MAN CONFESSES TO RAPING STEPDAUGHTER FOR YEARS

Mum discovers that husband had been raping her teen daughter since she was 5 years old

A PHUKET man arrested at a construction camp in Thalang last week has confessed to repeatedly raping his 13-year-old stepdaughter since she was 5 years old.

The man, now being detained at Phuket Prison, was promptly arrested after the girl's mother reported the horrific discovery she made after coming home from work early on July 18.

"The mother said she came home and noticed that the door and all the windows of her house were closed. She thought it was odd," said Lt Thani Petchswee of the Thalang Police.

'She looked in one of the windows and saw her daughter running out of her and her husband's bedroom looking scared. The girl went into the bathroom and stayed there for hours," Lt Thani

'The mother questioned her, and the girl revealed that her stepfather had been raping her for years," he added.

The mother told police that her husband had raped her daughter while she was out of the house working.

"He told the girl that if she told anyone, he would kill her," Lt Thani said.

On receiving the complaint, officers went immediately to a construction workers' camp in Thalang to arrest the stepfather.

The girl was taken to Vachira Phuket Hospital, where doctors confirmed she had been raped.

When confronted by police, the stepfather confessed to raping his stepdaughter repeatedly over the past eight years.

"He has been charged with raping a child," Lt Thani confirmed.

"The suspect is being detained at Phuket Prison," said Thalang Police Deputy Superintendent Amnuay Kraiwutthianun.

"Police are working on collecting evidence and questioning more witnesses. We expect to pass the case to the public prosecutor within a month," Lt Col Amnuay said.

Rohingya men escape overcrowded facility

DETENTION cells strained beyond capacity with Rohingya refugees at Phang Nga Immigration have been blamed for the escape of 11 Rohingya men on

More than 300 Rohingya men are being detained in large caged rooms at the center, originally built to accommodate 250 inmates, Immigration Police Lt Col Neti Khanboon explained.

"At about 3am, the men broke through the wire mesh covering a window in the men's toilet. They climbed over the wall at the back of the center and ran off. We believe they ran in separate directions," Col Neti said.

Phang Nga Town Police have been notified of the escape, and are now searching for the men.

"They are related to each other," Col Neti said.

"We believe someone on the outside assisted their escape. We will track down those people too," he added.

Overcrowding at the center has become a serious issue, Col Neti said.

"The number of refugees has been going up over the last eight months we've been detaining



them," he said. "We provide them food and facilities to make them comfortable, but they are not allowed to go outside."

Thailand has come under increasing criticism for its handling of the thousands of Rohingya fleeing violent unrest in their strife-torn home state Rakhine.

Often falling into the hands of

human traffickers, the refugees face slavery and extortion.

A Phang Nga policeman recently became the first Royal Thai Police officer ever to be charged with human trafficking, while police continue to investigate the officer's role in the alleged abduction and repeated rape of a Rohingya woman.

Tourist ignores warnings, flags drowns on sunny day in Karon

RUSSIAN Dmitry Onishchenko, 32, ignored lifeguards' warnings and entered the surf at Karon Beach Monday afternoon - and drowned within five minutes.

Uten Singsom, head of the Kata-Karon Lifeguard Club, said that his lifeguards took 20 minutes to recover the man from the strong surf.

"He came to the beach alone at about 4pm and ignored the red flags posted," said Mr Uten.

"Lifeguards warned him not to swim there as it was exactly where we posted the red warning flags,"

The man was spotted having difficulty less than five minutes later, as a rip current pulled him

away from shore while he was pummeled by strong waves.

"It was too late by the time we got him back to shore," Mr Uten said.

Dozens of foreign business owners suspected of using Thai nominees

THE Phuket Business Development Office (BDO) has identified 82 businesses suspected of breaching the Foreign Business Act (FBA) by using Thais as nominees so that foreigners can hold majority control.

The businesses were identified ahead of raids by the Department of Special Investigation (DSI) set for this week, targeting illegal foreign businesses in Phuket.

"After checking our records, we identified 75 suspects running the 82 businesses we believe are using Thai nominees," Phuket BDO Chief Nimit Kangkajit said.

All businesses in Thailand must have a physical address to legally operate.

"I would like to see the DSI make some progress in enforcing the law concerning Thai nominees," Phuket Tourist Association Vice President Bhuritt Maswongsa said.

"Foreign tourism entrepreneurs see the benefit of these crackdowns, as it supports those who operate legitimately," he said.

The number of businesses registered in Phuket from January 1,

Sex traffickers arrested

12 Burmese sex slaves liberated, three suspects caught in police raids

RAIDS by law enforcement officials rescued 12 Burmese women from forced prostitution in Phang Nga and Phuket on July 10.

Three suspects were taken into custody for sex trafficking during the raids, and arrest warrants were issued for two others believed to be part of a human trafficking gang.

Agents from the Department of Special Investigation (DSI) were tipped off by the Myanmar Association in Thailand about two businesses which were offering sex services to their customers.

In Phang Nga, eight women were liberated when twenty officers from the DSI, Kuraburi police and Phang Nga Social Development and Human Security office raided the Baifern Restaurant in Kuraburi, located near a fish processing factory.

"We believe their customers were mostly Burmese fisherman," Kuraburi District Police Superintendent Weerasil Kwanseng said.

"We arrested one suspect and issued arrest warrants for two others who are still at large," he added.

The women, all between the

ages of 16 and 29, told police that they were forced to have sex with customers every day and were beaten if they refused to work.

The women's cell phones and passports had been seized by the business owner, and they were never paid the 150 baht per customer they were promised, as the

owner kept their salary to repay the debt he incurred for bringing them from Myanmar, the women said.

"Six of the women are now at the Phang Nga shelter and two have gone back to Myanmar," Col Weerasil said.

After the raid in Kuraburi, the DSI agents travelled to Phuket,

where along with Phuket City Police, they rescued an additional four women who had been brought from Myanmar by the same trafficking gang.

Two suspects were arrested in that raid.

Swede murder trial postponed

THE trial of Swede Tommy Soderlund, charged along with fellow countryman Johan Ljung for a murder in Phuket in 2011, did not progress on July 20, as witnesses failed to appear in court.

Mr Soderlund and Mr Ljung are accused of stabbing to death Maksim Schantz and then stealing a motorbike in order to escape the scene. Mr Soderlund admits to stealing the motorbike, but denies the murder charge.

Police officers brought Mr Soderlund, looking tired, into the Phuket Provincial Court House at 10:30am

Expected in court were the housekeeper of the building where the murder took place, the man whose motorbike was stolen and neighbors of the murder victim.

When witnesses did not appear, the judge gave a final date of August 9 for hearing their testimony and ended the session.

Officials skip historic bus launch

THE long-awaited Phuket airportto-beach bus hit the road at 9:30am on July 19 with little fanfare.

Passengers on the inaugural ride from Phuket International Airport to Patong included media, tourists and relatives of bus operator Prakob Panyawai. No Phuket officials were along for the ride.

Married couple Ben and Kim, first-time visitors from England, had just arrived from Kuala Lumpur and were headed to Kata.

"We just found out about the bus. We were getting in a bus to Phuket Town, then heard we could go directly to Patong," said Ben.

The couple was surprised to learn that a taxi ride to Patong could have cost them 1,000 baht.

"It's very good to have this bus; 120 baht is very cheap and the bus is very good," said Ben.

"Our destination is Kata beach. It's great that the bus is taking us closer to Kata instead of to Phuket Town," Ben added.

The bus operator's mother, Somjit Panyawai, 70, and aunt, Jongkol Panyawai, 73, were also along for the ride to Patong.

"I'm very happy the bus has finally been launched," Mrs Jongkol said.

"We wanted to go all the way to Kata-Karon but local people wouldn't allow us," she lamented. Mr Prakob said, "We planned to have a big celebration at the airport for the first bus, but changed our minds after talking to officials."

"The bus is still a sensitive topic, so we are giving it a simple launch, without officials," he said.

Fetus washes up on Saphan Hin park shoreline

A FETUS that police believe was dumped at sea washed ashore at Saphan Hin on July 19.

Police and rescue workers responded to a 10:30pm call and found a crowd surrounding the body at the tip of Saphan Hin park in Phuket Town. Police believe the fetus had been about six months old, and had been dead for about two days.

"Because it was dumped in the sea, we assume the mother had an illegal abortion," said Phuket City Police Capt Rachan Phunwai.

Drug dealing duo netted at Phuket checkpoint

POLICE busted two *ya bah* (methamphetamine) dealers at a police checkpoint on Chao Fa East Road on July 19.

The two men, Apichart Karaket, 26, and Surasak Tunyaudon, 22, confessed to police that they were paid about 3,500 baht to transfer the drugs from a dealer's house in Thalang to another dealer's house, Wichit Police Superintendent Chawalit Phetsipear said.

Both men were charged with possession of a Category 1 Drug with intent to sell.

Russian sells spa products to cop

A RUSSIAN was arrested by Immigration Police in Patong on July 17 after he was caught attempting to sell spa products to a plainclothes officer.

Immigration officers arrested Russian national Alexander Pushkarer, 22, at a shop on the Patong beach road at about 7pm.

Once Mr Pushkarer presented himself as a staffer at the store, the plainclothes cop arrested him.

"He admitted he did not have a work permit," Angkarn Yasanop of Phuket Immigration said.

Mr Pushkarer was taken to Patong Police Station and subsequently charged with working without a work permit.





Construction starts for new Region 8 Police headquarters

A GROUNDBREAKING ceremony was held on July 18 to mark the construction of the new Region 8 Police headquarters, as plans go forward to move the office from Surat Thani to its new location opposite the Tah Chat Chai checkpoint in Phuket.

The construction for the new building, expected to cost about 84 million baht, started on June 3 and is slated to be finished 555 days later on December 9, 2014.

"We chose Phuket for the new office because the province generates the highest amount of revenue from tourism in Thailand, and we want to ensure the safety and confidence of all visitors and local residents," Police Region 8 Commander Yongyuth Charoenvanit told the *Gazette*.

"The current headquarters in Surat Thani are very crowded. The new facility will be much bigger and more comfortable for our officers, and will improve our efficiency," Lt Gen Yongyuth said.

The facilities will include a Scientific Crime Detection Center, a National Training Center, an of-

ficer ward and accommodation for officers.

The new headquarters at the 150-rai site have been nearly a decade in coming, with the original budget slated at 170 million baht.

The Region 8 Police are responsible for adminstration of police affairs in seven southern provinces: Surat Thani, Chumphon, Phang Nga, Phuket, Krabi, Ranong and Nakhon Sri Thammarat.

Anatomy

DEPARTMENT of Special Investigation (DSI) officers arrived in Phuket this week to crack down on illegal taxi drivers still operating at the airport. The move follows allegations of mafia operating on the island and illegal taxi drivers overcharging tourists.

Here, the *Phuket Gazette* investigates what it takes to become a Phuket taxi driver.

THERE are currently 2,110 taxis legally registered to operate in Phuket; 129 of those are metered taxis. However, almost 1,000 more drivers continue to work illegally on the island, gleaning profit from or outright gouging freshly arrived tourists.

During the crackdown earlier this year, the Phuket Land Transport Office (PLTO) identified 2,882 illegal taxis in Phuket. The crackdown inspired a further 1,981 taxi drivers to apply to have their vehicles registered.

"The PLTO is currently pro-

cessing those applications," explained PLTO officer Jaturong Kaewkasi.

However, that means at least 900 taxi drivers are operating in Phuket who have made no attempt to become legal.

"This is despite us granting them amnesty and helping them by negotiating with finance companies, banks and insurance com-

panies to reduce the costs of re-registering their vehicles as private taxis in order to become legal drivers," Mr Jaturong said.

Although the amnesty ended on April 30, drivers can still apply to register their vehicles as taxis and apply for their taxi drivers' licenses, he added.

Along with the carrot came the stick. On May 1, police and PLTO officers were called on to fine all drivers caught for "illegally operating a vehicle as a taxi". The fine levied was the flat maximum 2,000 baht for each infringement.

The enforcement enjoyed limited success. Phuket Provincial Police confirmed to the *Gazette* that across the island 170 drivers were each fined 2,000 baht in April for not applying to register their vehicles as taxis, while their counterparts who were still illegally operating taxis but who had applied to become legal were let free.

A further 246 drivers were fined in May, and another 224 in June.

Statistics for July were not available at time of going to print.

However, the penalty is no stiffer for repeat offenders. "We do not have stronger penalties for drivers who repeatedly break the law. So far, the fine is 2,000 baht every time they are caught," Mr Jaturong said.

THE CARS

Regardless of whether a taxi is fitted with a meter or not, the engine size must not be less than 1600cc. "It doesn't matter which make or model of car it is, and there is no restriction on the maximum size

of the engine," Mr Jaturong explained.

The vehicle cannot be more than two years old at the time it is registered as a taxi, and cannot be used as a taxi after the vehicle turns nine years old from the date the car was first registered, he added.

Further more, there is no such thing as an independent taxi driver in Phuket. The

car must be registered as working for a legally registered organization.

"This is a nationwide regulation so that the driver of each taxi can be identified and reached in case he does something wrong," Mr Jaturong explained.

"The person registering the taxi must provide evidence they work for a formal organization. They can provide a signed agreement proving they work as part of a taxi co-operative or an employment contract showing they work for a tourism business, such as a tour kiosk, or for some other form of legal entity," he added.

Regardless, so-called "taxi groups" are not held accountable for their members' actions, even if their members consistently break the law.

"If their drivers are involved in a crime, charges will be pressed against the driver, not the group," Mr Jaturong said.

"If there are complaints against

a driver, the group will resolve the issue themselves. They have their own rules to punish drivers, such as suspending the drivers from work. The number of days' suspension – and hence lost income – will depend on what the drivers have done wrong," he assured.

THE DRIVERS

In order to carry passengers in a taxi, drivers must be Thai nationals, as ferrying passengers is a job prohibited to foreigners under the Alien Workers Act.

They must hold a commercial driver's license, be at least 22 years old and hold a valid standard driver's license issued for five years.

Applicants must provide a medical certificate affirming they are free from leprosy, tuberculosis, elephantiasis, drug addiction and alcoholism.

And they must pass a test which takes place over a two-day period at the PLTO, during which applicants receive training in traffic law, basic English language, polite mannerisms and common courtesy, Mr Konlayut said.


They also undergo an eyesight and reflex test.

As part of the process, police conduct a background check.

"Any applicants found to have served jail time for any crime will be rejected," Mr Konlayut assured.

"However, repeat offenders even for traffic offenses such as reckless driving will be issued a license to drive a taxi in Phuket as long as they have not served a day in prison," he added.

Once issued their license, on its large yellow card, the drivers must have it on display at all times while driving the taxi.



THE INSURANCE

Every vehicle being registered as a taxi must first have at least basic commercial insurance coverage, as stipulated by the national Office of Insurance Commission, before the PLTO will process its application.

The high cost of commercial insurance has been an ongoing point of dispute among many illegal taxi drivers in Phuket, who claim they cannot afford the rates.

To make insurance coverage more affordable, the PLTO directly engaged in negotiations with finance companies, banks and insurance companies on behalf of the drivers. The result, after months of talks, was base policies starting at about 30,000 baht per annum.

"We know it can be expensive, but we have done the best we can – and this is a mandatory requirement for a vehicle to be registered as a taxi," Mr Jaturong confirmed.

Yet Patong Police Traffic Inspector Ekkarat Plaiduang confirmed to the *Gazette* that his officers would not pursue charges against any driver found driving without the required insurance.

"Instead, we will report it to the insurance company and let them decide whether they want to file a complaint,' Maj Ekkarat explained.

"If they do, we will charge not the driver, but the owner of the car with providing false information on an official document. The penalty for that is a fine of up to 60,000 baht or up to three years in prison, or both," he said. Maj Ekkarat did not elaborate on what action police would take in case of passengers, including tourists, are injured in an accident involving a taxi with inadequate insurance coverage.

THE AIRPORT

The ultimate goal of nearly every taxi driver on the island is to serve Phuket International Airport, which Chanchai Doungjit, chief of the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) Phuket office, last month reported was the primary tourist gateway on an island that attracts about 11 million visitors per year.

Tourists pump an estimated 200 billion baht into the local economy, said Mr Chanchai. The consequence is that, for many taxi

drivers in Phuket, the airport represents an easy avenue to cold hard cash.

To legally serve the airport, however, drivers must work for one of the taxi co-operatives that have signed concessions with the facility's operator, Airports of Thailand (AoT).

Prakob Panyawai, managing director of Phuket Airport Limousine and Business Cooperative Ltd (PBC), explained that all cars serving the airport must be of a higher standard than regular taxis and the drivers must adhere to a dress and behavior code.

And drivers must pay the concession holders they work for, who in turn pay AoT. Which concession they work for can affect their monthly take-home pay.

For example, Phuket Mai Khao Co, which operates 175 taxis and vans at the airport, must pay AoT 1.3 million baht a month – requiring each driver to pay nearly 7,500 baht each month in dues. PBC, which operates 271 vehicles at the airport, owes AoT 1.6mn baht a month – requiring each driver to pay about 5,900 baht a month.

Mr Prakob maintains that his drivers take home between 15,000 to 20,000 baht per month.

"They have to make payments on their own cars or pay a rental fee to use one of our fleet cars. Drivers who have only recently joined us also have to pay a 10,000 baht deposit against possible damage to the car they are driving," he added.

"But the harder they work, the more they earn, and the more they get to take home," he said.

PHUKET officials were ordered to take action last week against a restaurant found to be illegally built and encroaching on the beach south of Patong.

Acting on a complaint received on June 27, Phuket Vice Governor Somkiet Sangkaosuttirak led officers from the Damrongtham Center, Phuket Marine Office and Phuket Land Office to investigate on July 16.

"We determined that the Tri Trang restaurant had been built on public land and was encroaching on the beach area," Mr Prapan said.

It has been open and serving customers for about two years, but has no land title, explained Mr Prapan.

"We did not find the owner or manager of the restaurant. There were only staffers present when we visited," he said.

The Patong Municipality had asked police last year to prosecute the owner of the restaurant for illegal construction. That case is still under investigation, said Mr Prapan.

"We will ask the police to prosecute the owner for the beach encroachment," Phuket Marine Office Chief Phuripat Theerakulpisut said.

Illegally placed restaurant will Vandalized beach mangrove forest given a second chance

IN A joint effort to repair the work of vandals, Phuket Vice Governor Sommai Prijasilpa led 200 volunteers in planting mangrove saplings in the Klong Mudong area of Chalong on July 17.

Some of the 24,000 mangrove saplings planted in the area last May in honor of HM Queen Sirikit were destroyed on the night of July 11 by a group that also destroyed a sign honoring her majesty, said Chief of the Natural Resources and Environment Office Kasem Sukwaree.

"We have no suspects at the moment," said Capt Kraisorn Boonprasop of the Chalong police.

An officer of the Natural Resources and Environment Office noted that the mangroves planted in May on the beach would have caused landowners in the area to lose use of the beach.

Governor: no foreign mafia problem

PHUKET Governor Maitri Inthusut denied Tourism and Sports Minister Somsak Pureesrisak's allegations that foreign mafias are operating in Phuket.

The complaint about foreign mafia presence in Phuket was filed by Tourism and Sports Minister Somsak Pureesrisak to the DSI headquarters in Bangkok on July

"Phuket does not have any foreign mafia - just some groups of foreigners who are trying to benefit from the tourism industry. However, many of them have already been arrested," Gov Maitri said. (see page 3)

In a meeting at Phuket Provincial Hall on July 19, the governor gathered all relevant organizations to prepare the necessary documentation for DSI officers who are expected to tackle illegal foreign businesses using Thai nominees, illegal airport taxi drivers and foreign mafia presence.

The DSI officers will be on the island on July 25 and 26.

During their crackdown in Phuket, the governor said he would request the DSI distribute a 251-million-baht budget for more CCTV cameras on the island as a way to increase the safety measures taken to protect locals and tourists.


"Right now, Phuket has 1,419 CCTV cameras. We would like to ask the DSI for 251 million baht so we can set up an additional 2,550 cameras across the island," he said.

Dozing driver causes traffic jam

A MAN caused a huge tailback on a major road in Pattaya last week after falling asleep at the wheel of

It took passersby and police officers an hour to wake the dozing driver, who clung to his unconscious state for so long that officers began to suspect he was dead.

Police called to the scene at 5:30am on July 19 found a Jeep parked at the traffic lights at the start of Central Pattaya Road with its engine and lights on. The hand brake was set, and the vehicle wouldn't move when pushed.

Inside was a Thai man aged 30-35 fast asleep in the driver's seat, unaware of the danger he was causing.

As traffic piled up behind the Jeep, drivers had to brake suddenly to avoid crashing into other

Officers shouted at the driver to try to wake him, but he didn't budge. They also tried banging on the vehicle, shaking it, blowing whistles and honking horns, to no avail.

After an hour, the police decided to break into the vehicle, prising open one of the windows and waking the man up.

They gave him a cold towel and some water and he drove straight off before officers even investigated why he had fallen asleep at the wheel. - Pattaya One July 27 - August 2, 2013 PHUKET GAZETTE 7

Gov Maitri gets aboard the bus, predicts no taxi push back

PHUKET Governor Maitri Inthusut rode the new airport bus to Patong on Tuesday, four days after its inaugural run.

"The condition of the bus was good, and it was clean and safe. The staff were good too," Gov Maitri said.

"One thing it needs is more publicity. I don't think many people know it exists," he said.

The governor did not foresee problems with taxi drivers, despite previous vehement protests against the new service.

"I don't think local taxis will protest it, because they aren't competing for the same customers... People who prefer limousines will still use them, as will people with a lot of luggage," Gov Maitri said.

"Bus passengers are most likely to be backpackers and local people," he added.

"The bus is only 120 baht from the airport to Patong. It is a good deal for people who cannot afford a taxi. I believe taxi drivers understand there needs to be this option.

"It is a fundamental public service," he said.

Firework blast puts teacher in hospital

A BEACH party in Cape Panwa took a horrific turn after an English teacher went to light a 49-mortar firework on July 13. Immediately after the fuse was lit, the mostly buried firework exploded, sending one of its rounds directly into the face of Danyel Erickson, 31, while the rest shot off in every direction.

Ms Erickson, an American, bought the firework secondhand. She planned to set it off to celebrate the 4th of July, but decided against igniting it in her neighborhood. It was instead brought out on July 13 in celebration of a friend's birthday.

"Just as it got dark, we dug this hole and put this massive box [the firework] in there. I think there were four of us standing around it. It was starting to rain, so we had cardboard up just to cover it," Ms Erickson said.

Two fuses trailed from the 80cm-square firework: one short and black, the other long and green.

Hunched over, leaning toward but not over the firework, Ms Erickson lit the green fuse, she said. She believes that the two fuses, close together, both caught on fire.

"As soon as the fuse ignited, it went so fast you couldn't even see that it was starting... all of a sudden the whole box was glowing. It started exploding out of the side, out of the top, everywhere all at once. It was pretty much like a bomb," Ms Erickson said.

One mortar hit one of her friends

since undergone surgery.

Another mortar hit Ms Erickson directly above her left eye, blinding her.

"It hit me in the face, and I didn't really realize it at first... I dropped to the ground and military-crawled off the beach because they were just coming out everywhere," she said. "I thought I was in a war, military-crawling in the sand while I was blind."

"I could feel the wet blood coming down my face - everyone started gasping," she said.

Friends rushed Ms Erickson to the Phuket International Hospital. left eye; corneal abrasions in the right eye; foreign bodies in both eyes; a large skin laceration front left side; lacerated wounds on her forehead, eyebrow and left eye.

Ms Erickson has undergone serious plastic surgery, but will always have a scar from the incident. There are still pieces of dirt and debris lodged in her face that will require laser surgery, she said.

Three days after the event, still with lots of debris in her eyes, Ms

Erickson was starting to see again with her vision improving to 50/20 and 80/20.

Since then, her vision has improved greatly, but will never return to the same clarity she once had.

"My thought was that I was going to be blind. That was my

first scare – to be blind in a foreign country and not know where you are going or how to get there."

Ms Erickson arrived in Phuket from Seattle in April to complete a TEFL course. She had just begun her career as an English-language teacher in May.

She bought the firework from a woman who had fired off four of them at a children's birthday party.

"If they lit the one that blew my face up, it could have killed children. It could have been a lot worse, astronomically worse," she said.

"This is something people do here all the time... They sell [fireworks] on the beach, at clubs everywhere," she said.

"We were drinking that day, but I honestly wasn't intoxicated. I did this sober, which doesn't really say that much for me," she said with a laugh. "I did it with a conscious, sober mind. I lit this giant, dangerous bomb off."

Instead of buying fireworks on the street, go to an actual pyrotechnic show, Ms Erickson urged.

Phuket Provincial Health Office (PPHO) Director Bancha Kakong echoed her advice.

"Salesmen should not be selling fireworks to adults who are not professionals," Dr Bancha said.

The caution over the use of fire-

works stems from the number of injuries sustained during festivals where fireworks are prevalent, such as Chinese New Year and the Vegetarian Festival.

"A total of 43 people were injured from fireworks during the Vegetarian Festival last year,"

According to the Firearms Act of BE 2490, fireworks are considered weapons.

"Firework users must obtain permission before lighting them, even if they are being used on private property. However, there are no restrictions on buying fireworks," explained Kathu District Chief Veera Kerdsirimongkol.

"In Phuket, it is hard to control the use of fireworks because of traditions, so we have to compromise," Mr Veera said.

Despite the need to compromise, Mr Veera reiterated the importance of safety and obtaining proper permission before using these potentially harmful forms of entertainment.

Charging past the red

Sunshine a 'danger factor' leading swimmers to ignore warning flags

A PROPOSAL to post "Double Red Flag Rip Current" warnings at Phuket beaches gained momentum on July 21 after a fit Russian tourist ignored a red warning flag and was caught in a flash rip, leading to a daring and dangerous rescue by members of the Surin-Bangtao Surf Lifesaving Club.

The incident prompted lifeguards to issue a flash rip warning at all west and south facing beaches along Phuket's west coast.

Lifeguards were on patrol only 150 meters away as the unsuspecting swimmer ignored the red flags and warning signs on Surin Beach and headed for deeper water, one lifeguard explained.

"As soon as he entered the water, two surf rescue lifeguards were on their way to warn him. But by the time they arrived, it was already too late. The intended warning had become a serious rescue situation," he said.

The Russian man had jumped directly into a flash rip current, which is a hidden "river" of water flowing swiftly out to sea. Often these rip currents are present where the waves are smaller, and to the untrained eye this may look like a good place to enter the water.

Onlookers watched as the two experienced lifeguards reached the victim, and began to tow him to shore. All three were pounded by heavy surf for nearly six minutes as they made their way back to safety.

"The outgoing tide bumped the existing rip current up to incred-

ible strength and speed. The escape area to tow the victim to shore was very narrow, if we missed it there was another rip on the other side which was pulling through exposed rocks. It was a very dangerous situation. It could have taken us all," said one of the lifeguards who carried out the difficult rescue.

Phuket's lifeguards and ocean safety experts are beginning to understand more clearly how, and when, beach swimming conditions are most severe and likely to result in tragedy. (see page 2) Entering the ocean in the wrong spot during this time of year will almost certainly result in trouble for all except expert surfers and lifeguards.

"My idea is to identify when all the danger factors co-exist, and issue a 'Double Red Flag Rip Current' warning, in the hope that people will take the danger more seriously," said the lifeguard.

"The flags will have international symbols for 'No Swimming' and 'Rip Current' clearly visible. If we can clearly mark the rip current areas and keep swimmers from going there, we can save lives, maybe even our own," the rescuing lifeguard said.

The lifeguard explained that the main danger factors that create killer rips are:

• High tidal variations of over 2.4

meters, which usually occur in the two days on either side of a full moon

- Surf one meter and above with high wave frequency
- Persistent southwest monsoon winds above 20km/hr
- Sunny, fair weather


"If the first three exist, but the weather is raining and stormy, most tourists avoid the beach, and we are usually spared," explained the lifeguard. "But if the weather is sunny, we know there will be swimmers trying to enter the water. If they enter near the rip, it is almost certain they will be in trouble right away."

Another factor is that the "low" season of yesteryear, when few people entered the water, is now the "green" season. During this time of year the number of beachgoers and swimmers has markedly increased along with record numbers of tourist arrivals on Phuket.

"All beach hotels large and small, as well as the media, should be warning their customers of the severe danger which we predict will last until July 24, and then begin to ease. Many hotels have an 'in-house' television channel which would be perfect for displaying the warning," said the lifeguard.

"If everyone does not take this seriously, I fear more lives may be threatened or lost over the next five days," he added on Monday.

The warning applies to all west and south facing beaches on Phuket, and especially Layan, Bang Tao, Surin, Laem Sing, Karon, Kata and Kata Noi beaches.

Bus crash kills 19 in Saraburi

FORENSIC experts are working to identify victims whose bodies were burnt beyond recognition after 19 died in a horrific tour bus crash in Saraburi on Tuesday.

The Roi Et-Bangkok bus, operated by Transport Co Ltd, was travelling on Mittraphap Road - the main route to the Northeast when it was hit by a trailer-truck going the opposite direction, which ran across a safety island and crashed into it. The impact caused the two-level bus to catch fire, The Nation reported.

Most of 19 killed in the bus were trapped when the bus burst into flames; 20 passengers were injured.

"Preliminary investigation suggests the driver of the trailer-truck fell asleep behind the wheel," Lt Assavathep Jantanaree of the Kaeng Khoi Police said.

Truck driver Sa-ard Boonyang, 29, survived the accident and is being treated at hospital.

At press time, officials had identified only six of the dead.

Mr Chadchart said the GPS record showed that the bus was travelling at a speed of 78 kilometers an hour at the time of the accident.

"That's not very fast," he said. While he did not think the crash occurred because of any fault of the bus firm, he said he would meet with the company's top executive to discuss safety measures.

Transport Co Ltd is a state enterprise under the supervision of the Transport Ministry.

"We will discuss additional safety measures. Perhaps we can improve the design of emergencyexit doors or provide safety briefings to passengers the way flight attendants do once they get on an aircraft," the minister said.

Amnesty on front burner, bill set to turn up the heat

A PROPOSED amnesty for people charged in relation to Thailand's almost decade-long political crisis is set to be the biggest political issue of coming months, with some observers warning it could set the stage for a fresh round of protests and political conflict.

There are several possible amnesty bills on the table, including one favored by the government proposed by Pheu Thai MP Vorachai Haema and one backed by relatives of victims who were killed in the red-shirt

protests of April and May 2010.

The latter focuses on addressing the legal plight of ordinary protesters and will not help political leaders. It will only help protesters charged with minor offences,

such as those facing fines or prison terms of no more than two

One of the promoters of the bill, Payao Akahad, whose paramedic son was shot and killed on May 19, 2010, said that around 1,000 people were in hiding for violating the Emergency Decree by taking part in protests.

"If the amnesty bill is passed, they can resume a normal life," she told The Nation.

Protesters from the yellowshirt People's Alliance for Democracy (PAD), who shut down Bangkok's two airports in 2008, would also be covered, she

"This bill covers people who protested on all sides. The stress is on ordinary protesters. As far as I am aware, some PAD protesters who were not granted bail are still in prison."

Democrat Party leader Abhisit Vejjajiva has publicly backed the bill, saying his party would support its passage through Par-

liament so long as it did not result in the pardoning of arsonists or those accused of violating Article 112 – insulting the monarchy.

MP Vorachai's bill is favored by the government and the United Front for

Democracy Against Dictatorship (UDD), better known as the red

UDD leader Thida Thawornset is thought to be skeptical about the bill, believing it would delay the passing of an amnesty for another year.

She has also said it was biased against the red shirts, since it would exclude those who were wanted for setting fire to private property, as happened in Bangkok at the end of the 2010 red-shirt

leader Boonjong Wongtrairat said conflict was "100 per cent certain" when Parliament reconvenes in August.

He warned that debate on the

various draft amnesty bills would be explosive. The ruling Pheu Thai Party should not think that just because they enjoyed a majority voice they could simply slam their bill through, he said.

If the government wanted society to move ahead, it should not bring such divisive issues to the table, he said, adding that even Pheu Thai knew deep down this would bring a fresh round of major conflict.

Killings threaten Ramadan ceasefire in South

THE Ramadan ceasefire agreement between the bargain by executing insurgent leader the Thai government and an insurgent group in the Deep South, the Barisan Revolusi Nasional (BRN), appears to be at risk after both sides accused the other of violating the deal.

On July 21 a couple were gunned down in broad daylight in Narathiwat's Rangae District, while a defence volunteer was seriously wounded in Sai Buri in Pattani, The Nation reported.

Lt Gen Paradorn Pattanathabutr, chief of the Thai negotiating team in the ongoing peace talks with the BRN, said he would report the alleged violations to the Malaysian panel of experts who are acting as facilitators to the talks.

Meanwhile, the BRN has also complained that the government has violated its side of the previous negotiations," Gen Paradorn said.

Masupian Mama in Narathiwat on July 19.

In a letter to the Malaysian team, BRN negotiator Hassan Taib said Thailand's alleged infringement forced the BRN to launch counterattacks.

Gen Paradorn claimed Thailand had not violated the agreement by killing Masupian Mama. He explained that the killing occurred as both sides were exchanging gunfire. The security officials had no choice but to protect themselves.

DSI issues arrest warrant for disgraced monk

THE department of Special Investigation (DSI) has issued an arrest warrant for disgraced former monk Wirapol Sukpol, formerly known as Luang Pu Nenkham, and the Department of Foreign Affairs has cancelled his passport.

As well as launching a hunt for Mr Wirapol, the DSI is searching for eight tonnes of gold bars and ornaments that are believed to have been donated to the monk's temple, The Nation reported.

The Bangkok Criminal Court last week issued the arrest warrant on

three charges against Mr Wirapol.

DSI chief Tarit Pengdith said the charges were: violating the Computer Crime Act by posting false information on the internet

to raise donations; statutory rape of a minor under the age of 15; and taking the minor away from her parents/guardians.

He said that since these charges had a 10-year statute of limitations, his agency had up to a decade to hunt the ex-monk

Saying the DSI knew exactly where the ex-monk was now, Mr Tarit said that Mr Wirapol would be flushed out of hiding now that his passport and visa had been cancelled, making international travel for him illegal.

Cambodia at the polls

High hopes for change as royal pardon frees exile to return

AFTER 28 years of rule by Hun Sen, Asia's longest-serving prime minister, the rallying cry for Cambodia's opposition ahead of the election on Sunday is obvious, and appears to be attracting an unprecedented number of voters.

Hun Sen, a charismatic former commander in the genocidal Khmer Rouge, has built up formidable electoral machinery through his ruling Cambodian People's Party (CPP) that easily outguns the opposition. Adding to his advantages are a compliant media, the CPP's deep pockets, and an election system that is prone to government meddling.

The authoritarian leader, now 60, has vowed to stay in power until his planned retirement in his mid-70s, and appears intent on building a political dynasty by promoting his three US military-trained sons to top positions in the CPP and the army.

Still, the newly unified opposition hopes to mount its strongest challenge to the CPP since democracy was fully restored in 1998.

Under Hun Sen, Cambodia has transformed from a war-torn basket case into one of Southeast Asia's fastest growing economies, helped by a burgeoning garment export industry and growing political and investment ties with regional power China.

But the breakneck economic growth has been accompanied by a rise in social tensions over poor

factory conditions and rural land rights in the country of 14 million, where a third of people live on less than 65 US cents per day.

In rural areas, a backbone of CPP support where more than 90 per cent of Cambodians live, there is growing anger over huge land concessions awarded to foreign companies which have benefited close political allies of Hun Sen.

Most political analysts believe the CPP is on course to retain its majority but may lose ground from the 90 seats it currently holds in the 123-seat parliament. The two main opposition parties joined forces last year and are expected to improve on the combined 29 seats they won at the last elections in 2008.

The opposition received a morale boost on Friday when opposition leader Sam Rainsy returned after four years in exile in France. Sam Rainsy was given a royal pardon that removed the threat of a jail term, amid mounting pressure from the United States and other foreign donors to

ensure the election is fair. Donors provide nearly half of Cambodia's budget.

Tens of thousands of cheering supporters met Sam Rainsy, a former finance minister, who chose exile in 2009 rather than face trial for what rights groups said were politically motivated charges.

Some analysts believe the opposition could win enough seats to create political deadlock that would force Hun Sen into a coalition government with Sam Rainsy. Most, however, see the CPP keeping a strong enough majority to rule alone.

Philippine group to bar sending maids to Singapore

THE Association of Licensed Recruitment Agencies to Singapore (Alras) will bar its members from sending domestic workers to Singapore, starting September 2, in a bid to convince agencies in Singapore to stop collecting placement fees from maids.

Placement fees in Singapore average \$\$2,000, or four months of a domestic worker's salary.

About 70,000 of the 209,600 maids in Singapore are from the Philippines.

M'sian man sets self on fire over wife's lesbian tryst

A 50-year-old man set himself ablaze in front of his wife in their apartment near Kuala Lumpur after he learned she had been having a same-sex affair with her boss.

It is believed that the man, known only as Lim, could not accept the shocking news that his wife, whom he married 18 years ago, was in a relationship with another woman.

The couple has three children, aged between eight and 18.

Ampang Jaya OCPD Assistant Commissioner Amiruddin Jamaluddin said the couple's 19-year-old son, surfing the internet in his room at the time of the incident, denied claims that his mother had tried to kill his father.

Monk at center of Myanmar violence

A BOMB exploded meters away from a radical Buddhist monk as he delivered a mass sermon in Myanmar, police said on Monday, the latest flare-up in tensions pitting Buddhists against minority Muslims.

Wirathu, the prominent monk who heads a movement accused of stirring violence against Muslims, said he believed the blast on Sunday evening in Myanmar's second city, Mandalay, was intended to silence him.

The home-made bomb went off inside a parked car, according to police and witnesses. There was no claim of responsibility.

Tensions have been smouldering between radical elements of Myanmar's Buddhist majority and Muslims. Bouts of religious violence have killed at least 237 people and displaced 150,000 in the past year, testing the resolve of a two-year-old quasi-civilian government.

The device exploded during a ceremony conducted by Wirathu, who once called himself "the Burmese bin Laden". He is the chief proponent of a movement known as 969, which reformist President Thein Sein's office has described as a "symbol of peace".

Wirathu was unharmed, despite percent of the estimated 60 milbeing 12m from the blast accord- lion population ing to police. Five people were slightly injured, including a novice monk.

Reuters investigations in two of the hotspots of unrest – Rakhine state and the central city of Meikhtila – have revealed the violence was on both occasions fanned by monks who led Buddhist mobs.

The president's office, which says it wants to foster peace, tolerance and unity in ethnically diverse Myanmar, has described Wirathu as "a son of Lord Buddha". Buddhists make up about 90

The 969 movement has been accused of stirring anti-Muslim sentiment in a deeply Buddhist nation, where curbs on freedom of speech and assembly have eased since the end of military rule two years ago.

A Reuters investigation last month showed 969 monks were providing a moral justification for a wave of anti-Muslim bloodshed that could derail Myanmar's nascent reforms.

Government officials were unavailable for comment about Sunday's explosion. – *Reuters*

Baby prince steals spotlight, British royalty search for media sanctuary

ALREADY touted as one of the most famous babies in the world, the first child of Britain's Prince William and wife Kate faces a life in the spotlight like no previous royal, severely testing the couple's desire to give their offspring a "normal" life.

The baby was born with William at Kate's side on Monday and weighed 3.8kg.

From the moment the baby boy leaves hospital in the arms of his parents in front of an army of TV cameras and photographers, his life in the public eye begins and so does his parents' formidable battle to protect his privacy.

EU calls for release of Egypt's Mursi, new elections

THE European Union called on Monday for the release of ousted Egyptian president Mohamed Mursi and demanded democratic elections as soon as possible.

Ex-President Mursi has been held at an undisclosed military facility since the Egyptian army removed him from office on July 3 and suspended the constitution in the wake of street protests against his one-year rule.

The army says Islamist Mursi is being held for his own safety.

One Asiana victim killed by a vehicle, not plane crash

A TEENAGE passenger on the Asiana Airlines plane that crashed in San Francisco died from injuries sustained after being run over by a motor vehicle, most likely a fire truck at the scene, officials said on Friday.

Ye Mengyuan, a 16-year-old girl who sat toward the rear of Flight 214, survived the Boeing 777's crash-landing but died from blunt force injuries consistent with being run over by an emergency response vehicle, San Mateo County Coroner Robert Foucrault and San Francisco Fire Chief Joanne Hayes-White said at a news conference.

Death toll climbs after double earthquakes rock China

THE death toll from two earthquakes in China's western Gansu province has climbed to 89, with more than 500 people severely injured, after 1,200 buildings collapsed and tens of thousands more were badly damaged, said the official Xinhua news agency.

The quakes hit eight towns in the remote and mountainous Minxian and Zhangxian counties on Monday, Xinhua said.

The US Geological Survey reported two earthquakes, the first at a 5.9 magnitude and a strong aftershock about an hour and a half later at a 5.6 magnitude. Chinese authorities reported the first quake was a 6.6 magnitude.

Xinhua said that by Monday evening 422 aftershocks had been recorded, with the strongest measuring 5.6 in magnitude, citing Chang Zhengguo, a spokesman for the Gansu provincial government.

"Many have been injured by collapsed houses," said a Minxian county doctor.

On Monday the government of the city of Dingxi, the worst-affected area, said more than 27,000 people were left homeless.

Xinhua said about 3,000 police and rescue personnel have been sent to the quake-hit region, though landslides and flooding have hampered their efforts, and officials said

they were concerned more rain could exacerbate the need for shelter.

WHO asked India to ban killer toxin

THE pesticide that killed 23 Indian schoolchildren last week is a nerve poison banned by many countries because of what the World Health Organisation (WHO) describes as its "high acute toxicity".

As early as 2009, the United Nations health agency urged India to consider a ban on the pesticide monocrotophos - the substance said by a magistrate investigating the deaths to be the cause of the poisoning.

It had also noted that in India – despite strong international health warnings - many pesticide containers are not thrown away after use but recycled and used for storing water, food and other consumables.

In last week's case in the Indian state of Bihar, the children fell ill within minutes of eating a meal of rice and potato curry in their one-room school. They were vomiting and convulsing with stomach cramps – symptoms that experts say would be common in poisoning with such a toxic chemical.

The lunch was part of India's Mid-Day Meal Scheme, which aims to tackle malnutrition and encourage 120 million poor children to attend school. It had already drawn widespread complaints over food safety.

An initial forensic investigation found the Bihar children's meal had been prepared with cooking oil that contained monocrotophos,

which belongs to a family of chemicals called organophosphates that share a common mechanism of toxic action.

"Basically they are nerve poi-

sons," said David Coggon, a professor of occupational and environmental medicine at Britain's University of Southampton.

According to WHO, swallowing just 120 milligrams of monocrotophos - the weight of about five grains of rice – can be fatal to humans.

Monocrotophos controls a range of pests on various crops such as cotton, rice and sugarcane.

In India, monocrotophos "is

widely used and easily available", and is frequently linked to fatal poisoning, both accidental and intentional.

France defends ban on full-face veils despite Parisian ri

INTERIOR Minister Manuel Valls on Monday defended France's ban on wearing fullface veils in public places after a police check on a veiled Muslim woman sparked riots in a Paris suburb over the weekend.

The 2010 law was brought in by conservative former president Nicolas Sarkozy and targets burqa and niqab garments that conceal the face rather than the headscarf that is more common among French Muslim women.

A police check on a couple in the southwest suburb of Trappes sparked an angry confrontation that led to a police station being surrounded by several hundred people overnight on Friday. Another building was torched in several hours of street violence that led to six arrests.

"Police did their job perfectly," Mr Valls told *RTL* radio.

"The law banning full-face veils is a law in the interests of women and against those values having nothing to do with our traditions and values," he said.

France has Europe's largest Muslim population, estimated at around five million. Yet according to interior ministry figures, only between 400 and 2,000 women wear the veil and only a handful have been ordered to pay a fine for wearing it.

Critics say the law is patchily enforced as police seek to avoid confrontations in neighborhoods with high Muslim populations.

The rioting at the weekend was the first time the ban had let to an outbreak of violence.



Commercial real estate soars

DIRECT commercial real estate Transaction growth in local investment in the Asia Pacific region has exceeded market expectations in the first half of against the US Dollar by 13% from 2013, reaching US\$59.7

billion, 21% up on the first half of 2012. According to the latest Jones Lang LaSalle capital markets research, transaction volumes in the region have also increased quarter on quarter, topping US\$32.6 billion in the second quarter of 2013, up 21% on the previous quarter.

The growth was predominantly driven by the region's largest markets with Japan, Australia and China all experiencing strong deal flow throughout the quarter.

In Japan, investor confidence has been boosted by improving macroeconomic indicators following government stimulatory measures. Acquisitions have been dominated by J-REITs (Real Estate Investment Trusts) where inclusion in the Bank of Japan's asset purchase program has supported improved unit prices over the first half of the year. This coupled with increased IPO activity has supported transaction volume growth to US\$10.2 billion in Q2 2013, up 78% on the same quarter last year. Over the first half of 2013, volumes reached US\$20.8 billion, 50% higher than the first half of 2012.

In Australia, continued demand from both offshore and domestic institutional investors and pension funds lifted transaction volumes to US\$7.3 billion in Q2 2013 and US10.5 billion in H1 2013, up 27% from the first half of last year. currency terms was even higher as the Australian Dollar depreciated

Dr Megan Walters, head of research for Asia Pacific capital markets at Jones Lang LaSalle said: "Capital from around the region continues to show a bias towards core assets; however we are seeing some evidence of a shift towards more opportunistic investment. At the same time, government policy continues to have both positive and negative effects on deal flow, with stimulatory and cooling measures introduced this year. Investors are also developing their views around the Federal Reserve's intention to taper asset purchases, which some believe may happen as soon as the third quarter this year. Longer dated bond yields across a number of Asian markets have moved higher following the announcement, highlighting concerns around the direction of global interest rates."

Stuart Crow, head of Asia Pacific capital markets at Jones Lang LaSalle said: "We are seeing the results of increased allocations

Country Focus

Investment activity in other Asia Pacific markets was mixed as government cooling measures in Singapore and Hong Kong took effect. While quarter on quarter (q-o-q) volumes were down in a number of markets across the region, overall growth over the half year was positive compared to the first half of 2012, maintaining a positive outlook for the remainder of 2013.

Thailand

In Thailand, despite a smaller market, transaction volumes grew more than 95% in H1 2013, compared to the same period in 2012. Transactions concentrated in the hotel sector, reflecting increased availability of hotel assets and strong investor interest in Thailand's key hotel markets, particularly Phuket and Bangkok.

China

China bounced back strongly from a slower first quarter, to end Q2 2013 up 65% q-o-q at US\$6

billion. On a half yearly basis, investment activity has recovered from the slow H2 2012, up 97% to US\$9.6 billion in H1 2013, matching the first half of 2012. Foreign investors, including interregional buyers, continue to develop their China strategies with a number of large deals completed during the quarter serving to push cross-border transaction volumes in H1 2013 up 29% on H1 2012.

Hong Kong

Hong Kong's restrictive cooling measures, specifically the doubling of stamp duty on commercial transactions, have started to impact deal flow with transaction volumes down 53% q-o-q and 49% year on year. The number of cross-border deals fell by 71% in H1 2013, compared to H1 2012. Existing activity is being supported by corporates looking to occupy space with healthy investor interest for new developments in emerging office market locations.

Singapore

Singapore saw its investment activity grow 11% on the first quarter of 2013 to US\$2.3 billion and, over the half year, up 15% on H1 2012. While investor interest remains healthy, differing market outlooks between buyers and vendors has led to some disparity in price expectations. A number of large deals in the pipeline should support transaction volumes for the remainder of the year.

South Korea

Investor sentiment remained mixed in South Korea as a result of recent economic uncertainty. Transaction volumes in H1 2013 were up 34% on the first half of 2012 but down 48% on H2 2012 with overall activity predominantly driven by a handful of larger deals.

Indonesia


Indonesia continues to draw interest from foreign investors looking to develop their emerging market strategies, with strong growth potential and solid economic prospects presenting a positive investment case. Investment to date has been dominated by domestic groups as limited stock and opportunities, coupled with strong domestic competition have made it difficult for foreign buyers to enter.



To raise one's roof or not to

How much of your portfolio should be in your home

I AM often asked how much one should spend on a primary residence, and while this is an area open for debate, my answer usually surprises people.

I have always been baffled by arguments about mortgage interest being tax deductible and many other reasons to sink way too much into one's primary residence. This doesn't mean I don't think a good portion of one's assets ought to be in real estate; however, many people place too high an emphasis on expectation of capital appreciation from their residence and not enough on short term cash flow.

I think my beliefs are best summed up by Ed Kiyosaki, the famous author of "Rich Dad, Poor Dad'. He says that if your

home is your biggest investment you have serious trouble. His argument is that contrary to modern accrual-based accounting methods, one should look at things from a pure cash flow perspective and try to accumulate cash flow-positive investments.

Your primary residence is cash flow negative usually; you need to sink money into it to maintain it and you only unlock cash when you finally sell it (but then have to replace it and thus use some/all of that cash). A rental property on the other hand, is usually cash flow positive, assuming you price it so that it doesn't sit empty.

So basically, from a financial planning perspective, a mistake I think many people make is allocating all or too much of their real estate investments in their

own home. To make the concept simple, let's depart from reality for a moment and assume square meters are a commodity and each one costs the same amount. If you can afford 500 square meters of living space, this is usually what most people sink into their own home.

Of course, they may only really need about 200 square meters to live comfortably, but most people take a lot of pride in showing their friends what a nice big house they live in. They don't realize the opportunity cost of all those unneeded square meters. If they bought two properties of 250 square meters each, they could rent one out and have a significant positive cash flow investment. Again I am assuming the rental yield makes sense, while in reality sometimes it doesn't.

budget, you could realistically end up better off in the long run by splitting that money across two properties as opposed to sinking it all into one. Both would appreciate if the local market keeps going up, but one would be generating some positive cash flow in the meantime.

Warren Buffet is famous for saying that his favorite holding period is forever. Of course if you get a chance to cash out large gains after a market has run up this doesn't mean that you shouldn't do so. Yet if you continuously accu-If you have a 10 million Baht mulate cash flow generating properties and especially if you diversify geographically, eventually you will build up an equivalent to an annuity that has a natural inflation hedge built in, assuming you have a long term investment horizon.

Southern Thailand's next oasis: Trang

AS REAL estate in the markets of Phuket, Phang Nga and Krabi increasingly becomes unattractive to investors and speculators due to rapid appreciation and seemingly irreversible inflation, markets in other Southern Thai provinces are begin-

speculators would be wise not to ignore.

The President of the Agency for Real Estate Affairs Company Limited (AREA), Dr Sopon Pornchokchai, PhD, recently visited the province and made a number of noteworthy observations.

Due to its ideal location along

The province had a Gross Domestic Product (GDP) of more than 119 billion baht in 2010; With a growth of 27% since 2005, it Trang is one such market that ranked 9th of 14 Southern Thai provinces, Dr Sophon noted. During the five-year period,


Trang's private sector Consumer Price Index grew by 31%, while at the same time its Private Sector Investment Index jumped by 19%. This is compared to an increase in its Government Expenditure Index of only 4%, as well as a 32% decrease in its Expenditure on private sector Investments Index.

Total area that was requested to be developed grew by 24% in 2012 and is expected to be no less than 30% this year, Dr Sophon said.

Although revenues from the province's agriculture sector have been in decline, due mainly to the value of rubber and palm commodities plummeting in the global market, the real estate market should not be directly impacted, Dr Sophon insisted.

In 2012, construction in Trang's municipal areas covered 149,175 square meters and 117,992 sqm outside of municipal areas. Most of this was for single detached homes. Of the construction in municipality zones, 41,141sqm was for rowhousing or town-houses.

Aside from this, the province saw development of just one condominium project covering 1,182 sqm. Signaling the spark of a new, potentially lucrative market, there is

at least one more condominium project in the pipeline, with already half of its units reported sold off-plan.

Meanwhile, most of the other projects under construction are for single detached homes and town houses outside the city center, especially en route to Trang airport, where there are 10 "quality" projects underway.

Dr Sophon said that there are no indications that the property market in Trang is at risk of being flooded, since it is still in the infant stages of what appears to be a promising boom.

Dr Sophon says that Trang Airport, spanning 1,659 rai and located 8 kilometers or a 15-minute drive to the south of Trang Town, in the Tung Nang sub district, is an important factor in stimulating Trang's development and economic

Although Thai Airways had abandoned the destination, new airlines, namely Nok Air and Air Asia, have

stepped up to provide four daily flights to/from the province, which has proved a boon for the local tourism industry.

Moreover, there are plans proposed to expand the airport's western runway utilizing a budget of 96 million baht, and expand the passenger terminal using an additional proposed budget of 80mn baht.

If executed, these expansion initiatives will increase the airport's

passenger load capacity from 300 up to 400 passengers per hour.

At present, the airport can handle 2,424 passengers a day.

Given continued expansion and growth in infrastructure, tourism and education, and expected increased revenues from the agricultural sector and diversification of other industries, the real estate sector in Trang is poised to prosper, Dr Sophon concluded.

them save IT costs by a tremendous amount. If Fortune 500 companies are going this route, it makes sense for us as well.



Asian demand for tablets and laptops insatiable

SOUTHEAST Asia's internet laptops spurred the overall market's infrastructure has improved by leaps and bounds, spurring the increasingly connected society to seek gratification for instant connectivity via portable devices such as tablets and laptops. In the last 12 months, demand for both devices grew to hit combined sales of nearly 14.2 million units across six of the region's key markets; Singapore, Malaysia, Thailand, Vietnam, Indonesia and Philippines, reflecting a 32% growth in volume sales compared to the previous year.

Both the laptop and tablet markets in this region reported sales surge, albeit at signifiof growth. Although laptops

continued to make up more than half the combined sales volume at 57%, the segment's growth rate for Southeast Asia stood at 4%; whereas the fast growing tablet segment doubled in volume demand (101%) in the June 2012 to May 2013 period, compared to this same period the year before.

"Consumers in the region's developing markets eager to get their hands on the latest tablets and strong double digit growth rate in the range of 11% to 54%," commented Gerard Tan, Account Director for Digital Technology at GfK Asia. "However, it is mainly the tablet market which has been the

key growth propeller with four of the six countries reporting more than two-fold incremental sales volume."

Indonesia is the largest tablet market, accounting for nearly 1.3 million units or over a third of total tablet sales volume in the region, with consumers there snapping up one in every three units of all tablets sold across the six markets. Compared to the previous

year, demand for tablets in the country surged by 141% in the latest one year period. However, the most robust market appears to be the Philippines where the tablet take-up rate in the last 12 months grew at 322%.

Nearly 455,000 of these devices flew off the shelves in June 2012 to May 2013.

"It is worth highlighting that cost of tablets in all of the markets have dipped significantly over the past year, averaging at around 27% throughout the region," observed Tan.

"Not surprisingly, the competitive marketplace is inundated with countless international and local brands and models, 180 brands across Southeast Asia last year to be precise, giving consumers a wide variety of options that can suit any type of budget."

For instance, Indonesia and Thailand carry over 60 tablet brands in their respective local markets, availing consumers in the country around 300 models to choose from. Not surprising, prices of tablets are also lowest here, selling at an average price of US\$357 and US\$408, respectively. On the other hand, in Singapore where there are only around 29 brands, the average tablet price was highest last year at US\$525.

Meanwhile laptop sales continued to surge in Indonesia and Thailand by 17% and 16% respectively, while the Philippines and Singapore fell into the negative growth range.

"Laptops are definitely facing stiff competition from tablets as they present a possibly more inexpensive and comparable option for consumers seeking a slightly larger portable smart device with stronger capabilities than smartphones," said Tan. "However, laptops have their own unique functions and are able to perform tasks which tablets may not be able to, so both products have their own unique space in the market."

Moving forward, we can anticipate a more vibrant and competitive marketplace as manufacturers of both products come out with newer and more innovative features to vie for the consumer dollar," Tan - *GfK* concluded.

Bus about face

THE quiet launch last week of a new bus to shuttle tourists from the airport to Patong comes as a small dose of good news for Phuket's ailing public transport sector, which nevertheless continues to suffer from the chronic and very serious effects of collusion, self-entitlement and a blatant, goon-like disregard for the law, common decency and the greater good.

No other single issue has been the subject of more editorializing in this space, so we would like to formally applaud the operators of the new service, encourage all tourists to use it as much as possible and ask for better support from the authorities in seeing that it is eventually "allowed" to extend its route all the way to Kata and Karon.

The failure of authorities to trumpet this significant launch – instead, they persuaded the operators to keep it as low-key as possible — does not bode well for the future of public transport on the island in general, and especially not for Kata and Karon, where tuk-tuk and taxi operators continue to threaten "action" if their interests are infringed upon.

As mentioned in this space several times in the past, the inability or unwillingness of authorities to stand up to self-serving public transport syndicates, like the well-entrenched monopoly in Kata-Karon, harms Phuket's entire tourism industry and reinforces the island's reputation as a "ripoff" tourist destination.

Judging from the online comments in the English-language media about the transport situation in Phuket, some readers might be led to believe that the situation is the result of some sort of greed-driven conspiracy directed against foreign tourists.

The reality is that Phuket's reputation is also well-entrenched among residents throughout Thailand, thus costing the island untold billions of baht annually in lost revenue that could have come from domestic tourism – a too-often overlooked slice of the tourism pie.

Lack of reasonably-priced public transport of the kind that exists in every other province in the kingdom also manifests itself in other ways, such as making the island the most expensive place to live and work in the country. This has resulted not only in a chronic labor shortage, but is also one of the major contributing factors to the island's ever-worsening traffic woes.

That the transport syndicates that control Patong have allowed the bus service to operate on their turf is an encouraging sign that even those with highly-vested interests can reason and be made willing to make some measured sacrifices for the greater good.

As this issue goes to press, no incidents of protest against the new service have been received from Patong or any of the other locales through which the long-awaited route passes. We hope that the police are making some kind of behind-the-scenes efforts to ensure that the fledgling service is allowed to establish itself and give Phuket what it needs more than anything else: safe, reasonably priced public transport.

After we catch them, we let them go in a forest. We normally take them to hills behind Patong, where we believe they will be safe. We make sure to leave them on relatively flat surfaces, so they won't get swept away by water when it rains.

And we make sure that we set them free far from where people live. We don't want them to bite people and we don't want people to kill them.

People shouldn't try to catch a snake by themselves, even ones that are not poisonous.

One time a guy caught a python by himself, thinking it wasn't dangerous because it wasn't venomous. But he was bitten really badly on the arm.

When snakes bite, they sometimes pull your flesh off. That guy's wound couldn't be sutured. Just because they're not poisonous doesn't mean they won't bite you.

If you have any doubts about illegalities involving elephants, you can report it to the police, in your case, Chalong Police 076-381930, and they will check the operator and the elephant, then contact me and the Khao Phra Thaeo Wildlife Sanctuary in Thalang if they need more information.

Thank you for informing me about this case. I will contact the Khao Phra Thaeo park to see if we can set up a team to inspect the elephant camp again.

elephants: Phuket Livestock Office (076-218596), Khao Phra Thaeo Wildlife Sanctuary (076-318065) and the police.

The Livestock Office makes sure that elephants have the necessary documents to cross provincial borders and have appropriate places to stay.

We also keep a complete register of all elephants legally entitled to be kept in Phuket. Legal elephants have a registration document sometimes called a "ticket", which includes photos of the elephant, its registration number, microchip

number, the names of its mother and father, and the registered owner's name and address.

We also regulate and provide There are three organizations health services for elephants, and which are responsible for can investigate and take action on any reports of elephants being abused or mistreated.

We conduct our own checks, but the officials at Khao Phra Thaeo and the police are empowered to carry out checks as well.

Classical concert for an urgent cause

AN ENSEMBLE of 10 top-flight classical musicians accompanied by 100 students performed a free concert in Phuket on Tuesday to raise funds for Myanmar refugee children living near the border town of Sangkhlaburi, in Kanchanaburi province.

The two-hour concert, was held at the Andaman Embrace Resort and Spa on Haad Patong Road.

The ensemble of Korean musicians operates under an organization called Concert World and travels abroad to perform charity concerts twice a year, explained Sangsoo "John" Han, Regional Director of World Share Thailand.

"The Concert World benefit performances have been taking place for 13 years now, and this concert was organized by World Share," he added.

Most of the refugee families make broomsticks for a living, earning about 1,000 baht per family per month. There are no sewers and 60 per cent of households in the village do not have toilets.

Around 50,000 refugees live in the Sangkhla Buri jungle close to the Myanmar border. The refugees are restricted to the area, with no electricity or running water in their homes.

Most of the refugee families make broomsticks for a living, earning about 1,000 baht per family per month. There are no sewers and 60 per cent of households in the village do not have toilets. To alleviate the conditions the refugees are living in, World Share is raising funds to provide a dormitory, nourishing food and medical services, and to support a border school.

The United Nations refugee villages in the area will no longer receive support from December next year, and the dormitories the refugee children currently stay in while receiving what education is available are already deteriorated and in the process of moving to a pay-for system.

"We would like to provide a dormitory for students around the ages of 10-15 and to help them to enter university or to become a working members of society," World Share says.

In order to do that, World Share will provide accommodation, meals, pocket money, uniforms, textbooks, education and scholarships, if the children are accepted to a university.

Among the medical services to be provided is care for 15-year-old Suri, who was born with webbed fingers and toes and a fused spine, which prevents her from moving her arms and legs. She can't chew properly, so her food needs to be chewed or otherwise ground down for her.

Suri's mother passed away eight months after giving birth to her younger sister, so her father is homebound to take care of her and cannot work outside.

World Share's support for medical services for Suri started on May 6, after staff received a letter from Sangkhlaburi Hospital.

World Share asked the cost and availability of surgery for the girl, and on June 24, through the help of the Sangkhlaburi District Office, Suri and her father travelled to Sirirat Hospital in Bangkok for an expert.

A second checkup will take place on September 4 and an operation is scheduled for September 27. According to doctors, Suri will be able to hold things after surgery. She will even be able to walk and use her arms after physical therapy.

"However, the operation on her spine is impossible," the report said.



The Canadian Chekhov

By James Eckardt

AT THE age of 82, Alice Munro is the grande dame of Canadian literature. In her 14 books of short stories, she has been compared to Anton Chekhov. If I were Chekhov, I'd take it as a compliment.

Dear Life (Alfred A. Knopf, New York, 2013, 309pp) continues her Chekhovian obsession with time. Her narrative voice is as confident as ever, yanking the reader's attention immediately into the urgency of her tale. Her language is plain, even folksy, and lays out hard simple truths. Pride, a delusional story of small town envy, opens this way:

"Some people get everything wrong. How can I explain? I mean there are those who have everything against them – three strikes, twenty strikes for that matter and they turn out fine. Make mistakes early on - dirty their pants in grade two, for instance – and then live out their lives in a town like ours where nothing is forgotten... and they manage, they prove themselves hearty and jovial, claiming and meaning that they would not for the world want to live in any place but this.


"With other people it's different. They don't move away but you wish they had. For their own sake, you could say. Whatever hole they started digging when they were young... they keep right on at it, digging away."

As in her very early stories, these 14 new ones take place in rural Ontario during the Great Depression and the war years. Seldom do they stretch into the 1960s. The protagonists are generally young, poor, ambitious, intelligent yet vulnerable women seeking out their place in life.

In *Train*, the greatest story in this collection, though, the hero is a young man, a veteran returning from the war in 1946, hopping some discussion of death. Our

In 1961, he accompanies her on her first return trip to her native Toronto for medical treatment. After an operation for cancer, she suddenly turns lucid, remembering family secrets that prompt him to flee. Four years later, while working as an apartment superintendent, he hears the voice of his first love talking with the building's owner, in search of her runaway daughter, and suddenly we are back in 1940 and the reason for



his jumping off the train in the first place. And now he flees on yet another train to a new lumber town. Munro plays these varying chords of time with a master's

Two other stories In Sight of the Lake and Dolly deal with young and old love. In the first, a young girl comes to teach children in a tuberculosis sanitarium in stark timber country in the wintry depths of the Depression. Her awkward courtship by the sanatorium's director ends even more awkwardly: sudden, surprising and painful.

The second story opens this way: "That fall there had been three years old and myself seventy-one at the time, we had naturally made plans for our funerals (none) and for the burials (immediate) in a plot already purchased. We had decided against cremation, which was popular with our friends. It was just the actual dying that had been left out or up to chance."

This grim serenity is interrupted by Dolly. She comes selling cosmetics door to door and turns out be the great love of Franklin's youth. The ending is a great slight of hand.

Munro identifies the final four stories as frankly autobiographical.

A central figure is Munro's unhappy mother, risen from a poor farm to become a schoolteacher only to sink back into the life of a farmer's wife: "I think people found her pushy and overly grammatical. She said things like "readily" and "indeed so". She sounded as if she had grown up in some strange family who always talked that way. And she hadn't. Out on their farms, my aunts and uncles talked the way everybody else did. And they didn't like my mother very much, either."

Alice Munro hints that these may be her last stories. I can only hope that she's wrong.



C is for colorful palette

BOTH cordylines and crotons have been considered fairly recently in these columns. Time only for a whistle-stop tour. Suffice to say that they are two of the first foliage plants most tropical gardeners would choose, both for their dramatic and permanent leaf color and their trim form, which means that they can be put in large groups, lined up as a mid-border plant or planted for contrast amid conventional greenery. In both cases, the leaves issue from a single woody stem and tend to grow most vigorously at the top,

especially in dry conditions, in an almost palm-like manner.

Cordylines have been enthusiastically hybridized here in Thailand. Attractive recent forms have broad pointed leaves of an almost luminous magenta, though there are varieties with green leaves edged with crimson, and others with dull, purplish-bronze foliage, or even grassy, pinkish leaves. They

are rhizotomous and will grow well in pots filled with a loambased compost, but should not be exposed to the full glare of the tropic sun lest the leaves fade. Pick off the unsightly dead ones anyway. No pruning is required, though leggy plants can be chopped in half. The re-planted top should root, and the bare stem should produce new foliage.

Most crotons or codiaeums have even broader, glossy, leathery evergreen leaves, though there are varieties such as "banana" with narrow leaves. Many are characterized by pronounced veining, usually in a contrasting hue. One leaf may have three colors, for rather than the nineties of Phuket.



example: green suffused with deep pink, and yellow or red veins. "Gold dust" has yellow flecks on green foliage. Codiaeums start life as a single-stemmed plant, but given time and the right conditions – full sun and a moist but well drained soil – they will assume a clumpy shape and can develop into a small tree. Young cuttings will root in water. Good as a container plant,

they have graced western drawing rooms for well over a century.

Another foliage plant popular in Thailand is the coleus (solemostemon), hence the presence in nurseries of beautifully patterned potted specimens in a wide range of colors. Normally the leaves have two or more dramatically contrasting hues, for example: deep purple edged with green; yellow or a luminous green veined with crimson. The foliage is paper-thin and nettle-like and the stems are soft and brittle. In fact the coleus is not entirely at home here, preferring temperatures in the seventies or eighties

A position in filtered sunlight and well-drained soil will, however, fit the bill.

If you want the best of both worlds, you could try the costus or spiral ginger. Not only does it possess glossy, spear-shaped leaves which are grouped around the upper parts of the stems, but in the case of C. curvibractus, unusual bracts which form bright red cones above the foliage. It is frequently employed as a border specimen and used in massed plantings (such as in the Phuket Botanic Garden), where the effect

> can be spectacular. However, in common with all gingers, it will need plenty of moisture and a position out of direct sunlight. If deprived of water, it will soon die back and lose its leaves. A less common relative, the crape ginger (C. spicatus), has larger purple cones from which emerge white flowers with a reddish throat. Variegatus has vivid white and

green striped foliage.

Coincidentally, all these "C" plants will survive the container experience. I would not recommend that you plant any member of the *zingiber* family in a pot, but I know a gardener who does and successfully. As for cordylines, coleus and crotons, they are naturals: they will not only thrive in such an environment, but will add a dash of permanent color to your collection of potted plants.

Tip of the week Leafy Logic

EVAPORATION through the leaves is essential if water from the soil, via the roots and the plant's capillaries or zylem, is to reach the stems and foliage. This transpiration also helps to cool down plants, especially in tropical climes, as well as changing osmotic pressure in the roots.

As a general rule, the bigger the leaf area, the greater the potential loss of moisture through evaporation. A large tree may lose thousands of liters of water in a day. The rate of evaporation depends on many external factors: atmospheric humidity; heat (most crucial); direct sunlight or wind.

But the plant will have its own procedures or characteristics to help reduce water loss – for



example, closing some of these pores (stomata) or even shedding excess leaves (champaca). Thick, leathery leaves (rubber vine,

dillenia, plumeria) usually have fewer stomata and enable the plant to better withstand dry conditions.

For the love of durian

AS A Thai, I am fully aware of the nation's love affair with food. But one item baffles me still and it's no other than the infamous fruit – durian. I have observed that there was no two-way thing about this so-called king of Thai fruits - you either love it or hate it.

As the latter, I decided to see for myself what the fuss was all about and joined two durian aficionados, Wanida Hongyok and

Wilaiwan Dienel, on their fruit tasting trip to Phang Nga, an activity they indulge in on almost a weekly basis during the season, which typically falls around June-August.

"Good characteristics of durian are as follows," explained Wilaiwan to me, the

uninitiated: "Creamy texture, that is firm on the outside but yielding enough, sweet of course, with not too strong of an aroma and small seeds, which make for fleshier meat."

The nation's favorite varieties include Mon Thong or golden pillow in Thai, Kan Yao, so-called because of its long stem, and Chanee. These are cross-breeds, first cultivated many years back, which have become popular for their smooth and creamy texture.

But Wilaiwan and Wanida, born and bred Southerners, champion the more wild ver-

> sion called Durian Ban. They argued that this was what durian should be like: pungent, sugary and very gooey. However, as I was a relative newcomer and they wanted to ease me in gently, they thought I should try a milder version of durian ban a breed called Salika.

There is one problem. Salika is only grown in one small area in Phang Nga and the information we received as to where to find the orchard was sketchy at best.

Nevertheless, we took our chances and one fine Sunday morning drove off in the direction of Tai Muang, a district in Phang Nga where Salika was reportedly last seen.

Relying on street-side fruit vendors and passersby for directions, we ventured into many dirt roads to no avail. We ran into, and tasted, a few *Kan Yao* long stems, which I found to be a little too pungent, with an intense hint of sulfur and mushy texture. In all, not quite my type.

Another false trail led to a fruit tasting. Salika is something to behold -

vendor claiming to have some Salikas, but she couldn't fool an expert like Wilaiwan who pronounced the breed Kradoom. Kradoom was milder than Kan Yao with the taste that was not too bad. Still, I was not convinced.

Our search continued and after having been sent back and forth (by kind locals who were not quite sure what we were looking for) and losing

our way many times, we were about to give up. That was when we finally came across a motorcycle taxi driver who was able to lead the way to the farm in question.

At Tambon Tung Maprao village, 15 kilometers from the Tai Muang district center, Usit Keeratiwitayayuth has been farming Salika durians for more than two decades. He took us to see his patch, a smallish farm of five rai in the middle of a vast palm plantation.

The old trees there were grand and tall. Picking the fruits, Usit explained, was no easy feat and required an adroit picker who

must also be a good climber. Usit supplies to vendors in Phuket who collect from the farm on a weekly basis.

Then came the glorious moment of

creamy without being too mushy; mild almost to the point of being fragrant with honey-like sweetness that lingered long on the palette.

We piled a bunch of *Salikas* into the back of our pick-up truck and drove away giddy with satisfaction. And that was the day I became a durian convert.

> You may find Salika durians on roadside stalls in town and in Chalong. They are anything between 80-120 baht a kilo. Durian season lasts until the end of August

Racing with the wind

WINDS gusting to 20 knots made for a perfect end to what has turned into one of the best Cape Panwa Hotel Phuket Raceweek yet. The weather conditions delivered fast and exciting racing throughout and after four days, the sailors of more than 15 nationalities were left tired and happy.

Two races for all except the Classic class made for a hectic schedule of racing on the final day, Sunday, July 21, and with some classes on the edge, there was plenty still to play for.

Wan Ma Rang in IRC Racing I had their best day yet closing out the regatta with two second places. However, it wasn't enough to overhaul *Katsu* who has sailed consistently well and held onto second place by three points.

Class honors went to Australian Peter Ahern and his all-star crew on Oi! who with seven wins from eight races, were untouchable. Formerly Team Premier, Peter Ahern/ Scott Bailey/ Fergus Wilmer recently bought the boat, renamed her Oi! and Phuket Raceweek was their first competitive event. Having got some early points on the board in the 2013/14 Asian Yachting Grand Prix Championship, Oi! now heads to Hong Kong to compete on the circuit.

IRC Racing II was dominated by Australian Peter Sorensen and his crew on Fujin, and that domination continued through to the final race. Eight wins from eight races speaks for itself and as sailing star Steve McConaghy, who was racing onboard the former Ichi Ban said: "you could sail this thing backwards and still win.

Sunday's battle, however, was for second and third in the class,

between Stuart Williamson's Skandia Endeavour of Whitby and Neils Degenkolw's *Phoenix*. Despite struggling with their starts and being called OCS on more than one occasion, a good performance on the final day for Williamson and his crew (a 2,3 scoreline), saw them secure second overall and relegate *Phoenix* to third.

For the first three days there was one race per day, but the great winds on Sunday saw Principal Race Officer Simon James set two races for IRC Cruising and Irish entry Windstar, helmed by Peter Woods. reveled in the conditions to finish the last day with two more wins, and win the class by four points.

The doggedly-determined Aussie team, Rob Azzopardi's Dreamtime, with two second placings on the final day, could not overhaul the leaders and had to stay in second place overall, four points back. Mike Crisp, helming Sail in Asia Venture, who was introduced to a rocky outcrop on the third day, to be hauled off by the obliging press corps, finished third overall on 11 points.

The super-fast Firefly 850 sport catamarans, all built in Phuket, thrived in the strong winds last week, with competitors recording speeds in excess of 20 knots (37 km/h). Reading the conditions best and sailing consistently was Twin Sharks, skippered by Briton John Newnham, who didn't contend the last race having already won seven from seven to be the clear class winner.

However, second and third was a much closer battle, between Hans Rahmann's Voodoo and Roger Kingdon's Moto *Inzi. Voodoo* came into the final day with a slight edge and a 2,1 scoreline on the day saw them complete a strong Series and place second ahead of Moto Inzi by a single point.

The Multihull Racing class saw a remarkable come-back by Phuket sailor/ designer, Mark Pescott, with a second and a first in the last races, to go into the clear as Multihull Racing class winner, helming *DaVinci* (12 points), and defending their title by just one point ahead of the week's leader, Alan Carwadine's Asia Catamarans Hurricane who had to settle for second overall. Then came another early leader, John Coffin's Java, third, on 16 points.

The end of the Classic class was as expected, continuing the week-long pattern, with Simon Morris' Sirius (three points) at the front, Laurie Piper's Atlanta (seven) in second and the German maxi classic, Letizia, skippered by Captain Bernd Gundel (eight), third. Perennial regatta entry, Captain Bao's Seraph was relegated to fourth place, although equaling Letizia on eight points.

While the Aussies took home a lot of silverware at this year's regatta, what was noticeable is the large number of top boats from Ao Chalong Yacht Club, both winners and high scoring performers.

A lavish Gala Dinner hosted by Cape Panwa Hotel brought to a close a highly successful 10th Anniversary Cape Panwa Hotel Phuket Raceweek.


Yet it all goes under the same name - sailing. and we're all in it for similar reasons, driven by the urge to get closer to nature, to become part of it, use it to our advantage.

Life & style Born from the

ashes of war

The defeat the of Burmese army marked new chapter in the island's history. That's when Phuket Town was born...

THE Nine Armies' War started in 1785 when the Burmese, taking advantage of internal strife and the overthrowing of King Taksin in Siam, invaded the country with nine armies numbering around 150,000 soldiers.

One of those armies marched straight for Thalang, then the largest town in Phuket, and laid siege to it. During that time, the governor of Thalang and the only person who can organize the town's defenses, passed away in the most untimely manner. With the town in danger of being sacked, the governor's wife, Lady Chan, along with her sister, Khun Mook, rallied the town's fighting men and organized the defense of Thalang.

After five weeks of siege, Burmese supplies were dwindling fast. Lady Chan's deception in

making the Burmese think that her fort had a lot more men than it actually did, made the Burmese reluctant to launch a full scale attack. They retreated soon after, leaving Thalang's townspeople victorious against all odds. Lady Chan and her sister, Khun Mook became local heroines and the pair is still deeply revered in Phuket today.

In the aftermath of the invasion, the Burmese withdrew from the different regions of Siam. The defense of Thalang was one of the many heroic stories that emerged from this period in history. King Rama I bestowed upon many of these

war heroes noble titles to show his appreciation for their bravery in defending the country.

After the war, towards the end of 1785, King Rama I appointed Phraya Surintharaja as his viceroy to the Siamese towns on the west coast. He also appointed Thongpun Na Thalang as the new governor of Thalang, giving him the title of Phraya Narong Ruengrit. Lady Chan was bestowed the title of Thao Thepkasattri, the highest noble rank a non-royal woman can achieve. Her sister Khun Mook was bestowed a similar title and became known as Thao Srisoonthorn.

The promotion of Thongpun as governor of Thalang did not sit well with Lady Chan and her close friend, Phraya Thukkraj. Thongpun and Phraya Thukkraj had always been at odds with each other over the governorship of the town. Lady Chan had always supported Phraya Thukkraj, but since the appointment was the will of the King, neither Lady Chan nor Phraya Thukkraj could oppose the decision.

According to the Thalang Letters, after the appointment of Thongpun as governor, Lady Chan and Phraya Thukkraj led a group of townspeople who were loyal to them out of Thalang town and migrated south of the island to Baan Sapam near today's Phuket Town, away from Thongpun's authority. There the migrants proceeded to set up a tin mine around the new settlement under Phraya Thukkraj

In the year 1787, Lady Chan heard that Francis Light, an English captain who was an old friend of hers had successfully acquired Penang as a trading post for the British East India Company. Captain Francis Light had lived and traded in Phuket for several years. His house was located in Baan Tha Rua, south of Thalang Town. Light left Phuket before the Burmese invasion. He was one of the first to spot the approaching Burmese army and warned Lady Chan of the imminent threat to the island.

After the war was over, Light

offered to start up trade with

Phuket again.

Knowing that Captain Light wanted to start trading with Phuket again, Lady Chan asked the captain not to trade or provide any European goods to Thalang in exchange for tin. The war had left Thalang's coffers empty and trade was needed badly, but Lady Chan had her plans to oust Thongpun from Thalang's governorship. Instead she asked Captain Light to trade directly with her new settlement at Baan Sapam. The post-war crisis that the governor of Thalang was facing was soon exacerbated when the British, under Captain Light refused to trade with them, instead directing all European cargo to Baan Sapam. Thongpun found it

increasingly more difficult to

send the required tin tributes to

the royal treasuries in Bangkok as was mandated by the King. In contrast Lady Chan and Phraya Thukkraj had plenty of tin reserves to trade for foreign goods and they occasionally sent rich tributes to the King's treasuries.

Events

Thongpun's only solution to raise money was to dig through some old unsettled accounts. He demanded Lady Chan pay for the debt her husband, the previous governor had owed to the crown. Despite her heroic feats and sacrifice in defending Thalang, the King's treasuries had always reminded Lady Chan of her obligations to pay off her husband's debt to the crown. This time Lady Chan obliged by asking Captain Light to prepare for her a cargo of rare and expensive European goods that she personally took with her to Bangkok to present to King Rama I.

In 1791 Lady Chan also presented her daughter, Thong as consort to King Rama I. Thong was accepted into the palace, as one of King Rama I's wives. She was bestowed the title of Chao Chom Manda Thong when she bore a daughter (Princess Ubol) for the King.

Lady Chan was not only a local heroine who helped defend Phuket through one of its darkest times, through her feud with the governor of Thalang, she also helped establish a rival settlement that would one day grow to become Phuket Town as we know it today.









INDUSTRY: The Phuket Mining Museum illuminates the pivotal role mining played in the history of Phuket.

Phuket's high-speed internet put to the test

IT WAS the best of times, it was the worst of times...

I'm dropping back in for a guest column in the *Gazette* that concerns a topic that greatly interests me: internet in Phuket. I recently completed my move to Kathu although "completed" is a relative term, with boxes strewn hither and yon, and likely to stay strewn for some time to come. Internet's just as important to me as water and electricity. Oxygen too, for that matter.

After going through the motions to get a better-than-ADSL line to my new house, I finally gave up. TOT has fiber going up the road to within 100 meters of my house, but they wanted a king's ransom to connect my place. 3BB is laying fiber in Patong but, I was told, it would be many months before they come to Kathu. True didn't have DOCSIS, their cable-based service, anywhere near my place. I asked TOT about installing a WiMax box, but their story which cycled from "can't" to "won't" to "you don't want it" and back to "can't" wasn't very inviting.

In the end, I figured I was stuck with ADSL which just about everybody will string, just about anywhere on the island: TOT, CAT, 3BB, True, and several lesserknown companies all have variations on the copper cable ADSL line.

After talking with several people in the neighborhood and checking posts on phuketinternetspeed.com, I decided to go back to my old friends (and sparring buddies) at CAT. A few minutes on the second floor of Central Festival, and I signed up for the 1,049 baht/month nominal 14 mbps down/1 mbps up "HiNet" ADSL package.

Just as I started to move the first boxes of stuff into the new house, a flyer magically appeared on the doorstep. Although the information was almost all in Thai, the tech words didn't need any translation: 3BB was installing fiber in my neighborhood. This, in spite of the fact that just two days earlier, the folks at the 3BB kiosk in Lotus Mall said it would be many months.

That solved a major quandary for me. I firmly believe then as now that the only reasonable way to get a reliable internet connection in Phuket is to pay for two separate lines from two separate providers. It took me all of a minute to decide that

3BB Fiber would be my second line. I ordered the nominal 30 Mbps down/3 Mbps up line, the cheapest Fiber line they offer, at 1,200 baht per month.

CAT installed their ADSL line a few days after I signed up. 3BB took a few weeks. In both cases, the installation crews knew exactly what they were doing and they didn't mind allowing me to set up a few things my way. If you can say "192.168.1.1" convincingly, the crews will watch over your shoulder as you configure the router.

When I got the CAT 14 Mbps ADSL line working, my first stop was the international speed testing site testmy.net I was astounded to find that the CAT line ran about 4 mbps downloading from the US. I let loose the testmy.net automatic tests and ran them hourly

for several days. Speeds were consistently over two Mbps, usually around four, and sometimes up to 6 Mbps. While those kinds of speeds wouldn't win any contests in Europe, North America, Hong Kong, Singapore or South Korea, they're very, very good for Phuket.

When the 30 Mbps 3BB Fiber line arrived, I immediately ran to testmy.net, expecting some eye-popping numbers. Wrong. What a let-down. International single-thread download speeds on 3BB Fiber were roughly half as fast as the CAT 14 Mbps ADSL line. So the 3BB line was 10 per cent more expensive, but only half as fast, as the CAT line.



equipment, same software, same PC, same hub for both tests and I ran the tests just

a few minutes apart.

In my Live Wire columns, I used to emphasize that single-thread international download speeds don't tell the whole story. They don't. More and more, Thai Internet Service Providers are caching data in Bangkok. If you're looking at the main page of Bloomberg, or the New York Times, or Der Spiegel or you're watching the latest football match or Formula 1 race your web browser isn't reaching out overseas. It's just going to Bangkok, picking up bits that are imported once, then distributed inside

Thailand in the blink of an eye.

Yes, I used the same

Caching is only part of the internationalbypass story. Many of the major web sites, such as Google, YouTube, Facebook, and many others are "mirrored" in locations all over the globe. The

behind the sites

have fancy programs that minimize international data travel by ensuring copies of the right data are kept close to where you are. Your email may take an extra few seconds to arrive, for example, or your friends' Facebook pages may show a few seconds' lag, but mirroring lets those big sites give better and more reliable service worldwide, while reducing the companies' overall expenses.

All of those major sites and many others including sites run by the networking giant Akamai, or sites that run on massive server farms from Amazon or Microsoft are mirrored in Singapore. There are servers and international data lines located in Bangkok, leased by each of the major sites,

that connect directly to mirrored server farms in Singapore. As a result, when you watch a YouTube video, or fire up Google, your browser thinks it's pulling data from the US, but it isn't. The connection goes from your PC to the ISP's servers in Bangkok, hops once very quickly over a dedicated Bangkok-to-Singapore line, then screams its way to the company's mirrored site in Singapore. At least, as long as everything is working properly – Which is a roundabout way of saying that international download speeds are important, but local speeds to Bangkok are important, too. Depending on what you're doing, these days, domestic speed may be more important than international speed.

When it comes to domestic speed, 3BB's the clear winner. I ran the OOKLA-based test located at speedtest.net on each line. 3BB Fiber 30/3 mbps runs about 35 Mbps down (!) and 3 mbps up to Bangkok. CAT's 14/1 mbps line runs about 10 mbps down and 1 mbps up.

What does that mean in practice? I can use either line and get decent speeds if one line goes down. It take me 10 seconds to unplug my router from one provider, and plug it into the other one. When I'm running massive downloads from the US as was the case last week with the beta test version of Windows 8.1 I switch to CAT. When I'm running a lot c o m p a n i e s of Google (I use Gmail and Google Apps frequently), or YouTube, or Facebook, I switch to 3BB. Mostly, I don't worry about it very much, secure in the knowledge that between the two services I'll have pretty darn good internet connections almost always.

Times really have changed. Not many years ago, reasonably fast, reasonably reliable internet was a laughable goal. Now it's possible, and really not all that difficult - except when the electricity goes out.

Thanyapura triathletes rally in Roth

TRIATHLON legend and triathlon academy senior head coach at Thanyapura Juergen Zack notched up a second place in his age group as over 6,000 racers and 250,000 spectators turned out on a warm, sunny Sunday for the 2013 DATEV Challenge Roth in Germany.

Finishing in 9 hours, 18 minutes and 41 seconds, Zack finished 71st overall; Dirk Bockel of Luxembourg won the mens and overall event with a time of 07:52:01, followed by James Cunnama of South Africa (8:04:13) and Timo Bracht (08:08:18).

"It was when I got on the bike that the old racing instincts began to kick in and I got a little bit excited," said Zack, who has won the Roth five times before.

Switzerland's Caroline Steffen was the top women finisher with a time of 8:40:35, followed by the Netherland's Yvonne van Vlerken (08:46:22) and Germany's Julia Gajer (08:51:04).

Thanyapura's triathlon team, led by experienced triathlon coach Zack, set a series of personal bests at the 2013 DATEV Challenge Roth, one of the sport's annual highlights, bringing international attention to the Phuket-based training center's ethos of self-improvement in sports performance and lifestyle.

Zack's sensational showing led a charge by Thanyapura triathletes, which resulted in a string of personal bests and podium places, including a Thai record for Jaray Jearanai, best-ever times for Arnd Hill, Michael Lindinger, Stefan Scherer, Johannes Rabl, Joey-Lynn Musselman and Kathrin Puff who came third in her age group.

The women's race winner, Caroline Steffen, will arrive at Thanyapura next month as part of the inaugural Thanyapura's "Month of Women" campaign, to team up with another legend of the sport, Australian Belinda Granger, who was racing her last Challenge Roth.

"It was a great showing for Thanyapura in front of the whole triathlon world,' Zack said. "There was a lot of visibility for us, a lot of buzz and interest in Phuket as the hot emerging triathlon destination for racing and training.

"Personally, I wasn't planning to race again. When I hung up my bike and running shoes, I didn't even train for five years. But the work we do at Thanyapura got me back to a place where racing again looked feasible. It feels great to perform on one of the sport's big stages again."

Challenge Roth is unique in the grueling three-legged world of triathlon racing. It's the sport's version of the Tour de France, with crowds lining the shaded, charming streets of the historical Bavarian village and a carnival atmosphere prevailing. It's also the fastest course in the world over the full Ironman distance (70.3km).

This year, it also has a direct link to Phuket's premier race series, with the Challenge Family announcing a partnership with Asia's longest running triathlon: 2013

sees the launch of Challenge Laguna Phuket Tri-Fest from November 24, a week-long celebration of the sport, which will incorporate the iconic Laguna Phuket Triathlon and half distance Challenge Laguna Phuket.

At Challenge Roth, Zack covered the course in 9:18:41, a second behind another Thanyapura trained triathlete, Selukov Arnaud, with a bike leg split of 4:39, some way off his best Roth bike split of 4.14. "But not bad for someone who didn't race for seven years and didn't even train for five years," Zack said.

"It was amazing seeing my old rival (and fellow five-time Roth winner) Lothar Leder. He is still racing professionally, as

he was a younger man than me at the height of our rivalry. I was riding with him for quite a distance."

Leder was the first man to dip under the eight-hour barrier at Roth in 1996, when he went 7:57:02. The following year, Zack lowered that mark with 7:51:42, a time that would have won him this year's trophy.

Zack said he would now focus on getting Thanyapura's Triathlon team ready for the Challenge Laguna series, which he said was an exciting development in the sport and would help put Phuket even more firmly on the map as a world triathlon destination to be reckoned with.

adminton brawl may get boys banned: BAT head

TWO former badminton doubles partners, including one Phuket native, hit the "bad" back into badminton, when they instead decided to fight out their men's doubles final at the Canadian Open last Sunday.

The incident, which went viral on global racket channels, was deemed an act of misconduct by the Badminton Association of Thailand president, Charoen Wattanasin, saying it could lead to lifetime bans if imposed on the players by the International Badminton Federation (IBF).

One clip shows Bodin Issara chasing ex-partner and Phuket-born Maneepong Jongjit during a changeover after the first game of the final at the Richmond Olympic Oval in Vancouver: Bodin pushed aneepong to the floor before landing a punch and a kick to the back of his passive ex-partner, before the pair were separated by coaches and tournament staff. Bodin and his new partner later allege the events captured on video were preceded by an attack on Bodin by Maneepong.

Nipitphon Puangpuapech for the match, while Bodin was paired with Pakkawat Wilaikal.

According to the "Morning News" show on Channel 3, Maneepong said Bodin became infuriated when the former made a loud noise after winning a point during the match. The two reportedly provoked each other with vulgar language from that point on. Maneepong said Bodin challenged him to a fight several times during the first game, which was won by Maneepong and Nipitphon 21-12.

Bodin later expressed regret: "... I lost my senses. I feel sorry to have caused this stain on [Thailand's] reputation. I take full responsibility and want this all to end here," he said in a clip broadcast on Channel 3.

An initial investigation of the incident by tournament officials determined that Bodin started the fight. As a result, they awarded the title to Maneepong and Nipitphon.

However, according to Bodin's partner Pakkawat, Maneepong started the whole thing by cursing

Maneepong was teamed with his ex-partner, causing a fuming Bodin to land the first blow. He said Maneepong replied by hitting his former buddy with a racquet. According to the Vancouver Sun newspaper, Bodin needed two stitches to his right ear.

"If you [only] saw the clip, Bodin appears absolutely guilty. But no one saw what happened before that. Maneepong smashed Bodin with a racquet and left him bloody. That's why [Bodin] chased after [Maneepong] as can be seen in the clip," Pakkawat said.

Once a promising duo, Maneepong and Bodin shot to fame in the Kingdom after their sensational style of play took them to the quarterfinals at last year's London Olympics. But they parted due to personal conflicts late last year.

Charoen said on Facebook he had never seen anything like this in his 58 years on the circuit. The badminton boss said he would await a report from the IBF, which will be used as a basis for action to be taken against the guilty parties.

"This is a shame for the

badminton circuits. The International Badminton Federation will take this very seriously.

"From the clip, Bodin appears to be the guilty party and there's a high possibility he could face a lifetime ban. However, to be fair to both parties, we'll have to wait to hear from the IBF."

A tour de force for Froome

FIRST, the bald facts: Chris Froome has triumphed in the hundredth edition of the Tour de France. Last year, victory was claimed by Froome's Sky team-mate, Sir Bradley Wiggins. Remarkable? Absolutely. They are the first Englishmen to win the world's most prestigious and demanding cycle race since its inception. By any standards, it is a most extraordinary achievement.

Not only a British triumph, the 21-stage race over 3,500 kilometers has also been one for the purists, the most competitive Tour for some years. Although the mountainous course was probably the most demanding ever, it was consistently exciting, with more breakaways and more riders chancing their arm. The hill finishes were some of the most punishing and hotly contested in recent memory. Even to complete the tour is an athletic feat of the highest order.

If anything, Froome's achievement is even more emphatic than that of Sir Bradley, whose dominance was based on his superiority in the time-trials. He not only finished four minutes clear of his nearest rivals, but demonstrated an all-round prowess that enabled him to win three stages, including a grueling summit finish at the top of Mont Ventoux. Even in the last climb of the tour, a climb which humiliated his

nearest rival Alberto Contador, he was able to contest the finish. Froome is, moreover, young enough to win the race again and again - a calm, collected young man with remarkable strength of will and powers of recovery. One of his teammates, Ian Stannard, remarked: "He's definitely changed as a leader. He takes on more responsibility. He [has] really lifted his game."

As he reached the line on the darkening cobbles of the Champs Elysees, arms linked with his Sky team-mates, and applauded by 350,000 Parisian spectators, one could see the emotion he so clearly felt. As he said later: "Crossing the line with [the] guys brought tears to my eyes. I expected it to be big, but this is something else." Ever modest, he referred to the healthy state of British cycling: "The youngsters coming through and the way the sport is moving... [is] something to be proud of."

Much of the credit must go to Sir Dave Brailsford, who predicted in 2010 that Britain would have a winner by 2015. Well as Sky Chef de Equipe he has masterminded not one, but two victories, two years ahead of schedule.

Of course, the vexed subject of doping came up like a bad penny. Cycling has been badly scarred by drug scandals in recent years with American Lance Armstrong stripped of all seven of his Tour victories and Spaniard

Alberto Contador's 2010 crown expunged from the records. The 2013 Tour de France may well have been the first "clean" race for a very long time. Both Froome and Brailsford welcomed the new openness in the sport, with Brailsford offering the World Anti-Doping Agency all the data relating to his rider's performances. Sky also gave the information to French sports paper L'Equipe, where it was analyzed by a researcher. He found no anomalies. Froome himself declared: "I'm glad I've had to face all those questions [from the press]. After all the revelations of the past year, I'm glad it has been channeled towards me.'

In a massive boost of confidence for the race, he concluded: "I've been able to deal with it. The peleton is standing together." It augurs well for the future of this legendary event.

Hungary, hunters and hunches



Formula 1 By The Digby

THE Lions destroyed Australia, England is cruising through a shattered Australia in the Ashes, Andy Murray triumphed at Wimbledon and Chris Froome won the Tour de France. As Britons tower over world sports, Lewis Hamilton must be considering his chance of continuing this newfound tradition, starting with a win in Hungary this weekend. Can he do it? Mercedes has been exemplary in qualifying, so either Lewis or Nico Rosberg is quite likely to be on pole on Sunday. But Mercedes struggles with tyre degradation in race conditions.

The Hungaroring is a hot twisty low-speed track with a dirty surface and very few overtaking opportunities. It will reward a good aerodynamic set-up, a driver not easily bored, and the ability to conserve tyres. Qualifying well is crucial, but it's not enough. It's been a long time since the last race, so remember, Hamilton was on pole in Germany, but was roundly beaten off the grid by both Sebastian Vettel and Mark Webber. Hamilton could not match Lotus or Ferrari, either. P5 was more than he had a right to expect. Rosberg achieved nothing after a nightmare Q2.

Drivers will wish to qualify well, but also avoid starting on the dirty side of the track. In 2013, that has been a huge disadvantage, and at Hungaroring, I see it as a signifi-

cantly worse disadvantage than most. Anyone starting on the dirty side risks losing two places at the start. Look for some tactical manoeuvring on that. Remember last season in Austin when Ferrari deliberately broke the seal on Massa's gearbox after qualifying, to earn him a five place penalty, and thereby elevate Alonso to the clean side of the grid.

Prior to this season, Sebastian Vettel had never won his home Grand Prix, or any race in the month of July. He sprinted past Hamilton on the grid, and although both Lotus drivers had the potential to beat him, he won and extended his world championship lead. Webber also beat Hamilton off the line, but his right-rear wheel was not attached when he left his pit stop on lap nine, so it bounced and cracked a cameraman. Webber went a lap down, made that up under the safety car, and took P7 on the penultimate lap. Red Bull is looking very powerful, but in Hungary, is not my favorite to win.

Mercedes should out-qualify them, and Lotus may out-perform them.

Lotus had a great day in Nurburgring. They are back in contention, with Kimi R ikk nen's P2 and Romain Grosjean's P3. Grosjean was within half a second of Sebastian Vettel and we had glorious vision of Grosjean doing something really dangerous and taking both Vettel and himself out of contention. It was not to be. Lotus decided that Kimi should play through on the 55th lap. The team had a cunning plan to run soft tyres on Kimi's final stint. Like so many cunning plans, it was a failure, and Grosjean might have had a better chance of winning. Kimi would have done better not to pit for soft shoes as well, but a problem with his radio, stopped him telling them that. Anyway, 33 points for the Constructors' Championship slightly closed the gap with Red Bull. The Hungaroring will play to their ability to manage tyres in the

I had high hopes for Ferrari in

Germany. And I was disappointed. They gambled by starting Fernando Alonso on worn mediums. I am not sure it was any help. He finished P4, but Felipe Massa took an exotic and terminal spree into the gravel on the fourth lap. Massa's retirements are getting monotonous, and he needs to pull something out of the hat in Hungary. Alonso should do well at the Hungaroring, perhaps better than Vettel.

McLaren has not got its act together, but in Germany looked nearer to being a real team than for a long time, and finished P8 and P9. Sauber was as mediocre as ever in Germany, and we have just heard that Sergey Sirotkin is expected to drive for them next year. Sauber's new Russian partners seem to be behind the stunt, which would smash Jaime Alguersuari's record as the voungest ever grand prix rookie. I doubt if that is what Sauber needs when it loses Hulkenburg, one of the best drivers around.

Force India was disappointingly slow in Germany, but in the Silverstone testing, Adrian Sutil was second fastest, beaten only by Vettel, so perhaps they are ready to go up a notch. Toro Rosso lost Jean-Eric Vergne to a hydraulics problem in Germany, and Daniel Ricciardo, who is a very pretty driver, struggled. He wants to impress Red Bull for a seat next season, and he certainly did that in the Silverstone testing.

Williams did not improve in Germany, and their pit stops were agonizing. Williams has signed engineer Pat Symonds as their chief technical officer to revive their brand. Symonds won world titles with Michael Schumacher and Fernando Alonso, but was banned for five years for his part in fixing the 2008 Singapore GP.

Marussia contributed significantly to the excitement when Bianchi's engine let go. The empty parked car hung around for quite a while and then rolled rearwards leisurely down the slope, and cross the track. The resultant safety car was a rare treat for Nurburgring.

The new tyres tested at Silverstone seem quite similar to their predecessors, so do not expect any radical changes.

Honda announced that it will base its 2015 F1 racing operation in Milton Keynes. That is interesting, because its partner McLaren is based in Woking, but Red Bull is in Milton Keynes. The race is on Sunday at 7pm and qualifying is on Saturday at the same time. Join me at The Green Man to watch it on the Big Screen, where we may also have a Big Surprise.

Going from strength to strength

IN THE 21st century, when women increasingly have the same rights as men, body image ideals have also been increasingly questioned and many women in modern society have become more open, and indeed, proud of their individual body characteristics. One thing is now certain, having a muscular body is no longer an ideal sought only by men.

Many women aspire to have a feminine look – slender legs, an hourglass figure and flawless skin. As a result, diet pills, cosmetic surgery and other body enhancing techniques have proliferated due to this never ending quest for the "perfect

body" as promoted by the fashion, entertainment and celebrity industries. However, not everyone agrees with this popular view of the "perfect body" and Phuket based world champion female body builder Wilaiporn Wannaklang is one of them. For her, big is definitely beautiful.

Standing 150cm tall, Wilaiporn's stature would be considered small by most estimates, but her lean sculpted body is 50kg

of pure muscle and she's not afraid to

Despite disapproval from people around her, especially her family, she sees her bodybuilding as a way to thumb her nose at a society where everybody thinks that a women with a muscular body is something "unnatural" or "unattractive".

The proverb "health is wealth" became a guiding principal of Wilaiporn's life, after she had the chance to talk about dharma with a Buddhist monk in a temple in Lopburi province. The monk told her that to practice religion well, she should take care of herself and live a fit and healthy life. From then on, she started aerobic exercise. But she soon realized that due to a hyperthyroid condition she gets tired easily, which forced her to seek another style of exercise. She decided to go to a gym and start weight lifting with a friend. Four months later she was hooked, and after competing in her first bodybuilding competition in Nakhon Si Thammarat she has never looked back.

From 2009 to 2013, Wilaiporn has won 21 awards. She recently won first place in the Mr Thailand 2013 Women's Bodybuilding, for the third time running. She was also the champion of the 2010 and 2012 Thai-

land National Games Women Bodybuilding Open, the 2012 Siam Classic Women Bodybuilding Open. But her biggest achievement was winning the 2012 World Bodybuilding & Physique Federation (WBPF) Women Bodybuilding (50kg category).

In just six years, she has gone from being an average mother of two to a world champion female bodybuilder, but it hasn't come without struggle, both mental and physical.

She has been on the receiving end of derisive comments questioning her motivation and even her gender. But the same strenth she has used to become champion has helped her ignore these jibes and hold her head up high.

"From the start, I was doing something I loved and believed in. I tried my best and I believed in myself, knowing that one day I'd be successful in what I was doing, no matter what others said. Now, I'm at the point that I have been aiming for," said Wilaiporn with obvious satisfaction.

Women, normally, do not and cannot produce as much testosterone (male hormone) as men do. So, many women who want to increase muscle mass like

men, unfortunately, choose to use anabolic steroids (synthetic testosterone) that are dangerous and very unhealthy. Instead of taking this path, Wilaiporn focuses on what she says is the most important part of building muscles – food.

"Most people think that exercising heavily is the main factor to have a lot of muscles, but actually food is the most important thing you should care about.

"To build muscle mass, you need to exercise the muscle group you want to build. When you're exercising, You're also destroying that group. Then, any protein that you have after exercising will build up the muscle mass in your body, so protein is an important food for bodybuilders," Wilaiporn said.

Different people have different dreams. Although Wilaiporn's dream may be different from other women in the world, she is proof that anyone can pursue their dream, whatever it is, and with effort and dedica-

"I want to be the inspiration for housewives. Women with children can still have six packs and be in good shape. It's true that we don't even reach 10 percent of what our body's capabilities. I think we can always improve our body for the better," said Wilaiporn. Wilaiporn wins big at the 2012 WBPF.

Islanders lock horns with Bulls

PHUKET FC dropped one place to sixth of the 18-team Yamaha League One (YL1), after playing out yet another draw – this time to Bangkok FC in a tense yet thrilling 1-1 deadlock on Saturday evening in Thailand's capital.

Bangkok also lost their 3rd place standing, falling into 4th as a result of the draw and in conjunction with results of other matches this weekend.

The game, both sides' 19th of the 34 fixture list in the 2013 Yamaha League One season, was played in front of about 4,000 spectators at Bangkok's Chalerm Prakiet Stadium in Bang Mod, Thonburi, just off the west bank of the Chao Phraya River.

The stadium's east and west stands were jam-packed with orange and black "Bulligans" fans, while the hardly-noticeable visitor's contingent comprised of some 30 Bangkokbased Phuket supporters.

As to the reason for the unusual absence of a respectable Phuket away-game contingent, there is no doubt that die-hard Hulk supporters, who usually attend such away matches, were still devastated from their recent, disappointing FA Cup road trip to Muang Thong in which the Islanders conceded five unanswered goals.

Nonetheless, in their latest test in the capital, it was Phuket who drew first blood to silence the energetic Bangkok fans in only the 8th minute. The Islander's new Thai signing from Chonburi, Sukree Etae beat the Bangkok keeper at the far post after a meandering run which carved up the Bulls' defense.

Back-and-forth play ensued and the home team would eventually find the equalizer through speedy Ghanaian striker Samuel Donquah, beating Phuket's keeper at the far post on 27 minutes, topping his team's celebration with an impressive display of acrobats to the pleasure of much of the stadium.

Despite commendable attacking attempts by both sides, and a highly anticipated debut of Phuket's key new signing, Christian Alex – onloan from top tier Brazilian club Cruzeiro – the only mentionable highlight in the rest of the match were a series of abusive verbal and physical exchanges – although no one managed to get 'carded' for dissent.

Knocking Phuket out of 5th spot on Sunday was Gulf Saraburi, who prevailed 2-0 away to lowly, Khon Kaen; Bangkok were also bumped down by the Singhtharua Port Lions who downed Trat at home 3-0.

The Port Lions now have 34 points – six more than Phuket and Saraburi and two more than Bangkok; PTT Rayong sealed their 2nd place standing on 41 points after their 1-0 home win to Nakhon
