Illegal toothfish vessel caught selling cargo at Phuket port

A JOINT task force this week seized one of six known illegal, unreported, unregulated (IUU) vessels caught fishing for toothfish in the Southern Ocean, after it falsely reported and offloaded its cargo.

The ship, which recently had its name changed from Kunlun to Taishan, had already fled from the navies of New Zealand and Australia, as well as global conservation organization Sea Shepherd, before passing through Indonesian waters and mooring near

Since 2008, the boat has changed its name at least 10 times, according to a Sea Shepherd Conservation Society report.

In January, Interpol issued a Purple Notice against Taishan for illegally fishing for toothfish inside an area regulated by the Convention for the Conservation of Antarctic Marine Living Resources (CCAMLR).

"The only successful outcome of this rest would be the seizure of the vessel "Capt Siddharth Chakravarty of the Sea Shepherd ship Sam Simon told the Gazette.

German expat robbed over iPhone sex swap

TWO women have been charged for robbing a German expat after he allegedly reneged on a deal to buy one of them an iPhone and clothes in exchange for sex.

Rattriya Sirijumpa, 25, and Nongluck Homhuan, 26, were arrested at Tina Salon in Thalang on March 14, after police spotted the German's stolen car in front of Ms Rattriya's salon.

The arrests followed Wolfgang Gerhard Helmut Dehl-Buntha, 62, filing two complaints of theft.

"On January 23, he reported that several items had been stolen from his house in Soi Patak in Karon," Lt Col Ason Jiraksa of the Karon Police said.

"On February 2, he woke to find his car was gone. He then reported that stolen, too."

Mr Dehl-Buntha told police that on January 23 he went to the airport, where he met Ms Nongluck.

"They went to his house in Karon. Ms Rattriya joined them, but followed them in her own car," explained Col Ason.

All three drank beer at the house for about an hour, before Ms Rattriya left. Ms Nongluck stayed overnight.

Mr Dehl-Buntha woke up and realized Ms Nongluck was gone,

along with many of his valuables.

Police checked footage from CCTV cameras in the area and saw that Ms Rattriya's Toyota Altis was nearby on both days that Mr Del-Buntha was robbed.

"Officers tracked down where the two suspects lived and worked," Col Ason said. "At about 6pm on [March 14], officers spotted a black Toyota Camry with a red licence plate parked in front Ms Rattriya's salon.

"Ms Rattriva claimed that the car was hers, but police checked the engine number, which matched the number of Mr Del-Buntha's

The women were taken to Karon Police Station to be guestioned. The pair told police that Ms Nongluck knew Mr Dehl-Buntha from chatting online through the social-media application Badoo.

"Mr Dehl-Buntha promised to buy Ms Nongluck an iPhone and clothes if she agreed to be his girlfriend. The morning after they had slept together, she asked him to keep his promise," said Col Ason.

"Apparently, he ignored her after some grumbling. So, she called Ms Rattriya and decided to teach Mr Dehl-Buntha a lesson."

Ms Rattriya and Ms Nongluck were both charged with theft.

Phuket sailors warned of falling space-launch debris

THE Royal Thai Navy has issued a warning for ships to steer clear of an Indian Polar Satellite Launch Vehicle (PSLV) debris-fall zone in the Andaman Sea between March 9 and April 8.

The area marked in the warning, about 400km northwest of Phuket, is within the following coordinates:

9°15'00"N 94°45'00"E 10°05'00"N 95°05'00"E 9°45'00"N 96°00'00"E 8°55'00"N 95°40'00"E

"All ships, please be careful and avoid this area," the statement

Masseuse suicide sparks manhunt

POLICE are looking for a man wanted for beating his masseuse girlfriend who was found dead by apparent suicide in Phuket Town on March 15.

Friends discovered the body of Taweepat Boontawee, 33, at her apartment at a four-story complex on Phun Pol Road Soi 7. She was found hanged by a bathrobe sash tied to a light fitting.

"She left several messages of distress written with lipstick on her make-up mirror," said Capt Jariyawat Taencheun of the Phuket City Police.

Ms Taweepat, who worked at the nearby Angel Massage, was last seen before dawn on March 13.

"She filed a complaint with Phuket City Police at about 3am,"

Capt Jariyawat confirmed. "She said that her ex-boyfriend [named by police only as "Mr Bung"] came to see her on [March 12].

"Ms Taweepat said they had argued and that he began hitting her. Then he dragged her from her room to the parking lot, where he continued to beat her. Then he left with her cash, mobile phone and credit cards."

After Ms Taweepat filed the complaint, her friends urged her to stay elsewhere as they were afraid Mr Bung would return.

"She declined their offers and asked to stay alone at her place," Capt Jariyawat told the Gazette.

Police have identified Mr Bung through CCTV footage from cameras in the area, he added.

'We are not ready to reveal the man's name, but we hope to arrest him soon," Capt Jariyawat said.

Ms Taweepat's body was taken to Vachira Phuket Hospital for confirmation of the cause of death and to await collection by relatives. - Kritsada Mueanhawong

Experienced diver's death baffles park officials

OFFICIALS have yet to learn what circumstances led to the death of an experienced diver who fell unconscious during a mass-diving volunteer project at the Similan Islands.

Suthat Suktuk, a 45-year-old businessman from Songkhla province, went into shock while diving beyond recreational depths to 47 meters at a site south of Koh Miang, also called Koh See (Island Four), on March 14.

"We have been informed that Mr Suthat died from the effects brought on by decompression sickness," Nut Kongkasorn, chief of Mu Ko Similan National Park, said on Monday.

"It was a very deep dive and he stayed too long. There was too much nitrogen in his body, which caused him to go into shock."

However, Mr Nut has yet to learn why Mr Suthat stayed too long at that depth, and why his dive buddy Suwat Jutapruet did not suffer the same fate.

The park chief added that he hoped to learn what caused the tragedy.

"According to Mr Suwat, Mr Suthat had logged more than 700 dives," Mr Nut said. "Also, Mr Suthat's tank was more than half full, so we are investigating further in the hope of learning what caused his death."

Mr Suthat's body was transported from Phuket to Haad Yai on March 15.

Tuk-tuk drivers charged over huge blockade

THIRTEEN tuk-tuk drivers who were charged for their involvement in a massive blockade of Patong in March last year were fined and sentenced to one year's probation on March 12.

The drivers were part of a group of 68 drivers who were arrested and charged for blockading major roads in the party town in protest of the arrests of four tuk-tuk drivers for preventing green-plate taxi drivers from using public parking spots the day before.

"The drivers were handed the sentence [on March 12]. They were fined 3,000 baht each and put on probation for one year," Chief Judge Sakun Suanpharn of the Phuket Provincial Court told the *Gazette*.

According to the court's public documents, the 13 drivers were first sentenced to one year in prison and a fine of 6,000 baht each. However, since they confessed to their crimes and accepted the charges following their arrests, their sentences were halved to six months in prison and a fine of 3,000 baht. Because the drivers had no previous criminal records and were not considered a flight risk, the six month sentence was suspended to one year of probation, in addition to the 3,000-baht fine.

Hunt on for foreign thief

POLICE are trying to track down a foreign thief, believed to be a British expat, who is wanted for robbing a Swedish man's home of about 200,000 baht in valuables.

Known so far only by his alias "Charlie Machin", the suspect is known to frequent bars in Bang Tao and Rawai.


"At this stage, all we know of his identity is that he goes by the name Charlie Machin. He's about 35 years old, and we believe that he is of British nationality," said Lt Chamaiporn Supakom of the Karon Police.

Police were alerted to Mr Machin's antics when Swedish national Alexander Djerf, 26, filed a complaint that his house had been robbed on March 4.

Mr Djerf, who has been living and working in Phuket since 2010, told police that he left his house in Kata at about 11:30am that day.

"He returned at about 3pm to find the steel security bars over a window damaged and that his house had been robbed," said Lt Chamaiporn.

Among the items reported as

stolen were a Longines watch, gold ring, laptop computer, camera, diving bag, keys and a portable phone charger.

Video footage from CCTV at the house captured images of Mr Machin breaking in, and exiting about 20 minutes later, while hauling a black backpack bulging with booty. He fled the scene on a motorcycle parked outside.

Police traced Mr Machin's getaway vehicle to a motorcycle rental shop, where the staff gave Mr Machin's address as a rented room in Mai Khao.

Officers soon arrived at the abode, only to find a woman who admitted to being Mr Machin's girlfriend, but denied any knowledge of the robbery or her boyfriend's whereabouts.

Police searched the home and found several stolen items.

"We found a lot of stuff hidden in the room which we believe Mr Machin had stolen from many people," Lt Chamaiporn said.

"We found Mr Djerf's portable charger, but we believe the rest of the items stolen from him had been sold."

Officers did not take Mr Machin's girlfriend into custody.

"She co-operated with us during questioning, and we believe that she had nothing to do with the robbery," Lt Chamaiporn said.

The landlord for the room explained that Mr Machin said that he was from England and that he had been to Thalang Hospital for an x-ray and a prescription.

"We learned his name from hospital records, but staff there confirmed that they did not ask for his passport," said Lt Chamaiporn.

"We checked with immigration, but they also have no record of a Charlie Machin in Phuket."

The search continues.

"We are now searching bars in Bang Tao and Rawai to track him down, and hopefully to learn his real name," Lt Chamaiporn said.

Water-meter thief nabbed

POLICE arrested a man on March 10 after finding him in possession of 18 water meters stolen from homes in Cherng Talay.

Youngyut Matchawet, 25, was arrested at his house in Cherng Talay after police tracked him down through CCTV footage.

"We began receiving complaints from local residents on [March 7] about their water meters disappearing," said Lt Col Saad Wongwiangjan of the Cherng Talay Police.

"After reviewing CCTV footage of the thief, we were able to pinpoint the area where he lived."

Police raided Mr Youngyut's house, where they found the meters, some of which had already been taken apart so that the brass parts inside could be resold.

"Mr Youngyut confessed to stealing the water meters because he had no job and no money," said Col Saad.

Foot-washing tourist fined

A CHINESE woman was fined for washing her feet in a public sink on Phi Phi Don on March 13, following a recent change in policy on the tourist-popular island.

Within half an hour of officers posting a "no foot washing" warning sign at the public restroom, the tourist, who police declined to name, started washing her feet in the sink.

"She didn't pay any attention to the sign directly in front of her," said Koh Phi Phi-Nopparat Thara National Park Chief Chaithat Boonphupantanti. "Our officers took photos of her breaking the law before informing her that she was committing a crime."

The woman was given a 1,000-baht fine and her tour guide was informed of the incident.

Mr Chaithat explained that an area for tourists to wash their feet used to be in front of the toilets, but it had been moved behind the building in January because it was making the bathroom slippery and dirty.

"The sign is in English with clear pictures of what is prohib-


ited. We will be looking to include Chinese-language warnings as well," Mr Chaithat said. "We were not rude or aggressive when we were dealing with the tourist. We

are just trying to establish rules that will keep the place clean and beautiful."

differences to be overcome, but that it is essential for tour guides to inform their guests of the rules and encourage them to help keep Thailand beautiful.

Kratom delivery to Phuket intercepted

A SHIPMENT of 45 kilograms of *kratom* leaves from Nonthaburi to Phuket was intercepted by Phuket Tourist Police on March 13.

"We were tipped off that a truck with the Bangkok licence plate 61-6211 would be delivering the leaves today," said Tourist Police Division 5 Superintendent Chusawat Janrojanakit.

When police spotted the truck, they pulled it over and checked the documents of the driver, Akkapon Konluk, 46, and the passenger, Supharerk Kaewnam, 38. While searching the truck's contents, police found 10 bags of *kratom* hidden among furniture items being delivered to Phuket.

"Yesterday afternoon, an unknown man called me, asking me

to deliver the bags of *kratom* to Phuket. I accepted the job because I wanted the money," Mr Akkapon said after his arrest.

Both men were charged with possession of a Category 5 drug with intent to sell. Mr Supharerk denied knowledge of the illegal cargo. – *Kritsada Mueanhawong*

Illegal wedding photographer arrested on Bang Tao Beach

A WEDDING photographer was arrested for working illegally on Bang Tao Beach on March 11.

Chinese national Ma Chuan, 26, was arrested while taking a series of wedding photos, explained Lt Col Tienchai Chompoo of the Phuket Immigration Office.

"Illegal Chinese photographers are not a new thing. We regularly receive reports of Chinese tourists entering Phuket to take pre-wedding photos at many of the island's attractions, such as the beaches, temples and buildings in Phuket Old Town," Col Tienchai said.

"We are gradually arresting

Suspect land investigated

THE Deputy Permanent Secretary of Justice inspected four of 20 land plots on March 13 believed to have been obtained through illegal land-title deeds or illegally developed.

The plots examined are on Koh Raet, along Surin Beach and in Kamala, said Dussadee Arayawuth, Deputy Permanent Secretary of Justice for the Ministry of Justice.

Col Dussadee was the head investigator for the Public-sector Anti-Corruption Commission (PACC) probe into alleged illegal lands in Phuket and was transferred to the Ministry of Justice on October 1, 2012.

"We are conducting the investigation following complaints from locals and NGOs made directly to the Ministry of Justice," Col Dussadee said. "The complaints allege that Phuket officials illegally issued business owners Chanote titles and signed off on unlawful building permits."

The first plot of land was on Koh Raet, off of Ao Por Pier.

"The owner of the land was no plantations."

issued a Chanote title by using a *NorSor 3 Kor* as a reference. That document reported that the land was being used as a plantation, allowing it to be released and owned with a *Chanote*," Col Dussadee explained. "However, our inspection of the 161-rai island made it clear that there are

Officers circled the island in a speedboat, noting the dense jungle.

'We can see trees in the area that are more than 50 years old. Given this, a Chanote title cannot be legally issued," Col Dussadee said. "We are sure that the information provided by local officials was falsified."

The team later visited the La

Colline estate, which was allegedly being constructed without having passed its Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA). Additionally, it was being built in an area about 120 meters above sea level – no buildings are allowed to be constructed more than 80m above sea level in Phuket, Col Dussadee said.

The third area examined was an

under-construction building along the road near Surin Beach.

"The building is being built in Zone 1, 20 meters from the sea," Col Dussadde said. "Nothing is supposed to be built in Zone 1. Despite this, Cherng Talay Tambon Administration Organization (OrBorTor) officers issued a building permit."

The final location visited by the investigation committee was the Kamala Beach Hotel and Resort, which allegedly sits on public land.

"We are sure that the Chanote for the land was illegally issued, as it is within a public park," Col Dussadee said.

No property owners or representatives were asked to present evidence to the investigation team and no charges were filed, Col Dussadee confirmed.

"The officials involved in the false reporting of information and the unlawful issuance of Chanote titles will be charged for abusing their power. The owners of the properties will face charges for accepting and using unlawful Chanote titles and building permits," he said.

Vendors crash land inspection

A GROUP of about 30 beach vendors interjected themselves into an inspection of Kamala Beach on March 13 to submit a complaint letter to the Deputy Permanent Secretary of Justice, who was visiting Phuket for a property development investigation.

Deputy Permanent Secretary of istice Dussadee Aravawuth came to the island to inspect four of 20 land plots believed to have been obtained through illegal landtitle deeds or illegally developed.

However, the vendors were waiting for him when he arrived with his team at Kamala Beach.

"We all want sunloungers back, for the sake of the vendors and the tourists. The governor hasn't been listening to the vendors and doesn't understand the tourists like we do," said Manas Yenjit, a vendor from Karon, who spoke on behalf of the group.

"Tourists need sunloungers,

especially the elderly."

Mr Manas also expressed his confusion over the decisions made by Governor Nisit Jansomwong about the beach policy.

"First, the governor ordered the rented sunloungers off the beach. Now, tourists cannot even bring their own chairs. I cannot understand this," he said.

"This is a huge mistake. It makes Phuket look like it does not welcome tourists anymore."

Col Dussadee accepted the letter and told the vendors that he would speak with the governor himself.

"The governor has his reasons for these rules. This is not about the locals, tourists or the governor, this is about law, policy and order," Col Dussadee said.

"I will take everything into consideration and speak with the governor."

Fire blazes overloaded landfill site

TWO rai of the overflowing 120-rai Sapan Hin landfill were destroyed in a fire on Tuesday evening.

Five firetrucks immediately responded to the fire and were able to contain and douse the flames within two hours, said the Phuket City Municipality Environmental Division chief Prachum Suriya.

"We are unsure of the cause of the fire. It might have been caused by the hot and dry weather," said Mr Prachum.

"There was no property damage, as we were well prepared and had firetrucks already on standby for such emergencies."

An official fire warning was passed down from Bangkok to the Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation (DDPM) Phuket office last month.

Officers met after the incident, with the Phuket Environmental Office confirming that locals should not be worried about health risks following the fire.

Vessel netted at Interpol's request

...by blowing up multiple illegal Vietnamese vessels and Malaysia has arrested and fined vessels in the past.

"The captain of the *Kunlun* definitely miscalculated the extent of the refuge he would be granted in Phuket," Capt Chakravarty said.

The vessel was seized following a jointly-coordinated operation between Phuket authorities, Interpol and law-enforcement authorities in Australia and New Zealand.

"Australian authorities contacted the Customs Department asking that the contents from the *Taishan* be examined due to allegations of illegal fishing," a high-ranking officer from the Royal Thai Navy Third Area Command, who asked not to be named, told the *Gazette*.

"The *Taishan* was delivering seafood products. It arrived at the Phuket Deep Sea Port at the beginning of March. The vessel passed through customs with no issues, as they presented all the legally required documents."

However, after the notification, authorities recalled the shipment from Songkhla and discovered that the ship had falsely reported which kinds of fish product were being delivered.

"Toothfish are the sharks of the deep. If the world knew more about a fleet of six vessels poaching vulnerable shark populations in a managed fishery zone, there would have been public outrage and the vessels would have been apprehended instantly," Capt Chakravarty said.

"But typical of humankind's approach to the oceans, 'What cannot be seen, cannot be a problem', these vessels have been allowed to operate for a decade in complete violation of the conservation mea-

sures in the Southern Ocean.

"While the market for this fish is high-end restaurants in Europe and the United States, the gateways to those markets lie in Southeast Asia. Consumed as a delicacy in these markets, the operators earn millions of dollars from the catch of one vessel alone, and those sums of money, along with the blind eye that has been turned toward them, means they have continued to exist for the past decade."

The vessel owner, Stanley Management Inc, was contacted, as was the local handler South Services Co Ltd, to determine their role, if any, in the deceit at customs, said the investigating officer at the Phuket Customs Office, who declined to be named.

"The alleged illegal fishing took place outside of Thailand's waters.

It is beyond our authority to investigate those maters," the officer said. "It is under International Law, so we expect international support in dealing with this case.

"Representatives from Interpol have yet to arrive, so at the moment we are simply detaining the vessel and investigating the false reporting in regards to the fish product."

All 36 people on board the vessel – the Peruvian captain, four Spaniards and 31 Indonesians – have yet to face any charges, but remain under watch onboard the ship.

One Spaniard was removed from the ship before it was seized due to self-inflicted wounds over alleged family issues. According to a Sea Shepherd report, the *Taishan* is believed to have links to the Spanish organization Vidal Armadores, which has all but been convicted for countless allegations

of operating fleets of illegal fishing vessels.

The *Taishan* is one of three IUU vessels intercepted by Sea Shepherd in January.

The *Sam Simon* intercepted the *Taishan*, then named the *Kunlun*, along with the *Yongding* inside the exclusive economic zone (EEZ) of Australia and well within the controlled waters of the CCAMLR in January.

"The vessels were not engaged in fishing when spotted, but were in transit to the fishing grounds after a spell of bad weather," Capt Chakravarty said.

"However, the photos and the visual sightings confirmed the vessel's identity, the presence of banned gill-nets on board and the immediate attempt of the vessel to flee from the fishing grounds without responding to any radio calls by me."

Sea Shepherd ship *Bob Barker* has been in pursuit of another poaching vessel, *Thunder*, since December 13, making the pursuit the longest sea chase of a poacher in history.

"By shining the spotlight on these operators and by intercepting their operations, an international web of enforcement is quickly being cast on these vessels. To now see one of the vessels being apprehended is the reward we have been waiting for," Capt Chakravarty said.

"This is the first instance where governments, non-governmental organizations and Interpol, along with local authorities, are acting in concert to end IUU operations on the high-seas.

"This heralds in a new dawn for the enforcement and the prosecution of fishing crimes and a successful seizure of the *Kunlun* would help Thailand set a benchmark in international investigations into IUU fishing operations."



Bryde's whale spotted alive, whale shark turns up dead

A BRYDE'S whale and a whale shark have both been found near Phuket this month – one alive and well, and the other dead.

The first was the Bryde's whale, seen near Koh Haa off the coast of Krabi on March 9, which excited and alarmed divers and officials.

Both groups have cited an improving marine environment as a possible reason for the sighting, but have also warned against any actions that could hamper the Andaman Sea's recovery.

"It is strange that they saw it in the Andaman Sea, as these whales mainly live in the Gulf of Thailand. The whale could have simply lost its pod, but this could also mean that the Andaman marine environment is indeed improving," said Tathpon Krajangdara, head of the Natural Resource Observing and Analyzing Team in the Andaman Sea Fisheries Research and Development Center Phuket office.

of the Koh Lanta Tourism Association, was not as excited about the spotting, as the area where the whale was seen is in the possible path through which coal will be transferred to the coal-fired power plant slated for Krabi province.

Then, on Wednesday, a 500-kilogram whale shark was found dead near Koh Pu, off Krabi.

On examining the fish's body, a veterinary team found cuts on its head, as well as clots of blood.

"The cuts on the head were likely from a fishing net. We believe the shark died about 24 hours before it was discovered," said Dr Rachawadee Jantra.

Beach lifeguard contract renewal hangs in balance

PHUKET'S beaches again may be without lifeguards starting next week, as the government contract for the Phuket Lifeguard Club (PLC) to provide its life-saving services expires on March 26.

The Phuket Provincial Administrative Organization (PPAO) has offered the annual 22-million-baht concession for private operators to provide lifeguard services through the coming year to public bidding twice – as required by law.

No one placed any bids under the terms offered, confirmed the PPAO officer in charge of the contract, who asked not to be named.

"After failing to receive any bids twice, we called it off," he said.

"We have now handed the file to Governor Nisit Jansomwong to review and approve the hiring lifeguards through a special process, which is standard practice under these circumstances."

PLC President Prathaiyut its," he explained.

Chuayuan said on Tuesday that the key issue was the 2.2mn baht required to be held in deposits in order to bid for the contract.

"We did not apply for the contract as we cannot commit millions of baht just to be held in deposits," he explained.

Mr Prathaiyut assured that he would like the PLC to continue providing lifeguards.

"But the conditions of the contract have to be taken into consideration, too," he said.

The PPAO officer explained that under the contract offered, 1.1mn

baht was to held as a "deposit to enter the bid" and a further 1.1mn baht was to be held as a deposit to guarantee the contract terms are fulfilled.

"Both amounts are refunded to the bidder on successful completion of the contract," he said.

However, the contract offered this year provided no financial scope for the PLC to maintain or improve on the level of service provided over the past year.

This year's offer of 22mn baht is the same amount offered last year, which already took a hit with 20 per cent of lifeguards being laid off because of lack of funding.

"There are 86 lifeguards based at 38 stations at Phuket beaches," Mr Prathaiyut confirmed.

At the end of contract last year, there were 104.

"It is hard work, but we do our best to save people's lives. We work hard for little pay. I respect all the lifeguards for doing their job," Mr Prathaiyut added.

Illegal aliens caught during karaoke raids

ANTI-human trafficking raids of nightlife venues on March 12 netted two employers for hiring illegal workers from Myanmar.

Saengthian Luepanya, 24, owner of Happy Sea Man karaoke, was arrested for employing Myanmar nationals Lwin Thuza Myint, 26, and Thi Dar, 42, said Phuket City Police Deputy Superintendent Khunnadet Nanongkhai.

Later that night, police found two Myanmar nationals working at Thitaporn karaoke. The bar owner, Kritsana Musija, was arrested along with the workers: Myint Than, 26, and Ohn Mar Win, 27.

"The four Myanmar nationals will be charged for working illegally," Col Khunnadet said. "Ms Saengthian and Ms Kritsana will be charged for hiring employees without a work permit."

Krabi's got crabs

KRABI officials are moving to create a new eco-tourism destination out of a tidal plane that millions of tiny orange-clawed crabs call home.

Locals were amazed to see a horde of crabs suddenly appear and migrate across the sands of Ao Tang Len at low tide, prompting them to notify district officials.

"The stretch of sand at low tide is about a kilometer long and 30 meters wide. We saw millions of crabs in that stretch. They are tiny, about one centimeter long, with gray bodies and orange claws," said Ao Leuk District Chief Boonpas Raknuy, following his inspection of the site on March 12. "As we started to walk on the sand, the crabs sped away to hide in their holes. It was an amazing thing to see."

Mr Boonpas has requested that the local people help to protect and

German, French tourists take jet-ski accident case to court

A GERMAN tourist who was hit by a Frenchman riding a jet-ski in Phuket last month is now in court with the Frenchman settling the matter.

Erich Heim, 55, was knocked unconscious by Chadd Attard, 20, while swimming at Paradise Beach on February 28. Mr Heim was taken to hospital that day, and discharged on March 5.

The two tourists have since been unable to negotiate a settlement, Lt Col Anukul Nuket of the Patong Police told the *Gazette* on March 10.

"On Monday, Mr Heim and Mr Attard came to Patong Police Station to negotiate the case. Mr Heim asked for about 700,000 baht, but Mr Attard said that he could only pay 200,000," Col Anukul said.

"They could not reach an agreement at the station, so the case was transferred to Phuket Provincial Court."

Col Anukul said the case is now in the hands of the court, and any decision made henceforth will be at the discretion of the judge.

Underboob selfie ban brings threat of prison time

THE government issued a warning to women on Monday over posting "selfie" photos of the lower half of their breasts - a social media trend that has gone viral - saying their actions could violate the country's computer crime

Thailand's 2007 Computer Crimes Act bans any material that causes "damage to the country's security or causes public panic" or "any obscene computer data which is accessible to the public".

The Culture Ministry said that "underboob selfie" offenders faced up to five years in jail, but did not say how they would identify the culprits, The Nation reported.

"When people take these 'underboob selfies' no one can see their faces," ministry spokesman Anandha Chouchoti told Reuters. "So it's like, we don't know who these belong to, and it encourages others to do the same. We can only warn people to not take it up. They are inappropriate actions.'

The ministry has long been criticized for being overzealous in its censorship of films, music, television and some Western cultural practices in an attempt to preserve traditional values of Thailand, which is also world famous for its raunchy nightlife.

Smog in North worsens

THE amount of tiny dust particles in the upper North rose beyond safety levels again on Monday and poor visibility reportedly prevented at least four flights from landing at Chiang Mai Airport.

An informed source told The Nation that from 11am to 1pm, haze reduced visibility at Chiang Mai Airport to only 800 meters, which forced pilots to make a decision on whether or not it was safe to land. At least four decided not to: Thai Airways Flight 102 from Bangkok had to u-turn to Suvarnabhumi Airport; SL 8504 (Lion Air) flew back to Don Mueang; while PG 241 (Bangkok Airways) from Samui and FD3161 (Air Asia) from Phuket landed at Mae Fah Luang Airport in Chiang Rai, which reportedly had its lights turned on to improve visibility.

Other flights at the Chiang Mai Airport continued as usual.

Meanwhile, a 60-year-old Mae Hong Son man was the first person arrested this season for violating the outdoor-burning ban, which is a key measure to alleviate the smog problem.

Police used satellite data to detect hot spots, which led to the arrest of Dang Maneejan as he burned weeds on his property during the ban period, explained

"Police are now taking violations of the burning ban seriously, so we ask people to avoid burning anything during the province's 60day ban. Police can detect a fire from satellite surveillance," Maj Gen Jaruek warned.

The ban is March 1 to April 29. Readings of small particulate matter up to 10 microns in diameter (PM10) were very high at Mae Hong Son and Chiang Rai at 311 micrograms per cubic meter.

Readings at other towns in the North were: Phayao 271mcg, Chiang Mai 279mcg, Lampang 189mcg, Lamphun 189mcg, Phrae 152mcg, Nan 141mcg and Tak 130mcg. The maximum level that is considered safe is 120mcg.

Local government bodies were trying to combat the haze with various measures. Chiang Mai sent fire trucks to sprinkle water into the air, while Mae Hong Son requested an artificial rain-making operation to reduce the dust.

In Phitsanulok's Chat Trakan district, a wild fire ravaged around 500 rai of forest. The blaze started on Sunday evening, but wasn't brought under control until Monday. The smoke affected 100 families living within a two-kilometer radius.

The haze problem has hit local people's health and daily lives, with thousands seeking medical treatment for respiratory problems. Isara Sathapanaset, director the Tourism Authority of Thailand Chiang Rai office, however, insisted that tourism was not affected, as it is the low season.

After a private joint committee met on Monday to discuss the impact the 10-day haze is having on Chiang Mai's tourism sector and economy, Chiang Mai Chamber of Commerce chairperson Wipawan Woraputipong said that a survey showed that hotel bookings had not yet been affected.

However, visitors from other regions of Thailand have either dropped or postponed their visit to the province, she said.

Arrest warrants to be issued for two court grenade suspects

ARREST warrants will be issued for two fugitives for their alleged involvement in the hand grenade attack at the Criminal Court on March 7, a police source told The Nation on

The two men have been identified only as "Wit" and "Wasu".

It is alleged that they paid 50,000 baht for two men to carry out the attack, in which no one was injured, plus another 50,000 baht after the attack.

Of the 14 suspects, 10 are already in custody. Another two - Manoon Chaichana, also known by the alias "Anek San Francisco" and Wirasak Towangjorn, also known as "Yai Pattaya" – are on the run abroad, while officials believe Wit and Wasu are still in Thailand.

The military court in Bangkok on Monday

returned four suspects to military custody after earlier handing them over to the police. The suspects are Charnwit Jariyanukool, Sansern Sri-unruen, Wichai Yoosuk and Norraphat Luephol.

Speaking to the press before being brought to the military court, Mr Charnwit denied the charges against him, but admitted to being the MC at a meeting in Khon Kaen – although he claimed the attack was not discussed.

Mr Charnwit said that he had cooperated with military interrogators. He said that he did not know Mr Manoon or another suspect Suphaphorn Mit-arak.

Police said that they found Ms Suphaphorn's Line chats with Mahahin Khunthong, the motorcycle rider in the attack, in which they allegedly talked about the attack.

Thai national, two others arrested in murder-for-hire case in United States

The woman, Chansamorn Pokai, and her friend Stephen Brockway are charged with hiring Ronald Rosser to murder her husband, 66-year-old Richard Moore, two weeks ago.

The US media quoted police as saying that the couple had an unhealthy relationship, and officers had been to their home as recently as January to hear complaints that each had been unfaithful, reported The Nation.

"This was not a healthy relationship," explained Assistant McKinney Police Chief Randy

ATHAI woman and two Americans Roland. "They'd had a lot of onare in police custody for the death going and off-going strife."

reported finding her husband alone in their home, located in the 8700 block of La Quinta Lane, with multiple gunshot wounds.

Detectives were later able to piece together that the woman and Mr Brockway hired Mr Rosser to kill Mr Moore and that the motive was money.

Police also believe that the marital problems led to the murder.

"Part of our ongoing investigation to find out: was it a romantic relationship, how involved were they, when did that friendship start," said Chief Roland.

McKinney Police with the help of East Texas police departments of a man found in his Texas home. Police said Ms Chansamorn and Texas Rangers arrested Ronald Rosser on Tuesday.

McKinney Police Department and Texas Rangers then arrested Mrs Chansamorn and Mr Brockway.

Mr Rosser is currently being held at the Gregg County Sheriff's Office on unrelated federal firearm charges in addition to the capital murder charge.

Ms Chansamorn and Mr Brockway are being held in the Colin County Jail.

All three suspects are charged with capital murder, and each is held on a US\$1 million bond.

Need for more speed in court proceedings

FIRST PERSON

IT IS very hard work to be a judge in Phuket. Our court is overloaded, with the number of cases to be heard having risen to more than 13,000 over the past year. We have only 21 judges to take care of all of these cases.

Our court is already booked up with hearings through February of next year.

About 80 per cent of all Phuket court cases involve drug offenders, followed by incidents of theft and other types of criminal cases.

Civil cases in Phuket, however, are quite different from those in other provinces, as we have many cases involving land disputes. Land in Phuket is much more valuable and expensive than land in other provinces, and becoming a landowner in Phuket is complicated. This is why land dispute cases take a very long time to work out in court.

Litigants in these cases are will-

ing to take their cases to the Civil Court, the Appeals Court and even the Supreme Court it ends up being a long and drawnout process.

When I first took up this posi-

tion a year ago, there were nearly 500 cases that had been in the court process for a while already. This backlog is a result of defendants and plaintiffs not presenting their witnesses to the court, and the ever-increasing number of new cases that need to be heard piling up on top of the old ones.

I came into this job well aware that it was going to be difficult,

Here, he explains why it is important to stay on top of cases and close them in a timely manner, despite having only a small number of judges taking on thousands of cases.

as there were so many old cases to be closed and new ones to be taken on.

The first thing I told all of the judges and court staffers when I first started was that I was here to work. They can either love me or hate me – I will accept it. Be-

ing loved is better, but love is only an emotion, and it would be forgotten after my time here had passed.

I made it my goal to not hold on to cases for unnecessary lengths

of time. It is essential to close cases as quickly as possible so that we can handle the new ones. I have pushed my judges hard over the past year to do just that.

My policy was to push for defendants and plaintiffs to be responsible for bringing their own witnesses to testify in court. We do not have enough staffers available to do this for them, and I did not allow either party in a case to leave that task to our staff.

My rule was that if any party failed to bring a witness to court, the witness testimony would be dismissed. Either they ensure the witnesses come to court to be heard, or they lose the chance to use the witness. This makes the court process much faster. Judges are allowed to dismiss witness testimony, but if they must extend a case, they have to inform me and I will make the final decision.

I told my judges that we are like boxing referees. The match is set for five rounds. After five rounds, it is over. We are the ones who set the rules for the litigants; they do not control us and tell us what to do. Each case must be closed as efficiently and swiftly as possible.

As a result of this policy, we have cleared out a huge amount of ongoing cases. Only 10 per cent of them are left. This is an impressive feat, as we have managed to do this on top of handling incoming cases.

Waiting on a work permit

How long should it take for a work permit application to be processed? I am aware that the required non-immigrant B visa is valid for 90 days, but will a work permit application be processed before the permit-to-stay expires?

Do applications for some professions take longer than others?

And if I start work while waiting for my work permit to be issued, am I working illegally? What punitive measurements might I be liable to if working while waiting for my work permit to be issued?

As long as we receive the correct documentation with the application, the work permit will be issued within seven working days.

Employers can submit applications ahead of time to make sure

their foreign employees are issued work permits in time to start work according to their employment contract.

All applications take seven days to process, regardless of profession. When an application is filed, we issue an appointment ticket marked with a date to come to our office and pick up the completed work permit.

Foreigners cannot work before the work permit is issued. The penalty for working without a permit is up to five years in jail, a fine of between 2,000 and 100,000 baht, or both.

After serving any punishment handed down, the foreigner found guilty of working illegally will be deported.

Footiquette 101: Teach tourists

THE fining of a Chinese tourist for washing her feet in a sink in a public restroom on Phi Phi Don hardly comes as earth-shattering news.

It does, however, raise several cultural issues in a country which is so dependent on mass tourism, but at the same time famously sensitive to issues regarding the lowest of the lower extremities.

Why anyone would choose to contort themselves into a position to wash their feet in a raised sink clearly designed for hand use is anyone's guess.

It is certainly possible to conjure up emergency medical scenarios that might justify such an action, but such alarming situations would no doubt be few and far between: hardly frequent enough to spur park officers to erect a sign not only banning the practice, but threatening a 1,000 'bath' [sic] fine.

If true, the fact that it only took said officers an hour to rake in their first 1,000 baht also tends to indicate that the practice, whatever might be driving it, is more common than one would expect.

Lacking in-depth knowledge about Chinese customs, but aware that female "foot binding" was widespread in China for many centuries, the *Gazette* asked reliable sources in the Mainland Chinese expat community if we were missing some key piece of foot-related Chinese cultural information that needed to be understood in this puzzling phenomenon.

However, these sources assured the *Gazette* in strong terms that such behavior would be looked down upon as "very abnormal" in their country and suggested that the unnamed woman at the center of the controversy may simply have been "an eccentric".

Mainland China is perhaps the "final frontier" for Thailand's inbound market, one which will likely play a key role if there is any hope of filling all the hotel rooms that were built during the huge expansion of the tourism sector in recent decades.

Given this information, it is time to gear up and prepare for this huge potential market and ensure that they get the most vital information before arrival: such as the need to stay out of the surf when red flags are flying in the upcoming southwest monsoon season.

As for washing feet in public sinks on Phi Phi Don, the *Gazette* will of course continue to monitor the situation to see if this disturbing phenomenon becomes more widespread, though we fully expect that this will be the last we hear about it once news of the stiff fines – and the existence of purpose-built foot washing facilities out back – becomes known to Chinese tourists and those who guide them through this Land of Smiles.

Social media revenue boost

Your business either uses social media, or it's likely to suffer a premature death



NO MATTER where we go, we are surrounded by social media and its influences. Tweet this, like that, share and like this; terms we were not familiar with all that long ago are now in common, daily use.

So is this a passing fad or is this social media craze here to stay, and even more importantly, is this something we need to embrace and master? If we own a business, is social media even more important to know and understand?

Looking at some statistics gives us the best clues to answering those questions. Facebook had 100 million users in 2008 and now has over 1.6 billion users. Twitter has over 240mn users. Advertising spending rises 21.4% in Jan-Feb

ADVERTISING expenditures in NBT slid 7.9 per cent to 8.79bn the first two months of this year showed signs of a recovery, surging 21.4 per cent to 19.94 billion baht from 16.42bn baht a year earlier, according to Nielsen (Thailand).

Digital terrestrial television was still on the rise. Just 10 months after its launch, ad spending on the new medium reached 5.36bn baht – 26.9 per cent of the total for the industry.

Nielsen (Thailand) categorized 21 of the 24 digital terrestrial television channels as "digital television" and excluded Channel 3HD, Channel 7HD and MCOT HD (Modernine television) as they are simulcasts of analog terrestrial television channels.

Analog, cable and satellite television operators appeared to be the losers. In the first two months, ad spending on analog Channels 3, 5 and 7, Modernine TV and baht from 9.54bn baht in the same period last year.

Ad outlays through 56 leading cable and satellite television channels plunged 60 per cent to 615mn baht from 1.54bn baht in the same period last year.

Radio, newspapers, magazines cinema, outdoor media and in-store media continued going downhill.

Advertising on radio fell by 2.9 per cent to 712mn baht, on newspapers by 3 per cent to 1.75bn baht, on magazines by 18.1 per cent to 574mn baht, on cinemas by 1.1 per cent to 567mn baht, on outdoor media by 4.4 per cent to 653mn baht and on in-store media by 12.1 per cent to 181mn baht.

However, last month saw a turnaround in advertising on radio, newspapers and outdoor media, besides transit media and the - The Nation

Invest in your children

I READ an article in the BBC recently that I thought was worth sharing with my readers.

It is about an investment that actually costs no money, but could yield very large returns to your children in the future.

The investment is in their imagination, and the study I read about had some counter-intuitive advice. It actually concluded that the best thing you can do for your kids' future, in short, is actually nothing.

Before you say hogwash, let me explain in more detail what the study found. Imagination is often cited as one of the most important traits for success in life, yet the modern world is robbing young people of something that throughout history happened quite naturally. Boredom, it turns out, is the most important requirement for young people to develop their imagination.

When children

are stimulated constantly, they never have a need to creatively think about how to entertain themselves.

Every second that is spoon fed to them, whether by television, teachers and tutors, or tablets and mobile phones, is a loss of a chance for the child to exercise his or her imagination muscles. Of course, there needs to be balance; nobody is recommending locking kids in a closet for their entire childhood or taking away their

The problem with the ultracompetitive modern world is that fear of falling behind has led the "more is better" philosophy to

wreak havoc on balance. Kids are being pushed harder and faster than ever, and those lazy summer days of no responsibility that I remember from my youth seem nonexistent to most children these days.

Those boring times are precisely when kids' imaginations flourish, and nobody seems to realize this is the cheapest investment in your child's future that you can make.

Piano classes, soccer teams, extra English lessons and all of that is fine, but I think it is important to never forget that kids, after all, are just kids. They will

> never get another chance to go back, and if pushing them into adulthood is shown to have the likely effect of making them less prepared for success in the real world when they grow up because of a decreased imagination, why not schedule some time without the high-tech toys outside and stimulation?

Schedule in some weekly "imagination building" hours.

Don't just take away the

gadgets, but make them go outside and play.

Let them complain that there is nothing to do outside, and let them be bored. They will figure out a way to deal with it, and in the process they will build their imaginations.

When I go up to Isarn every high season (in fact I am writing this from there now), my kids spend countless hours getting filthy, playing with sticks and rocks and dirt.

Many of my friends ask me if I am worried about them missing lessons during this time, but when they get back to classes they always catch right back up with all

their classmates.

In the end there is no perfect formula for raising children, and a common response to this is to throw as much money as possible into their education and extracurricular activities.

banks to go after the same targets. Last year, Thailand's overall trade grew 1%, but KBank's trade finance grew by 6%.

Banks rush for slice of trade finance pie

The bank's export trade finance grew 19%, while import trade finance dropped by 5%, higher than the 3% fall in the country's overall imports, said Chongrak Rattanapian, executive vice president of KBank.

Mr Chongrak said the slowdown was caused by two main factors: trading partners having lower demand as their economies have yet to recover significantly, and the appreciation of the baht.

"If we look ahead, Thailand will

still rely on trading activities. Connectivity in Asean will bring more trade flows and when the logistics system in the region is improved, the transportation of goods will be more easy, resulting in exports and imports increasing in the future," he added.

Moreover, Thailand can import goods from neighboring countries where there are lower production costs, therefore trade activity is unlikely to decline, while improved connectivity will help boost trade, and consequently, trade finance too, said Mr Chongrak. - The Nation



Pricing your Phuket plot

IF ONE single fact has become evident in Siam Real Estate's Residential Market Report 2014, it is that since the tragic tsunami on Boxing Day 2004, land prices in Phuket have tripled in value.

The surge in prices has been led by land prices on the west coast, most notably in the traditional and well-established tourist destinations of Patong, Kata, Bang Tao, Laguna and Surin. However, land prices in southern and central Phuket have also bloomed, and now average more than 10 million baht per rai.

What is clearly noticeable is that land prices in the north of Phuket have lagged compared with these in all other locations on the island. To many Phuket residents this may seem obvious, as for years the north of Phuket lacked the necessary infrastructure and tourist appeal for land-price increases to match the rest of the island.

This is all about to change.

After the global financial crisis of 2007-08, residential property development concentrated on the traditionally popular locations along Phuket's west coast, the increasingly popular southern locations of Nai Harn and Rawai and Phuket's central hub, Kathu.

In comparison, the north saw little in the way of new developments in recent years and today remains the least-developed location on the island.

However, we are seeing a growing trend of improving infrastructure in the north of Phuket, which will lead to a growing demand for more residential property development in the area.

The north is already home to two deep-water marinas, at Ao Por

and Yacht Haven; the Phuket International Academy and school, which boasts some of the highest education standards and best sports facilities in Thailand; not to mention Phuket International Airport and Phuket Airpark; plus three golf courses, Blue Canyon (two 18-hole courses) and Mission Hills.

Tesco Lotus now has a new superstore in Thalang, and Homepro and Makro have recently opened their latest stores neighboring Tesco.


Phuket's northern area provides easy access to some of the island's best beaches: Nai Yang, Mai Khao, Nai Thon and Layan, which offer long stretches of white sand along the Andaman Sea and are almost deserted in comparison to the beaches of Patong, Kata and Karon.

This year will see the completion of the 5.8-billion-baht expansion of Phuket International Airport, to which the northern areas of Phuket provide fast and hassle-free access. This is ideal for the increasing number of Phuket residents who use the island as a base and commute for business throughout the region.

Despite these improvements in the local infrastructure, land prices in the north still remain reasonable. We are now seeing a growing trend of individual buyers looking to build large residential homes taking advantage of these lower land prices.

Longer-term land investors have also been attracted to cheaper land prices in the north, plus the great opportunities to buy reasonably priced land with potential to increase in value.

Yet, the clock is ticking. We expect to see increasing land prices in the north as demand increases from property developers

and individual buyers looking to take advantage of the lower land prices in an area.

WEST COAST

Other trends in land prices to note are a growing trend on Phuket's west coast of new residential property developments moving more inland to locations such Cherng Talay and Layan and further north to Nai Thon, Mai Khao and Nai Yang.

This growing trend is due to the lower land prices in these more inland and less-developed locations. Specifically, the price of land

within one kilometer of Bang Tao Beach has been driven up by large resort developments, in particular the Laguna resort area, which continues to expand.

CENTRAL

For property developers to keep their prices in line with market demand, residential developers have had to move to new locations where land prices are lower

Land prices in central Phuket have been driven upwards in recent years due to the expansion plans by Central Shopping Mall and the plans for The Mall Group (Siam Paragon) to open its new 20-billion-baht BluPearl Mall in Kathu. Adding to the mix is the surge in condominium developments in the area, also adding pressure to the increase in land prices.

SOUTH

Land prices in the south of the island, in general, match those of central Phuket, as the south has seen a steady increase in residential property development due to prices being much cheaper compared with those along the west coast.

The south has a thriving expat community; Chalong marina for boating and diving enthusiasts; access to Nai Harn beach, which is attractive to tourists; and has the necessary infrastructure to support the growing demand.

Yet, while all these price movements have been in play elsewhere on the island, it is the north where the movements are gaining momentum. The increases in Phuket's land prices have woken investors to the potential of the north, which has excellent prospects to outperform relative to current land prices.

Property firms set on 10 - 20% pre-sale, revenue growth in 2015

LISTED property firms target presale and revenue growth of 10-20 per cent compared with last year thanks to demand in the market recovering and high backlogs built up since 2011 being booked as revenue this year.

According to the business plans and financial targets for this year announced by the 17 listed developers, they target total pre-sales of 291.95 billion baht and total revenue of 264.03bn baht, up by an average of 15 per cent from 2014.

That revenue target accounts for 44 per cent of the nationwide property market, worth 600bn baht

Pruksa Real Estate takes the lead by targeting pre-sales of 47bn baht and a similar amount in revenue this year, up 20 per cent and 10 per cent respectively from the 39.09bn baht and 42.7bn baht posted in 2014.

Sansiri is next, targeting pre-



Sansiri targets pre-sales of 30bn baht to 32bn baht.

sales between 30bn baht and 32bn baht and revenue of 35bn baht, up 255 per cent and 18 per cent respectively from pre-sales of 9bn baht and revenue 29.5bn baht in 2014.

Land & Houses ranks third in terms of targeted revenue at 28bn baht, but second in forecast pre-sales at 34bn.

Harvesting monsoon bounty

How to take advantage of the abundance of free-falling freshwater



THOSE of us who have lived in a tropical country nearly all our lives tend to take rain for granted. We regularly forget that it's the rain that keeps the plants a lush green, while also providing for our everyday water-usage needs.

My grandmother used to collect rainwater in big Chinese urns in the garden. She would use the water for the plants in her gardens.

Rainwater harvesting throughout Asia dates back to the 9th or 10th centuries.

Nowadays, there are more sophisticated methods of rain water collection available to use.

For those homeowners who are more ecologically aware, it all starts with the catchment of rainwater from their rooftops,

which gets piped down to a collection tank. Here, the water is filtered and recycled.

Recycled water is then used to water plants in the gardens, flush toilets and so on. It is also possible to install a fine filter and use the recycled water in a washing machine, as well as in sinks and showers, though it is advisable to sterilize the rainwater using a chlorine dosage pump.

In Phuket, despite officials' statements to the contrary, there always seems to be a shortage of freshwater during the dry season. Due to this, more and more home owners on the island are starting

to practice rain harvesting to supplement ground water sources.

In addition to ground water sources, another common way homeowners have been getting water is by buying it from water trucks, which is an expense in sive practice.

The going rate for a truck load of water containing about 12,000 liters is 800 baht. During the high season, the demand for trucked water is very high, as many hotels, villas and devel-

opments are running at nearly full occupancy, pushing water consumption way up.

be filtered before use.

Rainwater harvesting can offer substantial savings for homeowners. However, someone pointed out to me that such practices were illegal in some areas in the United States.

The regulations about rainwa-


ter in the US focus on the fact that the rainwater falling from the sky onto private land does not make it the homeowner's property.

In several states, rainwater harvesting requires a permit to ensure that the harvesting equipment does not affect groundwater or infringe on others' legal rights to the water.

Looks like those of us out here in Asia will not have the same problems as the US, as we can freely harvest rainwater off our roofs anytime – assuming there is rain falling.

Books



DENIS Johnson published his first of three books of poetry at the age of 19. His meticulous attention to words is evident in his 11 books of fiction, which tend to be slim and terse, but intensely descriptive.

I've read his second novel, Fiskadoro, a post-nuclear apocalypse set in Key West, and his eighth, The Tree of Smoke, an epic - if somewhat overwrought novel about the Vietnam War, winner of the 2007 National Book Award. Now, at 65, he has published The Laughing Monsters (Farrar, Straus and Giroux, New York, 2014, 228pp) - an impressionistic black comedy set in bleak, war-torn Africa.

The narrator is Roland Nair, a spy for the espionage agency of NATO, who is dispatched from Amsterdam to Freetown, Sierra Leone. His mission has been prompted by the sighting of his old friend Michael Adriko, a US Special Forces operative who has gone AWOL. Their friendship dates back over a decade to Sierra Leone's civil war. They had both made a bit of money on the side and Nair is looking to repeat the operation. Most crucially, however, he is bored. "I've come back because I love the mess," he explains. "Anarchy. Madness. Things falling apart."

Nair holds a Danish passport and the rank of captain in the Danish Army but can barely speak the language. Adriko holds a Ghanaian passport but is from Uganda. He is headed now for the eastern mountains of the Congo where his clan had fled reprisals after the fall of Idi Amin. The occasion will be his wedding to Davidia St Clair, the beautiful African-American

daughter of his commanding officer at the 10th Special Forces Group headquartered in Colorado from which he is now "detached". Nair explains to the naive Davidia that she is now Adriko's "fifth fiancee".

Adriko and Nair had also been

up to some vague skullduggery in Afghanistan. Now they look to profit from the poisoned African atmosphere of post-9/11. "The World Powers are dumping their coffers into an expanded version of the old Great Game," Nair tells Davidia. "The money's without

limit, and plenty of it goes to snitches and spies. In that field, there's no recession." Or as Adriko has it: "Oh my goodness, you just tickle them in their terrorism bone, and they ejaculate all kinds of money."

As bait, Adriko has a chunk of

enriched uranium which he will claim came from an airplane full of the stuff that crashed in the Congo. The three conspirators fly off to Uganda in a Russian charter jet and put their radioactive wares up for market. They find a shifty pair of customers who turn out to be rogue Mossad operatives. After a fight, the trio flee into the Congo in a stolen Land Cruiser. They are now in a land of no law. Davidia is horrified when they run over a market woman and just keep going. She screams repeatedly for them to turn back, "but we wouldn't go back, we couldn't not in Africa, this hard, hard land where nobody could help that poor woman flopped probably dead in the road and where running away from this is not a mistake. The mistake was looking back at her in the first place."

They find shelter in a village where the people speak Adriko's native language, but a renegade Congolese army detachment arrives in pick-up trucks for an orgy of massacre, looting and rape. The commander takes the trio captive and turns them over to the American 10th Special Forces Group at a base they maintain to hunt down the Lord's Resistance Army. Adriko escapes en route, leaving Nair to be interrogated by another spook for going rogue on his spy mission. This dialogue between two world-weary schemers turns out to be the funniest section of the book, and Nair is released to search for Adriko deeper into the heart of darkness.

Denis Johnson has been compared to Joseph Conrad, Graham Greene and Robert Stone, though he lacks their moral gravitas. He is a fine prose stylist but his characters aspire to nothing more than the ill-gotten loot than will buy them a retirement of drunken pleasure with African hookers. Nihilism at its finest.

Life & style Cholesterol myths Cholesterol myths



IN MY previous column, I explained how a published dietician missed the mark when it comes to the potential benefits of consuming coconut oil.

This week, I want to focus on the following comment made by the same expert:

"Speaking from a medical point of view, coconut oil contains over 90 per cent saturated fatty acids, which are likely to raise blood cholesterol levels and increase the risk of contracting certain diseases."

What I would like to put forth is the possibility that this link between saturated fat, high cholesterol levels and heart disease has not been proven, but remains a highly topical subject among scientists and researchers.

Currently, the jury is still out, with many studies and researchers challenging and contradicting previous conclusions. Let's start with examining one of the benchmark studies.

In 1953, Dr Ancel Keys published a seminal paper that serves as the basis for nearly all of the initial scientific support for the Cholesterol Theory. The study is known as the Seven Countries Study, and it linked the consumption of saturated fats to coronary heart disease. However, the study had issues. One of the most alarming is that allegedly Dr Keys selectively analyzed information from only seven countries to support his correlation, rather than comparing all the data available at the time – from 22 countries.

Why didn't he use all of the nations. data? Well, the reasons are unclear and the dead can't talk – but one of the theories is that he cherrypicked his information, as many of the countries he excluded were those that did not support his hypothesis.

What this later led to was the construction of the "Dietary Goals for the United States", which recommends that all Americans reduce their fat, saturated fat and cholesterol consumption, and increase their carbohydrate consumption to 55-60 per cent of daily calories. This stance was also adopted by other western

It appears Dr Keys contradicted his own findings in many of his other works. For instance, in "Human Atherosclerosis and The Diet", he writes that "from these animal experiments only, the most reasonable conclusion would be that the cholesterol content of human diets is unimportant in human atherosclerosis.'

Additionally, in his paper titled "The Relationship of the Diet to the Development of Atherosclerosis in Man", Dr Keys says: "The evidence – both from experiments and from field surveys $-\operatorname{indicates}$ that the cholesterol content, per

se, of all natural diets has no significant effect on either the serum cholesterol level or the development of atherosclerosis in man."

A lot of contradictions from just one man - welcome to the world of nutritional science. In this world, one day eggs are bad, the next day they are good. Imagine being the poor old egg having to deal with these ever-changing tides.

So, what has the latest research found out about saturated fat and heart disease?

A recent large-scale meta-analysis study published in the American Journal of Clinical Nutrition concluded that there is no relationship between the intake of saturated fat and the incidence of heart disease or stroke.

It pooled together data from 21 unique studies that included almost 350,000 people, about 11,000 of whom developed cardiovascular disease (CVD), and were tracked for an average of 14 years. This one should have tipped the scales for many, but experts are still

If we go with the results of this study, perhaps saturated fats aren't the bad guy after all. Another question to throw in the mix then would be: are there any studies showing health benefits of saturated fats like butter and coconut oil? Last week, I listed some of the many studies that suggest coconut oil has many positive attributes.

If we throw out the idea that saturated fats are the main suspect for causing chronic heart disease - could there be some other culprits?

I, for one, look to sugar, processed junk food rich in high fructose corn syrup (such as soft drinks), and trans fat (such as those used in frying and in many packaged foods). Sadly, in Phuket we don't have a shortage of those foods – you can find them on any corner.

When the heart beats out of tune

A HEART that flutters temporarily because of love might well be a wonderful thing, but a heart that consistently beats out of tune is a cause for concern. The heart normally beats at a steady pace.

The tempo of the heartbeat can and does vary depending on both the body's condition and our health. During strenuous activity the heart beats faster to get more oxygen to the muscles. This is a natural response to the body's needs.

However, the heart can also sometimes change its tempo and rhythm without any reason. When a malfunction causes the heart to beat faster, it is called tachycardia. There are different types of tachycardia and they each have their own causes.

When the heart beats rapidly but rhythmically, it is called supraventricular tachycardia (SVT). Another type of tachycardia is reentry tachycardia. This is caused when there is a short circuit in the electrical signals controlling the heartbeat. As a result, the current

does not complete a circuit and tries to re-enter the beginning of the cycle, resulting in the heart beating out of pace.

The usual symptoms of tachycardia are fatigue, chest pain and heart palpitations, all of which are often overlooked.

Since many different factors can cause tachycardia, the first step of any diagnosis is a thorough examination. This involves a review of the patient's medical history and a physical examination. Diagnosis may also involve EKG or an echocardiograph to test

the rhythm of the heart. Here, we will focus on the treatment of supraventricular tachycardia (SVT).

Oral medication can slow down the electrical currents, while adenosine injections will bring the heartbeat back to normal by blocking the electrical current. However, neither of these options get rid of the underlying cause.

Radiofrequency ablation brings the current back to normal and prevents short circuits on a permanent basis with a 95 per cent rate.

Most cases are found in people who are stressed or have an unhealthy lifestyle, such as those with anger issues, who consume too much caffeine or take stimulants.

In most cases, the symptoms of SVT come and go, but diagnosis is easier when symptoms are present. If you experience any of symptoms of SVT, you should seek medical advice straight away.

In the meantime, try to lead a healthy life as this will minimize your risk of suffering from SVT.

Aflyby to success Airpark to bring more air show events to Phuket



THE successful Phuket Air Show & Fly'n event at the Phuket Airpark on March 28 is just the first in a number of similar activities planned at Phuket's only private airfield, with another fun event scheduled to take place in mid-

He described the event earlier this month as "an unbelievable success at every level, " with more than 70 passengers going up for rides in a variety of aircraft, and a number of people, Thais and foreigners, signing up for flying lessons.



It was set up on a rather impromptu basis, but turned out to be a very good form of entertainment - especially on such a hot day.

The system comprises a pair of water nozzles that the user hooks up to both feet. A jet-ski parked nearby pumps high pressure water through a hose and into the nozzles, propelling the user from the lake into the air.

With a little practice, users can learn to balance themselves atop the two columns of water. perhaps feeling like a dolphin using its tail fluke to balance itself and "walk on water".

Despite the considerable thrust involved, the water jet activity appears to be quite safe. The greatest risk ob-

A HOST of Phuket's leading brokerages and charter companies are preparing to hoist anchor to join the Singapore Yacht Show (SYS) at the ONE° 15 Marina Club at Sentosa from April 23-26.

Phuket-based companies alone will have hundreds of millions of baht of boats on display at the show. The key attraction for joining the event is the reach the show offers to the prospective international clientele throughout Southeast Asia, explained Bert van Muylwijk, resident director and sales broker at the Northrop & Johnson office at Phuket's Boat Lagoon Marina.

"The SYS is by far the most important show in the region, attracting large numbers of punters that can indulge in viewing yachts of all sizes and sorts," he noted.

Looking to gain a foothold in that realm is Multihull Solutions. Andrew de Bruin, Multihull Solutions' Asia general manager, based in Phuket, will be presenting the impressive Fountaine Pajot flagship motor yacht, Queensland 55, at the show.

Tahiti marinas ease superyacht stopover

is now home to three marinas that can accommodate superyachts making the journey across the Pacific.

Located 4,400km south of Hawaii, 7,900km from Chile and 5,700km from Australia, Tahiti has become one of the most popular stopovers for superyachts crossing the "Big Pond", explained Etienne Boutin, head of Asia Pacific Superyachts Tahiti.

While Papeete Harbor remains the only suitable dock in Tahiti for yachts longer than 65 meters, just five miles to the west is Marina Taina, which can tie up 550 boats.

> The marina is recognized for receiving the respected eco-label "Blue Flag" in 2012, created by the French Office of the Foundation for Environmental Education in Europe in 1985.

> Papeete's downtown area will very soon have a new marina, one that is currently under construction and due to completed at the end of April. It will mostly cater to yachts 30 to 75 feet long; with three berths for 35m yachts. One of the cruise ship's finger quay will be included inside the marina precinct to offer a more "yacht friendly" alternative downtown for large visiting yachts.

MOST divers remember taking a crash course in the color spectrum and light waves from their advanced diving course. Notably, that we see short wavelength colors, such as red, yellow and orange, quickly disappear as we descend on a dive. The lesson is usually combined with a colorcomparisons activity on our first deep dive to about 40 meters.

There is, of course, an entire world of light beyond what we can see.

Pounding across Kata Beach with a quarter moon overhead, we are about to shine the light of discovery and see what it does to the underwater world during a "Glow Dive" with Vince from Kiwidiver. Glow dives, also known as Glo dives and Flo dives, are new to the diving market, as the technology for ultraviolet (UV) and blue-light torches for divers have just recently become commercially available.

There are two distinct types of glow dives: one with UV torches, which shine light at a wavelength that is invisible to the human eye (395 nanometers); and blue light, which shines a strong blue light of about 455nm, and still resides in the visible spectrum.

As we swim out among the longtail boats anchored at the north end of the beach, Vince explains that we will be using a UV torch, as a blue-light torch requires divers to wear yellow filters (and fit their cameras with the same) in order to see the magic. Of course, Kata is loaded with biological wonders that aren't UV magical, so we are all carrying good old-fashioned LED torches as well.

As we approach the edge of the

clicking his torch over to UV mode. We tuck our own torches away.

At first, it's dark. There is a little moonlight trickling down to the sand and the top of the reef, and a hard wave of the hand causes a burst of bio-luminescent particles to light up like Tinker Bell's dust. Then, the corals are hit with the light from the UV torch and explode with color – strange colors: neon greens, deep purples and stunning oranges.


They are glowing in the dark-

reef, it's possible to hear Vince ness like beacons in a sciencefiction movie. Floating close to a small colony of brain coral, the swerving maze-like lines becomes mesmerizing as the tops glow, falling away into black


The corals are emitting light within the visible spectrum due to a chemical compound contained in their tissue, which reacts to the UV light, causing them to fluoresce. Unfortunately, not everyone is able to be the belle of this ravelike UV ball.

In fact, only certain animals react at all – most notably corals and soft-bodied critters. The rest remain hidden from sight. Though corals provide the most spectacular of the UV-color shows, invertebrates such as jellyfish put on an enamoring display as they pulse through the ocean.


However, without a jellyfish in sight and the glow of the corals giving way to our imaginations wandering about, curious as to what else is out there, Vince shuts off the UV light to continue the

dive - only to turn it back on every so often to check what else is willing to glow for us.

Though not so lucky as to find ourselves in a bloom of jellyfish, Vince was able to give us a taste of the wonders that present themselves to torches of the visible-light spectrum: two ornate ghost pipefish, two frog fish and what appeared to be a bumblebee squid (Sepiola atlantica), not to mention an assortment of crustaceans and other marine life that come out to play once the sun goes down.

Cycling Fest peddles back Local players pucker up in first shot at annual cup

PHUKET's first foray into the annual Mekong Cup ball hockey tournament, held in Karon last Saturday, ended with an ousting in the round-robin stage, but the competition for Southeast Asia's most coveted ball hockey trophy has been hailed a success.

Though this was the fourth straight year that the cup was staged at the Centara Karon Resort Phuket, it was the first time a team from Phuket entered the competition.

The Phuket Pucks, organized by Surin expat Joe Burgess, even featured a former draft choice of the San Jose Sharks, Dominik Bielke, who was drafted in the seventh round in 2009.

However, the Pucks (0-4-1) made a hasty exit, finishing sixth overall. Joining them were the Chiang Mai Highlanders (0-3-2), who secured fifth place.

The first semi-final saw a battle of the two Bangkok teams, with the top-seeded Thai Stix (5-0-0) beating the fourth-seeded Bullies Resurrected (1-2-2) 6-1.



The 21st Mekong Cup, held in Karon last weekend, drew teams from Thailand, Singapore and Hong Kong.

The other semi-final saw the second-seeded Singapore Chili Crabs (3-1-1) come back from two goals down to beat the third-seeded Hong Kong Islanders 3-2 (3-2).

That set up a final between the Thai Stix and the Chili Crabs. Singapore jumped out to an early 1-0 lead, but the Thai Stix stormed back with three unanswered goals.

Singapore scored a late goal to close the gap, but when the final whistle sounded, the Thai Stix had triumphed and were back on the top of the Asian ball hockey world, laying to rest the ghosts of recent past – especially last year's heartbreaking last-minute championship loss to the Hong Kong Islanders.

Thai Stix forward, and the

youngest player on the team, Aku Korkonen, was the tournament MVP, as he scored 10 goals.

This was the fifth championship for the Stix, but their first since 2004. Captain John Stevens and goalie Yves Gaboriault are the only surviving members from that team still on the Stix today, though Phuket team-member Scott Murray, as well as referee and former tourney organizer John Casella were also part of that dynasty, which won four titles over

The Stix are now tied with the Hong Kong Islanders for the most cups, with five each.

Yves Gaboriault was praised for an outstanding job in his first year as tourney organizer. Praise was also given to referees Craig Noon and John Casella for a great job of maintaining order.

A charity auction at the awards banquet raised 40,000 baht for the Vivian Slot scholarship fund. Attending the event and playing for the Phuket team was Roman Torok, senior vice-president of the International Street & Ball Hockey Federation.







Australian boxer killed

Queensland medics call for boxing ban following fatal fight

SENIOR Queensland medical officials have called for a ban on boxing in Australia following a local fighter's death after losing a title fight last weekend.

Braydon Smith, 23, had congratulated Filipino John Moralde for claiming a unanimous points decision win in their WBC Asian Boxing Council continental featherweight title bout in Toowoomba on Saturday.

He collapsed after returning to his dressing room.

The law student was put into an induced coma, but never regained consciousness and his life support was turned off at a Brisbane hospital on Monday.

Australian Medical Association Queensland president Shaun Rudd said that the fighter's death showed why boxing should be banned nationally.

"We believe that a so-called sport where two people knock each other in the head as often as you possibly can to win a bout seems rather barbaric," he told

ABC on Monday.

"You're not allowed to hit the organs beneath the belt whereas you're allowed to hit the organ above your shoulder, which is the

most important organ in the body."

A representative of the Smith family said that the young boxer, who was unbeaten in 12 fights prior to the Moralde bout, had wanted to show that boxing was not as dangerous as people feared.

"He really wanted to change the image of boxing," James O'Shea told AAP on Monday.

"A lot of times in this country the sport gets a bad rap.

"A big goal of his in life was to show people it's not [a bad sport]."

The death of Smith, also know as "The Great White", comes four years after another Australian boxer, 18-year-old Alex Slade, collapsed in the fourth round of a bout in Townsville. He never regained consciousness and died a week later.

Boxing Queensland president Ann Tindall defended the sport's reputation.

"It's a tragic accident, a tragic accident as you can have in a car or any other sport, there are many sports that have deaths in them," Tindall was quoted as saying by ABC. - Reuters

Did Mercedes kill F1?

NO SOONER had Mercedes cruised to the checkered flag at Sunday's season-opening Australian Grand Prix, their rivals were all but conceding the 2015 Formula One championship was as good as over.

Dominant in 2014, Mercedes were again in a class of their own with double-world champion Lewis Hamilton coasting to victory over teammate Nico Rosberg.

Despite taking it easy throughout the 58-lap race, concerned more about saving tyres and fuel than checking their mirrors for challengers, Mercedes finished more than half a minute clear of third-placed Sebastian Vettel's Ferrari.

Only two other drivers finished on the same lap as the Silver Ar-

"You have to be realistic," said Vettel after his first race for Ferrari. "This weekend it was in

their hands and they did a great job, not just as a team but individually.

"They are the favorites, they had a huge advantage last year and I think they did a good job increasing that advantage this year."

Vettel won four titles in a row for Red Bull before Mercedes overtook them last year, and that team's principal Christian Horner said 2015 was looking like another procession.

"On today's evidence we're set for a two-horse race at every Grand Prix this year," he said.

"Take nothing away from Mercedes, they've done a super job, they've got a great car, they've got a fantastic engine and they've got two very good drivers.

"But the problem is the gap is just so big you end up with threetier racing and I don't think that's healthy for Formula One."

Mercedes won 16 of 19 races last season and started 18 on pole. If last Sunday was anything to go

Australia's Daniel Ricciardo, who finished sixth for Red Bull. "It was a boring race. It was frustrating."

Even the Mercedes drivers have said they fear their dominance could drive fans away. In the leadup to the race, Hamilton admitted that he would be bored as a fan, while Rosberg said that he hoped the others could catch up.

"I hope they can give us a challenge, because it's important for the sport and the fans," the Ger-

Red Bull F1 Team: Broken wings, broken dreams

A RED Bull adviser has warned that the team could pull out of Formula One unless changes were made to the current regulations.

Red Bull are among a number of teams frustrated by their inability to keep up with Mercedes, who dominated Formula One last year and cruised to an easy victory in last Sunday's season-opening Australian Grand Prix after a virtual procession.

Rival drivers described the race as boring and Red Bull motorsport adviser Helmut Marko said that if it went unchecked, it could drive other teams away and reduce interest in the sport.

Marko even suggested that Red Bull, who won four championships in a row before being left in the Mercedes slipstream, might pull out if the team's billionaire owner Dietrich Mateschitz lost interest.

Marko's comments came after Red Bull team principal Christian Horner told reporters that Formula One officials should take action to equalize the engine performances of every team to create a more level-playing field.

Red Bull made a disastrous start

to the new season with Daniel Ricciardo getting lapped before finishing sixth in his home race.

His new Russian team mate Daniil Kvyat didn't even make it to the grid, withdrawing before the start with gearbox failure.

"When we were winning, and we were never winning with an advantage that Mercedes has, double diffusers were banned, exhausts were moved, flexible bodywork was banned, engine mapping was changed mid-season - anything was done to pull us back," Horner told reporters.

"The FIA, within the rules, have an equalization mechanism; I think it's something that perhaps they need to look at."

Mercedes team boss Toto Wolff had little sympathy for Red Bull, accusing their rivals of moaning because they were losing.

"If you try to beat each other and perform at the highest level and then you need equalization after the first race – you cry out after the first race – that's not how we've done things in the past,"
