High Court dismisses appeal against 'inhumane' living conditions in Thai prisons

THE British High Court has dismissed the appeal by former Phuket kickboxer Lee "the Pitbull" Aldhouse to stop his extradition to Thailand to face murder charges.

A source at the British embassy in Bangkok told the Gazette on Wednesday that formal notification of the decision had yet to be received, but embassy staff could confirm that the High Court had dismissed the appeal.

The news paves the way for the Office of the Attorney General [OAG] in Bangkok to begin the extradition process. "We have yet to receive formal notification of his extradition to Phuket," Prosecutor Intranee Sumawong, OAG Executive Director of International Affairs, told the Gazette on Wednesday.

"We expect the [Thai] Ministry of Foreign Affairs to inform us by letter within the next few days... After we receive the formal notice, I'm quite confident that within a week we will know when Mr Aldhouse will be in Phuket to stand trial," she added.

Mr Aldhouse successfully fled Thailand after allegedly stabbing American Dashawn Longfellow to death in August 2010.

He was later arrested at London's Heathrow Airport on an unrelated charge when he tried to re-enter the UK.

Sea gypsies win reprieve from developer action

POLICE intervention stemmed a rising tide of ire among a 200-strong protest by sea gypsies at Baan Laem Tukkae on Koh Sireh on November 15, winning a temporary reprieve against a developer taking over 11 rai of the small beachfront village on the east side of Phuket Town.

The small sea gypsy community has long been officially recognized, but villagers found themselves forced to stave off Land Office surveyors from marking out the boundary of a plot being earmarked for beachfront development.

The village is home to the 5.4million-baht Urak Lawoi cultural center celebrating sea gypsy traditions and home to the Porn Sawan rong ngeng dance troupe that has received an award from HRH Princess Maha Chakri Sirindhorn for preserving cultural heritage.

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

Aussie balcony fall survivor recovering in intensive care

THE Australian man from Sydney who fell from an 18th storey Phuket hotel balcony last week was still receiving treatment in the Intensive Care Unit of Vachira Phuket Hospital on November 16.

John Hurley, 39, plunged from the hotel balcony of his room at the Royal Paradise Hotel in Patong on November 13.

Mr Hurley underwent surgery at Vachira Phuket Hospital in Phuket Town later that afternoon for a ruptured spleen and to start a series of corrective measures for his left leg, which was shattered by the impact.

Hospital staff confirmed on

November 16 that Mr Hurley is conscious and is still responding to stimuli, but is now on breathing support. "He is now getting better," one

Police hunt driver in tour bus 'hit-and-run'

A TOUR bus driver fled the scene after the bus he was driving struck two women riding a motorbike in the northbound lane of the notorious Thepkrasattri Road on November 14.

The two women who died in the accident were identified by Thalang Police as Jaroonrat Waree, 35, and Nadlada Waree, 17.

"The motorbike rider and passenger were dragged by the bus at least 500 meters before it came to a stop north of Mud Dok Khao junction [the main turnoff toward Nai Yang Beach]," said Sub Lt Chatree Chuwichian.

Police contacted the driver's employer, allowing them to identify the suspect, Lt Chatree told the Gazette on November 17.

"We are waiting for them to contact the driver, and have him surrender to police," he said.

However, by Wednesday the driver still had not surrendered himself to police, forcing them to

request that the Phuket Provincial Court issue an arrest warrant. Though police have identified

the man, they have yet to release

the information to the public. Police plan to charge the man with negligent driving resulting in death, Lt Chatree said.

Officials: 'Stop harassing tourists'

TAXI touts at Phuket International Airport have been told to stop following and harassing tourists arriving at the airport, and to stay at their counters.

The news came at a meeting at the airport administrative office on November 13, called by Phuket Airport Director Prathuang Sornkham.

Present to oversee the proceedings was Phuket Vice Governor Chamroen Tipayapongtada, who called for taxi touts to stop following tourists through the terminal.

"We don't want them [tourists] feeling uncomfortable and annoyed," he said.

"Taxi operators already have their own counters both inside and outside the terminal, as per the agreement with the airport, so they do not need to walk around and pick on passengers who have just walked out of the arrivals hall," added V/Gov Chamroen.

Airport Director Prathuang pointed out, "We keep asking them

Mr Aldhouse lost his initial extradition hearing. Facing a return to Phuket to answer for murder charges, he filed an appeal claiming that conditions in Thai prisons infringed on human rights.

British Home Secretary Theresa May (UK equivalent to Interior Minister) publicly allowed his extradition but that decision was overturned by High Court judges who ruled that Mr Aldhouse's claims were at least worthy of being heard.

That appeal has now been dismissed.

Bobbette Anderson posted on the Dashawn Longfellow Memorial Facebook page: "I can't tell you how happy his mother and I, and the rest of his family, is with the British High Court's decision to send Aldhouse back to face trial in Thailand.

"A huge THANK YOU to the Thai government for working so hard to make this happen... We feel justice will be served after a fair trial and Aldhouse will pay for taking our precious Hero from us... RIP Dashawn... you are always on our mind and forever in our hearts."

Two dead, one survives in local swiming incidents

THREE separate swimming incidents left two dead and sent one to hospital this week.

Early in the week 69-year-old Russian tourist Mikhail Bogdanov drowned off Patong Beach in the same area where the where American student Joshua Shane drowned while taking a night swim with friends in June.

The body was recovered by a jet-ski rider in the water just north of Loma Park at about 10:30am on November 19, said Patong Police Capt Teerasak Boonsaeng.

"The tourist's body showed no signs of violence," said Police Superintendant Chiraphat Pochanaphan.

Col Chiraphat said that Mr Bogdanov left his hotel on Prabaramee Road alone to go swimming. He tried to swim

Yuan Dingrong, 56, who was spending a week in Patong with nine of her family members, drowned after getting into difficulties while swimming off Ao La (La Bay), a member of the

Tourist Police told the Gazette. Ms Yuan died en route to Phuket International Hospital.

The same afternoon a 44-yearold Indian woman, Jyoti Chavhan, was taken to hospital after encountering problems while snorkeling off Koh Racha.

Ms Chavhan, who was on holiday with her family on Koh Racha, allegedly took in water through her snorkel, causing a blockage of her airways.

A speedboat rushed her back to Phuket, where she was transferred to a Vachira Phuket Hospital ambulance.

A Vachira Hospital official told the Gazette that Ms Chavhan was transferred to Patong Hospital soon after arriving.

Patong Hospital staff said that Ms Chavhan is in a stable condition and expected to be discharged soon.

Russian tourist dies in 'high-speed' car crash

RUSSIAN tourist Andrei Pavlov, 31, has been named by police as the driver of the Toyota Vios that crashed early on November 17 while travelling at high-speed on the road from Patong to Kamala.

"He was a tourist. He arrived in Phuket more than two months ago and was living in a rented room in Kamala," said Maj Pratuang Polmana of the Patong Police.

The accident was reported at about 5:45am.

"At the scene we found [Mr Pavlov] dead in a black Toyota Vios registered in Udon Thani Province," Maj Pratuang said.

Police believe that Mr Pavolv, who was wearing only swimming trunks at the time of the accident. died from blunt trauma to his head and chest.

Witnesses said the car was travelling toward Kamala at a high speed when the accident occurred, he added. - Thawit Bilabdullar





Focus still on park land deals

THE investigation into every plot of privately owned land along the border of Sirinath Marine National Park will go ahead, park chief Cheewapap Cheewatham has confirmed.

"We are still continuing with the land investigation. We are following the order of the Department of National Parks, Wildlife and Plant Conservation [DNP]. The only thing that can stop us is an official order from them," Mr Cheewapap told the *Gazette*.

The mass land probe aims to investigate 379 plots of land covering more than 3,000 rai along the park boundary.

"I have not received any official order from the DNP telling us to stop investigating the ownership documents of all 379 plots along the national park border.

"The only official order I have received from the DNP is to delay charging [anyone in connection with the] resorts and private homes that are suspected of being built on protected forest land until the land documentation has been verified. That order was issued by Prime Minister Yingluck Shinawatra," Mr Cheewapap said.

The park chief went onto explain that, according to a Cabinet resolution made on June 30, 1998, any plot of land that was issued a Chanote title before the

or a protected forest area was to be considered legal.

"However, any land issued a Chanote after the area was declared a protected forest area will be considered illegal.

"That's why the land documents of any resorts or houses that are

area was declared a national park suspected of being built in a protected forest area must be reviewed carefully again," he added.

However, Mr Cheewapap said he had yet to be informed of the reason why there has been a delay in the arrival of the 366 DNP officers promised, who are to conduct the mass probe into plots along the park boundary.

"We have not yet started the investigation because we are still waiting for them. I have no idea when the teams will be here. The DNP might have delayed their arrival until after they have reconfirmed the exact location of the park boundary," he said.



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
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Police nab Patong bag-snatchers

Escape from underpass chaos

THE lane closures to make way for the construction of Phuket's first underpass in front of the Phuket Central Festival shopping mall on the bypass road are scheduled to be enforced this weekend.

Originally planned to commence on Wednesday, project managers from Italian-Thai Development Co Ltd explained that the start was delayed intentionally to prevent mid-week traffic congestion.

"After meeting with Phuket City Police and the Phuket Highways Office, we decided that the work should start on Friday," said Narong Horee, project manager of the 600-million-baht project.

"The authorities were concerned it would affect the rush-hour traffic during the week," he added.

Anticipating the construction causing heavy traffic at and around the busy junction, officials recently held public meetings to inform local residents and business operators of alternative routes to use to avoid the intersection when possible.

Among the suggested routes, southbound traffic heading toward Patong were advised to turn right





at the Samkong Intersection, in front of the Tesco Lotus mall about one kilometer north of the underpass project, and continue on to Kathu and Patong, as most southbound traffic already does.

Alternatively, motorists would be able to continue through the Samkong Intersection and then enter Bang Yai Road, which runs behind the Big C shopping center.

Southbound traffic heading toward Chalong were advised to turn left at Tesco Lotus onto Yaowarat Road, and continue through Phuket Town.


Officials suggested 'alternative routes' for motorists to avoid the underpass roadworks. Map: Steets of Phuket





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Russian drinks himself to death in guesthouse

A BROKEN-hearted Russian man who drank himself to death was found in his rented accommodation in Patong on November 14.

Maj Patapee Srichai of the Patong Police was informed of the incident by guesthouse manager Areeya Koksadon shortly after 2pm. At the scene police found the body of 27-year-old Petr Zavyalov lying on the bed, still clutching a bunch of red roses in one hand and a bottle of Thai whisky in the other.

"There were no signs of a struggle in the room... However, our investigation revealed that he had argued with his Thai girlfriend," said Maj Patapee.

"It would appear that Mr Zavyalov was unable to support her lifestyle and so she left him for another foreigner.

"He bought a dozen bottles of Thai whisky. He was later found dead in his room," Maj Patapee explained.

Mr Zavyalov's body was sent to Patong Hospital for medical examination and to await final instructions from his relatives.

Airport taxi operators gifted boost to fleet during 'freeze'

LOCAL officials this week approved every request made by local taxi operators to boost the number of taxi vehicles serving Phuket Airport.

Under a memorandum of understanding (MoU) signed on Monday by all main parties involved, the Phuket Mai Khao Company and the Phuket Car Service (PCS) Co-operative will each take into their fold 25 vehicles and drivers from the Mook Andaman ("Andaman Pearl") taxi driver co-operative.

Mook Andaman currently – and openly – provides taxi services at the airport despite not having a signed concession with AOT to do so. Its fleet of 136 vehicles maintains a taxi rank on the street in front of the airport, which serves passengers exiting the terminal when there are not enough Phuket Mai Khao or PCS vehicles to cater to demand.

Also approved was the request filed in June by the Phuket Taxi Meter (PTM) Service Co Ltd to have 30 more taxis join its airport

fleet. PTM currently has 80 me-

tered taxis serving the airport. Phuket Mai Khao will add 40 cars to its fleet, while PCS will have 65 vehicles (35 metered taxis, 25 limousines and five vans)

added to its ranks. All "new" taxis will begin legally providing taxi services from the airport after they have been registered as commercial passenger vehicles by the Phuket Land Transportation Office (PLTO).

That process is expected to be complete by January, the *Gazette* was told.

Under the terms of the agreement, any taxi driver who refuses to serve passengers, or who does not use the meter to determine fares, will be subject to immediate police action.

The MoU also stipulates that any future increases in the number of taxis serving the airport, and any increases in the fares charged by taxi operators, must be approved by the PLTO Committee. In turn, representatives of the taxi operators who are party to the MoU promised "not to damage Phuket's tourism image".

Any drivers found to have breached the terms of the agreement face action by the PLTO, including cancellation of the vehicle's commercial registration.

Phuket Airport reserved the right to withdraw from the agreement without any recourse for taxi drivers if the MoU is not upheld.

The boost in the number of taxi vehicles serving Phuket Airport approved follows AOT Deputy Director Wing Commander Pratheep Wichittho announcing that a freeze in the number of taxis serving Phuket Airport was in place until at least June next year. Mr Pratheep announced the "freeze" during a public visit to Phuket Airport on October 19.

However, the MoU signed on Monday stipulated that the agreement would remain in effect only until the AOT policy research project announced by Wing Cdr Pratheep had been completed.

Krabi Police manhunt for 'backyard gunsmith'

KRABI Police are on the lookout for a gunsmith who is now on the run after officers raided his illegal firearms workshop at a mangosteen processing plant in Nuea Klong District on November 15.

Provincial Police Commander Nantadech Yoinuan led a team of more than 10 police officers to raid a bungalow at the plant at midday.

During the raid, police seized "hundreds of items" of equipment related to the fabrication of firearms, including completed gun parts, said Maj Gen Nantadech.

"The raid follows the arrest of a teenager in possession of a gun who told us who sold it to him," he added.

Gen Nantadech told the media that the workshop owner, 37-year-old Meechai Butrapian, is still at large and an arrest warrant will be issued for him.

"Our inquiries revealed that Mr Meechai is a former ironworker. He now uses those skills to produce custom-made weapons," Gen Nantadech said.

British Embassy calls for road safety

THE British Embassy in Bangkok has urged all travellers in Thailand to observe road safety traffic regulations in a bid to eliminate the deaths and casualties in Phuket and the rest of Thailand.

The news came ahead of the "World Day of Remembrance for Road Traffic Victims" marked worldwide on November 18.

"The British Embassy Bangkok is hoping to raise awareness of the day and warn people of the dangers of driving abroad. There are over 25 million vehicles in Thailand, a high proportion of which are motorcycles and mopeds.

"Sadly, road traffic accidents in Thailand account for the second most frequent cause of death among British nationals as well as a high number of hospitalizations. The majority of these involve motorcycles and mopeds. Although it is compulsory for the rider to wear a helmet in Thailand, many do not do so," said a press release issued on the embassy website on November 16.

Embassy staff listed some of the key factors associated with accidents involving visitors abroad, which included drunkdriving, tiredness brought on by jet-lag and tourists having insufficient insurance to cover expenses incurred by a road accident.

"Regrettably, some of these people suffer life-changing, incapacitating injuries. It is not uncommon for families to have the additional worry of mounting hospital bills as either the motorbike's engine size or the failure to wear a crash helmet invalidates many travel insurance policies," said the release.

The plea for road safety follows UK Foreign Secretary Mr William Hague raising the issue of road safety with Thai Foreign Minister Dr Surapong Tovichakchaikul during Mr Hague's recent visit to Thailand.

Penis erected against ghost

VISITORS to Nong Yai in Rayong might wonder why residents have set up a shrine featuring a large wooden penis in the middle of their village.

The answer? A so-called "widow ghost", which the women of Nong Yai believe has been mysteriously killing married men in their village for 20 years.

The spirit has killed so many local men that Nong Yai had earned the nickname "The Widow Village," villagers told the *Daily News*.

As an offering to the malevolent spirit the woman erected the penis shrine.

Each year the women perform a ceremony, sprinkling holy water on to the penis, which is about 60 centimeters long with a red shaft and golden head.

Nattacha Butchali, 47, insisted the story was true and not just a case of "naive villagers" believing strange tales.

Mrs Nattacha said that some families had even fled the village.

Villagers had gone to spirit mediums to ask them what was going on in the village.

They had all received the same answer: the ghost of a widow was haunting the village.

The spirit apparently makes men feel weak and exhausted.

The night before they die, they dream they are having sex with a beautiful woman. In fact, the woman is the widow spirit, and the ghost takes their souls.

When their wives wake up, they find their husbands are dead, the villagers explained.

Anonymous complaint sparks Thalang pier investigation

VICE Governor Somkiet Sangkaosuttirak on November 16 gave an official task force 15 days to determine the legality of a pier being built at the Baan Kor En village in Thalang.

V/Gov Somkiet and Prapan Kanprasang, head of the Phuket Damrongtham Center (Provincial Ombudsman's Office), joined other related officials during an inspection of

the site. The visit followed an anonymous complaint filed at the Damrongtham Center that a pier was under construction without a building permit, said V/Gov Somkiet.

"The complaint also alleged that the pier is

being built on public land," he added.

V/Gov Somkiet explained that the first step of the investigation was to have the Damrongtham Center confirm with the Treasury Department whether or not the land in question is indeed public land.

"If the owner presents a building permit, the Mai Khao Tambon Administrative Organization [*OrBorTor*] must verify whether or not the permit is genuine," he said

"We need every factor to be verified in order to help prevent encroachment on our natural resources from investors," he added. – Irfarn Jamdukor

Sea gypsies win reprieve from development plan

A PROTEST by about 200 residents from the sea gypsy community at Baan Laem Tukkae on Koh Sireh on November 15 won a temporary reprieve against a developer taking over 11 rai at the small beachfront village on the east side of Phuket Town.

Nikom Ukhati, a surveyor from the Phuket Land Office, explained that he and a team of officers arrived to confirm the boundaries of the 11-rai plot after receiving an official request from the registered landowner.

"As soon as we arrived, these people tried to stop us. We tried for an hour to explain to them what we were doing, but they still resisted," he said.

Mr Nikom said the villagers feared being forced to vacate the land, which they have occupied for generations.

"When they saw that we had come to measure the land and mark the property boundaries,

they were afraid that they would be driven away by people who claim they are the legal owners of the land," Mr Nikom said.

"They have now requested that ments were issued," he added.

the land ownership documents presented by the developer be verified, and they called for an investigation into how the documents were issued." he added. Mr Nikom pointed out that as soon as his team stopped marking the plot boundaries, the villagers ceased their protest.

Village headman Suthon Pramongkij told the *Gazette*, "Baan Laem Tukkae villagers have been living here since 1927. Back then, it was a neglected, unoccupied piece of land.

"The village was formally established in 1958 when Somdech Phra Srinagarindra Boromarajajonani, HM King Bhumibol Adulyadej's mother, visited the village, named it 'Baan Laem Tukkae' and gave every sea gypsy the right to use 'Pramongkij' [fisherman] as their family name," Mr Suthon explained.

The village is now home to about 300 families with a combined population of about 1,600 people – all living on 16 rai.

"Business owners push government officers into issuing Chanote titles for our land... When we stand up against them, they disappear for awhile, but they always come back," he said

Stranded dolphin rescued at Karon Beach

PHUKET rescue workers recovered a young male spinner dolphin with scratches on its skin stranded on Karon Beach on November 17.

Dr Kongkiat Kittiwattanawong, who heads the Endangered Species Unit (ESU) of the Phuket Marine Biological Center (PMBC) received the report of the dolphin at about 9am, and immediately left with a team to help in the rescue.

"We went to Kata Beach, as the dolphin had been moved there by rescue workers. They moved him because they were afraid that the high waves at Karon Beach would throw the animal onto the rocks," Dr Kongkiat said.

An attempt was made to encourage the 1 to 2-year-old dolphin to swim back into deeper water, away from the coast, but it refused, Dr Kongkiat explained

"We found fresh scratches on his skin and 12 centimeter long varicose veins along parts of its body. He could swim, but not properly, and his breathing wasn't 100 per cent," he said.

Dr Kongkiat and his team decided to take the dolphin back to the PMBC for basic treatment.

"After the treatment we will release him into the waters between Koh Kaew and Karon Beach. The water is deep there and the waves are not too high. Moreover, we believe spinner dolphins school in that area," he added.

The dolphin was released back into the ocean at about midday on November 17. The PMBC staff monitored the dolphin's condition as best they could. They believe it is now safely in deeper waters.

Obama strengthens US-Thai bonds

Pilot dies in tribute flight

A BRITISH pilot died in Thailand while he was flying over the sea to scatter the ashes of a dead friend, The Daily Mail reported.

Tom Grieve, 57, was in a microlight with a friend over the Gulf of Thailand on November 17 when the plane's engine cut out.

The aircraft was sent plunging into the sea. Friends watched as the plane clipped a pier and hurtled into the water at around 100kph.

Mr Grieve was pulled from the sea alive, but died from his injuries in hospital.

Patrick Esser, 31, who was also in the aircraft, suffered a broken arm in the accident. "I was making a tribute to my best friend when suddenly things went terribly wrong," Mr Esser said.

"My friend Stuart Long had died of throat cancer aged just 41 and we were about to scatter his ashes in the sea... We were at about 1,000 feet when the engine cut. Tom tried several times to

start it but failed."

Mr Grieve tried to land the plane on a strip of concrete but it was sent spinning after it clipped the pier.

ISRAELI air strikes shook the Gaza Strip and Palestinian rockets struck across the border as US Secretary of State Hillary Clinton held talks in Jerusalem in the early hours of Wednesday, seeking a truce that can hold back Israel's ground troops.

Hamas, whose new Islamist government is trying to broker a truce, had floated hopes for a ceasefire by late Tuesday; but by the time Clinton met the Israeli Prime Minister it was clear there would be more violence first.

Hamas leaders in Cairo accused the Jewish state of failing to respond to proposals and said an announcement on holding fire would not come before daylight on Wednesday. Israel Radio quoted an Israeli official saying a truce was held up due to "a last-minute delay in the understandings between Hamas and Israel".

China fears effects of wild corruption

IF CORRUPTION is allowed to run wild in China then the ruling Communist Party risks major unrest and the collapse of its rule, state media on Monday quoted Communist Party chief Xi Jinping as saying at one of his first major meetings since taking the role.

In unusually blunt language, Vice President Xi, who assumes Hu Jintao's job as head of state in March, said that graft was like "worms breeding in decaying matter". - an old Chinese phrase meaning "ruin befalls those who are weak".

World champion boxer Hector Camacho shot

THREE-time world boxing champion Hector "Macho" Camacho was seriously wounded on Tuesday in a drive-by shooting in Puerto Rico, according to reports in the Puerto Rican press.

SOUTHEAST Asian nations have agreed to sign their first joint declaration on human rights, but the document was condemned by rights groups as failing to meet international standards and as leaving the door open for countries to crack down on freedoms.

The commitment by Asean comes as several of its 10 member countries come under growing scrutiny over an apparent deterioration in human rights.

US President Barack Obama was under pressure to raise human rights concerns with Cambodia and Myanmar during his visit to the region for the East Asia summit in Phnom Penh.

The Asean Human Rights Declaration, which is not legally blinding, begins with the principle that "All persons are born free and equal in dignity and rights".

It affirms that all citizens are entitled to equal protection by the law and that vulnerable groups such as women, minorities, disabled people and migrants have "inalienable" rights and freedoms.

But the declaration qualifies citizens' rights by saying they must be balanced with the "performance of corresponding duties". It adds that human rights must be "considered in the

regional and national context".

The International Federation for Human Rights, a grouping of 64 activist organizations, said the declaration "tears at the heart of long accepted human rights precepts".

"It flies in the face of the international consensus on human rights principles that have been in place for more than six decades," the group said in a statement released earlier this week.

PUBLIC RELATIONS GAME

The Philippines succeeded on November 17 in adding a clause stating that the declaration would be implemented according to international standards. But rights activists dismissed that change as meaningless because, they said, the document as a whole falls short of global standards.

Asean Secretary General Surin Pitsuwan acknowledged the declaration had weaknesses, but said it still represented progress.

"Some are complaining that it may not be up to the higher standard, but I think we are looking at it as a progression, we are looking at in a long time frame," he told reporters.

Phil Robertson, the deputy Asia director for Human Rights Watch, called the declaration an "Asean human rights feel-good show".

"As far as we can see it has basically been set up as a public relations game," he said.

"It has provisions in it that will allow them to say we don't have to follow this because of national context. They have created their loopholes right up front."

Robertson said Malaysia had pushed hard to ensure that the declaration contained no reference to gay rights.

Summit host Cambodia has for years faced questions over human rights standards. In recent years, it has been accused of trampling on land dwellers' rights by awarding huge land leases to politically well connected firms.

Other countries in Southeast Asia have also come in for consistent criticism over human rights issues, including wealthy Singapore for its tough stance on security laws.

Man allegedly steals majority of Greeks' identities

GREEK police have arrested a man on suspicion of stealing the personal data of roughly two thirds of the country's population, police officials in Athens said on Tuesday.

The 35-year old computer programmer was also suspected of attempting to sell the 9 million files containing identification card data, addresses, tax ID numbers and license plate numbers.

Some files contained duplicate entries, police said.

Greece's population is about 11 million.

"We are investigating what the source of the data was and how they were used by the man arrested, and also the possibility of him providing them to someone else," police spokesman Christos Manouras explained to reporters.

Police were also looking into whether the man had obtained the data files by hacking into a government server and whether he had an accomplice, officials said.

The files were discovered after police raided his home.

No charges have been pressed yet and the man is expected to appear before a prosecutor later on Tuesday.

Russian beauty queen criticizes life under President Putin

RUSSIA'S candidate for a global beauty pageant veered away from platitudes about world peace to deliver a stinging condemnation of her homeland under President Vladimir Putin, calling it a "beggar country" and a great artery that feeds a corrupt elite.

When Natalia Pereverzeva, who was crowned Miss Moscow in 2010 and posed topless in Playboy last year, was asked what made her proud of her country at the environmentally conscious Miss Earth pageant in the Philippines, she launched into a tirade against corruption and crony capitalism.

"My Russia is [a] poor, long, suffering country, mercilessly torn to pieces by greedy, dishonest, unbelieving people. My Russia, it

Phuket inflation skyrockets

The price of goods and services on the island rose at a rate twice the national average in the first 10 months of the year

NOT only does Phuket continue its reign as the most expensive (consumer) province in Thailand, but the island province's rate of inflation doubles that of the national average, recent economic data shows.

The Phuket Commerce Office, in collaboration with the Phuket provincial government and the Commerce Ministry's Information Office and Bureau of Trade and Economic Indices, recently published the province's Consumer Price Index (CPI-P) report for October 2012.

The CPI-P monthly report for Phuket surveys 256 consumer goods and services - covering everything from food, beverages, apparel, housing and personal health care to vehicles, transport, communications, entertainment, media, education, religion, tobacco and alcohol.

Comparing current prices with those of 2007 as a base year (100 points), Phuket's CPI-P rose to 126.6 points last month.

In other words, the overall cost of living on the island has jumped by 26.6% over the last five years, which translates to an average inflation rate of 5.3% per annum.

This is compared to the national 5-year inflation rate average of 16.8% or 3.3% per annum.

Though Phuket prices continue to surge relentlessly, there was some minor relief in the short run, with last month's CPI-P declining month-on-month (m-o-m) from September by 0.4 percentage points.

However, the CPI-P last month still jumped by 5.1 percentage points year-onyear (y-o-y) from October, 2011. Furthermore, when comparing the first ten months of 2012 with the same period in 2011, the CPI-P rise was even higher, peaking by 5.9 percentage points, y-o-y.

This equates to nearly double the national inflation rate over the same period, which stood at 2.9%.

Oct vs Sep – M-o-M

The 0.4% m-o-m drop in the CPI-P was a result of the overall price for food and beverage items falling by 0.9%, at the same time that non-food/beverage items rose by only 0.1% on average.

The report notes that the price drop for food and beverage items from September to October comes in light of prices remaining steady during the previous month comparison period (August to September).

The drop was calculated from price reductions measured in select categories as follows: rice (-0.6%); pork ribs (-1.2%); raw and grilled chicken (-2.5%) and chicken eggs (-0.3%).

Such price reductions were attributed to the fact that supply had outstripped demand for these items leading up to and during the vegetarian festival.

Meanwhile, the price of tangerines dropped by 11.6%, while food condiments such as fish sauce fell by 1.9%.

At the same time, the items that jumped in price included flour and tofu (0.3%); various types of seafood including silver pomfret fish, squid, cockles, sea crabs and salted mackerel and tuna, which rose by 2% on average, and likewise fresh vegetables and fruits, including kale, cucumbers, morning glory, coriander, onion, cabbage, chili, peanuts, pineapples, rambutan, mango and watermelon, jumping by an average 12.9%.

Such inflation was attributed not only to demand outstripping supply as a result of the Veg Fest, but also to the fact that nationwide crop supplies had been adversely affected by heavy rainfall this year.

Non-food/beverage items rose on average by 0.1% (compared to the previous m-o-m comparison period, when the category experienced a rise of 0.5%) with rises as follows: barber and salon services (0.4%); housing related costs such as utilities, construction materials, cement, bricks and painter fees (0.2%); transport, vehicles and communications (0.1%); and petrol (0.3%).

Oct 2012 vs 2011 - M-o-M

The 5.1% jump was calculated from the following: a 6.2% jump in food and beverage consumer items, which included out-of-home foods (9.6%); fruits and vegetables (8.8%); in-home foods (6.5%); meat, poultry and seafood (5%); nonalcoholic beveragges (2.9%); flour and flour products (2.6%); eggs and dairy products (0.7%); while food confinements dropped over the same period by 1.2%.

Non-food/beverage items rose on average by 3.8%, which came from price rises in apparel and shoes (9%) tobacco and alcohol products (7.9%); vehicles, public transport and petrol (5.2%); housing (2.3%); personal health care and pharmaceuticals (1.3%).





Asked about target occupancy, Mr Jabr said: "I cannot reveal the exact number, but I can say that the current number of reserved seats is satisfactory – higher than what we initially expected.

Mr Jabr added that the airline will be offering special ticket deals for an initial three month promotional period – from December 10 through March 31, 2013. The promotions can be accessed via the website (emirates.com).

Ranging in area from 30 to 60 sqm, the units will be offered from 1.49 million baht, or 48,500 baht per square meter.

Targeting both Thais and foreigners, the pre-sale period launched on November 11 and the developer expects to close sales by the end of the year.

Kasidit Manopinives, managing director of Able Assets Co Ltd revealed that the real estate company was founded earlier this year, with a total of 100 million baht in registered capital.

The management team has

vast expertise in property and construction business, having developed residential projects individually and jointly with other partners, including the Baan View Viman Condominium near Kao Takieb in Hua Hin, under Sittarom Residence Co Ltd.

Centrino's facilities will include a common area, lobby, golf putting green, exercise room, swimming pool and 24-hour security system with key card.

The construction is scheduled to begin in early 2013 and is expected to be completed by the end of 2015.

On December 8th, the company will launch another promotional event on the second floor Exhibition Hall of Central Festival Phuket, with special promotions to be offered.

Mr Kasidit explained that the reason Phuket was chosen for such a project is due to its worldwide popularity as a tourism destination.

"At the same time, Phuket residents have high purchasing power... The management team has developed projects in major

One key driver remains the sustained inflow of remittances over Filipino OFW's (Overseas Foreign Workers). In 2012 this is expected to account for 6.4% of the nation's GDP. An estimated USD364 million is expected to be spent on domestic property investment in the country.

One of the conference speakers pointed out the three leading reasons for leaving to work outside was to

create a sustainable livelihood, pay for the education of children and, as a caveat, buy their own home back in the Philippines.

Commercial property is another important contributor, with a decade-long surging Business Process Outsourcing (BPO) sector grabbing as much urban CBD office space as it can. While the showpiece on the industry has been call centers, the reach now extends into back office accounting and finance, design and architecture and financial services.

The world's multinationals

continue to cut and trim their expense lines to maintain profit and many of these initiatives find a willing workforce in Southeast Asia.


Coming along for the ride is a vibrant retail climate. Filipino's love malls. Actually everyone loves malls, except for communists and even they are starting to feel the magnetic pull of those food courts and branded goods.

Luxury is another force to be reckoned with in the new Manila. One developer Century 21 has found a niche with branded offerings by Trump, Paris Hilton, and is not tapping into the celebrity design game with Philippe Starck.

So there you have it, the world's most densely populated city and the largest in the universe coming together in a real estate zero hour.

After years of political pogo, it's great to see the economy showing signs of reaching its potential. Maybe there is something to be said for the search for the center of gravity after all.

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Prop developers to grow with GDP

DEVELOPERS remain confident that the property market in 2013 will grow by 5-10 per cent based on strong growth in gross domestic product, anticipated at 4-5 per cent.

Buoyed by this confidence, they plan to launch new residential projects worth more than 200 billion baht next year both in greater Bangkok and upcountry, especially Phuket, Chon Buri, Pattaya, Hua Hin, Chiang Mai and Khon Kaen.

The top three property firms – Pruksa Real Estate, Land & Houses and Sansiri – announced recently that they would each launch between 30 and 40 projects, totaling nearly 100. The estimated value of these new projects is 90 to 100 billion baht.

Another top-10 listed real-estate firm, Asian Property Development, plans at least 18 projects worth 20 billion baht. SC Asset Corporation plans at least 14 projects worth 20 billion baht, while LPN Development plans at least 10 projects worth between 15 and 20 billion baht in total. The

total investment budget for these launches next year will be between 100 and 130 billion baht.

Thongma Vijitphongpun, Pruksa Real Estate president and chief executive officer, said the company had strong confidence that demand for home purchases would grow next year between 5 and 7 per cent. This is in line with Thailand's expected GDP growth.

He played down business risk from political unrest next year. However, home buyers would face higher prices driven by the rising costs of labor, construction and energy. Home prices will increase by 5-7 per cent over this year's levels, he said.

Still, property firms will have to rein in overall prices through economical design and downsizing to match customers' purchasing power, he added.

SC Asset Corp chief operating officer Kree Dejchai said the company would continue to focus on the middle-to-upper-income market next year. Up to 70 per cent of its new projects would be lowrises, including detached houses and townhouses.

"We believe that demand in the market will grow when home-buyers are confident there will not be incidents such as floods as in 2011," he said. – *The Nation*



Using Exchange Traded Funds

IN TODAY'S uncertain economy, investors are increasingly seeking diversification, safety and a secure income. Interest rates continue to hover at or near all time lows in many countries, and the continued uncertainty about the strength of the global economic recovery has made many investors extra cautious. The Vanguard Dividend Appreciation ETF, for example, is designed to measure the performance of common US stocks that have a history of increasing dividends for at least ten consecutive years.

The top ten holdings are Pepsi, Procter & Gamble, McDonald's, IBM, Johnson & Johnson, Exxon Mobil, Coca-Cola, Chevron, Wal-Mart and United

Technologies. (Fig 1) The fund has a very low expense ratio of 0.25% per year, currently yields 2.2% and is up 90% from the March 2009 low. **Types of ETFs**

The use of ETFs has increased exponentially as they have gained popularity with investors. However, there are

a couple of categories of ETFs that ordinary retail investors should consider adding to their investment portfolio. These ETF categories include the following: **Index ETFs:**

By their very nature, most ETFs are actually an index fund as they usually track a particular stock index. This tracking can be done by owning the individual equities that make up the index.

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NMG report upturn in advertising

THE Nation Multimedia Group (NMG) says it predicts that revenue will increase 16.7% to 3.5 billion baht next year, based on an upturn in advertising.

"The growth momen should continue into next year, thanks in part to Krungthep Turakij TV, which should contribute more revenue next year. We also plan to launch the ASEAN One channel in the first quarter. The consolidation of Rawangpai and Mango channels into Kom Chad Leuk TV should also generate new revenue," says Duangkamol Chotana, president of NMG.

She added that this year's revenue of 3 bn baht is 20% above this time last year.

During the Stock Exchange of

Thailand's (SET) Opportunity Day, she said that after its launch in September, KKTV has achieved the monthly ad target of 10mn baht. Next year, it should generate 15mn baht a month. According to Nielsen Thailand, overall ad spending in the first 10

months grew 8.83% to 97 bn baht. Free TV dominated 58% of that.

NMG reported a nine-month net profit of 136.9mn baht, up 90% from 71.94mn baht from the same period last year. Duangkamol says she's hoping for a better fourth quarter than last year, when floods affected revenue. Earnings should improve enough for NMG to pay a dividend, depending on the board.

Print media generates 60% of NMG's revenue, then broadcast at 27% and 13% miscellaneous.

Next year, NMG should start realizing revenue from its partnership with Eleven Media Group in Myanmar, when a joint publication will be introduced. Both sides are working on legal issues.

Trade: big stick for carrots

THE time has come for the Pheu Thai government of Yingluck Shinawatra to devote more effort to addressing the ever-mounting problems facing Phuket and the rest of the South – and re-examining its erratic strategy in dealing with the ongoing unrest in the Deep South.

It would have been interesting to have been a fly on the wall when US President Barack Obama was briefed on the situation in the Deep South during his recent visit to Bangkok, if such a briefing took place.

There is little evidence that the conflict has wider dimensions. Fortunately for Phuket, the domain of terror has been confined to Haad Yai and points south at least so far.

According to Deep South Watch, insurgency-related incidents – including terror attacks and reprisals by state forces – have left 5,377 people dead and 9,513 more injured since the violence reignited in January 2004.

It was then that Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra, for political purposes, shifted power away from the military and the Southern Border Provinces Administration Center (SBPAC) towards a new agency under police control.

Of all the many state agencies operating in the region, none have been the source of more suspicion and contempt among the locals than the police. This comes as little surprise, given that the three southernmost border provinces for decades served as a dumping ground for rogue officers in a force where transfer, not dismissal or legal action, resulted from transgressions that if perpetrated by civilians would likely have resulted in jail terms.

Under PM Yingluck, the strategy has changed course dramatically: carrot is now favored over stick. A revamped SBPAC recently funded Hajj pilgrimage journeys to 8,000 Thai Muslims from the region at a cost of 160,000 baht each for the 45-day journey.

Among those receiving the all-expenses-paid Hajj trips were some 120 people enrolled under SBPAC's re-education program, including many who have already been the recipients of multiple compensation payments of as much as 7.5 million baht for each relative lost to the ongoing violence. While individual recipients expressed gratitude, the cumulative result of these and many other SBPAC-led initiatives have done little to stop the violence.

The unprecedented 1.28-billion-baht price tag is about half the cost of the former project to build a Phuket International Convention and Exhibition Center, an approved project now shelved with only the promise that the funds "would be put to good use".

The main problem remains that the Government's shifting tactics lack any coherent policy to address the root causes of the conflict, which have little to do with religion and much to do with matters of cultural self-identity and a widespread sense of social injustice among the majority Malay-speaking population in the Deep South.

Disabled fighting for Phuket reflections equal opportunities

FOR the past six months I have been working for the PPEO's Employment Support Department, providing employment advice to everyone, including disabled people.

Employers must open their minds to accept disabled people and not just lock us out. The PPEO is a very good place to see how an employer should treat disabled employees.

After work, I dedicate my time to the PRAV Club. As club president, I find and document road accident victims and other people in need. I make sure that information gets to the right government departments so those victims can get assistance.

Having a disabled family member greatly affects the whole household. A father who used to be the breadwinner becomes dependent on other family members. Sometimes children have to stop going to school to look after that person. Sometimes specific problems fall outside a government department's remit. That is where we step in to try to coordinate assistance.

Many Phuket organizations actively help the club with financial and resource donations, with much support coming from the Provincial Administration Organization and other agencies, such as the Social Development and Human Security Office and the Red Cross.

I fought hard to get parking spaces for disabled people at shopping malls. However, I still see able-bodied drivers using parking spaces reserved for the disabled.

I still have problems, too. Right



Nalinee Boonthawadchai, 42. has lived in Phuket since 1990. She has an accounting degree from Phuket Rajabhat University and a second degree in broadcasting.

A serious road accident in 1985 robbed her of her left arm. Five years later she lost both legs in another road incident. She now works at the Phuket Provincial Employment Office (PPEO) and in her

spare time runs the Phuket Road Accident Victim (PRAV) Club, which she founded in October 2011.

now I have a court case against a company I worked for a few months ago. By law a company with 100 workers must employ at least one disabled person. However, the company locations had no wheelchair access. Every day I had to be assisted to get into work. They didn't treat me as they did other employees. I don't want a single baht from them, but I do want this to serve as an example.

The PRAV is very active during the main holidays. New Year and Songkran are the worst periods for road accidents. Everyone knows that drinking and driving is dangerous, but still it continues. Except for Bangkok, nowhere else is taking this seriously. This is wrong and I want anyone with the authority to apply the law and arrest those driving while under the influence of alcohol. Subject them to the full force of the law instead of letting

them off or giving them a small fine as punishment.

I understand Phuket is a tourist destination and the authorities do not want to report crimes that will adversely affect the tourism industry. Tourists come to have fun and for many that involves drinking. However, letting drunk people drive could also ruin Phuket's reputation. Drink as much as you like, but

please do not drive.

I would also like to ask every disabled person to be proud and show your abilities. Society is opening up much wider for us. So come out and tell the public how good you are. Be clear with your employers about what you can and cannot do. Do not be shy.

I have only one arm, one brain and a heart – but I am happy with my fate and I won't give up. I am just trying to live as able-bodied people do and I can smile every day for the rest of my life.

PROBABLY as the result of a 22year military career, nearly nine years later I still get wandering feet syndrome after staying two or three years in the same place.

It happened the last time I lived and worked in Phuket. That spell in paradise spurred a two-year contract in Iraq followed by another two years in Shanghai, but with so many friends and fond memories of Phuket, it's not surprising I'm back.

I expect the cycle to continue. For now, my plan revolves around China. My love/hate affair with the language is far from over.

While I am gone there is much I will miss. The nightlife, Thursday football at Phuket Soccer Arena, Sunday afternoons at Nai Harn Beach and the live Thai music scene.

I'm going to miss the people I work with at the Gazette. I had presumed that after living on the island for a few years, I had good bead on what was where, who was who and the general goings on. Being a news editor has taught me how little I know.

Working on the news desk, receiving rough drafts from Thai reporters which then have to be rephrased to "native English" has been a true eye-opener.

Many a time I've been confounded by a statement made by a police officer or local politician, only to have the subtle undertones and beneath-the-surface activities explained to me. Courses of action, that we expats frequently sit in bars and write off as stupid or ill-conceived, suddenly start to make more sense.

I was told before I took the job that it would teach me more about Phuket in one year than I would otherwise pick up in 10 years. And that it has.

If there is one thing I won't particularly miss it will be

receiving the graphic images taken by the emergency workers of the dead and injured at the scenes of the all-too-frequent horrendous road traffic accidents.

I'm politically and geographically much more informed about Phuket and have better idea of what's coming up next and the problems likely to be faced. Strangely enough, I'm surprised that many Thais I speak to often don't know or haven't heard of events outside of their own subdistrict community.

Anyway, it's coming to end for me as I start to brush up on my almost forgotten Mandarin. However, it occurs to me that there is a huge number of expats out there who would benefit from a year immersed in the fascinating world of what's going on behind the scene in Phuket; some of which never makes it to print.

For those out there interested in the deeper issues of the island, it maybe worth keeping your eyes on the job section over the next few issues. No guarantees, but it may just be your calling.

struction is to be the new Phuket Port Control Center, but it is not yet operational.

To stop people dumping rubbish at the unfinished marina, we are coordinating with the Phuket Provincial Administrative Organization (PPAO) to increase how often officers check for boats attempting to dock there.

We would like to take this opportunity to inform all boat companies and owners of private vessels that this jetty is off-limits

and not to dock or dump garbage in that area.

Warit Wiriyapanich, chief of the PPAO Transport Division responsible for boat traffic at **Chalong Pier, replies:**

We are working with the Phuket Marine Office to solve the problem. Currently, early every morning sanitation officers arrive with a garbage truck and remove all the trash that has accumulated on the pier.

Throughout the day we have workers remove new trash that has been dumped there, but those officers do not have a garbage truck to aid them.

Furthermore, as the primary role of the officers working during the day is collecting boat tariffs, they do not have enough time to clear the trash that piles up throughout the day.

We have trash cans at many points along the pier and signs telling people to keep the area clean. Obviously, this depends on the consciousness of each individual.

We have not issued regulations that will punish those who dump garbage there, but we are currently meeting with the relevant organizations to determine what regulations would solve this problem.

Giving thanks to the goddess of water





SINCE the Vegetarian Festival has passed, Thailand is beginning preparations for Loi Krathong, one of the most colorful Thai festivals.

It is a time to give thanks to the Goddess of water and seek forgiveness for past misdeeds.

The festival always occurs at night during the full moon of the 12th Thai lunar month. This year the event falls on November 28.

Loi literally means "to float," while Krathong refers to the lotus-shaped vessels containing candles, incense and flowers, which participants float down rivers and on lakes and ponds.

The festival also includes beauty pageants, fireworks and Krathong making contests using materials such as banana leaves, banana tree trunks, coconut barks or paper. Each province has its own special features in celebrating this annual tradition, also known as the Festival of Lights.

A float can be as elaborate or as simple as you like. If you have a creative impulse to make one, try this simple method.

Traditionally banana leaves are used to make kratong, and for good reason too. They are easy to find, light and biodegradable. Stay away from the ubiquitous polystyrene foam, which takes years to disintegrate.

If you are lucky enough to have a banana tree in your garcutting its bark into lengths of say 10 inches, you already have a soft base on which to place the Kratong accoutrement flowers, a candle, and a few incense sticks.

Some people place a few coins as an additional offering. The key is to balance these props well in the middle of the bark so that your Kratong doesn't topple when placed in the river.

More elaborate forms of Kratong are made from weaving banana leaves into various shapes and forms, but this is best left to the professionals.


Most beaches and hotels will hold their own Krathong events where guests and tourist are welcome to take part.

In Patong, TAT Phuket joins forces with Patong Municipality to hold a Loy Krathong event on November 28 that will also include a contest for the best krathong and Miss Noppamas pageant.

Noppamas was a lady of the court in the 18th Century, who was credited with crafting the first krathong. At 5:30pm a large float will start from Sai Kor Road.

The Noppamas pageant will also be held on Karon Beach. In Phuket head to Sapan Hin and Suan Luang Park for similar celebrations.

HISTORIC architecture is fascinating. Architecture surviving from a particular time in history can tell us a lot about that period.

For example, the cultural influences of the period, the way people lived, their religious beliefs and a lot more.

One of the most interesting aspects of historical architecture is the clever designs and features that are purposely built into the buildings to solve peoples' everyday problems. Some of these ingeniously simple techniques were commonly used and incorporated into buildings throughout history.

Yet in today's modern world, they have become obsolete and forgotten with the advent of mod-

gets too hot, we simply switch on a fan or an air-conditioning unit. But in the past, people had to take a different approach to cooling.

A typical Sino-Portuguese shop-house building in Phuket Town is not very wide, but incredibly long.

Some of them are 25 meters long, and some go as far back as 50 meters. Often when one walks to the middle of the building, there will be a large rectangular opening in ceiling. Directly beneath the opening, there will be a pond.

Residents back then would have filled it with water, fish and aquatic plants. The opening in the ceiling would allow rain to fall directly onto the pond, filling it occasionally, whilst also allowing the sun to shine through and fresh air to ventilate the entire building. It must have been a nice spot to sit and socialize with friends and family.

But the sky view and indoor pool does more to cool the building than just allowing air circulation. When the buildings heat up in the hot tropical sun, the water evaporates directly from the pond. Water vapor leaves the building through the sky opening. When it does it brings down the temperature within the entire building.

Because of this cooling system, the temperature within the buildings was well regulated and far lower than the outside temperature.

It was a simple and low-cost cooling system, yet it must have been quite effective judging from the number of Sino-Portuguese buildings and mansions that adopted it.

In theory it seemed to work,

but in practice it may have worked wonders. The pond and open ceiling system have been used in many cultures to deal with excessive heat throughout history, in all sorts of buildings.

The Rajasthanis for example have been living in the desert climate of north-western India for thousands of years. They are renowned builders and many of their buildings feature a similar water cooling system.


Recently, Manit Rastogi, an award-winning architect, has taken a page out of the history books and incorporated this cooling technique in his design of the Pearl Academy of Fashion, located in the blisteringly hot capital of Rajasthan, Jaipur.

The Pearl Academy is a new building but it has the same poolunder-the-open-sky feature built into the middle of the structure. The pool is built into the ground and is around 4 meters deep. It is enough to create a microclimate within the building.

On a typically hot day, the Pearl Academy building is 20 degrees Fahrenheit cooler than the outside temperature. It does so without the use of air-conditioning or electricity whatsoever.

In today's modern world most of the solutions to our problems require us to use energy. As a result our demand for energy has become insatiable. Perhaps for a change, we could look back at what our ancestors did when faced with similar problems.

Many issues are not new or exclusive to our generation. We just got used to dealing with them in a different, more energy intensive way. Perhaps in this age when we so desperately need to cut down on our energy consumption, it is time to bring back some of those "obsolete" methods that have been used throughout history.

DR KOSOL Taenguthai wears many hats. As a busy obstetrician/ gynecologist he runs a six-day-aweek private clinic as well as heading the Thai Peranakan Association, a historical and cultural group where he has been president for five years. In addition, since July, he has been appointed as one of the four deputies of Phuket City Mayor Somjai Suwansupapana.

Phuket-born Dr Kosol, 47, studied medicine at Mahidol University and from 1995 worked for Bangkok Hospital Phuket. He left there after seven years but is still on call for emergency surgery.

Having joined the Thai Peranakan Association in 2006, Dr Kosol has been instrumental in highlighting the cultural heritage of Phuket as an alternative to what he calls the "Sun, sand and sea" tourism the island is famous for.

Under his leadership, the Association has organized many events to revitalize customs of the old Phuket ways, such as art and craft shows, traditional mass weddings, and the renovation of Old Phuket Town, among others.

His job has now been made a little easier since, as a new deputy mayor, he is directly responsible for fiscal and project planning for Phuket City.

"Phuket culture dates back more than 200 years," he says proudly. "The first contact with foreigners who set foot on Thai soil was made



here. Our history is rich and unique and we must preserve it and make it known to the world."

According to Dr Kosol, during the 1980s, when tourism flourished, old Phuket families responded by building hotels along the western coast or left the city altogether for the capital. This left the Old Town in a state of neglect and disarray.

"In a way my job here is a continuation of what I have done at the Peranakan Association. Phuket City has a clear mission to revive what is indigenous to Phuket, anything from architecture to old customs and religious practices."

As to whether he would put the promotion of culture above other more pressing issues like environment, Dr Kosol says:

"The two things are not mutually exclusive. When we campaign for the Old Town to be a pedestrian-only zone, we have in mind to cut down on fuel consumption and greenhouse gases. The preservation of old-style houses, which were built to be cool and airy, will also reduce the use of air-conditioning and therefore energy. So you can see that preserving the culture can also result lowering carbon emissions - killing two birds with one stone," beams Dr Kosol.

One of Phuket City's conservation programs worth noting, is a plan to develop the little known Klong Bang Yai, the historic 16 kilometer long waterway that was used to transport tin ore, which runs from Kathu through town and out to sea at Saphan Hin.

"We want to revive Klong Bang Yai and turn it into a historic 'green route' complete with walkways and bike lanes. We have been negotiating with householders in the area and most seem to be agreeable," reveals Dr Kosol.

Another conservation program, under the Peranakan Association this time, includes the formation of the Phuket Baba Museum on Phang Nga Road and a plan to propose Phuket as a City of Gastronomy under UNESCO's Creative Cities Project.

All in all, this is a busy time for the new incumbent Phuket City deputy mayor, a conservationist, a working doctor and a father of two children aged 14 and 9.

"I don't mind the hard work. I have excellent support from likeminded people whose aspirations are the same as mine: to let the world see Phuket for what it really is -ahistoric melting pot of many cultures that resulted in a rich and unique heritage."

LAST week I talked about the general state of internet connections in Phuket. This week I want to drill down on land lines.

I wish I could just point you to a web page that has all of the information about the various internet lines available on Phuket, and let you make a choice. Life isn't that simple.

You would think that the internet service providers would make some information very easy to find: go to the main page for TOT, for example, maybe click to get the page in English, and then you'd see a list of the packages on offer and their prices. Alas, it doesn't work that way.

If you're near a computer, try bringing up tot.co.th and tell me if you can find a list of TOT products and prices, in either Thai or English. Anywhere. I've wasted hours trying to get definitive lists of products and prices from the web site, and it's an exercise in futility.

You'd think TOT would know better. They aren't the only ones. CAT, True and 3BB – the other leading landline providers in Phuket – aren't any better.

The only way I've found to get actual, valid price lists involves schlepping to the service

brochure. If you're in the market for a new landline, get down to Central Festival, second floor.

There you'll find the CAT office (tucked in the back behind the mobile phone booths), True (next to Power Buy), and TOT (in the cul de sac with the banks).



account how much real speed you get for your money. Note that the "Mbps" (millions of bits per second) speeds listed in the brochures and advertising are pure marketing puffery and bear no resemblance at all to the real-world



speeds you're likely to experience. In other words, they're not much different from internet speed ratings all over the world.

TOT Fiber 2U 10 Mbps seems to hit the sweet spot, at 1,500 baht/month. You can spend 2,500 baht/month and get the nominal 20 Mbps line, but historically the 20 Mbps line isn't considerably faster than the 10 Mbps. There are "consumer" and "business" options, with "busi-

ness" being about four times more expensive than "consumer." I've seen little-to-no evidence that the business lines are any faster than the consumer lines. And if you're wondering about paying more for a "Fixed IP address," trust me, you don't need or want it.

True Ultra Hi-Speed DOCSIS 10 Mbps uses DOCSIS cable TV-style cables. The basic package is a very reasonable 599 baht/month. If you want the TrueVision "Knowledge" package of TV stations hauled in on the same line, the whole thing including internet costs 899 baht/month. The "Knowledge" package includes all of the major Thai

language local channels, plus various True-branded sports and movie channels, and the Fox network. Although True is working toward bringing other TV channels in on DOCSIS cable there are licensing problems – at this point if you want any of the good True TV channels, you have to get a TrueVisions satellite dish.

Some people have had good luck with the True Ultra Hi-Speed DOCSIS 20 Mbps line, at 1,299 baht/month (which includes the Knowledge package of TV channels). Others haven't seen any significant increase in speed over the 10 Mbps DOCSIS line. Since the 20 Mbps line costs more than twice as much as the 10 Mbps line, I personally wouldn't pay for it, but it may be worthwhile if you want local Thai language TV channels.

If TOT doesn't have Fiber near ou, and True hasn't run a DOCSIS cable in your neck of the woods, the next best line isn't a line at all, really. It's a box that's nailed onto the side of your house that gets its signal from a specific kind of mobile phone tower.

The TOT AirMax WiNet service runs B 599/month and it's faster than garden-variety ADSL lines. Unfortunately, TOT doesn't have many towers up that can use the service, but it's worth asking.

If you can't get any of those packages, you're left with ADSL. TOT and 3BB have ADSL lines almost everywhere on the island,

and CAT and True are almost as well-connected. My personal experience in Patong is that True is more reliable, and a bit faster, than 3BB, but the difference isn't huge. TOT and CAT are both competitive now – they're fighting in a commodity business – and their service is reasonably well regarded, as well. In general. You can find specific instances of shoddy service with any of the carriers, of course.

All four of the ADSL providers in Phuket offer decent 10 Mbps lines for about 590 baht. For that price, with a one year commitment, you should get free installation (which is generally remarkably professional) and a truly shoddy free WiFi router.

Almost everyone has to replace the router within a year or two. They just don't hold up. But that's another story for another time.

Based on many years of observations, I wouldn't pay much more for "faster" lines. In many cases, a 10 Mbps ADSL line runs just about as fast as a 20 Mbps ADSL line. You should expect about 1 Mbps in real world international download performance from a 10 Mbps line. That's fast enough to run Skype or YouTube, but painfully slow for big downloads.

Almost all of the service providers "throttle" (put a speed cap) on torrents and some other large downloads.

You'll notice that I didn't mention using a cable TV company for an internet connection. In my experience, the cable SandwichShoppe.

TV connections just don't work very well - they're technically fragile and not at all fast.

My number-one recommendation for land lines: if you need to be up most of the time, get two packages from two different suppliers. I've been running a True 10 Mbps ADSL line and a 3BB 10 Mbps ADSL line, concurrently, for many years, and the combination has worked well: when one line goes down, the other is almost always up. You have to set up your own router so you can swap between the two lines – unplug True and plug in 3BB, or viceversa – but that's cheap and easy.

Next week I'll talk about the wireless connections available all over Phuket - indeed, all over Thailand. Our "3G" service isn't the world's fastest, but it's certainly serviceable almost all of the time.

DOGS inherited keen senses from their wolf ancestors, and its these attributes that enable them to play such a massive role in our lives. With their phenomenal sense of smell, dogs are being used to sniff out illegal narcotics, explosives - even pirate DVDs.

Their sight and hearing capabilities help to assist the blind or deaf live more independent lives, and their power and strength is invaluable for dogs in an array of services such as water rescue or mountain search and rescue.

Sniffing Stuff...

A dogs' world is almost entirely organized by smell and their incredible scent detecting powers are so superior to ours, its almost incomprehensible. Dogs are able to detect scents at such low levels that even computers can't detect them.

Humans have around five million scent receptor cells in our noses, compared to around 300 million in dogs.

The structure of their noses allows them to breathe in a scent and keep it in their nose while still managing to

breathe in and out. Dogs noses are also famously wet and with good reason.

Numerous tear ducts run all the way their noses. A wet nose allows them to detect the direction of the wind and thus sniff out scents carried in the breeze.

The moisture also helps them to dissolve scent molecules so receptor cells located in the nose can identify specific odors.

This is why dogs can pick out the tiniest amount of contraband through a host of "decoy" scents such as coffee beans.

Seeing is Believing

A dog's sense of sight is very different from our own. Our vision is binocular and forward directed,

whereas a dog's is more monocular and peripheral, allowing them to detect the slightest movements, even from behind. In humans, our eves are located at the front of our heads, giving us a field of vision just over 180 degrees. We have to turn our heads if we want to see things that are to the side, or

behind us.

With dogs, the positioning of their eyes on the side of the head gives them a field of vision in the region of 260 degrees. A dogs's vision in dim light excels, to the point that a dog can see an object at a light threshold six times lower than a human would need to see the same thing.

Dogs are not color blind, but they don't have as acute a sense of color as we do and find it difficult to differentiate between red and green.

Dogs hear far better than humans. They hear sounds over a greater range of frequencies, from much further away, and can pinpoint the origins of these sounds with exceptional accuracy.

A sound that we hear at 20 meters can be detected by a dog at 200 meters. Dogs also have movable ears, which enables them to

localize a sound to a high degree of accuracy and quickly - in about one six hundredth of a second.

There are more than 18 separate muscles in their ears which pivot, tilt, elevate or lower the ear, to ensure that the dog knows where a sound is coming from. Dogs can detect sounds as low as 67 Hz - the equivalent of thunder rumbling in the distance – much the same as we can. However, their high frequency hearing is far superior and extends up to 45,000 Hz, which is ten times higher than a soprano hitting a top C. Such sensitive hearing means that even while dogs are sleeping, they are able to detect sounds that are inaudible to us.

Rather than feeding your dog a bowl of food in the kitchen, hide a number of smaller bowls around the house, and encourage him to use his nose and hunt for his food. Its a fun interactive game to play, to stimulate your dog mentally and physically.

The only rule is that customers have to order a drink or dessert to play with the kitties, or pay a fee of



bar, which is perched high on the northern hills above Patong.

Its not often I get to feel like a VIP, but arriving at 'Le Versace' was as close as it gets. Walking through the ornate, Gothicarched entrance you are transported into a sumptuously decorated interior dripping in opulence. There are tables, chairs, table ware and furnishings that are all Versace

originals. Chandeliers hang from the ceiling and gold statues and mosaics add to this superbly ornate locale.

Situated on three levels, each with a commanding view over Patong Bay, this is a perfect place to watch the sunset.

The Swiss-born GM and executive chef, Georges Dufresne,

explains that it was this same view that caused him to have the epiphany that resulted in the creation of Le Versace.

Georges' motto is Passion for excellence and it is easy to see that this is an establishment that cherishes quality.

We enjoy a cocktail together and discuss his concept some more. "This is a fun place and apart from fine dining I want to offer a 'smiley', happy place for people to hang out," he says.

"We have a karaoke lounge and what I call 'The balcony of Patong' where friends can enjoy the sunset view with one of our four signature cocktails and some 'French touch' tapas. I have a passion for fine food and love to look into the eyes of my clients as they taste my creations," he adds.

Although there is a menu available, I get the impression that Georges has already decided what to prepare for me this evening and he disappears into the kitchen returning with a platter of his famous 'French touch tapas'.

On the platter are two servings each of beautiful culinary art and we share the tapas together. This really is a case of putting your money where you mouth is as we start with a rich fish soup served in glass to better appreciate the frothy

cappuccino-style mousse that he has created on top. This homemade bouillabaisse is the most authentic-tasting French food I have had in Thailand and the same goes for the prawn served with Café de Paris and Champagne sauces and the smoked salmon and cream cheese tapas. Georges looks into my eyes for approval and gets it in bucket loads.

Before coming to Phuket, Georges, who is a member of the Chaine des Rotisseurs, worked as executive chef in some of the

> finest five-star hotels in Switzerland and it shows.

> > We have moved on to Le foie gras poêlé du Chef (590 baht small/ 900 baht large) warm, fresh foie gras glazed with tamarind and served with homemade vegetable chips. Divine.

After another affirmative glance from me, Making an entrance, Le Versace style. Georges returns to the

kitchen and the quietly efficient staff clear away the beautiful Versace dishes.

I look around at the intimate, sumptuous setting and, at a nearby table, one of the other guests, also Swiss, catches my eye and we raise our glasses to each other in a silent acknowledgment that we share a love of fine cuisine. The other guest moves over to the white piano and plays us a tune. It's that kind of place.

There are only five tables available: one table for eight; two tables for six and two for up to four. Georges prefers it this way and as he put it earlier "We are open from 5pm until late - even at midnight I will cook for you. I don't want too many people as I want to keep the atmosphere and to be able to lavish attention on each customer. If I cant do that well I'd prefer to turn people away."

In other words reservations are highly recommended, as is the main course that Georges has produced for me tonight: Filet de boeuf, Café de Paris, avec gratin dauphinois au senteur truffe blanche or Beff filet with Café de Paris sauce served with layered potatoes perfumed with white truffle oil. (700 baht small/1,270 baht large).

The sauce is divine and Georges explains how he has made it his own. The original Café de Paris sauce is a complex butter-based sauce, the ingredients of which remain a trade secret. Two recipes exist from the original Café de Paris in Geneva which opened in 1907 and Georges was able to obtain one of them. He modified it by removing the heaviness of butter and cream and this has now become his own secret recipe and the press still talk about it. He walks over and drizzles some over my beef.

Menu items comes in two sizes and prices, as George wants his guests to leave feeling they have eaten well but are not overfed. He has judged my portion to perfection with just enough fresh vegetables on the side. We wash it down with a New





MARILYN BAND sailed into Patong Bay in 1980 with husband, Nick, aboard their cruising yacht, Musichana. After sailing around the Indian Ocean, the adventurous couple had a sense they had found their new home.

appeals to me in the moment. I focus on my natural response to the places and people I meet on my travels."



Marilyn Band creates authentic art that reflects the cultures of tropical Asia. This will be one of the most important gallery shows of the season.





The Man Booker Prize for Fiction is a literary prize awarded each year for the best original full-length novel, written in the English language, by a citizen of the Commonwealth of Nations, Ireland, or Zimbabwe. The winner of the Man Booker Prize is generally assured of international renown and success; therefore, the prize is of great significance for the book trade. The Booker Prize is greeted with great anticipation and fanfare. It is also a mark of distinction for authors to be selected for inclusion in the shortlist or even to be nominated for the "longlist".

THE Man Booker Prize is a big thing for the Brits. The Americans used to have the Pulitzer Prize for Fiction till that turned insufferably stodgy and was eclipsed by the National Book Award. But it still does not compare to the Man Booker.

A great deal of fanfare goes into announcing the long list of candidates, then the short list, then the winner itself. There's also the prize money of 50,000 pounds, a boon to many an

impoverished novelist.

The prize will also make your name for life. I've read half the 44 prizewinning novels and all but a few deserved it.

One of these few is the 2011 winner, The Sense of an Ending (Vintage Books, London, 2011, 150pp) by Julian Barnes.

I'm no authority on Julian Barnes. Previously I'd only read one of his 13 works of fiction. Barnes was shortlisted three times but failed to win.

A contemporary of previous winners Martin Amis and Ian McEwan, perhaps he became a sentimental favorite the fourth time around for his slight novella.

The tale revolves around an epistemological question: how do I know what I know? How can I trust my memory, especially if there are no documents to support it? The text is liberally peppered with related questions and this becomes tiresome. The narrator disputes the idea that memory equals events plus time: "But it's all much odder than

that. Who was it that said that memory is what we thought we'd forgotten? And it ought to be obvious to us that time doesn't act like a fixative, rather as a solvent. But it's not convenient it's not useful – to believe this: it doesn't help to get on with our lives; so we ignore it."

The story is a common enough one for the author's generation and starts in a secondary school in London in the early 1960s. The narrator, Tony Webster, and his two friends Alex and Colin, yearn to escape their grubby middle class lives for the real, true,

important things that: "Literature [is] all about: love, sex, morality, friendship, happiness, suffering, betrayal, adultery, good and evil, heroes and villains, guilt and innocence, ambition, power, justice, revolution, war, fathers and sons, mothers and daughters, the individual against society, success and failure, murder, suicide, death [and] God."

The trio are joined by a fourth, a newcomer named Adrian Finn who greatly outshines them.

He leaves his history teacher dumbfounded by observing, "History is that certainty produced at the point where the imperfections of memory meet the inadequacies of documentation."

At Bristol College, Tony has his heart broken by his first love Veronica Ford who is ambitious and conniving enough to leave him for Adrian Finn who has won a scholarship to Cambridge.

After graduation, he goes off to the US to wander about for six months on his first real adventure and his second romance with an American girl named Annie.

Then, he decides to return to England and lead an absolutely normal life: job, marriage, daughter, divorce and retirement into weary and whimsical reflections like this nugget: "Just as all

political and historical change sooner or later disappoints, so does adulthood. So does life.

Sometimes I think the purpose of life is to reconcile us to its eventual loss by wearing us down, by proving, however long it takes, that life isn't all it's cracked up to be."

The only drama after his return from America

is that he learns that Adrian Finn has committed suicide. Thus ends part one and you think: This won the Man Booker Prize?

There are surprises in part two. Tony receives a 500 pound inheritance from Sarah Ford, Veronica's mother, whom he only met once at their stifling home in Kent. She also leaves him Adrian Finn's diary, but Veronica has stolen it, so Tony must track down his old love and unravel the mystery of Adrian's history that ended in suicide.

More surprises are in store. So the shock of his life in the end springs from the dead horse that Tony has a history of beating. But the novella still doesn't deserve the Man Booker.

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Fighting for feminism

FOR restless Balinese writer Oka Rusmini, the fight for feminism is far from over. "Many people think that in Indonesia, feminism has succeeded in the form of texts and theories," Rusmini says. "So, for as long as some women are still being discriminated against by their society, culture and religion, gender equality has not been established yet - not here, not anywhere."

This is why she writes.

Rusmini has published several works that center on the unjust treatment of Balinese women, who still suffer gender discrimination.

"My books are for women. It's too far-fetched to want men to understand and embrace feminism. It's the women who need to understand how to deal with their bodies, religion and society," she says.

Rusmini's publications include the poetry collections: *Monolog* Pohon (1997), Patiwangi (2003),



Warna Kita (2007) and Pandora (2008); the novels: Tarian Bumi (2000), Kenanga (2003) and Tempurung (2010); the short-story sets Sagra (2001) Akar Pule (2012). Tarian Bumi has been translated into German and English.

Born in Jakarta in 1967, she spent her youth in Bali, in a rigid patriarchal community. She says she "faced a harsh socio-cultural reality as a Balinese woman".

"People, not only Balinese, can shun me. I tell them this is fiction, but it echoes the facts in our society," she laughs. "The big picture covers the common things that can happen to women in many societies, but the frame is the Balinese community."

A mother and an editor of a leading newspaper in Bali, Rusmini started writing short stories and poems in elementary school but didn't publish anything until her second year of junior high.

This year, Indonesia chose Rusmini's novel Tempurung to receive the SEA Write Award. Earlier this month she was among eight Southeast Asian writers to accept their award in Bangkok.

Tempurung is about a woman who lives in an absurd marriage. The main character doesn't want to get married, though she does want children. The novel originated as a collection of articles published in newspapers.



The day also provides a bamboo raft trip.



AS READERS of last week's column will have noted, there are, in

essence, two kinds of aquatic plants: first, those that produce erect stems and flowers that keep only their roots in the watery element; and second, those with leaves and flowers that float, either with their foundations embedded in mud at the bottom. or, as in the case of the water lettuce, simply dangle their rootlets beneath buoyant leaves.

The water lettuce (pistia stratiotes) is very common in Thailand – some would say too common – but it produces rosettes of emerald green leaves, and it will usefully cover any fresh-water surface in a matter of weeks.

Sometimes known as the hell-flower, its leaves are deeply ribbed and scalloped, thus provid-

ing a textural Gardening contrast when mixed with **By Patrick Campbell** free-standing plants. In com-

mon with the water lily, it not only provides excellent cover for small fish, but out-competes algae in obtaining soluble nutrients, thus helping to prevent the discoloration of the water in your pot.

The water chestnut (trapa bicornis) operates in a similar way - a low floater whose leaflets grow on the surface and form attractive diamond-shaped patterns. But unlike the water lettuce, these leaflets are attached to a submerged, brown, edible fruit. It is, moreover, less invasive than the shell-flower and does not grow quickly enough to overpower other species. Along with the much more substantial, fleshy leaved water hyacinth, which has the advan-

tage of producing prominent clusters of hyacinth-like, mauve flowers. these "floaters" are all candidates for shallow, widerimmed pots. And as with nymphea, they look best if the container is positioned well below eye level.

If these low-lying fellows are hardly the aristocrats of your budding container gardens, then the reed-like typha angustifolia certainly is.

Formerly known the world over as the bulrush of Moses and then as the reedmace, this distinctive plant carries itself with an upright swagger. Like all these aquatic plants, its roots can be completely immersed in water, but because it is so substantial, it is more likely to suit a large, deep pot.

Typha grows on strong erect stems up to six feet in height, and has stiff narrow leaves at the base of the stalks. But its really unusual feature lies in its rich brown cylindrical spikes of densely packed florets up to twelve inches in length, which look like symmetrical sausages and feel velvety to the touch.

There is nothing in the plant world quite like typha. Surprisingly, since it grows all over the Northern Hemisphere, it will tolerate tropical sun.

A splendid column of these thriving in a friend's roof garden is evidence of that. These spikes can, furthermore, be dried and used in floral arrangements where they will last for years.

Finally another aquatic plant that stands tall. The cyperus, a native of Madagascar, is nonetheless widely available here in Phuket, and is often seen gracing slender containers outside spas and resorts. A dainty but vigorous foliage plant, it possesses green ramrod straight stalks three or four feet in height, at the tops of which are grasslike leaves which radiate out like the spokes of a wheel.

The variety usually found in plant nurseries is alternifolius, but there is a finer form which has feathery, slightly pendulous leaves. Known as Egyptian papyrus, and possibly the real ingredient in the biblical story, it is, in my experience, less hardy than its cousin. Both, however are perfect accompaniments to an elegant, ceramic pot.

As for conventional garden shrubs to go with giant ceramic pots, that is yet another story.

be the result of too little or too much water, even over-zealous applications of fertilizer. Fan palms can also suffer from fungal disease (fusarium) which blocks the water-carrying tissue.

These problems are much more likely to happen with potted specimens. At the summit of Rang Hill, plantings of magnificent, broad-leaved fan palms are flourishing in filtered sunlight. Some of the fronds are nearly two meters across. No sign of disease.





Sport Sport Beckham leaves Galaxy

WHEN David Beckham ends his playing stint with the LA Galaxy, in what he expects to be a very emotional MLS Cup final, he will take pride in how he has helped raise the game's profile in North America.

Since the former England captain, with his global celebrity status, joined the Galaxy in 2007, Major League Soccer (MLS) has grown significantly and become much better known in the soccer world.

"This sport now has the foundation of becoming much bigger here over the next 10, 20 years," Beckham told reporters at the Home Depot Center on Tuesday, a day after announcing his decision to leave the Galaxy after six seasons with the club.

"I've seen first-hand the new franchises that have come into this league, I've seen the attendances grow to the point where they are competing with baseball and basketball, and I've seen the quality of players that have come into this league.

'We've also seen huge television deals signed and this league is taken very seriously in Europe and different parts of the world now. I am very proud to have been part of that."

At the age of 37, Beckham remains one of the most marketable figures in the game and was the biggest soccer name to move to the United States since Pele,

Franz Beckenbauer and Johan Cruyff in the 1970s.

Galaxy head coach Bruce Arena described Beckham's influence on the sport in North America in glowing terms.

"He's done more in MLS and for the Galaxy than any of us would have imagined," said Arena. "He's worth a lot more to the league than we ever could have thought.


"He has done wonders for the Galaxy. We have accomplished much on and off the field, and he's done incredible amounts of positive things for MLS. We are now a well known league around the world and I attribute a lot of that to David."

Asked whether he had achieved all the goals he had initially set for himself in North America, Beckham replied: "It's for other people to decide what my impact has been in this league over the last six years.

"It might have been different 20 years ago but now we have the foundations, we have the owners, we have the stadiums that have been built so the foundations are there for this sport to grow.

'I've seen it grow in the last six years and we all want it to continue to grow. Soccer's potential has no limits in this wonderful country," added the London-born midfielder who plans to continue his playing career elsewhere.

Beckham, who won six league titles with Manchester United in the English Premier League before



enjoying success with Real Madrid in Spain, hopes he can end his Galaxy career by winning a second successive MLS Cup.

"I always want to win any game, whether it's a game with my kids in the backyard or the MLS Cup final," he said.

"To be able to finish my career as a Galaxy player in my own stadium in a Cup final is special enough, but hopefully to win it

The MLS Cup final will take place on December 1 when the Galaxy host Houston Dynamo at the Home Depot Center, having beaten the Seattle Sounders over two legs to clinch the Western Conference championship.

"I was actually quite emotional after the game in Seattle because it was the last game in a different stadium in my career here with the Galaxy," said Beckham.

going to be even more so next Saturday because this has been my home for the last six years. I've had some amazing times, one or two difficult times, but some amazing memories here in this stadium with this team.

"I will continue to support this club because I love the players here, I love the fans, I love the ownership. It's an exceptional group of guys and I am sad to be leaving that."

MANCHESTER City capitalized and Mata. on Manchester United's shock 1-0 defeat by Norwich to go top of the league after beating Aston Villa 5-0.

Aston Villa held out until a David Silva goal in the 44th minute. Two goals apiece in the second half from Sergio Aguero and Carlos Tevez sealed the emphatic win and ensured Manchester City moved to the top of the league for the first time this season.

Arsenal beat Tottenham by an identical scoreline to last season's corresponding fixture, 5-2.



AUSTIN was a great race for McLaren. Hamilton, on the dirty side, lost ground on the first corner, but after four laps passed Webber. Then he hunted down Vettel and when Karthikeyan momentarily slowed Vettel, swooped into the lead on lap 42.

of the time. People ignored the ephemeral foibles of politics, and stuck to old names. To get to Roxas Blvd, a taxi driver needed to be told to go to Dewey. It's like that with Interlagos, renamed Autódromo José Carlos Pace in 1985, after a Brazilian driver who won his only race there in 1975.

Deemed unsafe, Interlagos was abandoned by F1 in favor of the Jacarepaguá circuit in Rio de Janeiro in 1978.

In 1988 Jacarepaguá was

renamed Autódromo Internacional Nelson Piquet, but I have never heard anyone use that name either.

F1 returned to a shortened and modified Interlagos in 1990.

Brazil is traditionally the season's final race, which often means that everything is often decided before the circus reaches them.

To win this Drivers' Championship, Vettel realistically just needs to finish. Alonso needs Vettel's alternator to melt.

So I expect Vettel to drive a defensive race. Hamilton will really try to win again, and Button and Räikkönen are both in contention.

The 4.4 kilometer Interlagos circuit is anti-clockwise, hard to drive and demands power from engines.

The race is tough on cars, and tough on drivers. Cars need outstanding balance to manage the technical middle sector, and speed for the rest. Weather is always a factor in Interlagos, and rain is quite likely for the race.

It starts on the "Tribunas" straight, followed by the "Senna S". This connects with "Curva do Sol" left-turn that leads to "Reta Oposta", the track's longest but not fastest straight. Then a pair of downhill left turns called "Descida do Lago" into a short straight that goes down again.

This is followed by a slow and difficult section, with small, kartlike turns and elevation changes.

Turn 6 is downhill and "Laranjinha" is a very slow right. Turn 8 leads into "Pinheirinho".

Then "Bico de Pato" is an easy right kink into the near-hairpin that gives it its name, followed by a constant-radius left-hander that slings the driver straight into a harder left at "Junção".

A left uphill kink marks the start of the long, top-speed section. Rising up through "Subida dos Boxes", the driver encounters a long left turn, which demands a lot of power. At the end of it is the "Tribunas" straight.

From the exit of Junção all the way into Senna's S is one of the longest full-throttle stretches in F1, and demanding on engine's reliability.

Interlagos has one of the longest pit-lanes ever used in Formula One, so pit stops are expensive.

Pirelli will again provide the medium and the hard compounds, but this track is more abrasive than Austin. So expect two-stop strategies.

The race is on the big screen at the Green Man 11pm on Sunday, and the race is 11pm on Saturday.

THE 19th Laguna Phuket Triathlon (LPT) takes place Sunday November 25 at 6:30am. The event has attracted a world class international field to Asia's premier destination triathlon. The LPT consists of a 1.8 kilometer swim, 55km bike ride and 12km run through the tropical scenery of Laguna.

Australian Chris "Macca" McCormack, the two-time Ironman World Champion and one of the most successful athletes in triathlon history, has signed up to compete in the Laguna Phuket Triathlon (LPT) on November 25 and Ironman 70.3 Laguna on December 2.

Macca has won 200 races around the world since 1993 including 12 Ironman victories, more than any other male competitor. He is also the only triathlete ever to be Olympic Course and Ironman World Champion.



Chris McCormack remarked:"I've heard so much about Laguna Phuket over the years but have never managed to make it there. I'm really looking forward to finally get there and race in this iconic triathlon location."

Both LPT and Ironman 70.3 Laguna Phuket will attract a field of about one thousand athletes from around the world, and are linked by a 'tri-fest' of training and social activities at Laguna Phuket during the week between the two Sunday races.

With some athletes opting to take on the challenge of competing in both events, there are a number of intriguing duels in store. One of the most prominent will be between Laguna veteran Belinda Granger of Australia and Czech Olympian Radka Vodickova, who are both vying to become LPT's first-ever women's triple champion.

Italian Massimo Cigana, LPT's first-ever triple champion in the men's field, returns to defend his title in a bid to be a four-time champion.

He will face stiff opposition from elite pros such as American Chris Lieto – an Ironman champion renowned as the 'fastest cyclist in triathlon racing'. The reputed fastest cyclist in

triathlon, Chris Lieto, is heading back to Phuket to compete in the Laguna Phuket Triathlon (LPT) and Leanda Cave Ironman 70.3 for his second year.

Lieto says he is keen to make up for his Phuket debut last year, when he was forced

to retire from the 70.3 after crashing on the bike course.

Renowned as the fastest American Ironman and one of the top professional triathletes in the world, Lieto has recorded 15 major victories, including three Ironman wins, a U.S. Ironman Cham-

pionship and three Top 10 finishes at the Ironman World Championship in Kona, Hawaii, highlighted by a second-place finish in 2009.

The recently-crowned 2012 Ironman 70.3 World Champion, Leanda Cave, signed up for the Laguna Phuket event less than 24 hours after completing her epic World Championship victory in Las Vegas on September 9, and before resuming training for her next

title bid at the Ironman World Championship in Kona, Hawaii on October 13. Laguna's confirmation of Cave's

participation has set the stage for a thrill-

ing duel with 2011 Ironman 70.3 World Champion and defending Laguna Phuket 70.3 Champion Melissa Hauschildt of Australia who was beaten into fourth place on September 9 by Cave, more than seven minutes behind Cave's winning time of 4:28:05.

At Laguna Phuket, Hauschildt will be aiming to hold off the challenges of Cave, Rodickova, Granger and a field of other top pros to hold on to her 2011 title, which she won with a course record of 4:17:01.

Two intrepid endurance reality TV stars are also making Ironman 70.3 Laguna Phuket the final leg of a global adventure challenge that will be seen by millions of viewers across North America and elsewhere around the world.

Laguna Phuket Triathlon is on Sunday November 25 and the Ironman 70.3 is December 2.A number of events will be held in the week between the triathlons to keep those in attendance busy.

THE AFF Suzuki Cup comes just in time to cure any futsal hangover Thai fans may be feeling. Eight teams from across South East Asia will compete in two groups to see who will go on to the knockout stage and eventually be crowned the 'King of Asean football'. 
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
