supported more than 750 students in school, college and university studies through its education scholarship program.

Jiew's scholarship would fund him through the six years of studies ahead, a prospect he said was daunting but that he was determined to overcome.

And, although he thoroughly enjoyed his time in Haad Yai, there was always the magnet of home.

He said: "We were and still are a very close family, so it was difficult to spend most of six years away from them once I was given the support. I enjoyed my time at Haad Yai but I missed them all the time.

"But, considering the support and backup I was receiving, I knew I owed it to everyone who had faith in me to achieve my academic goal.

"There is still more to go. I am Phuket born and raised [in Chalong], so I want to give something back to my home province and the people who live here. I feel it is a duty."

Jiew is extraordinarily humble about his achievements, regarding them as reaching the target he needed to set himself.

Dr Boonyarat Warachit, the Chief of Haad Yai Hospital Medical Study Center, said that Jiew had been one of the outstanding students.

"His medical records were so excellent we use them as examples for other students to follow," he said. After a year in his current posting Jiew will spend the next two at a local community hospital, either in Patong (Kathu District) or Thalang District. Then it is on to specializing, either in Obstetrics or Geriatric medicine.

Jiew is also tempted to broaden his experience internationally when the ASEAN free-labor market for skilled professionals comes into force in 2015.

"That would be a very exciting experience if I was given the opportunity", he said. "But I would always come back to practise in Phuket. It's home."



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PIWC Melbourne Cup event at Laguna on November 6

THE PIWC's major fund raising event this year will be a Melbourne Cup extravaganza to be held at Latitude Marquee in Laguna on November 6. The celebrations will run throughout the day, starting from 9am, and will include fashion shows, sweepstakes, lunch, all forms of liquid refreshments and, of course, watching the big race on even bigger screens.

The Cup, as it is known to Aussies, is recognised as one of the world's premier horse races. It is also the richest "handicap" race each horse has to carry a designated weight – and this year offers prize money of more than A\$6 million (about 198 million baht). The winner's trophy alone is worth A\$175,000 (almost 5.8 million baht).

The 3,200-meter race was first run in 1861 and is always held on the first Tuesday in November at Flemington Racecourse in Melbourne. In recent times the quest for glory has drawn entrants from around the world, many from Europe.

It is the culmination of a carnival of racing held at the course and is reminiscent of the Cheltenham and Royal Ascot festivals in England.

Australia will simply shut down at 11am on November 6 for the big race. That's why it's called "the race that stops a nation".

> "Students should meet and communicate with English native speakers, while teachers should be innovative in finding opportunities for students to use English for functional purposes. Their role should be as a catalyst to point students towards resources."

> Professor Fry emphasizes that with enhanced quality of teachers, students will learn to become more productive. He is pleased to see the Ministry of Education is trying to deal effectively with the problem of small schools of low quality. - The Nation

ELEPHANTS in the wild consume up to 300 kilos of food and 200 liters of water per day. Despite my own jumbo proportions, my daily intake of food is much more reasonable and I do try to avoid water, seeking out fermented grape juice as an alternative whenever possible. So with that in mind, I found myself at one of Phuket's finest dining establishments -Trisara – at the latest Think Design Art Dinner entitled 'Elephant Parade'.

The concept of wine dinners, where food is paired up with specific wines, is well known on the island, but an art dinner goes one step further and also matches each dish with a work of art.

The art part of the dinner was provided by The Color Factory in Chiang Mai, who are renowned for their colorful elephant sculptures produced in limited quantities by local and international artists. Color Factory and Elephant Parade seek to attract public awareness and support for Asian elephant conservation.

The first elephant on display was the elaborately decorated Ming

Kwan Nakorn Ping created by artist Jharatpong Suthammavichit. Reminiscent of a Thai temple, the opulent decoration contains a mosaic of mirrors, beads and colored glass and is unmistakably Thai in appearance, as was our first course. Set before us was a smörgåsbord of blue crab relish on rice cakes; pork rinds with northern spicy chili relish and quail's egg; sweet and sour deep fried noodles with tofu; pomelo salad with grilled prawn wrapped in betel leaf and fresh Phuket pineapple with a chicken, tamarind and coriander paste. Delicious!

To wash down these tasty

morsels we were served a dry Villa kaffir lime leaves, roasted chili paste Sandi Blanc de Blancs from Italy.

My knowledge of wines is limited to French varieties, due to unfettered access in an earlier life, so I was happy to be seated across the table from a sprightly Italian septuagenarian, by the name of Giulio, who was obviously no stranger to the finer things in life.

He nodded his approval at this





and fresh mint) to match the work of art. The accompanying wine was a 2011 Silenzi bianco, Isola dei nuraghi, which my Italian neighbor told me was from Sardinia.

Next up was an organic soup, Gaeng Aom Hed, which was a clear and not too spicy herbal broth with mushrooms, angled gourd and pumpkin served with a 2008 Pinot Grigio, Lumina.

Then ensued a debate as to the provenance of this wine as the Pinot Grigio (pinot gris) variety of grapes need cooler climes and my neighbor could not place Lumina. Thanks to the wonders of an iPhone, WiFi and Google, we discovered that Lumina is in fact the brand name of the wine and that it was from Tuscanny where they are apparently now growing that grape.

The elephant in the room, so to speak, was at this point Selfness by Nathaporn Potha shows which human trying to escape from within the elephant.

Our next wine was a 2010 Umani Ronchi, Montepulciano d'abruzzo, from east-central Italy, a wine with an astringent quality. Our resident Italian looked perplexed until it was pointed out to

him that the dish to follow was baked, marinated, whole snake-head fish served with tamarind sauce and nam jim. This was elegantly served in a section of bamboo and was my favorite dish of the evening. The mouth cleansing qualities of the wine now made perfect sense.

Our next elephant was also a refreshing change as it was painted as an orange (see above) named Orangephant by Nat Posila, led us nicely into our dessert which was a light orange and guava sorbet with lime cream, water melon and flower crisp, accompanied by a Thai pineapple ice wine called 'Mythical Garden'.

At this point I was introduced to the representatives of Color Factory, Joanna Maclean and Miguel La Salle who told me about their concept.

"The Color Factory is new, about a year old, but prior to that I had another art gallery where we started working with Elephant Parade," said Joanna

"This is our first time in Phuket but we hope to host more art dinners like this one. The elephants are made of fiber glass so although they look heavy they are portable." said Miguel

Elephant Parade was founded in 2006 by father and son Marc and Mike Spits, who were inspired after meeting Soraida Salwala, the founder of the world's first elephant hospital in Lampang. Their partnership with The Asian Elephant Foundation is a guarantee that the funds collected through Elephant Parade will be utilized in the best way possible.

The four different styles of elephant, designed by Marc Spits himself, all have a string of hearts engraved around the left foreleg (remember Mosha?) and are made in Chiang Mai, where a talented team of artists reproduce the numbered limited series for sale at 'Elephant Parades' and in selected hotel boutiques.

"Apart from creating awareness in Thailand we also sell many

elephants to tourists, from China for example, who sometimes buy them in great quantities. We recently sold 25 cases of elephants to China," said Joanna.

Then it was all over. Good food, good people, good wine and a good cause all in a five star resort.

A night I'll never forget.

SAILING, in general, is a lifestyle choice that you associate with people who have spent the better part of their life working to save enough money to buy a yacht. For most people, the idea of taking time off and seeing the world from the sea is a long harbored dream that can only be realized



WE ALL know the power of a beautiful woman. It isn't the power of brute strength – they have a much subtler influence. Sirens can confuse even the cleverest among men.

In Homer's *The Odyssey*, sirens sang an enchanted song to Odysseus and his crew. The song caused them to steer off course towards jagged cliffs – nearly colliding and sinking their boat.

I mention *The Odyssey* because, until now, mermaids were considered to be the stuff of legend, a wives' tale, a fantasy – but that's all changed. The *Phuket Gazette* is proud to report the first actual sighting of a mermaid, not far from Chalong Bay.

Katrin Felton and several other sirens were spotted training at Andaman Ocean Safaris' pool last week.

"I'm a real mermaid," says Katrin, "When I was a child I loved being in the water and after watching Disney's, *The Little Mermaid*, I knew that I wanted to be a mermaid.

"As a mermaid I'm often filmed or photographed swimming alongside the ocean's mysterious and wonderful natural inhabitants. I don't use any scuba equipment."

Models participated in a mermaid master-class given by Katrin, including girls from Malaysia, Thailand, Scotland and Switzerland.

"Basically we got three diving trainers together and since we're shooting underwater videography we're teaching the girls how to be mermaids; how to move, how to act. You have to be careful, because you don't have a mask and so on," says Spencer Felton Katrin's husband and a dive instructor at Andaman Ocean Safaris.

The mermaids are part of a public relations campaign sponsored by the Dive Tribe, which aims to promote public awareness of shark

poaching in Thailand and Asia.

The six 'mer-recruits' had to learn basic free-diving techniques, such as how to hold their breath for at least two minutes and how to tread water with a mono-fin (mermaid tail).

Believe it or not there is actually an ever-increasing demand for these 'mer-models', especially at sporting events like football, says Dolphin Lee.

Dolphin runs a mermaid school in Malaysia and brought two of his models to Phuket to train and be part of the awareness campaign.

After completing training, the mermaids travelled to Pattaya for an underwater photo shoot on Her Majesty Queen Sirikit's birthday, in a tank full of sharks.

"There were black tip reef sharks, nurse sharks and others. The girls swam around with them just to show the public they're [the sharks] not really as dangerous as everyone thinks," says Spencer.

The girls formed a bond over their time in the pool together and could often be overheard giggling and joking around.

"It's been a really good experience," says Tanja Sey, 29, a Swiss woman who took the 'mer-course' and works as a Dive Master in Phuket. "I've had a lot of fun with all the girls and doing this I can learn a lot about my scuba diving as well.

"But, I have to make sure I can tread [water] for three minutes more so [that] I can get to the gold mermaid level," Tanja added as she flopped away. (You know they can't be out of water very long.)

Organizers say what they like most about the mermaids is that they're a different and more lighthearted approach towards conservation.

"In Europe people tend to have a dim view of [something like this] and here they are just like...okay," says Spencer.

Introducing a new master

OLIVER Stone's new movie is Savages, a thriller about the drug trade in Laguna Beach, California.

Starring a roll call of Hollywood A-listers – Blake Lively, Salma Hayek, Benicio Del Toro, John Travolta - the film is based on a crime novel by Don Winslow.

A former Private Investigator in real life, Winslow has written 15 novels and is suddenly being hailed by the likes of James Ellroy, Stephen King and Joseph Wambaugh as the great new master of crime fiction. This would make him the successor to Elmore Leonard who is in his 80s now.

In time for the premiere of the film Savages, Winslow has published a prequel, The Kings of Cool, (Simon & Schuster, New York, 2012, 322pp) to take advantage of the new surge in sales.

The novel opens in Laguna Beach, 2006, and stars two lifelong friends, adept at surfing and beach volleyball, who are total opposites. Ben is the son of Jewish liberals, hippies from the 1960s, owners of a peace and love bookstore. Chon is a Navy Seal, veteran of Iraq and Afghanistan, son of a drug dealer and ex-con. Ben doesn't believe in violence; Chon revels in it.

Chon brought a superpowerful marijuana seed from Afghanistan; Ben developed it. Together they manage a series of grow houses and distributorships that hawk the finest hydroponic buds in the nation.



But they didn't. So The Dinosaur Project ends up with a'la Hollywood – the impassioned screaming of people's names; an annoying kid character; an even more annoying Jar Jar-esque pet dinosaur; and thoroughly disturbing camera shake;

With so much camera jiggle you'd be likely to mistake a delicate shrub for a stegosaurus, the CGI still manages to make the actual monsters look, er... fake.

What is going on with British cinema? In the past five years we have had a rash of terrible attempts by British film-makers to cash in on the Hollywood action plan. Both Flood and Doomsday were notable for trying it the "Hollywood Way", but both failed to live up to either's ethos.

Why? When British film-makers are allowed to do it their way, we get excellent comedies, romances, gangster flicks and, yes, even, action adventure movies - look at Attack the Block for instance.

Dr Piyanat Sakulpipatana

IT IS a widely held belief that growing up in the shadow of accomplished parents can be daunting for any child consciously or subconsciously. Not so with Dr Piyanat, whose mother is the renowned local historian and cultural writer Pranee Sakulpipatana.

The 39-year-old doctor, head of the Department of Medical Rehabilitation at Vachira Phuket Hospital, remembers that: "My mother was a high achiever but I never felt inadequate growing up around her. To get me and my younger brother to do something she used a lot of encouragement.'

By her own admission, Dr Piyanat is an avid reader, a habit she developed growing up in a house full of books. "I read anything and everything," she says.

As she was particularly fond of biology in school, the path to medicine seemed clear. After almost a decade of studies, an internship and specialization at Siriraj Medical School in Bangkok, Piyanat came back to Phuket to work for Vachira Phuket Hospital in 2003.

"Actually I wanted to train as a dentist. Somehow I had it in my head that this was quite fashionable, but during the medical training it dawned on me that rehabilitation was as effective as any other modality at first-line treatment, and not just something applied once the patient is cured," said Dr Piyanat.

After three years of specialism,

Dr Piyanat emerged, a fullyfledged physiatrist, full of respect for this complex and multi-disciplinary field. "Practicing is a challenge and enjoyable at the same time," she adds.

Her work at the hospital involves treating patients with musculoskeletal disorders and patient with neurological diseases, which she says respond well to rehab therapy.

Her interests also extend to the field of pediatrics, an area that is dear to her heart. She talks excitedly about the hospital's new children clinic, House of Khun Poom, named after HRH Princess Ubolratana's late son.

"Now we have a clinic fully dedicated to children so we can treat cerebral palsy, genetic abnormalities and other development disabilities."

Also a certified acupuncturist, Dr Piyanat says she uses this traditional practice successfully in conjunction with mainstream treatments.

"In treating muscle pain, for example, acupuncture offers more meridian points. If you have a pain in the neck area, the corresponding points are on the neck and the back of your hand."

Part of her work is to teach

patients to help themselves get better by doing physical exercises. Here she comes up against a lot of resistance.

"There are patients whose sole belief is in passive treatment. They take pills all day long and regard doctors as their saviors but refuse to do something for themselves. I now question the use of the 30-baht card (free national health insurance). It seemed like a good idea at the time - complete and free healthcare for all. But I wonder if people are abusing the system somewhat?"

Is there any future in traditional Thai medicine?

"Definitely," she answers. "More people are using Thai herbs because they have relatively few side effects. The problem we face is production quality control. Another difference from synthetic and traditional medicine is that the herbs spoil very quickly. We still have a long way to go to standardize Thai herbs."


In her free time, Dr Piyanat tends her organic kitchen garden at home, a hobby she thoroughly enjoys. She loves travelling abroad and is particularly fond of India. Having an interest in Aryuveda medicine, she has visited Kerala in southern India to study this science and to relax and unwind. She somteimes takes part in Ashtanga yoga retreats in Myasore.

Apart from working full-time at the hospital, Dr Piyanat runs a clinic on Yaowarat Road every evening, and on Saturday mornings.



Certainly I feel like the realestate statue of liberty - welcoming those to America like the homeless, those without a country and some who really should seek some type of mental counseling.


But I digress and frankly speaking I do open my door to one and all, without favor or bias no matter how bizarre the scheme they may have plotted over the midnight oil.

Market for condos looks bleak

COMMERCIAL banks are open to lending to small property developers, but they are more inclined to focus on medium to large-sized companies, which are more financially sound and less likely to default, bank executives say.

To be eligible for financing, small developers must have projects in prime locations and their presales should exceed 50 per cent of target revenue, they said.

Sarut Ruttanaporn, head of the commercial banking division at Siam Commercial Bank, said most banks chose to lend for condominium projects located in areas with high potential and the developers must have sufficient capital of their own. In general, banks are ready to finance condominium developers when presale volumes are 50 per cent of total units, he said.

He noted that SCB provided financing to developers of all sizes, but would consider the project, the location and the marketing strategies before approving a loan. Most developers have their own sales offices and cash to buy land, he said. The bank has not seen any sign of a slowdown in the condominium market. Building-project financing represents 10 per cent of SCB's

commercial banking portfolio. Tinnakorn Boonyakalin, a senior vice president at Krung Thai Bank, said it was selective on lending to developers, taking note of the location of each project. Financing projects near mass-transit lines developed by medium to large sized firms is the comfort zone for KTB.

To support such projects, we offer post-financing with special promotions to condominium buyers. This helps boost presales for the developers as well as bringing in new lending to the bank," he said. New loans for condominiums in the first six months were 30 billion baht on a target of 40 billion for the entire year. However, the bank has not changed the full-year target.

For CIMB to be comfortable

with a project loan, presales should reach 50 per cent of total units on average. Vorakarn Dhepchalerm, head of corporate banking for CIMB, said the bank bases its lending decisions on the expertise of developers.

He said they prefer branded projects because these have enough capital to defend against unexpected situations. He said that the bank sets tight conditions for condominium developers because the market outlook is for oversupply, while growth of condo presales is slowing.

Property-project financing acounts for 9-10 per cent of the outstanding loans in CIMB's corporate banking portfolio, and condominiums account for 30 per cent of that. Vorakarn said loans to small developers who don't have sufficient cash flow could default if their projects do not sell well. According to a survey by Colliers International (Thailand), condominium projects launched in Bangkok in the first half of this year amounted to 24,100 units, up 7.1 per cent from the same period last year. More than half of these were launched by listed property firms. The Nation

DRIVING around Phuket today, I was interested to see what plants were being utilized in new developments: as ornamental additions to reception areas, flanking boundary walls, or as borders and hedges.

It makes doleful reading, but it is sadly the case that almost all budget-priced condominiums and shop-houses – and there is a rash of new ones – simply ignore the need for shrubs or trees.

Having removed every vestige of greenery from the site, these developers clearly see no point in planting new trees or, in most cases, even adding a few container plants.

Instead, the front area of each new construction is concreted over, so space can be made for parking. Priority number one.

High-end developers seem to take



ronment. In some cases, it is admittedly no more than a few token pieces of topiary, a row of wrightia, or a clipped hedge or two of *ixora*.

In those resorts and commercial projects that genuinely care about their ecological and artistic image, however, the results are gratifying.

Indeed, I was delighted to write recently about the Movenpick Resort, which not only has graceful columns of palms and star apple trees to greet new arrivals, but acres of lawns, lakes and woodland sporting hundreds of arboreal varieties.

Such first impressions are, more account of the natural envi- of course, very important. The Evason Resort, recently much in the news, has long been a Phuket landmark. As you approach the resort, you travel down a mature avenue of over-arching oil-palms, many festooned from ground to crown with ferns of various kinds. A soothing and relaxing in-

In contrast, Siam Niramit, is a new complex, aimed at providing a Thai style "spectacular". Built in an area of the Bypass Road on which the developers' gaze has begun to focus, the Niramit is entered past high white walls, already flanked by rows of bamboo, tall, graceful and vividly green.

Bamboo looks great when it is young and healthy: it is, however, a heavy feeder, produces dense root structures and lots of falling leaves. I wonder how it will look in a few years' time.

Festooned over the walls of the parking area was an unusual climber. The wooly morning glory (argyreia nervosa) is not a common sight in Phuket, but here it was being given a chance to show off its large, pink, trumpetshaped blooms.

Back in Rawai, a peek at the familiar Friendship Resort revealed the aesthetic benefits of low-rise chalets - a style less favored in nearby developments - and the soothing charms of a green environment where coconut palms and alstonias were much in evidence.

This old/new pattern is repeated elsewhere: the established Rawala complex in Rawai has lots of trees, including a row of white-flowering *plumerias* along

the entire frontage.

Just down the road, the newly completed Rawai Palm Beach Resort – a massive affair – continues the theme of palms and plumerias in its impressive entrance area, but lets itself down at the business end, where only a few token potted evergreens, and a solitary mature tree soften the overwhelming impact of concrete.

But wait. Another newish resort is bucking the trend. Admittedly, the Chalong Chalet Resort occupies an enviable position on rising ground with panoramic views. But everything has been done to heighten this natural advantage. The rotunda car park has a mature neem tree (azadirachta) smack in the middle, encircled by

a low evergreen hedge.

Such attention to aesthetic and natural detail is everywhere in evidence: pleasant singlestorey chalets are set amid acres of terraced and manicured lawns and an imaginative range of trees and shrubs.

Yuccas, screw pines, fernclad palms, low hedges and borders of duranta, ixora, clerodendrum, even a few indigenous rubber trees.



Thai Olympic anguish

DESPITE winning no gold medals, Thailand still did well by Asean standards, with bosses calling for bigger teams to be sent to Rio in 2016.

After 17 action-packed days at the Olympic Games in London, Thai athletes returned with just three medals, no golds, in a result below expectations and a far cry from their previous Games.

Thailand first participated in the Olympics in the 1952 Helsinki Games and since then has won a total of 21 medals, mostly in boxing.

The Kingdom had to wait until Atlanta in 1996 to win its first Olympic gold when featherweight Somluck Khamsing made his mark in the ring and captured Thai hearts.

From then, until this year, Thai athletes returned from every Games with at least one gold. The 2004 Games in Athens was the most successful. Thais fought hard to win eight medals, including three gold.

However, things turned sour for Thailand in London this year, which saw only 37 athletes from 16 sports associations test their mettle against

the world's best The size of the Thai team was well down from the 51 athletes who went to Beijing four years ago.

Results were down too. Thais left Beijing with their heads high after winning four medals, two of them gold. In Lon-

don, Thailand claimed three medals, one silver apiece from light-flyweight boxer Kaew Pongprayoon and weightlifter Pimsiri Sirikaew, plus a bronze from Chanatip Sonkham in

With the weight of past success at the Games becoming a heavy burden, the boxing team faced an uphill task to extend the country's proud record of win-

ning at least a bronze from the sport in every Games.

Preparation was far from ideal. In fact Thai boxing had just come through one of its most turbulent periods, with a new national body set up following a row with the sport's ruling organization,

Amateur International Boxing Association (AIBA).

These distractions were cited as a major reason why Thailand had only three fighters in London,

With the early exit of Sailom

Ardee and Chatchai Butdee, only Kaew Pongprayoon, 32, from Kamphaeng Phet, was left to fly the flag. He doggedly forced his way into the men's 49kg final against three-time world champion Zou Shiming of China.

Despite losing the showdown in controversial circumstances, Kaew produced a display that encapsulated a rugged, fighting spirit against an accomplished fighter. His silver was hailed as remarkable success for Thai boxing, given the circumstances.

In taekwondo, with in-form athletes such as Guangzhou Asian Games silver medalist Pen-Ek Karaket, the Thai squad had high hopes of some glory.

Pen-Ek and world champion Rangsiya Nisaisom put up good fights but suffered first-round losses. Only Chanatip saved pride by taking bronze.

EPL season kicks off

FINALLY, the English Premiership 2012- it, seems like an awful proposition to some 2013 season kicks off this weekend, but it has a hard act to follow after the success of the London Olympics.

The Olympics made new sporting heroes, and allowed old sporting legends to finish on a high. The number of athletes who endeared themselves to the hearts of those who followed the games shows how popular the games were.

The Olympics had something for everyone and the number of empty seats at the Community Shield match between Manchester City and Chelsea on Sunday showed where the British public's hearts were.

But with the games now finished, the focus will swing back to football.

Chelsea and Manchester City squared off in the Community Shield and shared five goals and a red card between them, Manchester City winning the game 3-2, in what many deem to be one last training session before the season starts.

The Champions league winners and Premiership winners put on a good show for those who did watch it, but with the world suffering from an Olympic hangover where humility and grace went hand in hand with sporting excellence, nine months of football and putting up with those who play

after what we witnessed in London.

Premiership teams have once again had a busy summer in the transfer market spending the sort of money other leagues can only dream of. Arsenal have surprisingly been extremely busy bringing in world class talent such as Lukas Podolski, Olivier Giroud and Santi Cazorla for a combined fee of 40 million pounds sterling. Liverpool, Manchester City and Manchester United have made a couple of expensive signings but nothing like Arsenal. Chelsea have spent over 60 million pounds sterling but their spending is not really as surprising as Arsenals.

The vast sums of money Premiership teams spend on players tends only to be matched by Real Madrid and Barcelona; The French side Paris Saint Germain are now owned buy a Qatari family and have been spending money like there is no tomorrow, but generally the big two from Spain tend to compete financially with English teams.

With two weeks left until the transfer window closes, many clubs across Europe still have time to splash the cash. And in

this time of financial uncertainty, and after witnessing sporting excellence by athletes who can only dream of the money footballers receive, Premiership and European football needs to take a long hard look at itself and take a leaf out of the Olympics' book.

The football season kicks off in England and Spain this weekend, with the German and Italian leagues starting the following weekend.

The noble art of Muay Chaiya

MUAY Chaiya, or Chaiya-styled Thai Boxing, is part of the martial arts that are collectively known as Muay Boran, literally the ancient art of fighting. It's the ancestor of the ever-popular Thai boxing, Muay Thai, which has been heavily adapted and modified into the fast and furious stage fight that we know today.

Originating in Chaiya, a town in Surat Thani Province, Muay Chaiya has kept its philosophy and forms intact, probably one of the few fighting disciplines that has managed to do so today. It is practiced by a handful of people who are in the know and who are lucky enough to have a club or a teacher nearby.

Muay Chaiya prides itself on being graceful in movement and style, an agility that demands one-pointed concentration. "It's more of a martial art than boxing; it is a fighting style that relies on self-defense and the clever deflection of the attacker's strength," says Kru Pong, a young master who teaches Muay Chaiya from a gym at the Sukho Cultural Spa on Chao Fah Road.

Muay Chaiya is a traditional martial art used by the guards of the Thai Kings in ancient

times. Forbidden to carry weapons in proximity of the Royal Family, these warriors trained to ward off assailants using their

bare hands and other parts of the body as weapons, and as a protective shield.

But Muay Chaiya also makes full use of swords, lances, clubs and other fighting apparatus. In addition, anything can be turned into a weapon in times of emergency even a pha khao mah or loincloth, can be used.

"The philosophy of Muay Chaiya is to turn yourself into a durian with deadly thorns, upon which attackers can hurt themselves," Tachapon Tephabutr, Muay Chaiya enthusiast and MD of Sukho Cultural Spa. Indeed, Muay Chaiya fighters make full use of their body extremities such as elbows, knees, knuckles, heels, ankles and even the side of the skull, to hurt opponents.

Chuak or hand-bound boxing, Muay Chaiya fighters tightly wrap their hands in cot-

ton strips turning their fists into stiff gloves.

'Hand binding is an art form in itself and some fighters create knots that upon impact can actually hurt opponents," says Rat Puanrak, another enthusiast who practices with Kru Pong on a regular basis. A professional photographer, Rat is working on a photo documentary book on the subject.

The beautiful and mesmerizing dance-like styles of Muay Chaiya mimic movements made by animals, real and mythical, and are named as such. "Crocodile's Tale Swipe" refers to a back kick produced after a fast turn by the boxer, and "Hanuman Proffering Ring" is a pow-

erful punch under the opponent's chin. Muay Chaiya was made famous by the


Sometimes referred to as Muay Kart Tai blockbuster film Ong Bak, in which the main protagonist, played by Tony Jaa, used Muay Chaiya to defeat evil.

Before filming, Tony Jaa underwent rigorous training with Kru Laem, a senior Muay Chaiya master working in Bangkok, who also choreographed many of the film's fighting scenes.

A typical class of Muay Chaiya consists of a series of exercises, which include: developing correct stance, footwork, body movements, and guarding yourself with arms and legs. Then comes the training with a long cane, a graceful but fast movement that requires alertness and concentration.

"It's a great sport that combines workout, concentration and self-defense; it can be practiced by people of all ages. I'd love to see more young people, especially girls, taking up Muay Chaiya. Some parents report that their children have become calmer and more focused in school after a few months of practice".

The indefinite delay had sparked concern among fans, players and team reps that TFL's star players would choose to play 11-a-side football instead, or even play in other leagues outside of Thailand, lowering the league's standard.

BACK-TO-BACK wins last week helped to finally pull Phuket FC out of the dreaded relegation zone, where they have lingered for much of the 2012 season.

In their latest triumph, last Sunday evening, a single goal by Watcharakorn "Bird" Klaithin was enough for the islanders to prevail 1-0 over Chanthaburi FC.

That away match, the season's 22nd fixture, was played in front of a humble crowd of 420 at Chanthaburi's Central Stadium in Chanthaburi town in Eastern Thailand.

Though Phuket were heavily favored, there was a clear difference on the Chanthaburi side, who were in better form than the side that were trampled by Phuket 8-1 in June.

The second encounter's only goal came in the final moments of the first half when striker Bird took a long range shot from outside the left corner of the penalty box, beautifully hitting its mark at the

Scoring his fourth of the season, Bird, a transfer from Suphanburi FC, is currently the Islanders' top scorer.

The result leaves Chanthaburi, who have yet to win a game this season, in dead last of the 18-team Yamaha One (Division 1) league.

Phuket, on the other hand, climbed up into 11th place, clear of the five team relegation zone – at least for now.

The win follows another single goal victory by Phuket several days earlier against Royal Navy FC.

Just over 2,000 fans turned up for the match, which was played in perfect conditions at Phuket's Surakul Stadium.

half-time break, though the score remained 0-0. The stale-

mate was finally
