MANY MOORINGS REMAIN PERILOUSLY UNMARKED IN SHALLOW WATERS

By Gazette Reporters

AFTER spending 5.8 million baht to install new moorings in Chalong Bay and at Ao Por, on Phuket's east coast, the chief of the local Marine Office now says he needs more money to fix the moorings, which have sunk one boat and damaged at least three others.

The moorings in nautical terms are brand-new.

They were dropped in the water 14 weeks ago – Theerakulpisut this week rejected accusations that 200 in Chalong Bay and 100 at Ao Por.

Reports surfaced barely a month later that many of the new moorings in Chalong were not usable because the buoys that marked them had disappeared. They broke loose, experienced yachties explained, because the lines attaching them to the concrete blocks on the sea floor frayed due to improper tethering.

However, Phuket Marine Office chief Phuripat

the tethers were "cheap" and "ineffective". Instead, he blamed the broken lines on sabotage.

"Some people have cut some of the moorings. I have no idea who they are. I am trying to find out," he said.

"Some of the moorings broke because they have been used for a while [since November 29]...

Driver confesses to assault, abduction - denies rape

A PHUKET taxi driver this week confessed to beating and abducting a karaoke hostess before stealing her valuables and leaving her tied up in a Phuket hotel room.

However, he denied the rape charge filed against him by the

Phuket City Police arrested Suksan Mornamrong, 28, at his rented home in Koh Kaew on Tuesday for the alleged rape on Monday night of a woman who worked at a karaoke bar in the Rassada port area.

Suksan, originally from Krabi, was found in possession of stolen property belonging to the victim, including two mobile phones, 4,000 baht, two necklaces, an ATM card and her ID card.

The woman reported her ordeal to Thung Thong Police on Tuesday morning, recounting how she was abducted, beaten, raped and robbed by a taxi driver who drove a white Toyota Altis.

After the woman reported the license plate number of Suksan's taxi, police quickly found his home address and within hours had him under arrest.

Speaking in front of the press on Tuesday, Suksan confessed to abducting and beating the woman, and to stealing her belongings.

"I picked the woman up from a karaoke bar in Rassada and took her to a hotel in Phuket Town to have sex, but I failed to climax so I beat her, then took her to another hotel in Thung Thong,"

"While I was driving the car [to Thung Thong], the woman started choking me, so I bit her hand. After we arrived at the hotel, I was angry so I took her into the hotel room and beat her again.

"After that, I tied her up with rope and took her belongings, and asked her for the PIN code to her ATM card before I went out to work. I had to take a tourist from Patong to the airport.

"After dropping the tourist off, I returned home [to Koh Kaew], where police arrested me,"

Suksan explained.

After Suksan left the woman alone in the room, she screamed for help, alerting hotel staff to come to her assistance.

"The suspect was charged with sexual assault, robbery and abduction," said Thung Thong Police Deputy Superintendent Yodsaphat Suwannakij.

"We are now waiting for the results of the medical tests to confirm the woman was raped, then we will transfer the case to the Public Prosecutor for further action," he added.

New moorings wreak havoc

If we are going to fix them, we need the budget – but I have yet to draw up any budget proposal," Mr Phuripat explained.

Further, Mr Phuripat said he was not convinced that the situation required urgent action just yet. "I am now thinking about it," he told the *Gazette* on Wednesday.

With no buoys to mark them, many of the moorings remain unmarked in shallow waters in the bay, lurking beneath the waves for unsuspecting boat captains to inadvertently run into, explained several local vachties with over 10 years of experience in navigating Phuket's waterways.

The danger of unmarked mooring blocks in shallow waters became clear two weeks ago, on February 26, when the tour boat "Booze Cruise" collided at low tide with an unmarked block in the middle of the approach channel to the Chalong Pier.

The collision punched a hole in the boat's hull, causing it to sink quickly. The daytrippers on board jumped into the sea and were rescued by onlookers.

Not two hours later, a speed-

boat carrying tourists from Chalong Pier to a popular island resort off Phuket struck an unmarked mooring in the same location.

Local vachtsmen have confirmed to the Gazette that "about a dozen" moorings were placed in the approach channel, the main thoroughfare for boats arriving and departing Chalong Pier.

"About four of them are still marked by [mooring] buoys," one yachtsman said.

"Where the remaining un-

marked buoys are located is anyone's guess," he added.

Yet Mr Phuripat remains unmoved by the growing list of calamities associated with the new moorings.

"Boat accidents in Chalong Bay are common," he explained.

"As I told you before, what I really do not like are reckless boat drivers. They drive too fast and do not drive along the approach channel. This is the main cause of boat accidents," Mr Phuripat said.

Residents protest plans for new provincial hall

MORE than 200 Phuket Town residents gathered at Sanam Chai in Phuket Town on Monday to protest the construction of the new provincial hall.

The protesters gathered to express their concerns that the proposed new hall will negatively affect the lifestyle of people in the local community.

Former Rassada Mayor Suratin Lianudom and former Tambon Administration Organization (OrBorTor) member Rangsan Kongthong led the area residents to meet Phuket Governor Maitri Inthusut to file a complaint against the construction of the new hall.

"Residents are concerned about losing the football field and tennis courts, which they use not only for sport but also for social and community events," he said.

"People gather at the football field in the afternoon and evening, and we use it for fairs and to celebrate the HM King Bhumibol Adulyadej's Birthday," he added.

Mr Suratin promised that protests would be ongoing and that the

group would invite more people to overnight at Sanam Chai. join. To show their determination, the protestors said they planned to set up a tent to allow them to stay

Phuket Vice Governor Chamroen Tipayapongtada received their complaint as Governor Maitri is currently on duty abroad, and tried to convince the protesters that their fears were unwarranted.

While Vice Governor Chamroen was talking to the protesters, some of them showed their dissatisfaction by shouting.

V/Gov Chamroen asked the protestors to send a representative to discuss the issue with him, but they refused.

The vice governor explained that the present provincial hall has been in use for 105 years.

"The building is showing its age and it is too small," he said. "It is crowded when many people come together at the same time.

"We received a 450-millionbaht budget from the Cabinet to build a new provincial hall at Sanam Chai. The new building will be five stories with a meeting hall that can hold 500 people,"

"Our goal is to facilitate people. The new hall will be beneficial to both government organizations and local residents. We have to find a way to explain this better to the protestors," said Mr Chamroen.

"The man was hit by an OrBorJor [Phuket Provincial Administration Organization] pink bus at about 10am, when he parked his motorbike in front of Lan Nawamin on Phuket Road," Col Yongyuth said.

Kirill Kulaein, 43, was conscious but unable to talk after he was struck.

"He suffered head injuries and a broken leg, and was taken to the hospital," Col Yongyuth said.

"From the tyre skid marks at the scene, it seems the bus was travelling at speed when it hit the man... the driver will be called in later to give his statement," Col Yongyuth added.

Parks chief bolsters support for probe

on March 1 to hear firsthand the update on the investigation into 14 plots allegedly encroaching on soon the only land left Sirinath National Park on Phuket's west coast.

"So far we have investigated the land documents of 14 plots of land and found that all were issued illegally. We have asked police to press charges

against five of those involved," Sirinath National Park chief Cheewapap Cheewatham told Mr Manopat.

Mr Cheewapap was reporting old news. The most recent action taken was five months ago, when on September 7 he filed a complaint to Cherng Talay Police against the fifth land owner for allegedly encroaching on the national park.

However, during Mr Manopat's visit Mr Cheewapap did not explain whether or not any further action had been taken against the remaining nine land owners accused of encroaching

> provide any update of police progress in pressing charges of encroachment against the five land owners already accused of encroaching on park.

Mr Cheewapap did explain that aerial photographs of the 14 plots of land under investigation had been compared with the

land title deeds for those plots, showing that the encroachment had came about through "Flying Sor Kor 1" or "Sor Kor Buwam"

Flying *Sor Kor 1* are title deeds that have been legally issued for a specific plot of land, but are then applied to another plot of land elsewhere.

Sor Kor Buwam, buwam being

the Thai word for "swollen", is used to describe title deeds that have maintained the relative dimensions of the plot boundaries, but illegally expanded to cover more land, hence illegally attempting to occupy more land than legally registered.

"We are now going to continue to investigate suspicious land title deeds for about 1,400 rai of land in the national park," chief Cheewapap added.

Due to a lack of cooperation from the Department of Lands, said Mr Cheewapap, the Depart-

ment of Special Investigation (DSI) will be joining the investigation (as reported in the page 1 story of the February 23 issue of the Phuket Gazette).

However, the plan to bring down a 366-strong DNP investigation team from Bangkok to help in the investigation has been cancelled, confirmed Mr Manopat.

"The 366 investigators will not be joining us from Bangkok. We are now in the process of putting together a new team of officers from Surat Thani, Nakhon Sri Thammarat and Songkhla," he

"To facilitate the work of the team, DNP will provide a budget of 4 million baht."

During his visit to Phuket, Mr Manopat inspected several of the sites believed to be encroaching on Sirinath National Park.

"Although we will face many obstacles, the raids will continue. Currently, about 30 per cent of the land in the national park has been stolen by investors.

"If we continue to ignore this problem, soon the only land left in the park will be what is below the park office and the sand on the beach," he said.

Copyright theft gets a rollover

Former Miss Universe Natalie Glebova in Phuket to join in destruction of fake brand-name items seized in raids

MISS Universe 2005 Natalie Glebova joined officials as they destroyed pirated goods worth about 216 million baht in a ceremony in Phuket which was held to demonstrate Thailand's dedication to protecting intellectual property rights.

"We are here to increase the awareness of consumers about counterfeit designer goods and to encourage them to say 'no' to pirated products," said Deputy Commerce Minister Nattawut Saikua, who chaired the ceremony on February 28.

"By completely destroying these products we can increase the confidence of brand owners that these illegal copies will not end up back on the market," he added.

Mr Nattawut, Phuket Governor Maitri Inthusut and Miss Glebova all grabbed hammers for the event and took part in smashing some of the 94,210 counterfeit items seized by Region 8 and Region 9 Police, as well as Region 4 customs officers.

Copies of designer brand-name clothes, sunglasses, purses, shoes

and watches were among the many items destroyed during the ceremony.

"Because of the importance of protecting producers' intellectual property rights, we have set up the National Intellectual Property Rights Protection Center,' Mr Nattawut explained.

The new center, dedicated to improving communication between different agencies in charge of protecting intellectual property rights, was established at the Ministry of Commerce in Bangkok earlier this year.

"Within the center, different organizations are assigned separate responsibilities geared toward putting an end to intellectual property rights infringement. The Department of Special Investigations is responsible for investigation and suppression; the Office of the Attorney General will continue to press charges and apply the laws of Thailand in court; and the Department of Intellectual Property will focus on public relations in order to increase public awareness," Mr Nattawut said.

"We have to gain the trust of foreign investors who want to

come and establish business in Thailand," he added.

Despite regularly destroying hundreds of millions of baht of pirated goods a year, Thailand struggles to shake the image of being a hub for counterfeit goods.

The Kingdom found itself in the international spotlight over copyright infringement in May last year after Lady Gaga landed in Bangkok for her "Born this Way Ball" performance.

Shortly after her arrival, the pop star tweeted to over 24 million Twitter followers, "I just landed in Bangkok baby! Ready for 50,000 screaming Thai monsters. I wanna get lost in a lady market and buy a fake Rolex."

In response, the Thai Commerce Ministry's Intellectual Property Department officially expressed its disappointment to the US Embassy, reported The Nation.

Karaoke killer suspects sing to police tune

POLICE arrested two men last Sunday for stabbing a man to death outside a karaoke bar in the port area of Phuket Town just one day earlier.

Aphichet Janpradit, 33, and Phusithi Phaosuparp, 43, were both arrested on Sunday at their rented room on Koh Sireh for the murder of 28-year-old Surasit Sukhum, Lt Col Prawit Engchua of the Phuket City Police said.

According to witnesses' statements given to police, Mr Surasit had entered the Kanokphat Karaoke bar on Soi Vanich 1, off Sri Sena Road, ordered a drink and taken a table next to the two men.

"After a while, he [Mr Surasit] started to swear at them. The men walked over and hit him," one witness told police.

Mr Surasit allegedly tried to flee the karaoke bar, but was caught outside by the two men.

"Mr Surasit was then stabbed to death," Col Prawit said.

Phuket City Police received the report of the incident at about 2:45am. When they arrived at the scene, they found blood on the ground, as well as one flip-flop and a jacket. About 100 meters away they found Mr Surasit's body, Col Prawit explained.

"He had been stabbed in the chest, arm and stomach," he said. Both men have been charged

with murder and for carrying a weapon in a public place, Col

foundation after a reader reported seeing turtle tracks and people probing for eggs in the area between Maikhao Dream Villa Resort Spa and Maikhao Beach Bungalows on February 14.

Foundation coordinator Kittipan Sabkhoon checked with security guards and staff at the ho-

tels in the area and said that as of February 28, no suspicious activity had been reported.

Nevertheless, he is sending "guards and our staff to check to see if there are any traces of egglaying turtles or their nests on the beach," he said.

"The area around the Maikhao Dream hotel is well known as a nesting site for turtles," said Phuket Marine Biological Center (PMBC) veterinarian Patcharaporn Kaewmong.

"The way poachers find the eggs is to stick a rod into the sand," she explained. "If the rod finds a nest under the sand, they

will start digging,' she explained.

"The **PMBC** worked together with the JW Marriott Phuket Resort & Spa to set up the Mai Khao Marine Turtle Foundation. The aim was for the foundation to take care of the turtles that come ashore to lay their - PMBC veterinarian eggs on Mai Khao Patcharaporn Kaewmong Beach and to protect those eggs from be-

ing stolen by people," she said.

"During the sea turtle nesting period [November-March], the staff at the foundation rope off the nests to prevent the turtles from being disturbed and to prevent people from stealing the turtle eggs," she stated.

DNP outlines conservation issues to be presented to CITES

IN PHUKET for the investigation into encroachment on Phuket's Sirinath National Park (see page 4), Manopat Huamuangkaew, the director-general of the National Parks, Wildlife and Plant Conservation Department (DNP), took time out on March 1 to hand out pro-conservation pamphlets to tourists at Phuket International Airport.

The pamphlets also advertised the 16th annual Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES), taking place in Bangkok from March 3 to 14.

Mr Manopat outlined several of issues to be raised at the CITES conference.

Among them, Thailand will ask

are needed to ensure that numbers do not decline.

Rosewood is not faced with extinction, Mr Manopat said.

decreased by more than 60 per cent in the past eight years. Thailand is believed to be home to the world's only remaining Siamese Rosewood forests.

Thailand is seeking to change one animal from Appendix I (threatened with extinction, trade is prohibited) to Appendix II status – Siamese and saltwater crocodiles.

"Thailand has developed expertise in effective conserving and breeding of crocodiles, and could breed them for trading purposes," Mr Manopat said.

"This change would allow local crocodile farms to generate income from exporting crocodile skin," said Assoc Prof Parnthep Ratanakorn of Mahidol University.

Blood bank launches March mobile donation drive

THE Phuket Chapter of the Red Cross Society has announced its schedule of mobile donation clinics for the month of March.

"We need to maintain a daily minimum stock of 200 units of A, B and O blood types, and 20 units of Rhesus-negative blood," said PRBC acting chief Pornthip Rattajak.

"We currently have only 100 units of blood type A on hand," she said.



Man dies after second hit-and-run in 24 hours

A 21-year-old security guard from Phattalung died after the motorcycle he was riding was struck by a car on the road from the Heroines' Monument to Pa Khlok late on February 27.

He was the second person to be struck down in a hit-and-run in Phuket in two days.

Thalang Police Duty Officer Chatree Chuwichian was notified of the accident at 12:45am.

"The man's motorcycle was in a roadside ditch. The body of Mr Jarin Weenada was lying nearby," Sub Lt Chatree said.

Mr Jarin was still dressed in his SAM Andaman Security Service uniform.

Witnesses identified a blue Proton sedan as the hit-and-run vehicle.

"The car was seen entering the Neramit Housing Estate, where we found it, with matching damage to the front, parked in front of a house," Sub Lt Chatree said.

"The driver was not inside the vehicle. His wife came out of the house and told us that her husband had just returned from a meeting. He parked his car in front of the house and ran away.

"She had no idea where he was," he added.

Sub Lt Chatree named the suspect driver as Chaowarot Jantarak, 38, a marketing officer at Thanachart Bank.

"We seized his car and are now searching for him," he said.

The hit-and-run in Pa Khlok followed another hit-and-run in Phuket Town the night before.

Police are searching for the

driver of a Chevrolet vehicle believed to have been involved in that incident.

Kowit Charoensuk, 23, was riding a motorcycle when he was struck down on Narisorn Road, near Phuket Provincial Hall, at about 10:30pm.


Officers arrived at the scene to find Mr Kowit in agony, crying for help in the middle of the road. Both his legs were broken.

"Not far from Mr Kowit, we found his motorbike, which suffered extensive damage in the impact," Capt Akaradech said.

"Near his motorbike, we found the license plate Gor Nor 361 still in its Chevrolet dealer frame. We will use it to search for the driver," he added.

Mr Kowit was admitted to Vachira Phuket Hospital, where he underwent surgery.

Police continue searching for Jintana killers

POLICE are continuing to question individuals over the murder of Jintana Mahattanapak as they await the results of CCTVfootage analysis being conducted in Bangkok.

"Experts in Bangkok are still trying to extract information that will lead to the arrests of the killers from the CCTV footage we sent them," Phuket Provincial Police Deputy Commander Sakchai Limcharoen told the Gazette on March 1.

"We have yet to be able to make a positive identification [of the killers]."

Mrs Jintana, the human resources director at the Hilton Arcadia Phuket Resort & Spa in Karon, was shot dead at close range on her way home from work on January 18.

Col Sakchai confirmed to the Gazette that police are actively continuing their investigation, most recently meeting with Mrs Jintana's cousins.

"We were hoping that information provided by her cousins would help us identify a motive in the killing," Col Sakchai said.

"I understand that this is an important case. However, at this point in time there is very little information we can reveal to the public," he said.

Cough syrup bust nets 25

Plainclothes police officers posing as pharmacy staff make arrests

A RAID on a Phuket Town pharmacy early on the evening of March 1 turned into a bumper haul for officers as they arrested a procession of young people turning up to buy cough syrup specifically to make the local drug cocktail "4x100".

Following an order by Muang District Chief Supachai Pochanukul, 15 officers arrived at the Pharma Sure drug store on Si Sena Road at 6:30pm.

"We received a tip-off that the store was selling cough syrup to be used to make the 4x100 drug cocktail," said Muang Chief Administrative Officer Thammarong Chuayaksorn.

"The store was open each day only from the afternoon until 7:30pm," he added.

When the officers arrived, the only person at the store was counter service staffer Mathuros Chumchuen. "She told us the pharmacist was not at the store. We asked to see the register of drugs bought and sold by the pharmacy, which they are required by law to have, but she could not produce it," Mr Thammarong said.

The officers then called in store owner and pharmacist Theerawat Khumnil, 30, a Trang

native, for questioning.

"While we were talking to Mr Theerawat, a total of 24 people aged 20 and 21 years old came in to buy cough syrup. I pretended to be working at the store and they all told me they wanted to use the cough syrup to make 4x100," Mr Thammarong explained.

"So we arrested them."

Officers discovered that several of the youths were carrying kratom leaves - another ingredient in 4x100.

Mr Theerawat was charged with operating a drug store without keeping a register of all pharmaceuticals bought and sold by the store; operating a drug store without a pharmacist on duty; and

selling prescription drugs to people without prescriptions.

"He accepted all the charges and was taken to Phuket City Police Station for further questioning," Mr Thammarong said.

All 24 of the young people, two of whom were Burmese, will attend a compulsory drug rehabilitation camp.

Youth get creative with cocktails: 8x100 comes back

THE police crackdown on the indigenous plant prising longkong leaves, cola, ya bah [methkratom, a mild narcotic, is taking its toll, with youngsters now reportedly turning to longkong leaves in order to make a new version of the drug cocktail long known as "4x100", which is made from kratom leaves, cola, ice and cough syrup.

The new recipe using longkong leaves even sports a new, improved nickname: "8x100".

"Kratom leaves are the main ingredient of the original 4x100 cocktail," said Ranong Provincial Police Deputy Commander Suthep Kasetthong.

"Because police have cracked down on the trade of kratom, youths created a cocktail comamphetamine], cough syrup, mosquito coils, chemicals from florescent tube lights, tobacco and yogurt," he said.

The 8x100 cocktail appeared in drug raids in 2009. It is now experiencing a new wave of popularity among young drug-takers, Lt Col Suthep said.

"It is gaining popularity again in the southern provinces of Ranong, Chumphon and Surat Thani," he stated.

"This new, stronger drink is very dangerous. We have to add tougher measures to crack down on this new drug," he said.

Lizard-eater reveals health, sex secret

A 74-YEAR-OLD man in Kamphaeng Phet Province has revealed his secret to staying healthy and maintaining his sexual power: eating lizards live.

Dokrak Umsaeng, originally from Ang Thong, says he has been eating small geckos, which are commonly found on walls in Thailand, for 12 years – and has no plans to stop.

Lert Thetjaem, the former village chief of Khlong Si Nuan in Muang District of Kamphaeng Phet, tipped off reporters from Kom Chad Luek that a man in his village was eating geckos because he claimed they had health benefits.

When the reporters arrived at Mr Dokrak's house, they found a large crowd gathered outside



with Mr Dokrak at the center, holding a plastic bag containing two small, live lizards.

He pulled one of the lizards out of the bag and held it over his gaping mouth. Then he flicked the creature on the head, presumably to stun it, before stuffing it into his mouth. After he took a gulp of water, the gecko was gone.

Mr Dokrak was almost giddy with excitement, as if he had just consumed some sort of stimulant.

He told reporters he had been

eating lizards for 12 years because he thought they could cure

He claimed that he used to suffer from shortness of breath but that eating geckos cured him.

He said that when he was a child, people regularly grilled and ate lizards because they believed they would make you strong.

"These days, whenever I find a lizard I grab it and eat it straight away. Sometimes I don't eat one for half a month as there aren't many left and finding them gets harder every day," he said.

"But for health, eating one every two or three days is good. The important thing is that it also increases your sexual power," said the septuagenarian.

Pheu Thai man loses in Bangkok elections

AROUND THE nation

INCUMBENT Bangkok Governor Sukhumbhand Paribatra won a second term in last week's gubernatorial elections in a victory that is being seen as a vote against political domination by the ruling Pheu Thai Party.

Some observers even called the result a blow for former prime minister and Pheu Thai patriarch Thaksin Shinawatra, who had claimed he could get a "lamp post" elected ahead of Mr Sukhumbhand.

The hotly contested poll saw the largest voter turnout of any Bangkok election yet staged. Of 4,244,465 eligible voters, 2,715,640 cast ballots, a record turnout of 63.98 per cent.

Mr Sukhumbhand of the Democrat Party won 1,256,231 votes the - highest number ever against 1,077,899 for the Pheu Thai candidate Pongsapat Pongcharoen.

Independent candidates failed to make much of an impact. Sereepisuth Temeeyaves came third with 166,582 votes and radio DJ Suharit Siamwalla won 78,825, while Kosit Suwinijjit gathered only 28,640.

Analysts believe the Democrat Party's focus on the "fear factor" late in the campaign may have helped tip the balance in the party's favor.

The party made a point of reminding Bangkok residents that Pheu Thai was associated with the political turmoil from the red-shirt protest in 2010 that led to the burning of buildings in the city centre.

Prime Minister Yingluck Shinawatra, reportedly on the verge of tears, promised "seamless" government cooperation with City Hall.

Mr Pongsapat had himself cam-

paigned on his claimed ability to provide "seamless" coordination with the government.

The result came as a surprise to many, since most of the polls leading up to the election had predicted a victory for the Pheu Thai man.

Even on election day, Abac Poll released "pre-election" results conducted on 5,713 people, 45.9 per cent of whom said they would vote for Mr Pongsapat while 34.1 per cent said they preferred Mr Sukhumbhand.

Writing in The Nation, editor Tulsathit Taptim pointed out that Pheu Thai was closing the gap in the city.

"That and pre-election surveys should give the opposition camp a clear warning that this could be the Democrats' last chance to please the highly fickle and extremely demanding Bangkokians, whatever their desires are," he wrote.

Yingluck vows action in ivory smuggling war

PRIME Minister Yingluck Shinawatra has pledged to end Thailand's role in the illegal ivory trade, in response to international calls for the country's help.

"I must stress that no one cares more about elephants than Thais and I believe that Thailand will be a strong ally in the fight against illicit trafficking in ivory," she said.

Ms Yingluck was speaking in front of more than 2,000 representatives of 150 countries at the 16th Meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES).

The annual two-week conference is taking place in Bangkok this year, putting a spotlight on Thailand's record of protecting endangered species.

"Unfortunately, many have used Thailand as a transit country for the illegal international ivory trade," she said, adding that the government is working with both domestic and international organizations to combat international trafficking in tusks.

"The next step will be amending national legislation," she said.

Southern peace talks met with doubts

Gen Prayuth said many new insurgent groups had formed groups that would not take orders from the BRN.



Newborn cured of HIV

THE remarkable case of a baby being cured of HIV infection in the United States using readily available drugs has raised new hope for eradicating the infection in infants worldwide, but scientists say it will take a lot more research and much more sensitive diagnostics before this hope becomes a reality.

In a medical first for an infant, the Mississippi toddler was born in July 2010 infected with HIV and treated within 30 hours of delivery with aggressive HIV therapy, which continued for 18 months. She is now considered cured of her infection, a team of researchers led by Dr Deborah Persaud, a virologist at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, said in a news conference at the Conference on Retroviruses and Opportunistic Infections in Atlanta on Sunday.

"From a clinical perspective, this means that if you can get an infected baby on to antiretroviral drugs immediately after delivery, it's going to be possible to prevent or reverse the infection – essentially cure the baby," said Dr Steven Deeks, an HIV and AIDS researcher at the University of California at San Francisco who is attending the conference, where the case was presented to researchers on Monday.

Deeks and others hailed the

findings as a great advance in the search for a cure in babies born infected with HIV. But the researchers said they also suggest the need for better ways to diagnose HIV infection, a process that typically takes up to six weeks.

"This could have a profound effect on how we approach babies born to HIV-infected moms," Deeks said.

Worldwide, especially in developing countries, as many as 1,000 babies are born infected each day. For these children, the findings could have a major impact on the "terrible burden of HIV infection throughout the world," Dr Anthony Fauci, director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, part of the National Institutes of Health.

Michel Sidibe, executive director of the Joint United Nations Programme on HIV and AIDS, known as UNAIDS, said the news "gives us great hope that a cure for HIV in children is possible," but it also underscores the need for research and innovation, "especially in the area of early diagnostics."

Dr Fauci said the child's case was an important "proof of concept," but he cautioned that it was only one case and it needs to be further validated.

"The real question is will this be broadly applicable to other infants?" he asked.

Dr Fauci said there is a risk that without better diagnostics, children who were never infected in the first place could be exposed to toxic drugs with very early

"The approach of treating really, really early needs to be pursued," he said. "When we get better diagnostics where we can tell within the first day or so whether the baby is infected, an approach like this looks like it might be a reasonable thing to pursue with the appropriate clinical trials."

Dr Fauci said it is not time to change treatment protocols for infants who are born infected. "It's a single case. We've got to be careful about that."

Borneo violence spirals into crisis for Malaysia, Philippines

WHEN dozens of armed Filipinos landed by boat on Malaysia's part of Borneo island last month claiming to be a "royal army" and pressing an obscure historic claim, it seemed like a bizarre incident that would soon be resolved and forgotten.

Three weeks later, 27 people including eight Malaysian policemen have been killed, sparking a political crisis ahead of elections for both the Philippine and Malaysian governments and raising concerns of instability in resourcerich Sabah state.

While the violence has been contained so far to a small corner of Sabah, it signals that militants left out of a peace deal between Manila and the Philippines' main Muslim rebel group could be renewing their focus on the region.

Prolonged insecurity could also affect Sabah's huge palm oil industry and dampen growing investor interest in energy and infrastructure projects in the state, although the main oil fields are far from the trouble.

majors such ConocoPhillips and Shell have poured in billions of dollars to develop oil and gas fields in Sabah. Chinese companies have been investing in hydro-power and coal mining, and Sabah is a popular tourist spot with pristine beaches, diving sites and rich tropical wildlife.

Appliances see double digit growth

THE rising affluence in contrasting ends of the consumer spectrum is stimulating sales of major domestic appliances across Southeast Asia.

This mix in consumer development has grown the total market worth of washers, air-conditioners, refrigerators and microwave ovens by a healthy 13% in 2012 over the previous year.

In 2012, 19.5 million units of major domestic appliances were sold across Malaysia, Singapore, Thailand, Indonesia, Philippines and Vietnam.

Close to US\$6 billion worth of sales were generated, representing a 13% volume increase from 2011.

Indonesia led in growth, and together with two other countries, made up three out of six in the region which registered vibrant double-digit growth in value.

"Even as some households in developing markets are installing their first double-tub washer, a proportion of the affluent population is concurrently upgrading theirs to the larger capacity models with enhanced technology," observed Jasmine Lim, Account Director for Home & Lifestyle products.

"A flourishing domestic economy and rising affluence are key reasons for the robust sales of appliances, especially air-conditioners, refrigerators and washers."

Air-conditioners posted the highest volume growth at nearly 18%. Philippines and Vietnam are the two fastest growing markets for this appliance, registering more than 20% surge in demand from last year.

GfK findings revealed that consumers in the region are increasingly buying better and higher-end models, which correspondingly upped the average price for air-cons in the region by as much as 12%.

In the washing machine category, although single tub remains

the dominant segment, making up over half of all washing machines purchased, rapid adoption of front load washers was observed across the region with value growth expanding in the range of 9 and 68% in the respective countries.

Washers in four out of six of the countries experienced a marginal fall in their local average price.

"Although front load washers cost more than twice the price of single tub models, consumers are still willing to spend more on such models," highlighted Lim.

"The local government in tandem with manufacturers have been actively educating and promoting, with much success, front load machines for their greater water efficiency."

Another contributing segment to the major domestic appliance sector is refrigerators which expanded by about 11 and 10% in value and volume respectively.

"Single-tub washers and 1-door refrigerator segments will definitely

continue to see growth as penetration deepens in the emerging markets where some households purchase their first washer and refrigerator," said Lim.

"At the same time, the rising affluent class will also keep on fueling the demand for more premium appliances, and together, this demand will drive the continued growth of the major domestic appliances sector in the region," she concluded.

Scrap yards cleaning up

AS PART of a campaign to raise awareness about pollution, and thus reduce it, the Phuket Environmental Office is conducting appraisals of the island's antique shops, warehouses and old household item scrap yards.

So far, a total of 39 businesses on the island have been targeted by the government campaign, which looks to certify related operators as a "Green Antique Shop" or "Green Scrap Business" (Raan Kai Khawng Gao See Kieao)

The most recent of inspections were carried out last week by officials from the Regional Environmental Office number 15 (Phuket office), led by Mr Surachai Kulathong, an environmental expert researcher, as well as a number of police, health and

other provincial authorities.

The campaign, carried over from last year, is part of a collaboration between the Ministry of Natural Resources' regional environmental offices and its Pollution Control Department (PCD).

Its objective is "to promote, support and raise awareness and understanding among scrap and antique dealers about safety and sanitation processes in order to reduce pollution and thus global

The PCD estimates that there are more than 10,000 antique shops and household-item scrap-yards in Thailand. Up until recently, regulations and the respective enforcement concerning such businesses has been lax.

The PCD asserts that the lack

of regulations results in pollution that not only negatively affects operators themselves, but also their employees and others living near by.

The first phase of the campaign's appraisal process will involve officials inspecting and advising operators about the proper storing and separating of scraps; the cleaning and maintaining of grounds compliance with respective sanitation regulations and ensuring that all operators have the correct permit to operate such a business.

The second phase will involve reviewing and considering all the businesses that have passed the criteria, as to acknowledge and finally issue a "Green Scrap Business" certificate.

Three more subdivisions get approval

A RECENT Phuket Land Subdivision Committee (PLSC) meeting gave provisional approval for three Land Subdivision Permit (LSP) applications, while denying another application.

Chaired by Phuket Vice Governor Chamroen Tipayapongtada, the PLSC's first meeting this year was held on March 5 at the Phuket Land

Among the topics addressed in the meeting was the review and consideration of four LSP applications, as well as a review of the procedures in sub-dividing land, making modifications to existing subdivision plans, establishing a development and withdrawing from guarantee agreements about providing public utilities.

The PLSC approved the applications for the following:

1. Chanakarn House and Land Co Ltd, Chanakarn Suan Luang, in the Vichit District of Phuket Town. The development will span an area

of about five rai (8,000 square meters) sub-divided into 86 plots, which will include two story singledetached houses, priced at 4.2 million baht; duplexes priced from 2.15mn baht and town house units priced from 1.9mn baht.

2. Tantikowit Co Ltd and their project Thanawadee in Cherng Talay of Thalang, which is a development on more than three quarters of a rai (about 1,200 sqm), to be sub-divided into 18 plots of three story shop-houses priced from 5.49mn baht

3. Phuket Ban Sabai (2012) Co Ltd's project Royal Marina Plaza in Koh Kaew sub district of Phuket Town, is a development spanning just over two rai 3,200 sqm and will offer 61 plots, including 60 shop houses priced from 5mn baht each, and one large plot to be sold at a rate of 60,000 baht per square wah (four sqm).

Final approval will be given as soon as additional guidelines are met.

Meanwhile, the application for Tri Estate Co Ltd's Palm Villa project in the Pa Khlok sub district of Thalang, was denied.

V/gov Chamroen gave the reason: The project does not get approval this time around because the mayor of the Pa Khlok sub district informed us that the permit application for water utilities and trash collection was not done correctly, and [we feel] that may cause difficulties for future inhabitants.

The property in question was to span over 11 rai (17,600 sqm), offering 80 plots: 62 duplexes priced 1.9 - 3.5mn baht, 16 singledetached houses priced 3.4 -4.5mn baht and two empty land plots priced 3 - 12mn baht each.

Mr Panya Samphaorat, Mayor of Pa Khlok told the PLSC that the development would need to plug into the water grid that temples in the municipality were already relying on. And since there already is a shortage of water for these temples, he said that the additional stress from the dozens of new households would surely cause problems for future inhabitants.

Moreover, its garbage collection permit was not done correctly, nor convincing enough that the project wouldn't cause hassle for future residents and the municipality.

They [the developer] had only one vehicle registered to collect garbage, he said.

The 2015 Asean Economic cific Air from the Philippines. Community (AEC) has competitive implications for the aviation industry in Thailand, especially low-cost carriers (LCCs), which are flocking here to cash in on business opportunities from an anticipated tourism boom, resulting in greater

Given the country's strategic location as a connectivity base, Thailand is becoming a battleground for aviation players. At present, there are about 24 LCCs flying regionally, including four based in Thailand -Thai Air Asia, Nok Air, Orient Thai, and Solar Air.

A few others operate flights to Bangkok, including Tiger Airways and Jetstar Asia Airways from Singapore, Mandala Airlines and Lion Air from Indonesia, South East Asia Airlines (SEAir) and Cebu Pa-

In the early stages, such LCCs launched service in their homelands, but lately have started spreading their wings regionally.

"Not only LCCs, but more fullserviced carriers will be flying in here when the AEC commences," Udom Tantiprasongchai, chairman of the advisory board of Orient Thai, told *The Nation*.

Thailand is very lucky to have a good geographical position as a regional center for the aviation industry. Unfortunately, Thai operators will be forced to face stiffer competition and will find it even harder to stay [in business]."

From now on, Udom said, the market would be more dynamic. Operators will find it more and more difficult to stay on, especially those that lack funding and strategic

thinking to cope with the fastchanging business environment.

AirAsia will play a leading role in the Thai market. The recent visit to Bangkok by Tony Fernandes, the airline's founder and chief executive, to meet with Prime Minister Yingluck Shinawatra underscored this. He sought her support for the airline's rising role in the Thai market by using the country as a hub.

An analyst who declined to be named said political connections are one of the keys to doing business regionally, especially if companies seek to secure a foothold in each

AirAsia, founded in 2001, has become Asia's biggest LCC. It has established a business foundation throughout the region, with 118 aircraft in its fleet at present and a further 357 on order.

The analyst said it was apparent that the carrier would have a big influence on the regional skies, including Thailand.

It could out-perform Thai Airways International, the national carrier, within five years.

Udom said: "The success of AirAsia today is [based on the fact] that it has deep pockets and [is led by] the visionary Fernandes. He is smart at doing business."

Executives in the industry say AirAsia also prospers because of its business flexibility. It makes decisions quickly, especially when it recognizes that part of its business is failing. It keeps its overall operation strong by cutting off poorly performing services.

In contrast, THAI as a state enterprise is bureaucratic, takes a long time to find solutions to problems or launch new routes. Sometimes, by the time it acts, it is too late. There is no doubt THAI has gradually seen its market share snatched away by LCCs, especially in the regional market.


The trend is clear that passen gers are increasingly looking for affordable flights. They do not mind flying two or three hours with a LCC even if no food or drinks are served on board.

Fernandes told the media last year in Jakarta that he intended the AirAsia brand to be as well known as Coca-Cola. Its rapid expansion may help fulfill his ambition, and THAI may feel the pinch.

Although THAI has a 49% stake in LCC, Nok Air, that may not be enough to protect its market share from AirAsia's expansion.

Krisda Mahanakorn to release shares

KRISDA Mahanakorn's shareholders yesterday approved the issuance of 4.49 billion new shares as part of the property firm's plan to drive revenue to 1.5bn baht this year, up from the previous target of 1bn baht.

Managing director Wirat Aiew-Aksorn said the new shares would be offered at the ratio of two new shares at 0.50 baht per share for one existing share.

The company also will offer one warrant (KMC-W3) per 10 existing shares.


Shareholders also approved the issuance of 5 billion new shares via private placement to a strategic partner to develop its business in the long term. They also approved a split in par value from 20 baht per share to 0.65 baht to erase some of its retained losses.

Under this plan, the company will raise 2.1bn baht from the market to launch four residential projects worth 2bn baht this year. One is a condominium on Rama IX Road that it took over from Vitoon Thanakorn Co.

It has already been completed and will contribute at least 1.1bn baht in sales this year.

The others are The Kris Extra Rama 9 and developments on Koh Lan in Chon Buri and in Songkhla's Hat Yai district.

astical real estate. Though a quick search also finds other Hells – Norway and Grand Cayman.

Thankfully, hell and heaven are not the strict domain of Americans only. With the Pope going into early retirement, what's next? Sansiri denies 'property bubble'

THE property market is still showing strong growth thanks to the country's expanding economy, Sansiri Plc's president Srettha Thavisin said in an interview with *The Nation*. He also denied the existence of a market bubble.

He explained that the Thai economy was not just driven by that of the capital, citing a National Economic and Social Development Board (NESDB) study showing that greater Bangkok contributed to only 44 per cent of the economy in 2010, which was lower than the 52 per cent contribution in 2001.

This ratio means the provinces now have a greater influence in the nation's economic growth. As a result, property firms have decided to expand their investment into the provinces since 2010.

"When comparing the country's economic growth this year to that of 1997, it is clear that the economy has changed in line with the country's environment," he said.

The factors contributing to this are lower interest rates, 3 per cent compared to 10 per cent in 1997, which makes it easier for commercial banks to approve loans for projects and mortgages. The second factor is that Thailand now

has a credit bureau, which it was lacking in 1997.

Lastly, property firms nowadays are able to restrict their debt-to-equity ratio to no more than 2:1, something they were unable to do in 1997.

In addition, Srettha said, the country's infrastructure has also changed since 1997. Now, the government is spending more on projects linking the capital to the provinces, which offers new areas for residential developments.

"Since 2010, we have seen a rising demand for property in the provinces, especially since lifestyles are changing and people are getting more urbanized. This is why the demand for condominiums in the provinces is rising," he said.

It is due to this that the property market has recorded a strong growth since 2008, he said.

"We don't believe that the property market [has] a bubble because

most of the people who bought into our condominium projects since 2008 have recorded an increase in the value of their property. Plus it has generated high income for our business?" he said

business," he said.

At the end of last year, Sansiri Plc recorded total revenue of 30.08 billion baht and a net profit of 3.01bn baht, up 45 and 50 per cent respectively from the previous year. These have been the highest earnings recorded for Sansiri, which proves that there is a real demand for property. The company has also earned 16.64 bn baht in pre-sales during the first two months of this year.

However, Srettha admitted that some speculators have been booking units and selling them for an average of 10-15 per cent more. He said that most of these speculators have been able to sell their booking contracts to real buyers, and hence the company has succeeded in meeting the real demand. In other words, he said, though there has been speculation, there is still a real demand to support this and hence, there is no bubble.

"We believe that the property market will continue showing stable growth in line with the country's economy," he added. – *The Nation*

KPN to focus on property

THE Narongdej family's private investment arm, KPN Group Corporation, is launching a property fund to finance its latest condominium projects during a period of transition, as it switches its business focus from automotive to property.

Chairman Kris Narongdej said in an interview with The Nation Group, that the company would launch a property fund through its wholly owned subsidiary, KPN Lifestyle Co, this month.

"The fund is expected to sell its initial public offering units in the middle of this month after getting the approval of the Securities and Exchange Commission."

He declined to disclose the size of the fund. Starting in 2006, KPN Group has gradually sold out its stake in the listed firm, KPN Automotive, a manufacturer of automotive parts and plastics used in car and motorcycle assembly, to one of the country's leading auto parts manufacturing firms, Apico Hitech, for a combined 1.8 billion baht. Most of the money from the deal is being poured into the property business.

KPN Lifestyle, the group's property arm, now has more than 10 apartment block rentals, low-rise and high-rise condominiums and commercial building rentals in KPN Tower. Two condo projects in the Din Daeng and Thonglor areas under its new brand – The Capital – have been successfully sold out.

KPN Group, most of whose income

has come from automotive sales, has diversified to other businesses after manufacturing bases of various industries started to be moved out of Thailand to cheaper countries. Kris, 43, the first son of Kasem and Khunying Phornthip Narongdej, conceded that the group's net margin in the automotive business is very small, declining to only 2-3 per cent now.

Strategically, he said KPN Group was focusing more on the property business, buoyed by several key driving factors such as the rising national income per capita base, people's changing lifestyle with the new generation preferring to live in condos, and the changing landscape of mass-transit transportation which would have 10 more routes in Bangkok and its surrounding areas.

Chief financial officer Nuttawut Phowborom added that KPN property fund would be the first-ever property fund backed by rental income from a "freehold" commercial office building – KPN Tower on Rama IX Road – which means the fund's terminal value is unlimited.

The 27-storey KPN Tower has a total space of 50,000 square meters. About 27,000sqm of that are for rent. Though the building is 13-years-old, its location is considered a central business district of Bangkok, booking average rental fees at 340-350 baht per square meter. The occupancy rate is about 90 per cent.

In addition, the tower will be 300 meters away from the subway station of the upcoming MRT Orange Line. Apart from good location and high occupancy rate, the KPN Tower also enjoys other income, 20 per cent of which comes from outdoor advertising.

Kris said 10 per cent of the building's 60 tenants are subsidiaries of the KPN Group. However, 80 per cent are foreign firms.

Kris said proceeds from the property fund would be used to finance the two new condo projects with a combined value of 5bn baht.

The projects will be near BTS Sky trains and are expected to launch this year.

KPN Lifestyle focuses on luxury property projects with prices starting from 2.5 million baht per unit. Kris said the group also planned to list KPN Lifestyle on the Thai bourse by the end of 2014. Last year, KPN Group posted 18 to 19bn baht in total revenue, of which 60 per cent came from automotive sales, 20 per cent from property, and 10 per cent each from music, education and investments.

Uncovering survivorship bias

ONE pitfall investors need to be aware of, to avoid making a costly mistake, is called survivorship bias. Basically,

this means that when looking at historical investment returns to make a decision within your portfolio, there is an upward bias that is caused by the fact that funds or companies that go bust get removed from indices. This can manifest itself in many forms, but I will discuss a few ways in which indices and specific fund performance records can be misleading.

Firstly, when considering stock market indices, one should consider that many companies, which have previously been a component of the index, such as the FTSE or DOW have gone bankrupt. Usually they rebalance the indices so that as a company goes into decline, it gets booted out and replaced by a company on the up and up.

What this means is that when big financial institutions produce research about long term stock market performance, the averages are always higher than in reality because of the huge negative affect of holding companies until zero is eliminated. A quick fix is to buy index funds and they will rebalance you automatically.

The term survivorship bias is most often referred to when dealing with hedge fund indices. The sector in general is not public, so reporting is in effect voluntary. Thus the potential distortion is much greater because only the select funds which are performing stellar get included in the indices.

You need to be aware that there may be a strategy, which has had many blow ups, after long periods of consistent performance. This can lead to underestimating

the risk of a fund even when using the most advanced statistical performance measures.

When putting together

a portfolio, all of the information used is backward looking, so measuring a portfolio's volatility is subject to survivorship bias. Obviously, one, more often than not, attempts to minimize portfolio volatility, and so the "survivors" in this sense are the funds, which had the lowest volatility over the period they were measured. It could be that in the next periods these asset classes perform very differently and become very volatile.

This comes down to where I become a little cynical of the investment world. Everything can be manipulated based on the time period used to measure. Mutual funds are often managed by companies with 50 years of experience and yet none or only a few of their current funds will have been

in existence prior to the last bear market. They simply close the old ones and open new ones.

This allows them to effectively hit the reset button on their statistics and their performance becomes extremely exaggerated to the upside.

Unfortunately, survivorship bias is just a fact of life in the investment world. An easy way to avoid being fooled by it is to look into the longer historical track record of a strategy or asset class over many cycles. Alternatively what I often do is simply assume the collective results of a portfolio will be something like 20% less than they have historically simply as an adjustment for survivorship bias.

Portfolio management is not really a hard science, despite the way investment data is usually presented. Simply understanding

how survivorship bias can exist is often enough to help you have realistic expectations from a given investment.



Hail Phuket Provincial Hall

PROTESTS over the recently-unveiled plan to build a new 465-million-baht Phuket Provincial Hall (see news pages) strike us as quite surprising, especially the fact that self-described "local people" are leading the opposition: virtually all of the land in the immediate vicinity belongs to the state.

Few would argue the need for a larger provincial hall complex on Phuket. Various plans to replace Provincial Hall, which is over a century old, have been on hold for almost two decades.

Provincial Hall is home to the Phuket Provincial Office (the seat of the central government apparatus); the head office of the Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (a locally elected body); and other organizations such as the Phuket Press Club. The current complex is simply too small to meet the administrative needs of an island that has experienced a huge population boom over the past few decades.

Underscoring this point is the fact that despite being the seat of the highest power on the island, the existing Provincial Hall is dwarfed in size by some of the palatial tambon administration organization (*OrBorTor*) buildings that have sprung up on the island in recent years.

Inside Phuket Provincial Hall, the offices are typically cramped and overcrowded; outside, an inadequate number of parking spaces forces visitors and workers to park on local thoroughfares, including Damrong Road, threatening to degrade one of the island's most picturesque roadways into just another city street.

To be sure, we are concerned about several aspects of the project, especially the impact it will have on the entire government quarter, which serves as a natural lung for the ever-expanding urban sprawl that Greater Phuket Town has become.

Every effort should be made to preserve the surrounding area in its current state, to fell as few trees as possible and put a halt to encroachment in the area.

This is especially necessary in and around the Chumchon Lang Sarn ("Community Behind the Court") and several other communities in the area, which have their antecedents as slums illegally built on public land.

It is difficult to know the exact motives that were truly driving this latest protest, but one must suspect that there is more to it than outrage at being temporarily deprived access to a poorly-maintained football pitch and some tennis courts.

The fact that one of the organizers is not, in fact, a local resident and was a central figure in the almost two-year delay in the opening of Phuket Bus Terminal 2 in Rassada suggests that vested interests, not just recreational pursuits, may be involved.

Feed stray dogs? Barking mad...

First PERSON

THERE are many stray dogs on Phuket because Thai tradition is to be kind to them and feed them. When you feed them, they stay nearby. The more dogs you feed, the more will come. This creates problems.

One problem with stray dogs is the possibility of disease. Phuket has been rabies-free since 2007. We want to keep it that way.

If you want to help stray dogs, the best thing to do is not feed them. Instead, call us or your local administration organization. We catch stray dogs and bring them to the dog shelter in Thalang, where we take care of them.

We neuter the dogs at the shelter, but we don't kill them, as this is against our Buddhist beliefs. Right now there are about 400 dogs at the Thalang shelter. They are available for adoption.

We welcome contributions of food for the dogs, but not cash. You can bring us food or just drop off the dog food receipt and we can pick up the food ourselves.

Feeding stray dogs but leaving them on the street is not the best way to help them. One dog foundation in Phuket hires people to feed stray dogs on the street and at local temples. They even sterilize stray dogs – it's true this can stop some of them from breeding, but the dogs are still living on the street.

We appreciate their efforts, but the best thing is to let us bring the dogs to our shelter.

the street is they sometimes attack people, but none of the people feeding them is willing to be responsible for them.

There was a legal case once that reached the Supreme Court someone was attacked by a stray dog that was being fed by someone else. The victim sued the feeder. The judge finally decided that if you feed a dog enough that it doesn't go away, you are the owner of that dog.

In another case, we once went to pick up a stray dog, and a man claimed to be the owner. I told him that I would take a photo of him and collect his ID information for our records, so that if the dog attacked someone, he would be Another problem with dogs on responsible. Then he denied

If you have the misfortune to be bitten by a dog, the first thing to do is take care of your wound. Run a lot of water on the wound. Disease comes from the dog's saliva, so the more you can wash off, the better. Then see a doctor.

If possible, take a photo of the dog that attacked you, then either let the owner know or file a complaint with the police.

If you are attacked by a dog on someone's property, you can't really blame the owners, since you were on their property. Compensation will be up to the owners – I'm not sure what legal rights you have.

You do have the right to protect yourself if you're attacked by a dog, within reason. Again, if you are on someone else's property, it might be a different story.

For our sakes and for the good of the dogs, let's all work together to solve the stray dog problem in Phuket.

Coronation Day commemorates the accession to the throne of HM King Bhumibol Adulyadej on May 5, 1950.


May 6, Substitution for Coronation Day (Public Holiday) May 24, Visakha Bucha Day

However, Separation

Anxiety (SA) or Isolation Anxiety (IA) in dogs can be a huge problem, and somewhat ironically, is a key reason why many dogs end up in animal shelters, or abandoned on the streets.

But one of the bigger problems is that it is also one of the most commonly misdiagnosed behaviors in dogs.

So, what's it all about?

Separation anxiety is found naturally in many canid species, particularly the more social species like domestic dogs. Such distress behaviors are beneficial to canine pups and exist to prevent them from wandering too far from the pack, and to assist the mother in locating the ones that do.

The relief and comfort of social contact reinforces the distress behaviors that a puppy displays. For example, puppy feels anxious, he whines for his mother, she comes back puppy feels better.

With most domestic dogs, the puppies are

removed from their mothers and litter mates at an extremely early age when they are neither biologically nor psychologically ready to be on their own. This transition is usually harsh and abrupt, instead of smooth and gradual, and in the pup's new home things usually go one of two ways – both of which have pitfalls.

First, he may spend a lot of time by himself; be crated; confined; isolated during the day when his owners are at work and placed in a separate room over night.

Or, he is probably cuddled constantly, held, given endless attention and never left alone.

In the first instance, the pup may be traumatized by a lack of familiarity and isolation from the new pack (family) and this isolation provokes anxiety. The pup vocalizes continuously for an owner to return and starts to feel that he cannot control or predict his environment.

In the second instance, the pup never learns to be on his own and becomes totally dependent. This is the making of a neurotic animal.

It's also important to note that SA and IA are two different things. IA means the dog simply doesn't want to be left alone. Having any human for company will do, not necessarily the owner (I know people like this too). True SA means the dog is hyper-bonded to one specific person and will continue to demonstrate stress behaviors until that person returns – regardless of whether other people or dogs, are present.

Some dogs are more at risk than others.



There are certain aspects of a dog's history that may make them more susceptible to developing canine separation anxiety but since


many of us have adopted "street dogs" from organizations such as PAWS, we generally have no idea what their histories are. However, while there are numerous risk factors, here is just a quick selection:

Punitive Rearing Practices: Sadly common here in Thailand. The general mass market for puppies is governed by quick money, rather than care for the animal or the breed. Thinking we're 'helping' the animal by buying it simply fuels the market. (Note: I appreciate the flip side of this argument and clearly this is a debate for another article!)

Change in Routine: from lots of time spent with you, to very little time. Dogs are

> masters of routine, so things like changing jobs, moving house, girlfriend moving in (or out), are all things that can upset their routine and trigger things like separation anxiety.

Acute Awareness of Owners movements: Does your dog follow



Trauma: A traumatic event experienced by a dog when he was alone could also lead to a development of SA, particularly if these negative experiences happened in the first few months of their lives. For example, if they were home alone during a loud thunderstorm, they may associate being alone with the onset of something scary.

What does it look like?

Your dog will typically anticipate the separation from associated cues in his environment. Your dog learns these cues, many of which are subliminal, from your pre-departure routine. The main things may be: alarm clock ringing, kids getting dressed, you picking up car keys.

The minor details show in your body language, things that we don't notice we're doing. The anxiety begins with the initial cue and steadily grows until you actually leave the house. To round it off, we can often exacerbate the situation by trying to pacify our dogs and tell them "I'll be back soon, I'll be OK".

Your dog, however, cannot control the situation so his frustration level rises and the distress grows steadily, peaking usually within 30 minutes from the time you left.

From there, anxiety levels slowly decline at a variable rate as a dog slowly recovers, but, any stimuli may re-sensitize him, such as another dog barking, a car driving by, or a delivery man coming to the door.

There are numerous signs and symptoms exhibited by SA, such as: excessive barking or whining; scratching or digging; chewing furniture doors, window frames or frantic pacing. An increased frequency in urination, wet footprints from sweaty paws, drooling or a highly exaggerated greeting routine are all symptoms to look for.

One of the reasons SA seems more prevalent today than a few decades ago, is that it is often misdiagnosed by the average pet owner. However, just because the symptoms are there, doesn't mean your dog is suffering from it. For sure house soiling can be related to anxiety, but there are many other potential causes such as incomplete house training, lack of access to appropriate elimination areas, unreasonable owner expectations (expecting the dog to "hold it" for 10 hours or more), fear, excitement, marking, submissive elimination, or physical incontinence.

Taking care of your dog's teeth

JUST as we care for our teeth daily, our dogs should be no different. Being proactive with your dog will help prevent bad breath, gum disease, and oral infections. The these tips will help keep your dog's teeth and gums clean and healthy:

Daily brushings at home: Gently brushing your dog's teeth and gum line daily helps to remove any plaque buildup. If you don't brush your dog's teeth regularly,

the plaque mineralizes and forms hard tartar. Tartar becomes a spot for bacteria to collect, and the gum recedes from the tooth. If the depression around the tooth known as the sulcus deepens, it could result in severe gum disease.

Professional cleaning: Regular oral care and professional cleanings can also help keep your dog's chompers clean. Your vet can provide a thorough cleaning

and remove any tartar that regular brushings can't.

Dental toys: Chew toys can also help improve your dog's dental health. Chewing on a nylon or rubber toy helps to scrape away buildup on your dog's teeth.

Warning signs: You should take your dog to the vet if he has inflamed gums. It could be a sign of severe tooth problems. The most common sign of dental pain is lethargy.

The digital blues of Phuket computing



OVER the years I've talked a lot about how computing in Phuket is different - what you can expect, what will never come to pass, how to work around a whole lot of problems. This week I want to share with you a couple of stories from some friends of mine, who got stung simply because they were trying to do something normal, but they were trying to do it in Phuket – which is anything but normal.

One friend wrote this tale of woe about Apple and its iTunes store:

"It's my son's birthday today and his aunt in Hong Kong sent him an iTunes gift card for HK\$500.

However, he cannot redeem it as his iTunes account is based in Thailand. He cannot open a Hong

Kong iTunes account as he has no address there."

Another friend had a more, uh, complex interaction, with regards to his Kindle Fire. Here's the mail he sent to Amazon customer service:

"My friend bought a Kindle in the UK and wanted to give it to me as a family gift so that my two-year-old daughter could also use it as an edu-

cational device. However, the device is useless in Thailand.

We cannot even access free apps in the Kindle Store due to 'geographical constraints'.

This was learned only after going through the whole process of unregistering my friend as the registered user of the device and registering myself using my name as the new registered user - which ended up creating yet another Amazon email even though I already had one.

This created much more confusion as Amazon was not sure which version of *me* in Thailand was accessing the account - the me with the free Kindle e-reading app installed on my work computer, or the me accessing the Kindle Store through his brand-new Kindle Fire HD. You know, the one with its beautifully tailored operating system – said to be Android, but it's so specifically tweaked for Amazon's financial needs that Google Play and access to any so-called free apps are blocked. Well, at least in Thailand they are.

Registering a new user also removed access to any apps or data that was previously paid for and installed by my friend as part of the intended gift. So all that

money was thrown away thanks to the lack of warning from the Kindle and Amazon.

Amazon was kind enough not to allow any downloads, free or not – despite forcing me to register for a 1-Click account and then blocking all downloads with an error message instructing me to go to the Country Settings in the Manage My Kindle section in the Amazon account pages.

Not confusing enough? Even when I changed my current address in Thailand to an alternate address in the UK, I still get the same error message.

Considering the current blocked status of attempting to use a Kindle Fire HD in Thailand, I am guessing Amazon is not aiming at the Thai market or the tens of thousands of expats living in the country – or anyone thinking of bringing their brand-new Kindle Fire while they are on holiday or

on a business trip to Thailand.

This is a very interesting concept for a product launch, especially now that I see kindle.co.th is "under construction".

Also, it seems to be a very odd strategy considering that Thai IT dealers are advertising on their websites that the Kindle Fire HD is available for just under 10,000 baht."

Both Apple and Amazon – two of the biggest names in online retailing – are completely and utterly inept when it comes to dealing with Thailand. There are a myriad of reasons why: distribution agreements, copyright overlaps and simple lethargy are ones that immediately come to mind. The fact is that Apple and Amazon, in particular, are still fighting battles on potentially enormously lucrative countries, such as Japan and China, and we in Thailand are way, way, way back on the sucking end of the stick.

I had the same problem when I first started using iTunes. I was naïve enough to sign up for an iTunes account using a Thai bank debit card. I shortly discovered that I couldn't download about 90 per cent of the stuff I wanted to download - music and kids games, mostly - because those aren't offered in Thailand.

Here's the hard part to swallow. Apple doesn't care where you're located physically. If you have a US-registered iTunes account and you travel to Thailand, for example, you can download anything from the US store while you're in Thailand, get updates and patches, and generally carry on as if you were sitting in a developed country. Imagine that.

But if you have a Thailandregistered iTunes account, you can't download all sorts of stuff, no matter where you're located. Even if you're logged on to iTunes while sitting next to Tom "We'll keep the light on for ya" Bodett in a Miami Motel 6, you're forced to work with the Thailand iTunes store. You're a second-class netizen. Your account's nationality controls what you can and cannot see in the store much less what you can and cannot download.

Apple has all sorts of reasons

for making those restrictions, but in this day and age, the excuses seem mighty stale. A song, for example, may belong to a specific record label, and that label may have an exclusive distribution license with a Thai company. A game may have a distributor in Thailand. There are royalties to consider, cuts to be cleaved. International licensing is a nasty game,

and that's why iTunes has very strict limitations, dependent on the "nationality" of the account holder. Where, in this case, "nationality" is defined as "the country of the bank branch that issued the credit or debit card you used to set up the account.'

Amazon's no better. When I first got my Kindle Fire (which I love, by the way), I had all sorts of problems trying to figure out why it wouldn't work right with my wife's Thailand-based Amazon account. Then I remembered the iTunes problems, kicked myself, switched the registered owner over to my name (and my US debit card based account) and Lonly lost the amount of money I had spent with the Kindle logged on to my wife's account.

Is there a solution? Sure. Cheat. Get a credit or debit card in the US. Failing that, get one in Europe (although Europeans have long moaned about precisely this problem, there's enough money involved that we're finally seeing some improvement in European cross-licensing). And get a mailing address to go along with the card. No doubt you've encountered that problem before, and know how to solve it.



Right now, Amazon only sells Kindles in the UK, France, Monaco, Germany, Austria, Luxembourg, Switzerland, Liechtenstein, Italy, San Marino, Vatican, Switzerland, and Spain so if you want a Kindle that's more than a brick, you need to set up an Amazon account with a credit/debit card and address from one of those countries. I've also heard that there are problems crossing country lines - signing up a US-bought Kindle with the Amazon UK account, for example – but I think most of those problems have been resolved.

Apple sells iPads and iPhones everywhere except North Korea, I think, so you'll be able to set up an iTunes account that will work in any country on Earth but you won't have access to the breadth of offerings available in, say, the US. For example, the iTunes Match service, which lets you "upload" your music to Apple, and have it available on all of your iPhones, iPads and Macs, was originally only available in the US. A month later, it expanded to 17 countries. It's now available in almost a hundred countries, including Thailand -

but if you had a Thai-based iTunes account, you couldn't get in during the first, second or third waves of the rollout.

Life & style Environment The rime of the ancient mariner

Two bellwethers of our ecosystem: the albatross and the leatherback turtle

AT THE end of the 18th Century, and just after the bloodbath of the French Revolution. Coleridge wrote a narrative poem called "The Rime of the Ancient Mariner." A wonderful poem in its own right, it contains a pertinent lesson for our time. It chronicles how a sailor shot an albatross, a pervasive harbinger of good luck, thereby shattering the sacred bond between man and nature, and thus incurring the fury of the elemental spirits. Forced to wear the dead bird around his neck, the mariner endures several terrifying ordeals including the loss of his entire crew.

At length, he blesses some water snakes in an "acte gratuit", thereby showing he has intuitively reestablished a sense of kinship with even the lowliest of natural creatures. He is "shrived" (forgiven) by a holy man, and returns to civilization. The poem concludes: "A sadder and a wiser man / He rose the morrow morn."

The 21st century albatross is fortunately still alive, but alas not so well. This magnifi-

cent bird with a maximum wing span of over ten feet and a capacity to circumnavigate the globe, is still suffering at the hand of man, from man's exponential misuse of the planet.

Every year more than 100,000 die, many from ingesting hooks from

baited long lines. You could add that overfishing, loss of habitat, plus the introduction of rats and feral cats to many far flung islands, have also been major factors in this decline. Whatever the reason, of twenty-one species of albatross, nineteen are now endangered.

Consider this. There is a small atoll, only

2.4 miles square, in the North Pacific Ocean, midway between America and China, which the globe-winging albatross regards as a haven, a staging post remote enough to rear its single chick. A good choice? It once was. But now twenty tons of debris is deposited on Midway Atoll's beaches every year. It comes, as it does on Phuket's shoreline, from ships' refuse, from offshore dumping, from litter discarded on beaches, from waste carried down rivers or simply allowed to seep into the ocean. Of this squalid gift, five tons is plastic.

The albatross, which feeds at night and principally on squid and krill which swim close to the surface, frequently mistakes the bobbing, brightly colored bits of plastic for food, and ingests them. Many of these items are, needless to say, plastic lighters.

And here's the rub. The adult albatross, and 70 per cent of the world's entire population of Layan albatross breed on Midway, regurgitates these objects and feeds them to its chick. But this fledgling cannot regurgitate such alien things until it is nearly five

months old.

The indigestible and often toxic objects stay in the gut and the young bird dies with the inevitability of a tragic heroine. Unlike the ancient mariner, it has no prospect of salvation.

Thus this majestic creature, like so many species of bird, mam-

mal, reptile, or plant, is a bellwether of the world's ecological health.

If the seas are polluted, then the whole food chain, and everything – including the high-flying albatross and low-lying man – is affected.

Take Racha Island. On a visit to this sparsely inhabited island south of Phuket,

the NRE (Dept of Natural Resources and Environment) recently checked water quality, at the point where rivulets enter the sea. Three tests found that the levels of coliform bacteria were around 300 times – yes 300 times – the maximum for good quality water.

The island is a microcosm of what has already happened in Phuket. On Racha, and remember that Racha is a newly "developed island", a recent survey found that a resort was spewing out untreated sewage onto the beach area and thence to the sea. No septic tanks, no nothing. Plastic for sure, and lots more unmentionables. The impact on fragile marine ecosystems can be imagined."

The albatross gives us a global perspective, but sea-turtles are a key indicator of the health of our own Andaman Sea. Egg poaching has become such a problem that they have to be removed and incubated in safe surroundings. But indestructible trash further affects the turtle's capacity to dig nests and lay its eggs, while resort encroachment and consequent pollution has meant extensive loss of breeding grounds.

Almost every week, we hear of dead turtles strangled by nylon nets, rendered flipper-less by propeller blades, or laid low by guts full of - you guessed it indigestible plastic.

The problem is most acute with the

leatherback, the largest and rarest of turtles. This majestic, 500 kilogram creature, has been, like the albatross, patrolling these seas for hundreds of millions of years.

For aeons, the long open beaches of north east Phuket and Phang-Nga have been a sanctuary to which leatherbacks have returned to breed. Fewer and fewer now return. In the blink of an eve, the leatherback's numbers worldwide are estimated to have dropped to 2,300.

And plastic is one of the main villains of the piece. Leatherbacks feed mainly on jellyfish, easily confused with a submerged plastic bag. A bellyful of this rubbish is just as lethal to a massive turtle as it is to a defenseless albatross chick.

On Nai Harn Beach, I have encountered used syringes and needles, plastic lighters, flip-flops, tar-laden plastic engine parts, as well as the ubiquitous bags, water bottles and cigarette butts. All moreor-less indestructible, all with the potential to give off toxins such as DEHP or BPA.

The problem is not just the "Pacific Garbage Patch", a mass of granulated plastic the size of Texas, or even the fluorescent lighters of Mid-Way Atoll, it is right here. And right now, action at all levels from classroom to cabinet is urgently needed. We may, like the Mariner, be sadder, but are we becoming any the wiser?



What makes us human



SCIENTISTS say that the DNA of chimpanzees is 96-98 per cent identical to that of humans. This is not surprising. All you have to do is look at a chimp to tell that it is a smaller, hairier, and uglier version of a human. I see people who might easily be mistaken for chimpanzees all the time on my frequent pilgrimages to Bangkok's world-famous Nana Entertainment Plaza (motto:"Center of the Known Universe"). Indeed, I myself have often been a victim of this misperception. This raises a profound philosophical question: What makes us human?

Scientists believe that our genes make us human. But there is a deeper answer to this question that transcends mere genetics - an answer that will thrill the hearts of humanists throughout the world.

The thing that distinguishes us from other primates – the thing that REALLY makes us human - is that we drink beer.

Yes! You will never see a chimpanzee drinking beer – unless a human is feeding it to him. You will never see other primates drinking beer; not the monkeys, nor the gibbons, nor the orangutans. Mighty Joe Young did not drink beer. King Kong did not drink beer (although I bet he could have used a cold one when he was up on the Empire State Building being strafed by fighter planes).

You will never see a chimpanzee popping its head into any of the many fine entertainment venues that grace the Nana Plaza. You might see somebody who looks like one, though.

One of the genes that distinguish us from the apes is the one that enables us to walk upright. Why do we walk upright? To get more quickly to the fridge for a beer.

Another such gene enables us to speak. Why do we speak? To request the wife, when we are feeling slothful, to nip out to the fridge and get us a beer.

In fact, all our higher functions have evolved in response to our

need for beer. It has inspired our greatest technological breakthroughs. Why did we learn how to make fire? So that we'd have something warm to sit around while drinking beer. Why did we invent the wheel? So that we could drive to the liquor store and stock up on beer. Why the computer? So that we could access beer-oriented websites and laugh at beer jokes. 

COLIN Mackav's A History of Phuket and the Surrounding Region (White Lotus, Bangkok, 2012, 418pp) is a magnificent

achievement: a towering work of erudition leavened with sly humor and fascinating side-bars. While destined to be the standard reference text for the island's history, the book is so vividly written that it deserves to be a raging

Mackay covers the early waves of migration down the Malay peninsula – Negrito, Funan spreading from Vietnam, Srivjaya from Sumatra and Chola from the Tamil Coromandel coast of India.

clashed in an epic battle near Ipoh in 1026, as described by a temple inscription, "written with all the natural histrionic and vainglorious cliches of early Indian inscriptions, which related history in much the same style as Bollywood movies do today".

Next, it was the turn of the Mon-Khmer from Pagan to occupy Phuket from 1058 till 1210 when Burma was sacked by the Mongols, leaving, "a pit of infighting between snarling Shans, Mon and Burmese warlords".

The people of Phuket were always treated abominably and they often rose up and slaughtered their occupiers to a man. This happened to the Cholas and the Sri Lankans. Mackay characterized the governance of Phuket as "dictatorship tempered by assassination".

Then the Thais arrived in 1293, during the reign of King Ramkamhaeng, and hung on for good, though the population remained mostly Malay.

For hundreds of years afterward, Phuket stagnated, ravaged by pirates and oppressed by rapacious Thai governors who robbed

> with impunity. A scattering of Malay fishing villages on the coast and a trio of Thai hamlets in the interior were hemmed in jungle.

> In 1687, an English sea captain observed of Phuket: "There is nothing beautiful, good, rare nor curious in this place. One sees on all sides only impenetrable jungle full of tigers, wild elephants and rhinoceros which we eat sometimes in place of beef."

> At sea, pirates ruled. On September 29, 1544, four Portuguese pirate captains infesting the Surin Islands defeated a Thai fleet captained by an Ottoman mercenary. There were Malay, Sea Gypsy, Japanese and Chinese pirates. Most fearsome of all were the Bugis from the Celebes and the Illanun from the Sula Sea, who rampaged for booty and slaves from 1600 to 1850. In iron helmets and chainmail, aboard double-decker 100-foot galleys rowed by slaves, they were the Vikings of the age.

> Meanwhile, the Burmese sacked Phuket time and time again throughout the 18th century

until 1810. Peace came only when the British seized the Tennasserim coast from the Burmese and steamships from

> Penang, Malacca and Singapore finally brought piracy under control. In the 19th century, Phuket was occupied by a legion of Chinese tin miners and entered into its golden age. Rubber plantations also spread and the jungle retreated.


> Mackay focuses upon two interrelated Chinese families, the Tans and the Khaws, who in making their authority and brought forth roads, bridges, sanitation, schools, hospitals, cinemas, steamships, automobiles and

Phuket's first ice factory.

British, Australian and Dutch companies joined the local Chinese families in launching massive tin dredgers that raised Thailand to the world's top tin producer in 1940. The next big development happened in the 1980s as Phuket switched from tin to tourism, sparking a boom in infrastructure and employment.

The Asian Crisis of 1997 brought on the drastic devaluation of the baht and prompted, "the next mad rush of greedy immigrants who arrived in Phuket at the start of the 21st century – the foreign property developers". Housing for foreigners popped up "like acne". Land prices skyrocketed.


But many of these resident foreigners – who now make up 10 per cent of Phuket's population - have married into the local population and a new generation of "look krueng" promise a fruitful future for Phuket. As an example, Mackay displays a photo of his own two half-Thai daughters.

pages, the publisher White Lotus has outdone itself. Mackay's history is not only a fascinating read but a collector's item.

Camouflaging and covering up

IF YOU strolled round the average Phuket schefflera has stylish garden with the proud owner, he might be forgiven for protesting: "What, do you want yet *more* foliage plants!?"

But remember that at this time of year, apparently evergreen trees and shrubs start to drop leaves in an attempt to conserve energy, and prevent excessive water loss through transpiration.

Others simply give up the ghost. So when patches of bare soil do inevitably appear, there is nothing better than colorful and evergreen foliage to paper over the cracks.

Schefflera arboricola, a native of Taiwan, is ideal for this purpose. Often grown as an indoor plant - testament to its hardiness - schefflera is a bushy, evergreen variegated shrub that will not only thrive in hot, dry conditions, but will also cope with the absence of direct sunlight. Full shade will probably mean the loss of the yellow and green patterning, but it will probably survive.

Oddly, it is related to the ginseng, a plant whose dried root was much favored by oriental gentlemen before they discovered the more exotic and costly delights of powdered rhinoceros horn, tigers' testicles and other quaint and useless aphrodisiacs.


But I digress. More to the point, the flowers of scheffera are relatively

leaves composed of rounded, glossy leaflets arranged in a whorl and held on long stems.

Hence its common name of umbrella plant.

It makes a big, dense bush and in the right conditions, can reach six or seven

feet. I have a specimen in a large ceramic pot, which was strategically placed in order to camouflage an unsightly plastic water tank in the garden beyond. Already it has more-or-less blotted the tank from our view. "Jacqueline" is a newer cultivar, with dramatic blotches bright yellow and green foliage. Every leaf



As with the majority of foliage plants,



unmemorable, but S actinophylla bears small red flowers on arresting spikes, which radiate outwards.

Rich in nectar, these flowers act as a magnet for bees and butterflies.

Talking of camouflage, I always think

that my next foliage plant, the so-called 'caricature plant', might be more accurately described as the camouflage plant. Why? Because its leaves are blotched with buff yellow and green, in exactly the same way as the "military" gear much favored by today's fashionconscious youth.

Native to the South Pacific, graftophyllumpictum, to give it the full botanical treatment, is less

bushy than the umbrella plant and has a narrower and more erect habit. The conventional and often wavy leaves,

moreover, are large, elliptical and sprout from opposite sides of each stem.

Many cultivars have been developed over the years, so the original blotched khaki look has been superceded by varieties sporting more exotic attire purple/bronze, deep-green mingled with white, yellow, pink and purple.

It may almost be said to rival the acalypha or 'Jacob's Coat' in its startling range of unusual hues.

But remember to propagate from cutting if you want to ensure the same color variations in succeeding generations.

There is an Australian species, excelsum, which, strictly speaking does not belong here.

Grown primarily for its profuse blooms, the scarlet fuchsia bush has dark green, glossy leaves and deep red and curved tubular flowers produced in the leaf axils. Apparently it is very hardy and grows freely to tree height among limestone outcrops in Queensland.

I have only seen one specimen in a Phuket garden – a pity, since it should do well in this amenable climate.

Tip of the Week

Monarch butterflies and milkweed

A COLLEAGUE, intrigued by the appearance of myriads of monarch butterflies around a particular shrub near his home, asked me if I knew why.

My guess, which proved to be correct, was that these were varieties of monarchs - probably tigers – that were using the shrub to feed off the nectar, and to deposit their eggs.

The plant favored by these butterflies is the Indian milkweed (calotropis gigantia) which produces large, greygreen leaves, the favorite diet of monarch caterpillars.

Personally, I grow this shrub/ small tree for a range of reasons. It not only provides leafy food

for beautiful-to-be butterflies, but also, has dense clusters of white or purplish, crown-shaped florets, which are a fragrant source of nectar. The flowers are, moreover, long-lasting, a reason why they are used in floral garlands. The shrub is extremely hardy and is one of the easiest to strike from cuttings.

All to play for in Six Nations

GLASGOW Warriors flyhalf Duncan Weir will make his first start for Scotland in Saturdays's Six Nations championship match against Wales at Murrayfield after replacing Ruaridh Jackson in the squad announced on Tuesday,

Weir, 21, who has won his three previous caps from the bench, is one of two changes to the starting lineup who defeated Ireland in the last round.

British and Irish Lions tighthead prop Euan Murray, who missed the Ireland match because he does not play on Sundays for religious reasons, replaces Geoff Cross who returns to the bench.

"It's a moment I'll cherish and hopefully I can do the coaches justice for giving me the start," Weir told the Scottish Rugby Union website.

Scotland interim head coach Scott Johnson said Weir had played well after coming on as a replacement in the 12-8 win over Ireland on February 24.

"He's a talent with a really good work ethic and a thirst to improve, which I like a lot," Johnson said.

"Geoff was a standout against Ireland and it's up to Euan, who fronted up big time against Italy, to raise the bar again."

Scotland, who have beaten Italy and Ireland after losing to England in the first round, share second place in the standings with Wales on four points. England, the only unbeaten team with two rounds remaining, head the table with six points.

"Just before I walked in the decision was taken to withdraw Johnny Sexton but that

Paddy will be good to go at training on Thursday," Kidney told a news conference, referring to a tight hamstring that kept Jackson from training on Tuesday.

"Paddy trained in the position yesterday, Ian trained there this morning and I'm sure they'll both be available on Thursday and we'll then make the call."

The defeat to Scotland, Ireland's second loss in three matches in this season's campaign, has piled the pressure on Kidney who oversaw a disappointing Six Nations last year and is out of contract this year.

Sexton, bound for French side Racing Metro next season, should be fit for Ireland's final outing against Italy along with Ulster wing Gilroy who will train again later this week after suffering a groin injury, Kidney added.

McFadden, who has not been part of the match day squad this year but who has place kicked for Leinster, leapfrogged club mate Luke Fitzgerald to start in place of Gilroy.

England's back row options for the Six

Nations clash at home to Italy this weekend have increased after Leicester's Tom Croft joined the squad on Monday after his recent return from a serious neck injury.

The Six Nations had looked an unlikely aim for Croft, who suffered a triple fracture to his neck a year ago but his return to first-team action with Leicester means he could play some role in England's push for a grand slam.

"The indications last week were that it might be a bit early for Tom to get involved in this Six Nations," England head coach Stuart Lancaster said in an RFU statement.

"But having played back to back games he has now had the all clear from the specialist and Leicester's and our medics.

"I also had a good chat with (Leicester coach) Richard Cockerill. He is happy with his form and we can clearly see he is playing well, but most importantly Tom feels he is ready – it is great to have him back in."

Croft made his fifth start for Leicester since returning in January last weekend, impressing in the thrashing of Sale, and while England do have plenty of options in the back row, the experienced Croft's return is a boost.

"We have competition in all places but the back row is very competitive and to have Tom available just adds to that so we are looking forward to seeing how he does this week," Lancaster said.

The 27-year-old has won 36 caps for England since making his debut in 2008.

England are on course for a clean sweep in the Six Nations after wins against Scotland, Ireland and France. They face Italy



on Sunday and conclude against Wales in Cardiff on March 16.

Wales recalled grand slam winning captain Sam Warburton to the starting lineup for Saturday's Six Nations clash with Scotland but retained Ryan Jones as skipper after two successive away victories.

Warburton, who started on the bench in the 26-9 win over Italy on February 23 after missing the previous round victory over France with a shoulder injury, replaces Justin Tipuric at openside flanker to join Jones and number eight Toby Faletau in the backrow.

British and Irish Lions lock Alun Wyn Jones returns to the starting XV after injury to partner Ian Evans in place of Andrew Coombs while Paul James takes over at loosehead prop from Gethin Jenkins, who has failed to recover from a calf injury sustained in the Italy match.

Interim head coach Rob Howley has named an unchanged backline for a match in which his team will attempt to become the first Wales side to win five successive away victories in the tournament.

"We have had two good, hard-fought away victories but we know we will have to be at our best again to come away from Murrayfield with the result," Howley told the Welsh Rugby Union website.

"It's disappointing for Gethin to miss out but Paul has impressed and made an impact in each game he has played.

"We are bringing in a wealth of experience with Alun Wyn and Sam and they both performed well off the bench in Rome. Ryan has led the team to two wins and deserves to captain the side against Scotland."

FIFA frets over Maracana

RIO de Janeiro's Maracana stadium is FIFA's main worry as Brazil prepares to host the Confederations Cup in June, FIFA secretary-general Jerome Valcke said on Tuesday.

Valcke visited the Arena do Copa outside Recife but said the famous Maracana was preying on his mind.

"The city I'm traveling to in two days is the one which is causing FIFA the most concern," he told reporters.

FIFA has said the six stadiums,

which will host matches in the Confederations Cup, considered a dress rehearsal for the 2014 World Cup, must be ready by mid-April.

"The date of completion is very important so we can test them before the start," Valcke said. "May is too late and that could cause a lot of trouble for FIFA, for the World Cup and for Brazil."

The Maracana, built for the 1950 World Cup and remodeled several times since, was due for

completion in December but the deadline was put back to February and then April.

The latest rebuilding work started in 2010 at a cost of 900 million Reais (US\$457 million).

It is due to re-open with a friendly between Brazil and England on June 2.

Brazilian Football Confederation (CBF) technical director Virgilio Elisio said recently he was worried and that work would have to speed up — *Reuters*

International Sport Drug scandal scares Olympic chief

AUSTRALIA'S Olympic chief John Coates is fearful that the scandal surrounding the misbehavior of the swimming team at last vear's London Games could lead to parents being reluctant to let their children take part in sport.

The reputation of Australian sport has taken a hammering in the last month after the release of a string of damaging reports, including one by the country's leading criminal intelligence body, which said use of drugs by athletes was widespread.

As an advocate of prison sentences for dopers, Coates is certainly not complacent about the issue, but sees the Australian Crime Commission report as primarily a matter for the country's professional sports.

A report alleging that a "toxic" environment had been allowed to develop in the Olympic swimming team, and the admission by five swimmers that they took the sedative Stilnox in a bonding session before the London Games was a different matter.

"The biggest worry I have, because of swimming behavioral problems, is that the public doesn't think as highly of our Olympic teams," the Australian Olympic Committee (AOC) President said on Wednesday.

"The last thing we want is for the mums and dads not to think of our Olympians as role models. We

are trying to create greater participation in sport through our team.

"Is that what happens when I send my little girl to the team or my little Johnny to the team?' That's what scares me."

Speaking after the opening of new AOC offices overlooking Sydney Opera House, Coates said the swimming affair might also have ramifications in the hunt for the sponsorships, which underpin the organization's budget.


"Our sponsors know that we take a very strong stand on doping, our sponsors know that during the Games we have a total ban on illicit drugs," he added.

"But certainly some of the behavior aspects of the swimmers is going to cause some problems. We are looking at it and we need to sort it out.'

Coates, who will be looking to raise AUS\$40.2 million (27.1 million pounds) through marketing ahead of the next Summer Olympics in Brazil in 2014, said one sponsor had called to congratulate the AOC on the hard line they were taking on the matter.

The AOC have appointed an investigator to look into the matter and promised stiff penalties for wrongdoers.

While Stilnox was very publicly prohibited by the Australian Olympic Committee in the lead-up to the Games because of its side-effects, it is not banned by the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) code.

'The unwashed public out there tend to group it all together as the same," admitted Coates.

"I bet you there's a lot of people in England and places that are salivating. Our friendly rivals.

"(But) the rest of the world is not naive enough to think things are not happening in their own countries," he added.

Coates took his advocacy for criminal sanctions for those who use and supply banned substances, as well as the right to compel witnesses to testify about drug use, to a senate hearing in Canberra last week.

"I'm confident that ASADA (Australian Sports Anti-Doping Authority) will get these extra powers. There's precedent...if the integrity of the financial markets is being protected, the integrity of sport should be protected," he said.

"The question mark for me is whether they will take our point and go further than just civil penalties... I would like them to go to potentially criminal penalties.'

It was not just the behavior of

some of the swimmers in London that was a disappointment to Australia with the team finishing 10th in the medals table, after targeting a place in the top five.

"I think [the recent events have] been a bit of (a) wake up to sports," he said.

"A lot of the sports have sat back and had a good think about how they could improve and perhaps that hasn't happened too much since the Sydney Olympics. We were in a bit of a comfort zone for too long."

Swann seeks swift return

GRAEME Swann's troublesome right elbow may have forced him out of the test series against New Zealand but the England spinner has been told the required surgery is "relatively simple" and is eyeing a May return.

Swann was a surprise omission from England's team before the toss for the first test against New Zealand at University Oval on Wednesday and was replaced by left arm spinner Monty Panesar.

England later confirmed the 33year-old had been ruled out of the series and would need surgery on the elbow in the United States. James Tredwell has been called into the squad for the remainder of the New Zealand series.

"If I don't have the surgery I know it's more or less curtains," Swann told reporters after play was abandoned for the day without a ball being bowled because of persistent rain.

So the fact that I can have the surgery and I have been told that it is relatively simple, and touch wood it will be, I will wake up on the other end and everything will be great.

"I'm very much buoyed by the success the last time I had it done," he added in reference to a similar procedure on the same elbow in 2009.

"My elbow was in a lot worse

shape than it is now, so I am very confident I will bounce back in a short space of time and be fighting fit."

Swann was reticent to put a timetable on a possible return, though hinted he would like to be available when England host New Zealand in May and June.

Alastair Cook's side then play the one-day Champions Trophy and then have back-to-back Ashes series against Australia.

"I still haven't played a test match against the Kiwis," the 50test veteran said. "I'm going to be optimistic and say I will get a chance to play them at home.

"I haven't seen the timetable but I will need to speak to the surgeon and he will give me a better indication."

The elbow had caused him problems since his first surgery but it flared up again in England's four day match against a New Zealand XI in Queenstown last week.

"It came about quite suddenly. I have struggled intermittently with a sore elbow for about four years but it never manifested itself into a dire predicament for me.

"Then in Queenstown before the game I felt an unusual pain that I hadn't felt since before the last operation and that rapidly got worse throughout the game."

Swann had scans on the elbow when the team arrived in Dunedin and the results, after they had been seen by the specialist in the United States, confirmed he needed the procedure to "clean up" floating bone fragments in the joint.

The operation was similar to the one England team mate Tim Bresnan had last month, Swann

"It doesn't seem anywhere as near as dire as the last time when it felt like a bomb had gone off in there," he added.

"The fact you have to have surgery means you have a pretty serious injury, so I was hoping that I would get to the end of my playing days and not have to go back under the knife. - Reuters

Klitschko to defend heavyweight titles

UKRAINE'S Vladimir Klitschko will defend his four world heavyweight title belts against former sparring partner German-Italian challenger Francesco Pianeta in Mannheim on May 4.

Klitschko, who holds the IBF, IBO, WBO and WBA crown had used the 28-year-old Pianeta as a sparring partner last year.

The 36-year-old Ukrainian's record stands as 59 wins and three defeats after his three successful title defenses in 2012, including a November victory over Poland's Mariusz Wach.

Pianeta, who at 1.93 meters is rive centimeters shorter than his opponent, is still undefeated with 28 wins and one draw.

"I have a lot of respect for Pianeta because he is young and has a big fighting spirit,' the 36-year-old Klitschko said in a statement.

Klitschko's older brother, Vitali, holds the WBC crown.

"I was briefly his sparring partner last year and I noted where his weaknesses are and how best to exploit them," said

WITH its English Premier League (EPL) rights set to expire at the end of this season, TrueVisions is aiming to secure more broadcasting rights for leading sports and add extra high definition (HD) channels for sports fans.

The firm wants to become the undisputed "leader of high-definition broadcasts", with more HD channels than any other operator.

TrueVisions currently has 17 HD channels, including three for sport, which cover the EPL, volleyball, Thai Premier League football, tennis, snooker, NBA basketball and Formula One.

The company recently changed its slogan from "King of soccer" to "King of

sport" after failing to secure the rights of EPL, Thailand's most watched football league, last November.

"Sport is not only football – there are plenty of other kinds of sport [to watch]," said TrueVisions chief commercial officer Ong-ard Prapakamol.

Cable Thai Holding won the EPL broadcast rights for 2013 to 2015. TrueVisions responded by trying to secure rights to more sport content. This year they secured rights for the Thai Volleyball League, French Open tennis (with two matches broadcast live simultaneously on two HD channels), and added 34 more Thai league matches.

Ong-ard said TrueVisions still holds the rights for the Uefa Champions League from 2012 to 2014. Europe's top club tournament will be broadcast in HD soon, he said. Negotiations are underway with Cable Thai Holding about the possibility of broadcasting some EPL matches on TrueVisions, with subscribers eager to know the outcome. Ong-ard said the firm would call a press

"Let's see how we can compensate our customers and retain their loyalty in case we fail to get some EPL match broadcasts [from CTH]," Ong-ard said.

conference to address the issue next month.

"We are prepared for life without the EPL broadcasts but we welcome any discussion from the rights holders," Ong-ard said.

Thailand had more operators competing for sports broadcasting rights than any other

country, and rights owners were taking advantage and raising their bid fees, Ongard said. Overpriced content was not worth competing for, he added.

Chulathai Saligupta, TrueVisions' director of sport programming, said that after last year's huge bid by CTH for the EPL

rights, the price of other sports content may rise. CTH paid the Premier League almost 10 billion baht for the broadcast rights – six times higher than TrueVision paid in the last three seasons.

He cited the case of the Thai Premier League, whose 2011-2013 broadcast rights cost TrueVisions 200 million baht. In contrast, he said, the Football Association of Thailand is hoping to reap 600 million baht for the next three seasons. - *The Nation*


At the end of the matches, some of the kids also got to try out PCG's new bowling machine which will prove to be a valuable tool in improving their cricketing skills.

Pearl shock Lightning Shrimp

Phuket United win hat trick by defeating Surat Thani Futsal Club in an electrifying Southern showdown

WITH the Thai futsal season rapidly winding down, Phuket United maintained their good run of form, winning their third match in a row by defeating Southern rivals, Surat Thani (4-2) in a tense yet thrilling match last Saturday night in Phuket Town.

Played at the Saphan Hin Indoor Sports Complex, the game was Phuket's 26th and Surat Thani's 25th match of the 30-fixture GMM Sport Thailand Futsal Premier League (TFPL) 2012-2013 season.

In their first meeting back in December in Surat Thani, Phuket were pounded by a score of 6-1.

That match was the first in which Brazilian Jardel had played for Phuket United and the skillful winger was looking to avoid a similar result this time around.

Anticipating the rematch, a large contingent of orange and blue shirted "Lightning Shrimp" fans from Surat Thani were hoping for a repeat of the first result, setting up their cheer base behind the east-end goal, defended by the visitors in the first half.


However, a Phuket defensive blunder – resulting in an own goal early in the match – drove the Lighting Shrimp cheer squad into an electrical frenzy.

Phuket got it together at the start of the second half when Jardel quickly found the equalizer. Minutes later, the Andaman Pearl's leading scorer, Jackson Santos seized the lead with a brilliant goal, his 28th of the season.

Santos is the third top scorer in the TFPL, behind Si Saket's Romualdo Namorato (35) and Navy's Jessada Chudet (32).

With tension of the Southern showdown intensifying with every foul whistle, a composed yet cunning Jardel extended Phuket's lead in the 32nd minute with his second goal of the match.

Pushing on with a power play attacking formation – leaving their goal undefended – Surat Thani finally found the back of the net moments later through Wiwat Thaicharoen.

However, a tight Phuket defense was quick to exploit Surat Thani's vulnerable defenses a moment later, with Nattapong Buachai doubling his side's lead on a counter attack.

Despite back-and-forth play, the final score of 4-2 was sealed by the officials final whistle

Phuket moved into 9th place with 39 points from 13 wins, the same amount of losses and a goal difference of five. Surat Thani fell to 6th place with 43 points from 13 wins, four draws and eight losses (GD: +20)

Four minutes later, the home


