Fight for your right to work

Go toe-to-toe with police in court, says employment chief

By Saran Mitrarat

ALL foreigners who believe that they have been wrongfully arrested for breaching the conditions of their work permit must fight for their rights, said the chief of the Phuket Provincial Employment Office (PPEO).

"If the police insist on arresting you, let them do it. If they threaten to detain you, let them. You have the right to deny the charge in court. If you have done nothing wrong, you have nothing to fear," PPEO chief Yaowapa Pibulpol told the Gazette this week.

"Do not pay any money 'under the table' if officers ask for it. This only encourages corruption.'

Ms Yaowapa was adamant that only genuine cases of foreigners working illegally would be upheld by the

Killing of Frenchman motivated by revenge

THE Frenchman who police believed was killed during a bungled robbery on April 18 was instead murdered out of revenge, Myanmar national Shwe Oo, a suspect in the killing, confessed to police after his arrest last

The 24-year-old blamed his accomplice, Myanmar national Maung Myo, also 24, for killing Fabrice Boigeol, 37, who was found in a pool of blood partially under a mattress in a room at the Moragot Resort, located off Saiyuan Road in Rawai.

"Maung Myo asked me to go with him that day. We started stealing things from room number three, then we went to room number five. The door was not locked," Mr Shwe said.

Mr Maung had been insulted by the Frenchman in an encounter before April 18 and was still enraged, Mr Shwe explained.

"It made him so angry he wanted to kill the Frenchman. He hit him at the base of the ear with a piece of wood while he was sleeping.

"I tried to tell him to just hit him, but don't kill him, but he hit him two more times after the Frenchman fell from the bed to the floor."



Shwe Oo told police his friend Maung Myo was furious with Mr Boigeol.

After ransacking the room, Mr Maung gave Mr Shwe a camera and the pair fled the resort, Mr Shwe said.

"After I heard that the Frenchman had died, I hid at my friend's house in a rubber plantation," Mr Shwe said.

After days of scouring the area for clues, police arrested Mr Shwe at a rubber plantation near a worker's camp in Wichit on Saturday, National Police Office adviser Ratchata Yensuang told a press conference on April 27.

Officers found Mr Shwe in possession of items stolen from Mr Boigeol, as well as other goods, including a camera, a mobile phone and money stolen from another room at the resort, Gen Ratchata added.

Mr Shwe was charged with theft and murder.

'Officers spotted him walking in front of the Kata Beach Hotel on Thursday night [April 24] and arrested him," he added.

Mr Baturin confessed to the attack and was charged with assault. - Kritsada Mueanhawong

Lifeguards leave posts

No one watching over beaches as dangerous season rolls in

LIFEGUARDS abandoned the island's tourist beaches on Monday after the Phuket Provincial Administration Office (PPAO) failed to break the deadlock surrounding a 22-million-baht lifeguard contract that expired on April 27.

"Since the contract has ended, it is no longer our responsibility to patrol the beaches. All 108 lifeguards have quit their jobs," Phuket Lifeguard Club President Prathaiyut Chuayuan told the Gazette on Monday.

"I have no idea what will happen if someone gets into trouble while lifeguards are not there to help."

Nararit Touyon from the PPAO Tourism Department said that he was unaware of any backup plan to ensure the safety of swimmers as the sea surrounding Phuket becomes more dangerous with the onset of the southwest monsoon season.

"We must find lifeguards to look after the beaches as soon as possible. We know how important it is to maintain safety for swimmers," Mr Nararit said.

The PPAO will hold an auction

The Phuket Lifeguard Club returned all lifesaving equipment, including emergency oxygen tanks, binoculars, rescue boards and floats to the PPAO after their final shifts last Sunday, Mr Prathaiyut confirmed.

Despite a 10-per-cent increase from the budget previously offered and agreed on – a budget which had stayed frozen at 20mn baht for the past three years - Mr Prathaiyut held firm to his desire to increase salaries for his staff without cutting the number of guards that patrol the island's

"We have 108 men working as lifeguards throughout the island daily. If we renew the contract and cut some of the staff, there will only be 88 men on duty - covering the same areas - to look after people's lives," Mr Prathaiyut told the Gazette early last month.

Last year, 928 people were saved by lifeguards from Phuket's waters. However, despite lifeguards' efforts, 23 died, Mr Nararit noted earlier last month.

"I am now waiting to see if the PPAO will call and re-negotiate with us," Mr Prathaiyut said on Monday.

Locals protest, perilous curve gets makeover


SHORT-TERM safety measures are now being implemented to slow down motorists approaching the dangerous "100 bodies curve" and should be completed within a week, confirmed officials.

The construction follows a blockade of Chao Fa West Road between Wang Talang Jewelry and Rolly Tasker Sails that was staged last Sunday by villagers, angry about the conditions of the road and the government's inaction to fix it. The blockade disbanded only after Phuket Governor Maitri Inthusut promised quick solutions to improve safety.

"We are now adding several speed bumps to the road to slow down motorists. Then, we will place plastic poles to divide the lanes along the entire curve. Four flashing lights and permanent signs urging motorists to slow down when approaching the turn will also be installed," Wichit Police Deputy Superintendent Ampol Chunthakul told the Gazette.

"The Phuket Provincial Administration Organization has agreed to give us 3 million baht to build a concrete barrier along the curve. We will begin construction on the barrier after we receive the budget, which should be in about six months," said Col Ampol.

Employment office backs legitimate foreign workers

...[and the court] any 'misunderstandings' the officers may have had," she said.

"Let the judge determine whether or not you are guilty. Many foreigners have successfully defended such charges from the police in the past."

Ms Yaowapa confirmed that penalties for people breaching the conditions of their work permit do not include deportation.

"The only people who should worry about being deported over working illegally are those caught working without any kind of work permit. Doing so breaks immigration law, and immigration officers have the right to deport those individuals," she said.

"Breaching work permit conditions incurs only fines. However, if you continue working after your work permit has expired – that's a jailable offence."

Even then, any penalty can only be handed down by a judge, Ms Yaowapa added (see panel on page 5).

Deputy Secretary-General of the Public Sector Anti-Corruption Commission (PACC) Prayong Preeyachitt voiced his full support for Ms Yaowapa.

He even advised wrongly arrested foreigners to take counter-action.

"If police bring you in for questioning, detain you, then send your case to court – and the court finds you not guilty, you have the right to file a complaint against those officers," he said.

Foreigners acquitted by the court could file a complaint at the

police station where the officer works, with the officer's commanding officer, with the PACC; or at the Damrongtham center (ombudsman's office) at Provincial Hall.

Prapan Kanprasang, chief of the Damrongtham Center, assured that his office was willing to investigate police harassment claims.

"Police have the right to question anyone about suspicious behavior, but they should not repeatedly bring in the same people for questioning about the same matter.

If the same officers are bringing in the same person for the same charge, then it is time to fight back, said the recently reinstated Chalong Police Superintendent Sirisak Wasasiri.

"These kinds of officers should be prosecuted. It will deter others from doing the same," Col Sirisak

"The worse thing to do is give them money. Doing so only encourages them, and they will be back for more."

Working

POOR definitions in work permits have left loopholes that allow criminal foreigners to skirt the law and corrupt officials to take advantage of law-abiding foreigners.

To this, Phuket Provincial Employment Office (PPEO) chief Yaowapa Pibulpol is waging a war to bring common sense to the enforcement of employment regulations.

THE events of March 10, during which Chalong Police rounded up 20 dive instructors and allegedly threatened them with legal action if they did not pay cash fines, has shone a spotlight on what Governor Maitri Inthusut calls "holes"

through which corruption can occur – ambiguous job descriptions in work permits.

Noting that the holes could be filled only with crystal clear job definitions, Governor Maitri set up a task force that is spearheaded by Yaowapa Pibulpol, chief of the Phuket Provincial Employment Office (PPEO).

"The best we can do at this stage is visit the dive shops one

by one to verify the workers are legal and to advise foreign dive staff what they can or can not do to stay within the remit of their work permit," Ms Yaowapa said.

The critical factor for foreign workers to stay legal is to not perform duties beyond the scope of the job description entered in the work permit.

"We see this as the most important aspect as we cannot include all the actual duties a foreign staffer may perform in the work permit itself," Ms Yaowapa explained.

the dive shops to explain clearly what can and cannot be done under the definition in the work permit."

Ms Yaowapa highlighted the example of how job descriptions in work permits did not differen-

tiate between the work done by a dive master and a dive instructor.

"The job description, written in Thai, is the same for both: 'a person who oversees and advises customers on diving techniques and the use of diving equipment to international standards'.

"Please note that the definition does not include suggesting, offering or

advising on any kinds of tour packages, which would be the work of a tour guide or a shop attendant.

"It also does not use the word 'teach', which would mean the foreigner would need to be registered as a teacher and recognized by the Ministry of Education."

That said, Ms Yaowapa admitted that in reality the very function of a dive master and instructor was to "educate", as she explained that her goal was to bring common sense to the enforcement of employment law.





between the Thai lines

"We understand this is what they really do, but they cannot perform duties beyond that. If they need to teach a class at a building, then the address of the dive school should be marked in the work permit.

"But if they need to take students to practice or be tested in a swimming pool or in the sea, they are allowed to do that - and of course travel in between."

The catch was when foreigners "helped" by performing other duties, such as carrying equipment or luggage for tourists.

"If they are genuinely helping, that is fine, but it cannot be a regular part of their duties, part of them doing their job, as that is a vocation reserved for Thais under the Alien Occupation Law," Ms Yaowapa explained.

"Officers appraise such incidents case by case, and there have been many cases where we have found foreigners exploiting this as a loophole in order to not hire more people, namely Thais."

Among the 39 jobs specifically reserved for Thais under the Alien Occupation Law, introduced while the Vietnam War was still raging in 1973, are the following:

- Driving motor vehicles or non-motorized carriers, except for piloting international aircraft;
 - Shop attendant;
- Supervising, auditing or giving services in accounting, except occasional international auditing;
- Brokerage or agency work, except in international business;
- Clerical or secretarial work;
- Hawking goods;
- Working as a tour guide or tour-organizing agent.

However, Ms Yaowapa acknowledged that the above list was "onerous".

"Of course it doesn't apply in all cases," she said, adding that her office recently received a query from an expat in Karon asking if he could paint the balcony ceiling at his own condo.

"If you own the condo, you may do the painting yourself," she

"Any foreigner who would like information on whether they are permitted to do an activity or not is welcome to contact us at the PPEO. We are ready to give advice and answer questions."

The PPEO will not issue any special "documents of permission" affirming foreigners may perform specific activities.

"If one of our officers tells you that you are allowed to do an activity, and the police later stop you and question your right to do it, then bring it to our attention," she said (see page 1).

LIMITED ENGLISH

In response to calls to have job descriptions written in the work permit in English, Ms Yaowapa explained that doing so was a complex task fraught with its own perils.

"Work permits issued for companies operating under the Board of Investment (BoI) often have job positions in English and Thai, but even for these work permits the job description is still in Thai.

"Having job descriptions in English is too complicated to carry out effectively. The translation has to be accurate and has to be approved by the Department of Employment legal division."

Other problems were the possible difference in meanings between the Thai and English descriptions.

"And not all foreigners read English," Ms Yaowapa said.

BOUNDARIES

Although the PPEO is willing to extend the definition of the workplace in the work permit to include all places necessary for the foreigner to perform his or her job, Ms Yaowapa said her office could not issue work permits that were valid in other provinces.

"To work in another province, foreigners must have a work permit issued by the Employment Office in that province," she said.

"A person can have more than one place of work in a permit, and

Work Permit Penalties

- 1. A work permit holder shall carry the permit with himself/herself, or keep it at the place of work while working, ready at all times, for presenting to the competent official or the registrar. Any permit holder who violates or fails to comply with the foregoing shall be liable to a fine of not exceeding 10,000 baht.
- 2. A work permit holder shall engage and perform works only in the particular type of work or job description, and with an employer in certain locality or place of work under stipulated conditions as permitted. Any permit holder who violates or fails to comply with the foregoing shall be liable to a fine of not exceeding 20,000 baht.
- 3. Prior to the expiration of the permit, the permit holder shall submit an application for the permit renewal to the registrar. Any work permit holder who violates or fails to comply with the foregoing and still continue engaging in the work performance as specified in the permit without permission shall be liable to imprisonment for a term of not exceeding five years or to a fine from 2,000 baht to 100,000 baht, or to both.
- 4. In case where it appears that a permit holder violates or fails to comply with the conditions stated in the granted permission, the registrar shall have the power to revoke the work permit.

the company the foreigner works for must have an office in the province where it conducts business.

While embracing a "sensible" approach to allowing foreigners to work in Phuket, Ms Yaowapa warned foreigners from flouting the law.

"I suggest adhering to the job description in the work permit. If you are caught doing work that is plainly beyond the permit, there is nothing we can do to protect you."

Tourists flee Bang Tao wastewater

Local official warns those with open wounds not to swim in the sea

ALARMED officials are concerned how the weather has turned the flow of black wastewater from a canal at Bang Tao toward a beach area where tourists swim.

"All the tourists are afraid to swim here. They are going to Layan Beach instead," said local resident Jumnong Korkaew.


When Governor Maitri Inthusut inspected the site on April 12, the wind pushed the dirty water away from the tourists' swimming zone, he explained.

"The dirty water didn't affect tourists because it flowed toward the area where longtail boats are anchored," said Mr Jumnong.

"But now the wind has changed, and the black water heads directly into the area where tourists swim."

The dirty water has drastically affected local people's incomes, Mr Jumnong said.

"Right now very few tourists come here as the water is worse than ever. The smell and the color

are terrible; the stench sometimes stings my eyes and nose," he added.

"It's because hotels still release wastewater directly into the canal."

Ma-ann Samran, president of

the Cherng Talay Tambon Administration Organization (OrBorTor), warned tourists who have open wounds to avoid going into the water.

"All people, including residents,

tourists and fisherman, please do not go into the sea if you have any cuts on your body," he said.

People who do come into contact with the dirty water should wash the affected areas with clean

water as soon as possible, he

"Our officers are working on the wastewater problem. We will make it better as soon as we can," Mr Ma-ann said.

QUEER

POLICE in Nakhon Ratchasima, the gateway province to Isarn known as "Korat", are investigating a report about a known sex addict who allegedly raped his neighbor's dog, named Dodo.

The incident was brought to light when Attapon Srisopha, the 36-year-old village headman in Tambon Nong Ya Khao, escorted Anuwat Saithong and his three-year-old female Golden Retriever to Sikhio Police Station to file a complaint on March 15.

The nature of the complaint: that a "Mr Cherd", 50, had raped the

"My daughter always took Dodo for walks through our neighborhood," Mr Anuwat said.

"Mr Cherd, a neighbor of mine who is well known in the area as a sex addict, called my daughter to come into his house. She refused and ran home." But Dodo did not follow the girl. "Mr Cherd took Dodo into his house, and we heard howls that made me think he was beating or trying to kill her," Mr Anuwat said.

"I called the headman to help me save my dog. Then the worst thing happened: right in front of me, I saw Mr Cherd having sex with Dodo."

Interrupted, Mr Cherd suddenly pulled up his trousers and ran off.

"Doctors confirmed that the fluid we found on Dodo's body was sperm," Mr Anuwat said.

Mr Cherd was called in for questioning and denied the complaint, said Maj Thanadol Sriwanchai of the Sikhio Police.

"The case is now under investigation and we are waiting to question the dog owner further."

If Mr Cherd is tried and convicted of having sex with the dog, the maximum sentence is a 1,000-baht fine, up to one year in prison, or both.

"Thailand has no laws specifically prohibiting such acts," explained Maj Thanadol.

"The most we can charge him with is inflicting harm on an animal." – Sanook/Daily News

Pian out as Chalermluck wins Patong Mayor poll

UNOFFICIAL results rolled in last Saturday evening, revealing that Phuket Democrat Chalermluck Kebsab of the Patong Fa Mai (New Sky Patong) Party had won the race for the coveted position of mayor in Phuket's premier party town of Patong.

Ms Chalermluck received a total of 4,390 votes, defeating former Patong Mayor Pian Keesin of the *Rak Patong* (Love Patong) Party, who garnered 3,330 votes.

The only other candidate in the mayoral race, Kittisan Kuru of the Patong Gao Na (Patong Progress) Party, scored a total of 580 votes.

Patong has 12,651 registered voters, 8,679 (68.60 per cent) of which showed up to cast their votes last Saturday.

The ballots not tallied into the mayoral count were either marked as a "No Vote" (188 ballots) or were discarded as spoiled ballots

Ms Chalermluck drew the "lucky number 1" slot on the ballot when she registered for a spot in the mayoral race on March 20.

Some of the issues she vowed to address as leader of the city

were: use of public land, environmental protection, floods and traffic problems, including road accidents.

"It now depends on the people of Patong to move the town toward a better future. I cannot do

it alone, I need a hand from the people," she said.

Ms Chalermluck, a Phuket native, is a veteran of island politics, and was voted to serve as a Phuket MP in 2001.

Mr Pian, the long-standing

former Patong Mayor, was ousted from his post in September. He was found guilty of vote fraud early in March this year. Despite being found guilty, the court issued him a "yellow card", allowing him to run for re-election.

Bins to keep dangerous waste safe

MUNICIPALITIES throughout Phuket will launch a project to ensure the separation of hazardous materials from public trash on June 5 in a united effort to prevent dangerous materials from contaminating the island's beaches, canals and the ocean.

Public bins for three kinds of trash – general waste, infectious waste and hazardous waste - will be posted at locations throughout Phuket, said Vice Governor Sommai Prijasilpa.

"Each kind of garbage will be collected on a different day by a different-colored truck," Vice Governor Sommai explained.

The move follows complaints from a tourist who reported seeing another tourist drop used batteries into the sea.

Chinese tourists, skipper injured in speedboat collision

FOUR Chinese tourists and one Thai national were injured on Monday after two speedboats collided at the docks on Koh Khai Nok, off the east coast of Phuket.

"The Nontasak was heading toward the pier at about 3pm and crashed into the Star Andaman, which was carrying 32 Chinese tourists, as it was reversing from the pier," explained Lt Col Chatchai Sakdee of the Phuket Marine Police.

The *Nontasak*, driven by Thaweesak Hantalay, 20, was transporting 18 tourists from Phi Phi Island to Koh Khai Nok.

"Five people on board the Nontasak, including the driver and four Chinese tourists, were injured in the accident and taken to Mission Hospital Phuket," Col Chatchai told

"Mr Theewasak injured his back, and the four tourists, Du Yong, 31; Xing Cheng, 26; Wang Chenxi, 20; and Zhang Yongyan, 23, were treated for minor cuts and bruises."

The five were discharged shortly after receiving treatment for their wounds.

Mr Thaweesak was charged with reckless driving causing a boat accident.

The boating incident on Monday followed a speedboat crash near Ao Nang, Krabi, in February. That accident left six people injured, two of whom were hospitalized.

Police have yet to charge the operators of either boat for that collision.

"We are waiting to question the key witnesses: the two hospitalized passengers from the boat. They were transferred to Bangkok Hospital Phuket to receive treatment," Capt Sophon Kongthong of the Krabi City Police said on Tuesday.

Teens deny police brutality claims

Accused officers apologize for misconduct that may have never happened

TWO of the three teenagers allegedly struck by police officers investigating the rape of a pregnant woman in Phuket on April 20 (see facing page) have publicly declared that the officers never struck them.

"Police did not hit or threaten any of us," one of the teenagers told the press. "They just asked us if there was anything we would like to confess.'

Allegations that four police officers struck the teenagers while searching for the rapists sparked a blockade of Thepkrasattri Road on April 23. The blockade created Phuket's worst traffic jam on

As part of the negotiations to end the blockade, the four officers – Lt Akarapol Siwilai, Sub Lt Manus Faipetch, Sgt Maj Sansak Choti and Sgt Yongyuth Ritplud were immediately removed from active duty at Tah Chat Chai Police Station and ordered to report to the Phuket Provincial Police Station in Phuket Town.

Two of the teenagers were present in front of the press at a meeting at Provincial Hall last Saturday. The third was represented by his parents, though no reason was given for the boy's inability to attend the conference.

The four officers were present as well, and Lt Akarapol offered an apology for the misconduct that apparently never happened.

"Everything we did was in accordance with the law. It might

seem rough, but it is how police work," he said, speaking on behalf of his fellow officers.

"Please accept our apology for anything we did that made you feel uncomfortable."

Lt Akarapol said that the three teenagers were in no way suspected of being associated with the twin brothers who have since confessed to the rape.

"I would also like to affirm that we did not assault, handcuff or bring those three teenagers to the police station. We saw them at the gas station and just talked with them," he said.

One of the teenagers said that a photo of a gun saved in his mobile phone prompted officers to search one of their homes.

"After seeing the photo of the gun, they asked to search my house, but they didn't find anything and they let us go," he said.

No reason was provided as to why the teenager had a photo of a gun saved in his phone, who owned the gun or where the gun was being kept.

Governor Maitri Inthusut offered advice of forgiveness.

"We must understand each other. Police have to do their best when investigating a case, but they have to be 'softer' when questioning people," he said.

'And people have to understand how police work, because questioning suspects has led police to arresting suspects in many

"Everyone makes mistakes, but the most important thing is forgiveness."

Wiroj Manakit, chief (Kamnan) of Tambon Mai Khao, accused "third parties" of inflaming emotions among protesters on April 23.

"Our main purpose for the protest was to see justice for the woman," he said. "But third parties, people who had been previously arrested by these officers, mixed in with the crowd and called for the four police officers to be removed."

Mr Wiroj personally attested to working with the officers.

"I have close relations with these four officers, as we have worked together on arresting drug suspects," he said.

"I understand the reasons for the behavior of all parties involved in this, but I am not sure that most people will come to the same understanding as mine."

Tah Chat Chai Superintendent Somchai Sanprasert requested that the officers be reinstated at the Tah Chat Chai Police Station.

"These four guys did great work which led to the arrest of the rape suspects within 30 hours of the incident," Col Somchai said.

However, Provincial Police Deputy Commander Peerayut Karajedee denied the request.

"We must honor our promise to the protesters," he said. "We have to find replacements for them as soon as possible. Otherwise, I believe there will be a marked increase in crime in the Tah Chat Chai area," he said.

'She had to beg for her life'

Mother tells of pregnant 25-year-old daughter's rape ordeal in Mai Khao

THE mother of the pregnant woman raped by twin teenage brothers in Phuket on April 20 has told the *Gazette* how the men ignored her daughter's pleas for mercy.

"She begged them not to do it, but they didn't listen," the mother said. "They didn't only rape and rob her. They choked her very hard as if they wanted to kill her."

"They only stopped because passing motorists scared them off," she added.

The victim – a 25-year-old mother already looking after two children and five months pregnant with her third child – was attacked and raped while riding a motor-bike along a dark road between Wat Mai Khao and Thepkrasattri Road at about 10:30pm.

The two 17-year-old brothers have confessed to the attack.

"It feels like someone has stuck a knife through my heart. How could they do that to her? Anyone can see that she is pregnant," said the victim's mother, wiping tears from her face.

"I don't know what to say, those two men broke my heart."

Staff at Vachira Phuket Hospital confirm that the victim was

discharged on April 24.

"Her brother picked her up and told us that he would be looking after her until she felt safe enough to live by herself," a staffer at the One-Stop Crisis Center* said.

"The physical health of the woman and the baby are fine. The expectant mother's broken leg is recovering well and her mental health is stable.

"She was able to converse with

us. She managed a smile and even a laugh. However, we have made appointments for her to come to the center for further checkups. She must come back for these checkups to make sure she will be able to live a normal life."

The woman's mother, however, doubts her daughter will fully recover.

"She will suffer for the rest of her life. I do not know if she is strong enough to live a normal life," she said.

"She separated from her husband before she knew she was pregnant with their third child. We have heard nothing from him since he left

"She looks after the children by herself. He has never given any support."

Tah Chat Chai Police Superintendent Somchai Sanprasert told

the *Gazette* that his investigators are waiting for test results to confirm whether or not the two rapists have tested positive for drugs.

"We tested the two suspects for drug use. However, we have yet to receive the urine test results," he said.

Lt Col Somchai declined to confirm or refute the mother's claim that the two men attempted to strangle her daughter.

The victim's mother called on police to arrange for the men to apologize for the attack in person.

"I hope police will bring the suspects to apologize to my daughter and the family," she said.

"I urge everyone who has children to look after them well, to teach them decency. Do not let them go out and do such things."

The horrific rape spurred outrage among local villagers, who staged an eight-hour blockade of Phuket's critical Thepkrasattri Road on April 23 (see facing page).

Fifty killed by H1N1

FIFTY people have been killed by seasonal influenza, which has hit more than 30,000 people this year, prompting the Public Health Ministry to be on alert.

Public Health permanent secretary Narong Sahametapat said that he had instructed all public and private hospitals to watch for possible cases of infection with the H1N1 virus, reported *The Nation*.

Doctors were asked to administer Oseltamivir to patients immediately if their condition does not improve in two days.

Mr Narong said that of 30,024 seasonal influenza cases reported this year, most of the illness was caused by the H1N1 virus.

Compared with the same period last year, the number of influenza cases has jumped by 36 per cent, he said, adding that no one was killed by influenza last year.

Mr Narong said that most Thais did not have a strong immunity against the H1N1 virus so it was expected that many people would be hit by it.

He said the ministry had formed a panel of experts to monitor the situation to provide advice to doctors nationwide.

Mr Narong added that the ministry would soon provide vaccinations against H1N1 to the most at-risk groups. – *The Nation*

More troops called in as Bangkok crisis heats up

THE government is to ask the army to deploy more troops in Bangkok as fears mount that the country's lengthy political crisis could move into a more violent phase.

Surapong Tovichakchaikul, a deputy prime minister, voiced concern on Friday about the potential for clashes between pro- and antigovernment groups if Prime Minister Yingluck Shinawatra is ousted in May as a result of legal cases brought against her.

Ms Yingluck has been charged with abuse of power for her transfer of National Security Council chief Thawil Pliensri in 2011, which opponents say was done for personal and party political reasons. If found guilty, she may have to step down.

"There are important legal cases coming up next month and the red shirts will rally," said Mr Surapong, who heads the Centre for the Administration of Peace and Order that coordinates the state's handling of the protests.

The red shirts are supporters of the Shinawatras and Ms Yingluck's government and they have vowed to resist any bid to force Ms Yingluck from office, by either the anti-government protesters or the courts.

"We are worried there will be violence and clashes between the protesters and the red shirts, which is why we must increase the presence of troops to protect security," Mr Surapong said.

A February 2 election that Ms Yingluck looked set to win was

disrupted by the protesters.

As a result, a court nullified the election in March and the Election Commission has yet to set a date for an election.

Ms Yingluck's brother, ousted premier Thaksin Shinawatra, or his loyalists have won every election since 2001. Mr Thaksin lives abroad to avoid a jail term for graft he says

was politically motivated is widely seen as the guiding hand behind his sister's government.

Weeks of political upheaval have hit tourism and business confidence and left Thailand without a properly functioning government.

Opposition leader and former Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva also warned of an escalation in violence next month and offered to help kick-start dialogue between the different parties and groups involved in the protest.

"I think there are many people who want to see common ground emerging. My intention this week is to say that: isn't it time we all

accept the reality that neither side can get its way, and even if it did, it couldn't bring long-lasting stability," he said in an interview.

Mr Abhisit met Armed Forces Supreme CC Gen Thanasak Patimaprakorn on Monday to ask for two weeks to try to resolve the crisis peacefully.

"He (Thanasak) supports what I want, which is to bring all sides together to find a way out for the country," Mr Abhisit told reporters after the two-hour meeting. "The commander underscored that political problems must be solved through political means."

Malaysia cites 'sensitivities' as Obama struggles to push TPP pact

MALAYSIAN Prime Minister Najib Razak said last Sunday that he and US President Barack Obama had agreed to upgrade bilateral relations but suggested that his country remains far from ready to sign a US-led trade pact due to domestic "sensitivities".

Mr Obama's visit to Malaysia follows his swing through Japan, where he failed to clinch a trade deal key to the US "rebalancing" back to Asia. Such a deal would have injected momentum into the delayed 12-nation Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP) trade pact.

PM Najib's ambition to bring Malaysia into Mr Obama's flag-

ship trade plan has been undercut by the resurgent influence of traditionalists within his own ruling party following a weak election showing last year.

Early this month, a Malaysian cabinet minister was reported as saying the country was a long way from being able to sign a TPP deal and that the priority should be on economic integration within the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (Asean) bloc.

Mr Najib said Malaysia was committed to free trade, and denied that Washington was "bullying" the Southeast Asian nation into joining the controversial pact.

"We are working around the sensitivities and challenges which I alluded to in my discussions with President Obama," Mr Najib told a joint news conference in Putrajaya.

Rohingya health crisis as NGOs forced out

AS THREE-MONTH-OLD Asoma Khatu approached her final, labored breaths, her neighbor Elia, a 50-year-old former farmer, dug through the strongbox holding some of the last medicines in this camp for Myanmar's displaced Rohingya.

First, some paracetamol for the severely malnourished girl's fever and a wet towel for her forehead. Then some rehydration salts for her diarrhoea. There was nothing else left.

The death of Asoma in a dusty, stifling hot camp a two-hour boat ride from Sittwe, capital of Rakhine State in west Myanmar, is part of a growing health crisis for stateless Muslim Rohingya that has been exacerbated by restrictions on international aid.

"I think my child would have made it if someone was here to help," Asoma's mother, Gorima, told Reuters, as she cradled the girl's shrouded, almost weightless body in her arms.

In February, Myanmar's government expelled the main aid group providing health to more than half a million Rohingya in Rakhine State – Medecins Sans Frontieres-Holland (MSF-H) after the group said it had treated people believed to have been victims of violence in southern Maungdaw township, near the Bangladesh border, in January.

The United Nations says at least 40 Rohingya were killed there by Buddhist Rakhine villagers. The government denies any killings occurred.

Attacks on March 26 and 27 on NGO and UN offices by a Rakhine mob angered by rumors a foreign staffer for another group, Malteser International, had desecrated a Buddhist flag, led to the withdrawal of aid groups providing healthcare and other essential help to another 140,000 Rohingya living in camps after being displaced by violence since 2012.

The government had pledged to allow most NGOs to return to full operation after the end of Buddhist New Year celebrations this month.

But so far only food distribution by the World Food Program has returned to normal, and Rakhine community leaders in the state government's Emergency Coordination Center have imposed conditions on others wanting to go back.

NGOs will only be allowed to operate if they show "complete transparency" in disclosing their travel plans and projects and are not seen to favor Rohingya, said Than Tun, a Rakhine elder who is part of the centre. Neither MSF-H nor Malteser are being allowed back in, he said. - Reuters

Saudi Arabia sees 73 per cent boost in MERS cases

SAUDI Arabia confirmed last weekend 26 more cases of Middle East Respiratory Syndrome (MERS), which has killed nearly a third of those infected.

Saudi Arabia has identified 339 confirmed cases of MERS since it was discovered there two years ago, 102 of which have been fatal. The 143 cases announced since the start of April represent a 73 percent jump in total infections.

China tightens grip on online freedom

THERE can be no internet freedom without order, China's top Communist Party newspaper said on Monday after several United States television shows were pulled from Chinese video sites.

The removal of the shows coincides with a crackdown on online freedoms that has intensified since President Xi Jinping came to power last year, reports Reuters.

Italian navy rescue 1.800 from sea

ITALIAN navy and coastguard vessels have rescued about 1,800 more people from boats in rough seas off Sicily, authorities said last Friday.

More than 20,000 migrants have arrived by sea in Italy through North Africa and the Middle East so far this year, a movement which has intensified since the "Arab Spring" upheavals of 2011 and the civil war in Syria.

African platinum strike end in sight

THE end to South Africa's big platinum strike is drawing near after the producers said they would take their latest wage offer directly to employees after talks to end the 13-week strike collapsed on April 24.

Despite the unprecedented scale of the stoppage, which has hit 40 per cent of global platinum production, the spot price is little changed since the miners downed tools on January 23.

Court seeks death for 682 Brotherhood members, leader

AN EGYPTIAN court has recommended the death sentence for the leader of the Muslim Brotherhood and 682 supporters, and handed down a final capital punishment ruling for 37 others, judicial sources said on Monday.

Seeking the death penalty for Mohamed Badie, the Brotherhood's general guide, is certain to raise tension in Egypt, which has been gripped by turmoil since the army removed the Brotherhood from power last year.

He is charged with crimes including inciting violence that followed the army overthrow of Islamist president Mohamed Mursi last July. The session could mark the first major

verdict against any Brotherhood leader

The 37 death sentences were part of a final judgment on 529 Muslim Brotherhood supporters who were sentenced to death last month. The remaining defendants were sentenced to life in jail.

Death sentence recommendations in the case involving Mr Badie will be passed on to Egypt's Mufti, the highest religious authority. His opinion is not legally binding and can be ignored by the court.

The authorities have branded the Brotherhood a terrorist group, an allegation it denies.

South Korean PM resigns over bad government call

SOUTH Korean Prime Minister Chung Hong-won announced his resignation on April 27 over the government response to the ferry disaster, in which it was first announced that everyone had been rescued.

The Gyeonggi Provincial Office of Education sent text messages to parents that "All Danwon High School students are rescued" in the hours after the disaster, media reported.

The Sewol ferry sank on a routine trip south from the port of Incheon to the traditional holiday island of Jeju on April 16.

More than 300 people, most of them students and teachers on a field trip from the Danwon High School on the outskirts of Seoul, have died or are missing and presumed dead.

The children on board the Sewol were told to stay put in their cabins, where they waited for further orders. The confirmed death toll as of April 27 was 187.

South Korea, Asia's fourthlargest economy and one of its leading manufacturing and export powerhouses, has developed into one of the world's most technically advanced countries, but faces criticism that regulatory controls have not kept pace.

As part of the investigation, prosecutors raided two shipping safety watchdogs and a coastguard

office. They have also raided two vessel service centers, which act as maritime traffic control.

Mr Chung's resignation was approved by President Park Geunhye, although her spokesman said later that Mr Chung would remain in post until the rescue operation was completed.

"Keeping my post is too great a burden on the administration," a sombre Mr Chung said in a brief announcement.

"On behalf of the government, I apologize for many problems from the prevention of the accident to the early handling of the disaster.

"There are too many irregularities and malpractices in parts of society that have been with us too long and I hope those are corrected

so that accidents like this will not happen again."

Mr Chung was booed and someone threw a water bottle at him when he visited grieving parents the day after the disaster. President Park was also booed by some relatives when she visited a gym where families of the missing were staying.

Tempers have frayed over the slow pace of the recovery and frequent changes in information provided by the government.



West targets Putin's inner circle with more sanctions

THE United States imposed new sanctions on allies of Russian President Vladimir Putin on Monday, prompting Moscow to denounce "Cold War" tactics amid more violence in eastern Ukraine.

The move to ban visas and freeze assets of the likes of Mr Putin's friend Igor Sechin, head of oil giant Rosneft ROSN.MM, also drew fire from President Barack Obama's domestic critics. who called it a "slap on the wrist."

European Union states also

added 15 more Russians and Ukrainians to their blacklists.

"The goal is not to go after Mr Putin personally," Mr Obama said. "The goal is to change his calculus with respect to how the current actions that he's engaging in Ukraine could have an adverse impact on the Russian economy over the long haul."

Western countries say sanctions are already having an effect on Russia by scaring investors into pulling out capital. – *Reuters*

BKK's green virtues



Suvarnabhumi opens museum highlighting the airport's features.

SUVARNABHUMI'S Airport has now been operational for nearly eight years and, despite the political complexity involved in its development and construction, the airport remains one of the few mega-projects driving Thailand's economic growth.

On the occasion of His Majesty the King's 84th birthday celebrations in 2011, the Airport Authority of Thailand, Suvarnabhumi's operator, decided to establish the Suvarnabhumi Airport Museum.

The building and interiordesign schemes for the museum were completed in 2008, and construction took place from 2010 to 2012.

The museum complex consists of a central space that houses an exhibition on the airport's history. This main bay is surrounded by smaller satellite structures that accommodate airline offices, while a bridge connects the museum complex to the main terminal.

Sustainability was highlighted in the design brief for the museum. Design decisions were pursued in consideration of heat and noise reduction, daylighting, and reduction of UV and infrared exposure.

The building was designed to reduce energy consumption, CO2 emissions and other damaging outputs. The main airport terminal consumes energy at a rate of as much as 3 million baht per day; in contrast, the design of the museum focuses on conservation and excellent provision of thermal, lighting, acoustic and visual performance.

The building consumes less energy, since the exterior wall has a thermal resistance, or R-value, which enhances interior cooling. The building's cooling load averages 100 square metres per ton of air-conditioning, compared to the main terminal's load of 8-12sqm per ton.

The HVAC system is unique. Fresh air passes into the building from the ceiling level and cycles back outside via rises in the floor. The rise is a lightweight system constructed from metal decks and non-flammable EPS (expanded polystyrene) foam as thermal insulation.

Overall, the museum is an active case study in sustainable design, which may provide cues in the renovation of the main airport terminal.

Freehold versus leasehold

FROM my experience in selling Bangkok condominiums, 70% of buyers will turn down a leasehold condominium without even looking into the details of the property. Most of them hold the belief that a leasehold condominium is a depreciating asset and, therefore, they would rather buy a perpetual freehold title.

By definition, a condominium is, "a strata title property within a juristic development where the owner has a perpetual freehold title and the common property is managed through a juristic management committee and subject to the Condominium Act".

Based on this definition, there should be no leasehold condominiums, but the term was commonly used in the market as referring to a long-term lease apartment with the rent being paid up front.

In Thailand, the maximum leasehold period that can be registered is only 30 years. Even if the developer or landlord wishes to grant a series of extensions up to 90 or 120 years, no leasehold term can go beyond the 30-year cap. The only option is to renew the lease by following the legal process of registration for the renewals, which can only be done at the end of each 30-year period.

Despite the term limit, there are various reasons for leasehold condominiums continuing to be developed. Firstly, because the land-title deeds belong to an institution such as the Crown Property Bureau, a foundation or the government, whose land will not be available for freehold title.

Second, individual landowners do not want to sell the land freehold titles, as they want to maintain ownership for the next generation – so they prefer to sell just the leasehold right for 30 years.

Third, in a market where the majority of buyers are foreigners, most developers

tend to choose leasehold ownership, which enables them to sell unlimited space to foreign buyers, while freehold ownership is only allowed for up to 49% of the overall property.

Lastly, in resort development, which aims at hotel-managed units with guaranteed returns, developers commonly sell the units on leasehold titles rather than free-hold as the hotel needs total management control of the property to ensure proper maintenance and services.

CBRE Thailand has experience in selling both freehold and leasehold condominiums. I have found that leasehold condominiums have some advantages over freehold ones. It is fair to say that a freehold condominium of equal quality and equally good management is a better investment than a leasehold property.

However, the factremains that most developers or landlords who own the property intend to keep their asset for the long term. They have a superior attitude as to building quality and maintenance standards.

In addition, leasehold property is not subject to the Condominium Act. Therefore, management decision-making can be done by the landlords themselves, who either manage the property on their own or appoint and enter into a long-term contract with a top-quality manager or hotel operator.

The drawback of a freehold condominium is management through a juristic body, which relies on a concept of majority votes and democracy. This is ideal in principle, but in practice it can create disputes over services and budgets which demonstrate lack of strong and clear leadership, consistency and efficiency in management decisions.

Moreover, a juristic body where the juristic committee changes annually cannot effectively enter into long-term

service contracts.

With more and more problems of property management in freehold condominiums being experienced by buyers, I have noticed that more people – especially end-user buyers – are starting to consider buying a leasehold condominium located in a prime location.

Buyers could then be assured over property management either by using a branded hotel chain or being managed by the landlords themselves, who can ensure continuity in the operation and project and who can plan for long-term maintenance, renovation and management of the property.

This is one of the advantages of leasehold. I still believe, however, that even with this advantage, the majority of buyers still prefer freehold. Leasehold property using the strength of management will be effective in prime locations where freehold land is rarely available. In Bangkok today, we see luxury leasehold properties with strong sales performance in both occupational and investment demand on Rajdamri Road, including The Residences at The St Regis Bangkok and Magnolias Ratchadamri Boulevard.

This does not mean that every freehold condominium is an inferior product to every leasehold property, but it does highlight the need for freehold-condominium owners to learn and develop good property-management standards.

Staying out of the heat

THERE is a smart way to reduce in-home temperatures with innovations that can be easily and efficiently applied to various types of residential property, from detached housing and townhouses to commercial row housing.

Each type of house faces a different challenge from heat and requires a fine-tuned application of these systems to comfort the home and its occupants, Tra Chang knowledge-development specialist Thammatorn Kraikokit said recently.

Tra Chang is a brand of raw construction materials that is produced by SCG Group.

Mr Thammatorn shared homeimprovement tips to defy the summer, using cooling systems that enable flexible application across various types of housing.

A detached house is normally a person's dream home, but it comes with so many design possibilities that it blinds many people from heat issues – because a stand-alone house can easily take in heat from all directions.

To solve the problem, homeowners should seek ways to prevent and draw out heat that would otherwise penetrate through the roof and walls, and also reduce heat that enfolds the house.

Light colors are, for example, recommended for the roofing tiles because they absorb less heat than dark ones.

To reflect heat away, Ultra-Cool heat-reflective insulation should be installed under the roof, and to prevent heat in the loft from entering the interior, lay Stay Cool heat-barrier insulation atop the ceiling of the upper floor, said Thammatorn.

A house-cooling effect can be enhanced with good ventilation in the loft by using ventilated ceiling board at the eaves. As for the walls, use the Cool Wall system at the sides that directly face the sun.

By covering the exterior concrete floor with Cool Plus paving blocks, excessive heat from all-day exposure to the sun can be reduced. Having some shading trees around the house similarly helps cool down exterior space, he explained.

Meanwhile, heat in townhouses is commonly addressed with the use of awnings, which is helpful to some degree. Since townhouses in the same block share the same roof, reducing heat that enters through the roof involves – in addition to blanketing Stay Cool insulation atop the ceiling – partitioning the loft of the house from that of next-door neighbors' by using insulation board.

For end townhouses, Smart Wood lattice panel helps shade and cool down the exterior wall that is exposed to direct sunlight. This also doubles as a blind for a greater feeling of privacy, he said.

A problem shared in commercial row houses is excessive heat of spaces directly under the rooftop, because heat greatly accumulates in the concrete base of the rooftop from all-day exposure to the sun.

With these simple homeimprovement steps, summer heat in any house can be reduced, be it a detached house, townhouse or commercial row house – old and new alike.

Not only will your home sweet home become more comfortable to live in, your electricity bills can also be cut, giving you long-term savings from your smart investment, said Thammatorn.

How to invest in Myanmar

AS IT is just a short trip from Phuket, I find myself spending more and more time in Myanmar, and I am also becoming more and more convinced of the very promising future of the country. You may have read my previous article in the Gazette on the country, and I am far more convinced now than I was then.

A question I am frequently asked while speaking with many of my fellow Phuket expats after I have gone on my rant about how exciting the current environment there is becoming is "How can I take part?" Unfortunately, this is a difficult question to answer, and things are changing so fast that by the time this goes to print the answer may have changed.

I was shocked to recently find out the country doesn't even have intellectual property laws in effect yet. The laws have been legislated now and should come into place shortly, but the country is currently in a race to catch up with the interest it is receiving now that it has decided to open back up to the world.

Another snag is that, currently, importing and exporting is a practice that is reserved for only 100%

ventures cannot even do this. Thus, any company that does not set up and manufacture locally has to place a certain amount of trust in a local importer or exporter. These restrictions get in the way of the most obvious business opportunities most people will initially think of, such as finding a local manufacturer and exporting to countries that previously had been off limits due to embargoes. It is tough to know if these restrictions will be lifted. I think they may eventually, but my guess is the fear of changing too fast and the problems that could come along with it will cause them to stay in place for quite some time.

There are several routes to opening up a Burmese company, and one difference from Thailand is that a company can be 100% foreign owned. If it is a subsidiary of a foreign company and no revenue generating activities are performed in the country, then a representative office can be opened with a minimum investment level of \$50,000 USD. This is a similar level to the two million baht of registered capital required to open a Thai limited company.

There are two main categories for a Burmese private limited comlocally owned companies. Joint pany which can be used to open a

company by foreigners, those under the Myanmar Companies Act (CA) and those under the Myanmar Foreign Investment Law (MFIL). The main difference is that MFIL companies can receive tax incentives, but they are required to have a much larger capital base (\$500,000 for manufacturing and \$300,000 for service companies). The set-up is slightly more complex as well. A CA company can perform the same activities, and the capital requirements of \$150,000 for a manufacturing company and \$50,000 for a service company make this route much more accessible for your average entrepreneur.

The stock exchange is in the process of getting set up, so as of now investing in direct equities is not an option. However, it should be coming soon and this will most likely provide a lower cost and passive avenue for investing in the country. At the moment, the only active and direct approach of opening some kind of company makes investing in the country cost prohibitive with small amounts of capital. Of course, the rewards are usually less with passive investing than with active, and it will have to be seen if the opening levels of Myanmar listed companies start off trading at valuation levels that even

make sense for investing. Given the optimism at the moment there, the stock market could launch right of the gates at bubble levels. Only time will tell, but I believe very strongly that we are seeing a once in a lifetime opportunity in Myanmar.

Thai investors need to shed old perceptions of Myanmar

MYANMAR is a land of opportunity, but Thai investors who go there in search of a piece of the action should change their perceptions of the country, Pisanu Suvanajata, Thai ambassador to Myanmar, has suggested.

He considers perception to be a key barrier to investing in Myanmar, and points out that Thai investors still misunderstand the country, holding on to old memories of drug trafficking, ethnic disputes and extreme poverty. In fact, this land of 53.3 million people has rapidly changed both its economic and political landscapes via a series of reform initiatives, he said, adding that such progress was sending out a good signal for those considering doing business in Myanmar.

Economically, he said its gross domestic product was projected to grow in a stable manner over the long term, with growth this year estimated at 9.1 per cent. As to per capita income, Pisanu cited the Asian Development Bank's projection of it rising from an annual US\$850 (27,430 baht) currently to \$2,000 to \$3,000 by 2030.

Interestingly, he said, Myanmar's economy had continued to grow even during the period of sanctions. It only turned to negative growth during the country's national political crisis. Its rising prosperity can be seen from the traffic congestion on its city streets, and also from the ongoing inflow of foreign investment. Further evidence is that the number of local people travelling abroad is on the rise, the diplomat said.

Moreover, in regard to tourists visiting the country, the number was 200,000 just three years ago, but this rose to 1.6 million last year - with a further increase to 1.8 million expected this year.

Tourism certainly offers a big business opportunity. Beyond the large cities of unspoiled city located on the coast of an island in the Andaman Sea - is also attractive for investment.

Pisanu spoke to a delegation of 125 Thais in Yangon recently, the majority of them members of the Association of Thai Travel Agents (ATTA). They were keen to explore business opportunities from Mandalay and Naypyidaw to Yangon.

The Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) Hong Kong office will launch a pilot campaign to lure couples in Hong Kong to legally marry in Phuket.

The pilot project alone is expected to generate 124 million baht for the Phuket economy.

To introduce the concept, TAT Hong Kong office director Titiporn Manenate brought a delegation of leading wedding planners from Hong Kong to meet Phuket Vice Governor Sommai Prijasilpa at the Phuket Provincial Hall yesterday afternoon.

Joining the delegation in support was Khanthong Nuanual, the Thai Consul General in Hong Kong.

"About 65,000 marriages are registered each year in Hong Kong," said Ms Titiporn.

The pilot project aims to bring just 100 couples to Phuket by offering special wedding packages valued at HK\$300,000 (about 1.2mn baht) up to HK\$400,000 (1.68mn baht).

Southern Thai beaches remain popular with tourists

THAILAND'S Southern beach resort regions remain some of the most popular holiday destinations for international tourists, with hotels in the area reporting occupancy rates of up to 78% during the first quarter of this year.

According to figures from the Tourism Authority of Thailand's (TAT) eight domestic offices and two coordination centers in Southern Thailand – Krabi, Phang Nga, Chumphon and Surat Thani have been attracting a consistently high number of tourists throughout the January to March period.

In Krabi and Phang Nga, hotels reported occupancy rates hovering at 75% and 78%, respectively - levels that match last year's numbers. These healthy occupancy rates can be attributed to the enduring popularity of islands in Krabi such as Ao Maya, Ko Hong and Hat Railay, which are thronged with local and international tourists especially during the long public holidays.

Mr Thawatchai Arunyik, TAT Governor said, "The figures speak for themselves that Thailand remains a popular and welcoming tourist destination. Our Southern provinces, in particular Phuket, Krabi and Samui, have seen an increasing number of domestic and international direct flights, meaning that foreign visitors and locals alike can cut down the travelling time, needed to travel via Bangkok, to Southern resorts and enjoy our pristine beaches and islands for weekends as well as for longer

Phang Nga, just one hour's drive from Phuket, recorded an average length of stay of 5.81 days. About 90% of visitors to Phang Nga are from overseas, with tourists from Germany topping the rank in terms of arrivals, followed by visitors from Scandinavia and other European countries.

Phang Nga can boast the highest numbers of tourist arrivals, as well as visitors to its many attrac-

tions. Ao Phang Nga recorded approximately 5,000 visitors per day; Ko Khai saw some 3,000 visitors per day; and Ko Ta Chai attracting some 400 daily visitors. The Similan and Surin Islands each received 200-300 visitors arriving every day. On the mainland, the recently opened Dairy Hut Farm on Phang Nga-Tubpud Road has been a great success and is particularly popular with family holiday-makers and teenagers.

In Krabi, which has its own airport but can also be reached via Phuket (about 176 km or two hours by car), it is the community-based tourism activities; such as, those found at Ban Ko Klang, Khlong Prasong and Ko Poo and Ko Jum that are popular. Inland, tourism activities such as cycling trips amid the limestone peaks and rubber plantations are popular. Tourists also get the chance to see palm plantations and take boat trips to learn about the community's ecology and mangrove forests.

Chumphon, another Southern Thai province on the coast of the Gulf of Thailand remains popular, being the port that serves the famous Koh Tao and Koh Nang Yuan islands. The region has recently maintained its normal occupancy rate of around 55%. In Chumphon province itself, popular destinations include Hat Sairee, Hat Tung Wua Laen and the Shrine of Krom Luang Chomphon, which are favorite destinations for local

Nearby Surat Thani is also attracting an increasing number of meetings, incentives, conferences and events (MICE) travellers and stop-over tourists looking to continue their journey to other destinations, including the famous Koh Samui, Koh Phangan or Koh Tao. Surat Thani's Ratchaprapa Dam and water reservoir, farm stays and important religious sites still attract local and international tourists. Occupancy rate for hotels in this area are an impressive 95%. – TAT

Policing a Protestocracy

FEW stories in recent memory better reflect the collective failure of local police to maintain law and order than the recent blockade of Thepkrasattri Road by residents of Thalang (see page 8).

The closure paralyzed traffic in the north of the island for more than eight hours, inconveniencing untold thousands of visitors — many of whom will never choose to include Phuket as part of their future travel plans.

The crime which precipitated this sad chain of events was indeed heinous: the attack by two teenagers of a young woman, whom they robbed and raped at roadside, over her cries for mercy because she was pregnant (see page 9).

The very nature of the crime no doubt struck a chord with local residents, who are no strangers to blockading the island's central artery when they feel that justice has been denied, or injustice applied, to members of their tight-knit community.

Repeated blockages of a section of Thepkrasattri Road following accidents at the dangerous curve near the off-ramp to Kor En Village over the years attest to this fact. In this case, their actions were clearly inappropriate and misdirected.

Allegations of police brutality against three local youths who police questioned during their investigation were subsequently shown to be false, showing just how quickly clear communication – and then law and order – can break down in this era of "protestocracy".

It also shows just how impotent police are in such circumstances. Indeed, it is official action – or lack thereof – that remains the most common cause of public protest in Phuket, even despite all the political turmoil of the times.

The horrific crimes against the pregnant mother of two can't be compared to the inconvenience experienced by the thousands stuck in traffic due to the roadblock. Nonetheless, those thousands represent the cash flow necessary for Phuket's tourism industry, which in no small way supports the country as a whole.

And this roadblock is not an isolated incident – just last Sunday, residents blockaded Chao Fa West Road to urge officials to fix a dangerous curve in the area (see page 3). Tuk-tuk blockades are well known to islanders; the most recent, in Patong on March 3, claimed police persecution and lasted five and a half hours. Just a month before that, the Patong beach road was blocked by a group complaining about police extortion.

For the sake of the island's future, Phuket Provincial Police need to establish a special emergency response team to better deal with such road blockages which, due to past inaction, seem to be increasing in frequency.

Kids to save Karon

First PERSON

KARON is facing critical environmental and social problems: drugs, robberies, traffic, wastewater and garbage management.

The main reason we have these problems is because officials have been focusing more on objects than on people. For almost ten years, Karon has been one of Phuket's most important tourist destinations, and officials have prioritized the development of tourism here, supporting all kinds of facilities for

What has slipped through the cracks is support for the education of local school children.

That support is especially important because the children we are teaching at Wat Suwankeereekate School are not rich; rich kids are sent to well-known schools in Phuket Town.

At those schools, well-off parents make sure that their children get a quality education by contributing financial support themselves. They set up Parent's Clubs, sponsor all kinds of activities and solicit funds from alumni.

Parents at our school are not in a position to do these things.

The government supports us, of course. Like every other school in the country, we receive 1,900 baht per child, per year. However, this amount alone is not enough for any school in Phuket, because the cost of living in the province is so high. It's especially low for tourist towns like Kata-Karon, where prices are

As educators, our most important job is to prepare children to live their lives well and to teach them how to support themselves.

Because they are growing up in a tourist town in a tourist province, it's very likely they will look for jobs in tourism. To be com-


petitive, they must have foreignlanguage skills.

But we can't afford to hire foreign-language teachers. We need English, Russian and Chinese teachers, but we simply don't have the budget.

Knowing a foreign language is not a luxury for our kids, it's a necessity, but we can't do it without more financial support.

Our other goals are to teach our students to have self-control, to understand the effect of their actions, and to be able to adapt to change.

We've been able to set up some projects on our limited budget to teach these things: a garbage bank and a vegetable garden. The idea with both of these is to teach Children show produce they grew to make a living



and also how to protect the environment.

For the garbage bank, students are assigned to bring in garbage from home or that they find on the way to school. We separate it together, then sell what we can, and give the children the proceeds. This teaches the kids that garbage is valuable, that they can separate it by themselves, and that collecting it cleans up our environment.

As for the vegetables, every spare bit of land at the school is a vegetable plot. The crops we grow we serve in the school canteen for lunch. Any excess, we accompany the children to sell at a nearby market. Doing this is fun, and it teaches the students that empty land can be utilized to make money.

We also use the garden plot to teach environmentally healthy practices - we use dishwater to water the plants. The children learn to value water and not release dirty water into local

> canals. Children are like pieces of

white paper. If we put emphasis on supporting their education, and teach them well, they will grow up to be people who contribute to making Karon a better place. We must not waste this precious

Fine for not updating a work permit

The company which supplied my work permit recently moved office and I forgot to inform the immigration office. It's all sorted out now, but can I ask what the standard fine would be?

Expat worker

Yaowapa Piblupol, Phuket Employment Office Chief, replies:

It is illegal to work at an address that doesn't match the one listed in your work permit.

If your work place moves to a new location, we must be immediately notified of the updated address so we can amend your work permit to show the change.

The fine for not having the information changed is up to 20,000 baht for the employee and up to 100,000 baht for the business owner.

Worried that Patong Hill Road will slide again

makes me feel nervous about crossing the hill this rainy season.

What process was used in the latest repairs, and how long is it expected to last?

Samak Luedwonghad, Phuket Highways Office Director, replies:

We have faith in our landslide prevention techniques and I am confident that the land on Patong Hill will not slide this rainy season. Last year, we installed soil nails which will last for three to four years. Once this time is up, we will make any necessary repairs again.

The process involves drilling

The landslide repairs on Patong Hill holes into the slope, then insertseem to fail very often, and that ing steel bars into the holes, grouting them, and covering the face with concrete.

Construction on Patong Hill is one of the main causes of landslides. When the rain comes, the soil can become loose and flow down the hill. Trees on the hill slow the downward flow of water, but the trees are being cleared out by these construction projects, which is something we cannot prevent.

May 3-9, 2014 Life & style World Press Freedom Day

TODAY, May 3, 2014, marks the UNESCO World Press Freedom Day. The day was proclaimed by the UN General Assembly in December 1993 and marks the anniversary of the Declaration of Windhoek, a statement of free press principles put together by African newspaper journalists in 1991.

World Press Freedom Day celebrates the basic principles of press freedom, takes stock of press freedom around the world, promotes media independence and pays tribute to journalists who have lost their lives on the job.

According to the World Press Freedom Index 2014, compiled by non-government organization Reporters Without Borders, Thailand has moved up five places, from 135th to 130th, in the list ranking countries on their level of press freedom.

According to a statement on the Reporters Without Borders website, this year, "Finland tops the index for the fourth year running, closely followed by the Netherlands and Norway, like last year. At the other end of the index, the last three positions are again held by Turkmenistan, North Korea and Eritrea, three countries where freedom of information is non-existent. Despite occasional turbulence in the past year, these countries continue to be news and information black holes and living hells for the journalists who inhabit them,"

The report was also critical of Thailand's 1 se-majest law, stating that the law was an effective weapon for intimidating or silencing those who are disrespectful to the Thai Royal Family. It noted that the suspended jail sentence imposed on Chiranuch "Jiew" Premchaiporn, the editor of the online newspaper Prachatai, for "comments critical of the monarchy" and the 11-year-jail sentence given to Somyot Prueksakasemsuk, editor of the Voice of Thaksin bimonthly, were noteworthy examples. The report stated that the, "sentences had a deterrent effect on the entire Thai media."

H&M fashions arrive at Central Festival



Feel-good football

ON April 24, 40 students from the Good Shepherd Learning Center had the opportunity to visit Phuket FC's recently completed Republic Phuket football training

The event was a cooperative effort between Phuket FC fan club the Mushy Peas, and the Grumpy Old Man's Society (GOMS) in conjunction with the Good Shepherd Learning Center and Phuket FC.

The 40 students from the Phuket Town based school, which has about 150 kids enrolled, are primarily the children of laborers from Myanmar who have come to work in Thailand.

The children were led by four members of the Phuket FC team for a stretching and warm-up session, football handling drills and friendly team competitions. The kids were clearly ecstatic to be out on a field trip and were quick to engage with the Phuket FC players.

The Phuket FC players, including Myanmar national Pyne

Soe, participated as part of their community outreach obligations, and the 27-year-old defender was able to talk and joke with the group in their native tongue, serving as a positive role model for the underprivileged kids.

GOMS member Simon O'Herlihy attended the event at Republic Phuket to lend a hand. He explained that although GOMS has served as a resource of information to share among members since its inception in 2009, the group's primary goal is to raise money for various charities. Meetings are held twice a month and they donate 200 of the 250 baht dues to local charities.

"For a lot of people, like myself, who are retired here, it really gives you some motivation to get involved," said O'Herlihy. "I think it is rather sad to see so many capable expat guys who could be giving a bit back."

GOMS has helped organize several fund-raising events which have benefited various schools and orphanages, but O'Herlihy explained, "We have probably worked with this school more than

any other. When I first went to visit the school, it was about two years ago. They had a school at Rassada port that was just breeze block, chicken wire for windows and a corrugated tin roof."

Since then, many organizations and individuals pitched in to raise enough funds to build a new facility for the children. In December, 2013, the Good Shepherd Learning Center was opened and provides a modern and safe facility for the students.

Good Shepherd teacher and volunteer Carol Goodison served as one of the chaperones for the kids on the field trip. Visiting from Ireland, Goodison is in Phuket for a six-month community service project until June.

The Rawai based Phuket FC fan club, the Mushy Peas, also helped to coordinate the event and donated funds which went to purchase new shoes for the children. Excited, smiling kids gathered around Mushy Peas member Richard Dill as he passed out shoes to the kids. Amidst a frenzy of flying boxes and shoe laces, every available adult helped the kids get into their shoes so they could run onto the field to try them out.

"This is such a win-win situation for everybody, but mostly for the kids. It's such a great thing to get them out of the school," said O'Herlihy. "When you see the look on their faces and you see how they are enjoying themselves... it's fantastic."

Laguna launches mobile education

LAGUNA Phuket's most recent corporate social responsibility (CSR) initiative, the "Fully Booked!" Mobile Learning Center, was officially launched at a VIP event last week.

The custom made vehicle functions both as a library and a classroom, and is equipped with books and variety of learning materials not readily available in schools and rural communities.

Starting this June, "Fully Booked!" will travel to target schools, setting up a "popup" classroom on the grounds to provide schoolchildren with access to materials that are crucial for learning, but are very expensive and unaffordable to many rural schools and families. It is hoped that this will reduce the literacy gap between urban and rural schools.

The center will help inspire younger schoolchildren to develop interest with books and help improve their literacy through assisted reading. As part of the long-term plan, the center will also work with rural parents to teach them how to read "to" and "with" their children to encourage the learning process.

During the first semester of 2014, the center will service 580 students in three pilot schools in Phuket including Baan Don Child Center (50 students, pre-school level), Wat Thep Kasattri School (450 students, K1-K3 and G1-G6), and Baan Cherng Talay

School (80 students, G5-G6), visiting these schools a total of three full days per week for the entire semester. Each week, students will be encouraged to borrow at least one book to take home for leisure reading.

A qualified librarian cum teacher will be employed to manage the center and ensure the program runs efficiently and learning progresses are in line with the national curriculum and will keep the program relevant, fresh and engaging, covering topics such as the environment and English language skills.

The project is one of many initiatives set up by Laguna Phuket to support its wider strategic goal on social and educational development, which aims to build capacities of local communities through socially benefiting projects, adequate educational support, and access to quality educational

"Today, I have the pleasure of introducing all of you to our brand new CSR initiative that has been two years in the making,' said Mr. Ravi Chandran, managing director of Laguna Phuket in his speech at the project's launch last week.

"We believe that quality education helps build quality people. So for two years, our team has been committed to developing an initiative together with local schools to bring quality books, learning materials, and

learning opportunities to students to help center for five academic years, starting from encourage them to read more."

Since the project initiation two years ago, more than 2.2 million baht was raised for the center through the generous support of Laguna Phuket triathletes, marathoners, associates, and community members. A matching fund of 2.2 million baht was created by Banyan Tree Global Foundation to purchase and outfit the mobile vehicle, along with an additional 500,000 baht for purchase of books and learning materials.

The funding is enough to operate the

June 2014. Laguna Phuket will continue to fund raise for the center to keep providing the service to underprivileged schools even after this initial period.

The center's operation launch will take place in June this year. Guests staying at any Laguna Phuket hotels will be invited to visit the mobile learning center at schools and join the teachers through interactive involvement by reading and playing interactive learning games with the children.

Life & style The art of the steal

CAMBODIA, which was heavily looted of many of its cultural riches during the Khmer Rouge years and the turbulent civil war that followed, is making concerted efforts to get its priceless antiquities back.The poor Southeast Asian nation has confronted the arts trade and is having more than a little success.

After going into a prolonged legal battle with the influential auction house Sotheby's, a 10th century Khmer statue which is valued at about US\$3 million (96 million baht) and was to be auctioned in the United States is instead due to be returned to Cambodia some time in the next few months.

Anne Lemaistre, who heads Cambodia's Unesco office, which helped Cambodia with the Sotheby's case, says she's happy to see Cambodia win out.

"I hope it will have a major impact within the region, and also worldwide," says Lemaistre with an eye to ongoing pilfering in war-torn nations such as Afghanistan and Syria.

Cambodia, with the help of the US government, filed suit against Sotheby's claiming the auction house had agreed to sell a warrior statue known as the Duryodhana while knowing it had been looted from its pedestal during the 1970s. The pedestal is still there at the remote Koh Ker temple complex.

In December, with legal wrangling continuing, Sotheby's agreed to send the statue back to Cambodia.

Asked if Cambodia's suit against

Sotheby's could mean the government, now emboldened, will pursue the return of further artifacts, Lemaistre said this has already been the case with the Metropolitan Museum of New York.

"It had already had a domino effect, as the Metropolitan gave back on a voluntary basis two major sculptures... belonging to the same looted temple in Koh Ker, Prasat Chen, from which the Sotheby's sculpture comes," she said.

The Met returned the twin, sandstone, 10th century Cambodian statues known as The Kneeling Attendants, or Pandavas, in June last year after conceding that they had, as Cambodia alleged, been looted.

"In total, nine sculptures were looted in this temple. Most of them are identified, some of them belong to Western museums that could decide to follow the Metropolitan's exemplary gesture and give them back.

"Private owners could do the same also. We will welcome them with honors and a red carpet to thank them," Lemaistre adds.

The Cambodian government is now seeking the return of a Khmer statue similar to the Duryodhana from the Norton Simon Museum in California.

We are still in negotiations," confirms Hab Touch, director general for tangible heritage at the Cambodian Ministry of Culture, declining to comment further on that case.

Of the Sotheby's piece and the two statues already returned by the Met, Touch says preparations were under way to display them in Phnom Penh.

"We are still working on the transportation [of the Duryodhana] and of course this will be displayed at the National Museum," he says.

"The Met statues are now at the National Museum in the workshop," to be cleaned and re-secured to their pedestals, but will soon be ready for display, he adds.

Cambodia is not the only country in the region that has sought the return of stolen antiquities, though it seems to be the one pushing hardest, and it has been having the most luck so far.

The Indonesian government has tried for years to have the country's artifacts returned from foreign countries, especially the Netherlands, with little success.

President Susilo Bambang Yudhoyono said last year that many Indonesian artifacts are in the hands of foreign collectors and diplomatic efforts are needed to bring them back.

The Philippines has for years been trying to get back three 19thcentury church bells that were taken as war booty by US occupation troops in 1901 from the town of Balangiga in Eastern Samar province.

In Nepal, efforts are under way to ensure two 12th century Hindu statues are returned by France's Guimet Museum after they were discovered to have been stolen, though the efforts to repatriate them originated in Paris and not in Kathmandu.

Last year China saw two Qing dynasty animal heads returned by a French billionaire collector. They had allegedly been looted by Brit-

ish and French troops when the Old Summer Palace in Beijing was burned down during the Second Opium War in 1860.

They were from a set of 12 Chinese zodiac animals cast in the 18th century. Many Chinese people have supported campaigns over the past decade to return all 12 of the heads to China, protesting whenever the heads were included in international auctions.

And in Thailand in 1988, the government managed to persuade the Art Institute of Chicago to return the Narai lintel, stolen from the Khao Phnom Rung ancient temple in north-east Buri Ram, after the issue developed ramifications for Thai-US relations.

While some art experts have questioned the wisdom of returning statues from world-renowned museums in the West to developing countries which might not have the facilities to look after such antiquities, Lemaistre has no concerns on that front.

"It is true that when a country is in a political turmoil and/or conflicts or faces major natural disasters, some pieces are better protected in safer places," she said.

"But this is not the case any more in Cambodia: the National Museum in Phnom Penh offers all security and conservation guarantees and the pieces will be well conserved, following international - The Nation

In truth, many books on tropical plants offer little in the way of cultural advice. For example, Plant Materials in Thailand by U Veesommai includes pictures of 1,320 plants, the most complete catalog of plants

in the kingdom, and an indispensable reference book for the likes of me. But there is little advice about the needs of individual plants, apart from a few cursory notes listing categories, for instance: "plants for suburban street, for parking areas, or, for waterfalls." Even The Field

Gardening By Patrick Campbell Guide to Tropical Plants of Asia

by Engel and Phummai, a constant companion on trips to nurseries because of its small size, excellent photographs and Thai botanical names, has only cursory hints on cultivation. Two books that do much better in explaining how to grow plants are not specifically about tropical conditions, though The Complete Encyclopedia of Trees and Shrubs covers most of the bases. Another weighty tome intended for North American readers, Western Garden, has the most complete cultural notes of all.

Both these books, incidentally, use the valuable system whereby plants are given a hardiness zone number. Most tropical plants, for instance, have a zone number of 11. Thus trees and shrubs that can survive the cold of zone 4 (frosts down to minus 20 degrees Farenheight) are unlikely to succeed in the heat of zones 10 or 11. It takes an exceptionally tolerant shrub such as the tulip tree (liriodendron tulipifera) to boast a wide-ranging growth zone of 4-10. Of course other factors such as humidity and rainfall patterns are also important when you decide which plants to acquire.

Talking of buying, Phuket is well stocked with garden centers. Both Chao Fa East Road and Chao Fa West Road have a number, colorfully adorning the roadside. Their small plants tend to come in soft plastic bags, the more mature specimens in

six, eight or ten-inch pots. While some are home-grown – produced from seed, offshoots or cuttings – the bulk of the plants are brought to the island from areas where land is cheaper. That indeed is one of the drawbacks here, since many of the old established nurseries have lost their land to the demands of landowners anxious to capitalize on the building boom. I can think of four that have disappeared in the last year to be replaced by apartment blocks, or in the case

of one on Chao Fa West, by a Tesco Lotus supermarket.

One of the beautiful things about the older nurseries was that they offered more in the way of mature shrubs and unusual plants. I am currently searching

for a couple of climbers: passion flower (passiflora) and a flame vine (pyrostegia), but the prevailing fashion is for easy, colorful and quick-growing plants. While local most nurserymen and women are reasonably knowledgeable about their

charges, do remember to take a color photograph along as well as providing the Thai name. That will help things enormously. Impressed, they may even drop the price.

Tip of the week Plants for places

YOU can often get valuable clues about suitable plants for particular environments by observing plantings in public spaces – parks, road sides, central reservations and so on. Low maintenance favorites include ixoras, dwarf allamandas, durantas, and small trees, for example; thevetias or cassias.

There are, however, some examples best not followed. After the tsunami, the sea wall at Nai Harn beach was reduced to rubble. The new structure had a concrete walkway with spaces for plants. A good idea except that the rectangular cavities were planted with golden cane palms. Most died. A few stragglers remain, but they are in poor shape, unable to cope with the salt-laden winds.

The beach itself has rows of sea almonds and screw pines (pandanus), thriving in the inhospitable conditions. Further back are rows of stately *casuarinas*. Any of these would have been a better choice. In fact, one or two sea almond saplings – probably self-sown – have recently taken up residence.

AROUND the same time as Bossa Nova reached the big US market in the early 1960s, Brazil's Jorge Amado scored a huge popular hit with his novel Gabriela, Clove and Cinnamon, which takes place during the 1920s cacao boom in the northeastern state of Bahia. When I lived in Brazil, I read this again in Portuguese, along with the rest of Amado's novels and all of those of his great southern contemporaries from Rio Grande do Sul, Erico Verissimo.

But that was 40 years ago and Amado and Verissimo are long dead. So I picked up a new Brazilian novel, Alberto Mussa's The Mystery of Rio (Europa Editions, New York, 2013, 210pp). The author is 42 and the recipient of a prestigious literary award, the Machado de Assis Prize.

What a mistake. This turned

out to be 210 pages of wasted time. The novel starts out well enough, "It is not the geography, it is not the architecture, it is not the heroes, or battles, much less so the chronicles of customs, or the fantasies conjured up by poets. No, what defines a city is the history of crimes."

This is a murder mystery, set in

Rio de Janeiro in 1913, and it hooks you from the beginning. The Secretary of the Presidency of the Republic is strangled to death while bound, blindfolded and gagged by a prostitute named Fortunata Conceicao in the House of Swaps, a combination medical

clinic, brothel and wife-swapping orgy scene. Fortunata disappears completely.

"The theory that the death had been an accident, the result of excessive zeal in the simulation of torture to which the secretary liked to submit himself, was somewhat weakened because the assassin had employed great strength - indeed, unusual strength for a woman," the narrator observes.

Assigned to the murder case is Rio's top forensic expert Sebastiao Baeta. What is unique about this case is the use of witchcraft, brought over from Africa by the spirit possession cults of Macumba and Candomble. Baeta discovers that Fortunata has a brother named Aniceto Conceicao, a malandro and capoeira layabout and martial arts expert – who is also a customer at the House of Swaps and indeed a star at the occasional orgies. Baeta discovers that Aneceto has taken his missing sister's jewelry to pay for

the occult services of the 100-year-old hermit Rufino. a former runaway slave and notorious sorcerer.

The author now veers off into many of his formal asides to the reader, "Since this book's thesis - this history of a city is the history of its crimes - can-

not by proven merely by presenting one case study, I have decided to mix into the larger narrative certain reports of crimes that, in a sense, foreshadow it. They are what I would call 'predicate crimes'.'


many occult crimes in Rio throughout the centuries. One is that in 1911, a thug named Dito slit the throat of his girlfriend Maria do Pote at a samba dance and later at a cult drum circle is possessed by her spirit, "the malandro, the crook, this evil and murderous thug, suddenly danced into the center of the circle, hands on his twisting hips - dancing in the exotic, seduc-

tive, and unmistakable style of the late Maria do Pote. They even say his laugher had the exact timbre as the girl's."

These stories are entertaining at times but besides the point. What's the solution to the 1913 murder mystery of the title? It turns out to be preposterous. Fortunata and Aniceto are one and the same. Baeta discovers that "the siblings were the first known case of individuals who

have the exact same fingerprints."

The sorcerer Rubino has buried Aniceto as a man, dug him up as the woman Fortunata before the murder and buried him again afterward to return as a man, irresistible now to a legion of women. I know I'm not supposed to reveal the ending, but I don't want you to waste your time, as I did, on this cruel disappointment of a novel.

Take a ticket to Trang



TRANG, the seaside province in southern Thailand, boasts hidden charms and is the perfect destination for anyone who likes to feel they are off the beaten track and getting away from mainstream tourists.

The province stretches out into the blue of the Andaman Sea in an archipelago of 46 islands. There are limestone caves and peak to explore, vibrant local cultures and traditions, as well as gorgeous beaches and other natural won-

tend to stick to the province's islands, which have much to recommend them. The most popular Koh Muk, known for its spectacular Emerald Cave; Ko Kradan, regarded as the most beautiful island in Trang and for being the venue for the famous annual un-

derwater wedding ceremony; and Koh Chuek, which boasts an underwater paradise of shallow and deep water corals. All of these lovely isles are within the boundaries of Had Chao Mai Marine National Park.

When you go island hopping, keep an eye out for the playful dugongs (sea cows), often said to be the basis for legends of mermaids, but uglier mermaids you'll never see.

Tours of Trang's islands can be booked from local tour operators and generally cost around 700-800 baht per person. There are some good travel agents near the train station and near Pakbeng pier who specialize in day trips. If you want to get there under your own steam, then the main islands are easily reached by getting local ferries and boats, most of which leave from the Pakmeng pier.

It takes about an hour to reach the Morakot Emerald cave on Koh Muk, and there's often a little crowd there fighting the current to get inside and see the wonders of the cave. It is worth waiting your turn, for this is one of the most mysterious chambers in the world. After swimming into what seems to be a deep and menacing cave, you are suddenly in a natural room into which the sun streams - albeit a room containing a warm emerald sea and soft sands in which you can relax and

After seeing the islands, head to dry land and discover Trang town itself. This centuries-old seaport has a multicultural blend of Thai, Malay and Hokkien Chi-

nese residents. The colorful mix of people and traditions means that there's a great deal to see around the town.

Phraya The Rasadanupradit Mahisorn Phakdi Musuem in Kantang district offers a fascinating glimpse through the mists of time to tell the

story of the province's history. Chinese by origin, Phraya Rasadanupradi was, and still is, highly respected by local Trang people and regarded as a great man who brought wealth and prosperity to Trang thanks to his astute organization of transportation, agriculture, education and local administration.

Phraya Rasadanupradit was the first person in Thailand to plant commercial rubber trees, which of course, can now be found all over southern Thailand - indeed the kingdom is one of the leading international exporters of this natural product.

Wat Phu Khao Thong, around 20 kilometers from the city is another place worth seeing. The tranquil monastery sits in lovely

surroundings and there is a stunning limestone cave within the Manorah – Reclining Buddha image of Srivijaya which is said be around 800-1,000 years old.

The most distinctive feature of the Buddha image is its decorated headdress called a Thoret. This holy and royal ornament is associated with the dance of Manorah - which originates in Southern Thailand and tells the legend of Nora, one of the kinneree, mythical half-bird half woman creatures from the Himmaphan forest.

Being the only Buddha image with such adornment, the Manorah Reclining Buddha was last year listed as one of the seven

Amazing Ancient Wonders of Thailand by the Tourism Authorcompound. It houses the unique ity of Thailand. For it is not only a train station which offers a nosbeautiful piece of Buddhist art, but talgic peep back to the days when also unlike any other statue in the kingdom.

Legend has it that the famous reclining Buddha image was here long before the temple was officially established as a Buddhist monastery. These days, there are only two monks residing here but there are classes for Buddhists to come and meditate and study. During the Songkran festival, the temple stages a very special performance of the Manorah dance, as a way of paying homage to the reclining Buddha.



Caring for the tummy

ALTHOUGH diseases of the digestive system are not lethal, they can cause considerable distress to both the sufferer, and his or her parents. The cause is basically down to behavior. Children love putting things in their mouths, a habit that makes them prone to gastric infections.

A gastrointestinal virus leads to queasiness, upset stomach, lowgrade fever, dehydration, vomiting and lack of energy. Six-month old babies tend to be particularly exposed to this virus because they regularly put their hands or contaminated toys into their mouths. Another environment where the virus is highly contagious and circulates effectively is in schools, where saliva-soaked hands touch surfaces and toys. Although a gastrointestinal virus is highly contagious, it is not dangerous and can be prevented through good hygiene habits, such as the frequent washing of hands.

Certain cases present with more severe symptoms. If a child is vomiting two to three times per day, they run the risk of dehydration, so a visit to the doctor is recommended.

Much of the food that we do not prepare ourselves tends to be presented in such a way as to be attractive to children. Whether on special occasions or on a week-

end, children want to try new food and drink. The very hot and humid climate in a country like Thailand naturally makes people sweaty and thirsty, but parents should not just allow their children to consume whatever they wish. Bad consumption habits can harm their children's digestive systems.

Diarrhea, which can be viral or bacterial in nature, is caused by a pathogen in unclean food or drink that allows germs to penetrate into the stomach and the large intestine. Symptoms include three episodes of watery stool per day or a mucous bloody stool.


Children infected with virusinduced diarrhea experience a low-grade fever and watery stools, although with minimal loss of energy. While it is not necessary to see a doctor in such cases, it is important to keep the ill child well hydrated. Prepare a glass of oral rehydration solution to be hand-fed to the child every three to four hours. Parents are advised to avoid feeding the child from a bottle or through a tube, as the intestine does not absorb fluids well in this way.

The symptoms of rotavirus-induced diarrhea can be identified as eight to ten episodes of watery stool, which leave the child dehydrated and weak. A visit to the doctor is recommended and the child may need to be admitted into hospital.

Bacterial diarrhoea from dysentery and salmonella infection are very dangerous. Noticeable symptoms include high-grade fever, mucous bloody stool and cramping abdominal pain. Children with bacterial diarrhea need antibiotics and should visit a doctor immediately.

Physicians treat digestive tract infections with symptomatic treatments, but prevention is far more important. School children have a high propensity to experience digestive tract infection, as they spend a great deal of time engaged in communal activities and sharing objects. Each child should have his or her own water bottle and teachers should encourage children to wash their hands and shared objects frequently. These simple steps cultivate good hygiene habits in children and keep them safe from many avoidable diseases.

Finally, some advice for children and parents planning outdoor activities that involve food. Food stand operators tend to decorate their products to attract buyers, so it's vital to consider the benefits and as giant meat balls and red velvet safety of the food. Both kids and adults should consume all five food groups - carbohydrate, protein, fat, vitamin, mineral – in every meal and if there's a shortfall, they should make it up in the next meal. Always be careful to select food with natu-

ral coloring, dine in restaurants free of flies, and avoid food created obviously to attract attention, such crushed ice. These items may contain harmful substances to which some children may be allergic. Parents should instead prepare simple food, such as fried egg sandwiches for a day out.

It also helps to keep children's

fingernails clipped and have them wash their hands before meals. To help rehydrate your children when necessary, always keep some oral rehydration solution at hand.

The first sign of pregnancy

ONE of the first signs of pregnancy, morning sickness or nausea gravidarum, is a condition experienced by more than 50 per cent of women.

While the nausea and vomiting are usually experienced in the morning, they will continue well into the day and while uncomfortable, morning sickness is also natural and is due to the increase in the Beta-hCG hormone during the first three months of pregnancy. This hormone is indicative of the strength of the fetus: the higher the level of hormone, the stronger the fetus. Women who are carrying twins also have more of the hormone because they have a larger placenta.

Experts are at odds as to whether nausea gravidarum should be considered as an ailment and most doctors are reluctant to prescribe any drugs to control it unless it becomes severe.

However, mild morning sickness can benefit from a change in dietary habits. You should replace the norm of three main meals a day with five of six smaller meals. It is also recommended that you don' t let vour stomach become empty or become too hungry.

It is also wise to avoid anything that can cause you to vomit, including overly pungent and fatty

You should start to feel better after three months as the Beta-hCG hormones decrease again and the morning sickness subsides. If the conditions persists or becomes

worse, a doctor should be consulted and Dramamine or Vitamin B6 will be prescribed.

Ginger is very effective for easing queasiness and research has demonstrated that ginger ale can relieve morning sickness. In more severe cases where you lose your appetite, cannot even drink water and become exhausted, it is recommended that you stay in hospital so that you can be fed saline solution intravenously. In most cases, you will feel better in one or two days.

There are certain types of abnormal pregnancies, such as molar pregnancy. In this case, the placenta produces unusually high amounts of hCG hormones, which causes expectant mothers to have more severe nausea and vomiting.

If an expectant mother is still experiencing queasiness and vomiting in the eighth month of pregnancy, it is possible that there is a malfunction of the alimentary system, such as irritable bowel syndrome, gastroesophageal reflux, food poisoning, a failure of the circulatory system of the body or low blood pressure. These symptoms are a result of the uterus overlaying the great vein of the pelvis, leading to a poor flow of blood to the heart and the brain.

To reduce the risk of this hapening or to alleviate the symptoms if they are already present, it is recommended that you take plenty of rest, drink a lot of water, and avoid standing or sitting for too long in order to prevent the uterus from overlaying the great vein for any extended period. If there is still no sign of recovery after following these steps, visit your doctor.

TWO critical issues plague the Phuket drinking scene: terrible drinks, and terrible service. The number of watered-down something-or-other and cokes served on this island that take 20 minutes to get, and are delivered with anything but a smile, is abysmal.

"Just because you're on a beach in Phuket doesn't mean you should be satisfied with a [expletive] drink," says Richard "Liquid Playground" Gillam, as he lounges at Xana Beach Club after another day of training the club's staff.

After 15 years in the game playing a range of roles, from bartender and gastronomic

molecular mixologist to avant the aroma of rosemary wafting up garde cocktail glassware designer and bar designer, Richard isn't your average consumer.

But after managing The Kenilworth Cocktail Lounge, one of the top cocktail bars in the world, this man has an idea of what we want – more so, perhaps, want we need.

"How many drinks have you sent back, compared to food?" he asks. "If you think about the prices... A burger can be 500 baht, but go [somewhere] and get a [expletive] rum and coke, and they try to charge you 350-400. I'm going to have 10 of these and one burger. I'll happily send [the burger] back, but I'll drink 10 crap drinks and not say a thing," Richard points out.

"People need to stop being so easily pleased with drinks. Send it back, and have them make it again."

Easy for Richard to say. Most of us schmucks simply don't know we can get better.

"I don't say drink more. I never say drink more. I say drink better," Richard explains.

"If you go out and can afford to have 10 drinks, most people will have 10 drinks – spend it all. Why not spend the same amount on seven drinks and have a more expensive spirit? Just try it.

Now, Richard isn't insinuating that everyone needs to be shelling out 600 baht per drink - which, when made by him, are gastronomic masterpieces. Imagine

spherified (liquid shaped into spheres which resemble caviar) booze in a tantalizing glass, with

in waves of cold, freeze-dried ice steam – he can make that happen.

"I'd rather teach this [basic ratios for creating an endless number of drinks], and how to shake, how to strain and why ice matters.

The bottom line, however, isn't the drink (that's Richard talking), it's the service.

A week spent in the Phuket bar scene, from go-gos in Patong to the exclusive beach clubs in the north, might leave few questions in a visitor's mind about the concept of "service" – not that there aren't exceptions.

The moments when a waitress seems to be on the verge of tossing a drink in a customer's face are a welcome change to an inattentive bar staffer who avoids eye contact for 30 minutes before meandering over to see if a customer actually ists end up at the same bars every

happened by the pub for a drink.

"Waitresses, bar-backs, bartenders, bar managers – they all have the same job. Their job is to assure that when someone leaves the bar, they leave happier than when they came in. Full stop. That's all."

"And there is no excuse. You do that, and it's golden. All this stuff [mixology] is not important compared to that, so hopefully we're going to see a change soon."


The secret is that they all have different sur-

MAIDEN FLIGHT WREAKS HAVOC!

PHUKET, THAILAND — Residents of this once tranquil seaside community were thrown into turmoil this morning when they awoke to find that an English-language newspaper had been unleashed upon them.

Several hundred copies of the **Phuket Gazette**, an audacious and most unwelcome new tabloid, were immediately seized and burned by the Environmental Protection Department. Thousands more, however, remained in circulation late this afternoon.

In Cheong Thalay Village (pop: 319), a woman known only as Mrs Shampoo, owner of a small but highly fashionable hair salon, shrieked that she had lived in Phuket all her life but that now she had no choice but to evacuate her family to a neighbouring province. "I find this Gazette outrageous," she wailed. "It has only local news! I want to know

what 's going on in Udon Thani... and Sarawak... and New Jersey. Page 9 of this thing contains a commentary on fashions in Soi Bangla. You think I care about

Residents of suburban Ao Chalong, a posh enclave of distinguished expatriates and other outcasts from normal society, were gripped in fear that a second issue of the Gazette might infiltrate their community shortly. "We do not want a newspaper that we can read, or in which we might express our views," said tuk-tuk driver Sir Winston Titherington-Smythe. "Nor do any of us wish to sell our old shirts in that dreadful Island Trader classified section on page 11. We can find other ways to pay our debts," he scoffed.

Klaus Wiener, a tourist from Frankfurt, was incensed. "I voke up dis morning and I found dis ting—dis Gazette ting—in my hotel, yah? It says all what's going on here. I don't vish to be informed, specially when I'm in a foreign country. Dis Gazette says dere's many tings to do and shtuff to buy cheap here, yah? My vife, she read all dis chunk and shpoil my holiday. I go home now. I chuss peck my bags and go home," he fumed.

Speaking at a hastily convened, late afternoon press conference in the Alice Bar on Bangla Road, Arthur Mumbler, Vice President - Corporate Communications of The Phuket Gazette Co Ltd, acknowledged that the first issue of the Gazette had brought calamity to this island. He then went on to convey his company's assurances that there would be a second issue very

SEA GYPSIES ARRESTED

In the latest incident in an ongoing conflict over control of resources in the waters around Phuket, six boat-loads of fishermen from the Sea Gypsy community at Rawaii Beach were arrested for fishing in restricted areas and using a type of net which has been banned by the Fisheries Department.

In the first incident on March 4, four boats were confiscated off Kata Beach and more than twenty men arrested. On March 23, two more boats were impounded off Mai Ton Island and 19 men arrested. Though the laws have been in effect for about one year, these are the first arrests.

The problems stem from a ban on the "Oan Lom" or weighted fishing net, which was banned by the Fisheries Department one year ago. The authorities claim this net damages coral reefs. The Sea Gypsies maintain that they have used this type of net, at these same sites, for gen-

erations with no ill effects to the reefs. They claim that they are being forced out of their ancestral fishing grounds by tourismrelated business interests.

The new restrictions cover most of the western coast of Phuket and most of the area around Mai Ton Island and Racha Island, traditionally the richest fishing grounds in the

If forced to operate with only drop lines and fish traps, a local fisherman may make about 50 baht per day in the dry season, and much less in the rainy season. This is far below a living wage on Phuket, but without basic education and language skills, the Sea Gypsies find it almost impossible to gain employment in any other industry.


In a recent meeting between the Sea Gypsy community and a senior representative of the Fisheries Department, the Department expressed sympathy with the plight of the Sea Gypsies, but reiterated its commitment to preservation of the envi-

AFTER crossing the Sarasin bridge, the sense of immediacy, impatience and the hustle and bustle of Phuket fades quickly. The pace of life slows to what is expected of a tropical island.

Dozens of people experienced this feeling as they made their way to Khao Lak for the first annual Khao Lak Surf Competition last weekend. They drove to Khao Lak and passed Nang Thong, Bang Niang, Khuk Khak, and all the way to Pakarang, where they crept along looking for the small dusty sign marking Memories Bar and the surf competition.

After turning left to head due north, where bigger swells were

west, they passed some elephants and abandoned rubber plantations on the long and winding dusty road that leads to Pakarang beach. Looking south from the end of the jarring road one sees an idyllic scene of long

flat beaches reaching down into clear blue waters, all of which were almost completely devoid of people. However, looking north you see where all of the people are. Surfers congregated between buoys marking the competition zone and Memories Bar and Pakarang Surf Shop were overflowing with water-lovers sprawled about under the protection of any scrap of shade they could find.

Surf boards were everywhere racks and hanging all over Memories Bar, making it clear what kind of beach bar you were at. Reggae music set the vibe and contestants gathered around the results board to see if they made it through their last heat to proceed to the next round.

Organized by the owner of Memories Bar and Pakarang Surf Shop, Montree "Ching" Natakuatung, along with help from his long-time friend and local surfer Matt Blauer, the first surf competition to grace the shores of Khao Lak exceeded their expectations with over 100

entries in six divisions.

Although the contest enjoyed sponsorship from many, including Elleciel Custom Surfboards, Saltwater Dreaming, Andaman Sea and Surf, the Kata Krew Firewire, NSP and more, it takes more than sponsorship to have a successful surf comp.

"The thing that you need is the goodwill of people to come up and be a part of it. We went to Phuket and tried to get people excited and it worked," says Matt of their efforts to spread the word.

As the surf season in Phuket approaches at a seemingly lethargic speed, surfers from Nai Harn to Nai Yang jumped at the chance to head

hoped to be found. Sadly, Saturday's waves were an uninspiring one to two-foot and choppy, leaving surfers struggling to squeeze in any miniscule maneuver before the wave closed-out.

Saturday saw round one heats in men's longboard, open shortboard and women's division.

The following morning had stoke meters reading high when hungry eyes fell upon glassy two to three foot waves breaking fairly clean at Pakarang. Many families were in attendance, as well as local kids taking part in the contest, or just hanging out enjoying the friendly scene.

Heats and quarter-finals were – laying in the sand, standing in held all day, with longboarders squeezing out the longest rides, rushing to the nose to try and get five toes over before the break cut the ride short. Shortboarders were trying to generate enough speed to pull off a maneuver before the section closed-out with reasonable success, this can be attributed to the fact that they normally have to surf with small and sloppy conditions.

Dubwise Phuket was representing with DJ Unity Selekta, who was serving up free-flow reggae and dub for spectators and beach goers, and as a soundtrack for the surfers.

Matt explained that the idea for

a competition stemmed from a way to get locals more excited and involved with surfing.

"For me it's about the kids, for Ching it's about the community – Phuket and the different surfers, everyone coming up and having a good time together. This surf contest is about getting kids stoked because when they see other kids better than them, they want to surf that much more."

Matt sees surfing as a way to keep local kids involved in positive activities, "Our thing is, give them something clean to do – the surf is here, it's free."

The contest was a huge success. The sponsors pulled-through providing money and prizes, plenty of surfers made it out and the sea cooperated to an extent.

So what's next? "I think it is inevitable that there will be another contest next year," exclaims Matt.

"To be honest, we are not looking for bigger sponsors, we are going to keep it kind of homegrown."

Tennis = balance

WE HAVE to balance how much hitting zone and maintain a long we train and how much we rest our body, we have to have a balance of offense and defense, and we have to balance risk versus reward on each shot. The most important balance however is balancing your body while playing.

Keeping our body-balanced means keeping our weight distributed evenly overtop of our feet. Generally, if your feet are about as wide apart as your shoulders, and your knees slightly bent you will have a certain amount of balance.

When moving to the ball you want make every step more efficient, so instead of taking big steps which are hard to adjust from, little steps are better for getting you there and keeping you stable.

When actually hitting the ball what matters is that you are stable and secure. This will allow you to be strong through the contact area. This long contact heightens your control of the

Balance is especially critical for serves. When you serve there is NO reason you should not be balanced – you have the ball in your hands. This is the only time in tennis you are completely in charge of the tennis ball. Make sure you take this time before your serve to feel stable and comfortable. In our PBI Training we learn to ask students to imagine they are going to stand in their pre-serving stance for ten minutes, if you can do this then you are in a relaxed state.

Focus on balance and make tennis simple. Happy Hitting.

Klitschko keeps WBO crown

World heavyweight champion Vladimir Klitschko easily retained his WBO crown when he knocked out Alex Leapai of Australia in the fifth round on Saturday in an overwhelmingly one-sided bout.

The 38-year-old Klitschko, who holds the WBA, IBF, WBO and IBO crowns, has now been unbeaten for 10 years with his most recent defeat back in April 2004 against Lamon Brewster.

Klitschko, with his brother Vitaly – the former WBC champion and a politician in his home country – in his corner, knocked down his opponent after a few seconds in the first round, a big left-right combination sending the 34-year-old Leapai sprawling.

The Ukrainian, whose record now stands at 62 wins with 52 knock outs and three defeats, then pumelled the hapless Australian in round five, knocking him down once again before a clean knock out with less than a minute left in the round.

"Alex Leapai, I know it was not easy for you, but you were up against the best fighter in the world and it was hard," Klitschko said in a ringside interview.

"Despite my 38 years I felt superb. I was in top form tonight in the ring."

Klitschko also had a special mention for his home nation, saying his preparation for the fight was not easy due to the political crisis back home with neighboring Russia.

"I trained long and hard but it was not easy. My mind was back in Ukraine and what is happening there. Politicians must find a compromise and it should not come to a war. Ukraine will not be split up and (must) remain united."

Leapai, who got a shot at the world title after his stunning win over Russian Denis Boytsov in November last year, never got much chance to fight, with the 15-centimeter taller Klitschko tormenting him with his jab and longer reach.

"I tried to go inside and avoid the jab but it did not work. It's like that when you fight the champion," Leapai said. "Now it's back to the

Aussie olympian caught with drugs

AUSTRALIAN former Olympic swimmer Geoff Huegill has been charged with drug possession by police in Sydney after being arrested at a horse racing meeting at the weekend.

Huegill, who won a medley relay silver and a 100 meters butterfly bronze for Australia at the 2000 Sydney Olympics, was charged with his wife on Saturday and will appear at a Sydney court next month.

"Police were patrolling Randwick racecourse as part of their general duties when they were directed to a suite in the grandstand by security personnel," a police spokeswoman

man and his 30-year-old wife, who were alleged to be in possession of a small quantity of white powder, believed to be cocaine."

Huegill posted links on his Twitter account on Saturday to pictures of himself and his wife beaming in a room at the race meeting while drinking cham-

'Enjoying the day with @mshuegill in the Mo t suites at Randwick today," a caption read.

Huegill's lawyer Paul Hunt confirmed the couple were issued with a court notice.

"As the matter is not yet resolved, my clients do not intend to make any further comment at this point in time," he said in a state-

A former 50m butterfly world record holder, Huegill retired from the pool after the 2004 Athens Olympics and battled depression, weight and alcohol problems before making a highly publicized comeback in 2008.

He won golds at the 2010 Commonwealth Games and took a world championship bronze in Shanghai the following year before quitting the pool again after failing to qualify for the 2012 London Games.

Huegill's drugs charge follows problems with fellow former Australian swimmers in Ian Thorpe and Grant Hackett in recent months.

Five-time Olympic champion Thorpe was checked into a health clinic in February to treat depression after he was found disoriented and behaving oddly near a parked car in a Sydney suburb.

Triple Olympic champion Hackett flew to the United States later the same month to seek treatment for an addiction to a sleeping medication after he was photographed shirtless in the lobby of a Melbourne casino.

Ferdinand takes responsibility

Rio Ferdinand hopes to remain at Manchester United to help resurrect the fallen Premier League giants after an "embarrassing" season under David Moyes.

With his contract set to expire in June, the 35-year-old former England captain had appeared set to finish his 12-year career at the club after being used sparingly under recently sacked Scotsman Moyes.

"I'm going to continue playing," Ferdinand told British media. "Whether it's here, I don't know, but I hope so.

"I am sure that whoever is here, whoever is managing, the aim of this club is to win trophies and championships and we have done that for 25 years. Long may that continue."

After winning last year's league title in Alex Ferguson's final year as coach, United plumbed new depths under former Everton manager Moyes, and will miss out on the next Champions League tournament, a once unthinkable prospect.

Interim coach Ryan Giggs took the reins with a 4-0 win over Norwich City on Saturday, their biggest home league victory of the season. The win kept them seventh on the table, six points behind

Tottenham Hotspur.

Ferdinand was unable to explain the team's immediate improvement without Moyes in charge.

"The person who has the correct answer to that would be a genius," he said. "If we knew why, then I'm sure the change of manager wouldn't have happened. I've not looked at the league table for ages.

"We were saying it before the game. It's because you don't want to. It's embarrassing. You don't want to look at the league table and see where we are, but that's down to us as players.

"We take responsibility for that as much as anyone else. We are where we are and we have to take some responsibility for that.

"We are not shirkers and we are not people who don't take responsibility. I don't think you get to where we have got to in our careers without taking responsibility and this is no different."

Giggs has been backed to continue as United's full-time boss by Ferguson, but Dutch media have linked Louis van Gaal with the role once he finishes his World Cup commitments with Netherlands' national team in Brazil.

Scolari wary of protests

PEOPLE protesting against the World Cup or in favor of more social spending could harm the country's chances of winning the tournament, Brazil manager Luiz Felipe Scolari said on Sunday.

Hundreds of thousands of Brazilians took to the streets during last year's Confederations Cup to protest World Cup spending and a lack of infrastructure investment.

Smaller scale protests are still occurring in the country, which will host the June 12-July 13 tournament for the first time since 1950.

Scolari said he was not against demonstrations, but the World Cup was not the best time for his players to be confronted with any outside issues.

"I think protests can happen," Scolari said in an interview on Fantastico, a popular television show. "If they are normal, without smashing things up, then that is democracy.

"But I don't know if it's the right time.

"They are Brazil players and they have one mission. They can think, they can express themselves, they can say 'I want a better Brazil, too', but I don't want it to be something that causes problems in our environment."

When asked if protests could affect the players, Scolari replied: "It could, big time."

There is concern that protestors will try to disrupt some of the 64 World Cup matches after they marched towards the stadia used in last year's Confederations Cup.

They were often held back by riot police using dogs, percussion grenades and tear gas and police have undergone further training to make sure there is no repeat.
