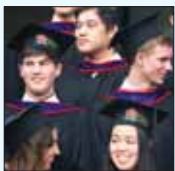

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# New park chief vows to end land encroachment

THE new chief of Phuket's Sirinath National Park has vowed to pick up where recently transferred Cheewapap Cheewatham left off and to push forward with investigations into land encroachment claims.

Chief Kitiphat Taraphiban arrived on the island last Friday and reported to Governor Maitri Inthasut for duty on Tuesday.

"I met with Governor Maitri to ask if there were any specific issues the Phuket government wanted me to tackle," Chief Kitiphat told the *Gazette* after his meeting on Tuesday.

"Of course, returning all encroached land back to Sirinath National Park and to the public is of utmost importance.

"The park is the property of the Kingdom, and we must preserve it for public use."

Chief Kitiphat said that he had spent the past three days reviewing reports that Chief Cheewapap left behind for him.

"Land encroachment is a serious problem for the park. I will start investigating it as soon as possible," he said.

Chief Kitiphat praised the current park officers for their hard work, but also pointed out areas

of weakness that he wanted to improve on.

"We have some strong officers here who work hard and truly want to return park land to the public. On the other hand, we have officers that do not support our investigations and do not enforce the law, which allows the bad guys to win," explained Chief Kitiphat.

"Our honest officers will focus on getting park land back, and we will stamp out any corruption within our ranks as we move for-

ward as a team."

In his final words as Sirinath park chief, Chief Cheewapap called upon his successor to be honest and brave.

Chief Kitiphat promised to answer that call.

"Please trust in me. I will work carefully and fight against all illegal activities. I am not a Phuket native, but I will help Phuket people by preserving the park so that future generations can enjoy it," he said.

## Foul weather foils search for body off Phuket coast

STORMY conditions last week hampered search efforts to locate a body spotted near Koh Kai Nai, an island off the coast of Phuket.

"We received a call from a villager on Koh Kai Nai at about 12:30pm saying that he had seen a body floating in the sea between Koh Yao Yai and Koh Kai Nai," Panya Chaichana of the Phuket Marine Police told the *Gazette* on May 22.

"We sent Marine Police and Kusoldharm Foundation rescue workers to search, but the strong waves and stormy conditions made it difficult. They could not find anything."

The team was able to resume the search the next day, said Col Panya.

"However, they were unable to find the body," he said.

"We are waiting for another sighting to be reported before we set out again."

Regarding reports of a body being spotted off Phi Phi Island, Lt Col Chaityasit Kancharoen of the Krabi Marine Police said that he had received no such report.

"We will look into it, but at this stage we have not received any reports of a person missing at sea in our area," Col Chaityasit said.

## Freak Facebook failure not initiated by Army

A WORLDWIDE Facebook crash on Wednesday caused a flurry of tweets in Phuket and Thailand over concern that the popular social media site had been blocked by the junta.

Downrightnow.com reported "likely service disruption" across the globe at about 4pm, but not isolated incidents in Thailand, as many were worried about.

Commanding General of the 41st Military Circle Peerapol Wiriyakul told the *Gazette* just after the crash happened that he had not yet been briefed about the issue with Facebook.

"Earlier this afternoon, we experienced a load-balancing issue that prevented some people from accessing Facebook for a brief period of time," Facebook said in a statement to the Huffington Post.

"We resolved the issue quickly, and we are now back to 100 per cent. We're sorry for any inconvenience we may have caused."

Media freedom has taken the front stage after the coup, leading four groups of media professionals — the Thai Journalists Association (TJA), National Press Council of Thailand, Thai Broadcast Journalists Association, and News Broadcasting Council of Thailand — to organize a meeting at the TJA headquarters Tuesday morning.

The group discussed how the media would perform its duties in the current situation, TJA president Pradit Ruangdit said.

During the discussion, the editors agreed on a three-point conclusion, saying that though their freedom was limited to an extent, they did not feel the National Council for Peace and Order's (NCPO) orders were too much of an obstacle.

However, they said the junta should hold a formal press conference every day and allow reporters to freely ask questions. They all agreed that if the public is able to get accurate information, with no questions left unanswered, then the country has a better chance of returning to normalcy.

## French expat arrested over ATM fraud

ACTING on a tip from a bank, police on May 24 arrested an expat Frenchman with counterfeit ATM cards and a stash of marijuana.

Jawad Naci, 32, was caught after Phuket Police were informed that a counterfeit electronic card had been used at an ATM in Srisoonthorn, in central Phuket.

Police obtained CCTV images from the ATM and got Mr Naci's name from Immigration, said Police Region 8 Commander Panya Mamen.

Police found and arrested Mr Naci in a Patong parking lot.

"We took him back to his house, where we found 71 counterfeit electronic cards and 106.08 grams of marijuana," said Gen Panya. "He confessed to everything."

Mr Naci was charged with possession of a Category 5 drug and ATM fraud.

# Gun-toting Aussie tourist nabbed with illegal drugs

PATONG Police arrested an Australian tourist on Tuesday after finding him in possession of 530mg of *ya ice* (crystal methamphetamine), a gun, and ammunition.

Police were able to track down Mark Robert Coutelas, 53, at Green Mango Apartment complex off Nanai Road after receiving a tip-off.

"We went to the complex and found Mr Coutelas at his rental room at about 2pm," said Lt Col Suttichai Thianpho of the Patong Police.

"We searched his room and found 530mg of *ya ice* in a small plastic bag along with drug paraphernalia. We also found an illegal 9mm handgun, bullets and a BB gun."

Mr Coutelas was charged with illegal possession of a firearm and ammunition, as well as possession of a Category 1 Drug, said Col Suttichai.

"A woman showed up after the

raid and told police that she and Mr Coutelas were dating," added Col Suttichai. "But we did not press charges against her, as she



was not present when officers searched the apartment."

"We are questioning both Mr Coutelas and his female companion about the gun and possible drug networks."

Officers declined to name Mr Coutelas' female companion.

## Patong Police issue naughty maid warning

PATONG Police are calling for any information that might lead to the arrest of a woman who applies for work as a maid, then literally cleans the place out, absconding with valuables.

"Today we received another complaint, this time from Karlsson's Hotel," Lt Col Suttichai Thianpho of the Patong Police told the *Gazette* on May 23.

Management at the hotel provided CCTV footage of the woman leaving the hotel after allegedly stealing cash and a mobile from a guest's room.

"Each time, the suspect applies for a job as a maid. She says she doesn't mind how much the pay is, she just needs to start work as soon as possible," explained Col Suttichai.

"But she never presents her ID card, she says that she will bring it later."

"Then as soon as she has a chance to work, she grabs whatever she can and leaves."

Col Suttichai described the woman as heavysset with dark skin, and about 155cm tall. She speaks in Southern Thai dialect.

Anyone with information that may lead to the woman's arrest is urged to call Patong Police Station at 076-342720.

## ATM users beware: new skimming device discovered

POLICE are warning all ATM users to beware fake covers fitted to the card-insert slots of ATM machines after finding a new form of card skimmer installed at a cash dispenser in Patong on Tuesday evening.

The new device was attached to a Siam Commercial Bank ATM in front of a 7-Eleven convenience store at Malin Plaza, on Prachanukrh Road, at the south end of Patong.

"We received a report from a local resident who said the card-insert slot looked odd," Lt Col Suttichai Thianpho of Patong Police told the *Gazette*.

Officers inspected the machine at about 6:30pm and found that a cover had been fitted over the card slot. Attached to the fake cover was an electronic chip.

"It was obviously a skimming device that copies the electronic information from every card that is inserted in the machine," Col Suttichai said.

"We haven't seen anything like this before. The bank staff that officers spoke to also confirmed this was a new device."

"We have notified all police stations in Phuket, as we don't know how many of these devices have been installed, or where."

"Please be cautious and check the ATM before using it. To be safe, please use one inside a bank."

# Divers plumb legal depths

LOCAL dive instructors do not need to obtain work permits for every neighboring province they visit with students, dive professionals learned on May 22 at a day-long seminar organized by the Phuket Provincial Employment Office (PPEO).

The purpose of the seminar was to clarify work permits and related legalities of working in Thailand, specifically for professionals in the dive industry.

The seminar was organized in response to widespread complaints from foreign dive instructors that they had been extorted by police for violating job descriptions stated in their work permits.

More than 100 members of the Phuket dive industry, both Thai and foreign, attended the seminar and submitted written questions to the speakers. The most popular question concerned geographical limits of the work permit.

"If my company has a program to take students diving in Phuket, Phang Nga, Krabi, Surat Thani and Ranong, are instructors allowed to accompany them?" was one such

question.

"You have to work at the location indicated in the work permit," responded Somchai Morakot-sriwan, an officer from the Legal Division of the Department of Employment Bureau.

"In this case, I advise dive companies to add this information to the employee's job description as part

of the work permit application."

Those divers who already have work permits that do not specify this information can get their permits amended, Mr Somchai noted.

Explaining why job descriptions are written only in Thai, Mr Somchai said, "We don't have enough officers who can communicate well in English. There are

only about 10 in the employment office who speak English well."

A final question asked whether divers needed to have their work permits on their person at all times, even in the water.

That is not necessary, Mr Somchai said, but they should be nearby. "Don't leave them at home," he said.

## Illegal shutterbugs caught snapping

TWO wedding photographers were caught working without work permits last week after police were tipped off by a pair of Thai wedding photographers.

Chinese photographers Bolin Zhu and Jing Wang, both 27, were taking pre-wedding photographs of a couple on Soi Romanee in Phuket Town when police arrived at the scene.

"We asked them to show us their work permits, but they were unable to produce them, so we took both men to the Phuket Immigration Office for questioning," said Phuket Immigration Inspector Tianchai Chompoo.

Mr Bolin and Mr Jing told police that they charged 1,500 baht per couple to shoot photo-

graphs in scenic Phuket locations, Maj Tianchai said.

Both men confessed to working without a work permit and were taken to Phuket City Police Station.

They each face a fine of up to 100,000 baht, up to five years in jail or both. They may also be deported within 30 days, Maj Tianchai said.

In February, two Chinese wedding photographers, a Chinese makeup artist and the owner of a Phuket photography studio that specialized in Chinese wedding photographs were arrested for working without work permits while shooting pre-wedding photos in Old Town Phuket.

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# Translators enlisted for tourists

## Bangkok-based translators to help in police stations nationwide

POLICE stations throughout Phuket will have video conference capabilities installed so that tourists can communicate with translators in Bangkok at any time, one of the country's top-ranking officers announced on May 23.

The initiative is to prevent misunderstandings between tourists filing complaints and police, said Assistant National Police Chief ML Pansak Kasemsant, speaking at Phuket Provincial Police Station.

The team of translators will be conversant in many languages, including English, Chinese, Russian, Burmese, Lao and Malay, Lt Gen ML Pansak said.

"We will have at least six qualified translators per language on standby at the Tourist Police

Division headquarters in Bangkok to help police communicate with tourists easily," he told the meeting of top-flight officers from Phuket, Phang Nga and Krabi.

"The number of translators will depend on the number of incoming tourists." Gen ML Pansak explained that his office had received requests from police in 30 provinces to have translators available.

The move will also help facilitate the introduction of the AEC [Asean Economic Community] in 2015, he added.

Misunderstandings between foreigners and police had caused problems in the past, he noted.

"In one case, there was a translation mistake, and the victim complained to the international media about Thailand. We do not want that situation to happen again," he said.

"Some stations already have foreign volunteers assisting them, but we want to do our utmost to make sure that we do not have any more misunderstandings."

Gen ML Pansak played down

the impact of the coup and the curfew on daily life.

"Do not worry about the coup if you have not done anything wrong, but make sure you comply with the announcements," he said.

"The Royal Thai Police are giving their full support to the army. However, our orders right now are to continue with our duties as usual and to maintain the safety of the people as our top priority."

## Tunnel eyed for traffic troubles

OFFICIALS in charge of the Patong tunnel project are reviewing strategies they can use to avoid creating bottleneck traffic jams at the Thung Thong Intersection in Kathu.

The tunnel project, budgeted to cost 9.57 billion baht – 6.80bn for materials, 2.56bn for land expropriation and 200mn baht for salaries – aims to provide a safe alternative to the notoriously dangerous road currently used to get into Patong.

Present at a meeting at Kathu Municipality on May 20 to review the problem was Lertsak Chingharanon, Deputy Governor for Technical Affairs at the Expressway Authority of Thailand (EXAT), the state enterprise tasked with completing the feasibility study for the tunnel.

"The intersection is the focal point of much of the traffic in the area. The tunnel could create bad traffic jams at that junction," Mr Lertsak noted.

He explained that, so far, EXAT

officials had come up with three strategies to cope with traffic at the junction: 1) Do nothing; 2) build a flyover across the intersection; and 3) expand traffic lanes at the junction.

"We will raise these options with other senior provincial officials and the relevant government officers on the island to see what positive ideas they may have," Mr Lertsak said.

"Hopefully, together, we can come up with a solution."

Mr Lertsak noted that reviewing potential problems before the project begins is critical to its success.

"Our feasibility study must be comprehensive to make sure we are aware of any problems the tunnel might create after it has been completed," he said.

Kathu Mayor Chaianan Sutthikul agreed.

"It is always much better to prevent a problem than to let it happen and try to fix it later," he said.

# A midnight

PATONG business operators this week welcomed the relaxation of the curfew, which they say had crippled trade in Phuket's busiest tourism town, costing nightlife operators 10 million baht a night.

The initial curfew, introduced on May 22, banned all unsanctioned travel on the streets between 10pm and 5am.

It was not until Tuesday this week that the National Council for Peace and Order (NCPO), the national administration set up by coup leader Gen Prayuth Chan-ocha, saw fit to revise the hours.

The new curfew, which came into effect on Wednesday, shortened the ban on being outdoors to four hours, from midnight to 4am.

"It is such a welcome relief that the curfew has been revised. The 10pm curfew was too early," Weerawit Kurasombat, president of the Patong Entertainment Business Association, told the *Gazette* on Wednesday.

"The midnight curfew is much better. At least tourists can go out and have fun."

The first few days under the original curfew drew a frightening picture for the immediate future for Patong. Shops, restaurants, bars and clubs shuttered early and the streets quickly emptied.

Patong rendered bereft of its renowned nightlife literally overnight led Mr Weerawit to warn of the town's ruin if the curfew continued.

"We were affected big time last night," he said last Friday. "If this curfew continues, it will be even worse than the tsunami. At least tourists could understand the tsunami was a natural disaster."

"The financial losses are seri-

ous, but they are nothing compared to the loss of image. Tourists will stop coming if they believe they can't have a good time here, and it will take a very long time to regain their confidence."

Mr Weerawit on Wednesday explained that it was still too early to estimate the losses inflicted by the curfew.

"We cannot say at this stage exactly how much we lost, but I would estimate near 10 million baht a night," he said.

### BOMBARDED BY LOBBYING

Initial pleas for the NCPO to lift the curfew in tourist areas, especially in Patong, seemed to fall on deaf ears.

Piyaman Tejapaibul to petition the ruling junta last Sunday.

Ms Piyaman asked for Gen Prayuth to consider lifting the curfew in key tourism areas, specifically Phuket, Koh Samui, Krabi and Pattaya.

"The NCPO accepted my proposal for consideration. However,

I was informed that the army must be sure about any changes they make before taking any action."

Gen Prayuth, after receiving royal endorsement to lead the NCPO on Monday, vowed to ease the "drastic measures" when the situation improved, but said the curfew was still needed.

Finally, the NCPO announced the revised curfew after Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) Governor Thawatchai Aranyik asked for a repeal of the curfew in tourist attractions that operate at night.

The TAT remained confident that reducing the curfew would not impair the nation's security.

### HARD HIT

Ms Piyaman said it was too early to calculate coup-related cancellations, but said that it was clearly affecting tourists' confidence.

However, TCT Vice President Pornthip Hirunkate pointed out that more than 50 nations had issued travel warnings urging their citizens to avoid non-essential travel to Thailand.

"Among these, Hong Kong raised the warning to the top level," Ms Pornthip told *The Nation*. "Furthermore, tourists from long-haul markets, including the US and Canada, as well as the UK and other European countries, have postponed their trips."

Many business and leisure tourists reportedly also cancelled trips to Thailand last week.

Ms Piyaman pointed out that the past six months of protests in the capital had stunted tourism growth for the year.

"The number of tourist arrivals during the first quarter this year dropped by 5.85% compared with last year, and the second quarter [which ends June 30] is already

# Coup crackdown on media

COMMERCIAL radio stations throughout Phuket fell silent last Sunday after receiving requests from the army to comply with an order issued by the National Council for Peace and Order (NCPO).

The ban on broadcasting included local satellite television networks.

The only Phuket station still broadcasting after Sunday was BlueWave 90.5FM.

"The station is part of the Public Relations Department, and they didn't really tell me anything," station manager Oscar Chitamitree told the *Gazette*.

Although all local radio stations and cable television networks were ordered offline immediately after the coup on May 22, many throughout the country were allowed to resume broadcasting soon after, as

the army became more clear which broadcasters were deemed to be disseminating "anti-coup propaganda".

However, the decision to reinstate the nationwide crackdown was announced last Sunday.

Army deputy spokesman Lt Col Winthai Suwaree announced that the army was targeting a total of 14 "community radio stations" and local television networks.

The NCPO was working out solutions for allowing the 14 banned broadcasters to resume their regular programs, he said.

The NCPO was willing to talk to the 14 stations if they had solutions to ensure that broadcasts would not cause turmoil in the country, Col Winthai added.

8.75% behind last year," she noted.

Considering the damage already done to the number of tourist arrivals, Ms Piyaman said the TCT supported the intervention by the military.

"We believe that it was better that the military step in than to let the protests go on forever. They had already gone on for far too long," she said.

That said, on Tuesday, Permanent Secretary for Sports and Tourism Suwat Sidthilaw confirmed that the arrival of foreign tourists had dropped by 20% following the imposition of martial law on May 20.

## THAI RESILIENCE

The TCT believes that the tourism sector could record growth this year if a new government is installed quickly and confidence in Thailand as a safe destination returns.

According to Ms Pornthip, tourism has suffered since the last coup in 2006 while other political issues, including the airport shutdown and street protests, have also had an impact, as did the severe floods in 2011. Despite that, the number of arrivals had continued to grow.

In 2006, Thailand received 13.8

million tourists. By 2013, the number of visitors had risen to 26.7 million, including an increase of 19.6% in the number of arrivals in that year alone.

"In Bangkok, the streets appear slightly quieter than usual and the general mood of the city seems calm," Ms Pornthip said.

"But everyone in the country, especially in the tourism sector, hopes military rule is lifted soon and democracy restored."

To counter the fall in the tourism arrivals, Ms Piyaman called on all media agencies to promote Thailand – by telling the truth.

"All we need to do to regain tourists' confidence is to tell them exactly what is happening in Thailand and where tourists can travel safely," she explained.

"Let them know that nearly everyone is going about their lives normally. This is especially true in Phuket, where you can see that – except the curfew – there has been no impact."

## DAY BY DAY

In response to the curfew, which may be lifted at any time by the NCPO, resourceful nightclub operators in Patong are opening their doors earlier in the hopes of luring patrons while the sun still

shines.

"Each venue has adjusted its hours to fit the curfew. Discotheques are now opening at about 4pm," Mr Weerawit explained.

"While there are no customers in discotheques at 4pm, this is our only option if we want to salvage business," he admitted.

Bar and nightclub owners aren't the only operators to suffer, Mr Weerawit added.

"Other businesses such as restaurants and shopping malls are suffering too. The industries are all connected. What I can tell you is that many operators have lost a lot because of the curfew," he said.

Night-venue operators understand the law and are complying with it, Mr Weerawit said, but they remain hopeful that tourist destinations such as Phuket will soon be exempted from curfews.

"I understand that we have to follow the NCPO's orders, that we have to 'walk in the same direction' as the coup leaders, but if things don't go back to normal, tourists might go to other countries that have beaches and nightlife.

"The sooner we get back to normal, the better."

## We've got class: Students return as schools open

STUDENTS in Phuket and nationwide went back to school on Monday, despite rumors online stating that schools would remain closed.

"I can confirm that all schools, both public and private, are open as usual today," Chalam Attatham, director of the Phuket Primary Educational Service Area Office, said on Monday.

"False information was spread throughout social networks claiming that schools were closed indefinitely, but the schools were closed only from May 23-25."

Mr Chalam urged everyone to refer only to credible sources for notices about school closings.

"Whoever is spreading rumors on social media sites, please stop, and everyone looking for information about closings should refer to the NCPO only," he said.

## Officials ask for help in stopping illegal fishing

PHUKET City officials are calling on the public to notify officers immediately of any illegal fishing carried out at Suan Luang Park (also called Chalermprakiat Ror IX Park or King's Park) in Phuket Town.

The call for public assistance follows a video posted on Facebook showing several people illegally fishing at one of the park's ponds.

"Anyone who sees people fishing at the park should report it to officials as soon as possible," said Tawatchai Tongmung, Chief Administrative Officer at Phuket City Municipality.

"No one is allowed to fish at Suan Luang."

Mr Tawatchai pointed out that the culprits caught on video were too quick for officers to notice during their routine patrols.

"They took only five minutes to lure the fish, cast their net and run away," he told the *Gazette*.

"We have officers patrolling the park, but it is a huge area with many ponds. We don't have enough officers to stand guard over all the ponds at all times."

The penalty for fishing in the park is a fine of up to 1,000 baht, Mr Tawatchai said.

"But there will be additional charges if anyone caught resists arrest," he warned.

"We need your help," Mr Tawatchai said. "If you see anyone fishing at the park, tell one of our officers as soon as possible. They are easy to recognize; they wear brown uniforms."

# Coastal erosion takes big bite out of Andaman coast

OFFICIALS on May 24 expressed deep concern about the rate of coastal erosion, especially at Bang Tao Beach and coastal areas inside Sirinath National Park.

Coastal erosion has ravaged areas in all six provinces along the Andaman Coast, said Somsri Arvakait, Director of Policy and Management for Coastal Areas at the Department of Marine and Coastal Resources (DMCR).

"In addition, areas in nine provinces in the upper reaches of the Gulf of Thailand have suffered extensive coastal erosion, as well as eight provinces in lower areas of the gulf," Ms Somsri said.

Tanet Munnay, chief of the DMCR Region 5 office, reported that sections of Bang Tao Beach and coastal areas inside Sirinath National Park were the worst hit on Phuket.

"Coastal erosion has been a problem for years. We have been studying it, but we simply are not sure how best to counter it," Mr Tanet said.

The battle against coastal erosion has plagued seafront communities and resort owners in the region for years.

In March, Krabi villagers built bamboo barriers 500 meters long in front of a fishing village to protect against it.

Last year, waves two meters high caused damage along 13 kilometers of beachfront at Bang

Niang Beach in Phang Nga, forcing at least one hotel owner to set up sandbags to protect against the sea, and prompting the local mayor to call the Phang Nga Governor for help from the

In 2012, constant pounding by waves battered a seawall to pieces at Surin Beach.

In 2011, local businessmen and restaurateurs at Rawai Beach raced to repair a seawall after a

large section of sidewalk plunged into the sea.

Mr Tanet told the *Gazette* that the DMRC was to meet again soon to discuss possible strategies to defend against erosion.

## Hundreds of coup supporters gather, give roses to officers in Phuket

"No words can explain how happy we are that we will be getting our [rice-pledge] money after waiting for so long."

Commanding General of the 41st Military Circle Peerapol Wiriyaikul, accepted the flowers and letters.

Maj Gen Peerapol acknowledged that the coup had inconvenienced people.

"We are now taking steps toward resolving the issues, so that life can go back to normal as soon as possible," he said.

"As Phuket is a holiday destination, the safety of tourists is a top priority. The army has been assigned to the island to maintain safety here, and although there is a curfew, tourists should still be able to carry on with their activities until 10pm."

The curfew has since been relaxed to midnight.

Gen Peerapol said that army officers assigned to Phuket will be stationed at the Tah Chat Chai checkpoint.

"Officers will not be allowed to carry weapons into any public places," Gen Peerapol affirmed.

THE four intrepid men biking their way from Sweden to Phuket to raise funds for the Barnhem Muang Mai orphanage in Phuket found themselves in a small Turkish village called Kandira on May 25.

With about 3,600 kilometers under their belts, and thousands more to tackle before crossing Sarasin Bridge, morale is still high for Calle Wollgard,

Fredrik Jessen, Tomi Blumen and Christofer Johansson.

"We still like each other, and I can't see that will change for the next couple of weeks at least!" Mr Wollgard told the *Gazette*.

Prior to Kandira, the team had spent more than a week resting in Istanbul, Turkey. However, time came when the team was ready to get back in the saddle, still aiming to arrive in Phuket in time to enjoy Christmas with the orphans. Mr Blumen was reported to

have been suffering stomach issues during their rest, but pushed on when it was time to move out – keeping up as they covered about 110km their first day back on the road.

Another concern is Mr Johansson's bike. Though its wheels are still spinning, it's in "far from perfect shape", explained Mr Wollgard.

The team is shooting to beat the heat as they travel through picturesque Northern Turkey by getting early starts to allow them to seek shade in the middle of the day.

"There is not much we can do about the hills, except conquer them," Mr Wollgard said.

The next big challenge will be staying safe in the traffic through-

## Phuket to serve as one of five hosts in upcoming Andaman carnival series

THE first in a five-part series of carnivals to be held in Andaman provinces will take place in Ranong on June 8.

Ranong, perhaps best known among expats as a visa-run destination, has plenty of things for tourists to enjoy, said Ranong Vice Governor Supawat Sakda, who announced the carnival with Phuket Vice Governor Sommai Prijasilpa on May 23.

"We are famous for our hot springs and mineral water, and have a lot of interesting

culture," Vice Governor Supawat said.

Called "Scent of Andaman", the Ranong event has an 8-million-baht budget and is expected to draw more than 10,000 visitors.

## Snake slithers onto electrical supply line, causes blackout in Phuket Town apartments

ELECTRICAL engineers called to a neighborhood on the north side of Phuket Town late in the night on May 25 found that a small tree snake had caused a blackout at several houses and an apartment block.

"We were called to Pimprapai Place apartments on Rassada Anuson Road [in Baan Kuku, Rassada] at about 10pm," said Pichai Rattanamunee, an electrical engineer with the Phuket Provincial Electricity Authority (PPEA).

"While inspecting the cables, we realized that a green snake about one meter long had caused a short circuit by slithering onto the main supply line to the apartment block."

Mr Pichai estimated that more than 1,000 volts had coursed through the snake's body.

"That's more than enough to

kill a snake. It did not survive," he said.

Power was restored after about an hour, Mr Pichai added.

## Pre-coup raids turn up illegal war weapons

AHEAD of the coup, a military-police team launched at least five raids and seized caches of war weapons under martial law, as ordered by Army chief Gen Prayuth Chan-ocha.

The first raid in Lop Buri on May 20 landed nine homemade bombs, a stick of TNT, an AK-47 assault rifle, an anti-personnel Claymore mine, 11 sets of detonators and large amounts of ammunition, reported *The Nation*.

Chaowat Thongphuek, a 54-year-old former paramilitary ranger, reportedly confessed to having acquired the weapons and having been hired to make bombs to be used for violence in the capital.

Later that day in Samut Sakhon, Jathana Warakornsakulkij was arrested for possessing a large cache of weapons.

Ms Janthana admitted to owning the items: five assault rifles, an M79 grenade launcher, a large amount of ammunition, three hand grenades, explosives contained in 120 bottles, eight homemade bombs, a handgun and a bullet-proof vest, as well as nails and wires meant as shrapnel for the bombs. However, she later said that the weapons were for self-defence.

She denied that two membership cards for the pro-government United Front for Democracy against Dictatorship found in her room were hers.

A third raid was at a home in Soi Rachadaphisek 32 in Bangkok and turned up 140 rounds for an M16 assault rifle and two dummy hand grenades.

On May 22, the results of more raids were released to the media.

Deputy Army spokesman Lt Col Winthai Suwaree issued details about one raid in Bangkok that turned up an AK-47 assault rifle and a loaded magazine, and another in Pathum Thani in which a bullet-proof vest and an Army helmet were seized.

## Media urge junta to grant freedoms of press, expression

EDITORS of several publications and media outlets called on the junta on Tuesday to allow freedom of press and freedom of expression, reported *The Nation*.

Four groups of media professionals – the Thai Journalists Association (TJA), National Press Council of Thailand, Thai Broadcast Journalists Association and News Broadcasting Council of Thailand – organized a meeting at the TJA headquarters Tuesday morning.

The group discussed how the media would perform its duties in the current situation, TJA president Pradit Ruangdit said.

Editors present agreed that although some

freedoms were limited, they did not feel the National Council for Peace and Order's (NCPO) rules presented a huge obstacle.

However, they said the junta should hold a formal press conference every day and allow reporters to freely ask questions. They argued that if the public was able to get accurate information, the country would have a better chance of returning to normalcy.

Army secretary Maj Gen Polphat Wannaphak warned two reporters that afternoon against trying to corner Gen Prayuth Chan-ocha, the NCPO chief, with pointed questions at press conferences.

Media controls are to be strictly observed to prevent the use of the press to instigate riots, protests or insult the monarchy, Lt Gen Theerachai Nakwanich said on Tuesday.

# Army to set up reconciliation centers throughout Thailand

IN AN attempt to patch up the rifts in society, coup leader Maj Gen Prayuth Chan-ocha on Tuesday ordered the four Army areas to set up reconciliation centers throughout the country.

The centers would be forums for people to exchange views and receive information on the junta. This would help avoid misunderstandings and false information spreading among the people that was stirring up conflict, said Lt Col Winthai Suwaree, a spokesman for the National Council for Peace and Order (NCPO).

Participation in the center's activities would be voluntary, but groups of people might need someone to lead the political dialogue, Col Winthai said.

Gen Prayuth staged a coup last week after negotiations among warring factions failed to produce any agreement to defuse the political crisis, reported *The Nation*.

Ousted education minister Chaturon Chaisang was seized by soldiers on Tuesday in front of a crowd of foreign journalists after giving a snap press conference at the Foreign Correspondents' Club of Thailand (FCCT).

Mr Chaturon, who did not report to the NCPO when summoned last Thursday, came out of hiding to appear before the international community at 2pm, reading a statement saying he was innocent of all charges.

Thailand needs to return to democracy as soon as possible and all sides must avoid violence and suppression of viewpoints, he said. He also called for the Army to release all detainees. Col Winthai said that Mr Chaturon was taken away as he had failed to comply

with the NCPO summons.

"Holding a press conference for the foreign media is deemed improper and against NCPO policy," Mr Winthai said.

The junta has invited hundreds of people for questioning, but some have still failed to appear, including Petchawat Wattanapongsirikul, chairman of the Rak

Chiang Mai 51 Group.

In Lamphun, troops and police stormed a longan orchard in response to tips that claimed red-shirt guards had been undergoing weapons training there. Surprised by the raid, five people tried to run away. Two were caught. Searches of the area uncovered several guns and signs for the red-shirt United Front for Democracy against Dictatorship.

In Udon Thani, members of the anti-coup Udon Peace group reported to the province's internal security operations center. They were warned not to rally and allowed to leave.

In Tak, the mansion of an adopted son of former interior minister Charupong Ruangsuan was searched. Mr Charupong has defied his summons.

In Trat, police continued hunting for Narong Krachangklang, who was accused of fatally shooting a ranger on duty during a search at Mr Narong's house on Monday. Police rejected rumors that Mr Narong, who was not home at the time, had already been gunned down.

The NCPO has appointed six advisers on five issues, with former defence minister general Prawit Wongsuwan leading the team.

## Soldiers told to negotiate, exercise restraint

THE military has threatened to take tough action against anybody caught carrying weapons, reported *The Nation*, in a move to stop disaffected factions from staging attacks and instigating riots.

Police will be the main force in controlling protests. They have been instructed to be initially lenient before opting for stricter measures, such as negotiating before arresting protester leaders, said Lt Gen Theerachai Nakwanich, serving as a commander of the peacekeeping force.

The police have also been instructed to avoid the use of force in order to prevent deaths and injuries.

Lt Gen Theerachai said soldiers stationed at various spots would not reject food and supplies given to them by civilians even though they might be handed dangerous items under the guise of donations.

He also warned that action would be taken against those who intend to harm soldiers, though the troops have been strictly banned from using weapons except for in self-defence.

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# California killer hails Penang days

THE 22-year-old man who went on a rampage in California last Friday, stabbing three people to death before opening fire on passers-by and killing three more before turning the gun on himself, was born to a Malaysian mother.

Elliot Rodger, son to Peter Rodger, the Hollywood assistant director for *The Hunger Games*, wrote in a 140-page document just days before his rampage about his trip to Penang with his mother Ong Li Chin Rodger.

"Sometime after my third birthday, we all went on a vacation to Malaysia, my mother's home country. I have only flashes of memory of that vacation. I enjoyed it very much. We visited a few of my mother's relatives," he wrote in the document, which he sent to several people, including his parents and therapist, shortly before his killing spree.

On his 13<sup>th</sup> birthday, Elliot said his mother took him and his younger sister Georgia to Malay-

sia again. In Penang, they met up with several relatives, including his maternal grandmother Ah Mah.

"We met up with Ah Mah, my mother's sister Min and her husband Jack and cousin Emma. They were also visiting Malaysia from England.

"During the trip, we toured the island of Penang, visited George Town, went to a fun water park

and had very delicious meals at many exotic restaurants," he said.

Elliot said the vacation was so nice that he did not miss his life in the United States, where the family had moved to from Britain.

Media accounts revealed a young man who lived a comfortable life but was troubled by loneliness and rejection by women. He was also known to have

Asperger syndrome, which affects the ability to communicate and engage in social interactions.

In the document titled "My Twisted World - The Story of Elliot Rodger", the London-born youngster spoke about his childhood and his family.

According to the dossier, which was circulated on the internet, his mother had gone to England to work as a nurse on several film sets.

"She became friends with important individuals in the film industry including George Lucas and Steven Spielberg. She even dated George Lucas for a short time," he wrote.

His mother was 30 when she gave birth to him, he said.

Shortly after his seventh birthday, Elliot said his mother and his father were divorced.

"I was absolutely shocked, outraged, and above all, overwhelmed. This was a huge, life-changing event."

Apparently, his mother had told him just a few months earlier that there would be no divorce.

Towards the end of his manuscript, murder was on his mind.

Women, he said, must be punished for rejecting a gentleman like him.

Chillingly, he spoke about a day of retribution. - *The Star*

### Cambodia premier spurns Thaksin's government in exile

PRIME Minister Hun Sen announced on Tuesday that Thaksin

Shinawatra and his sister, former Thai premier Yingluck, will not be allowed to form a government in exile in Cambodia.

PM Hun Sen said that despite good relations between himself and Mr Thaksin, Cambodian law did not allow him to set up a government in the country.

The Cambodian premier also advised Thaksin's lawyer, Robert Amsterdam, not to suggest forming a government in Cambodia as such an idea may cause more risk for the Shinawatra siblings.

### Religion minister resigns over graft

INDONESIAN Religious Affairs Minister Suryadharma Ali resigned on Monday after being accused of misusing funds that were supposed to help Muslims perform the Hajj pilgrimage to Mecca.

An anti-corruption agency last week named Suryadharma a suspect after it detected suspicious transactions of about US\$20 million in a special Hajj fund.

Millions of people have paid into the fund and must wait years as the annual quota of pilgrims is strictly controlled. - *Jakarta Post*

## China, Vietnam spat blooms as boat rammed, sunk

VIETNAM and China traded accusations on Tuesday over the sinking of a Vietnamese fishing boat near where China has placed a US\$1-billion oil rig in the disputed South China Sea, as tensions fester between the two countries over the giant drilling platform.

Hanoi said some 40 Chinese fishing boats had surrounded the Vietnamese craft before one of them rammed it and it sank. Vietnamese fishing boats operating nearby rescued the 10 fishermen

on board, the government and the coastguard said.

China's official Xinhua news agency, citing a government source, said the vessel capsized

after "harassing and colliding with" a Chinese fishing boat.

Scores of Vietnamese and Chinese ships, including coastguard vessels, have continued to square off around the rig despite a series of collisions earlier this month after the platform was towed to the site.

Each side has blamed the other over those incidents. Until Monday, no ship had sunk.

The incident took place about 17 nautical miles from the rig, which is drilling between the

Paracel islands occupied by China and the Vietnamese coast. China calls them the Xisha islands.

Vietnam has said the *Haiyang Shiyou* 981 rig is in its 200-nautical mile exclusive economic zone and on its continental shelf. China says it is operating within its waters.

The rig, owned by state-run China National Offshore Oil Company Group, is 240km off Vietnam's coast and 330km from the southern coast of China's Hainan Island. - *Reuters*

## Myanmar adults living on US\$10 a day

ABOUT 95 PER CENT of adults in Myanmar live on less than US\$10 a day, according to a recent report by the United Nations Capital Development Fund (UNCDF).

The UNCDF report was based on the agency's Making Access Possible survey, which was compiled on a sample of 5,100 people from throughout the country, including interviews conducted last year.

"Financial services are at a very low level in Myanmar and this is impacting the country's ability to harness the capital available for national development," said Henri Dommel, director of the Inclusive Finance division at the UNCDF.

"Significant effort is required to move the country towards more formal financial services."

The survey noted that 10 per cent of the country's adults preferred to save money in gold or cash.

Due to the cash-based culture, the cost of starting a business in Myanmar is high, the report said.

Myanmar's current monetary services do not match the country's needs, added the report.

Also impeding the country's development was that many banking firms posed obstacles to obtaining loans and burdensome rules and regulations all encouraged informal money-lending, said the report.

## Aussie lawmaker sneaks fake bomb into parliament

AN AUSTRALIAN lawmaker smuggled a replica explosive device into parliament on Monday to highlight security shortfalls created by budget cuts, in perhaps the oddest protest yet against the conservative government's controversial cost-cutting measures.

Senator Bill Heffernan said that new cost-saving security protocols being trialled had allowed him to smuggle the device into the building in a plastic bag.

## Pistorius ordered to one month of psychiatric testing

SOUTH African Olympic and Paralympic track star Oscar Pistorius was ordered on Tuesday to undergo a month of psychiatric tests to find out whether he was criminally responsible when he shot dead his girlfriend on Valentine's Day last year.

## Nuclear activity in North Korea alerts South Korea, China

SOUTH Korea and China agreed on Monday that nuclear activity by North Korea has posed a serious threat to peace and stability in the region and Pyongyang must not conduct nuclear tests, Seoul said after a diplomatic meeting.

Analysts have suggested the North may be close to miniaturizing a nuclear warhead, alarming regional powers that have for two decades tried to rein in Pyongyang's atomic program.

## Mining minister to mediate in ongoing platinum strike

SOUTH African mining minister Ngoako Ramatlhodi has pledged to mediate in a crippling platinum strike now in its fifth month.

Mr Ramatlhodi, who was sworn in on Monday evening, also said that mining companies had not done enough "to address the well-being of workers", particularly with regard to the squalid living conditions at many mines.

# China launches full-scale crackdown on terrorism

CHINA has launched a one-year crackdown to hunt down and punish terrorists in Xinjiang, state media said on May 23, a day after the deadliest attack in years in the far western region with a large Muslim Uighur minority.

Five suicide bombers carried out an attack on the morning of May 22 which killed 31 people at a market, according to state media.

"The campaign will make full use of political and legal forces, army and armed police in Xinjiang," the official Xinhua news agency said of the crackdown, citing local authorities.

The aim, Xinhua said, was to "focus on terrorists and religious extremist groups, gun and explosive manufacturing dens and terrorist training camps."

"Terrorists and extremists will be hunted down and punished. The government will prevent terrorism and extremism from spreading to other regions."

Authorities reported that in May, more than 200 suspects in 23 "terror and religious extremist" groups had already been apprehended.

The drive, approved by the central government and a national-level group leading anti-terrorism activity, would last until June 2015 with Xinjiang as the "major battleground".

Last week's bombing was the

second suicide attack in the capital in just over three weeks. A bomb and knife attack at an Urumqi train station in April killed a bystander and wounded 79.

The government had already

launched a campaign to strike against terrorism in Xinjiang, blaming Islamists and separatists for the worsening violence. At least 180 people have been killed in attacks across China over the past year.

The attackers ploughed two vehicles into a market in Urumqi and hurled explosives. Many of the 94 wounded were elderly shoppers, according to witnesses.

"Five suspects who participated in the violent terrorist attack blew themselves up," the *Global Times*,

a tabloid run by the *People's Daily*, the official newspaper of the Communist Party, reported on May 23. The newspaper said authorities "are investigating whether there were other accomplices".

No group has claimed responsibility for the latest attack.

China has been grappling with a rise in suicide attacks, reported Reuters. A car burst into flames at the edge of Beijing's Tiananmen Square last October, killing five people.

## Ukraine orders air strikes on rebel-held airport

UKRAINE launched air strikes and a paratrooper assault against pro-Russian rebels who seized an airport on Monday, as its newly elected leader rejected any talks with "terrorists" and said a robust military campaign in the east should be able to put down a separatist revolt in "a matter of hours".

As the *Gazette* went to print on Wednesday, more than fifty people had been killed as a result of the fighting.

Ukrainians rallied overwhelmingly in the May 25 election behind Petro Poroshenko, a political veteran and billionaire owner of chocolate factories, hoping the burly 48-year-old can rescue the nation from the brink of bankruptcy, civil war and dismemberment by its former Soviet masters in the Kremlin.

Monday's rapid military response to sepa-

ratists who seized the airport in Donetsk was a defiant answer to Moscow, which said it was ready for dialogue with Mr Poroshenko but demanded he first scale back the armed forces' campaign in the east.

Gunfire and explosions could be heard as a warplane flew over the airport, hours after truckloads of armed rebel fighters arrived and seized a terminal.

The airport serves a city of 1 million people that the rebels have proclaimed capital of an independent "people's republic", and where they succeeded in blocking all voting in the May 25 election.

Their attempt to seize the airport may have been intended to prevent Mr Poroshenko from travelling there: he had said his first stop would be to visit the restive east.

## Nigerian military has located kidnapped girls, will not risk rescue

NIGERIA'S military knows where the more than 200 girls abducted by Boko Haram are but has ruled out using force to rescue them, the state news agency quoted Chief of Defence Staff Air Marshal Alex Badeh as saying on Monday.

Seven weeks since Boko Haram militants abducted more than 200 girls taking exams at secondary school in the remote north-eastern village of Chibok, little is known of their whereabouts or what the military is doing to gain their freedom.

"The good news for the parents of the girls is that we know where they are, but

we cannot tell you," Mr Badeh was quoted by the News Agency of Nigeria (NAN) as saying.

"But where they are held, can we go there with force? We can't kill our girls in the name of trying to get them back."

Most officials think any raid to rescue them would be fraught with danger and

probably not worth the risk that the girls would be killed by their captors – an Islamist group that has shown a high degree of ruthlessness in killing civilians.

Since the girls were captured, according to a Reuters count, at least 470 civilians have died violent deaths in various locations at the hands of Boko Haram, which says it

is fighting to establish an Islamic state in religiously mixed Nigeria.

President Goodluck Jonathan has branded them an "al Qaeda of West Africa".

Britain's BBC reported on Monday that a deal was close to being agreed to rescue the girls in exchange for Boko Haram prisoners – a demand the group had made public – but that it was called off at the last minute.

Nigeria accepted help from the United States, Britain, France and China last week and US troops have started arriving in neighboring Chad to organize a mission to try to free the girls.

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# That 2006 feeling again

ONE of my many guilty pleasures is the movie *Top Gun*. Just a whisper of the names Viper, Iceman or Goose brings back the memory and has me feeling like it's 1986 all over again. It's hard not to turn all Righteous Brothers with a shout-out on "You've Lost That Lovin' Feeling".

As I write today, the day after the coup, I have been getting all nostalgic thinking what the big event in 2006 brought to real estate and tourism in Phuket. While it was only eight years ago, it seems more like 18 or 800.

One thing I oddly remember is the World Cup final between Italy and France. The former, of course, won in a penalty shoot-out and French midfielder Zinedine Zidane was sent off in disgrace after head-butting an opposing player. Little did we know at the time that Thai Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra was headed for the sidelines in the fall of that year. On September 19<sup>th</sup>, while he was visiting New York, a coup was staged and Thaksin joined Zidane on the bench.

There was a lot of optimism in 2006, with only an inkling of what lay ahead with Subprime, Ireland, Greece, Madoff and Lehman's. Here in Phuket, the property market was hitting its peak, and there was an entirely new face for property buyers. No

longer was it simple end-users, but the investors had crashed the party and were snapping up anything that moved. Yes, it was a giant party back in 2006, one that we may not be seeing again for a very long time.

Today as I sit in my office, with the grim prospect of no television tonight, I have to ponder if we are indeed back in a cycle or treading into the brave unknown world of further confusion. Politics in 2006 did not bring down Thailand's prop-

erty market, nor did it dissuade tourists in the long-term to visit the Kingdom.

Over the past decade and a half the game changers, as it were, with the exception of the Asian tsunami, were external events. Going from 9-11, SARS, to the global financial debacle, Thailand somehow has managed to stay on the sunny side of the street. Certainly over the past six

months, one has to wonder how long this can last, or what damage has been done.

Looking back at the property peak and the swift trip downhill, one of the most prolific killers of demand was the demise of the pound sterling. This cut deep with an abrupt change in exchange rates and once that came uncorked, Ireland came unglued and we all know what happened later. For Phuket, UK property buyers and investors – be they expats from Hong Kong, Singapore or the US – were critical to the sector's rise.

In the succeeding years, as Europe and the US imploded, Phuket came alive with domestic buyers, who became the flavor of the day. These days, with a virtual glut of inland shoebox condos, the ominous secondary market which crushed the foreign sector a few years before could stifle the industry once again.

Broad brush strokes and generalizations are not the best of

ideas when painting a precise portrait instead of a massive landscape. So where we sit today, gearing up for yet another World Cup, we start to wonder is this déjà vu, or just something bad we had for lunch. All things will pass, as did 2006 and as will 2014.

A week ago, my travels had me in Niseko, where seasonality and high development costs hamper property yields. But as one person said to me, people still

buy property here because they can. It's not about the returns, or the fine print, but the lifestyle and the dream. This still holds true today, as Phuket remains an object of desire for so many the world around, despite the good and the downright bad that often plagues life in paradise.

DEVELOPERS in Thailand are increasingly eyeing the lucrative expat retirement-living market, which is set to be a rapid-growth area as members of the aging population in Western countries seek out a tropical retirement lifestyle. The *Gazette* recently spoke with the Managing Director of Krabi Consultants Co Ltd Robert C Reynolds about new flexible leasing structures for units in the company's Lai Thai Luxury Condominiums, which seek to capture this growing market segment.

"I have been studying the market for retirees, or senior citizens for some time. Since there is such a broad definition of this market in terms of age – over 50, over 60 etc – we call it the 'silver market'," said Mr Reynolds.

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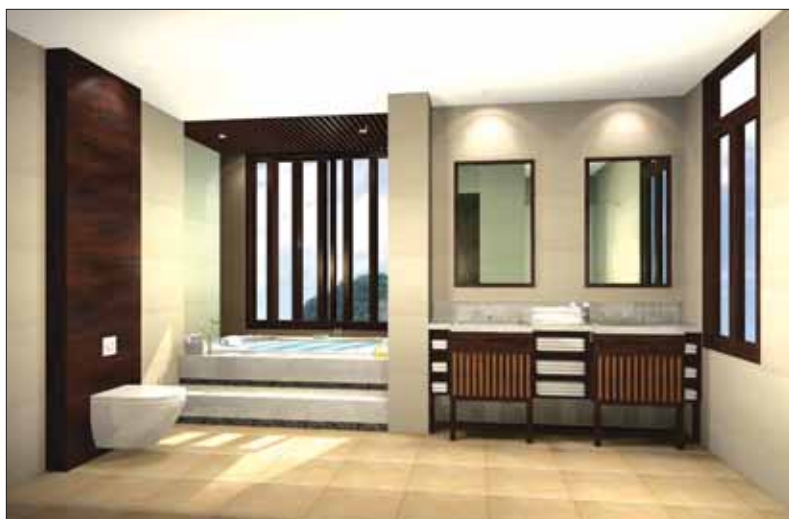

# Make tourism a priority

AS THIS edition goes to press, the nationwide curfew imposed by the National Council for Peace and Order (NCPO) has already done considerable harm to Thailand's all-important tourism sector.

Indeed, no province stands to suffer more than Phuket if international confidence in Thailand as a safe tourism destination deteriorates any further. Hence, the *Gazette* fully supports calls by tourism industry leaders [pages 6-7] for flexibility on curfews and other restrictions in important tourist destinations such as Phuket, where the likelihood of violent protests appears to be very limited.

While the NCPO is reportedly already drafting a roadmap to bolster an economy stilted by years of political instability, here in Phuket we can only hope that the coup leaders place tourism as one of their top priorities. This will of course go hand-in-hand with restoring the country to some form of a functional democracy.

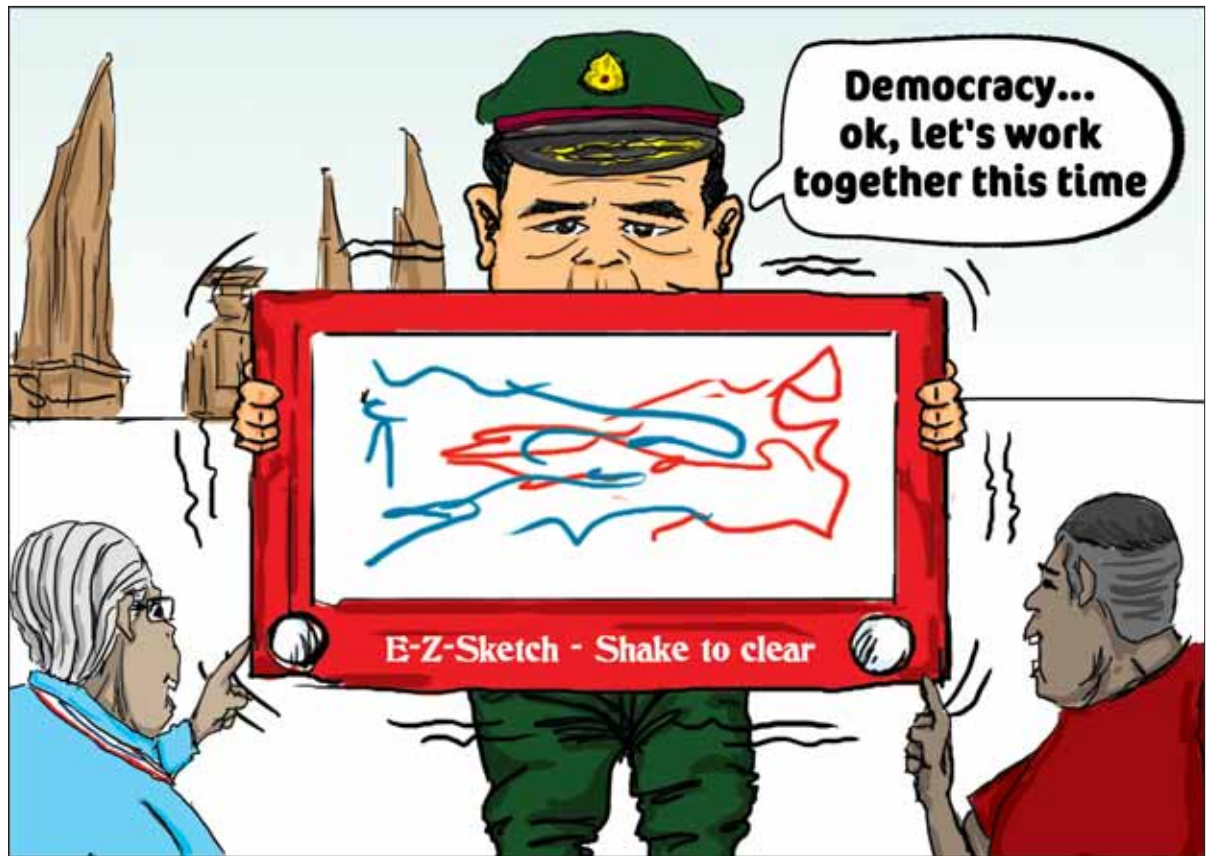
Though a coup may appear a setback, especially to those unfamiliar with modern Thai history, past events have shown that positive strides can be made under well-intentioned appointed governments such as the one headed by Anand Punyarachun in the 1990s.

The current coup leaders have already taken one popular step in terms of agricultural policy by authorizing payouts to rice farmers contracted under the controversial rice pledging scheme.

That said, the coup leaders should remember the lessons of Black May in 1992. There could be no better warning about the dangers of trying to parlay a "successful coup" into real administrative, political power. If it did not work then, it certainly will not work now in this new era of unprecedented political divisiveness powered, in large part, by social media. This is one information component previous coup leaders could never have imagined having to deal with. The NCPO is aware of its power, but has a long way to go in mastering its use.

It is sad and somewhat embarrassing that Thailand's tortuous journey to democracy seems to be written on an Etch A Sketch, with opposing forces each controlling one of the two knobs until the entire screen is filled, a complete mess has been created, and the only solution is a shake-up that just brings us back to where we started.

Nevertheless, given the importance of the local tourism industry, lack of danger in Phuket and power of social media, we should all get out the message that Phuket is still a safe destination. The potential for violence and danger remains, but for the most part it exists mainly, like just about everything else in this highly centralized nation, in Bangkok.

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# Turning others' bad reputation to profit

THE bad reputation of taxi drivers in Phuket actually helped my taxi business become successful.

It all started for me about three years ago. I had been working as a driver for a tour company but decided to go out on my own because I wanted to get more experience and manage everything by myself.

I didn't use the internet very much at that time, but then I had a customer named Ian Bishop, a teacher from Australia, who taught me a lot about it. He liked my service, and when he went home, he posted a good review of me on TripAdvisor.

In the first year after that, I didn't see an increase in customers, but then more people posted comments about me, and in the second year my customers went up by about 70 per cent. Now I'm booked solid through to next year. I get about 10 emails a day asking for bookings. I work alone, and I'm so busy I have to turn away customers.

Here, he talks about how the bad reputation of taxi drivers in Phuket and a good online review helped him expand his business, and discusses the attributes of a good taxi driver.

The customers I get from online research the island before they come. They tend to be knowledgeable about Phuket and want to learn more when they're here. They are usually calm and patient, and I like working with them.

When I hear stories about bad taxi drivers – the ones who break the rules, cheat their customers or sexually harass them – I feel so sad, because it gives us all a bad image. These guys need to be really strongly punished.

All of us who deal with tourists hold Phuket's reputation in our hands, especially if we're the ones the tourist meets first – the crew on their airplane, immigration officials, taxi drivers. We help them form their first impression of Thailand. We all need to try to give

them a good feeling when they arrive, so they'll be impressed with Thailand.

It's not hard to be a good taxi driver. You just need to take care of your customers well. You need to have a service mind, be responsible, honest, trustworthy, friendly and helpful.

Some taxi drivers who take customers on day trips take them to shops. I know they do it because they get a commission from the shop, and I think this behavior is selfish. What kind of experience is that for the visitors? They probably spent a long time planning their trip, and are really looking forward to a fun holiday. They're not going to be impressed if we take them to a shop. Phuket has so many great places to visit – beaches, attractions, lovely nature – these are the things that tourists are going to enjoy.

I love my job. It gives me so much, and allows me to help my family. I'm really grateful to Mr Bishop for praising me online and helping me establish a good reputation.

### Not all work permits equal in the AEC

I am not a Singaporean citizen, but I have a work permit to work in Singapore. When the Asean Economic Community (AEC) comes into effect in 2015, will I be able to use that work permit to work in Thailand? Or do I have to be a Singapore citizen?

**Yaowapa Pibulpol, Chief of Phuket Provincial Employment Office, replies:**

Right now, a person who has a work permit in a particular country can only work in that country. They can't transfer the permit to another country.

The Ministry of Labor has not yet issued full details explaining how work permits will work once the AEC begins.

**Somchai Morakotsriwan, officer in the Legal Division of the Department of Employment, replies:**

One purpose of the AEC is to make it more convenient for citizens of member countries to work in other member countries, and for employees to hire them.

However, when the AEC begins, the Alien Working Act BE 2551 will still be in effect, which means that every non-Thai will need a Thai work permit in order to work in Thailand.

## Moo not moot at Immigration

This morning I went to the Immigration Office to get a proof of residence certificate and an officer turned me away, saying the address in my rental contract wasn't complete because it didn't include my *moo*. I have gotten residence certificates before and the officers never asked me to supply my *moo*.

In any case, I knew my *moo* and told him, but the officer insisted I had to change my rental contract and formally correct the address. My real estate agent is shocked, he has never experienced this either.

Is this a new rule, old rule or just a strange officer?

**Lt Col Napat Nusen, Phuket Immigration Officer, replies:**

It is not a new rule that the address has to be filled in completely. I am not sure why you weren't required to fill in the *moo* before. Our rules state that the address must be 100 per cent complete.

Anyone coming for a proof of residence document should make sure that the address they submit is exactly the same as the address on the house registration document known as *tabian baan*. This is the official, complete legal address.

By law, anyone who rents property to a foreigner or even has a foreigner living in

their property rent-free must report to us. Once we receive the report, we'll have the information in our database, and when the foreigner comes to request an address certificate, we can easily confirm the information and print the proof of residence certificate.

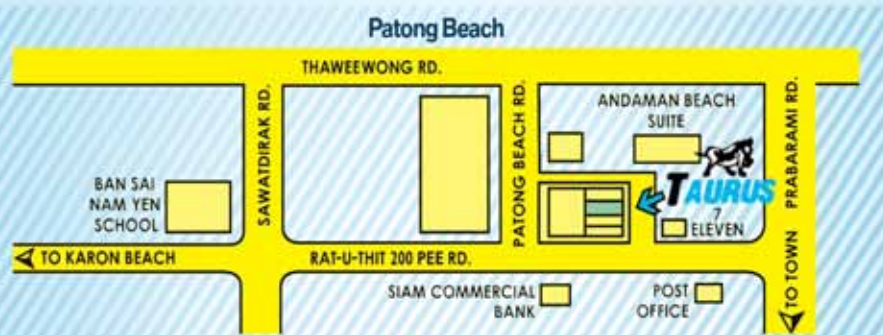

# The need for expert advice

I RECENTLY wrote about the importance of women expats having a sound understanding of their financial status, and putting in place the correct procedures to protect themselves financially, should they divorce or outlive their husband. This article continues that theme and looks at what type of expert advice expat women should seek to ensure their financial security while living abroad.

Even if you believe your current financial situation is easy for you and/or your spouse to manage on your own, and you as a couple are used to handling all financial matters by yourselves, becoming an expat will immediately complicate your financial situation and overall life considerably. Moreover, both husband and wife could easily be overwhelmed with all of the other details that come with relocating abroad such as: finding a place to live, enrolling any children into school, making new friends and learning to live in a new culture.

At the very least, you should either consult with on a regular basis, or be ready to consult with the following experts:

• **Tax Accountant** – Unless you are both retired and plan to keep most of your financial assets in your home country, you will need to find a tax accountant who understands expat tax issues – especially if you are American and have worldwide tax and financial reporting obligations about overseas financial assets. A tax accountant who understands expat tax issues will cost more than a typical tax accountant, but he or she can end up saving them significant amounts of money by ensuring you are in full compliance with all applicable tax laws and asset reporting rules.

• **Attorney** – While sites like legalzoom.com and various legal software programs are very useful for helping you come up with some basic estate planning docu-

ments like wills and power of attorneys, it's always a good idea to have an attorney look over such documents. It's also advisable to have an attorney in the country where you will be residing (and ideally one who is familiar with the expat's home country's laws) to also take a look at all of your estate planning documents to make sure they are not in conflict with that country's laws.

• **Insurance Expert** – Insurance is all about protection from risk and unforeseen accidents, but many expats fail to have the right amount, or the right kind, of insurance. Specific types of insurance needed to be carried by expat couples would include: expat health insurance that covers medical evacuation to their home country; life insurance on anyone whose income they are dependent on, as expats are usually ineligible for unemployment compensation from their home countries; disability insurance, as most Western countries do not allow expats to collect or even file for disability compensation while living abroad; long-term care insurance if you are near retirement; and some sort of umbrella liability insurance to cover homes, cars and any other property in the event of an accident, disaster or theft. With all of that in mind, an insurance expert should take a look at current coverages and see where there might be gaps or the need to purchase additional coverage.

• **Financial Adviser** – Having expert investing and financial planning advice will be critical for a comfortable retirement, with the best financial advisers being those who work under the fiduciary standard rather than the suitability standard. Under the fiduciary standard, financial advisers are required to put their own interests below those of any clients and are required to provide infor-

mation that is as accurate or complete as possible while avoiding conflicts of interest.

This means no commissions paid by investment firms for selling or pushing their financial products. Instead, such financial advisers earn income by charging a small annual fee that is the percentage of the amount of assets under management – meaning there is an incentive to grow your investment account while avoiding both risky investments and excessive trading that generate commissions.

Finally, expats should be sure to find a financial adviser who is licensed by proper regulatory authorities, both locally and abroad such as the US Securities and Exchange Commission, as the world of financial advice for expats is often like the Wild West filled with scams and dubious investment products or salesmen masquerading as experts.

How often should expats con-

sult with all of these experts? Generally speaking, and unless your lives or financial situation are overly complicated (such as owning a business in a foreign country), and barring any major changes in your lives, you would only need to consult with an attorney and an insurance expert once every few years. However, it's a good idea to consult with a tax accountant near the end of every financial year, and, of course, before you must file a tax return or fulfill any asset reporting requirements (such as an American maintaining large overseas financial accounts).

However, and at the very least, you should schedule a meeting with your financial adviser at least twice a year – towards the end of the year around the time they consult with your tax accountant, and near the middle of the year to review your financial plan, goals and investment performance – or more if their financial situation is overly complicated or if the markets are particularly volatile.

Given how often expats will need to meet with their financial

adviser, it's important that husband and wife select one who they BOTH feel comfortable working with together, or alone, and can build a good rapport and long-term working relationship. Wives statistically tend to outlive their husbands and it will be important to have some continuity when it comes to financial advisory should they outlive their husband. And while they might be comfortable working with a financial adviser who is in the same age bracket they are in, this may not make much sense if they are near retirement or already retired because inevitably their financial adviser will also be thinking about retiring.

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## Economy adversely affected by military coup, but hope remains

FOLLOWING the Royal Thai Army's announcement of a coup on May 22, the benchmark of the Stock Exchange of Thailand (SET) Index, closed up 0.2% to 1,405.21. This was in contrast to its fall of 1.2% when martial-law was first declared.

According to the exchange data, since the May 20<sup>th</sup> declaration of martial law, overseas investors had pulled US\$408 million out of Thai stocks, sending the SET Index

benchmark down 0.7% this month.

The country's gross domestic product (GDP) had already contracted 0.6% in the first quarter compared to the same period last year and the bank further lowered its 2014 growth forecast to 1.3% from 2.2%, amid the political protests and violence that has resulted in more than two dozen deaths.

Another development that is threatening the country's economic growth is the weakening of

Thailand's \$35 billion tourist industry, which contributes 9% to the country's GDP, as many countries in the world have issued warnings for their citizens to exercise a high degree of caution when entering the kingdom.

However, after the prolonged political unrest that has continually deteriorated, many sides hope that this coup will be the silver lining for Thailand's resolution of disputes.

# Outlook positive

## Business leaders are confident in economy regardless of coup

BUSINESS and economic leaders have expressed confidence in the economy despite the uncertainty surrounding the direction the National Council for Peace and Order (NCPO) will take in the coming weeks and months.

The heads of several leading property development companies, including Italian-Thai Development Plc, Sansiri Plc and Land and House Plc, all of which have large projects underway or slated for Phuket, were ordered to report to the NCPO on May 25.

Since then, two of the companies have released statements that none of their projects have been affected by the coup and will continue as scheduled.

"Sansiri Plc will continue normal business without any effect on operations. Chief Executive Officer Apichart Chutrakul and Chief Operating Officer Wanchak Buranasiri, along with other high-level executives of the company will perform their duties as usual," said the statement released by Sansiri.

Anant Asavabhokhin, chairman of the executive board and chairman of the board of directors at Land and Houses Public Co Ltd was also called to report to the council.

Land and House General Manager Ruksaspong Khumkhanjum, subsequently told the *Gazette* on Tuesday that the company's projects would not be affected.

"Mr Anant was called by the NCPO. For what reason, I have no idea. However, our projects are ongoing as is. All the investments are on the way, including current projects and others," he confirmed to the *Gazette*.

The third developer to be called was Premchai Kamasutra, president of Italian-Thai Development Plc, the contractor for the Thainan underpasses currently being built on the bypass road. However, no Ital-Thai statement was available as this story went to print.

### Property agencies unfazed

Leading property agencies Jones Lang LaSalle and Frank Knight have also expressed confidence that the property market would not suffer in the wake of the coup, saying that the industry had weathered similar events in the past with little or no negative effects.

"Our discussions with clients and business partners, including property developers, investors and corporate occupiers, showed that the coup came as no surprise,"

Jones Lang LaSalle Managing Director Suphin Mechuchep told *The Nation* on Tuesday.

"Similarly, since the political tension escalated late last year, we have seen developers, owners, investors and occupiers becoming more cautious, with some of them adopting a wait-and-see approach. There remains no clear evidence of the coup changing the situation at this stage," Mr Suphin said.

Frank Khan, executive director and head of residential for Frank Knight's Thai unit, said that the political crisis in Thailand is currently not a big deal for the property business, and that things were difficult in the first four or five months of the year and the real-estate market was soft, but the situation is gradually improving.

"To look on the bright side, the political unrest has been beneficial

in that the condominium market has cooled down, reducing the likelihood of an oversupply," he added.

### Economic road map

Meanwhile, seven key private-sector organizations are drawing up an economic road map comprising short and long-term reform plans to be presented to the NCPO in a bid to help restore economic confidence in the Kingdom, reported *The Nation*.

The groups are the Thai Chamber of Commerce/Board of Trade, Tourism Council of Thailand, Thai Bankers' Association, Federation of Thai Industries (FTI), Federation of Thai Capital Market Organizations, Stock Exchange of Thailand and Thai Listed Companies Association.

"The most important thing right now is to find ways to bring back confidence in consumption, investment and tourism. Each organization has also been tasked with coming up with a plan to enhance the country's competitiveness for the next 15-20 years," said Isara Vongkusolkit, chairman of the Board of Trade.

Supant Mongkolsuthree, chairman of the FTI, said there were seven frameworks within the road map. They include plans to increase the country's competitiveness, enhance public and private investment, promote education and innovation, lessen social and economic inequality, fix corruption, reform regulations and create a new economic structure.

### Banks praise rice payments

Other signs of economic confidence increasing after the NCPO's breaking of the political deadlock include the rapid payback of rice

farmers involved in the troubled rice-pledging project. Payments have already started to flow, enabling farmers to pay back debts and put money towards next year's crops.

Commercial banks have expressed strong interest in bidding for a multi-billion-baht bridging loan under the rice-pledging project, as they believe the payment of long-overdue money to farmers marks the first step in fueling the sluggish economy.

Their interest comes after the Finance Ministry invited 32 state and private banks to bid for the first phase of a three-year program of bridging loans, totaling 50 billion baht, to the Bank for Agriculture and Agricultural Cooperatives (BAAC), so that rice farmers can be paid.

The first 30-billion-baht tender will take place on June 6, while a second is scheduled for June 13.

Vasin Vanichvoranun, executive vice president of Kasikornbank, told *The Nation* on Tuesday that assuming legal issues surrounding such lending were fully clarified, the bank should have no problems about participating in the bidding.

"Rice payment [to farmers] is

a good way to fuel the economy. However, we also have to pursue other projects, including infrastructure projects, which have not been announced yet," he added.

Other leading banks have expressed optimism that since the political impasse is over, investment funding for public infrastructure will begin to flow, boosting the economy.

Chansak Fuangfu, director and senior executive vice president of Bangkok Bank, said they were awaiting signals from the NCPO on such public infrastructure funding.

"What the bank has to monitor is additional public investment projects, which will fuel the economy significantly. We are awaiting the upcoming economic road map from the National Council for Peace and Order," he said.

Arthid Nanthawithaya, senior executive vice president of Siam Commercial Bank, said a positive sign for the economy – and for boosting private-sector confidence – is the fact that the NCPO has announced it will give importance to public investment, and especially to major infrastructure projects.

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# More than visa runs

THE first in a five-part series of carnivals to be held in Andaman provinces will take place in Ranong on June 8.

Ranong, perhaps best known among expats as a visa-run destination, has plenty of things for tourists to enjoy, said Ranong Vice Governor Supawat Sakda, who announced the carnival with Phuket Vice Governor Sommai Prijasilpa on Friday.

"We are famous for our hot springs and mineral water, and have a lot of interesting culture," Vice Governor Supawat said.

Called "Scent of Andaman", the Ranong event has an 8-million-baht budget and is expected to draw more than 10,000 visitors.

"We think the average visitor will spend

about 1,500 baht per day," V/Gov Supawat said. "But it doesn't matter whether we meet our target number of visitors or make a profit, the main point is to familiarize people with what we have to offer."

Following the initial event in Ranong, carnivals will be held in Phuket, Krabi, Phang Nga and Trang, said Vice Governor Sommai.

"Five provinces have agreed to support each other with respect to tourism. Krabi will promote historic artifacts, Phang Nga will focus on sea gypsies, Trang on local traditions and nature, and Phuket on our Sino-Portuguese heritage," Vice Governor Sommai said.

The dates of the other carnivals have yet to be set.

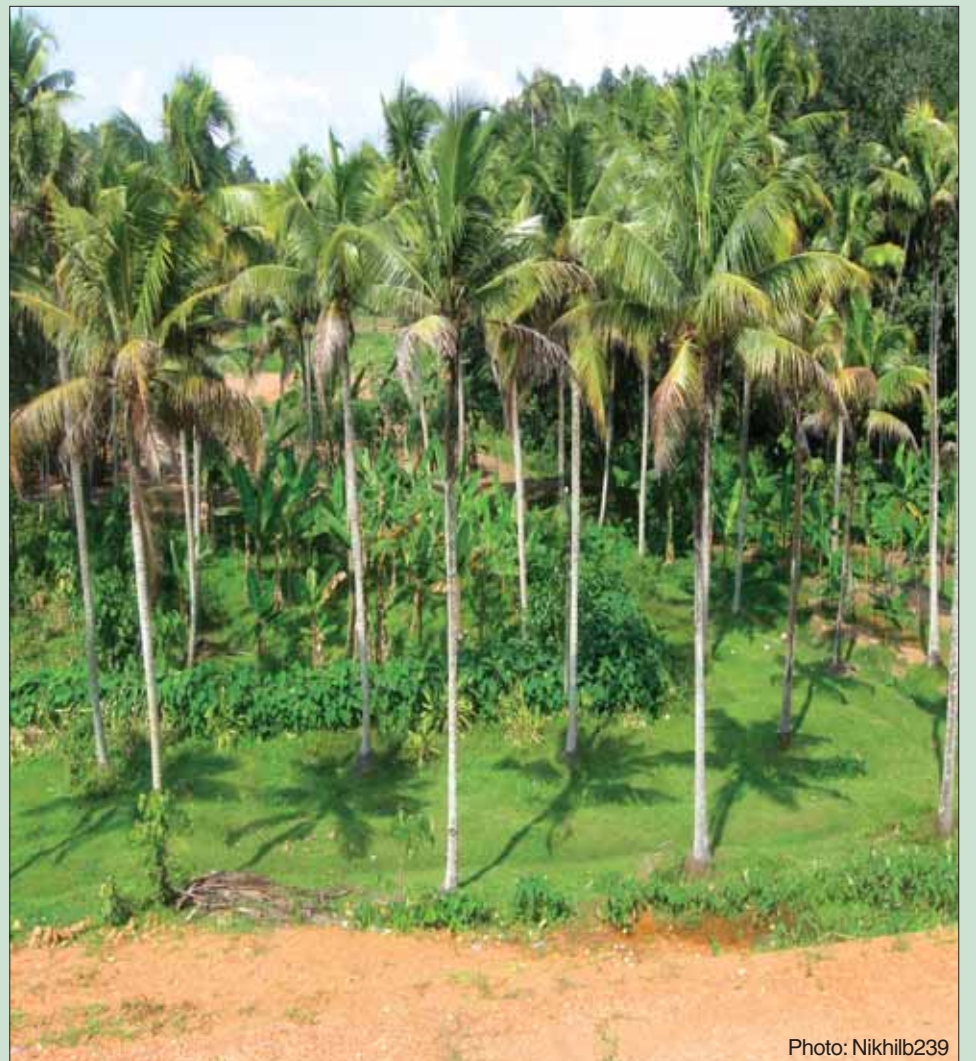

# One gun to rule them all

## Looking Back

THE Thailand Ministry of Defence building is located opposite the Grand Palace in the old part of Bangkok. What is interesting about this government building is its large collection of old cannons, which are exhibited within the yard parallel to the main road. The cannons date back to various periods in Thai history and range from small guns to intimidatingly large bombards. Each cannon has its own story. Many of them were present in various wars that shaped the history of Thailand.

Of the 42 cannons parked outside the ministry building, a large bombard called the “Phaya Tani” probably has the most interesting story. Dating back more than four hundred years, the Phaya Tani is the largest cannon in the collection. The sheer size of the magnificent weapon seems to dwarf the cannons that surround it.

It is said that the Phaya Tani was cast in the old kingdom of Pattani Darussalam. Although today Pattani is a province in the south of Thailand, during the 17<sup>th</sup> century, it was an autonomous Muslim sultanate. In the beginning of the 17<sup>th</sup> century, a succession crisis in the Pattani royal family paved the way for the first queen, Raja Hijau to ascend the throne of Pattani. After Raja Hijau, three more queens ruled Pattani successively, ushering in a period of peace and prosperity that lasted for 67 years.

Pattani, being a small state, had always struggled to preserve its independence. To its north was Siam, a regional power with Ayutthaya as its capital city. Ayutthaya laid claim over a vast area of land that stretched from Chiang Mai in the north to Cambodia and Laos in the east. Its hegemony also stretched far south into the predominantly Muslim Malay Peninsula. However, because the Malay states were so

far away from Ayutthaya, the capital often found it hard to assert its claims over these semi-autonomous sultanates.

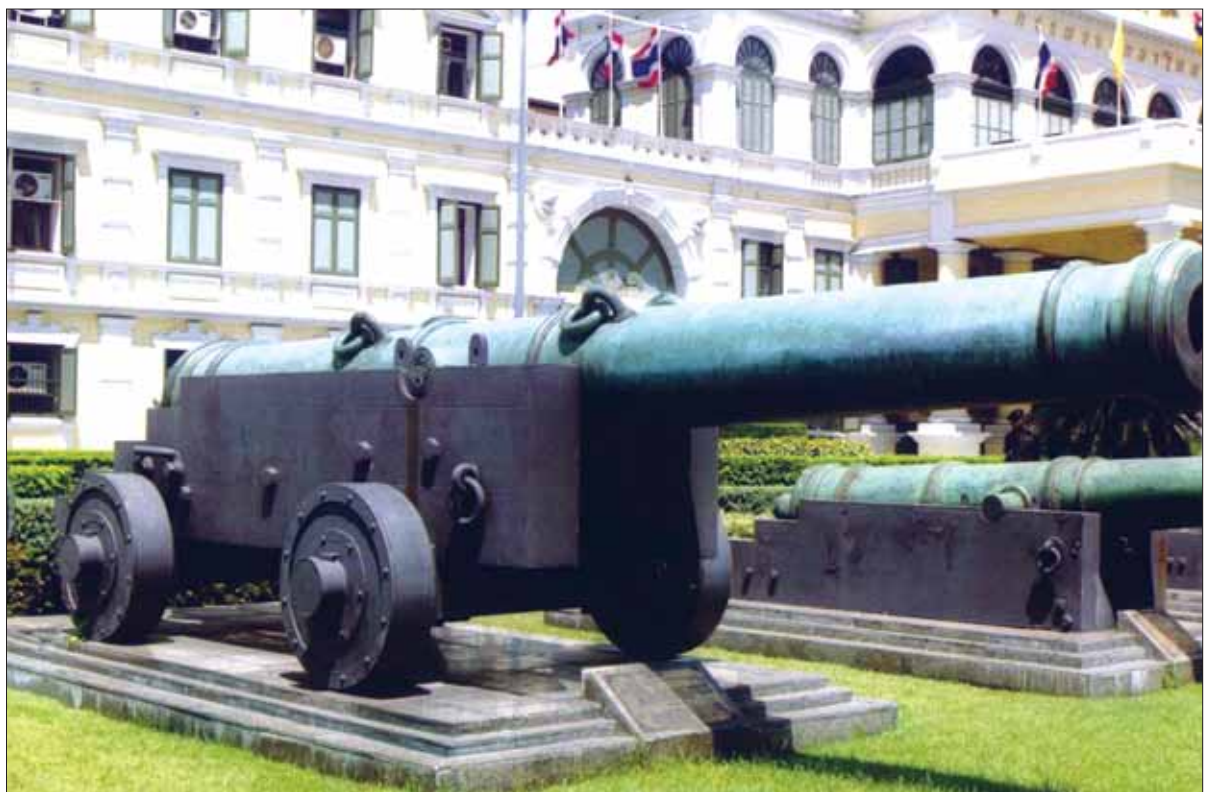
The four queens foresaw the need for strong defences in order to maintain Pattani’s independence. Due to the constant threat of attack from Siam and its allies, the rulers built impressive forts and defences around their city-state. They also invested in large cannons that could effectively repel enemy attack when fired from the city’s walls. The Phaya Tani was one such weapon, and perhaps the only one that survives to this day.

No one knows exactly when the Phaya Tani was cast or its exact history. Apart from the cannon itself, few historical records still survive from that period. It is possible that the cannon may have been made during the reign of Sultan Ismail Shah in the early 15<sup>th</sup> century. However, it could also have been cast during the reign of the four queens during the 17<sup>th</sup> century.

The casting techniques evident in the cannon hints that it was produced locally and not imported from somewhere else. Made out of bronze, the Phaya Tani cannon is exceptionally large. The barrel is 6.82 meters long, with a caliber of 24 centimeters. On the barrel is an engraving of a lion, an inscription that says “Phaya Tani” and instructions on how much gunpowder needs to be loaded from the mouth of the cannon.

In 1785, the Burmese attacked Siam once again, this time with nine armies that spearheaded into different regions of Siam. Rama I King Phra Buddha Yod Fa Chulalok Maharaj ordered his younger brother, Prince Maha Sura Singhanat to lead Siam’s defenses in the west and south.

The prince was an experienced general and although the Siamese forces were inferior to the enemy, they managed to inflict heavy casualties on the Burmese. By 1786, the Burmese were forced to retreat from Siam.

After his victory against the Burmese in the Nine Armies War, Prince Sura Singhanat marched his armies further south of Siam to the gates of Pattani. His aim was to subjugate the kingdom and bring it back under Siam’s hegemony. Pattani’s defenses were no match for Prince Sura Singhanat’s soldiers and the city fell to the Siamese attackers.

Historical records reveal that during this conflict, the Siamese captured two massive cannons. In order to weaken Pattani and discourage them from rebellion, Prince Sura Singhanat ordered the cannons to be taken back to Bangkok. Of the two cannons captured, only one – Phaya Tani – reached Bangkok safely. The second cannon, named “Sri Negara” according to the chronicles of Pattani, was lost when the ship carrying it sank in the ocean. Other sources say it came loose when being loaded onto the ship and fell into the sea.

According to this chronicle, there was also a third large cannon named “Maha Lela”. This cannon was never captured and

no other historical evidence confirms its existence. Some historical documents suggest that it may have exploded during a battle against the Siamese under Prince Sura Singhanat’s command.

The Phaya Tani arrived in the capital in 1786. Prince Sura Singhanat presented the weapon to his brother King Rama I.

King Rama I was especially impressed by the sheer size and firepower of the Phaya Tani. He ordered the refurbishment of the cannon. King Rama I also commissioned the casting of a second cannon of similar size that could be stationed with the Phaya Tani. This second cannon was named the “N a r a i Sangharn”.

Both cannons were stationed within the Grand Palace for many years before being moved to their present location in the courtyard of the Ministry of Defense.

Nowadays, the Phaya Tani is highly revered by the Thai armed forces. Each year military commanders, led by the defence

minister, gather in a solemn ceremony to pay respects to the cannons, especially the Phaya Tani. Some believe the cannon still has mystical powers that continue to affect the country’s fortunes. For many years the cannons had been facing the Royal Palace, but General Aud Bueangbon, then permanent secretary for defence, moved all 42 cannons so that they faced Wang Saran Rom Park and the City Pillar Shrine instead.

In January 2004, an armed robbery was carried out on a military camp in Pattani. After that, a wave of unprecedented violence swept the far southern region of Thailand. In March 2004, General Chettha Thanajaro, then Defence Minister gave an order to re-adjust the Phaya Tani cannon once again in a belief that the superstitious tactic would ward off evil and curtail violence in the three southern provinces that made up the former Pattani kingdom.

In June 2013, the government installed a replica of the Phaya Tani cannon in front of the historical Krue-Se Mosque in Pattani province. A few days later, the replica cannon was bombed and damaged by insurgents.

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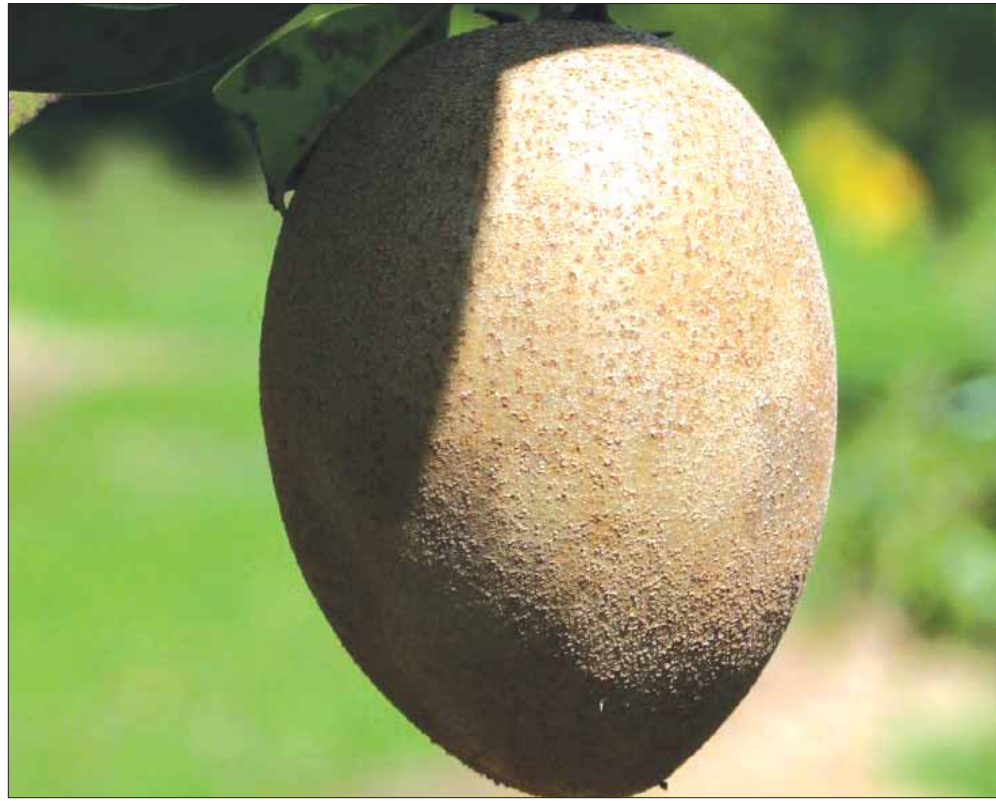

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# An odd couple of fruits

THE recent passing of one of cinema's most well known comedic actors, Bill Hoskins, reminded me of a scene in a "posh" London hotel.

An obsequious waiter asks if he wants a drink, "A Bloody Mary is it, sir?" He replies, "No, a pot of tea, please."

"Ah, lapsang suchong or Earl Grey?" says the waiter. "No," replies Hoskins tersely, "Tea."

Apart from being an example of British working-class humor that echoes a social divide, this shows how a pedantic attitude toward names can obfuscate rather than clarify.

This is a constant dilemma for the horticulturalist who wants to be precise about botanical labels, but who knows that they are often difficult to get one's tongue

around – let alone remember.

Take the *manikara zapota*. Despite its pretentious name, it is a fruiting tree that deserves more than a passing mention. If next to no one knows this title, many of you out there will recognize it as saporilla. Talk to your Thai partner about the *lamut*, and she will nod in instant acknowledgment.

One of the most exotic-tasting native fruits of Mexico and Central America, the saporilla resembles a soft, tan-colored and somewhat elongated egg, about seven to 10 centimeters long. But inside the skin, which is best peeled away with a knife, are segments of yellow or brown flesh, each with a shiny black seed. Worth a try? Well, a French botanist declared that it smelt of "honey, jasmine and lily

of the valley."

For me, it is very intriguing, with a slightly gritty texture like that of a pear and a flavor sometimes described as malty. If you come across a pile at your local fresh market, check to ensure that the fruit is not too soft; on the other hand, if the fruits are hard and greenish, leave them for a day or two to ripen.

Introduced to Southeast Asia primarily as a cash crop, the saporilla is unfortunately too large for the average garden, being a slow-growing species that may reach 40 to 50 feet. A pity because it bears fruit fairly quickly, and from germination takes only six years to crop. Moreover, it yields fruit twice a year. In addition, the tree has a pleasant rounded shape with glossy green leaves.

Besides those sweet, fragrant fruits, its boughs exude a latex-like substance called chicle,

formerly used in chewing gum. While that may not persuade you to acquire a tree, its other virtues might – if you have the time and space to cultivate it.

Another strange fruit that periodically appears in Phuket's wayside markets is the *salak*, referred to in these parts as the *sala* or *rakum*, or to botanists as the *salacca*. To westerners, it is known as the snake fruit on account of its scaly, reddish-brown skin. Shaped like a small, plump pear, the fruit's rind is thin and brittle so it can be readily removed

to reveal three or four segments of creamy flesh and one or more stones. The *salacca* has a high tannin content, and when eaten unripe can be unpleasantly astringent. In this state it is, like so many local

fruits such as mangoes, papayas and camias, popular in sour salads. When ripe, it has an exotic flavor that is hard to put into words, somewhat nutty with a hint of acidic sweetness.

Perhaps surprisingly, the *salacca's* golf-ball sized fruits grow in clusters at the base of a palm tree. Native to tropical Asia, it will make an interesting addition to your garden. This particular palm has a short stem and large pinnate (feathery) leaves which tend to grow more upward than outward. *Salacca*

*magnifica*, the doyen of the species, has huge, undivided leaves up to six meters long, and offers a splendid ornamental presence. Were I planning a new garden, I would surely include one.

## Tip of the week

### Potted plants

A RECENT visit to a garden consisting almost entirely of potted plants has prompted another stab at the topic. What the visit made clear was that many shrubs can be grown in containers, not just the usual culprits. While front yards and patios in Phuket tend to be inhabited by euphorbias, adeniums, bougainvilleas, palms and wrightias, this garden had gardenias, dracaenas, gingers and lots more. Try foliage plants such as crotons, graphophylums and acahyphas.

Container plants can be deployed to create an

interesting focal point: to define an area; or to decorate difficult patches, such as a dry or an excessively wet corner. Pots are an effective means of controlling a plant's environment, as the amount of moisture required can be monitored and specific nutrient or pH

requirements catered for. Additionally they can, if necessary, be brought indoors. Short spells in the house are recommended, since few plants can adapt permanently to the relative lack of sunshine and humidity.

# Latest Chabon: A chore

## Books

MICHAEL Chabon's third novel, *The Amazing Adventures of Kavalier & Clay*, won the 2001 Pulitzer Prize. This exuberant romp about two young Jewish cartoonists during the golden age of American comic books in the 1930s and 1940s is one of the most enjoyable novels I've ever read.

Now we have Chabon's *Telegraph Avenue* (HarperCollins, New York, 2012, 468pp), and I'm sorry to say that this big novel is a disappointment. Not because the characters are not sympathetic or the plot not intricate and tight, but because the style is wordy, over-the-top, self-indulgent and the dazzling, but ultimate, turgid display of a literary showoff. Sentences are serpentine and run on for thick paragraphs and even pages. Section III is a single sentence that rambles for 12 pages and is told largely from the point of view of a parrot. The jokey, narrative tone, ripe with hip nods to movies, TV shows and pop songs, is reminiscent of Thomas Pynchon, but if Pynchon is the High Renaissance Michelangelo, Chabon is over-ripe Rococo.

The time is late August 2004 and the place is the borderline between Berkeley and Oakland, the birthplace of white radicals and Black Panthers, where a used vinyl record store called Brokeland Records is the hangout for a multiracial group of musicians and neighborhood characters. The store is owned by two bandmates: Nat Jaffe, third-gen-

eration Jewish socialist who grew up in Richmond, Virginia, with a black step-mother, black friends and black enemies; and Archy Stallings, African American Iraq war vet and son of Oakland native Luther Stallings, washed up kung fu star of Blaxploitation movies. Their wives, Aviva and Gwen, are partners too in a thriving midwife service, Berkeley Birth Partners.

The plot kicks off as the little record store is threatened by a prospective mall, complete with a giant record department, to be opened by developer Gibson Goode (G. Bad), ex-NFL quarterback and the fifth richest black man in America, who does business aboard a black dirigible named Minnie Riperton.

The midwife practice is also threatened by a lawsuit and a hospital review board hearing following a sudden medical emergency during a home birth. Gwen Stallings, nine-months pregnant and upset by Archy's infidelity, didn't help things along at the hospital with her hot temper. Into the mix comes 14-

year-old Titus Joyner, Archy's long-lost illegitimate son, who has turned up from Oklahoma, and Jules (Julie), son of Nat Jaffe, who has fallen in love with him.

The plot grabs you, as do the characters with their snappy dialogue, but the reader has to wade through chunks of overwrought description that slow the narrative pace to a crawl. Thus:

"Daylight was taking its sweet time fading into dusk, and the street at supertime seemed to be holding its breath, torn into patches of deep shadow and

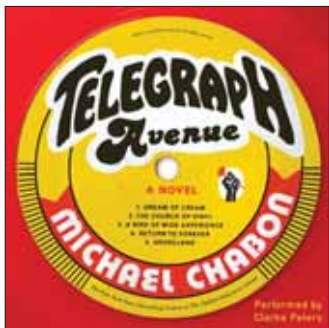
sunshine, motionless but for the little white moths stitching their loopy crewelwork in the honeysuckle. In the sandpit of the tiny playground, dozens of toy vehicles and appliances lay bleached and upended, primary-colored plastic ruins as of some toddler cataclysm."

There are honest bravura passages, though, like this passage describing how organ player Cochise Jones, a record store regular, approaches the

song "I Don't Know How to Love Him": "Cochise began his vandalism in earnest, snapping off bright bunches of the melody and scattering it in handfuls, packing it with extra notes in giddy runs. He was ruining the song, rifling it, mocking it with an antic edge of joy. You might have thought, some critics felt, that the meaning or spirit of the original song meant no more to Cochise Jones than a poem means to a shark that is eating

the poet."

The novel reaches a climax with a ten-page description of Gwen's labor pains. I can't recall anything so intense about the birth process in all of literature. The novel should have ended there instead of a tacked on scene two months later which ties up all the plotlines into nice happy bows – like chick lit. But my primary reaction was one of relief. Having trudged to the last page, I could read something else now.






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# Islands steal spotlight for Environment Day

PHUKET will celebrate World Environment Day (WED) with a three-day event from June 5-7 to encourage residents to take action against pollution and promote the preservation of the island for generations to come.

The event will support the United Nations Environment Program (UNEP) campaign called "Raise your voice, not the sea level".

"The aims of the UNEP campaign are to promote the importance of protecting Small Island Developing States (SIDS), raise awareness of the environmental problems we face as a world community and to take action against activities that escalate climate change," said Pornsri Suthanaruk, director of the Regional Environmental Office 15.

"It is a challenge to maintain our

planet for future generations. However, we must all work together to decrease our impact on the environment and prevent global warming, which can cause sea levels to rise and have many

detrimental effects on our environment."

Phuket's WED event will be held at the Queen Sirikit Park off of Thalang-Dibuk Road in Phuket Town starting at 9am on June 5. No plastics or foam products will be allowed at the event.

"Activities at the event will include trash cleanups, art exhibitions, tree plantings, concerts, campaigns to encourage bicycle use and many fun contests," Dr Pornsri said.

Municipalities across Phuket will also be launching a project to ensure the separation of hazardous materials from public trash on June 5 in a united effort to prevent dangerous materials from contaminating the island's

beaches, canals and the ocean.

Public bins for three kinds of trash will be posted at locales across Phuket, said Vice Governor Sommai Prijasilpa.

The bins will be marked: 1) general trash; 2) infectious waste, such as medical waste from small clinics and veterinary surgeries; and 3) hazardous materials, such as used batteries and fluorescent light bulbs.

Mr Nutthakrit pointed out that a lot of hazardous materials, such as used batteries and fluorescent light bulbs, get mixed up in public bins with everyday garbage.

"If we allow it to sit in the landfill, it could contaminate the soil and create a serious health concern and even pose a safety risk. If such materials contaminate a canal, it could poison the water supply," he said.

The call to action by government and health officials follows a recent complaint from a European tourist who claimed Chinese tourists were dropping used batteries into the sea.

"The tourist said he asked the Thai guide to tell them to stop, but the guide replied that people did it all the time," said Mr Nutthakrit.

"If everyone dropped whatever they want into the ocean, how much dangerous trash would be floating around? We don't want to wait until it is too late to fix the problem. Preventing the problem is better than having to fix it."

# Lion Air roars in the South

REGIONAL low-cost carrier Lion Air has launched services to several new destinations in Thailand, with its Thai subsidiary Thai Lion Air aiming to establish Hat Yai Airport (HDY) as a second hub in Thailand.

Executive Managing Director of Thai Lion Air, Andi Burhan, said that the carrier's decision to use a 72-seat ATR 72-600 prop plane, the first ATR to join Thai Lion Air's fleet, would allow it to develop routes between niche markets and develop a more comprehensive domestic network. Unfortunately, none of the announced new routes involve Phuket (HKT) and it is still impossible to get a chartered flight between the two largest airports in the south of Thailand: HKT and HDY.

The new domestic routes are a five-times weekly service to Hua Hin and a three-times weekly service to Surat Thani, both of which began on March 21. The flights are the first scheduled non-stop service from Haad Yai to both cities.

Regionally, Thai Lion Air also launched twice-weekly service from Hat Yai to Medan, Indonesia and Subang Kuala, Lampur over the past two months.

"We chose Hat Yai to be our second hub because it is a gateway into southern Thailand and we know that many people want to travel to southern Thailand for

business and leisure. There are a lot of popular holiday destinations in southern Thailand," said Mr Burhan.

"We will also be encouraging Thais to explore neighboring countries, namely Indonesia and Malaysia," he adds.

## AutoGyro update

Flight training on the island's one and only "gyrocopter" is going off without a hitch at Phuket AirPark in Pa Khlok. Phuket AirPark Flight Operations manager Pat James is among four trainees being instructed to operate the AutoGyro Cavalon by a factory-trained instructor from Sweden who is staying at Phuket AirPark for one month.

"It's looking really good. Everything is working out the way it was supposed to. It's turned out to be a better bird than most of us expected – much better," said Mr James.

The other trainees are Phuket Airpark owner Robert Suchard Raksangob, as well as two of the Cavalon's co-owners: Torben Jensen from Denmark and building contractor Best Wanamakok.

Pat and Robert are being trained as instructors so that they can teach others to fly the AutoGyro, while Torben and Best are using the training as part of their efforts to become registered ultralight pilots.

As of May 23, the foursome combined had put in over 80 hours of training in the bright yellow two-seater, which has had many island residents staring aloft and pointing as if Superman had been spotted.

"We've done about 82 hours of training so far over the last two weeks, and we still have a week and a half to go to finish the training."

Pat, a combat helicopter pilot

during the Vietnam War, described the aircraft's unique abilities when it comes to take off and landing.

"It takes off a bit like an airplane; it needs about 100 to 200 meters of runway to get up in the air, but the landing is very much like that of a helicopter. You autogyrate down and it's very gentle. You only need about 25 or 50 meters for a nice smooth landing," he said.

Asked about flight range and fuel requirements, he said, "It has the Rotax engine, like most ultralight aircraft. This particular one is turbocharged, developing 115 horsepower. We use standard motor vehicle gas, 95 octane, and we burn about 18 liters an hour. This gives us about three and a half hours of flight duration. We usually cruise at a speed of anywhere from 60 to 70 knots."

"We've been flying it around Phuket and have taken it out to Phi Phi Island and up to James Bond island in Phang Nga Bay, but most of our flight training activity

has been around the airfield itself here in Pa Khlok and down on the southern end of the island."

"We are having so much fun with it. I feel like a kid at Christmas time. This is one very exciting little bird to play with. A lot of the flight characteristics bring me back to my helicopter days. It is so agile – easy and forgiving. The visibility is beautiful and it's aesthetically gorgeous. We call it our 'little yellow bumble bee'. It's ideally suited to the islands here. We fly low over the islands and beaches and places like that."

Asked just how low the Cavalon could safely go, he said, "Just as low as any ultralight fixed wing aircraft. Out over the water, we can take it right next to the surface, but normally we fly at about 500 feet over water. Over residential or built-up areas, we must of course maintain safe elevations," he said.

People familiar with both prop planes and helicopters know that both can generate a lot of noise. Asked if the Cavalon was the

worst of both worlds, Pat said, "Probably less than a helicopter, but more than a normal small fixed wing aircraft. I would say it fits in nicely in between the two, both in terms of noise levels and flight characteristics," he said.

In addition to using the aircraft to entertain friends and clients, the owners will also use it as a training aircraft for island residents who wish to learn how to fly.

"Several people have already expressed interest. Some are already pilots, but they would also like to know AutoGyro flying skills. Others are just brand new and they want to start out flying on the AutoGyro," he said.

As the AirPark is home to the only AutoGyro dealership in the country, the owners hope to eventually see some trainees acquire their own aircraft. One advantage of the Autogyro is its versatility. It needs very limited space to operate and even less for storage because it has no wings sticking out.

The confidence with which she delivered her graduation speech proved she's right, but is it enough to improve the world we live in? Cautious optimism is what describes Bao's reply best.

"Changing the world is such a grandiose idea, I believe we should start by improving ourselves, and then our communities, which is at this time Phuket, and then Thailand

and only then the world. But maybe 10 years down the line, you'll see me changing the world," she said, smiling.

However it wasn't the distant future that occupied the young minds the most that day, but rather the past memories of their school years.

"I've been here for 13 years, all of my schooling life," said Luke. "This school is the only place I really know. So I'm excited to visit new places and explore new opportunities, but I'll miss this familiarity," he explained.

Both Luke and Bao didn't stint on kind words when talking about their BISP experience.

"From outside it looks like a really big school but once you're in, you understand that the small student to teacher ratio really helps you become an individual. You're not just one of many in the class," said Luke, while Bao added that the endless opportunities for personal development that the school provides is what makes it special.

On stage, prizes were awarded to the most hardworking of the IB students, including the Theory of Knowledge award for Liam Kealy, Extended Essay award for Nathanon Khanijow and Valedictorian award for Piers Grassman, among others. After the ceremony, food was served in the school hall and mortarboards flying high into the air soon followed. The BISP Graduation Ceremony had ended, but for the graduates, the future had begun.

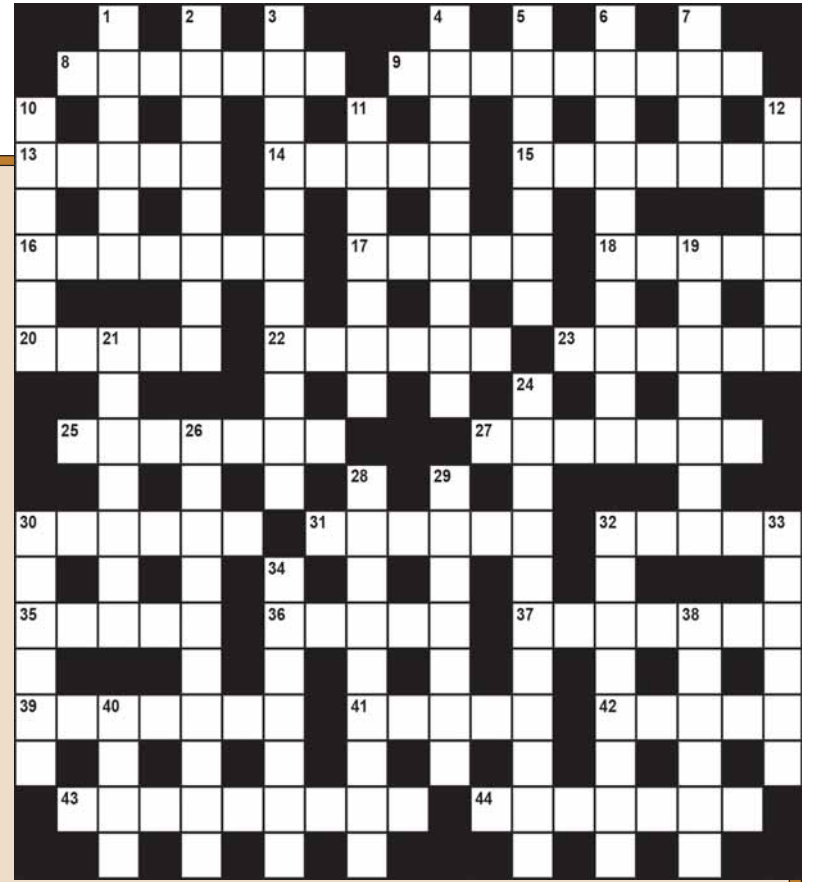

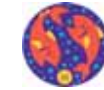

# Toes to the nose

THE monsoon arrived just in time for the first Pearl of the Andaman Longboard Classic hosted on the rocky coast of Kalim last Saturday.

A bit of afternoon rain and a military coup couldn't keep 30 contestants and more than 40 spectators from turning out, as a few days of consistent ground swell marched its way through the Andaman to meet the grateful surfers. Required to use boards nine feet or longer, surfers were able to line up far out and catch the peeling three to five-foot waves early for long nose-rides.

Judges were vigilantly watching the contestants during the 15-minute, heats on the lookout for those who chose the best – not necessarily the biggest – waves, and performed the most difficult and stylish maneuvers while maintaining the highest level of control.

The most graceful bottom turns, powerful cutbacks, radical maneuvers and longest nose-rides earned the surfers top scores.

International Surfing Association (ISA) certified judge Erwin Van Putten said that they originally expected more than 40 entries, but the degrading political situation

deterred people from Taiwan, Malaysia and Indonesia from making the journey.

Somsak (Malek) Kreechai made the most of the great conditions and high-scored his way through six heats as well as the quarter-finals, semi-finals and finals to take home the first place trophy and

prize – a Firewire Timbertek Sub Moon 9.5. Second place went to Neung, third place to Decha Sithidej and fourth to Lee Patong, all of whom took home striking oyster shell trophies and goodies donated by the sponsors.

Although this contest was the first with the “Pearl of the

Andaman” label, the organizers: President of Surfing Thailand Chanin (Joob) Aiyarak; Vice President of Surfing Thailand and owner of Baan Andaman Sea Surf Decha Sithidej; and ISA judge Erwin Van Putten have been putting together surfing competitions all over Phuket for more than 10 years.

“It started out a little bit in Kata and around that area. Then we had a surf series that was in Kata, Kalim and Kamala. A year later we had it in Patong and in Kalim – so it just hops around a little bit,” said Erwin.

“Surfing Thailand is the main force behind it with some local sponsors like Baan Andaman Sea Surf and Phuket Surf.”

For the next surfing competition, the Phuket surf-scene advocates have their sights set on a multi-day event with a women's, grommets, shortboard, longboard and master's divisions hosted in Patong in September. Stay tuned.

## Train smart in the rain

THERE is something in the air. Humidity has been up and more rain clouds are coming in. It's just a matter of time til the first heavy rainfall here in Phuket. Training for Triathlon in the rainy season can be very pleasant. The water temperature in the pools usually drops and swimming has finally a “cooling effect” again. The air gets cleaner and the temperatures feel quite nice during or right after a rain shower. Especially for running, this is the perfect time to pick up the mileage and enjoy some fresh air.

Nevertheless, you need to be extra cautious during your training sessions. During lightning, stay out of the water and away from any dangerous areas. On the bike, be extra careful. During group sessions keep a bit more distance between riders to be safe.

Choose the right equipment such as aluminum instead of carbon rims. These wheels still provide good braking qualities in the rain. Wider tires with some profile ride better on wet roads than slicks.

Being on a mountain bike is the best choice. Avoid busy roads and slow down before turns on slippery surfaces.

Maintenance of your bike is crucial as well. Lubricate your chain and cables more often or take your bicycle into a local bike shop regularly.

On the run, I recommend staying more on roads or running tracks. Trails might be slippery.

Be safe, train smart!

MORE than 500 people are expected to show up at Phuket's first MMA gala, and they are in for a treat.

"Thai culture understands combat sports and the Kingdom is on the cusp of accepting MMA with open arms. We're just trying to give a little push," explains Ree Webster, the event's co-organizer, when asked about motivations behind his efforts.

This event will also see the likes of EMAC Gym owner Niti Techottiasnee and Shannon Wiratchai, One FC fighter and Martial Warrior Star, providing the commentary.

One of the tasks the organizers set for themselves is to promote MMA in Thailand – a country with rich martial arts traditions that it holds dear, but is slowly shifting to accept contemporary fight sports such as MMA.

"I feel like Asia still thinks of fighting in the cage as taboo. Many still prefer a boxing ring. Many Thais still have the "old school" way of thinking and we're just trying to break through doors,"

explains Ree Webster. It starts with the events name. "There is no Thai word like 'Octagon' which the UFC uses to describe their cage. So we're helping out. Dojo is a place where martial arts are done. And what surrounds our awesome dojo? Full metal, that's what.

Enter the Full Metal Dojo."

The organizers are also hoping to get the Tourism Authority of Thailand involved in the promotion of future events, at the time this issue of the *Gazette* went to print, the negotiations were ongoing.

# World Cup not welcomed by all

THE bus carrying Brazil's World Cup squad to their first day of training on Monday was kicked and punched by demonstrators angry at what they consider exorbitant spending on football and not enough on social programs.

A small group of striking teachers attacked the bus as it left Rio de Janeiro for the mountain town of Teresopolis, where the squad will be based during the tournament.

The teachers covered the bus with stickers as Barcelona players Neymar and Dani Alves looked on from inside.

When the bus arrived in Teresopolis, 100 kilometers away, another group of about 30 people chanted anti-World Cup slogans.

"This country's priority shouldn't be the World Cup, it should be improving health,

education, housing and public transport," said Rui Costa, a striking teacher who helped organize the protest.

Costa said none of the houses promised to victims of a deadly flood in the area that killed around 1,000 people in 2011 had been delivered.

Protesters allied to a far-left political party held up a banner in English that read, "Billions for the FIFA's World Cup, No housing for the victims of the heavy rains of 2011. Do you think it is fair?"

The demonstrations ended peacefully, but they provided another warning of the potential pitfalls that Brazil faces as it struggles to host football's biggest extravaganza.

Last year during the Confederations Cup, the dress rehearsal for next month's tournament, hundreds of thousands of people took

to streets across the country to protest bus fare hikes.

The grievances soon expanded to cover a lack of social spending and excess investment in football stadiums.

None of the matches were affected, but fans fought with riot police outside the

arenas and tear gas was used.

"No one here is rooting against Brazil," said Alex Trintino, the coordinator of a local teachers' union.

"This was a symbolic act against a country that doesn't have money for health and education." — Reuters

## AFC continues battle to eradicate match-fixing

THE Asian Football Confederation has asked its member associations to appoint integrity officials to report any issues of match-fixing as they battle to clear up corruption in the sport.

The AFC, which has 46 full members and one associate member in Northern Mariana Islands, has set a deadline of June 30 to make the appointments, with those hired reporting to the organization's integrity officer Hassan Haider Khan.

"Responsibilities of the integrity officer are to establish and maintain integrity initiatives within the MA (member associations), receive information related to match-fixing matters within the MA and conduct inquiries or inves-

tigations as an administrative 'fact finder' in coordination with AFC and relevant national law enforcement agencies," AFC Director of MAs and Development Sanjeevan Balasingam said in a

statement.

AFC members have long battled match-fixing issues, with China, South Korea, Lebanon, Australia, Malaysia and Singapore among countries to have been hit by the problem.

AFC President Sheikh Salman bin Ebrahim Al Khalifa, elected to the position last year, promised to tackle the issue upon taking office but problems have continued.

The AFC said they were committed to clearing up the problems. — Reuters

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
