Hope found

Crew thrown from cargo ship in rough waters, eight lost at sea

RESCUE efforts lasting four days by the Royal Thai Navy and a passing German container ship, the *Buxmoon*, managed to pluck nine sailors from broiling storm seas this week after a Bangledeshi cargo ship capsized south of Phuket.

The fully laden MV Hope broached broadside about midnight on July 4 amid high waves and strong winds some 29 nautical miles south of Racha Noi Island. The hull had buckled and ripped open, causing the ship to lurch violently starboard, launching 12 of the 17 crewmen on board into the sea.

The *Buxmoon*, first on the scene after a distress call was sent, rescued five sailors from a life raft. After assisting in the search and rescue, the Buxmoon safely delivered 4th Engineer Md Abdul Hakim; Deck Cadet Moklechur...



Teenager shot in rival gang attack

A GANG reprisal attack in Phuket Town has left a 16-year-old boy from Rawai in hospital after he was shot in the leg four times by a rival gang of teenagers last Sunday night.

The teenager, given the pseudonym "Korn" by police, was shot multiple times at the Esso gas station on Chao Fa Road, near the busy Slaughterhouse Intersection and Yee Teng Complex, at about 9:20pm.

"When we arrived at the gas station, we saw pools of blood on the ground but the boy had already been rushed to Vachira Phuket Hospital by his friends," said Maj Rattaket Munmuang of the Phuket City Police.

"He was shot twice in his left calf and twice in his left thigh," Maj Rattaket explained.

At Vachira Hospital, Korn told police the gang attacked him after he and his friends went to a computer game shop in Soi Pattana 14, off Pattana Road nearby.

"After the shop closed, we sat at the laundry shop across the road," he said.

"While we were sitting there, a

gang of about eight teenagers, who we had argued with before, rode past. A little later, they rode back, pulled out knives and started walking toward us," Korn alleged.

"We all ran. I made it to the gas station before they caught up with me. They hit me, shot me in the leg and rode away," he said.

"My friends arrived soon after

and took me to the hospital," he

Maj Rattaket said his officers were continuing their investigation on the presumption the attack was motivated by revenge.

"We will collect more evidence and question more witnesses to track down the teen gang," he

Man confesses to killing 'nagging' mother-in-law

A MAN who suffocated his mother-in-law after an argument confessed to the killing several hours after the horrific encounter.

The body of Prayad Phawaphutanon, 50, was found half-clothed and lying on her bed by her 14-year-old son when he returned from school on July 9, said Thalang Police Superintendent Sirisak Wasasiri the next day.

"After finding his mother dead in bed, he called his father and his father reported it to us," Col Sirisak said.

Mrs Prayad's son-in-law Anun Mahasit, 28, confessed to police that he had killed her in a fit of rage after she had insulted him for not having a job.

Mr Anun came under police suspicion after neighbors reported hearing the pair arguing earlier in the morning.

"We assumed that the murderer had to be someone close to the family, since he was able

to walk in and out of the house freely," Col Sirisak said.

Mr Anun was asked to come to the station. "We found scratches from finger nails on his arm, and were quickly able to secure a confession from him," Col Sirisak said.

After having sent his wife to work, Mr Anun

said that he walked past Mrs Prayad's house. At the time she was wearing a shirt and a sarong wrapped around her waist and was washing dishes.

"When she saw me, she started to hurl insults at me again about not having a job and about stealing valuables from her house. I was furious," Mr Anun said. "I followed her inside the house – she didn't notice me."

Mr Anun said that once inside, he followed Mrs Prayad into the bedroom. He then ripped the sarong from her waist and wrapped it around her neck, pushing her face down into the bed.

"I pressed her head into the pillow until she was dead," Mr Anun said.

Police made it clear that there were no signs of sexual assault on Mrs Prayad's body.

Mr Anun has been charged for the murder of his mother-in-law, Col Sirisak said.

Sarong key for police catching up with killer

THE sarong wrapped around the head of a man found dead in a field near a prominent Phuket school last week has led police to arrest a murder suspect.

"This is an ongoing investigation. We believe more than two people were involved in the murder and we don't want to say anything else at this time," said Phuket City Police Deputy Superintendent Yongyuth Kongmalai.

When the victim was found near the British International School on June 21, the only clue to his identity was the company shirt he was wearing.

"Then someone called us on June 22 and gave us information connecting the sarong on the victim's head with the suspect. He said that he had seen a man wearing a similar sarong walking around Soi Surin 5 early on the morning of June 21," Col Yongyuth said.

The victim's motorbike was located by police in the same area earlier in their investigation.

Police were able to find the man and take him into custody the same day.

"We are going to send the sarong and a DNA sample from the suspect to Songklanagarind Hospital in Haad Yai," said Col Yongyuth.

Laos border on alert for wanted rapist stepfather

POLICE have alerted immigration officials on the Thai-Lao border to be on the lookout for a Laotian man wanted for repeatedly raping, and impregnating, his 15-year-old handicapped stepdaughter in

The 40-year-old man, originally from Laos, has been at large since June 29, when he reportedly confessed his deeds to the girl's mother.

Police have not publicly released a description or a photograph of

The girl's mother reported the alleged crimes to police on July 3.

"The mother told us that on June 29 the stepfather admitted to raping the daughter multiple times," said Capt Teerasak.

"The girl can't walk because she had polio, and she is only 15 years old. The mother was furious and kicked him out of the house," he said.

The mother first sought help from Patong Municipality officers, who arranged for a pregnancy test. The test revealed that the girl was

five months pregnant, at which point her mother took her to the police.

Patong Police confirmed the pregnancy with another test at Vachira Phuket Hospital, in Phuket Town, and arranged for social services to help the girl.

The girl's mother and stepfather married when she was five years old, the mother told police. They had been married for 10 years and have two children.

"The stepfather has left the country," Patong Police Officer Teerasak Boonsaeng explained to

Police used a telephone number provided by the mother to determine that the man had gone

"We were issued a warrant for the man's arrest on July 4. We have alerted all police stations in the country, as well as all immigration police, to be on the lookout for him," Capt Teersak said.

"We believe he will return to Thailand... because he doesn't know that his wife reported him to the police, and he has two children here with her," he explained.

"We will also notify the Laotian police that we are looking for this man," he added.

Meanwhile, doctors have recommended that the stepdaughter's pregnancy be terminated.

Doctors at Vachira Phuket Hospital determined that carrying the pregnancy to term would bring health risks to the girl and the baby, Capt Teerasak said.

The punishment for sex with a minor 15 years of age or younger is four to 20 years in prison, or a fine of 8,000 to 40,000 baht, or

In brief...

Corpse found by Rawai roadside

THE body of a man was found wrapped in a blanket by the roadside in Rawai just after midnight on July 4.

His skull was fractured as if it had been hit with a hard object, and his face was bloodied and covered with a black plastic bag.

Police believe the man, identified as Anuwat Kathong, 25, had been dead for one to two days.

"He worked at Chalong Pier," said Pol Capt Thada Sodarak.

Local residents saw the blanket tied with telephone cord. When they noticed feet sticking out of it, they stopped to investigate, Capt Thada explained.

No foul play in Bamford death

POLICE see no reason to open a murder investigation in the death of American-born former Microsoft engineer Clifford Nelson Bamford, whose body was found floating in his villa pool at Ao Makham on July 1.

There were no signs of a fight and there were no signs of violence on his body, police said.

Mr Bamford's girlfriend of 10 years told police Mr Bamford had a heart condition.

Police will decide whether or not to continue their investigation after they receive toxicity tests and the autopsy results, said Lt Anurak Klangnarong of the Wichit Police.

Russian tourist dies in ICU

KHO Khay Gym, 31, the Russian tourist who was comatose after being pulled from the water at Karon Beach on June 23, has died.

Mr Gym was rushed to Patong Hospital and later transferred to Vachira Phuket Hospital, but never regained consciousness.

"He was pronounced dead at about 7pm on July 2," a hospital staffer confirmed to the Gazette.

Police search for romantic runaway

THE disappearance of Bunyanee Sungparn, 29, is no longer being considered a criminal case, police confirmed on Tuesday.

"After her brother reported her missing on July 1, I checked her Facebook page," said Pol Capt Rattanatorn Bumrungthin.

"I read a conversation between her and her brother, Weerawit Sungparn, that mentioned a man named Serm," he said.

Mr Weerawit told police that Serm was Ms Bunvanee's bovfriend in Phuket.

However, Ms Bunyanee had a longtime boyfriend in Nakhon Sri Thammarat whom she was engaged to marry, he explained.

Mr Weerawit and their parents had come to Phuket at the Ms Bunyanee home for her wedding, her brother told police.

"We were aware that she had a new boyfriend in Phuket," Mr Weerawit told the Gazette. "But we thought she had broken up with him and was willing to go back to Nakhon Sri Thammarat to get married."

Ms Bunyanee's fiance contacted the Gazette on July 9 and said, "I thought everything was fine between us...we hadn't argued. I don't know what happened."

Though no criminal action is suspected, police are still looking for Ms Bunyanee and Mr Serm.


"We want to help the family get together and clarify the situation," Capt Rattanatorn said.

Missing woman found in pond

Relatives claim signs of foul play, police say alcohol-related accident

RELATIVES of a woman found dead in her car in an old tin mining pond on July 8 believe she was murdered, but police do not agree.

Wattana Itthisan, the 27-yearold owner of Fasai Minimart in Chalong, was found in her submerged car in an old tin mining pond behind Chalong Temple.

"The driver's window was open and the gear had been shifted into the park position. Mrs Wattana's body was found in the back seat," Chalong Police Capt Thada Sodarak said.

"The family believes these elements indicate foul play, but we do not agree," he said.

"We believe that the impact from the crash into the water threw Mrs Wattana to the back seat, after which she lost consciousness and died," he said.

"We also believe that she put the car in park as the vehicle crashed into the pond," Capt Thada said.

None of Mrs Wattana's jewelry

– a gold necklace and two gold

rings – was missing and she still had her cell phone with her, Capt Thada said.

Mrs Wattana had gone to the Rong-Tium Pub near Chalong Circle with two friends at about 9pm on July 6.

A witness told police that when

Mrs Wattana left the pub, she was drunk, said Chalong Police Super-intendent Krittapas Det-intarasorn.

She dropped her friends off at their house about 200 meters from the pond at about 5am. CCTV in the area recorded her car driving in the direction of the pond at 5:15am. Her friends received a missed call from Mrs Wattana at 5:27am.

When she didn't return home, her husband, Pinit Itthisan, 39, started calling relatives. Together they spent the day looking for her, said Capt Thada.

They couldn't find Mrs Wattana, but they noticed tyre tracks leading into the pond and became suspicious that they were from her car.

After midnight on the following morning, Mr Pinit reported his wife missing and told police about the tyre tracks.

Kusoldharm Foundation rescue divers searched the pond until about 3:30am but were unable to locate the car. They returned in the morning with marine police, and after about an hour of searching found Mrs Wattana's blue Honda Jazz about 100 meters from the shore at a depth of about 10 meters, said Capt Thada.

"The car was found flipped over in the pond. The windshield was broken and the front of the car was full of mud," he said.

The car was pulled to shore by a crane and Mrs Wattana's body was retrieved.

"Cause of death will be determined at Vachira Phuket Hospital," Capt Thada said. "We are working on questioning more people and collecting more evidence."

Body of man swept into sea brought back following day

THE body of a man who disappeared while fishing with friends in Phuket on July 4 was found washed ashore at Kalim Beach, north of Patong, the next morning.

"Villagers called us at about 9am to say they had found a body on Kalim Beach," said Patong Police officer Thawatchai Srimai.

"He has been identified as Jittakorn Kerdrit, 32, from Surat Thani," Lt Thawatchai said.

"There were no signs of violence on his body," he added.

Mr Jittakorn went fishing at Kalim Beach with his wife and some friends, explained police.

At about 5pm, as he was standing on some rocks near the Paradise View Point Restaurant, big waves struck him and pulled him into the sea.

When his wife and friends couldn't find him, they reported him missing to Patong Police.

His body washed ashore about 300 meters from where he had gone into the water, said Lt Thawatchai.

Just-arrived American man dies while surfing at Kata

AN AMERICAN surfing at Kata Beach died the day he arrived after falling from his board into the water.

Mark Carroll, 60, hit Kata's surf alone immediately after checking into his hotel on July 8.

"Mr Carroll appeared to have lost consciousness while surfing and fell into the water," said Pichai Wattanawalan of the Karon Police.

He was unconscious but breathing when lifeguards pulled him from the water, said Capt Pichai.

"However, Mr Carroll stopped breathing while being transferred to Patong Hospital. Doctors did their best to resuscitate him, but

were unsuccessful. He was pronounced dead at about 6:30pm," Capt Pichai said.

Leaflet campaign assails Kathu chief

KATHU District Chief Veera Kerdsirimongkol has denounced accusations claiming that he accepted cash from drug suspects to overlook test results and that he attempted to extort money from developers by holding their machinery for ransom.

Chief Veera flatly denied the

allegations: "I have never sought benefits, money or otherwise, to release drug suspects. It's not true, and all the other things the handbills say are not true."

The accusations were printed on handbills being circulated throughout Kalim, Kamala and Patong. Many of the

leaflets were found strewn along the side of the road between Kalim and Kamala on the morning of

The leaflets, dated July 1, 2013, allege malfeasance by Chief Veera in two specific cases.

"Mr Veera had police set up a

checkpoint to test teenagers for drugs. When some teenagers tested positive, they were asked to pay 8,000 baht to avoid being sent to a mandatory drug rehabilitation program," the handbills alleged.

The leaflets, printed only in Thai, also accuse Mr Veera of seizing a backhoe and three 10wheeled trucks on Big Buddha

hill, but not pressing any charges.

Instead, he asked for about 200,000 baht to have the vehicles returned, the handbills alleged.

The leaflets called for the Ministry of Interior to remove Chief Veera from office by July 31.

"Or else there will be protests to close the road and the Kathu

District Office, and we will do every thing we can to get justice," the writers warned.

Chief Veera remained undeterred by the allegations and vowed to continue his fight against land encroachment and

"I have even posted one of the leaflets at the Kathu District Office so everyone can read it," Chief Veera said.

"I believe the handbills came from someone who lost out due to my investigations into illegal deforestation and encroachment on protected forest areas. These investigations have doubtless cost some people a lot of money," he said.

Police at Patong, Thung Thong and Kamala have been asked to identify and arrest those responsible for creating the documents and distributing them.

"Police have found CCTV footage showing the handbills being thrown from a black car in Soi Kathu Waterfall at about 1am on Sunday... After the car exited the soi we couldn't see where it went," Chief Veera said.

Bypass repairs cause jams

LONG tailbacks on Thepkrasattri timely finish to the construction. Road caused by the resurfacing of the bypass road starting at the Bang Khu Intersection in Koh Kaew has forced police to urge motorists to use alternative

"We need to resurface about 1.5km of the [bypass] road," said Phuket Highways Office Director Samak Luedwonghad.

"The road surface is uneven nd broken up so much it looks like crocodile skin," he said.

The effect on traffic has been dramatic.

"During rush hour, the traffic can back up all the way to the Heroine's Monument," said one disgruntled motorist.

Mr Samak said the resurfacing is scheduled to be completed within 150 days.

"But I examined the site today and I don't think it should take that long. By my estimate it should take less than four months," he said.

Traffic police have asked for a

"We've contacted the Phuket Highways Office to ask them to speed up the work," Sen Sgt Maj Pairote Srathorngin of Phuket City Traffic Police said.

"Unfortunately, the daily rain we've been getting is delaying the construction," he said.


Sgt Pairot has already changed traffic light settings to try to ease delays.

"I ordered the southbound lanes at the Koh Kaew Intersection be given a longer green light during rush hours. This should improve the flow," he said.

Sgt Pairote advised drivers to consider using the road behind the Premium Outlet mall instead of the bypass road.

'Go through the Bang Khu Intersection towards town. At the first u-turn, go straight across. That road takes you behind the Premium Outlet mall and reconnects with the bypass road farther down," he said.

Rohingya rape suspect handed over to court

THE Rohingya man charged by police with holding a 25-year-old Rohingya woman captive and raping her repeatedly over three days has been handed over to the Takuapa Court.

Kuraburi Police relinquished custody of Korlimula Ramahatu on July 3 after he conducted a reenactment of the alleged crimes a day earlier.

"The suspect denied the rape charge," Kuraburi Deputy Police Superintendent Chalerm Wannasathid told the *Gazette*.

"He claimed he was very religious. He said he would not do such a thing," he added.

Mr Ramahatu on July 2 retraced his alleged steps during the trafficking and alleged rape ordeal.

"We took him to the shelter where he picked up the woman and her daughters, then we headed to the house, about 10 kilometers away," said Col Chalerm.

The house belongs to Mr Ramahatu's relative, he said.

"He used to live there when he was working for Sgt Maj Weerayuth Fuangfu as a palm plantation laborer. Sgt Weerayuth is the person who allegedly picked up the other two Rohingya women from the shelter," Col Chalerm explained.

Sgt Weerayuth is also reportedly the first Royal Thai Police officer to be charged with human trafficking.

The investigation into the human trafficking and rape ordeal is likely to take at least a month to conclude, Col Chalerm noted.

"We need to question the two daughters. That will take time. A social worker, psychologist and the public prosecutor must be present when we question them," Col Chalerm explained.

"I believe it will take at least a month before we can hand the case over to the Public Prosecutor," he said.

Mr Ramahatu is now being detained at Takuapa District Prison.

"He has a right to request bail. Police denied him that privilege, but we no longer have authority over this. It is now up to the court whether or not to allow him to post bail," Col Chalerm explained.

Sgt Weerayuth, however, remains free.

"He surrendered himself to police and acknowledged the charges against him; then he was released," said Col Chalerm.

"However, Sgt Weerayuth must come to the police anytime he is called," he added.

...Rahaman; D/fitter Cadet Mohammed Rubel; Oiler Mohammad Osman and GS Saiful Islam to their home port Chittagong in Bangladesh.

Meanwhile, on July 5, a Navy helicopter spotted deck hand Abu Bakar Siddique holding on to a life preserver for dear life in the swirling sea.

The HTMS *Pattani*, deployed to carry out the search over a 20-mile radius, brought on board three more survivors the same day: 2nd Officer Mohammad Mobarak Hossain and Cadets Raeq Fairooz and Mushfiqur Rahman.

"All were found floating on life preservers," said Rear Admiral Prayuth Phutien of the Royal Thai Navy's Phuket-based Third Area Command.

The *Pattani* also recovered two bodies that day, whose identities as of July 10 had not been confirmed by Vachira Phuket Hospital.


Bangladesh Ambassador to Thailand Kazi Imtiaz Hossain arrived in Phuket on July 5 to assist in the coordination of the search and rescue efforts.

As 2nd Officer Hossain arrived by medivac helicopter, Amb Hossain rushed to greet him.

"He seemed very weak, but he said his name. It's a great relief to see the survivors... I also introduced myself to him to let him know that he has not been abandoned," Amb Hossain said.

"We are very grateful to the Royal Thai Navy and the Thai officials who have risked their lives for the survivors," he added.

The Navy on Monday called off Phuket.

the search for more survivors. Local fishermen that afternoon reported seeing four bodies in life jackets off Koh Rok, off the coast of Krabi.

The Koh Rok Islands, a popular day-trip destination for tourist snorkellers and divers, are located about 100 kilometers southeast of Phuket.

"The crew said the bodies they saw were wearing life jackets, but they did not recover them because they were afraid they would become involved in a crime that had been committed," he explained.

The Royal Thai Navy alerted the local Marine Police and the Thailand Maritime Enforcement Coordinating Centers.

Survivor recounts ordeal

CREWMAN Abu Bakar Siddique lay resting in a ward in Vachira Phuket Hospital in Phuket Town, recovering from his ordeal of being washed overboard from the cargo ship MV *Hope* amid heavy seas late on July 4.

The MV *Hope* was overpowered by rough seas while en route from Penang, Malaysia, to Chittagong, Bangladesh. The ship was about 25 nautical miles south of Racha Noi Island when the heavy weather began to take its toll

"About 11pm, there was heavy rain and seas that made our ship shake," he told the *Gazette*.

"Around midnight, the starboard side was hit by big waves and damaged. There was a big hole in the side and the ship started sinking," he added.

There were 17 people on the ship when it started listing heavily.

"There were 12 of us on deck when the ship suddenly tipped. We all went overboard, but the other

However, the Navy did not dispatch any ships or aircraft to recover the bodies. "If we did, by the time we reached the site, the wind and current could have moved the bodies far from where they were last seen," Capt Thammawat said.

Regardless, Capt Thammawat urged anyone who discovers a body at sea to report it to the Royal Thai Navy's Third Area Command in Phuket by calling 076-381598 or 076-393584.

"The line is open 24 hours. We will contact the Marine Police or the local Marine Office so they can Mueanhawong

make the appropriate arrangements," he said.

The MV Confidence, commissioned by the insurance company responsible for MV *Hope*, towed the stricken vessel to Langkawi -Malaysia's northernmost island on the Andaman Coast. The vessel arrived on Tuesday.

"The Royal Thai Navy will not be involved in any further efforts involving the MV *Hope* as it is now out of Thai waters," Capt Thammawat added.

Marine Office ducks overloading probe

THE Phuket Marine Office will not be investigating any aspect of the MV *Hope* capsizing south of Phuket, despite eight crewmen still being lost at sea.

According to Phuket Marine Office chief Phuripat Theerakulpisut, the MV Hope was not in Thai territorial waters while en route from Malaysia to Bangladesh when the ship foundered – which to him meant that the Thai authorities had no cause to investigate.

"Where the ship capsized was not in Thai waters. We are responsible for only 24 nautical miles from Koh Racha Noi. The actual incident happened on the high seas," Mr Phuripat said.

The distress signal sent by the ship's crew – picked up by the Australian Maritime Safety Authority's Rescue Coordination Center and relayed to their Ma-



laysian and Thai counterparts placed the ship at 25 miles directly south of Koh Racha Noi.

The decision not to investigate an incident that left a 97-meter cargo vessel adrift off the Thai Andaman coast also follows news reports, which cited the MV Hope's ship registration certificate, that the Hope was overloaded by nearly 1,000 tonnes of "ball clay" bound for ceramics factories in Bangladesh.

"The ship's certificate showed its load-carrying capacity was 5,550 metric tonnes. But according to the information provided to Chittagong Port Authority by the owners, it showed the ship was carrying nearly 1,000 metric tonnes more than its capacity," reported bdnews24.

Regarding the search mission, however, Capt Thammawat Malaisukkarin, Director of the Naval Civil Affairs, confirmed that when the ship was found by the Navy search and rescue team, it was well within Thai waters.

"Even if it weren't, we would have still provided assistance since we were the closest to it,"

Police sniff out glue-huffing free vaccines monk on holiday in Phuket

A MONK who came to Phuket to visit a friend was arrested in Rassada yesterday and charged with sniffing glue and theft.

Police were alerted by villagers at about 6pm on July 5 that a monk was sniffing glue in a pavilion at Pa Aram Rattanaram Temple, near Mission Hospital.

When police arrived at the temple, they found Chaiyasit Janpetch, 33, sitting in the pavilion with a glue can and glue in a plastic bag beside him.

In his bag they found a tablet computer, a pocketknife, a mini DVD player and some cash, with a total value estimated at 7,000 baht, said Lt Col Prawit Engchuan of the Phuket City Police.

After Mr Chaiyasit confessed that he had been sniffing glue, he was taken to Buddha Mongkol Nimit Temple in Phuket Town to be defrocked and formally removed from the monkhood.

He was then taken for question-

"I was a monk for six years, first in Trang and then in Pattani. I came to Phuket on June 29 to visit a friend in Patong," Mr Chaiyasit told the police.

Mr Chaiyasit confessed to po-

lice that the day after he arrived in Phuket he stole 1,000 baht and a child's schoolbag from a grocery store on Thepkrasattri Road, Lt Col Prawit said.

Washing machine blazes in SuperCheap

Police flex muscle on Bangla

IN A mass show of police strength, more than 300 officers gathered in Phuket's famed redlight district of Soi Bangla in Patong last Saturday in the government's latest campaign to bolster tourist safety on the island.

Led by Phuket Governor Maitri Inthusut, the officers patrolled the bars with an eye to keeping the peace, on the lookout for any troublemakers.

"Tourists need to have confidence that Phuket is a safe place, so we are staging raids from July 1 to July 15 to boost security," Governor Maitri said.

"The Thai Government wants to increase revenue from tourism, and Phuket is among the top five tourist destinations in Thailand, along with Bangkok, Chiang Mai, Pattaya and Samui," he said.

The show of 300 on Saturday followed 100 officers staging similar raids on Friday that netted at least seven suspects who failed on-the-spot urine tests.

Patong Police Superintendent Chiraphat Pochanaphan separated the officers into four teams.

They set up a drug-test checkpoint on the beach road and raided nightclubs, internet cafes and karaoke bars.

"Our focus is on drugs, illegal

workers and children under 18 years old working in nightclubs," Col Chiraphat explained.

The random drug tests led to the arrests of seven persons found

to have used narcotics, said Deputy Superintendent Akanit Danpitaksat.

"Three were at a nightclub on Soi Bangla, and four were at a karaoke bar on Phang Muang Sai Kor Road," he confirmed.

"We are conducting tests on any people we suspect of using drugs, whether they be motorists driving down the road or people partying in a nightclub," he said.

"We are also checking work permits and passports of foreigners," he added.

Governor Maitri welcomed the security boost.

"It doesn't matter whether it's the low season or not, every season must be safe for tourists," he said, "especially since the number of tourists is rising."

Governor Maitri pointed out that from January to June this year, tourist arrivals were up 19 per cent over last year.

"Making Phuket safe will make tourists happy and help to inspire more visitors to return," he said.

"We see the project as an important way to develop communities and even the nation because women are influential in the success of families," PPAO Vice-President Sorratham Jinda explained.


"Women teach their children to follow Islamic law and also counsel and support their husbands," he said.

Fury over detainee fire deaths

THE GOVERNMENT is promising decisive action after four detainees died in their cell when a fire broke out at a Nonthaburi police station last week.

Deputy Prime Minister Pracha Promnok said officers deemed responsible for their deaths would be punished and the families compensated, The Nation reported.

The fire is believed to have started after a transformer exploded in the early hours of July 7, causing a storeroom in the station to catch fire.

The four detainees, who were locked up in the next room, are believed to have died from smoke inhalation.

They were: Jerd Songpoo, charged for illegal possession of guns; Wasant Sornsil, charged with driving under the influence; Wisut Kongyuen, charged with possession of an illicit drug; and Najirapong Wonganan, charged with using a prohibited drug.

Capt Somrak Yensabai said he heard a blast from the room next to the cell before realizing a fire was raging in the station.

He said he could not breathe, so he dashed outside to get help.

The next day families of the victims came to the station to curse officers for failing to rescue the suspects.

Mr Pracha expressed condolences to the grieving families, adding that officers would have to determine whether the deaths were the result of neglect of duty, carelessness or uncontrollable factors.

Pressure mounts against 'luxury living' monk

PRESSURE is mounting on a Si Sa Ket monk who is accused of living a luxury lifestyle and fathering a child with an underage girl.

Luang Pu Nenkham of Wat Pa Khanti Dhamma hit the headlines last month after footage emerged on YouTube showing him and another monk flying in a private jet.

Since then, an avalanche of damaging allegations have surfaced concerning the lifestyle

Luang Pu Nenkham, who is out of the country, is accused of fathering a child after having

sex with a 15-year-old girl, The Nation reported. and 13 vehicles, including a Rolls Royce,

Despite taking a vow of celibacy, he is also alleged to have had as many as seven lovers and to have fathered a number of other children with them.

Reports have also alleged that up to 200 million baht in donations has been uncovered in bank accounts belonging to his charity.

A joint investigation by the Department of Special Investigation (DSI) and the Office of National Buddhism is said to have uncovered assets including two luxury homes Chevrolet, Ferrari, Hummer, Toyota Camry, four pickup trucks and four motorcycles.

After a meeting to discuss the probe with the DSI, senior clergy from Si Sa Ket have decided not to disrobe the monk until "additional evidence is provided".

Weera Daosee, an academic at the Si Sa Ket Buddhism Office, suggested that it would probably take DNA results or the monk's confession to warrant the termination of Luang Pu Nenkham's monkhood.

Time magazine calls out 'trashy' full-moon parties

THAILAND's world-famous fullmoon parties on the island of Koh Pha Ngan have become an environmentally destructive, crimeridden "disgrace", according to a damning report last week in *Time*.

The magazine detailed the party's decline from its humble origins in the late 1980s to today's huge, debauched gatherings, in which some 30,000 people descend on Had Rin Beach for an orgy of "tawdry techno, cheap fast food and wasted Millennials".

Beginning in 1988 on what old Thailand hand Joe Cummings called "one of the most beautiful beaches I'd ever seen", the party began to attract intrepid travellers who came for festivities centered on "tents, campfires and music the partygoers made themselves".

"Hippies from across the globe used to quietly gather at this idyllic enclave, drifting in on clouds of marijuana smoke to sit on a beach, strum a battered guitar and simply be," the report said.

In 1989, when Mr Cummings first attended the party, it was still an intimate affair attracting no more than 2,000 people.

But things changed. The Time report catalogued the party's alarming array of current woes, which include the trashing of the environment, rampant crime and hard drug use, as well as deaths from drowning, illness and

Internet giants hit in Singapore sling

SINGAPORE's move to tighten regulation of news websites, already under fire from bloggers and human rights groups, has attracted criticism from an unexpected quarter: large internet firms with a big presence in the citystate who say the new rules will hurt the industry.

Web giants Facebook, eBay, Google and Yahoo! have said the revised rules "have negatively impacted Singapore's global image as an open and business-friendly country".


The comments, made in a letter to Singapore's minister of communications and information by the Asia Internet Coalition, an industry body, are the first sign that Singapore's success in wooing major players to its shores is not assured. Google, eBay, Facebook and Yahoo all have a major presence in the city-state.

Google said separately it was concerned about the long-term implications of the regulation especially for local internet entrepreneurs who it said now faced greater uncertainty and legal risk.

In late May Singapore said websites that regularly report on Singapore would have to be licensed and listed 10 news sites that would be affected, based on criteria such as having 50,000 unique visitors from Singapore each month.

Websites affected by the new licensing regime would have to put up a S\$50,000 (about 1.22 million baht) performance bond as well as take down within 24 hours any story that authorities deemed objectionable.

ture, but this regulation looks a lot like the past," Google's Ann Lavin, director of public policy and government affairs, Southeast Asia, told Reuters.

The Media Development Authority (MDA) said the changes would make the rules governing news websites more consistent with those affecting newspapers and other traditional media platforms. But it has stressed there

"The new licensing framework is not intended to clamp down on Internet freedom," an MDA spokesman said in a written response to questions.

Yahoo's popular Singapore news site was the only foreign website among the 10 listed by the MDA, but critics fear the rules could be extended to cover other websites, including those critical of the government.

Former Mexican President Fox urges marijuana legalization

FORMER Mexican President Vicente Fox took his crusade to legalize marijuana to San Francisco on Monday, joining pot advocates to urge the US and his own country to decriminalize the sale and recreational use of cannabis.

Legalization is the only way to end the violence of Mexican drug cartels, which he blamed on America's war on drugs, Fox said.

Mexico's current president, Enrique Pena Nieto, has opposed legalization. But he recently said that he would consider world opinion on the matter, particularly in light of recent voter-approved initiatives to legalize marijuana in Washington state and Colorado for recreational use.

Two dead, 180 injured in Asiana plane crash

TWO people were killed and 130 were hospitalized after an Asiana Airlines jumbo jet crash-landed at San Francisco International Airport on Saturday morning, San Francisco Fire Department Chief Joanna Hayes-White said.

The Boeing 777, which had flown from Seoul, South Korea, was carrying 307 people when it came in low and hit a sea wall at the end of the runway.

US considers pulling all troops from Afghanistan

THE United States is considering pulling out all its troops from Afghanistan next year, US officials said, amid tension between President Barack Obama's administration and Afghan President Hamid Karzai's government.

President Obama is committed to wrapping up US military involvement in Afghanistan by the end of 2014, but the United States has been talking with officials in Afghanistan about keeping a small residual force there of perhaps 8,000 troops.

Chinese open fire on Tibetan monks on Dalai Lama's birthday

CHINA'S top official in charge of religious groups and ethnic minorities vowed on Tuesday to step up the fight against exiled Tibetan spiritual leader the Dalai Lama, as a rights group reported police shootings of monks marking his birthday.

The comments by Yu Zhengsheng, number four in the ruling Communist Party's hierarchy, appear aimed at thwarting speculation that China's new leadership could take a softer line on the Dalai Lama.


Beijing considers the Dalai Lama, who fled China in 1959 after an abortive uprising against

Chinese rule, a violent separatist. The Dalai Lama, who is based in India, says he is merely seeking greater autonomy for his Himalayan homeland.

While Chinese security forces often use heavy-handed tactics to stop protests in Tibetan regions, they rarely use guns.

Officials reached by telephone in Ganzi said they had no knowledge of the incident.

China's Foreign Ministry said it was also unaware of the reports, but said the Dalai Lama was using the opportunity of his birthday to promote his separatist agenda.

Egypt seeks end to crisis

EGYPT'S interim rulers issued a faster than expected timetable for elections to try to drag the country out of crisis, a day after 51 people were killed when troops fired on a crowd supporting ousted President Mohamed Mursi.

The streets of Cairo were quiet on Tuesday but Mursi's Muslim Brotherhood movement called for more protests later in the day, raising the risk of further violence.

Under pressure to restore democracy quickly, Adli Mansour, the judge named head of state by the army when it brought down Mursi last week, decreed overnight that a parliamentary vote would be held in about six months. That would be followed by a presidential election.

In an important positive signal for the transitional authorities, the ultra-orthodox Islamist Nour Party said it would accept ex-finance minister Samir Radwan as prime minister, potentially paving the way for an interim cabinet.

The stakes were raised dramatically by the bloodshed on Monday, the worst since President Mursi was toppled by the military. The army opened fire outside Cairo's Republican Guard barracks where the deposed leader is believed to

alarm among key donors such as the US and the EU, as well as in Israel, with which Egypt has had a US-backed peace treaty since 1979.

Officials said troops fired in re-

sponse to an attack by armed assailants. The protesters disputed that account, insisting they were conducting peaceful dawn prayers.

"They shot us with teargas, birdshot, rubber bullets - everything. Then they used live bullets," said a man wounded in the scuffle.

The bloodshed shocked Egyptians, already tired of the turbulence that began two and half years ago with the over-throw of autocrat Hosni Mubarak in a popular uprising.

However, the Muslim Brotherhood rejected the decree issued by Egypt's interim head of state.

Senior Brotherhood politician Essam El-Erian said the decree by interim head of state Adli Mansour was "usurping legislative power".

The Brotherhood is demanding the military reinstate Mursi as president and has said it will have nothing to do with the militarybacked transition.

Post Arab spring plagued by increased corruption: Poll

CORRUPTION has worsened in most Arab corruption may undermine governments' efcountries since their 2011 revolutions, even though anger with corrupt officials was a major reason for the uprisings, according to a public opinion poll released on Tuesday.

The survey by Transparency International, a global non-governmental body which studies bribery around the world, appears to dash hopes that the Arab Spring would produce cleaner government and business in the region.

Of four countries which experienced changes of government during the Arab Spring, a majority of respondents in three – Egypt, Tunisia and Yemen – feel the level of corruption has risen in the past two years, the survey showed.

In Egypt, 64% said corruption had wors-The Arab public's continued frustration with ened; in Tunisia, the proportion was 80%.

The exception was Libya, where only 46% said the country had become more corrupt.

Within Egypt, 78% of respondents said the police were corrupt or extremely corrupt. The proportion was 65% for the judiciary and 45% for the military, one of the country's most respected

The survey was based on interviews with pout 1 000 people in each country between last September and March this year.

Runaway train devastates Quebec tourist town

THREE days after a runaway train derailed and exploded in the downtown core of Lac-Megantic, many residents of the Quebec tourist town are still waiting for answers about missing loved ones.

With the fires now out and the authorities finally able to access the epicenter of the blasts, the death toll is expected to climb and many of the town's evacuated

residents will finally be allowed back to assess the damage.

For the families of the dead and missing – around 50 people altogether – the recovery efforts will start to bring some closure, though it may still take weeks or even months before all are identified.

"They know their loved ones were there, on the site. Most of them are now waiting for confirmation - because that makes it official," said Steve Lemay, the parish priest of Lac-Megantic, who has been meeting with affected families. "It's clear that they are not waiting for the missing to return."

Ouebec police said late on Monday that they had so far recovered 13 bodies from the blackened rubble of what was once the historic downtown strip. - Reuters

More ways to secure Thai land

FOR those of you who read my article on obtaining Thai citizenship and aren't going down that road, I promised to come back and write about the other ways of "buying" property in Thailand.

The fact is you can go right ahead and pay for land here, but the law is clear that the land office will not be registering the title in a foreigner's name. I am often asked by people in Phuket about how to secure the land under the property they wish to own, and in my normal line of work, I get to sit down with many people from various walks of life and hear what they have in fact done themselves.

Obviously purchasing a freehold condo is the most straightforward, although if your heirs are not Thai citizens they will have trouble inheriting it from you. Most of you, I would assume, are more interested in buying a house in paradise, and this is where things get much more tricky. Knowing what not to do is almost as important as knowing what to do in this case.

Many people simply find a Thai person they think they can trust and register the property in their name. Others set up shell companies to hold the title at the land office, and some actually form companies that in reality do some sort of business. Some people get a thirty year lease with the promise of multiple extensions. No one way is fool-proof, as I will explain below.

It should go without saying that if you trust putting the title into someone else's name, you

have no legal recourse should they decide to rip you off. I have recently heard about an expat likely losing his property because he put it into someone's name and they borrowed against it to develop a property that didn't exactly turn out as expected. Even your wife or mother in law, or maybe I should say especially your mother in law, may do unexpected things that could see your property taken away from you.

The government has continuously threatened to crack down on the practice of nominee shareholders and companies which are only set up to skirt property laws. It seems to me that the majority of people I have come across throughout the country use this method and the government has never made good on its promise to root them all out. It would still worry me personally that someday there may be a reckoning.

To me it seems that if you can actually have a "real" business here this is ideal and would be a legally acceptable means of owning a property, but of course then you have the risk that business goes bad.

The major problem with the lease method to me is that legally you have rented the property for thirty years. The land office will only register that bit of the contract, the rest of it is technically illegal and if the original seller decides not to give you the next thirty years, it is hard to know if that would stand up in court.

Also, if you die, the lease dies with you, and if the seller dies it is likely their heir could try to claim

the property back after thirty years despite a contract for two additional thirty year extensions.

Since none of the methods are fool-proof on their own, I think a prudent thing to do is to mix them up. I would never get a 30-year lease from the seller, you could instead put the title into the name of

a Thai person you think you can trust and then lease it from them.

Alternatively, you could start a company and then lease it back, giving you a second layer of protection securing your usage rights should something go wrong with the company.

Some use an offshore company

to hold the Thai company so that they can pass shares on to their loved ones to avoid a taxable event in Thailand or any other scrutiny at death. Of course it may be overboard and a little expensive, but at least you can secure the right to use the property even if you can never technically own it.

Slower growth forecast for 2nd half

THE property market is expected to grow more slowly in the second half of the year, due to the economic slowdown and a fall in purchasing power in a key segment, according to leading developers.

Pruksa Real Estate director and chief business officer Prasert Taedullayasatit said the market would be slower than in the first half of the year for these reasons, and that reduced purchasing power would affect the market for homes costing more than 5 million baht.

However, the demand for homes priced up to 5mn baht will continue to expand because this segment represents real demand from those who buy a property in which they intend to live, he said.

Demand for homes priced up to 2mn baht is also continuing to grow, as buyers in that category are generally not those who decided to purchase a vehicle under the government's first car scheme, he added.

"Our research shows that customers buying a first car have a different lifestyle from people purchasing a home, which put them in a different market and leads us to believe that homes costing no more than 2mn baht will still experience strong demand," said Prasert.

However, the overall market will continue to expand because demand for homes priced up to five million baht is still strong among those in employment and generating a monthly income, he said.

Demand for homes in this price category continues to be largely real, rather than demand for speculative or investment purposes, he added.

Nonetheless, Issara said the overall property market may grow by less than had been estimated early this year, due to reduced demand from speculators and investors for properties costing more than five

Putting aside the prospects for ne second half, top 10-listed developers have recorded presales worth more than 100 billion baht combined for the first six months of the year. Pruksa Real Estate had presales of 23bn baht, more than half the company's full-year target of 35bn baht.

Sansiri's presales came in at 29bn baht, more than half the company's full-year target of 48bn

Land & Houses, meanwhile, achieved presales worth 15 bn baht, exactly half of the company's full-year target.

LPN Development recorded

presales of 15.5bn baht in the first half. The company's full-year target is 20bn baht.

AP(Thailand)'s presales totalled 8bn baht, while Supalai achieved 10bn baht. Their full-year targets are 22bn baht and 26bn baht, respectively.

SC Asset Corp saw presales of Bt6 billion in the first half, representing 40% of its target of 15bn baht for the entire year.

Property Perfect, meanwhile, had presales worth 6bn baht. The developer's 2013 target is 19bn baht.

"Our presales were higher than we had estimated following increased demand for homes costing up to five million apiece," said Pruksa's Prasert.

Supalai managing director Atip Bichanond said the company's firsthalf presales had come in lower than estimated because it had launched fewer projects during the period.

That said, presales were still higher than in the same period last year, he added.

SC Asset chief operating officer Kree Dejchai said presales in the first half had been close to the company's target, thanks to higher demand than in the same period last year.

IT'S been said that all that glitters is not gold and real estate is an example of the vast wealth that simple plots of dirt can conjure up. But bringing on the bling can certainly attract some of the more adventurous souls out there.

Last week, an image of a Phuket property man's life, who had taken a turn for the worse, flashed up on various news sites across the island. The mug shots with police and the threat of pending deportation are a sad reminder of the personal demons of paradise.

My mind's eye turned back to the Phuket boom years after the new millennium, and I had a hard time reconciling the distant vision of success with the immediate prospect of certain failure.

For the most part, our property sector has taken a predictable course in cyclical growth from an emerging story line, with more entrepreneurs than institutional developers. Phuket has historically been unlike other parts of Thailand in that its tourism and property sectors have a large segment of foreign players. Despite the stories of meteoric rises

from rags to riches, there were no corresponding large-scale defaults of epic proportions. Of course

there have been some, which have inflicted considerable pain on naive purchasers.

More than a decade has come and gone since mad dogs and glory saw demand sprint far ahead of supply. Imagine Usain Bolt racing with a hippo. The fix was in.

Today, as we all know, the tables have been turned, the baby has grown into a full fledged adult and the welcome mat while still out, is now dominated by bigger players who have no trouble flexing their toned muscles.

Since the global financial crisis, Phuket's expat real estate players have felt a continued pressure similar to global warming. The seas are rapidly rising and it has been a daily race to sink or swim. Of course, many have had to change course, going from sales into rentals, estate management, online anything or completely different businesses. The world they had known had disappeared and a ransom note was left by the nightstand.

the industry has had to take a reality check, change expectations and tune up or tune out. Sure there are hold-outs wanting the good old days to return. For them, the best advice might be anticipating when hell freezes over. It's been no different for local Thai developers who hear the running of Bangkok bulls over and over each and every night.

Today, there remains money to be made on the island whether you are Thai or an expat, but the goalposts are higher and competition fierce. Sure the highways glitter with foreigners' red license plates but most of these are funded through money from abroad. Things in the property trade are not as easy as they used to be, but for a few, success remains achievable unlike many countries in the West where it's best to just not bother getting out of bed, roll over and cry the entire day.

Life in paradise is not as cheap as it used to be, when it was forty baht to a dollar. Nor

as easy as just showing up, and opening the door with a flood of easy property sales. The vicious competition of new emerging markets, resales, cheap rentals and shoebox condos are enough to make most people dizzy.

In days past, foreigners who traveled to the East had the opportunity to remake their lives, rewrite the book and this remains the case to this day. But one thing for sure is Easy Street is a dead end, and there are no short cuts.

Reality has bitten back and the truth is just like selling dirt. Making money on property here, as in most parts of the world, is a long-term proposition. Certainly there are exceptions, but for the most part hard work, good ideas and dogma are the only things that count in this race. Add in a little luck, but be very wary of getting to close to the edge, it's a long way down.

Your Retirement Income

The cost of living "back home" may have risen so much during your time abroad that returning on your retirement income will mean a much lower standard of living.

The good news is that inflation tends to be much lower in developed countries than in the emerging markets that are popular retirement destinations, meaning the low interest rates your investments might be getting right now, and for the foreseeable future, may be enough to at least get by on without many worries.

Moreover, not returning home for some nationalities (British) can mean frozen pension incomes.

Retirement Years

Housing Back Home

Even if you have a good retirement income, returning home to a place like San Francisco or London, where housing has gotten very expensive, may not be financially viable without a large mortgage if you did not maintain a residence in such pricey locations.

And having a mortgage as a retiree on a fixed income is usually not a smart financial move.

Tax Home Situation

Living abroad for most retirees who aren't US citizens (and thus subject to worldwide taxation) will likely mean significantly lower taxes.

However, taxes may not matter much when making a decision if you will be on a relatively low fixed or investment income while American retirees have 50 states with 50 different tax regimes to choose from.

Cost of Retirement Visas

Returning to your home country will not require you to tie up potentially large sums of money in retirement visa deposits in non-home country currencies and pay annual expenses to maintain such visas.

Likewise, there is always the risk of retirement visa rules or requirements changing or becoming more financially onerous forcing you to leave.

Standard of Living

If you have gotten accustomed to living in places where expats enjoy a very high standard of living (live-in domestic help), returning home will likely be much more of a culture shock. After all, it's usually only the truly rich in developed countries that enjoy live-in domestic help – something that may become more of a necessity rather than a luxury as you get older.

Personal Health

The older you are, the more difficult it will be to buy affordable health insurance as there is usually an age cut-off date while government health care programs for retirees rarely cover citizens when they are living abroad.

A possible compromise might be to retire abroad in an inexpensive location close to your home country (Mexico if you are American or Canadian) so that it's possible to easily return to your

home country for a major and expensive medical emergency.

Climate

Living in places like Thailand where the weather is usually hot and humid, plus there is an annual rainy season, may become harder to bear the older you are while "winter" in the tropics may actually be relatively cold when you consider homes usually don't have central heating of any kind.

On the other hand, if you have spent a good portion of your life abroad in warm tropical climates, you might find returning home to a northern latitude to be an even more difficult adjustment when you are older.

Family, Friends, Others

If you have been an expat for many years, you may not have many close family or friends left in your home country who can assist you in any way. That could make integrating back into your home country even more difficult as it might be hard to find a social circle of friends you can relate to as you have no doubt missed out on a lot of events and cultural or political changes while living abroad.

ACCORDING to representatives from various Thailand-based food export associations, the volume of shrimp exports is expected to increase this year by 40%, while the

export value will also swell by 20% due to the appreciation of the baht.

Projections about Thai food exports were presented to Prime Minister Yingluck Shinawatra, who'd chaired a discussion on July 8 with entrepreneurs from the food export and agri-food industries.

In the meeting, the private sector called for the Government to attend to anti-dumping measures, with parties agreeing to the establishment of public private partnership (PPP) working groups to overlook rules and regulations of food export supply chain and FTA developments that impact the food industry.

The PM was told that exports of frozen chickens this year would reach 620,000 tons with a value of 79 billion baht. This would equate to an increase of 7% from last year; whereas the value of processed food exports was expected to be valued at approximately 180bn baht, which would be about the same as - Phuket Gazette last year.

Island inflation 10% higher than country

PHUKET continues to outpace most of the rest of the country in terms of inflation, with the cost of living on the island in the first six months of the year, growing at a rate 10% faster than Thailand overall.

Meanwhile, headline (overall) inflation in the Kingdom's two main cities in the North and Northeast was more than 40% higher than the national average.

As measured by the average Consumer Price Index (CPI), Thailand's cost of living in the first six months of 2013 rose by 2.7% over the same period last year, while overall inflation in Phuket was measured at 3.1% during the same period, compared to 6.3% in Chiang Mai and 5.9% in Khon Kaen.

The Phuket Commerce Office, in collaboration with the Phuket provincial government and the

Commerce Ministry's Information Office and Bureau of Trade and Economic Indices, recently published the province's Consumer Price Index (CPI-P) analysis for the first half of the year.

It should also be noted that this year, the Kingdom's central indices office changed its base year – the year used to compare current consumer prices to from 2007 to 2011.

Prior to such change, from 2007 to 2012, overall inflation in Thailand was measured at about 16%, compared to Phuket, which had a 5-year inflation rate of 26%.

In other words, during the period, the cost of living in Phuket rose about 60% quicker than Thailand as a whole.

Compared with the national CPI report, which now surveys 450 items (previously, 407), the CPI-P survey for Phuket covers only 238 consumer goods and services.

Both lists cover expense

trends for everything from food, beverages, apparel, housing and personal health-care, to vehicles, transport, communications, entertainment, media, education, religion, tobacco and alcohol.

Phuket's average year-on-year inflation of 3% during the first six months derives is highlighted by an average 3.2% price increases for food and [non-alcoholic] beverage items (F&B), namely fruits and vegetables (5.2%), out-of-home consumer foods (4.7%); in-home consumer foods (2.4%) dairy and egg products (3.6%); meat, poultry and seafood items (3.5%); food condiments (1.5%) and rice, flour and flour products (0.2%).

Meanwhile non F&B items on the island inflated by 2.5%, highlighted by consumer goods price and expense rises in alcohol and tobacco (7.8%); clothing apparel and footwear (6%); packaging,

transport and communications (2.7%); housing (1.8%); and personal health care (1.4%).

Consumer expenses and prices categorized as entertainment, reading, education and/or religion inflated in Phuket by only 0.7%.

A change from the usual, Phuket has not had the highest inflation rate in the country so far this year, with the economies of major cities in the North and Northeast this year being affected by a number of economic stimulus initiatives and schemes.

Among the most controversial of these is the government-sponsored rice pledging scheme.

Trade drops by nearly 60% since last year

THREE-quarters of the way into (y-o-y) from 8.6bn baht. the government's current fiscal year, the island's export-import industry is dwindling, particularly when compared to last year's benchmark trading year.

Phuket Customs House' records through June 30 show that the value of exports in the 2013


As usual, the island's top export this year so far – by far – has been raw block rubber, with exports of the commodity currently valued at 2.9bn baht or 58.6% of all Phuket's reported exports, representing a 66% decline, year-on-year

The average export price of rubber (FOB via Bangkok) in July has dropped by about 18% y-o-y now to about 80 baht per kilogram.

Meanwhile, Phuket's second biggest export is fiberboard made from old rubber trees (1.46bn baht or 29% of

exports), down 28% yfrom 2.03bn baht.

Other significant exports include sports and leisure v e s s e l s (384mn baht or 7.63% of exports); live sea fish (78mn baht) and frozen sea

Topping the island's imports' 59% to 682.2 million baht from list, by combined gross value, is 1.67bn baht this time last year. chilled sea fish, with imports valued at 253.5mn baht, down 45% y-o-y from 466mn baht.

This is followed by sports and leisure vessels worth 251.4mn baht, a drop of 43.2% y-o-y from 443mn baht.

The only import to show growth during the nine month period was frozen sea fish, with imports this year currently valued at 161mn baht, up 8% from 149mn baht, last year.

Other up-and-coming imports include processed lumber (8.6mn baht) and particle board (2.6mn baht).

Saving swimmers by not letting them swim

First PERSON

IT SHOULD be illegal to swim when red flags are posted, and hotels should warn their guests clearly about the dangers of the sea during the low season.

When there is dangerous surf, we post red flags along the beach to warn swimmers, but many of them ignore the flags. Many times when we try to stop them from going into the sea when it is dangerous, they swear at us. Sometimes they even hit my staff.

The authorities should take action against people who do not listen to us. They should fine people who do not obey the rules that are in place to save their lives.

Hotels and resorts should post signs in their lobbies or hotel rooms to warn guests not to swim during the southwest monsoon. I suggested this idea to some hotels, but most of them disagreed. They thought it might chase their guests away.

I understand that they're looking at it from a business angle and I also understand that a big dream of many tourists who visit Phuket is to swim at our beautiful beaches. But as a lifeguard, I would say that if they come here to die, it's better not to come.

We don't have the authority to stop people from going in the water. We need help with this. We have enough stress in our job without having to fight with people who won't listen to us.

We're under incredible pressure when we rescue swimmers. I always try my best to save them. Even when they disappear in the water, I feel I have to find them. Whether they are alive or dead, I

will not leave them in the water. If they die at sea, I want to at least return their body to the shore.

About two years ago, I rescued a German man by pulling him out of a rip current. It was scary and I almost died.

My friend and I took a jet-ski out to rescue him. The waves were really strong. As we arrived near him, I jumped off the jet-ski and stuck the rescue float under his chest. I tried pulling him out of the strong waves in a safer direction.

He was big and heavy and had been hit so many times by the waves before I got to him that he was exhausted and about to pass out. I asked him to help me swim and tried to go under the waves with him to avoid being hit, but he was too scared and too tired. I had to pull him all the way with my own strength.

The waves hit me again and again and pulled him and me in the wrong direction. I was choking on sea water and felt exhausted. I felt like I couldn't hold

At that moment, I even thought about leaving him and swimming away alone, but a voice in my head told me to try again and I finally made it.

After we got out of the rip current, my friend picked us both up with the jet-ski and took us safely back to shore.

In some cases, after getting people back to shore, I have to do CPR. This part is also stressful because their lives are in my hands. I really want to save them, I want them to survive.

Sometimes as I am about to do CPR, a family member of the person I pulled out of the water comes and says to me tearfully, "Please save my son. Please do not let him die." That puts more pressure on me and makes me very sad if finally I can't save the person.

The last time I did CPR was on June 23, on an Indian tourist named Ramesh Chand Singhal, who was pronounced dead on arrival at Patong Hospital. That day I went home feeling so de-

Enigmatic beach flags

YOU arrive at the beach ready for a day of sun, sea and sand, but you are greeted by a line of different colored flags lining the shoreline: red, red and yellow, yellow, blue, red and white chequered. Most people, me included, aim for the area away from the red flag as they know what that means. The others are just colored fabric on a

Four swimmers died on Phuket beaches in the period June 20 to 23 and over 30 tourists were pulled from the surf.

Tourists were partially blamed for getting themselves into difficulty by ignoring the warning flags. This spate of drownings and the large number of people rescued from the sea indicate either that people choose to ignore the warning flags or they have no idea what they mean.

Flags are important on beaches to inform users about local information, lifeguard services and potential safety risks. Signs and flags are important not only to people unfamiliar with the beach but also to regular beach users in relation to currents and changing conditions.

However, the flag system used on Phuket, although an international system, is not familiar to all beachgoers.

Some people may never have been to the beach before and some might have been to a beach that didn't have a flag warning system. and get home alive.

How many beachgoers know them all: red means beach closed, do not enter water; red and yellow, patrolled area – the safest swimming area; yellow, warning potentially dangerous conditions; blue, aquatic activity allowed within the boundary; and red and white chequered, evacuate the

Another factor to consider is that people by nature tend to follow the crowd. If someone sees a group of people swimming in an area, they will instinctively think that it is safe and go in the water there, even if these people are swimming in a red-flag zone. It is then up to the lifeguard to move these people out of the dangerous surf area and keep them out.

One way to keep tourists out of harm's way is by sensory overload. Bombard them with safety information that shows them the dangers of the sea and what exactly each flag color means.

This can be done through an inflight video, pamphlets at the airport, hotels, tourist attractions and huge signs at the beaches.

International money transfer rules

What does the Thai law state regarding foreign money transfers? Does each bank set its own rules and regulations?

I was told by Siam Commercial Bank that I wasn't allowed to transfer a mere 1,000 euros to my foreign account.

Allain Forex Phuket

An officer at the Bank of **Thailand replies:**

All Thai banks must follow national regulations for foreign money transfers. They can't make their own regulations.

There is no minimum amount set for transfers from a Thai account to a foreign account.

If you would like to transfer

more than US\$50,000 or the equivalent in another currency, you need to file a request with the Bank of Thailand. We will consider the needs of the individual when granting permission.

As for transfers from a foreign account into a Thai account, any amount higher than two million baht requires the bank to notify the Anti-Money Laundering Office to confirm the source of the money.

An officer at the Personal Loan **Department of SCB Head office** in Bangkok replies:

Foreigners cannot borrow money from Thai banks according to the regulations of the Thai National Bank. However, you can borrow money under the name of a Thai person or a Thai spouse. If money is borrowed under the name of a Thai spouse, the foreigner can be the guarantor.

If you have your own busipartner to be a guarantor. The length of the loan cannot exceed 10 years.

Gerard Van Paassen, Senior Assistant Vice President -Laguna Property, replies:

Currently, we are not aware that any bank in Thailand is offering foreigners a loan to purchase property within Thailand.

Laguna Property offers a deferred payment on 50 per cent of the selling price with a one, three or five year payment plan.

For a few selected properties

we have a 10 year payment plan, but for a limited time only.

Nichapat Kaewnarong, Property Consultant, Boat Lagoon, replies:

Yes, foreigners can get a loan with us. They have to make a 50 per cent down payment, and must repay the loan within three years. The interest rate is 10 per cent.

A great wine menu deserves a prize

By Maciek Klimowicz

JON Hyams, founder of the Wine List of the Year Awards, says that one of his biggest aims when starting the competition was education.

But this time, it's not teaching consumers about the wine, but rather teaching the sommeliers and waiters how to present their product to you and helping them get rid of their inherited, old and often out-

dated habits. "We're trying to steer away from the more conservative, long and complicated wine list based on regional selections to a layout based on styles of wine. Some of the best lists in the world are short and eclectic with the emphasis on listings by style. We're trying to encourage

creativity but also attention to details – correct spelling of appellations, vintages and regions," says Jon.

So basically, it's about letting the wine experts do the hard work, so that you don't have to. A good modern wine list is one that helps you choose a bottle you might like without actually knowing much about appellations, Grand Cru's and vintages, "90 per cent of consumers choose wine by style. So at the end of the day it comes down to describing what it tastes like," adds Jon.

But even if you know your Chardonnay from your Sauvignon Blanc there are still places out there that appreciate a more traditional approach. Georges Ciret, wine director of the Boathouse Wine & Grill which holder of the 2012 award in the Restaurant Wine List category is a proponent of the on my wine list, and I consider the traditional approach.

"I love wine list that is very clear and panoramic. I try to give a clear vision of names, vintages and prices. "I think it's good to work with countries and then

ing the fact, that

some wines are quite pricey in Thailand. But a well designed wine list is an integral part of selling it to consumers. Especially in a place like Phuket, a holiday destination where most wine is consumed not by locals but

by tourists, people who want to relax, chill out and not deal with the headache of choosing the right wine for their meal.

"Guests generally need to be told what's good with the food on the menu. They are on holiday and taking the decision making away from them and masterfully matching food and wine combinations for them on set menu is what luxury resort management and ultimate guest satisfaction is all about." says Dawid Koegelenberg, manager of The Sarojin resort, winner of the last year's Best Wine List in Thailand award.

But it's not only about high-end resorts and five-star hotels. Among the five categories in this year's competition there is one designed for shorter wine lists. "I want to see many, many more players, not just the big resorts and hotels," says Jon, "If I had a backyard cafe on the street corner and I had 20 wines





Life & style Lessons from Penang

DESPITE their many similarities architectural and historical – in terms of modern-day tourism, old town Georgetown, Penang, beats the pants off the old quarter of Phuket Town. First of all, Georgetown got World Heritage status in 2008. You can't get a better internationally recognized advertisement than that. Second, it knows what city tourists want and supplies it in spades: walkability and photo-ops.

Old town Georgetown's streets are not clogged with cars like old town Phuket's are. Where there are no sidewalks, tourists can walk safely in the street in Georgetown. Tourists like to walk. It makes them masters of their fate, and takes away the stress of haggling with taxi drivers or figuring out bus schedules. Most importantly, walking lets tourists take photos easily. And in this day of smart phones and social networking, showing friends where you are is a key component of taking a holiday.

Georgetown provides an abundance of photo-ops, most notably its Sino-Portuguese shop

Penang calls these "heritage shop houses" and understands the treasure it has in them. The government program "Think City" offers funding for the repair or renovation of heritage shop house facades and roofs. Georgetown World Heritage Incorporated encourages owners and business people to protect old town Georgetown by capitalizing on its economic potential. One program they offer is a workshop that helps local designers identify Georgetown's "cultural DNA" in order to make more relevant souvenirs. Another group, Penang Heritage Trust, is a "watch-dog" NGO with a mandate to protect endangered buildings.

But the protection and development of old town Georgetown is not just left up to the government – private individuals are involved in preserving heritage as well. The two



Peranakan mansions that have been renovated and made into museums, and many of the Chinese clan houses are privately owned. And it is private enterprise that has transformed so many historic buildings into hotels – many more of them high-end than we have in old town Phuket.

Though most of the photo-ops are free, Penang understands that tourists are willing to pay to see history. They're willing to pay up to 20 ringgit (200 baht) to go inside those renovated Peranakan mansions, whether they offer an interesting tour (The Cheong Fatt Tze Mansion) or just guides shouting at each other and singing to themselves (Pinang Peranakan Mansion). Tourists will even pay 10 ringgit (100 baht) to see the clan house of a Chinese family – the Khoo Khongsi (where part of Jodie Foster's Anna and the King was filmed).

But there's more than just old buildings for tourists to photograph in Georgetown – there's art too. Murals by Lithuanian artist Ernest Zacharevic are scattered around the old town area and are major tourist magnets. Galleries like Whiteaways display real local art, not souvenir art for tourists. And currently there's a 15-meter high bamboo installation a la Christo between the city and town halls part of Georgetown's annual month-long arts and music festival.

Yet Georgetown is not overgentrified. Real people and real tradesmen still live there, providing yet more photo ops for tourists, like the banana-filled ceiling of a fruit store, the Indian gentleman in his two-seater green barber's hut, men lined up praying in a tiny narrow mosque, gigantic incense sticks outside a fortune-teller's shop.

Last but not least, there are museums in old town Georgetown air conditioned museums with interesting, well-labeled exhibits.

All of these sights are within walking distance; the world heri-



tage zone is just one square kilometer, and the buffer zone around it, which is equally interesting, is 1.5 square kilometers.

Tourists can easily find their way around, with clear street signs, and learn snippets of history by reading informative wall plaques. After receiving world heritage status in 2008, the Penang state government voted to put up these signs and plaques in multiple languages. The signs are in Chinese too. Like Phuket, Penang has recently seen a dramatic increase in number of Chinese tourists, not surprising, since both places figure prominently in Chinese history, having been the targets of so many Chinese immigrants.

Penang spotlights Sun Yat Sen, who planned a revolution during his four months in Penang in 1910, with a museum and walking trail.

Thailand's Tourism and Sports Minister Somsak Pureesrisak says Phuket needs to promote high-end tourism. He would do well to follow Penang's recipe, by focusing on history, architecture and art; creating multiple points of interest within walking distance (we need museums in town, not in Thalang and the hills of Kathu) limiting traffic in old town Phuket and encouraging the development of 5-star lodging.

Old town Phuket has what it takes to be just as good as old town Georgetown, and shouldn't be afraid to copy.

The sky's the limit for Les

ONE of the undisputed highlights during the Phuket Airshow and Family Picnic charity event last week was a series of spectacular acrobatic performances by Les Vorosmarthy, the internationally famous stunt pilot originally from Budapest, Hungary.

The Gazette caught up with Les at the Phuket Airpark shortly before his fifth and final show on Sunday afternoon.

"I have been flying aerobatics since 1988, when I was 29 years old. It started as a hobby. I wanted to fly gliders when I was as young as 14, but my parents forbid me," said the 54-year-old.

But there is nothing they can do about it now," he added, with a laugh.

Les' relationship with Phuket Airpark began when owner Suchart Raksangop contacted him for the exotically entitled "Bikini Fly-In" event, held there four years ago.

Married to a mainland Chinese woman from Beijing, Les has three children – 14, 17 and 19 – and all study Chinese at the family's home in the Malaysian capital of Kuala Lampur.

"We didn't want to live in China because for me in China there is nothing to do because I don't speak or read the language. I would end up in an expat society somewhere. This way I can live with the locals in Malaysia. Everyone speaks English and it's a very nice place."

Les comes to Phuket two or three times a year and also has business interests in the US state of California, where he runs a Santa Barbara-based company that manufactures a device used to facilitate doctors conducting cataract surgery. But his real passion is flying.

"I flew two times yesterday, two more today and have one more to go," he said.

Asked about motivation and mindset while flying stunts, he said there is an element of, quite literally, "winging it" involved.

"I put together a routine, which is based on several elements. Each maneuver in an element, basically. Each of these maneuvers I have flown hundreds of times. So depending on my speed and altitude I decide what I am going to do next."

> Les uses an Extra 300 aircraft, which

is a Germanmanufactured plane designed by award-winning stunt pilot Walter Extra.

"This is a standard. This model is one of the very few planes in the world

that can do unlimited, top-level aerobatics," said Les. In one of his most remarkable stunts, the "tailslide", Les lets the engine idle and the craft go into a backwards freefall.

I go vertically up, and then when I reach a certain altitude that is safe for me to recover from I pull back to idle. Then the plane just falls, backwards, until it reaches a certain speed when the air hits the tail in one direction and you flip over," he said.

Asked how he developed these skills, he said: "I did a basic aerobatic training, which includes rolls, loops, spins - a few things. Then, in 1995, I started flying in aerobatic competitions. There are different categories, and as you move up through the categories more and more maneuvers are involved, and the complexity increases. The categories are Basic, Sportsman, Intermediate, Advanced and then finally, Unlimited. This is organized in the US by the International Aerobatics Club, which has from five to ten contests yearly in my area. So I went all the way to the top level of competition, Unlimited."

However, the pinnacle of his competitive career came in 1998, when he had a chance to represent Hungary in the World Championships held in Trencin, Slovakia.

Asked if aerobatics was as dangerous as it appeared, he said flatly: "It is dangerous. I have lost quite

friends.

One of the most dangerous parts of aerobatics is the unnatural stress it puts on the human body. Commonly known as "pulling Gs", Unlimited acrobatic pilots sometimes expose themselves to a

passed out and crashed. Les is very familiar with the dangers of the so-called G forces, but is also very experienced in how to deal with them safely.

"You can get a blackout or, more commonly, what we call a greyout, which is when you don't see anymore, but it is only temporary. When you pull Gs you get tunnel vision first. Then the colors go away. Then you see only the outlines of things. Then no picture. If there is no

picture you have to immediately release; you need to stop pulling,

otherwise you will lose consciousness," he explained.

Fortunately, strong monsoonal conditions throughout the weekend of the Air Show had almost no impact on flying conditions, he said.

"I have been lucky. So far I have

had no issues with the weather. The only thing I was concerned about yesterday was the presence of some low clouds, but they moved out. Today I actually clipped a cloud with my wing during my performance," he said.

Les has no plans to stop his aerial performances.

"The main reason is that I enjoy doing it. The people like it and I get invitations from all over the place to fly in shows," he said.

Asked what he thought of the nickname "The Mad Hungarian" that had been heard at the Airpark over the weekend, he said with a smile: "It's madness only to the people who don't know what it is really all about."

After that Airshow coordinator Pat James of the US Navy League stopped by to ask if conditions were safe enough for one last show, and with that Les was off once again to his Extra for the final, thrilling performance of the show.

Life & style Raising a rooftop garden

THE CHANCES are you probably have a roof garden of sorts. As Phuket is increasingly dominated by blocks of concrete

pretentiously known as condominiums, which it means being able to avoid the unhealthy necessitate the annihilation of all existing vegetation in the area, the chances are that your balcony or roof is the only repository of greenery you are likely to possess.

So why not make the most of it? After all, it is a pleasure to look out on something verdant, colorful and, above all, living. When I designed my house, I included two low-walled areas outside the bay windows where potted plants could be placed. Though the less hardy ones have long since gone, the broad-leafed dracaenas, colorful euphorbias and bougainvilleas are still alive and well. Plants that need little maintenance, they have tolerated my neglect.

Container plants are of course the obvious solution for concrete balconies, but choose glazed containers, place saucers under each pot and try not to over-water. Otherwise, you will stain the sand-wash or tiles beneath.

And don't stop at flowers or potted palms. If you start off with a fertile potting mix, your containers will support herbs such as basil, chives, ginger, chilies and coriander. In fact, growing your own vegetables is becoming increasingly

fashionable in urban centers, especially where people are lucky enough to own a roof terrace. Apart from anything else,


> levels of chemical pesticide used in commercial farming. Just for the record, Thailand has 27,126 agricultural chemical brands registered for use, more than any other Southeast Asian country.

> Apart from the fresh food benefits, plants reduce the overall heat absorption of a building, help control rain run-off, and offer natural and aesthetic benefits. When surveyed, 80 per cent of Singaporeans voted for more roof gardens to be implemented in the city's plans.

> Though Bangkok has relatively few such gardens, chef Jess Barnes shows what can be done. Though his apartment block has a mere 4.6 square meters of viable roof space, it now boasts more than 300 different fruit and vegetable plants, including tomatoes, aubergines, basil, lemongrass and even pomegranates. He reckons it takes 20 minutes daily watering. and 2-3 hours weeding and tidying every week. The aim is to cultivate shrubs with enough foliage to create shade and help retain moisture for the smaller plants, most of which find a use in his restaurant.

Of course most roof gardens have aesthetics in mind rather than any utilitarian purpose. A while ago I was asked for any suggestions for making the most of hold lots of water: that means they can sur-

an apartment roof space at a property in Ao Makham Bay.


The problem was not the residents' roof, but rather a huge flat rooftop immediately in front of their own condo. Topped with bitumen, it was such an eyesore that spoiled their view of the mangroves and the blue sea beyond. A quick and simple solution would have been lorry loads of pot plants, but in the long term, what

was needed was a properly laid, soil enriched surface with all the additional drainage and roof reinforcement. A very costly business.

On a much smaller scale, my daughter decided to cover a flat bitumen roof – an extension to her London house – with a creeping *sedum* or stonecrop, a variety of succulent increasingly being used instead of grass to create oases of greenery. Sedums have narrow fleshy leaves which

> vive dry spells and, in some cases, even a touch of frost. Moreover, sedums need little in the way of soil in which to anchor their roots.

> My personal favorite rooftop garden in Phuket is atop a Royal Phuket Marina penthouse. All around the swimming pool are masses of flowering shrubs, vines, succulents and plants chosen for their sculptural appeal. All are



taken up residence.





AN ONLINE game is a video game played over some form of computer network. Once you install the


game client on your computer, get a user name and a password, you're almost in. Almost, being the key word, because more often than not, there's just one more thing you need to do before you play – pay.

There are generally two ways in which games creators charge the user. Some of the online games are charged according to air time – want to play longer? Pay. This system is often found in popular MMORPG (Massively Mutiplayer Online Roleplaying Game) online

games, including some of the most popular titles out there such as Ragnarok or Lineage2. But other games may give the illusion of being completely free. You pay nothing to download the client, you pay nothing for the time you spend in the game. Yet somehow, players spend thousands of baht to stay on top of their game.

To find out how these games extract players money, the Gazette asked an online gaming

Chanthong, a university student from Phuket. Much of this spending goes towards "item trading" a sort of online shopping that can eat up a considerable chunk of many Thai kid's pocket money. It's just like traditional online shopping, except that the purchased goods don't get delivered to your doorstep – they stay in the game. Swords, armors, outfits – all these virtual goods are bought with real, hard earned of the game.

Why would anybody spend money on things that only exist

become more than just entertainment. These days, what fascinates the gamers are interactions, the possibility of meeting friends from the other side of the world. And the more fancy clothes and the bigger the sword you have, the better chances you have of meeting cool people and winning the game too.

Online games have been available in Thailand for many years, they are popular with both children and adults. According to the owner

of an Internet Cafe in Thalang, the customers who enjoy online games can be divided into two main groups; children aged 7 to 13 and teenagers from 13 to 19 years old. The first group spends around two to three hours playing games, the older kids play for five or more hours a day. 

Life & style Sabah: Journey to the


WHEN I was a child, the word Borneo would conjure up images of colonial explorers in pith

helmets slashing their way through wild jungle teeming with exotic plants, ferocious animals and roaming tribes of headhunters. As I grew older, my mental picture was expanded by David Attenborough's wonderful documentaries, which transported me to this remote island in the darkest heart of exotic Asia, and always left me marveling at the incredible array of plant and animal life it supported.

me a life-long wish to visit Borneo and recently my wish came true. As my plane took off from Kuala Lumpur, I felt a thrilling sense of a silent mist-covered river to a

anticipation and it wasn't long before tantalizing thoughts of orangutans, elusive pygmy elephants, colorful hornbills, unexplored caves and virgin rainforest filled my mind.

In just two and a half hours, we began our descent into Kota Kinabalu, capital of the Malaysian state of Sabah and



spotless and gleaming modern bordered by calm blue ocean. airport, I quickly jumped into an air conditioned taxi which took me to the sprawling grounds of the 384-acre Sutera Harbour Resort, the

As it turns out, it did quite well indeed this massive resort complex contains two 5star hotels with almost 1,000 rooms, a 27hole golf course and country club, a 104berth marina, the luxurious Mandara Spa,

the main entry point for visitors to four world-class restaurants – all Borneo. Disembarking at the set among lush tropical gardens and

I had been invited to Sabah by Tourism Malaysia to attend Tadua Kamataan; traditionally a harvest festival held by the Kadazan-Dusun

people of northern Borneo to appease and respect the spirit of the rice paddy. Nowadays, the festival has become a wider celebration of the cultural diversity of Sabah, where tourists and locals alike can see traditional dances and costumes, music performances, handicrafts, local cuisines and the ever-popular beauty pageants.

But before attending the official celebrations, we were scheduled to

check out some of the many attractions in and around Kota Kinabalu that make Sabah a such an fascinating destination. After a restful night at the hotel and a sumptuous buffet breakfast, our group met in the lobby to be greeted by our guide George. A

Sabahan. A man of Indian descent, George turned out to be a fountain of knowledge about the history, culture and geography of the region, and as we soon found out, never short of a joke either. Soon we were off on a bus to the Mari Mari Cultural Village, tucked away in the tropical jungle covered hills that surround the city.

At first, I was weary that this cultural village might turn out to be a "Disney-fied" tourist trap, but I was pleasantly surprised. The village consists of five

descendants of various tribes in the region. Our guide for the village, along with the other guides who demonstrated traditional skills, dances and costumes, descended from the cultures represented at the village. This lent an authenticity to the tour and our guide was indeed knowledgeable about traditional practices and beliefs and more than happy to answer follow up questions from a curious journalist. The interactive displays of traditional skills included cooking, henna tattooing, cloth and rope making, bamboo fire-starting, rice wine production and blow pipe hunting demonstrations.

But, perhaps the most astonishing part of the tour was the longhouse of the Murut – one of the last tribes to give up their headhunting practices. Under the roof of the 15-meter long bamboo house, is a platform set in the center of the floor, supported by thick, yet flexible tree branches, it is used as a sort of trampoline. In former times, after returning from a raid, the heads of their enemies

would be hung from the roof and the victorious warriors would use the the platform to bounce and leap to snatch their "prize" from the



rafters. The tour was concluded with a lively musical performance, where dancers dressed in very colorful traditional clothing demonstrated the "bamboo dance".

Requiring incredible skill, dancers hop and weave between long shafts of bamboo, which are slid to and fro on the floor and clapped together to create a percussive rhythm for the dance. The tour was a fascinating introduction to the skilled workmanship and complex culture and of Borneo's original inhabitants and I left wanting to learn more about them.

The following day we hopped on a speedboat to explore the Tunku Abdul Rahman Marine Park, comprised of a cluster of islands 20 minutes from Kota

Kinabalu. The five islands of the park are gleaming emeralds dotting the

shallow turquoise water, ringed with white sandy beaches and verdant coral gardens. The denizens of these pristine waters include scorpion fish, blue-spotted rays, cuttlefish, mantis shrimps, the occasional green or hawksbill turtle and between November and February, whale sharks can also be spotted.

Our first stop was Manukan island, where some of our group chose

to relax on the beach while others donned snorkels and dived into the water in search of marine life. For scuba enthusiasts, there are countless dive companies offering a range of dive experiences, giving you the chance to explore the abundant coral reefs and exotic marine creatures that inhabit the serenely beautiful waters.

After our morning on the beach, it was off to nearby Sapi island for lunch; a veritable smorgasbord of fresh crab, calamari, fish, prawns and a choice of many local noodle and rice dishes. All this was finished off with a dessert of Malaysian cakes, sweet sticky rice and fresh tropical fruits. After lunch I went exploring and came across a colossal monitor lizard, grazing for food at a leisurely pace. This behemoth was an astonishing two meters long, but apparently quite docile and didn't seem to be bothered at all by having his photograph taken.

After our peaceful morning at the beach it was time to head back to Kota Kinabalu to attend the official Tadua Kamataan celebrations. As we filled into the

large auditorium, we could see that we would be in for quite a show, as dozens of performers in colorful traditional dress lined the walls to welcome attendees. After everyone was seated the

performances began, some 34 of Sabah's distinct tribal cultures were represented in a medley of traditional song and dance performances, each one more

dazzling then the last. The sheer variety of costume, music and dance styles made it obvious why Sabahan's pride themselves on preserving and sharing the rich cultural heritage. After the show, many guests posed for photos with the charming ladies who took part in the beauty contest, an event which has become an integral part of Tadua Kamataan.

For the final day of our tour we boarded a bus to take us on the two and a half hour journey to the majestic Mount Kinabalu. It is the highest mountain in Southeast Asia, at 4,095

> meters, and the jewel in the crown of the UNESCO World Heritage listed Kinabalu National Park one of the most

bio-diverse ecosystems on the planet. From dense lowland jungle to sparse alpine cloud forests, the National Park encompasses a huge range of habitats. It is worth quoting

some figures here, to give you an idea of the ecological riches to be found inside the park. It has been estimated that a mind-blowing 5,000 to 6,000 plant species can be found here. This includes over 800 species of orchids, 50 of which are endemic to the park; and over 600 species of ferns (more than the whole of Africa's 500 species) of which 50 are found nowhere else.


There are also some 326 bird species and around 100 mammalian species including the famous orangutan.

One of the biggest draw cards to the National Park is the opportunity to climb to the summit of Kinabalu itself. Despite its foreboding size, it is a relatively easy climb and can be achieved by any relatively fit person without the use of specialized

> mountaineering equipment. Although it can be done in a single day, most people take two days, and all climbers must be accompanied by an accredited guide. Climbers trek 6km to Laban Rata on the first day, taking four to five hours, before climbing to the summit early on the following morning. The return trip from Laban Rata to the summit can take anything from six to nine hours. Climbers descend to the park head-quarters that afternoon, which takes three to four hours.

Unfortunately, we did not have time to make the ascent to the summit, and contented ourselves with the spectacular views of the mountain that dominate the landscape. Returning to Kota Kinabalu that evening, the members of our group gathered at one of the dozens of restaurants that crowd along the esplanade

of Kota Kinabalu to reminisce about our trip. There was unanimous agreement that we would have to return to Sabah one day soon. to explore more of the many wonders we did not have a chance to see.

Murray makes tennis history

THE last few heart-pounding strides towards the summit proved the most precarious for Andy Murray as he beat Novak Djokovic to end a 77-year British jinx at Wimbledon on a Sunday that will forever be etched in the nation's sporting history.

The record books will show an almost routine 6-4 7-5 6-4 win for the boy from Dunblane but the three hours nine minutes it took to finish off a slightly below-par Djokovic felt like an eternity.

It was more tortuous than any of the five-set thrillers that Murray has contested in his career – most recently when he came from two sets down to beat Spain's Fernando Verdasco in the quarter-finals to keep the dream alive.

With 15,000 people on a baking Center Court bellowing his name, and millions glued to TV screens around the country, Murray stepped up to serve at 5-4 needing four points to emulate Fred Perry, who won the last of his three titles here in 1936.

Three points later, amid a cacophony of sound that even surpassed the decibel level reached when he won Olympic gold on the same stage last year, it was 40-0.

But this most unpredictable of Wimbledons, a tournament stacked with shocks and unexpected turns, was not about to let Murray achieve British sporting immortality without one final, stomach-churning, twist.

World number one Djokovic, who was ahead in both the second and third sets only to be engulfed by a tide of patriotic fervor, saved all three and then had a point to make it 5-5 after dribbling a drop volley off the

Had he done so, the statue of Perry perched in the grounds of the All England Club might still be casting a shadow over British tennis but Murray, whose broad shoulders have carried home hopes for nearly a decade, would not stumble.

With his pulse racing and nerves on fire he conjured up a fourth matchpoint and this time Djokovic succumbed, netting a backhand to spark cheers from Land's End to John O'Groats.

"It's the hardest few points I've had to play in my life," said a dazed Murray.

"In that last game my head was everywhere. That last game will be the toughest game I'll play in my career, ever."

Twelve months ago Murray's Wimbledon dream was crushed by Roger Federer on the same stage – yet that tear-jerking defeat proved to be a watershed for the obstinate 26-year-old.

A few weeks later he claimed the Olympic gold medal before beating Djokovic to win the US Open and his first grand slam title after four times falling at the final hurdle.

Despite those milestones, Murray knew that becoming the first British man to win

Wimbledon in shorts would ultimately define his career.

"For the last four or five years, it's been very, very tough, very stressful, a lot of pressure," said Murray, the only British man to reach the second round this year.

"I felt a little bit better this year than I did last year. But it's not easy. I think now it will become easier. I hope it will."

When Perry thrashed Germany's Gotfried von Cramm 6-1 6-1 6-0 in 1936 the same year the BBC made the world's first television broadcast and Jesse Owens won four Olympic golds in pre-war Berlin, it proved to be his swansong.

Approaching his athletic peak and with age and injuries catching up with 17-times grand slam champion Roger Federer and Rafa Nadal, Murray could have several more memorable Sundays on Center Court in the next few years.

"The bottom line is that he was a better player in decisive moments," said Djokovic who still leads Murray11-8 in their career head-to-head.

"He played fantastic tennis, no question about it. He deserved to win."

In the women's singles final, Marion Bartoli defeated Sabine Lisicki 6-1 6-4. Lisicki was outplayed for most of the match by her French opponent, who won her first major title in her 47th Grand Slam apperance.

A pride of Lions

THE Australian team had the momentum. History was on their side. They had home advantage. Robbie Deans had kept faith with a winning combination. And yet.... In an astonishing resurgence at Sydney's venerable Olympic stadium, the Lions annihilated the Wallabies, running up a massive 41 points – a record – and scoring four tries, three of them in a hectic period of 12 minutes in the second half. Final score: 41-16. Game, set and match to the British and Irish side.

The build-up had been dominated by Warren Gatland's decision to drop talisman Brian O' Driscoll, one of the true greats of the modern game. He had already lost both captain Warburton and and vice-captain O'Connell to injury, and O'Driscoll had been widely expected to lead the side. Furthermore, in a selection construed by some pundits as biased, the coach had dropped six players, picked ten Welshmen in the starting line-up and five Englishmen on the bench. In the event, his bold and much criticized decision, was amply vindicated by events on the field. Before the game, he had declared; "I can put my hand on my heart and say it was the right rugby decision." Prescient indeed.

The game was only a minute or so old when rejuvenated Alex Corbisiero, brought in to bolster the scrum at loose head, smashed over from close in. The dominant Lions scrum, which did not lose their own ball throughout, were awarded two free kicks and three penalties by referee Romain Poite, spot kicks converted by Leigh Halfpenny. For a while, the home side were

in disarray. But just before half-time, the Wallabies found some rhythm and were rewarded with a try, as Sexton missed a tackle on O'Connor. Early in the second half it suddenly became 19-16, after Leali'ifano had slotted two penalties.

Having surrendered a 16 point advantage, the Lions might have been forgiven for losing heart; instead they proceeded to up the tempo and scored thrice in an extraordinary 12 minute spell. After sustained pressure, Sexton and Bowe sent Davies through; Halfpenny's short inside pass to Sexton saw the Irishman atone by scoring. Then Halfpenny, exploiting a perceived defensive weakness on the left flank, stepped inside Genia and Tomane, to send North over. Finally, Murray found Jamie Roberts who bullocked over unchallenged. By now, Gatland had sent on all his substitutes. They certainly did him proud, keeping the Wallabies scoreless in the latter stages while the mayhem continued at the other end.

Man of the series, Leigh Halfpenny, justified all the superlatives heaped on him. A model of consistency both under the high ball and as a goal-kicker (39 out of 44 successful kicks on tour), he also showed his value as a deceptive runner in this match. The entire pack was remorseless with the back row more than matching the Australians at the breakdown and the front row entirely dominant. Alex Corbisiero, showed how much he had been missed, by giving Wallabies tight head Alexander such a torrid time that he was yellow carded and then replaced. Corbisiero was nominated by Gatland as his personal man of the match.

Alun-Wyn Jones, the stand-in Lions captain, was tireless, carrying more ball than anyone.

If it was not an occasion for an expansive game, at least the backs showed that they could grasp what opportunities came their way. Twenty-one-year-old George North, already a menacing figure, and the star three quarter of the series, will only get better. As Gatland said: "These guys have done themselves and that jersey proud." Some understatement.

FOUR Bayern Munich players – Thomas Mueller, Franck Ribery, Arjen Robben and Bastian Schweinsteiger – were named on a 10-man shortlist for the 2012/ 13 UEFA Best Player in Europe award on Tuesday.

Unlike last year, when the final three contenders came from Barcelona or Real Madrid, only two of the 10 were drawn from the Spanish clubs – Barca's 2011 winner Lionel Messi and Real's Cristiano Ronaldo.

Tottenham Hotspur's Gareth Bale was the only British player nominated, with the Premier League also represented by Manchester United's Robin van

Robert Lewandowski, whose Borussia Dortmund side lost out to Bayern in the Champions

League final at London's Wembley Stadium, was named as was Paris Saint-Germain's Zlatan Ibrahimovic.

The award, voted for by a jury of journalists from each of UEFA's member associations, was established in 2011 and was won last year by Barcelona midfielder Andres Iniesta.

The top 10 players will be whittled down to three candidates in a second vote, with the ultimate winner decided in a live poll on August 29 during the Champions League group stage draw in Monaco.

UEFA said in a statement that it had also launched a Best Women's Player in Europe award, with the first winner to be unveiled on September 5.

Pitlane clampdown enforced

FORMULA One's governing body ordered an immediate clampdown on access to the pitlane on Tuesday after a television cameraman was struck and injured by a bouncing wheel at last weekend's German Grand Prix.

The International Automobile Federation (FIA) said in a statement that only authorized team personnel and event marshals would be allowed to work in the pitlane during qualifying sessions and the race.

"Access for approved media will be confined to the pit wall," it

British cameraman Paul Allen suffered a broken collarbone and fractured ribs in the incident when Australian Mark Webber pulled away from the Red Bull pits without the car's rear right wheel being properly attached.

The wheel, weighing some 10 kg, then flew off and bounced down the pitlane, missing Mercedes mechanics before hitting Allen on the back.

The cameraman was flown to hospital where he is expected to make a full recovery.

The incident triggered a fresh focus on Formula One safety after a spate of tyre explosions during the previous British Grand Prix saw debris thrown up in the path of drivers, who arrived in Germany threatening a boycott.

The governing body said FIA president Jean Todt, a former Ferrari team principal, had demanded immediate changes to the sporting regulations in order to reduce the risk of similar pitlane accidents.

"The FIA today informed teams that the approval of the World Motor Sport Council (WMSC) will immediately be sought for two changes to the Sporting Regulations. Both of these changes have already been approved for 2014," it

The first change requires all team personnel working on a car during a pitstop to wear head protection, already a common practice for mechanics.

The second will reduce the pit lne speed limit during races from 100kph to 80kph, with the exception of Melbourne, Monaco and Singapore where due to track configuration the limit is 60kph.

The FIA said they were expecting champions Red Bull to submit a written report about the Nuerburgring incident on Wednesday. The report will be shared with the other 10 teams to help improve - Reuters pit lane safety.

To be played out at Surakul Stadium, kickoff will be 5pm, and admission will be free, as only 40 minutes remains on the clock. In


