Policy change for faster response times in missing child cases

ANXIOUS parents of missing children no longer have to wait 24 hours before police can take action to find them, under a new policy revealed by Phuket City Police Superintendent Sermpan Sirikong last week.

"Now, when someone in your family goes missing, you can inform police immediately," said Col Sermpan.

The new policy came into sharp focus this week when the worried parents of 13-yearold Sirinut "Nong Guy" Chaowalert made a public appeal for any information to locate their daughter, who disappeared from the family home in Rassada last Saturday.

Nong Guy was found alive and well, staying at a friend's house in Thalang, on Wednesday, much to the relief of her parents.

"I received the missing person report from Nong Guy's sister on Saturday night," said Lt Pittaya Thanawut.

"We did not have much information, but at least we were able to send out an alert to patrol officers throughout Phuket and share this information among people registered on the police Line chat group.

'The next day, Nong Guy's mother arrived

from Bangkok and gave us photos of Nong Guy, which we quickly shared."

Col Sermpan explained that steps were taken to heighten public awareness of the dangers of kidnapping following the kidnapping and rape of 6-year-old "Nong Cartoon" in Bangkok last December.

Anti-kidnapping posters have already been distributed in Bangkok schools and in some other provinces, he said.

"In Phuket we have not been given the order to distribute these posters yet, but if

your child or someone you know goes missing, you can notify the police immediately," Col Sermpan explained.

Col Sermpan cited the case of a mother currently wanted by police for abducting her two British-Thai daughters from their natural father as being one that might have benefited substantially, if Pattaya and Phuket police had been able to take action earlier.

'Ya Ice Butcher' slays friend, attacks another

ONE man died, while a woman lay seriously injured in hospital on August 14 following an attack by a drug-crazed man thought to be high on *ya ice* (crystal methamphetamine).

Phuket City Police were called to a dormitory on Santisuk Soi Mai Luan Road at 6:30pm, where they found the 25-year-old suspect, Niwat Sampoosri, locked in the room attempting to kill himself.

"Mr Niwat had attacked his 22-year-old girlfriend, Rarinya Putthawong, with a meat cleaver," said Capt Pornthip Chumsri of the Phuket City Police. "A friend of the couple, Chalermpol Pasurawiroj, 25, tried to help Ms Rarinya. However, Mr Niwat attacked him with the cleaver too."

Mr Chalermpol and Ms Rarinya managed to escape the room and were quickly transferred to Vachira Phuket Hospital with severe injuries after rescue workers arrived.

Mr Chalermpol, who suffered deep lacerations to his chest, was pronounced dead upon arrival by doctors. Ms Rarinya suffered wounds to her abdomen.

Following the pair's escape, Mr

Niwat locked himself in the room and attempted to commit suicide.

"He locked the door and was yelling and screaming. He then drank fabric softener and attempted to cut his own throat and wrists. After that, he tried to electrocute himself," said Capt Pornthip.

Police spent more than an hour trying to coax Mr Niwat out of the room, but eventually resorted

to breaking down the door.

"We stormed the room and overpowered Mr Niwat. He was then transferred to VichiraPhuket Hospital by Kusoldham rescue workers," Capt Pornthip said.

Mr Niwat is to be tested for *ya ice* and charged with murder and deadly assault with a weapon. Additional charges might also be brought, Capt Pornthip added.

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Russian's death ruled suicide

POLICE have concluded that a Russian tourist found dead in his Phuket hotel room died of self-inflicted wounds, after eliminating the possible involvement of a ladyboy seen in his company.

Fedor Vasilev, 33, from the Sakha Republic, was found dead on August 13 with seven stab wounds to his chest and a deep

laceration running the length of his forearm.

Police tracked down ladyboy Mesa Promkerd, 35, and brought her in for questioning, but quickly concluded that she was not involved in the Russian's death.

Additionally, police said that three pages of handwritten notes in Russian that were found discarded in a

bathroom bin corroborated the theory that Mr Vasilev had killed himself.



"The papers Fedor Vasilev turned out to be a suicide letter," said Lt Col Sutthichai Tianpho of

Scores of alleged taxi mafia members shuffle into court

THE first 70 of 108 Phuket taxi drivers facing charges for alleged involvement in the taxi mafia appeared in court for their preliminary hearing on Monday. Those unable to fit in the court room were told that they would be seen by the court in early September.

The drivers were charged for gathering more than five people for illegal activities carried out by criminal associations.

"We cannot say much at the moment as our cases are being processed," one Karon taxi driver, who declined to be named, told the *Gazette* on Monday.

"We will have a lot to say when we are able to speak to the media. I will say now, however, that I denied the charges. The charges are too much for us."

The driver confirmed that he, and some of the other drivers, have court dates set for September 1.

"Some of the other suspects and I will give further statements in September," he said.

Mercedes-Benz, tuk-tuk crushed in rainy landslide

A MERCEDES-BENZ, a tuk-tuk and four other vehicles were crushed in a landslide after a deluge of rain saturated a Patong construction site on August 15.

"There were six vehicles parked at the site, as it is close to the owners' homes. When the land below a retaining wall gave way, part of the wall collapsed," said Wisit Methasunthornwat, head of the Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation (DDPM) Patong office.

"Fortunately, no one was hurt. We are now working on removing the dirt and remnants of the wall."

The vehicles crushed by the earth and cement wall on Soi Nanai, about 200 meters from 50 Pi Road, included a Mercedes-Benz, a tuk-tuk, a Honda City, a pick-up truck, a rescue worker truck and a motorcycle, Mr Wisit said.

Patong Municipality officers were dispatched to the construction site to investigate whether or not the landowner had permission to build on the site, Patong Municipality Chief Administrative Officer (Palad) Poonsak Naksenaare told the *Gazette*.

"If the owners do not have permission, we will report them to the police," Mr Poonsak said.

Hard Rock GM arrested over grisly 1990 murder

HARD Rock Cafe Phuket General Manager Gerard Caleo, 42, was arrested in Australia for his alleged role in the gruesome murder of Rita Caleo, reported the *Sydney Morning Herald* on August 15.

Mr Caleo was arrested by Homicide Squad detectives after landing in Sydney on a flight from Kuala Lumpur at about 6am. He has been charged with solicitation to commit murder, accessory before the fact to murder and accessory after the fact to murder.

A manager from Hard Rock Cafe Patong declined to comment to the *Gazette*.

However, it is believed that Mr Caleo is the brother of Mrs Caleo's husband, Mark Caleo.

Mrs Caleo, 39, was stabbed to death on August 10, 1990. In an adjoining bedroom were her two children. Her body was found at 1:30am by a live-in nanny who heard suspicious sounds.

Her husband was at work at the time of the killing, according to police.

Detective Inspector John Lehmann, from the Unsolved Homicide Team, told the *Sydney Morning Herald* that Mrs Caleo's killing was made to look like a robbery

"An intruder broke into the house and she was attacked in her bedroom," Inspector Lehmann said. "It was a horrific murder."

Mrs Caleo's death came less than a year after her millionaire brother, Michael Chye, was shot dead as he drove his Mercedes into the garage of his mansion in Woollahra.

The gunman managed to successfully flee the scene.

An inquest into his death in 1991, about two years later, found

that Mr Chye, his sister and her husband had been involved in a dispute over a 107-million-baht property, reported the *Sydney Morning Herald*.

Inspector Lehmann said that police believed the same people were responsible for both Mr Chye and Mrs Caleo's deaths.

"We do think that both the murders are linked. Rita Caleo was murdered some 10 months after the murder of Dr Michael Chye, and yes... we do believe that the same persons are responsible," Inspector Lehmann said.

The inquest into Mrs Caleo's death in 1991 heard that she had handed her solicitor a sealed envelope just three months before her own death.

The envelope read: "To be opened only if my death is unnatural." Inside were the names of two people she accused of organizing the assassination of Dr Chye

Mrs Caleo wrote in the letter that if she died an unnatural death, the same people would be responsible.

However, police have been asked by Phuket Provincial Police Commander Peerayuth Karajedee to make rounds after midnight to boost tourist confidence in their safety, Col Suthichai noted.

"Everything we are doing is to improve tourist safety," he said.

Island swamped by deluges

FLOODS across Phuket late last week saw Patong Police Station inundated twice within two days and traffic at the critical underpass intersections on the bypass road drawn to a halt.

The flood alerts started pouring in before dawn on August 15, when a heavy rainstorm blasted through Phuket, leaving the carpark and first floor of Patong Police Station underwater.

"The flash flooding started at about 5am and lasted a couple of hours," said Lt Col Suttichai Tianpho of the Patong Police.

"Some of our computers were damaged during the flood, as we were not able to move them to a higher floor in time. The water is now being drained from the building. Everything else at the station is running normally."

Motorists on Nanai Road and Rat-U-Thit 200 Pi Road also found themselves stuck in flood waters brought by the deluge.

"Flash flooding also inundated Phang Muang Sai Kor Road, which runs behind Jungceylon

Patong Hospital was affected by the storm, but able to recover

"Rainwater flooded the carpark, but our ambulances were still able to get in and out. It has now been drained," Patong Hospital Director Sirichai Silpa-archa confirmed.

Less than 24 hours later, Patong Police were scrambling to move

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the second floor as the station was swamped again.

"The water is about up to our knees in the station," said Col Suttichai last Friday. "The computers and case files are still on the second floor due to the flooding yesterday. Right now, we're getting the refrigerator to the second floor."

Further east, on the bypass road, flooding slowed traffic to a crawl at Tesco-Lotus intersection, where knee-deep water caused long tailbacks.

The underpass construction site was also flooded, though construction manager Chalermpol Wongkiattikun said that the severe weather was not expected to cause delays to the project.

"We have a special drainage system that is also backed up by large water pumps that can drain water from the site within 24 hours," Mr Chalermpol said.

By Monday afternoon, blue skies over Phuket heralded a welcome reprieve to the downpours, but only after humidity had reached 98 per cent and more than 47mm of rainfall had been dumped on and around Phuket Town within just three hours.

However, the Thai Meteorological Department Phuket office warned that more heavy rain was due to arrive by this weekend.

San Jantharawong, chief of the Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation (DDPM), warned for small boats to stay ashore during heavy weather and urged tourists not to swim where red flags are posted on the beaches.

...already taken the matter into their own hands.

"Every morning, each of our teachers checks a list of students to make sure all students are present," said Utain Jitsamruoy, director of Satree Phuket School.

"If someone is missing, the teacher will call the parents to make sure that the student is taking the day off. If parents tell us that the student is not at home, then we will notify the police immediately."

In one Phuket cold case, Samudchaya "Nong Pin" Yanpunya went missing at the age of 12 in December 2011. She had skipped school on that day and gone to a Phuket Town internet cafe to use the popular social networking portal Facebook and "do homework".

Just 11 days after Nong Pin's disappearance, the girl's mother, Samruay Saenthaweesuk, voiced her fear that the 12-year-old might have been abducted by someone she met online while using

The possibility of such predation was confirmed by reports the day before from Nakhon Sri Thammarat where 37-year-old Phuket resident Wimol Srida was arrested for raping three teenage girls he met on Facebook. The youngest was just 13 years old.

In April this year, fast action by a Phuket village headman prevented the abduction of a 4-year-old boy.

Worried parents of the boy, named by police only as "Nong Ice", in less than 24 hours reported their son missing from their home.

"After failing to find him, village headman Sangkom Sinthupradit went to Phuket's main bus terminal with the parents and many local village defence volunteers to see if he was there," explained Col Sermpan.

At the station, the search team found the boy, and the couple attempting to abduct him and take him to Bangkok.

The results of searches for 7year-old Natthapa "Nong Dear" Papkaew, who disappeared last year, were tragically different.

Days after Nong Dear went missing on a Friday night from her neighborhood in Chalong, bone fragments – later confirmed to be hers via DNA testing - and her tattered clothing were discovered in a nearby wooded area.

Fight for Freedom

Battle begins over claim to billion-baht prized resort real estate

THE Land Department has set up a task force to establish whether two land titles covering 65 rai at Freedom Beach – with an estimated value of at least 1 billion baht – were legally issued.

The task force was officially formed last Friday and has 60 days to submit its findings, Land Department Deputy Director-General Thammasak Chana told the claimant, Eakkachai Sae-Iw, and his lawyer, At Srisamut, on Tuesday.

The two *Chanote* titles, numbered 98414 and 98415, are both alleged to cover land within the Khao Nakkered National Forest.

"We received a request from the Royal Forest Department asking us to revoke the titles as they said they had confirmed the land in question is within a protected forest," Mr Thammasak said.

"If the new task force agrees and asks the Land Department to revoke the titles, the claimant will have 30 days to appeal."

Mr Eakkachai's lawyer, Mr At, said he will appeal any decision to revoke the titles.



Eakkachai Sae-lw used the land titles to secure a 400mn-baht mortgage.

"If the Land Department decides to revoke the titles, the court may not agree – and the court is the highest authority," he said.

Mr At claimed that Mr Eakkachai had evidence that the

land was acquired before the area was declared a national forest and that he could prove purchase of the land through a tax payment receipt – the lowest form of land claim available in the Kingdom.

"I stand by my words that the two plots are fully legal," he said. "I believe somebody wants to pick on my client, so they filed a complaint against him."

Mr At did not elaborate on who might have targeted Mr Eakkachai for investigation, but did reveal that the land – which he estimated to have a value of "at least 1 billion baht" – had been used to secure a mortgage of 400 million baht.

"The complaint is affecting my client as people who are looking to buy the land have lost their confidence," he said.

"While this drags on my client is responsible for paying interest on the 400mn-baht debt. My client was going to build a resort on the land, but the project is on hold because of this complaint."

The dubious origins of the land titles came under scrutiny by the National Counter-Corruption Commission (NACC) in 2012 in a probe that revealed that "at least 13 officials were involved in illegally issuing land titles"

At that time the land was estimated to be valued at more than 3bn baht.

Officials set on reclaiming 700 rai of park land

MORE than 700 rai of public land inside Sirinath National Park could be returned to the public by September 16 if land documents under investigation by the Land Department are found to have been illegally issued.

"I am quite confident that most of the [12] documents [under investigation] were illegally issued. We are just waiting for officers from the Land Department to finish their investigation," said Director-General Niphon Chotiban of the Department of National Parks, Wildlife and Plant Conservation (DNP) on Monday.

"I am also confident that none of the Land Department officers would risk their livelihoods by approving illegal land documents.

"If all of the 12 plots [under investigation] are found to be illegal, we will be able to reclaim at least 700 rai of public land."

Land Department Deputy Director-General Thammasak Chana assured that the Land Department is taking the investigation "very seriously", and that it would be complete by September 16.

"We are working hard to determine the land ownership. We are also in the process of confirming all documents from applicants who attempted to upgrade their land deeds from a *SorKor 1* to a *Chanote* title," he said.

Argument over cash woes ends in suicide bid

A WOMAN plagued by financial woes was rushed to hospital on August 15 after she ingested a lethal insecticide.

Chamnan Kornsuwan, the woman's boyfriend, called Thalang Police to the scene at about 10pm.

"I think she tried to kill herself because of the financial problems we're having. We had an argument. She told me she was going to poison herself, but I didn't believe her," he said.

About 10 minutes later, Mr Chamnan found her unconscious on the kitchen floor with a bottle of insecticide next to her.

Ms Samrong was rushed to Thalang Hospital where doctors closely monitored her condition before later discharging her.

Hospital Director Arnon Kaewbumrung confirmed that a resident psychologist was following up on Ms Samrong's recovery.

"With cases like this, we are always concerned about the patient's mental well-being. Such patients need extra attention to make sure they make a full recovery," he said.

Cyclists push beyond halfway mark from Sweden to Phuket

WITH a five-day sprint across Turkmenistan behind them, a group of cyclists who departed Sweden in April for the fair shores of Phuket to raise money for a local post-tsunami orphanage have now crossed the halfway point on target to arrive well in time for the 10th tsunami anniversary.

"The desert race through Turkmenistan was incredibly hot and dry. We had 500km to cover and could only get a five-day transit visa," one of the cyclists, Calle Wollgard, told the Gazette. "Before that, we had done Iran quite quickly – our bodies were a bit worn out, but we managed."

With more than 8,000 kilometers under their belts, and about 8,000km more to tackle before crossing the bridge to Phuket, morale is high for Calle, Fredrik Jessen, Tomi Blumen and Christofer Johansson.

"Right now, we are in the city of Buchara, Uzbekistan. A couple of days ago we reached a milestone when the meter showed 8,0000km, which means halfway!" Calle said.

"Morale is good, I think. Of course there are days when you don't want to cycle, and of course there are days when we don't love each other. But we are starting to see the end of this journey."

The positive attitude of the group, which has been quintessential to the team's outlook from

the start, continues despite Tomi and Fredrik suffering from serious stomach problems.

"To be honest, I also don't feel 100 per cent either," Calle said.

Once they have recovered, the team's next big challenge is China.

"It's the biggest country on our route. We'll have to cover about 5,800km of desert, mountains, small villages and big cities – it's going to be awesome."

With regular updates rolling in, the children of the post-tsunami orphanage Barnhem Muang Mai

The orphanage, which will be the benefactor of the charity ride, is run by Susanne Janson and Hans Forssell, who have set up a room to allow the children to follow the cyclists' epic journey.

"We have a special room at Barnhem that we call 'The Happy Tour Room' where the children can follow them [the cyclists] on the map, paint the flag of each country they enter and learn a little bit about all the countries. And the children love to watch the small

movies they are posting online," Susanne said.

Before the trip got underway, Susanne explained that she and Hans would be following the journey with a mixture of horror and joy, as Calle had become a kind of little brother to them.

Now, both Hans and Susanne follow Calle and his team's journey with joy.

"I guess I should say that it has been a little bit scary – but it hasn't, as we have kept close contact.

"I am filled with happiness from all of their stories about how helpful and kind the people they meet on their way have been opening up their homes, giving them food – and so on.

Hans said that the team's stories of kindness have been touching.

"Being a westerner you hear about Serbia or Iran and you hear about those places in a geopolitical context. The average person, 'the-man-in-the-street' in these places is just so amazingly kind," Hans said.

When Calle was recently asked about the most extraordinary portion of the trip – since last speaking to the Gazette - it was the kindness of the Iranian people that bubbled to the surface.

"The people are just amazing: they invite you to have food and shelter almost every day; they are cheering for you all the time; and if you need any kind of help, they are always there for you – we just





Numbers dive for Ranong visa runs

BOOKINGS for Phuket's renowned "Ranong visa run" have plunged by as much as half, a fall that is threatening the once-daily service that has become a hallmark experience for many expats.

The number of people attempting to re-enter Thailand at Ranong has dropped by about 50 per cent, popular Phuket visa run companies and Ranong immigration officers confirmed to the *Gazette* on Monday.

"We cut the Ranong run because we don't want to deal with the strict enforcement," said a representative at one Phuket visa run company that declined to be named.

"We can take only people holding non-immigrant B [business] visas there, which means about five people instead of 10 – it's financially not worth it."

However, another well-known visa run company, KBV, explained that they were continuing the run, but now only irregularly.

"We still go, but only if we have 10 customers for the van. We now offer visa runs to other places, such as Satun [on the Malaysian border], so we advise our customers to go there if needed," said Preeyapan Adithepwarangkul, the owner of KBV Visa Run.

"Immigration officers are strict on visa-exemption stamps. So we always suggest that our customers call us ahead of time for the most up-to-date information about what is happening."

Since the order to tighten up on visa-extension stamps came into effect on August 13, the number of visa runners at the Ranong border has halved, confirmed Ranong Immigration Superintendent Aekkorn Butsababodin.

"Since then, our officers have refused to allow foreigners to re-enter Thailand if they had just completed a visa-exemption stay," Col Aekkorn said.

"The drop in numbers has been so significant that I have even been contacted by officials in Myanmar asking what has happened to the tourists in Thailand."

The strict enforcement comes as Thailand attempts to crack down on foreigners abusing the system and working illegally.

"It is not only Ranong. The rule applies to every border checkpoint throughout the country," Col Aekkorn said. "Even tourists entering on their first visa-exemption stay may be refused at the border if we suspect that they will be working illegally in Thailand."

However, Sadao Immigration

Deputy Superintendent Banphot Kittivira pointed out on Monday that genuine tourists had nothing to worry about.

"Genuine tourists will be fine. All you have to do is prove to the officers at the border that you are a legitimate tourist, so either have the right visa or the necessary documents to prove your legitimacy," Col Banphot said.

"A travel itinerary, hotel bookings, tour bookings or any other similar travel documents will be helpful proof."

Skimmers bank 1.4 million from Krabi ATMs

MORE than 1.4 million baht was skimmed from the accounts of 43 ATM card holders across the bay from Phuket in Krabi between August 7 and August 13, Krabi City Police revealed last week.

"After questioning victims, it appears that the skimming has mostly targeted Bank of Ayudhaya customers," Col Wittaya Meksai of the Krabi City Police said.

Col Wittaya added that some of the victims included Bank of Ayudhaya card holders withdrawing money from ATMs belonging to other banks.

Police confirmed that Bank of Ayudhaya would take full responsibility for the skimming and compensate in full all customers who had lost money.

"Police are now collecting information from all banks in Krabi to locate the ATMs that were fitted with skimming equipment. After that, we will check the CCTV footage in the targeted areas to see if we can identify the suspects," Col Wittaya said.

Those falling foul of the scam included Taweepong Charoenrup, captain of Krabi FC, who discovered that more than 300,000 baht had been illegally withdrawn from his Krungthai Bank account via an ATM in Taiwan.

Club Med gives green to Kata

THE five rai of public land returned to the Kata-Karon community when Club Med was given a new lease on life on August 11 will be developed into a public park.

"Representatives of the public and Club Med decided that the best way to use the land will be to develop a green space where everyone can exercise and play sports," said Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (OrBorJor) President Paiboon Upatising on Saturday.

The resort would cover all construction costs of the park.

The OrBorJor leased the plot to Club Med in 1985, with the 30-year lease set to expire in September next year.

Club Med was able to renew the lease for only three years.

Although President Paiboon initially reported that the land to be handed back covered three rai, he confirmed last Saturday that the full area of public land reclaimed covered five rai.

Phuket's first underpass opens, building continues

THE 600-million-baht underpass located beside the Central Festival Phuket shopping mall is now open to northbound vehicles, Phuket Highways Office Director Samak Luedwonghad confirmed to the *Phuket Gazette* on Tuesday.

The underpass was opened on Saturday from 10am to noon and then opened to traffic again on Tuesday after it was determined that the road surface for northbound traffic at ground level was unsafe.

"After opening the underpass for two hours on Saturday, we closed it to allow traffic to travel as normal. However, on Monday we discovered yesterday that the road surface wasn't safe for northbound traffic due to drainage issues derived from the recent heavy rains," Mr Samak said on Tuesday.

Though the underpass is open, the northbound traffic cannot make a left-hand turn toward Makro along Wichit Songkram Road. Those wanting to turn toward Kathu are advised to drive north until they can access Bang

Yai Road.

The underpass was originally slated to open for a mid-May trial, but was set back by heavy rains.


The unofficial opening of the underpass comes days ahead of the planned opening at the end of this week. However, with the project 85 per cent complete, it is expected to be functioning

smoothly by next week and completely finished by the beginning of October.

"Construction workers are focusing on repairing the road surface and removing construction waste from the roadway. Motorists should be able to make left-hand turns toward Kathu by next week," Mr Samak said.

Mr Samak urged motorists to drive carefully while the underpass is still under construction, and to be patient with any tailbacks.

"Please drive slowly and carefully. We have only one lane open for northbound traffic right now. Any accidents there would produce enormous tailbacks," Mr Samak said.

Tear downs rage on

A MASSIVE military sweep of some of Phuket's most popular beaches on August 14 saw almost two dozen illegal structures forcefully removed and charges pressed against the business owners.

"We are following orders from the National Council for Peace and Order [NCPO]. Multiple business owners have ignored the order to remove their establishments, so we are doing it for them," said Col Somchai Ponatong of the Army's 41st Military Circle.

The owners of the establishments have been ordered to present themselves to local police or the Navy to face charges for encroachment, failure to obey an official order and building without permission.

"If they refuse to present themselves, they could be taken to military court," Col Somchai added.

The Navy started demolishing the Windsurf Shop and Restaurant and Tri Trang Restaurant, but left standing Patong Bay, owned by Prab Keesin, son of former Patong

Mayor Pian Keesin.

"Patong Bay will stay, as Mr Prab was able to present a legitimate *Chanote* title. We have already checked its legality with the Land Office," Col Somchai said.

Officials also visited the White

Box Restaurant on Kalim Beach and found that restaurant staff had already begun tearing down parts of the building the military had ordered them to remove.

"The Navy did not interfere in the tear-down of White Box, as staff were already doing it themselves," said Col Somchai.

Later that day, officials inspected and ordered torn down more than a dozen structures that were encroaching on Nai Yang beach and on Cherng Talay beaches.

Waterfall area inspected for encroachment

AN INVESTIGATION squad on Sunday inspected developed areas allegedly encroaching on the protected forest surrounding the Wang Kee Aon Waterfall in the hills of Patong, one of the places HM King Bhumibol Adulyadej visited on a trip to Phuket in 1959.

The team, composing Royal Forest Department (RFD) officers and Navy personnel, were following up on complaints from residents that claimed the area had been overrun by construction.

"The complaints said that many buildings had been constructed in this area, diminishing the natural landscape," said Cheewapap Cheewatham, a former Sirinath National Park chief who now serves as director of the RFD's Forest Protection and Fire Control Division.

"We found that there are at least three construction sites near the waterfall. Additionally, PVC pipes have been installed upstream to divert water to nearby households, which diminishes the volume of water flowing to the waterfall."

Although officers believed that the area looked like it had been encroached on, Mr Cheewapap said that they would have to wait for verification from the Land Department and aerial photo interpretation of the land boundaries to be completed.

"We can't move forward until the land title documents for the buildings are checked and the boundaries determined. However, the waterfall is in a protected forest area, so if we can prove that the construction sites are encroaching, the buildings will be demolished," he said.

Ancient remains unearthed, WWII shipwreck discovered

ANCIENT human bones have been unearthed along with clay pots believed to be up to 5,000 years old in Khao Na Wang Mi in Krabi, across Phang Nga Bay from Phuket.

Following the discovery in a cliff area in Thap Prik, north of Krabi Town, the Phuketbased 15th Archaeology Office director Riam Phumpongphaet said the office would register the area as an protected site to prevent further damage.

Ms Riam said the belief that an area must be registered before being granted protection was incorrect.

When an ancient object is discovered and confirmed by the Fine Arts Department, the significance of the find is sufficient for the area to receive protection status, she said.

News of the discovery of ancient human remains in Krabi came as the Fine Arts Department on Monday dispatched divers to inspect a sunken ship, possibly from World War II, about a kilometer off Chumphon.

Fine Arts Department archaeologist Siri Ploymukda led divers to investigate the ship-wreck, lying at the bottom of Thong Kho Bay in Tambon Bang Nam Jeud.

The team found the ship, 50 meters long by 8m wide, on a shallow seabed.

Mr Siri said an initial inspection to determine the metal-hulled boat's origins would take three days and then there would be a week-long investigation. — *The Nation*

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No debt with new budget, says NCPO

GEN Prayuth Chan-ocha, head of the Army and the National Council for Peace and Order (NCPO) told the National Legislative Assembly (NLA) on Monday that the proposed 2015 fiscal year budget would not leave problems or debt for the country.

Gen Prayuth proposed the 2.575-trillion-baht budget on Monday for approval by the NLA. The budget will adhere to the principles of economic sufficiency, reported The Nation.

The assembly voted 183 in favor of supporting the bill on the first reading, while three abstained.

The Army chief expects the economy to recover in the latter half of this year on the back of a clearer political situation and effective budget measures.

Japanese man may have fathered nation at least 12 Thai surrogate babies

THE lawyer of a Japanese man suspected of having fathered at least 12 babies using Thai surrogate mothers, submitted DNA samples to Thai police on Monday in a bid to clear his name.

The 24-year-old man, Mitsutoki Shigeta, identified by police as a

Japanese national who travelled frequently in and out of Thailand, has not been charged with any crime.

His lawyer, Suriyamonthon, said his

client wants to clear the allegations against him.

"It's a DNA sample, yes. He wants the truth to be known," Mr Kong said on Monday, adding that he did not know whether Mr Shigeta would return to Thailand.

He declined to confirm Mr Shigeta's whereabouts, but said that the samples had come from

Col Naiyawat Padermchit of the Metropolitan Police Divison 4 said at least 12 babies tested were fathered by Mr Shigeta.

Thailand has been gripped by surrogacy scandals recently, following allegations that an Australian couple had abandoned their Down's syndrome baby with his Thai birth mother, taking only his

twin sister back to Australia.

Earlier this month, Thai police discovered nine surrogate babies with their nannies and a pregnant surro-

gate mother at a Bangkok apartment, dubbed the "baby factory" by media. Police later said that they had found more babies, all suspected of being fathered by the Japanese businessman.



A BOILER exploded at a dyeing plant in Samut Prakan's Muang district on August 17, injuring 22 workers and residents. Several nearby homes were also damaged in the accident.

Of the injured, 17 were migrants including a Myanmar national in charge of running the boiler. Four others were from a Thai family living next door to the factory.

The entire plant and its machinery, owned by Wongwisit Dyeing Co was destroyed Damage was estimated to be about 10 million baht, reported The Nation.

The site has been declared offlimits pending an inspection by police to determine the cause of the accident. No one has been charged vet.

The explosion blew out the upper and lower lids of the five-meter-tall by three-meterwide boiler and sent the main unit flying some distance away from its original site. The explosion levelled six homes and damaged a few others while setting fire to machinery on the other side of the

building. The blaze was extinguished in 30 minutes.

Police said six workers were on duty, including the operator, identified as Sor Mon San, 25, who was taken to the intensive care unit of a hospital with burns all over his body from scalding water.

A police source said there may have been problems with water pipes cooling the boiler, causing steam pressure to build up and exceed the safe limit resulting in the explosion.

Thawee Kaewchart said the pre-dawn blast sent him and two children diving into a ditch by their house, which was flattened by the force of the blast. Mr Thawee had burns on his arm and both of his children had burns on a large part of their bodies.

Jeerasak Sukhonthachart, permanent secretary of the Labour Ministry, said registered migrant workers would be provided assistance from the Social Security scheme while those unregistered would get initial assistance from their employer.

We did this because of our faith, and we did it to help others.

A group of 19 people made up the original administration board when Kusoldharm was founded. Now, there are 50 paid staff and about 300 volunteers, some of whom have been working with us for almost 20 years.

The foundation has evolved and adapted since its modest beginning more than 40 years ago. Nowadays, we do a lot of social and charity

work apart from our duties as a rescue foundation.

It is no secret that this is a hard job. Not many people would willingly do the work

that our staff do. Most are volunteers and the staff are paid little.

I am always watching over my staff very closely. People in our foundation must love each other and always have a positive attitude, as our job is to help others.

I work hard to gain the trust and respect of my staff, and if one

or causes any problems, I will not keep them around.

I greatly admire my staff and volunteers for having the heart to help other people while asking for little or nothing in return.

Every worker must pass a training course with the Phuket Provincial Health Office in order to take part in lifesaving missions. The course includes CPR certifi-

> cations, first aid techniques and more.

> Our workers are normally associated with the grisly business of saving lives on the

road, but we also train our staff in marine search and rescue. We are having to adapt to the ever-increasing number of waterrelated accidents in seas near the island. Many of our staff members and volunteers have learned essential techniques to save others, and even themselves, in the of our members is disrespectful case of a marine emergency.

We must be ready to deal with anything – on land or in the sea.

The organization is run solely on donations. However, we never send our staff out to collect money. The only way a donation can be made is by visiting our headquarters in Phuket Town.

Our focus is on Phuket, but we also help out if there is an accident or disaster in other provinces.

For example, in 1989, a plane crashed in Phang Nga, and many people died. Kusoldharm Foundation coordinated with Phang Nga provincial authorities in retrieving bodies from the crash site.

And of course, when the 2004 tsunami hit, Kusoldharm rescue workers served tirelessly.

We work 24 hours a day, seven days a week and all of our services are done for free.

No one is forced to join our team. They all follow their heart and passion, and most volunteer. I believe that is why we are still here and why we are always getting stronger.

Unlike the chain-smoking taxi drivers that often greet visitors at Phuket Airport with dress shirts unbuttoned and attitudes meant to establish a fictional level of dominance, the drivers in Borneo were well dressed and incredibly polite.

On the way out to see the orangutans at the Semenggoh Wildlife Centre, one driver began talking about how certain local plants are used in traditional medicines for a variety of illnesses. He wasn't selling anything, he was simply imparting information he thought we would find interesting.

Such conversation makes a person feel good. There is something undeniably welcoming about the interaction.

One of the main differences between Phuket and Borneo taxi drivers boils down to language

barriers. Drivers who are confident in their English-language skills - much easier to find in Borneo than Phuket – are more likely to initiate a casual conversation, acting almost as informal tour guides while taking a person to exactly where they asked to go, with no additional stops to book unwanted tours.

Beyond English-language skills and a general hospitality that puts most Thai-taxi hospitality to shame, the drivers in Borneo charged reasonable prices.

In general, people, especially tourists, don't mind the price of a taxi. What they mind is the feeling of being ripped off.

Legalities of profitable video blogs

No, it isn't, as long as load is for fun or to share for free.

However, if you turn on YouTube ads while living in Thailand, or post them in your own blog where they can collect revenue, this could be considered work.

Even if you posted videos while outside Thailand, but then turned on ads while here, this would be considered work, as you are making money while in the country.

However, if you activated the ads before entering the country, and still received revenue once here, this would not be considered as working.

Can you tell me where the beach is?

Is a there a statutory definition for "beach" in Thailand? For example, the area of land below the mean tidal height? Or that area of land below highest astronomical spring tide? Or something else?

Somyot Laochoo, director of the Phuket Land Office, replies:

The Land Office has no exact definition of what constitutes a beach. The definition is controlled by the Marine Office.

Anytime we have to deal with measuring land next to the beach, we have to work with the Marine Office and make sure the plot of land is not on the beach.

Some laws mention the word beach, but there is no precise definition of what exactly is a beach.

For example, Section 117 of the Thai Navigation Act BE 2456 says, "No person shall construct buildings or other structure encroaching over, in or underwater of any river, canal, marsh, reservoir, lake using as a communication path or for a common use of the public, or of the sea within Thai waters or on the beach of such sea unless permission is obtained from the

Harbor Master."

But the act does not give any definition of what a "beach" is.

However, Marine Department regulations give two definitions for "coast" or "shoreline".

One definition, for where there is no beach [no sand], is the high tide mark.

The other definition, for where there is a beach [sand], is where the water meets the "sea bank" that is, where land meets the sand. beyond high-tide mark.

A step in the right direction

THE welcome news that the Royal Thai Police no longer need to wait 24 hours before launching a missing child search is one of the greatest leaps forward in policing policy in years (see page 1).

A regular reader would not have to flip through a pile of back issues to know of the countless international law-enforcement conferences reported over the years – and the standard photo opportunities of local police targeting "bad guys", primarily in the hope of saving Thailand from losing face and defending the nation's lucrative tourism reputation.

This latest move targets the saving of lives of those most valuable to any society: children.

It also brings the Royal Thai Police in line with world standards. The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) has Child Abduction Rapid Deployment (CARD) teams across the United States.

"The first few hours after a child is abducted are critical," says the FBI on its website, although admitting that the CARD teams were only established in October 2005.

However, the FBI brings some common sense to the problem – and a counter to the Thai Police mantra that they do not have enough officers: the FBI has only 60 CARD officers who make up five teams working the entire US.

The policy shift also caters well to the changing social fabric of Phuket, where many parents are from other provinces. Most Thais in Phuket are not Phuket natives, and many of them leave their children with elderly family members or friends while they work. Sadly, as the tragic tale of Nong Dear shows, anytime a child is out of sight of his or her parents could be a time for worry.

To their credit, the Thai police now (unofficially) use to their benefit another recent cultural shift – the Thai dependency on being connected online. Police use the chat application Line to update the media on breaking news stories. News of a missing child can be quickly spread the same way.

Of all sad irony, the case of missing Nong Pin in 2011 highlights how she herself could have been using at the time of her disappearance, one of the greatest tools in locating missing persons: she was last seen in an internet cafe using Facebook.

The global online networking portal has 24 million users in Thailand, who collectively send more than 5.5 billion messages each month. Yet despite the plethora advertisements that target a specific Facebook readership, the *Gazette* has yet to see one localized public notice for a missing person.

Mark Zuckerberg, 29, has yet to sire children, but has amassed more than 893.48bn baht from Facebook. Maybe he can afford to spare a few localized ad slots to promote missing children notices – if the Royal Thai Police can seize the initiative.

Wine knowledge is power

TIMES when a waiter in a restaurant could get away with just about any wine recommendation – a white for the fish or a random red to go with meat - are luckily over. These days, customers are more and more knowledgeable and demand an ever-growing level of service. Better trained staff can be the key to success, especially in Phuket's highly competitive environment.

The fact that local food and beverage and hospitality establishments are aware of the connection between better staff training and increased competitiveness could be clearly seen during the recent Intensive California Wine Training Program organized by World Class Wines Co, Ltd and California Wines Co, Ltd in cooperation with WineCraft held at Patong's Holiday Inn. The hotel's conference hall was packed with representatives of such renowned establishments as Trisara, JW Marriott, Outrigger, Avista and others, who attended the two-day training with hopes of expanding their knowledge and gaining appropriate certification.

The course, conducted by international wine specialist, Singapore national Lim Hwee Peng, a Certified Specialist in Wines (CSW), focused on the wines of Napa Valley, California, one of the world's smallest but most diverse wine growing regions, which in its relatively short, 150-year history, has produced some of the world's greatest wines. Everything, starting with the region's wine industry origins, its most influential characters, soil, weather profiles and much more, was covered during the training, accompanied by a number of premium Napa wines to create a perfect match of knowledge and fun.

"The world of wine is a constantly evolving universe - a never-ending learning journey," explained Lim Hwee Peng. "It's a constant process not of trying to catch up, but of staying ahead of the game. This is why it's important for wine professionals to get as much certification as possible," he added.

According to Lim, such train-



ing builds confidence and competency, which helps wine and food professionals in their dayto-day jobs, enabling them to answer any question a well-traveled and knowledgeable guest might want to ask.

"It's not enough to say whether a wine is fruity or not. People know more and more and that's why courses like this have a future here," he explained.

And being in Thailand and Southeast Asia in general, this might be more true than anywhere else. On one hand, wine is not a part of the region's native culture, so more time and effort is needed to propagate it. On the other, the

demand is ever growing as is the understating of the wine culture in these parts of the world. Lim, who has had a chance to observe this growth through his years of providing wine knowledge to local hospitality and food professionals, confirms.

"The service I'm providing here is for a niche market, but I do notice growth. Just a few years ago, during such training, I needed a translator to help the audience understand what I was explaining. Not anymore. Now I can crack jokes and everybody understands. I think this shows how it's all developing. And it's very encouraging to see this

improvement."

Any conversation about wine culture in Thailand cannot be complete without the mention of outrageous taxes and import duties resulting in excessively high prices of wine in local outlets. But according to Lim, it's nothing that should deter anybody from the wine business here.

"Many people complain about high duties and tax problems, but if you speak to the locals and let them know that you intend to do business with them, they will tell you that these are just small issues to overcome and it shouldn't prevent people from doing business here."

UCaaS market in **APAC** to expand

OVER the past few years, the Unified Communications-as-a-Service (UCaaS) market has been experiencing tremendous growth in the Asia-Pacific region and is expected to continue until 2018, helped by strong growth in verticals that have highly mobile workforces, such as high-tech, professional services, logistics, travel and hospitality services.

The UCaaS market is defined as an integrated communications and collaboration environment that combines or unifies voice, video and text communications delivered through hosted, cloud and managed services.

The Asia-Pacific UCaaS market is expected to grow from 53 billion baht (US\$1.67bn) in 2013 to 95bn baht (US\$2.98bn) by 2018, at an estimated CAGR of 12.4 per cent. The telephony services segment is the most widely adopted market, and it is likely to maintain its prominence in the future. Although the audio conferencing services segment has matured, it is expected to remain an important segment throughout the forecast period. Mobility, video-asa-service (VaaS), web conferencing and cloud contact center services are expected to be the key growth service segments.

Preschool learning app aspires to build a solid academic foundation

THAI tech startup Taamkru recently received support from several organizations including Silicone Valley based 500 Startups resulting in an infusion of US\$620,000 from a seed funding


Taamkru (Thai for "ask the teacher") aims to raise the standard of education for preschool-aged kids in the Kingdom and beyond through a series of mobile and web

The Taamkru team consists of four founders who each bring a specific piece of expertise to the Taamkru puzzle. From child development to coding, the team has garnered the attention and support needed to get their startup off the ground.

The free Taamkru app seeks to take advantage of Thai's outright obsession with mobile technology by infusing an element of education into the endless varieties of mindless games that have reached pandemic levels of popularity.

The app's creators hope to bridge the ever-elusive gap between education and fun. They are encouraging educators to cast aside boring workbooks in exchange for a more modern and engaging method of education.

Participants' responses are con-



bored with content that doesn't challenge them.

An even more noteworthy feature of the app is that it allows parents to monitor their child's progress in real-time and compare it with the results of other kids in a nationwide database.

In a recent interview, Taamkru

reached 100,000 active users across the multi-platform app.

Although they certainly seek to monetize the app, they have strong motivations to raise the level of early childhood development in Thailand from its current low standing. UNICEF claims that only 84 per cent of kids 3-5 years

old attend early childhood development centers and only two-thirds of those centers meet quality assessment standards.

Furthermore, out of 65 participating countries in the Programme for International Student Assessment, Thai students ranked 48th in reading and science and 50th in mathematics. In education, Thailand falls in 8th place out of 10 Southeast Asian countries. This is

despite the fact that in 2010, Thailand spent 22.3 per cent of the national budget on education according to World Education News & Reviews.

Within the first two months following its release in January, Taamkru reached the prestigious ranking of number one on the Thai app store in both the kids and education categories. Credit for the app's rapid succession to popularity can be partially attributed to it's availability in Thai, English and Chinese as well as lessons across English, IQ, mathematics and science.

Taamkru has accrued more than one million creative exercises with a new lesson added everyday to keep the content fresh and engaging.

To further validate their credibility, Taamkru ensures that all of their content aligns with the standards of the Ministry of Education.

But perhaps the success and impact of Taamkru can best be summed up in one word: accessibility. Most children already have access to the tools needed to take advantage of Taamkru – a phone or tablet and internet access.

It might seem overly optimistic to expect a simple app to pull the floundering Thai education system up from the depths, but at least it's a step in the right direction.

THERE is a lot of confusion over whether it is possible to time to the markets. If you are speculating, or trading, you rely on technical analysis of some sort and do, in fact, time the market. As an investor on the other hand, you should look at underlying fundamentals and attempt to make a purchase when it represents value as a stand-alone investment or contributes to desirable attributes when looked at from a portfolio perspective. That said, there is a statistically significant seasonal tendency which has been well

The question is though, is this luck or will this be repeated in the coming 25 years as well? If you look into the statistics behind his strategy, the answer is that it likely will. The caveat is that it also may not, and a little explanation of statistics and game theory may help understand why.

The efficacy of seasonal timing strategies to the 147.8% return obtained by buying the DJIA (Dow) and holding onto it, while simultaneously missing the crashes of the dot com bubble and the financial crisis of 2008. This makes the strategy look bullet-proof, but in statistics we rely on the law of large numbers to achieve results close to statistically significant averages. The next 25 years is a relatively small sample size, and so deviation from the longer term historical averages could easily occur. Deviations often occur in runs as well, meaning that there may be a bunch of years close together where the normal relationship fails to hold. Anyone who has played roulette knows how the wheel can put up an extremely long run of black or red as soon as you start betting against it.

very good explanations why the phenomenon behind the old Wall Street adage of "sell in May and go away" normally holds. For one, many traders take holidays over the summer and the lack of volume often leads to negative reversals (a lack of volume behind an advance is often interpreted by technical traders as a sign of weakness).

There is also good reason why December and January are good months on average. Many fund managers buy stocks that have performed well over the year to be able to show on their annual statements that they are holding them. This is known as window dressing and the increase in volume has the opposite interpretation by technical traders as the one mentioned above. Also, most employees receive their annual bonuses in the beginning of the year and inevitably some of this finds its way into the markets.

On any given year or over a short number of years this strategy may not work, but in the long run the seasonal timing strategy is one of the few that actually stand up to statistical measure. Anybody can easily duplicate Sy Harding's strategy on their own via a discount broker and the ETF with the symbol "DIA", which represents a low cost basket of the stocks that make up the Dow. On the other hand, there are The activity requires strict discipline however, so if you find that you are not able to stick to it 100%, then you will be better off with a buy and hold strategy or dollar cost averaging.

Gateway provinces see jump in land prices ahead of AEC

CHIANG Rai and Udon Thani are start until next year, demand for among those reaping benefits of plans to link Thailand with neighbors

Land prices for residential development in key gateway provinces to neighboring Asean countries have risen by between 20% and 50%, even though the Kingdom's 2.4-trillion baht megainfrastructure projects will not get under way until next year.

The provinces witnessing such boosts are Chiang Mai and Chiang Rai in the North and Udon Thani and Nong Khai in the Northeast, where developers believe that despite the delay in mega-projects due to the political situation and the ruling junta's reassessment of state spending, there will be continued strong residential demand in locations to support the country's logistics system after the Asean Economic Community (AEC) comes into effect next year.

Meanwhile, demand to develop residential projects around the mass-transit routes in greater Bangkok remains strong, with developers confident that new and extended routes under construction will kick off in the next three years.

Land prices in the main provinces central to the country's logistics system connecting to neighboring countries are increasing following rising demand for residential, retail and manufacturing development, despite the fact that the new investment in mega-infrastructure projects still awaits final approval by the next government.

Issara Boonyoung, director of the Business Housing Association, said that though investment in a double-track rail system will not

land in gateway provinces had been on the rise since last year.

This is most pronounced in Chiang Rai, which is the gateway to Yunnan in China, and Udon Thani and Nong Kai - the gateways to the Lao capital.

Investment in these provinces is for residential, retail and warehouse development in support of the country's logistics-system links to AEC countries.

Kittipol Pramote Na Ayudhya, director of the Thai Real Estate Association, said the master plan for the infrastructure and logistics system would change the country's property business across all sectors – not only residential projects.

"We see retail businesses expanding their investment to support demand in the provincial market, which leads to residential, warehouse and manufacturing expansion to the provinces in the next stage," he said.

Infrastructure investment will change the country's demographics, and also expand development from Bangkok and its suburbs to the provinces in the future, he added.

However, most property firms continue in a wait-and-see mode, and will decide their next moves if and when the ruling National Council for Peace and Order gives its approval to the 2.4tn baht master plan to develop Thailand's infrastructure and logistics system

The bulk of the budget, at 741.4bn, is for two high-speed rail routes linking with Southern China, Laos, Malaysia and Singapore to facilitate expansion in trade and investment in the region.



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Warning signals for Phuket's unlicensed accommodation sector

PART of every real estate cycle across Asia since the early 1990s is the appearance of exotic property investment propositions. Imagine it's Groundhog Day and the past is destined to replay, time and time again. We can always count on the condominium hotel sector to surge as we crest a wave of undying consumer exuberance.

Over the past few months as part of our island property research I've come across between 20 to 30 new developments offering rental programs, term guaranteed returns and rental yield investment opportunities. As I start to read the information, what remaining hair there is on the back of my head starts to stand on end.

The majority of these projects are informal options for unit buyers who can, of course, avail themselves of the unique opportunity to cash in on the island's boom. Vague descriptions ramped up return projections, oftenpromised long-term returns, and numbers that defy any historical paradigm – we have seen them all in the Phuket marketplace.

Where the sector has some very credible players, at the other end of the spectrum, are developments which don't have hotel licenses and avoid paying any form of tax. They do not report guests

to immigration as the law requires, nor do the budding hotel-type operators have experience in the running of hospitality operations.

For hotels that pay tax, obtain permits, and operate under the applicable legal system, this is clearly not a fair playing ground. For the island, taxes that should rightly come back into the infrastructure arena are not paid and guests at many of these establishments put themselves at a safety risk, given that their presence in condominiums or villas is often unknown to authorities. In times of emergency, no one knows that there is an actual tenant.


Certainly, there are issues for developers or operators who may

wish to obtain licenses for hotel operations but due to the vague hotel geared legislation, are unable to qualify even if they wanted to.

At a time when Phuket's hotel supply edges closer and closer to the 50,000 room level, the reality on the ground is that a swelling new inventory of unlicensed establishments is creating a substantial gray accommodation market. Management of these properties, given they have no statutory requirements, can offer low-cost prices which legitimate hotels simply cannot. At the end of the day, if increasing quality is the island's tourism mandate, this alternative market could easily derail the process.

More critical though, is consumer protection for real estate buyers. The island's buying demographic is shifting and the new markets are perhaps a bit more inclined to take the offering of high-sustained rental yields at face value. As history has shown, this clearly will not be the case. Non-traditional accommodation typically prospers when there is a hotel undersupply. But once hotels are plentiful these offerings can only effectively compete on lower prices to induce demand.

While I'm a big fan of entrepreneurism, and also to some extended, well-crafted, hospitalityled residential offerings, the sector

does have a very dark side. As buyers have found, in developments such as Laguna's Allamanda, there is often no guarantee that a hotel-managed property investment is going to stay that way in the long term.

For the island's government the issue of addressing both unlicensed establishment and creating broader, more practical ways, that villas and developments which offer rentals can come into the mainstream, are much needed. As for vigilance in consumer protection, potential buyers need to appoint experienced legal advisers to read the fine print and need to ask serious questions about managed properties.

Sadly, Phuket is not alone in

this debacle. Bali has experienced the same growing pains. What's amazing is to see the skyrocketing fortunes of Internet accommodation booking giant AirBnB, whose growth depends on so many properties operating without licenses or paying tax. At the end of the day, tourism remains Phuket's primary growth engine and the bigger it becomes, a rational degree of regulation is simply mandatory to control the beast within.

Thailand scoops beach awards

THAILAND has taken the number one spot in the new Global Beachfront Awards with an amazing 1,250 "true beachfront" hotels. Thailand beat out the USA and Mexico in second and third place respectively.

The awards, organized by the Beachfront Club website that maps and details seaside hotels around the world, are the result of a recent survey of more than 11,000 hotels in 109 countries.

According to the website "true beachfront" means only those hotels directly on the beach or oceanfront, with no road or traffic between the rooms and the water. The website has more than 12,000 qualified hotels in its database. Thailand's win over so many heavyweights of global tourism might surprise some people, but it also comes as Thailand reached the Top 10 tourism destinations worldwide for the first time, coming in at Number 10 in 2013 with 27.4 million international visitors.

In the five years between 2009 and 2013 Thailand recorded the world's highest rate of tourism growth by a wide margin. And the largest number of those visitors, by far, were headed for Thai beaches. Bangkok is a hugely popular stop-

over that now attracts many millions of visitors annually, but the number of those visitors continuing north to Chiang Mai and other cultural destinations is just a small fraction of those heading south to Thailand's famous beaches.

Beach-lovers in both Europe and North America are now seeking new, more pristine sands in an era when long-distance travel is faster and cheaper than ever. The longer travel times to the new beach destinations in Southeast Asia are now affordable for millions of beach-lovers.

Spain, where beaches are also the major attraction, gets over 60 million tourists a year. But the rise in Spanish tourism over the past five years totalled just 16 per cent, tiny beside Thailand's whopping 88 per cent increase.

A more pristine, natural environment ranks high among the desires of visitors from developed countries, and even among the new wave of visitors from highly urbanized China. Thailand's beach environments are – relatively speaking – in reasonably good condition. Nevertheless, environmental degradation and over-development are perhaps the greatest current threats to Thai beaches, and these

dangers continue to rampage across its islands and beaches largely unchecked.

The country's thousand-plus beachfront accommodations span every price and quality range, from five-dollar backpacker huts to super-luxurious, international five-star resorts. The new wave of creatively-designed, boutique beach resorts is helping push Thai accommodations to the forefront, while still offering something for every taste and budget.

While Southeast Asia recorded the world's fastest growth in tourism between 2009 and 2013, Thailand was the biggest winner, taking 40 per cent of all visitors to the region.

Thailand's beach tourism industry faces so many dangers from environmental degradation and over-development that its chances of retaining the top spot in beach tourism well into the future is in doubt. The first major clean up of encroachment on Phuket's beaches was initiated by the military government in July 2014. For now, Thailand's beach environments remain more natural than most, while the future remains uncertain.

Life & style The summer of the **American Century**

ONE word can best describe the 63-year-old American author Bill Bryson: Genial. His 17 books are all told in a breezy, affable, humorous, intimate, first person style that immediately ingratiates itself upon the reader. He has written funny travel books about America, Britain, Europe and Australia. The Life and Times of the Thunderbolt Kid is a memoir of his childhood in Iowa. Having spent most of his adult life in England, he delves with some authority into the differences between American and British English. His masterpiece is A Short History of Nearly Everything which covers the development of human knowledge from the Stone Age to the present.

His latest book, One Summer (Anchor Books, New York, 2014, 509pp), focuses on a few months in 1927 that marked the pivot of the American Century. This was a summer of roaring prosperity, of the rise of radio, movies and tabloids, of Charles Lindbergh's solo flight across the Atlantic, Babe Ruth's 60 homeruns, the Jack Dempsey-Gene Tunney fight and Al Capone's rule over Chicago. Bryson brings it all back to life.

He offers, for example, this thumbnail portrait of Captain Charles Nungesser, a French air ace and early rival to Charles Lindbergh.

"With his Gallic charm and a chestful of medals, Nungesser proved irresistible to women, and in the spring of 1923 after a whirlwind romance he became engaged to a young New York socialite with the unimprovably glorious name of Consuelo Hatmaker. . . [Her father] opposed his daughter's marriage to Captain Nungesser on the grounds – not unreasonable on the fact of it - that Nungesser was destitute, broken-bodied, something of a bounder, unemployable except in time of war, and French."


This was also the summer of Babe Ruth, "the most brilliant, headstrong, undisciplined, lovable, thrillingly original, ornery son a bitch that ever put on a baseball uniform". With Lou Gehrig batting beside him, he made the New York Yankees the greatest team in history. Their partnership would eventually sour. "By the 1930s, Gehrig would hate Ruth as passionately as it was possible to hate a person. The fact that Ruth reportedly had by that point slept with Gehrig's wife would seem, not surprisingly, to have had something to do with that."

If baseball was America's national sport, boxing ran a close second. Heavyweight bouts attracted a huge crowd and media frenzy. Jack Dempsey was boxing's hero. He dispatched the heavyweight champion, the giant Jess Willard, in this fashion: "Dempsey charged from his corner and smashed Willard's jaw so hard that he broke it in thirteen places, then followed up with a hook that sprayed six of Willard's teeth across the canvas." It was a more brutal time. Bean balls and brawls were common in baseball too.

For all the heroes of the age, however, none matched Charley Lindbergh. The world had never seen such mass hysterical adulation. Later manias over the Beatles and the American moon walkers were nothing compared to the mob scenes that accompanied Lindbergh's grand tour of America aboard his Spirit of St Louis.

Bootlegger Al Capone was wildly popular too. "Chicago was to corruption what Pittsburgh was to steel," Bryson notes. "It refined and cultivated it, and embraced it without embarrassment." Capone would soon come undone by the Saint Valentine's Day Massacre. But not before the American gangster became enshrined in Hollywood movies.

"Moviegoers around the world suddenly found themselves exposed, often for the first time, to American voices, American vocabulary. American cadence... Spanish conquistadores, Elizabethan courtiers, figures from the Bible were suddenly speaking in American voices. With American speech came American thoughts, American

attitudes, American humor and sensibilities. Peacefully, by accident, and almost unnoticed, America had just taken over the world."

It was also a time of unparalleled hatred: hatred of blacks and other "inferior races", especially the Jews. Hitler and the Nazis did not spring from a vacuum. They had long befriended Charles Lindbergh who gave a speech in September 1941 for the America First isolationist group. He urged American to stay out of the war in Europe and blamed warmongering by Britain, Franklin D Roosevelt and the Jews.


Three months later, Pearl Harbor was bombed. Lindbergh was no longer the hero of the age.

VISITORS to Phuket are often perplexed by the many things going on around them. Following a recent visit to a working rubber plantation and whirlwind tour of the world's largest rubber factory, many of the questions I had been accumulating over the years, regarding the omnipresent farms blanketing southern Thailand, were answered.

A number of useful innovations were spawned following the discovery of rubber's potential. However, it wasn't until the process of vulcanization (the addition of chemicals to enhance various desirable properties) was discovered in 1840 by Charles Goodyear - as in Goodyear the tyre manufacturer – that its applications increased exponentially.

Once the booming automotive industry became dependent on rubber for tyres and other parts, production erupted. Endemic to the tropical Americas, the vast quantities of rubber trees growing wild in the northern Amazon were the first to be exploited.

In the late 19th century, rubber seeds were smuggled out of the Amazon to Britain where highyielding strains were developed and subsequently brought to Southeast Asia, in particular Malaysia, to be grown. Seeds were smuggled north once again into Thailand, which now stands as the world's largest producer of natural rubber.

In Phuket, and all over southern Thailand, unbroken lines of rubber trees with little catchment bowls dangling, stretch off in every direction. As a monoculture crop, rubber trees are attractive since they are fairly hardy and once established,

produce latex year after year.

Many tree-based crops take years before they begin producing and rubber is no exception with farmers having to hold out for seven years before tapping their

However, as can be witnessed all over Phuket, young rubber trees are planted far enough apart and allow light through their canopies for other crops to grow amongst them – such as the famously sweet and delicious Phuket pineapples.

Pineapples can flower and

produce fruit in about 18 months providing rubber farmers income from their land in the long wait to tap their rubber trees. Farmers claim that pineapples and rubber trees have a symbiotic relationship, with one depleting the soil of certain nutrients, while the other replenishes. Thailand has been one of the top five producers of pineapples for years.

About 95 per cent of the 12.5 million rai of rubber plantations are small-holdings run by about one million families. It seems like a large number of people until the fact is revealed that every tree is tapped, the latex collected, and is all initially processed by hand.

The tapping process must be carried out at night since sunlight and warm daytime temperatures cause the latex to coagulate before

reaching the collection container. Workers embark at midnight and make a shallow diagonal cut halfway around the trunk of the tree just below the last cut.

"The way they cut it, they have to have a technique... if they cut too deep they will injure the tree and the next thing you know it will have some deformities that effect its lifespan," ex-

plains Marketing Assistant at Von Bundit, Michael Ong.

the cut.

The latex removed from the tree is of low viscosity and quickly drips down the cut and off a small metal spigot into the collection cup. Workers then revisit every tree around daybreak to collect the liquid latex.

One rai contains 60 trees, which can produce 3 kilograms of latex per day on average.

Once the latex is collected, three liters is mixed with two liters of water and a small amount of formic acid to induce coagulation. Blocks of bright white latex with the look and consistency of fresh mozzarella cheese are then run through a series of presses to flatten the blocks and remove moisture.

The floppy sheets are then hung on lines to dry for three days and subsequently moved to lines indoors to dry slowly for an additional month.

These rubber sheets, which are then purchased by second-dealers - a type of middleman - make up the higher-grade rubber that processing facilities sell.

Once the sun rises, a small amount of latex continues to drip from the cuts made in the tree. After it coagulates in the collection cups, it is harvested and sold as a lower-grade material they call "cup lumps". This rubber undergoes less processing and is delegated to making things like shoe soles and rubber bands.

Once the second-dealers have sold the rubber sheets to the processing factories, they are evaluated for quality and workers cut out contaminants. They are then hung on racks in smoking rooms where they remain for three days to remove even more moisture from the rubber.


"Smoking is to get more DRC [dry rubber content] out of the rubber sheets. The rubber sheets that we are buying from the market consist of around 90 per cent DRC, and then after the smoking process this increases to around 97 to 99 per cent," explains Mr Ong.

Once a rubber tree's production has dropped off, it is cut down and destined to fuel the smoking process.

The production of natural latex over synthetic versions has its benefits. The labor intensive process keeps millions of people in work – especially those from less fortunate backgrounds with limited

employment options.

The planting of rubber trees also serves to enhance soil fertility and help prevent erosion. In contrast to synthetic petroleumbased rubber, swathes of rubber plantations act as carbon sinks to absorb greenhouse gasses.



monoculture of any variety has consequences for the environment. Pests that feed on this particular crop run rampant and, typically, farmers increase pesticides in response. Although the trees can make soils hospitable for certain species, they deplete other nutrients that have to be supplemented with fertilizers.

Monocrops also devastate the diverse ecosystem that many animals depend on for their habitat, a scenario seen with the endangered status of orangutans in Malaysia, Indonesia and Borneo - a result of intense oil palm production.

Although synthetic rubber and the potential for more lucrative crops for farmers poses a threat to natural rubber production, our current level of dependence on this resource ensures that the latex will keep on flowing.

Looking Back



IN MAY of this year an unbelievable discovery was made in a palm plantation in Khao Chaison, a district within Phatthalung province. Wee Thapsaeng, the owner of a 7-rai plot of land was using his tractor to plow the land, in order to prepare it for growing palm trees. What emerged, however, was not just mud and earthworms, as one would expect. To his surprise, Wee also found several gold plates emerging from the disturbed ground.

A visit to the local goldsmith quickly confirmed that the objects were indeed solid gold. News of the discovery soon spread among the villagers sparking a frenzied rush to look for more gold. Hundreds of villagers started digging in Wee's plot of land and true to their expectations, more gold was discovered. By the time the Fine Arts Department had heard of the news and arrived to investigate the site, villagers had dug up hundreds of gold plates, bracelets, nuggets and animal pendants.

Initial investigation of the artifacts confirmed that the gold was indeed ancient. In fact, the hoard found in Khao Chaison turned out to be more than 800 years old, according to experts from the Fine Arts Department.

Villagers who lived nearby said that the site of the discovery used to be an old canal bed, which had long since dried up. They also said that an old Chinese vessel had been uncovered there several years ago. One of the villagers who managed to dig up a gold plate from the plot of land, said that her find was buried only 20 centimeters underground. When she uncovered the plate, it resembled a piece of paper that had been folded many times. The plate had Chinese characters inscribed into

it. According to her daughter, the characters translated as 'Powerful Being'.

So how did Chinese-inscribed treasure, or for that matter, any treasure end up in the middle of a field in Phatthalung province? Assuming the experts at the Fine Arts Department have correctly dated the treasure hoard, the gold must have originated from an era that preceded the Sukhothai Kingdom. In fact, around 800 years ago when the treasure was lost, the boat carrying it must have been sailing along an ancient canal that ran through, what was then, the Srivijaya Empire.

Srivijaya was a regional power

from around the 8th to the 12th century AD. The boundaries of the empire stretched from what is now modern-day Sumatra, Java, the Malay Peninsula and the south of Thailand, up to Surat Thani province. The empire prospered from maritime trade and fostered its commercial relationship with the ruling Tang Dynasty, and then later with the Song Dynasty of China. Srivijaya was also an important center for Mahayana Buddhism. In fact, the earliest mention of Srivijaya was made in the 7th century AD. A Chinese monk called Yijing, who travelled to the empire in the year 671 AD, wrote about Srivijaya in his travel

Srivijaya was a maritime empire. During its heyday, the rulers of Srivijaya controlled the most important sea routes and allowed it to foster trade between China and the various kingdoms in India. Its location made it a maritime trading center and propelled it into one of the wealthiest and most populous kingdoms in the region during that period. Back then, the rulers of Srivijaya understood that their regional dominance was owed to the fact that they controlled the most important trade routes. The kings of Srivijaya ordered the building of canals throughout their empire,

in order to make it easier for merchant ships to sail within the territory. Aerial photographs, which were taken in 1984 show remnants of impressive canal networks, moats and ponds in Palembang, in southern Sumatra, which were built during the Srivijaya Empire.

The city of Ligor, modern day Nakhon Sri Thammarat, was an important trading center within the Srivijaya kingdom. The ancient canal network, which runs through Phatthalung may have connected Ligor with the sea and the various towns in the region.

Although many trading vessels would have voyaged along the canals during the Srivijaya period, maritime journeys during that time were fraught with danger. Several ships were sunk due to storms and other catastrophes. The hoard of gold discovered in Phatthalung may have been in transit through Srivijaya territory, but for some reason the vessel carrying it must have sunk in the canal along with its precious cargo. The invaluable treasure would not resurface again for another 800 years.

Anek Sihamart, chief of the Fine Arts Department is worried, however, that if the gold rush is not stopped, villagers could seriously damage the ancient site and the historical artifacts. The fact is, discoveries dating from the Srivijaya period have been very rare and this find, if confirmed to be from that period, could reveal some intriguing information about the empire's history that has never come to light before. The Fine Arts Department has now offered to buy the ancient gold back from villagers who may have taken those pieces home, at prices higher than the market value. They have also asked the military for help in fencing off the area so that proper excavation of the site can be done in due course.

A WHOPPING 45 per cent of us believe we are allergic to basic foodstuffs such as wheat and dairy products – causing anything from bloating to insomnia, according to an article called "The Allergy Fraud" which was published in the UK's Daily Mail.

Another food item that many people believe wreaks havoc on their health is monosodium glutamate (MSG).

The Gazette recently ran a special report about MSG that laid out some of the arguments both for and against the substance. One of the arguments in the article proposed that sensitivity to MSG can cause reactions like headaches, diarrhea and bloating.

It seems that the issue of food sensitivity, food intolerance, has become a widespread health issue. So, how do we know exactly what is going on when our bodies have negative reactions to food? And what can we do to help ourselves?

FOOD ALLERGY VERSUS FOOD INTOLERANCE

It is important to first understand the difference between food allergy and food sensitivity.

A food allergy is a genetic condition that affects about two per cent of the population. Reactions can range from mild to severe: from a rash to potentially fatal anaphylactic shock.

Genetically inherited allergies can be confirmed by a radioallergosorbent test (RAST). A RAST can detect specific antibodies of suspected or known allergens and confirm the existence of any food or other types of al-

Common foods that are associated with genetically-inherited

allergies include: cow's milk, soy, tree nuts, eggs, strawberries, bananas, chocolate, wheat, peanuts, fish, shellfish, beans and oranges.

Those with a true food allergy, if ever exposed to the allergen once or multiple times – will certainly know about it.

A food intolerance, on the other hand, involves any adverse reaction to foods. In this case, the immune system's roll is uncertain, because the standard allergy tests come up negative.

So where does this leave the 45 per cent who experience uncomfortable side-effects like abdominal bloating, gas or diarrhea, after eating certain foods?

POSSIBLE SOURCES OF FOOD INTOLERANCE

It is believed that one of the most common explanations for food intolerance is digestive disorders, such as irritable bowel syndrome (IBS), and the issues that come with them.

According to general practitioner Dr Dan Rutherford, IBS is the most common condition seen by doctors, and some estimates suggest that as many as one in five of the adult population in the UK suffers from it at any one time.

There is a strong suggestion that an increased permeability of the intestinal wall, known as leaky gut syndrome (LGS) – one side effect of IBS – is behind many different food intolerances.

If you answered affirmatively to more than half of these questions, you should consider testing suspect foods by adopting an elimination diet. An elimination diet requires that you temporarily remove suspect foods for a two to four-week period, monitor how you feel, then re-introduce the

foods and evaluate your overall feeling of health afterward.

Try to recognize whether your symptom or symptoms – whether they be bloating, gas, diarrhea, constipation or something else seem to be connected to the food you had eliminated and re-introduced.

IN recognition of the benevolence of HM King Bhumibol Adulyadej to grant the World Muaythai Council (WMC) Royal Thai Patronage, the WMC on Wednesday held a special ceremony at the Sports Authority of Thailand headquarters in Bangkok.

The WMC, which is the national governing body for Muay Thai, was inaugurated in 1995 under the directive of the Royal Thai Government to foster and promote all aspects of Muay Thai as a cultural art form, a competition sport, self-defense and fitness, and in short, a way of life.

Among the honorable guests invited to take part in the celebration were HE Gen Pichitr Kullavanijaya, the privy councilor to HM The King; Gen Wimon Wongwanich, the former president of the WMC; Gen Chatta Thanajaro, the current president of the WMC; guests from ministries, international embassies and consulates, organizations as well as national and international

The event included the delivery of the Royal Standard and a Royal Letter from HM The King by military cadets from the Chulachomklao Royal Military Academy, reception of the Royal

Letter by Gen Chatta and his performance of the Loyalty Oath on behalf of the WMC as well as speeches delivered by the permanent secretary of the Ministry of Tourism and Sports, a representative of the Ministry of Culture and by the WMC Vice President Stephan Fox.

The cultural part of the program included performances of Muay Thai Wai Khru by juniors from Laan Khru Suea House, Muay Thai Dance and the We are Muaythai anthem.

The Royal Patronage marks an important milestone in the development of Muay Thai under the guidance of WMC. Just 19 years ago, when WMC was inaugurated, Muay Thai had no international recognition, the sport received coverage only on Thai television channels and only three national federations had been recognized by the National Olympic Committee.

Today, 78 national federations have been observed and Muay Thai is recognized by the Olympic Committee of Asia, SportAccord, The Association For International Sport for All (TAFISA) and the International World Games Association, and receives TV coverage from major broadcasters such as Eurosport, ESPN and FOX Sports. Muay Thai is also the only martial art

ever to be nominated for the International Emmy Awards.

From a local sport it has become a worldwide phenomenon featured in major multi-sport competitions such as Arafura Games, TAFISA Games, SEA Games, Asian Indoor and Asian Beach Games.

Muay Thai is part of the World Combat Games and was recently included in the World Games, which are both under patronage of the International Olympic Committee.

Muay Thai has won the "Spirit of Sport Award" in 2014 bestowed by SportAccord (the umbrella organization for 104 world-recognized sports) for using sport as a means to reach out and develop local communities through the "Sport is Your Gang" sport-awareness campaign.

Morton picked up the last two wickets in successive balls (meaning that he is on a hat-trick when next he bowls in the competition) ending the VCT innings in 11.2 overs for a score of 42.

BBB, changing their batting line up in order to provide much needed batting practice for their other batsmen, sent in Mushtaq and Swart to open the innings in a left-hand, righthand combination. With very few runs to defend, VCT had no choice but to attack and hope for a BBB batting collapse. VCT's Mydeen was first to face Mushtaq, BBB's harvester of half-centuries, but on a day when nothing seemed to be going VCT's way, his first ball was expertly driven to the boundary. By the end of the second over, BBB had figures of 0 for 12, and were looking comfortable. Swart continued his good form with the bat and hit four 4s in an unbeaten innings of 22 off 15 balls, while Mushtaq mathematically unable to reach his sixth consecutive 50—had to settle for 20 off 17 balls.

BBB, having won the Outrigger T20 league, now look forward to completing their campaign with a full complement of eight wins from eight before competing in the upcoming finals scheduled for September.

Suarez adds bite to Barca

BARCELONA have added Luis Suarez to their star-studded forward line but it could be their defensive reinforcements that make the difference as they look to win back the La Liga title.

The club's first trophyless season in six years has sparked an overhaul with new coach Luis Enrique bringing in fresh faces for many positions ahead of the La Liga campaign that kicks off on Saturday.

All eyes will be on Suarez, signed from Liverpool for a fee reported to be 81 million euros (65 million pounds), when he finally makes his competitive bow for Barca at the end of October, after he was handed a four-month ban for biting at the World Cup.

The prospect of him lining up with Neymar and Lionel Messi in attack is mouthwatering, yet the club's title hopes are likely to depend on them shoring up a rearguard that looked vulnerable at key times last season.

The backline has been neglected in recent years with close-season recruits Jeremy Mathieu and Thomas Vermaelen the first centre backs to be signed since Dmytro Chygrynskiy in 2009.

paper over the cracks by converting midfielders into center backs, with the idea being that they would be comfortable in possession and bring the ball out of defence.

The combative Argentine Javier Mascherano has done relatively well in this role, despite his lack of height, but Sergio Busquets and Alex Song have also been tried out in the position with little success.

Barca have now added strength and depth to their defence but there are still question marks over the signings of Mathieu and Vermaelen ahead of the Catalans' curtainraiser against Elche on Sunday.

The club paid 20 million euros for the 30-year old Mathieu while Vermaelen arrives at the Nou Camp with a poor injury record, having fallen down the pecking order at former club Arsenal.

Goalkeepers Claudio Bravo and Marc-Andre ter Stegen, signed to replace Victor Valdes, would appear to be sound investments.

Barca basics

Barca struggled to adapt last season to the new tactical ideas introduced by coach Gerardo Martino, who resigned after one campaign in charge.

They have gone back to basics with Luis The club had previously attempted to Enrique whose teams play the club's typi-

cal short passing football.

"We will play the attacking style that has caught the imagination of millions of people around the world but we also need to defend," Luis Enrique told a news conference in Barcelona.

"We have an incredibly talented squad. My work and that of my staff is to find a system that fits. We will look at all possibilities and consider the qualities of the players.

"Basically, the three forwards will play centrally but at times they will vary this and a lot will depend on the approach of the opponent. We will do different things.

"The team is prepared physically but as regards the football I would have liked two months more as we have a new coach,

seven or eight new signings and youth players coming in."

Luis Enrique coached the Barca B (youth) team for three seasons until 2011 and is keen to give the young players a chance.

Eighteen-year-old forward Munir El Haddadi has shone during pre-season and is pushing for a chance in attack.

"It will depend on his performances if he is in the first team. I think he has done well and it is clear he has a lot of quality," said Luis Enrique.

"It is the same with the other youth players. I am always saying it is great to have young players like we have that have plenty of drive and ambition."
