Land slated for park entangled in property scandal

A PLAN by Patong Mayor Chalermluck Kebsup to transform an area of 69 rai of longcontested land near Tri Trang Beach into a public park received special attention last

Maj Gen Intarat Yodbangtoey, adviser to Agriculture and Cooperatives Minister Petipong Pungbun Na Ayudhya, inspected the site on May 2.

Gen Intarat explained to the accompanying members of the press that the Agriculture and Cooperatives Ministry and the Interior Ministry were working on 'returning the land to Patong locals', after years of its ownership being contested in the courts.

"However, as of today, the land has yet to be returned to the state because of a recent claim to its ownership," he confessed. "We want to take back the land, but we will wait until after the Supreme Court has made its final decision.'

Ms Chalermluck told the Gazette on Monday that she had no idea that the ownership of the property was still being contested in the

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Phuket foundations ramp up efforts to help Nepalese

THE Thai-Nepalese Foundation is now accepting donations of relief supplies to aid the victims of the disastrous earthquake in Nepal, the foundation's president confirmed on May 1.

Supplies being collected by the foundation include clothing, medicine, tents (family size), gloves and sanitary napkins.

"If you have a lot of supplies and are unable to transport them to the foundation, please call us. We will arrange to collect the items," said Panuphong Limbuprasertkul, president of the foundation.

Items can be dropped off in Patong at the foundation, officially called the Shree Bhagawat Dhaam Sanatan Mandir Foundation, located in Soi Kuan Yang off of Phra Baramee Road.

Monetary donations to the 'Phuket Together For Nepal Disaster Victims' fund can be made at the Damrongtham Center (ombudsman's office) at Phuket Provincial Hall; directly at the Phuket Provincial Hall in Phuket Town; at the Phuket Red Cross Center at Saphan Hin; or any government office on the island.

Trial for alleged baby rapist set back by delay in autopsy results

A DELAY in autopsy results has resulted in police having to defer bringing to trial the alleged rapist and killer of a 1-year-old baby boy.

Somsak Yakob turned himself in to police on April 6, but denied the allegations.

Mr Somsak was arrested and taken to Phuket Provincial Court on April 8, but was bailed out by relatives on the same day, Lt Ronnaphum Permpoon of the Phuket City Police said.

Mr Somsak has been formally charged with aggravated assault causing death. Additional charges for the suspected rape are pending until police receive the autopsy results, Lt Ronnaphum explained

The autopsy results and forensic tests conducted by the Region 8 Police headquarters have been sent to the Institute of Forensic Medicine at Police General Hospital in Bangkok for further verification, said Lt Ronnaphum.

"It will take about a month for the results to come back to Surat Thani from Bangkok, and before we receive them ourselves," he said. "We could plainly see bruising on the body, but we cannot verify whether or not the baby was raped until we receive the results."

"A house next to the group of connected buildings was burnt too. Fortunately, no one was hurt in the incident," said Lt Col Danai

Niyomdecha of the Krabi City Police.

Firefighters spent more than one hour dousing the flames, with help from residents and tourists.

"We believe the cause of the fire was a short circuit in one of the units. However, we are waiting for experts to examine the site and confirm the cause," said Col Danai.

"At this stage, we believe the damage is about 1 million baht."

Jet-skis return to Surin

MARINE officials are investigating reports that jet-ski operators have returned to Surin Beach, where the wave-riding machines are banned.

The investigation, led by Phuket Marine Office Chief Phuriphat Theerakulpisut, follows recent reports and photographs of jet-ski touts bringing the machines onto Surin Beach, as well as allowing them to be driven dangerously close to swimmers.

"I will have my officers check whether or not these guys are operators, or if they are just tourists that have ridden the jet-skis over from another beach," Mr Phuriphat told the Gazette on Monday.

"If they are jet-ski operators, we will find out which club they belong to. If they are not members, I will take legal action against them."

Regarding jet-skis being ridden to Surin from nearby beaches, Mr Phuriphat told the *Gazette* that he has not taken any serious measures to stop the wrongdoing, as to the best of his knowledge it is being done by unknowing tourists.

"Jet-skis are banned from Surin Beach, but some tourists drive them there from beaches nearby. At this stage, we do not have any measures in place to prevent this from happening," Mr Phuriphat

"I do not know what to do. I have ordered jet-ski operators to inform tourists about the ban at Surin Beach, but many tourists do not abide by the rules.

"It would not be fair of us to fine the jet-ski operators over something that their customers are

Mr Phuriphat added that he would call the jet-ski operators together again to discuss the issue further.

However, a date has not yet been set for this meeting.

This is not the first time complaints have been made about dangerous jet-ski antics at Surin Beach.

Ma-ann Samran, president of the Cherng Talay Tambon Administration Organization (*OrBorTor*) witnessed the practice himself while inspecting the beach in January.

During his inspection, he watched a rented jet-ski from Laem Singh being driven to Surin Beach, where the rider repeatedly came dangerously close to swimmers at high speed.

Asked about the ongoing jet-ski dilemma on Surin Beach, Mr Maann told the Gazette that it was up to Mr Phuriphat to find a solution.

"It is beyond my authority to enforce jet-ski regulations. Mr Phuriphat has taken full responsibility for the issuance of permits and enforcement of the rules," he said.

"I have already talked to Mr Phuriphat about ways to ensure people's safety at Surin Beach. One idea we had was to rope off the area to prevent jet-skis from coming near swimmers.

"However, after discussing the idea with OrBorTor councilors, we agreed not to rope off or install buoys in the water, as jetskis are already banned. We also do not feel it is sensible to pay more money to enforce a rule that is already set.

"I personally am against installing ropes and buoys, as it would surely affect the beach's natural





Mr Ismael was charged with parking in a prohibited area, confirmed Maj Santi.

"We have yet to decide whether or not to press charges over the boy's death," he added.

Motorcyclists to face law for using underpass

OFFICIALS have set a deadline of May 15 for local authorities to start charging drivers of motorbikes for using the recently completed Darasamuth Underpass.

"The underpass has been open for a month, and in that time we have noticed many motorbikes, including some with sidecars, driving through it," said Deputy Transport Minister Arkhom Termpittayapaisith during an inspection of the Samkong Underpass on May 2.

"This is dangerous. There is no dedicated motorcycle lane through the underpass. After May 15, local officers will arrest and charge drivers, and they will make sure new signs and lights are installed to make sure all drivers understand the rules."

The charge will be 'breaking traffic regulations', as indicated by traffic signs, for which the penalty is a fine of up to 1,000 baht, Mr Arkhom noted.

The practice of driving across the double solid lines south of the underpass in order to access or exit the street to Wichit Police Station will stop, he added.

"This is also very dangerous, and local officers will take steps to make sure this no longer happens," he said.

The charge of 'breaking traffic regulations' will also apply to this, Mr Arkhom confirmed.

The move to ramp up safety measures at the Darasamuth Underpass follows the tunnel's first accident last month, when the driver of a motorcycle with a sidecar escaped with his life after his three-wheeler was clipped by a passing truck.

Solider nabbed for late night bag snatch

AN ARMY private and his friend were arrested in Thalang on Monday night for bag-snatching.

"We were able to identify the suspects from a description given to us by the victim," Cherng Talay Police Superintendant Serm Kwannimit said on Tuesday.

"The two suspects grabbed the victim's bag and sped off together on a motorbike."

Private Chonlatea Krolek, 23, who entered the military in April and is based at the Phaya Intira Military camp in Pattani, and Krittameth Jampada, also 23, who had just completed his two-year military service on May 1, were arrested at a self-service petrol machine in Thalang.

The two men were caught with 540 baht, a mobile phone and the victim's backpack. Police also seized a walkie-talkie and the motorbike used in the robbery.

Both men were charged with committing theft at night using a motor vehicle.

"They both confessed to the crime," said Col Serm.

Phuket gifted B1.3bn for roads

DEPUTY Transport Minister Arkhom Termpittayapaisith announced on May 2 that Phuket will receive funding of more than 1.3 billion baht to build underpasses at Bang Khu on the bypass road and at Chalong Circle.

Included in the funds is 200 million baht to build a flyover at the Koh Kaew Intersection on Thepkrasattri Road and another one at the main airport turnoff on Thepkrasattri Road in Mai Khao.

Mr Arkhom delivered the news after inspecting the progress made on the Samkong Underpass in front of the Tesco shopping center on the bypass road.

"Despite the project being nine per cent behind schedule, it is still on target for completion by the end of this year," Mr Arkhom said.

Work began on the 850mn-baht underpass in September 2013 under a concession granting 720 days for completion.

However, progress suffered delays last year when workers were forced to move power cables and water mains pipes, making the June 25, 2015 deadline impossible to achieve.



Mr Arkhom said the Samkong underpass is on track to open this year.

During his visit, Mr Arkhom confirmed that the Highways Department had been approved to allocate 600mn baht to build the Bang Khu Underpass, where Thepkrasattri Road joins the

bypass road.

The Phuket Highways Office had also been granted a further 570mn baht to build an underpass at Chalong Circle, he added.

"We are now in the process of

looking for contractors for both projects," Mr Arkom said. "We expect to confirm who the contractors are by the middle of June, and construction of both projects will start before the end of the year."

New projects, aimed at alleviating Phuket's ever-worsening traffic jams, revealed by Mr Arkhom today included a 200mn baht flyover at the Koh Kaew Intersection, long known for its daily, mile-long tailbacks.

The Department of Highways first publicly recognized the Koh Kaew Intersection as a 'tailback blackspot' in 2012. The move to build a flyover at the busy junction bypasses previous concerns with expanding the number of lanes there further. The junction already has six lanes; three each way.

The plan to build a flyover at the Mu Dok Khao Intersection on Thepkrasattri Road in Mai Khao, where most of the traffic turns off to reach Phuket International Airport, aims to reduce the volume of traffic there.

Chalong Marina given B172mn budget top-up

THE Transport Ministry has granted the Phuket Marine Office a total of 172 million baht in order to complete the seawall and marina in Chalong Bay.

Transport Deputy Minister Arkhom Termpittayapaisith on May 2 revealed the news during his inspection of the facilities, which are currently under construction.

"The Marine Department has approved 98mn baht to complete the final phase of the seawall, which is slated to be finished by November," Mr Arkhom said.

"Another 74mn baht has been granted to complete the final phase of the actual marina, which is now expected to be finished by September next year."

The Chalong Marina has taken more than eight years to complete.

The latest allocated funds bring the price tag for the facility up to 477mn baht.

"After construction is complete, we will have a much better marina and a strong seawall, which will support yachts and superyachts," Mr Arkhom said.

Ongoing repairs to the marina have been needed for years, as the deteriorating facility slowly became a safety hazard for tourists boarding or disembarking boats there.

Phuket Marine Office Chief Phuripat Theerakulpisut in October last year prohibited boats from mooring within 200 meters of the still-incomplete marina for an entire year while renovations and construction to the seawall were carried out.

Just months earlier, the marina was falling apart, with officials posting a line of small red and white flags to mark a large metal pillar that lurked beneath the water's surface near the pier, posing a hazard to passing boats.

"After the project is complete, we will have a facility that can accommodate about 45 yachts," Mr Phuripat told the *Gazette* on Monday.

The push to complete the long-awaited marina follows Tourism and Sports Minister Kobkarn Wattanavrangkul pledging her support for changes in visa and chartering legislation to secure the island's position as the top yachting destination in the region.

Officials play down fears Mysterious Brit burglar of possible quake disaster Mysterious Brit burglar still at large

OFFICIALS have played down fears that the 4.6 magnitude earthquake off Phuket on Wednesday signaled potentially more destructive temblors from the same fault line in the future.

The quake struck at 4:18am, with an epicenter about 20 kilometers off Phuket's east coast, Governor Nisit Jansomwong told the press following the first quake on Wednesday morning. Following the governor's announcement, a second, lighter earthquake struck in the same area.

"The quake failed to trigger a tsunami warning," Governor Nisit said. "After the earthquake, all local officials and village leaders throughout Phuket were ordered to inspect their areas and file damage reports. There were none filed."

Gov Nisit assured that the earthquake provided no cause for alarm. He said that the National Disaster Warning Center (NDWC) and other relevant government agencies were monitoring the situation.

"They will update the public as necessary," he noted.

Santhawat Riwleung, chief of the Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation Phuket office, concurred.

"The quake struck at a depth of 4km, but measured only 4.6 in magnitude," Mr Santhawat told

the Gazette on Wednesday.

"For an earthquake to cause a tsunami, it would need to be at least 6.5 Richters, depending on where the earthquake strikes."

Mr Santhawat added that the fault line along which this morning's quake shuddered officially called the Klong Marui fault - was unlikely to unleash earth-shattering devastation.

"Earthquakes along this fault should not register more than 5 Richters, so please do not panic," he assured.

"However, I will ask the Department of Mineral Resources to confirm my understanding about how serious the earthquakes along this fault can be."

The Klong Marui fault is regarded by the Department of Mineral Resources as a 'basinbinding fault', rather than a 'major strike-slip fault'.

The Klong Marui fault is also responsible for many of the hot springs on the mainland that have become major tourist attractions, the department notes.

KARON Police are still trying to track down a British thief, known only by his alias 'Charlie Machin', who is wanted for robbing a Swedish man's home of about 200,000 baht in valuables in March.

"We only have this name and a few pictures of him. All farang [Caucasians] look the same. It has been very hard to find him," Lt Chamaiporn Supakom of the Karon Police told the Gazette.

"We checked with Phuket Immigration, but they have no record of a Charlie Machin in Phuket."

Police originally learned the name 'Charlie Machin' from hospital records, but staff at Thalang Hospital confirmed that Mr Machin was not asked to present a passport during his visit.

Despite the lack of information and leads, police are continuing their search for the mysterious

"If anyone has any information about Mr Machin or his whereabouts, please call the Karon Police at 076-396393 or 098-013 1191 at any time of the day or night," Lt Chamaiporn said.

Airport taxi slams into 18wheeled truck

AN AIRPORT taxi driver faces charges of reckless driving after his car slammed into an 18wheeled truck near Mai Khao Temple, in northern Phuket, the morning of April 30.

The taxi rammed the trailer broadside, but luckily for taxi driver Vichan Artharn, 35, the car spun out from under the trailer and came to rest in roadside bushes next to a house.

"Mr Vichan suffered only minor injuries to his head and back," confirmed Maj Santi Prakobpran of the Tah Chat Chai Police. "He was taken to Thalang Hospital for treatment as a precaution.'

Truck driver Sumet Kalasri, 39, was not injured in the impact.

"Mr Sumet was heading northbound when the accident happened," Maj Santi said.

'He said he was passing Mai Khao Temple when the taxi exited a side street at high speed, and that he could not avoid the collision."

Police have yet call Mr Vichan to the police station to question him about the accident, Maj Santi confirmed to the Gazette on Wednesday.

Hospital staff, however, confirmed Mr Vichan had been released from hospital on May 1.

Cyclists injured in Phuket Town firework explosion

A FIREWORK injured four cyclists after it exploded in a crowd at the start line of a night ride in Phuket Town on May 2.

The four injured were taken to Bangkok Hospital Phuket for minor injuries and released within a few hours, confirmed one of the organizers of the Plukpanya Night Ride, who declined to be named.

"We will pay for any medical costs and refund the registration fees of those injured. We will ensure nothing like this happens again," said the organizer.

Plukpanya Night Ride organizers set the firework off to commence the 23-kilometer ride from Lime Light Avenue to Kathu.

"The firework was lit on the side of the road. It shot up into the sky, but then fell to the ground, where it exploded," one witness told the Gazette.

Police will not be investigating further or taking any legal action, confirmed Sub Lt Prawet Mueangram of the Phuket City

Foreign-flagged superyacht charters possible for Phuket

THE Phuket Marine Office will table the idea of creating temporary chartering licenses for foreign-flagged superyachts, as Thailand pushes for the province to become a maritime hub for Southeast Asia.

"There will be a public hearing, with an English-language translator, to discuss what legal measures need to be taken to ensure that Phuket becomes the destination in the region for yachts and superyachts," said Phuket Marine chief Phuriphat Theerakulpisut.

"We will be looking at which licenses can be given to foreignflagged yachts and superyachts to allow them to charter from Phuket."

The meeting falls in line with orders handed down by the Ministry of Transport, explained Mr Phuriphat.

The meeting, which is expected — Thawit Bilabdullar | to comprise about 120 partici-

pants from the yachting industry and other relevant sectors, will be held on May 11 from 1:30pm to 4:30pm, and headed by Marine Department Director Chula Sulmanop.

In January, Tourism and Sports Minister Kobkarn Wattanavrangkul told the *Gazette* in an exclusive interview that changes in visa and chartering legislation were needed to secure

the island's position as the top yachting destination in the region. The minister's commitment to the changes has been backed by Prime Minister Gen Prayut Chan-

...of the Nakkerd Hills, to 489

The SorPorKor program aimed to give poor, landless farmers the right to use government land to farm in order to make a living.

In 2004, SorPorKor papers for 3,000 rai were revoked, following a ruling by the SorPorKor Land Commission that the land was not being used as intended.

It was later found that members of 11 wealthy families in Phuket were among the land recipients.

Ms Chalermluck said that she claimed by the prominent Patongbased Tantiwit family had long been laid to rest.

"The Supreme Court ruled that Banlue Tantiwit was not qualified to receive SorPorKor land," she said. "I thought that the land had been returned to the state since that is what the Supreme Court had ordered.

"But now, another person has filed an appeal and claims to own the land. I do not know who that person is."

Nonetheless, Ms Chalermluck vowed to have the site transformed into a public park.

'It will take time, but I will do thought the rights to the 69 rai, as my best to give more to Patong and the tourists who visit," she said.



Fishing boats raided for human-trafficking

GOVERNOR Nisit Jansomwong joined a random inspection of three Phuket fishing boats near Rassada Pier as part of a nationwide crack down on illegal trawlers and human-trafficking of migrant workers in the industry on April 29.

The boarding party comprised officers from the Phuket Marine Police, Royal Thai Navy and other government agencies, accompanied by Phuket Provincial Police Deputy Commander Pinit Sirichai.

"The inspection focused on checking work permits and business licences, and to check on what the workers are paid and how are they treated by their employers," said Governor Nisit.

The 47 workers – seven Thais and 40 Myanmar nationals – and the three fishing vessels were all found to be legal.

"Each fisherman receives a salary of 8,000 baht per month plus a bonus from the catch each month, which alone is about an extra 10,000 to 15,000 baht a month," Governor Nisit noted.

'We will carry out random inspections every week. We know some boats in Phuket still do not

have licences, but we are giving these boats until the end of May to register."

After then, officials will crack down on any illegal workers and boat owners found illegally operating fishing vessels, he said.

'They will be charged for operating an illegal, unreported and unregulated [IUU] fishing vessel," he said

The inspection coincided with similar checks in Chon Buri and Songkhla, carried out ahead of an upcoming inspection by representatives from the European Union.

The European Commission on April 21 put Thailand on formal notice for not taking sufficient measures in the international fight against IUUs.

Thailand was given six months to implement a corrective tailormade action plan, or face a ban on seafood exports to Europe.

Krabi double homicide

Couple involved in illegal pangolin trade found dead, ropes wound around necks

POLICE in Krabi are searching for at least three suspects in connection with a double homicide of a married couple who were engaged in illegally trading pangolins.

The bodies of the couple, Taweesak Janwiang, 41, and 43-year-old Jinda Janwiang were found with nylon ropes tied

around their

necks in a plantation on Monday.

"We believe they were strangled to death over a business issue pangolins," said Lt Col Torsak Boonlon of the Khlong Thom

Pangolins, also known as 'scaly anteaters', are a protected species in Thailand, but are often sold to

restaurants to be eaten.

"Relatives, who had filed missing person reports with the Thap Put Police Station on May 1, told us that the couple dealt in pangolins. They filed the

Tambon Huay Nam Khaw rubber report after being unable to contact either of them for 24 hours," Col Torsak said.

"When we found the couple's regarding their illegal trade in ransacked pick-up truck in

Nakorn Sri Thammarat on May 3, we officially launched our investigation."

Police believe that the pair were killed about five days prior to the discovery of their bodies in the rubber plantation, about three kilometers away from the main road.

"We are chasing down all pos-

sible leads. At this point, we are unable to provide any additional information about the suspects' identities," Col Torsak said.

Police find body of suspected victim of human-trafficking

A SUSPECTED human-trafficking victim's body was uncovered in a shallow grave north of Phuket in Phang Nga on Tuesday.

The discovery follows the news of police uncovering mass graves in the Thai-Malaysian border province of Songkhla last weekend (see page 8).

The badly decomposed body, believed to be that of a woman, was unearthed after officials launched a probe into a humantrafficking camp in Takuapa, Phang Nga.

"We were made aware of the possibility of human remains being buried at the camp after questioning two refugee boys taken into custody," Phang Nga Governor Prayoon Rattanasenee told the Gazette.

The boys are staying in a shelter in Phang Nga, after they and about 80 other Rohingya refugees were arrested at the camp in October last year, confirmed the governor.

"The boys told us that they tnessed some of the adults being beaten by the traffickers, and that it was likely that some of them were killed and buried near the camp," said Gov Prayoon.

Joining the search was Phang Nga Provincial Police Commander Chalit Kaewyarat.

"At this point we can only tell that it is the body of a woman, based on the height and the clothes found with her," Gen Chalit said. "We have taken the remains to Takuapa Hospital to attempt to establish a cause of death and see if there are any signs of violence to the body."

It is suspected that the woman was dead for months before the body was discovered.

Officers and rescue workers are continuing to search the area for bodies, confirmed Gen Chalit.


"The last arrest made in Phang Nga was in October, not because we have stopped hunting human traffickers, but because they are no longer using the same routes," said Gen Chalit.

"We have successfully sealed off one corridor. However, I have no idea if they are simply using a different network by land, or if they are avoiding the province by taking them by boat farther south.

"After the mass graves were discovered in Padang Besar, I urged police and local officials to remain vigilant. However, I am confident that they have not let down their guard since October."

Gov't attempts to change costly lottery, reduce 'gray money'

THE government says its move to try and solve the problem of expensive state lottery tickets is a bid to control so-called 'gray money'.

The so-called 'gray money' earned from selling the tickets above 80 baht apiece might have been used in other illegal activities or to support activities that could have damaged the country, deputy government spokesman Sansern Kaewkamnerd said on May 3, reported The Nation.

Mr Sansern said that Prime Minister Gen Prayut Chan-o-cha's decision to replace the Government Lottery Office's (GLO) board by invoking Article 44 of the provisional constitution on May 1 was designed to boost the agency's management efficiency.

The change should enable better regulating of lottery ticket sales and appropriate prices, he

As part of the government order issued on May 1, people caught selling overpriced lottery tickets will be subject to up to one month in prison and/or a fine of up to 10,000 baht, starting on June 16.

The current penalty is a fine of up to 2,000 baht.

Many lottery vendors in Chiang Mai said on May 3 that they disagreed with the order because they thought it was not tackling the problem at the root cause.

They also said that selling lottery tickets for 80 baht may result in no profit, meaning they may have to find other jobs.

PM warns of tough action against human traffickers

PRIME Minister Prayut Chan-ocha has warned of tough action against state officials linked to human trafficking, a government spokesman said on Tuesday.

The warning came as five graves, once believed to hold the remains of migrants from Myanmar and Bangladesh, were found at a jungle camp in an area bordering Malaysia.

No bodies were found in the graves.

The camp was uncovered just a kilometer from a similar 'holding area' on a steep hillside in the border district of Sadao in the Deep South province of Songkhla, where forensic teams found 26 bodies over the weekend – all but one buried in shallow graves, reported The Nation.

Royal Thai Police Commissioner Somyot Phumphanmuang confirmed the discovery of the mass grave on Friday, noting the area had been used as a detention center by human traffickers.

After the second camp discovery on Tuesday, administrators of all levels – villages, tambons and districts - were ordered to comb their areas of jurisdiction to see if there was any illegal camp to hold migrants, The Nation reported.

Deputy government spokesman Sansern Kaewkamnerd said officials would be moved out of their areas of jurisdiction as punishment if more cases of human trafficking were found.

"If there is any serious incident

like the one in Sadao district of Songkhla again, the officials involved will be moved out of their areas. It's because they failed to enforce the law," the spokesman said. "Any official found to accept bribes or make personal gains will face criminal as well as disciplinary actions."

He added officials believed to turn a blind eye to such illegal activity would be moved out of their area and severe disciplinary action would be taken against them.

"The government must use

strong medicine against all forms of crime," the spokesman said. "This is to get rid of the deeprooted evil from Thailand."

Separately, in the southern province of Phang Nga, Governor Prayoon Ratanaseni and Provincial Police Chief Chalit Kaewyarat led a team of local officials to inspect an area used as a jungle camp for Rohingya in Takua Pa district. They found a skeleton, believed to be of a Rohingya woman, buried in a Muslim funeral style (see page 7).

Meanwhile, national police chief General Somyot Poompunmoung on Tuesday issued an order to transfer 15 police officers in the south out of their areas of jurisdiction, in connection with the probe into the trafficking scandal.

The officers included Satun Police Chief Sunthorn Chalermkiat, and seven more police colonels, most of them from Padang Besar station, whose jurisdiction covers the area where the mass graves were found.

DNA evidence to be verified in Koh Tao murder case

A THAI court has allowed independent verification of the DNA evidence against two suspects in the beach murder of two British holidaymakers last year, officials said on April

Both suspects, Myanmar migrant workers Zaw Lin and Wai Phyo, appeared in court on April 30, reported The Nation.

The defence team has asked that several items of the prosecution's physical evidence be sent to the Justice Ministry's Central Institute of Forensic Science for reexamination.

The team also asked the Thai police to provide additional information to the court and defence concerning details of analysis of case DNA evidence.

Mr Zaw and Mr Wai were arrested in October and confessed to the crimes, but later withdrew their statements saying they were tortured.

British and Myanmar envoys both raised concerns about the Thai investigation, with London sending a police team as observers. The National Human Rights Commission of Thailand has also expressed concern about the alleged forced confessions. Thai police have denied the accusations of torture or misconduct.

The trial is scheduled to begin on July 8.



Gen Suwira said the police would present the request to the prosecutors within two weeks, reported The Nation.

More than 576 people have filed complaints against the UFUN Thailand scheme with a total damage of 152 million baht. Police have seized 800mn baht from the suspects and have sought co-operation from the Fiscal Policy Office to a file bankruptcy suit against them.

Gen Suwira said the police would take legal action, in accordance with anti-money laundering laws, against anyone who buys assets such as houses or cars from UFUN scheme suspects who want quick cash to flee the country and escape justice.

Turn them off, folks

BECAUSE I'm an anxious flier, I have always been overly aware of my surroundings while taking commercial flights.

With all the drama surrounding the ban of Thai carriers to Japan, South Korea and China following the United Nation's International Civil Aviation Organization audit, which found that Thailand's Department of Civil Aviation met only 21 out of 100 operational and safety requirements, I was curious to see how well the safety measures would be followed on board my small Thai carrier flights to and from Penang.

One thing I am always hyper aware of is the use of electronic devices. As a safety precaution, it is requested they not be used during takeoff or landing, so as not to interrupt the navigational equipment on board.

While the announcement is made in several languages to switch them off, I am constantly checking the people around me to see if they've complied. It's safe to say that there is always at least one person sitting nearby who needs to be reminded before takeoff.

Surprisingly, on my first flight, there was not one person within earshot who had to be reminded to do anything, whether it be returning seats and trays to their upright positions or buckling their safety belts.

I personally attribute it to the fact that the flight attendant, although nice, was not overly accommodating and rarely smiled.

Adversely, during my flights back to Phuket on a different carrier, the flight staff were extremely

kind and a little too accommodating. The first of two flights was not too bad. However, the second and final flight was absolutely ridiculous.

As we were accelerating down the runway, people were taking selfies, listening to music and texting. Their actions were difficult to miss because the dark cabin was lit up by screens.

Samak Luedwonghad, director of the Phuket Highways Office, replies:

Thank you for your question.

Please be aware that we have forbidden all two to three-wheeled, small vehicles from driving through the new Darasamuth underpass. As big bikes fall under this category, they will also not be permitted to use the underpass.

We have three lanes inside which provide enough room for cars only. It is dangerous for small, two to three-wheeled vehicles to drive through as there is no room for them.

Any such vehicles found passing through the underpass will be charged with 'breaking traffic regulations' and subject to a fine of up to 1,000 baht.

Please obey traffic laws and take note of warning signs outside of the tunnel. We are doing this for your safety.

Grave times

THE discovery of a mass grave of dozens of migrants from Myanmar and Bangladesh in Songkhla's Sadao District, on the border with Malaysia, this week screams urgency for the National Council for Peace and Order (NCPO) to use its extraordinary powers to turn the tide against human trafficking in the

The order by Prime Minister Gen Prayut Chan-o-cha to bring to justice any officials who were aware of the illegal activities at the detention camp must be enforced (see page 8).

Those responsible must be found guilty and face full justice under the law.

Any action less demanding would only trivialize the National Legislative Assembly (NLA) voting just six weeks ago to introduce life imprisonment and the death penalty in cases where human traffickers' victims had died.

The discovery of the mass grave in Sadao is the latest indication of the vast scale of human smuggling and trafficking throughout the Southern Thailand provinces.

Human rights advocates make a distinction between 'human smuggling', which takes place with the consent of the illegal immigrants, and 'human trafficking', cases in which intimidation, coercion, deception or force against victims take place. By all accounts, this latest atrocity qualifies as the latter.

With the Asean Economic Community (AEC) set to take effect at the end of the year, human trafficking continues to make a mockery of the bloc's intent to use 'increased cooperation in human resource development' to achieve economic integration and create a marketplace with increased global competitiveness.

The sad truth is that Asean's charter mandate of non-interference in any member state's internal affairs provides just the right environment for cross-border human trafficking of stateless people such as Rohingva to flourish in the region, with the victims being passed on as unskilled labor ripe for exploitation in what essentially amounts to a modern-day slave trade.

However, human-trafficking victims are hardly limited to ethnic groups such as the Rohingva. Phuket alone is home to untold thousands of stateless illegal aliens, many born on the island to

Many of these people were smuggled onto the island, delivered in the same manner as the 2008 'death truck' that left 54 Myanmar nationals dead from suffocation, including an 8-yearold girl, inside a seafood container bound for Phuket.

Those who survived are now often fluent in Thai and have children who have known no other home, yet exist as part of a growing underclass of stateless people throughout the Asean region.

Thailand needs to work with its Asean partners to address this threat to regional stability and not merely focus on ivory-tower economic development plans that will make the region's richest elites even wealthier.

Steal your Facebook



WITH the advent of social media and its meteoric rise in popularity, technology has grown at a rate much faster and in ways that the law has not been able to keep up with or envisage.

Platforms such as Facebook, Twitter, YouTube, LinkedIn, Instagram and Pinterest now have billions of users.

There are a couple of areas in

particular that should be of fundamental interest to business owners and people using social media for profit. These main issues focus around copyright and data protection laws, or more

and what can be done with it.

Many people may be surprised to know when they post content on many of the above named platforms they have given up many of their rights to the service provider, although they still own the copyright to original material.

For example, when you sign up for a Facebook account and agree to their terms and conditions you agree to 'a non-exclusive, transferable, sublicensable, royalty-free, worldwide license to use any IP content that you post on or in connection with Facebook.'

So in understandable terms what does this really mean?

Put simply, you are allowing Facebook to use your content as and how they like – and they can use it for free. Even more relevant, they are allowed to let all of their users (and this includes people that do not even have an account) do

So the reality is the moment you post any content on Facebook, you lose the privacy and control you originally had over it.

In practical terms what does this mean?

Once you have posted content on Facebook, you have given up most of your legal and commercial rights. When you see someone's post on Facebook you

have the opportunity to Like, Share or Comment. You have given implied consent to anyone that sees the post to use that information in any manner they want (as long as it is lawful), and you are

commonly, who owns the content not entitled to the expectation of privacy or reward.

> While we have focused on Facebook, the same applies to most of the social media providers.

YouTube is an example of where they even make it easy for other people to use your content. If you look at any YouTube video that is public, there is the Share tab. This allows any viewer to take your video and send it to others, and even place it on their own websites as if it were their own. They must not amend or tamper with your video, but they have a cost-free version of your content.

Instagram has gone a step further and has you agree in their terms and conditions that they can receive money for selling your content to third parties.

LinkedIn really takes the cake. Their terms allow them to "copy, prepare derivative works of, improve, distribute, publish, remove, retain, add, process, analyze, use and commercialize, in any way now known or in the future discovered..."

LinkedIn is saying they can use your content and ideas in whatever ways they can to make money, even in ways that have not even been thought of yet.

In short, once you post any content on social media, you pretty much lose your right to any expectation of privacy or payment.

While you do retain ownership, even if you try to delete the content in the future, it is like the proverbial genie, once it has been let out of the bottle it is virtually impossible to get it back in.

So, before you create a new account, it is worth checking the terms and conditions, and before you post on social media make sure you are not giving away the keys to the cookie jar.

Businesses turn to bloggers to draw in tech-savvy consumers

THE emergence of digital media not only offers tremendous opportunities for companies wanting to market their products, but can also create jobs for bloggers, some of which have become important links between brands and consumers.

Nuffnang Thailand cashed in on this idea when it built up a 'blog advertising community' years ago.

"New brands are created every day in the market. Each of those brands needs its own differentiation and uniqueness. Storytellers, therefore, are needed either for traditional communication or online conversation," explained Patcharah Sirikietsoong, executive director of Nuffnang Thailand.

Brands are being challenged by an array of uncontrollable risks on online platforms. Smart consumers are searching out and reading comments and product reviews on their hand-held devices before opening their wallets.

Mr Patcharah said bloggers provide answers for consumers, and brands are seeking specialists to help deliver messages to target

He added that Nuffnang Thailand currently managed around 1,000 bloggers, YouTube users, Facebook page managers and Instagrammers. Dealing with these talented people, the company expects to see at least 30-per-cent year-on-year growth in revenue.

The company acts as a business matcher between brands or companies and top bloggers. The agency must understand its clients' marketing strategy and demands and translate these requirements to the right bloggers and influencers to promote online marketing campaigns.

"We hope that our business can create new jobs for the advertising industry as Thai people have great talent in this regard," he said. - The Nation

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Ways expats lose money

Financial complexities in foreign countries can spell disaster

FINANCIAL problems, or losses, are often the major reason why expats are forced to return home or worst - end up stuck



somewhere they no longer want to be. If you don't want to end up in the same position as many failed expats, keep in mind

the following ways expats lose money abroad.

OFFSHORE INVESTMENT PRODUCTS

Investing in complex offshore products requires even more due diligence on your part than investing in 'normal' investment products in your home country, as additional due diligence may reveal extra risks.

For example, high interest rates are usually paid to compensate for risk, either because of what the product itself is invested in or because it's based in a jurisdiction with less financial regulation and oversight.

If you have trouble understanding even basic investment products like exchange traded funds, don't even think about investing in complex offshore investment products.

FOREIGN EXCHANGE RATES

Currency fluctuations and FX transaction fees are a fact of life for expats and you will probably find there are times when your income and living expenses in multiple currencies are moving in the wrong direction.

And while currency fluctuations and transaction fees can be managed or the risks minimized (such as maintaining accounts in multiple currencies so you are forced to draw on one for money at an inopportune time), be cautious trying to speculate or profit from currency movements as you will probably end up getting in or out at the

Likewise, you should also be extra cautious of investment products that force you to lock up your money in one currency for a long period of time or don't offer you much flexibility to get in or out quickly should the need arise.

BUDGETS

The need to live by strict budgets becomes imperative when living

You will need to deal with currency fluctuations and likely much higher rates of inflation - meaning you will need to track exchange rates and prices.

Failing to properly budget can easily mean you will end up spending significantly more than you need to.

REPATRIATING MONEY

If you are working abroad or have managed to earn a big capital gain in a currency other than that of your home country, you may have trouble repatriating your wealth out of your adopted country and back home, or into your home country's cur-

Many countries have or could institute strict capital controls (especially in times of crisis) while a negative currency movement could easily wipe out your capital gain

Don't forget about transaction fees or any exit taxes that you could be liable for.

PROPERTY

Buying or speculating on property might be commonplace in your home country, but buying property in a foreign country is a minefield, as the rules and regulations are inevitably much more complex and titles


In the worst case scenarios, you won't be able to sell the property or you may find yourself paying heavy taxes to multiple jurisdictions on any capital gain.

You also might have your losses disallowed for tax purposes.

TAXES

Depending upon your citizenship, you may have tax liabilities in both your home country and in any other country where you live or perform work.

If you are an American and thus subject



to worldwide taxation and disclosure requirements for foreign financial accounts, you will probably need to hire an accountant who specializes in expatriate tax preparation to avoid increasingly heavy fines and penalties for non-compliance.

FINANCIAL ADVISERS

As an expat, you will need to seek financial advice, ideally from a financial adviser who is independent and regulated.

Remember, while referrals are always a good way to find competent professional advisers, they aren't effective if the person making the referral failed to do his or her due diligence on the person first.

Bank of Thailand's Forex regulation changes draw mixed reviews

THERE are doubts over how much effect the Bank of Thailand's relaxation of foreignexchange regulations will have on the value of the baht, but there are some positive indications that the measures will facilitate overseas investment.

The new regulations have received approval in principle from the Finance Ministry.

Vallop Vitanakorn, vice chairman of the Thai National Shippers' Council, said the measures would provide more incentive for local companies to invest overseas, and that would lead to an outflow of US dollars, consequently depreciating the baht.

However, it would take some time for business operators to act on the new measures.

"The consecutive cuts of the

policy interest rate and the additional measures have so far pushed the baht further down to 33 per dollar, but I doubt it will [weaken] any further in the coming quarter. The depreciation will help close the gap in exchangerate competitiveness, but the currency is still on average 7 per cent stronger than [those of] our trade partners in the region," Mr Vallop said.

"Operators will need time to consider the new measures, while the depreciation of the baht also depends on the main trading currency [US dollar], which is on a downward trend from the poorer-than-expected US economic numbers in the first quarter."

economist and assistant vice president of its research department, said the BOT anticipated that the new measures would make the baht weaker, but the securities

firm expected that the measures would have only a 'limited impact' on the Thai currency.

"You can open more room but it does not guarantee that people will move into it," Mr Tim said.

He said Maybank's regional team had changed its prediction for the baht to be trading at 33 per dollar by the end of the third quarter to around 33.2 after the policy-rate cut on Tuesday, but the team now had decided to maintain its earlier prediction after the new measures have been

Pimonwan Mahujchariyawong, deputy managing director of Kasikorn Research Center, said many business operators were looking to expand overseas and the central bank's new measures were in

line with this trend.

The measures would also increase the pace of the baht's depreciation, but even so, Kasikornbank still believes that the currency will probably be in the 34-per-dollar region by the end of the year.

Pornsilp Patchrintanakul, adviser to the Board of Trade of Thailand and Thai Chamber of Commerce, said the relaxation was a positive measure that should help weaken the baht and benefit the export sector.

"Both the policy-rate cut and the central bank's relief measure on capital inflows should stimulate economic growth, as the export sector will perform better from a weakening baht, while domestic investment will also be stimulated," he said. - The Nation

Local tycoon family starts construction of resort-style residential development

DESPITE a nationwide slowdown in the property market, a new residential estate construction project is on track, according to the scion of a local tycoon family.

Boon Yongsakul, deputy managing director of Boat Development Company, said Hideaway@Bypass is up and

running as transfers of the company's first project near Bypass Road, Bypass Biz Town, are underway.

"We have about a thousand rai of land here and have a vision of turning it into a town," Mr Boon explained.

"We started selling around 60 Bypass Biz Town units in March and have almost sold out.

Let's say 99 per cent are gone, so the reception was much better than anticipated. Single houses sold best and we ourselves were surprised."

He said the company's success was due to "getting the mantra right with the location."

Mr Boon said the location of 200 meters off Bypass Road is

ideal for a resort-style residential estate.

"And the price point from 2.5 million baht for a townhouse, climbing to 12mn baht for a pool villa is easy on the pocket," he added.

Mr Boon said the residential estate will eventually occupy about 15 rai and comprise 60 pool villas, houses, twin houses and

townhouses with an investment of 450mn baht.

Although Thais living in and around Phuket are the primary target, foreign buyers have purchased 10 to 20 per cent of the units. Mr Boon said Boat Dev e l o p m e n t Company has established a new department, Boat Assessment Management,

which will provide maids and gardeners to maintain units for off-site owners.

"We have asset management as a support service because this is a long-term investment in building up our brand," Mr Boon explained.

Mr Boon's plans for the future include a furniture and housing



Streamline EIA process: developers

ENVIRONMENTAL impact assessment approvals should be streamlined, as residential projects worth more than 600 billion baht are waiting for EIA permits, property-industry players say.

If the EIA committee sped up its approval process, it would be a significant boost to the economy as condominium construction could get under way, Pruksa Real Estate president and chief executive officer Thongma Vijitpongpun told *The Nation*.

He said property firms wanting to develop condo projects had to wait eight to 12 months for an EIA permit after submitting their applications, and these companies had to bear significant costs before they could launch the projects on to the market.

Atip Bichanond, president of the Housing Business Association, said the problem was that EIA applications were not considered according to objective standards but were granted or rejected based on the personal judgements of the

EIA committee members.

No set timeline for EIA approval exists; some projects are approved within four months while others must wait 13 months. Meanwhile, the property firms are bearing costs for land they cannot do anything with, he said.

Thai Condominium Association president Prasert Taedullayasatit said that on average there were 500-600 EIA applications a year for condo or hotel projects, but the average approval rate was only 400 a year.

That means an annual shortfall of 100-200 approvals.

According to the Office of Natural Resources and Environmental Policy and Planning (OEPP), it approved EIA permits for 586 of the 3,994 projects proposed in the fiscal year ending on September 30, 2014.

Meanwhile, the Environmental Impact Evaluation Bureau under the OEPP says it has tried to solve the delay by revising the EIA rules and decentralizing the process.

At present, all EIA applications are handled by the central OEPP office, but this will change in September, Environmental Impact Evaluation Bureau director Piyanant Soponthanaporn said early this year. An amendment to the relevant legislation will localize EIA approvals.

If the decentralization is effective, the approval process may be faster, Prasert said. However, the rules governing EIA approvals also need to be revised and standardized, he added. — *The Nation*

"Often, it's easier to find critters and appreciate their wonderful colors in the more 'pure' focused light of the torches, without the overwhelming blue-green of sunlight. Colorful feather stars, for instance, are amazing to watch at night, whereas you'd often just swim past them on a day dive," said Vince, who seems to

spend just as much time nose deep in marine-animal identification books as he does in the water.

"Reefs come cracking and popping to life at night, so to sit and watch the heightened activity of life underwater can be an amazing experience."

A heightened appreciation is one thing, but some of the animals that actually show up on the dive are the real selling points.

For unseasoned divers, there are a lot of

'firsts', even outside of **Diving** the crustacean world, which rule the waters at night. Cuttlefish, sting rays, octopi, sleeping

parrot fish and various species of moray eels are not too uncommon. Even for divers who have far surpassed the triple-digit mark, there can be a few opportunities for first sightings of robust ghost pipefish, ornate ghost pipefish, frog fish and bumblebee squid, as well as unusual nudibranchs and flatworms.

Even more exiting are the fish that you can't identify (see photo, center). This longchinned fish was camouflaged against a

> However, what next season will bring will remain a mystery, at least for the next few months.


The Kata Beach dive site of the 2013-2014 season is different than the site of the season we are wrapping up now. What appears to be an increase in water pollution rolling in from the canal at the north end of the beach has changed the biological landscape. The seahorses, which

were being spotted regularly out in the sand and the sea grass beds, were mostly gone by the middle of the season. In their place a number of different sea creatures, including a variety of sea cucumbers, crawled in.

"I would expect pollution levels to subside a little during this 'low season' and hope that more seahorses return at least for a while, until 'high season' tourist numbers cause pollution to increase again. There are annual patterns anyway, warm and cold

Yoga above the rest

AERIAL yoga, widely known as 'antigravity' yoga or 'flying yoga', is now available in Phuket, as it takes Asia, Australia and the rest of the world by

storm. The incredibly new form of yoga, the first classes reportedly being taught by Michelle Dortignac in New York City in 2006, takes adaptations of traditional yoga poses, and combines them with the circus art of aerial silks to create a playful, challenging and rewarding practice.

"It's really just started taking off in the last year or so, and it's not just here, it's everywhere... everyone is doing aerial yoga," says Kim White, who has been teaching yoga on Phuket for the past six years, and now teaches aerial yoga at Yoga Connections in Chalong.

Unlike many traditional forms of yoga, aerial yoga demands a great deal from the studio, including sturdy ceiling anchors to hang the hammocks from. However, it was an investment that Yoga Connections saw worthy of the fun and health benefits that can be derived from the practice.

The hammocks and anchor points can support the weight of

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Serving Indian soul food

THE dishes served up by Spice Box's chef, Savita Sriram, are the Indian version of the Southern American soul food that makes New Orleans a must-stop destination on any foodie's travels they are simply everything you want from Indian food and nothing you expect.

"We are not a fancy restaurant. We are not tandoori chefs. We are none of that; we don't claim to be," says Chef Sriram with the air of an old friend. "We give good solid food. The kind of food that if you travel anywhere in India, you will find in a small, little restaurant.

"The kind of food you eat in a big restaurant, that's not the kind of food you would eat at home at all. You can't eat like that, that heavy creamy stuff. This is what we eat on a daily basis. And that's what we want to introduce to people."

The funky, little Indian restaurant nestled into one of the many industrial storage containers of Phuket's Boat Avenue serves up truly authentic, home-style dishes, which means patrons, who quickly become friends of the owners - Chef Sriram and Sonu Kapoor of Events International – have to re-adjust what they think about when they think Indian food.

"In India, 'curry' means many things, it means vegetable, as well as meat. It just means a preparation, a dish. So even aloo gobi is a curry, though traditionally for the western palate it's different because it's dry like a stir fry, but in India it's a curry."

Though aloo gobi, which is basically spicy potatoes and cauliflower, is nothing like the curry found in Europe, it has quickly be-

come a crowd favorite at Spice Box, explains Chef Sriram. However, this doesn't mean everything prepared in an Indian kitchen is a curry. Kebabs, and samosa are different, but if you eat it with rice or *naan*, then it's a curry.

Because Indian curries have travelled the world, they are very different things to different people. In British cuisine a lamb roganjosh The aloot chat is not to be overlooked. is a spicy, bright-red curry. However, because Spice Box serves home-style cooking, it's a very mild curry – even for a foreigner.

"So we do kind of like a mix. Because it's home cooking, it's not very spicy, but I add spice for people who would like it. However, when it's made in its pure form, it's



actually not spicy," explains the chef. Chef Sriram, originally from Bombay – yes, when she was liv-

ing there last it was still Bombay – also serves up a traditional southern curry.

"This has mustard seeds. They have quite a sharp bite, a bitter bite. And this curry leaf, that's a very

specific herb, very specific to southern India," she says. "And it doesn't grow here. So we've actually both brought our plants back from India and nurtured them over the years – so it's very precious that curry leaf, but it imparts a very subtle, beautiful aroma and taste."

Though Spice Box plates up more mild dishes than are eaten in other Indian restaurants in Phuket, it does spice it up a bit. Moving away from a true homecooked meal, which would usually only have a few spices, such as coriander, and fresh ingredients such as ginger, garlic, lime and chili, Chef Sriram incorporates garam masala in almost every dish.

"You roast the cloves, cinnamon, star anise, peppercorns, cardamom (green and black pods) - there are about seven different spices – and make a powder, and that's called garam masala. Garam means hot, as in warm, because it creates a heat within your body. Masala basically means 'spice mix'," Chef Sriram says.
"It's all the spices that people

came to India for. This was basically the reason India was colonized.

"We had all these spices, and they were traded like gold," she says with a big laugh. "And now, we just use them willy-nilly everywhere."


With a customer base that tips the scales at about 80 per cent returning customers, Spice Box is looking to keep the buzz going in Boat Avenue along with the help of Events International. Co-owner of Spice Box, Sonu, will be roping off an area on May 30 and setting the stage for international renown, American standup comedian Tom Rhodes.

The Evening News describes Tom as, "brash, abrasive, but exceptionally funny!" while Edinburgh Festival says, "Highly recommended, if you want a fast thinking razor sharp and above all - irreverently funny show."

Though the colorful, open-air restaurant might seem like an odd venue for an American comedian, who has taken the New York City stage for Comedy Central Presents, it is in fact a perfect match – as long as it doesn't rain.

At the heart of it, the food, the show and the people behind putting it all together, are the souls of community builders, who are bringing new tastes, spectacles and edgy comedy to our little part of the world.

Message comes second When messages in media reflect view of writer rather than reality


On Your Mind

I FIRST became skeptical about the print media 20 years ago when my family (wife, son, and daughter) were returning to the United States from a trip to Peru. We flew out of Lima and arrived in Houston, Texas, where I picked up a copy of that day's New York Times, which included a story about political unrest in Peru.

Reading the story, which sounded an alarm about a serious political protest in the capitol city, I was struck by how at odds the report was with what I had actually seen and learnt in that country. The protest I had seen in Lima was a small orderly affair and few of the people with whom I had spoken in Peru seemed much concerned with the current government there. What I realized upon reading the overblown *Times* story was that the reporter – likely the only foreign US correspondent covering matters in Peru - had needed to pump up the story in order to get it published. What I had seen and learnt in Lima was certainly not newsworthy, at least not on an international scale.

When I lived in China for three years (2009-2012), I frequently wrote commentaries for the English-language newspapers the Global Times and China Daily. In

addition, I authored an awardwinning web column for China Daily for a year. Unlike some Western journalists, I generally felt that the Chinese press treated many subjects fairly and objectively, albeit with glaring blind spots and 'off limits' topics.

Now that I have lived in Thailand for a couple of years, I still peruse Chinese sources, particularly for news about Thailand.

It was disappointing to read an op-ed recently in the Global Times, 'US interference in Thailand leaves country in mess and hinders change,' (March 10) that exaggerates US influence here.

While it is true that a US State department official recently criticized the current military government for its slow movement in implementing its promise of democracy here, it's hardly the case that the country has been left in a mess or even that the comments will hinder change.

The Global Times op-ed headline, like the story I read many years ago in The New York Times, simply misrepresented what was happening, likely as a way to attract and provoke readers.

But China's media has a more endemic problem than an occasional inflated headline. Because the media is an arm of the government, it cannot call that government to task. Nearly as damaging as that disability is the perception that the Chinese media never acts independently and that even op-eds represent the government's official position.

For example, four years ago, the American magazine, The Atlantic, accused the Global Times of launching a propaganda war

against a small Maine town based on an op-ed that cautioned Chinese parents to think twice about sending their children to a public high school in Maine at a cost of US\$24,000 (798,900 baht) per year. The Atlantic accused the newspaper of serving "as a regime tool to flatter the Communist Party and to assail its enemies."

In response to The Atlantic criticism of the Global Times, an editor at that newspaper wrote that his newspaper had chosen to publish the freelance submission "because we thought it was interesting, like virtually all of our original English-language opinion pieces. It had nothing to do with any political agenda."

The op-ed, which I had written, was the same type of advice I would have given as a former public high school teacher to anyone living outside the US considering sending a child to that Maine school.

I had done some background research on the school and it was a run-of-the-mill school trying to bolster sagging enrollments and financial difficulties with a clever overseas recruitment strategy.

I'm pretty sure I wasn't the victim of a subliminal brainwashing scheme intended to inculcate socialist values in the masses, but unfortunately, sometimes the message plays second fiddle to the

Make sure you get enough 'D'

ONE in every three Thai working people has a vitamin D deficiency, while 64.6 per cent of adults in Bangkok face Vitamin D insufficiency leading to increased risk of health problems in the long term, according to a leading expert.

Vitamin D insufficiency is caused by insufficient sun exposure, primarily as a result of long hours inside the office and concern about skin damage from sun exposure. The statistics were unveiled at the "Have you got enough D?" event, held by Roche Diagnostics (Thailand), which aimed to raise awareness about the benefits of Vitamin D,

"Vitamin D is known as the sunshine vitamin. The recent study found that one in every three, or 36.5 per cent, of Thai people had vitamin D serum lower than 20ng/ mL, which is defined as a deficiency. The lowest level of vitamin D in the blood of the sample group was 9.95 ng/ml. Even in Thailand, a country with abundant levels of sunshine, a large percentage of the Thai population is at risk of low vitamin D levels, especially Bangkok residents who spend long hours sheltered from sunlight,' says Dr Sant Chaivodsilp of Phyathai 2 International Hospital.

"Common pollutants in the air also decrease the amount of UV rays reaching the skin, hence reducing the opportunity for the skin to produce vitamin D. Worldwide, it is estimated that 1 billion people have vitamin D deficiency or insufficiency."

Vitamin D is produced by the skin via its absorption of UV rays and also occurs naturally in a few foods, among them certain fish, fish liver oils, and egg yolks, as well as in fortified dairy and grain products. At higher risk of vitamin D

deficiency are dark-skinned people, the overweight and the elderly, menopausal females, pregnant women, lactating mothers and those who adhere to a vegan diet.

In addition to insufficient sun exposure, further factors include ingesting fewer vitamin D-rich foods, intake of anticonvulsant or steroid medicine for long periods, and absorption problems.

"Vitamin D has taken a back seat to vitamin C and many do not realize the vital role it plays in their health," Dr Sant continues.

High vitamin D levels protect against such auto-immune diseases as rheumatoid arthritis and Type 1 Diabetes, while a sufficient vitamin D level lowers cardiovascular risks including hypertension and the hardening of artery walls.

In addition, researchers have pointed out the correlation between high Vitamin D levels with decreased risks of breast, colorectal and prostate cancer.

"I urge Thai people to take vitamin D deficiency seriously. The first step is for people to have their vitamin D level tested because deficiency can occur even in people who consume rich Vitamin D food or take supplements," said Dr Sant. - The Nation

Life & style House and Garden Dog days, damp plants



AS THE poet W.H. Auden once observed, "Thousands have lived without love, not one without water."

That adage is equally applicable to the plants in your garden, though loving your charges and watering them are part and parcel of the same impulse. Now, after three months without rain, Phuket's gardeners are all prioritizing their use of the world's most precious commodity.

Personally, and since I have no functioning well, I have decided to let the grass turn brown and sere in the expectation that a good downpour – or three – will restore its verdancy. The same principle applies to established trees: their deep root systems should ensure their survival.

Container plants, however, still have to be watered on a daily basis: that is to say everything growing in ceramic pots apart from cacti, succulents and desert shrubs, such as euphorbias and adeniums. As for the rest, and granted a continuation of these xeric conditions, without daily applications from the hose or watering can, they will first wilt, then shed foliage and finally expire.

Which brings me to marshloving flora. Not the ones recently discussed in these columns: plants which actually live in water with submerged roots like nymphaea, lotuses, papyrus, water cannas, reed mace, or the flotilla of tropical floaters such as water hyacinths, water chestnuts and water lettuce. With all of these, just top up their pots with more liquid, and maybe add a fertilizer tablet for good measure. They should be fine.

Plants whose leaves require fresh air to breathe and whose roots sit in moistened soil present a different problem. To keep them going means heavier applications of water than is required by the rest of your land-locked collection. Sitting in shady surroundings will help to limit both water loss through transpiration and the drying out of roots, but they will still need irrigation.

When I first planted my garden - 'designed' is too grand a word – I put in *alocasias* (elephant ears) to provide some shade, and both canna lilies and heliconias. The idea was that the elephant ears, large specimens garnered from marshy, jungle waste conditions that my garden simply

ground, would provide instant shade for less robust neighbors. It worked well enough in the rainy season, but once the monsoon was over they started to struggle beneath the harsh tropical sun. After all, they are rainforest understorey plants that require the kind of humid, somewhat cooler did not possess at the time. Now, years on, I have one alocasia left. It has survived, a specimen fully 10 feet tall, because it is next to a sizable tree and, more important, gets a daily dose of water in the form of run-off from the outdoor shower.

And there's the rub. If you want to grow cannas, alocasias or heliconias, in fact most rainforest understory denizens or bog-loving plants, you will need either a consistently damp, shady area, or an unenclosed pond or canal which allows plants to thrive at its muddy margins. An ordinary flower bed just won't fit the bill.

I recall my neighbor who, blessed with a soil-filled trough the length of his outside wall, planted rows of heliconias. An area in full sun and with a limited depth of soil, it proved too much for them. Within a year they had been replaced with orange ixoras, a tough shrub with leathery leaves that will take any amount of heat. Right now, three months into the drought, they are still blooming. I should add that my canna lilies, similarly misplaced, went the same way as the neighbor's heliconias.

There is a further distinction to be made between understorey plants that simply need moist roots and high humidity, and those that, in the wild, occupy the zone between land and water, thrive at watery margins and can cope with waterlogged environments. Many irises – for example versicolor, laevigata, and the yellow flag pseudacorus - flourish in such conditions, as do gunnera, swamp milkweeds and most varieties of juncus (rush), sedge (carex) and

It's all about horses for courses. Selecting the right plant for the right location is half the battle.

Did I say battle? I mean make love, not war, at least with your plants.

Tip of the Week Growing galangal

EVERYONE knows the familiar taste and appearance of root ginger, but galangal (alipinia galanga) is not so well known outside Asia. But to Thais, kha is just as important, and the sour soup called tom yam would be unthinkable without it. What's more, it comes from the same zingiber family. The rhizomes are less knobbly, and a paler pink than those of ginger, but there is no mistaking their extreme and unique spiciness. It is too pungent to

Galangal is very easy to grow. The quickest way is to put a couple of roots directly into fertile, moist soil, with the reddish stems protruding above ground. These rhizomes are always available in your local fresh market.

It grows fast and does best in partial shade; my plant has stems fully six feet high. And you can split the roots up for the cooking pot, or to start a new plant.

Kingdom's Cup runneth over

LOCAL sailors Scott Duncanson and Alfie Rowson, and their fellow *Kingdom Property* crew David Chapman, Trent Pedersen and Tony Harman, have won the Coronation Cup 2015.

In doing so, they have become the first crew to successfully defend the title in the event's 19-year history.

The four-day Coronation Cup was held as part of the Top of the Gulf Regatta, raced at Ocean Marina Yacht Club in Pattaya, starting last weekend and culminating with the final day of racing on the Coronation Day public holiday on Tuesday.

Kingdom was slow out of the blocks, Duncanson admitted, placing fourth in the first race of the series.

The crew managed third place in the second race of the day, and then closed the first day of racing with a first-place bullet.

"It was a conservative and careful start," Duncanson said. "The conditions were 'superlight winds', which were very tricky, but the breeze picked up to about seven knots on day two, and we started getting our groove on."

And that they did, finishing first in all five races held over the next two days.

Two races were held on the final day, and *Kingdom Property* required only 10th place or better in one of the two outings to claim

overall victory and defend their title.

But a poor second-row start by *Kingdom* sparked a rally from tactician Chapman, who guided the team through the fleet and with some impressive upwind boat speed, *Kingdom* rounded the first mark of the windward-leeward course in second place.

From there, the team steadily consolidated their position, passing the Hong Kong crew led by Andrew Moore and Jonno Rankine aboard *Wicky* on the second

and final lap to take a convincing overall points victory and not even need to start the final race. Such was *Kingdom's* dominance throughout the regatta, the crew

amassed a tally of just 16 points – after scoring maximum points for not even contesting the final race.

In comparison, the much respected crew of Chris Way on *Easy Tiger IV* massed a tally of 28 points to place second overall.

Duncanson, who has now won the Coronation Cup a record five times – in 2008, 2010, 2012, 2014 and now 2015 – was full of praise for his crew.

"The defence of the title has been our goal for the past 12 months," he said.

"As always, our boat preparation was second to none and with some new sails, speed and tuning tips from David [Chapman], we worked hard on areas where we had been previously a little weak, which really brought the whole boat and crew package together."

The 7.5 meter Platu class yacht was designed specifically for Thai waters by world renowned yacht designer Bruce Farr in the early 1990s and continues its global success offering affordable one-design racing in New Zealand, Asia and Europe.

With more than 20 boats based in Thailand, the Platu racing division remains one of the Kingdom's most competitive one-design sailing classes.

"I'm often asked what was the deciding factor in regatta victories, but there are so many variables in yacht racing it's impossible to single any one thing out," Duncanson explained.

"What I can say is that the *Kingdom Property* crew put in an almost-flawless performance on and off the water, and approached the regatta with the utmost professionalism. I'm very proud to be part of this team.

"It's not often a one-design regatta is won by such a large margin, especially at this level, so defending the title so convincingly makes it a very special achievement—It's hard to believe ... and it's still taking Some time to sink in."



Ronins draw in Krabi showdown

PHUKET FC missed their chance to climb into third place on the Yamaha League One football table when bayside rivals Krabi FC scored a late equalizer at Surakul Stadium to force a 1-1 draw last Saturday.

Mayweather runs away with fight of the century

IN A hotly anticipated match-up of contrasting styles, Floyd Mayweather's defensive brilliance trumped Manny Pacquiao's all-out attack as the American eked out a unanimous decision over the Filipino on May 3.

Time and again, Mayweather bobbed and weaved out of harm's way to leave Pacquiao punching thin air in a welterweight showdown at the MGM Grand Garden Arena that was no classic, but is expected to be the richest bout of all time.

"I knew he was going to push it, I knew he was going to win some rounds," Mayweather said ringside after improving his career record as a professional to 48-0.

"He had moments in the fight, but I kept him on the outside. I was a smart fighter. I outboxed him. I wasn't getting hit with a lot of shots until I sat right there in the pocket, that's when he would land a lot of shots."

Mayweather is regarded as one of the best defensive fighters of all time and he relied on those

skills, along with timely counterpunching, to earn the vote of all three judges in what is expected to be a record-shattering payday of US\$180 million.

F1 unable to gain traction in pulling female brands

WHEN Claire Williams was appointed vice-principal of the Williams Formula One team, she hoped her promotion and the presence of Susie Wolff as test driver might open the door to an untapped market.

With women making up some 40 per cent of the audience, it seemed a good time to approach brands more interested in female consumers than the average petrolhead.

The response was hardly deafening: "I said [to the Williams sponsorship people] 'Let's go out there, let's really go hard at female brands'. And not one of them [brands] was interested," Williams, who was appointed deputy to her father Frank in 2013, told Reuters.

Formula One has become more inclusive – some eight per cent of Williams' engineers are women and has come a long way from the days when the sport was sponsored by oil, beer, cigarettes and even men's magazines and prophylactics.

While Formula One supremo Bernie Ecclestone is convinced that a woman racer would be a commercial boost for the series, getting one who really excites the fans – and sponsors – has been the problem.



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
