

Aussie haunted by violent child abuse fights back to inspire world

A GREAT white shark knocked Damien Rider from his paddle board during one of eleven shark encounters he faced as he paddled 800 kilometers from Rainbow Bay, Gold Coast to Bondi Beach, Sydney in January 2015.

However, the demon that he was battling wasn't below the ocean's surface, but in the vivid world of abuse that he endured as a child.

Now, 33 years after he was first scarred by the violence of his mother's boyfriend, he is doing everything in his power to raise awareness of child abuse throughout the world.

Mr Rider's latest effort lands him in Phuket, where he is training at Phuket Cleanse before embarking on a circumnavigation of the island – a four-day journey by standup paddle board – for his self-funded organization: Paddle Against Child Abuse (PACA).

While training, Mr Rider is also sharing his story with many students on the island, such as those at Phuket International Academy.

"From the age of six my mom's boyfriend came to live with us. I never grew up with a father, so he was the only man who came into the house," Mr Rider said.

"My introduction to him was him beating police on the front lawn and then coming in and bashing my mom and then...

Tourists saved from sinking speedboat

MORE than a dozen Chinese tourists and a speedboat crew were safely rescued after their boat sank near Koh Kai last weekend.

The 16 tourists were on their way to Phi Phi from Phuket when their speedboat, *Papangkorn*, struck an unknown object causing the boat to take on water, Phuket Marine Police Chief Panya Chaichana said.

A speedboat that had been following the *Papangkorn* was called upon to help rescue the tourists, tour guide, boat captain and crew.

The captain of *Papangkorn* confirmed that all tourists had been wearing their life jackets.

Illegal fishing vessel targeted internationally

THE ongoing search for the illegal, unreported and unregulated (IUU) fishing vessel that slipped through the fingers of Phuket officials earlier this month is now the subject of an international pursuit, confirmed Sayan Prasongsamrej, commander of the Royal Thai Navy Third Area Command.

"As soon as we received the report that the vessel had gone missing, we began an aerial search in the south, where we believe the vessel may have gone," said Vice Admiral Sayan.

"The vessel was under investigation regarding its registration, so the crew were not in police custody. They were just mooring like any other ordinary cargo ship."

Air pollution warning lifted

OFFICIALS lifted an air quality health warning for the island on September 20, after the haze caused by Indonesian wildfires began to decrease.

"Air pollution levels dropped to an average of 94 micrograms per cubic meter for the last 24-hour period," Pornsri Suthanarak, director of the Regional Environmental Office, said on September 21.

That weekend, air pollution on the island maintained levels above the public safety standard of 120 micrograms per cubic meter.

Stinky shroom to bring good luck, says local

LOCALS believe that the rare 'stinky squid' mushroom they discovered in a jasmine pot after making merit in Chalong on September 20 will bring them good luck.

"It looked so weird to me: it was like a squid and smelt very, very bad," said Wichut Lakban. "There were even flies buzzing around it all the time."

Ms Wichut sent photos of the funky fungi to the Kusoldharm Foundation, who then passed them on to an officer at the Khao Phra Thaeo Wildlife Sanctuary, who confirmed that it was a specimen of *Pseudocolus fusiformis*, a stinkhorn mushroom most commonly known as the 'stinky squid', which is rarely found in Phuket.

Big budget set to fix Patong's flooding woes

A BUDGET of 420 million baht has been approved by the Public Works Department to help alleviate flooding in Patong.

"Four flood-protection methods will be put into place from 2016 through 2018," Patong Mayor Chalermluck Kebsub told the *Gazette*.

The department is now working with municipality officials on surveying, planning and designing the new systems, which include a retaining wall man-made ponds, shortcut drains and a sluice gate.

Excavation of mountains around Patong is a main source of excess water reaching the already low-lying area.

"The excavation of mountains is like making wounds on them. When water comes down, there is no surface to absorb the water or slow it down," Ms Chalermluck said.

Two of Philippines' 'most wanted' arrested in Phuket

Joel T Reyes and his brother Mario Reyes were arrested in Phuket on September 19, according to a *Philippine Daily* Inquirer police source.

The source, an official of Task Force Usig, the tracker group assigned to catch bigname fugitives from the Philippines, said that the Reyes brothers had long been

wanted for the slaving of Palawan environmentalist and journalist Gerry Ortega. The task force was in close coordination with the Thai police, who are holding the brothers before deportation, the source added.

In 2012, President Aquino offered a 2-million-peso (about 1.54mn baht) reward for the arrest of the 'Big Five' including the Reyes brothers, Army Maj

Gen Jovito Palparan, Globe Asiatique developer Delfin Lee and former Dinagat Island Representative Ruben Ecleo Jr.

Four of the five high-profile fugitives have been arrested. Only Mr Ecleo remains on the

The arrests were confirmed by the victim's wife, Patty Ortega, who told the Inquirer that she had been officially in-

Ortega's daughter, Mica, said in a radio interview that the family was initially 'stunned' and would not believe the news

Ms Mica added that they felt relief that justice could continue with the trial of the alleged masterminds.

Roads safer because of local men

FOUR local men used money from their own pockets to help fix dangerous sections of the bypass road near the Samkong underpass construction site on September 17.

Kanin Raksaraj, Jiradet Sawatjan, Somsak Juapsri and Suthisak Srikong bought two bags of asphalt, costing 350 baht, to fix the road.

We have seen so many accidents occur over and over again on the bypass road because of its condition. We haven't seen much action taken by the construction company or local authorities. If we don't do it, who will?" Mr Kanin asked the Gazette.

On August 30, a group of locals protested and submitted a formal letter of complaint to the governor about the dangerous road conditions along the construction

"After the protest, I have only seen a few changes. They did place more lights on the road at the construction site. However, after a few days, they disappeared. The holes also have yet to be fixed. I

can't stand seeing people getting hurt because of this," Mr Kanin said.

The four plan to continue fixing the road on Sunday when there is less traffic.

'We are happy to spend the

money if it can help save lives,' Mr Kanin said.

Mr Kanin and his three friends have expressed their gratitude to the public for the positive feedback.

New six-month multiple-entry tourist visa

IN A move to boost tourism and drive the economy, Thailand has officially announced that it will start offering six-month multiple-entry tourist visas (METV) starting November 13.

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs' official website notes that the visas will cost 5,000 baht and will grant travellers multiple entries during a six-month stay, for up to 60 days per entry.

Santi Pawai, director of the Ministry of Tourism and Sports (MOTS) Phuket Office, said that he can see huge benefits for Thailand with the implementation of METVs. However, he cautioned that with the new visas, security should also be tightened.

"I have yet to receive any official orders as to what action the MOTS should take," said Mr Santi.

Expert says plastic bag possibly killed dolphin

A STRIPED dolphin found washed up on Nai Yang Beach on September 15 most likely died from the consumption of a plastic bag, explained marine

"It was about 15 years old, 2.45 meters long and approximately 90 kilograms. It had a wound near its eye," said Patcharaporn Gaewmong, a Phuket Marine Biological Center (PMBC) veterinarian. "The results from blood samples we took showed that it died from a blood infection.'

Veterinarians have yet to determine the exact illness.

"In most cases where dolphins have these symptoms, they have usually eaten a plastic bag that they mistook as a jellyfish," Dr Patcharaporn said.

"Clear plastic bags thrown

in the sea by a human can look very similar to a jellyfish, and dolphins love eating jelly fish. The plastic bag will affect the intestines and, if they do not receive any treatment, they will

Dr Patcharaporn noted that plastic bags and other rubbish are often thrown into the sea by people on tour boats.

Police expect new governor to tackle alleged Surin Beach encroachment Inspiring

Tipayapongtada, who will be the governor of Phuket as of October 1, to strongly back their efforts to evict a number of Surin Beach clubs and businesses that are allegedly encroached on public land.

"I don't think it will take long once the new governor takes charge. He was previously a vice governor for the province and use to take a very strong stance on issues concerning public land," said Lt Col Rassada Kleungwong of the Cherng Talay Police. "I believe he will wrap this up quickly."

Mr Chamroen, however, hesitated to make any comment on the matter when speaking to the Gazette last week.

"I've yet to take up my position as governor in Phuket. Currently, Governor Nisit Jansomwong is in charge. I think it might not be appropriate for me to voice my

ideas about the island yet," Mr Chamroen said. "I will be taking my position there on October 1 and will then be able to answer such questions.'

Nonetheless, in June last year, Mr Chamroen declared Surin Beach 'beautiful again' during an official inspection following the dismantling of illegal beach structures.

Lt Col Rassada explained that due to the size of the issue, the Cherng Talay Police were in the process of setting up a committee with officers from other stations throughout the island to develop a plan to present to Phuket Police Commander Patchara Boonyasit.

Eight businesses, including some of Phuket's famous beach clubs, already have cases in court, while 31 businesses are still under investigation, Col Rassada said.

...grabbing us and throwing us.

'It happened week after week. All the time I would just have to brace myself."

The rest of Mr Rider's childhood was filled with more abuse and constant attempts to flee it: sleeping in rock caves and under jetties - anywhere that he could escape to.

"The problem is that the bruises go away, but the emotional scarring lasts a lifetime, which is where the post traumatic stress disorder [PTSD] comes in. With PTSD, things from everyday life trigger those emotions from back then and

puts you back in that space.

"I was on a roller coaster of life really, just going through drugs, alcohol, everything to try and suppress the feelings and the emotions, the memories and just the visuals that come into your head.

"I had created successful businesses and I had tried every way to make myself happy by making money and that didn't work," Mr Rider said.

Prapan Kanprasang However, the tipping point came when Mr Rider opened up to someone about his childhood and didn't get the response he needed.

"After going through many years of it, I had a breakdown and considered suicide as a final option to stop the pain and thoughts from my childhood."

Instead, Mr Rider realized that he needed to face PTSD head-on so that he could perhaps someday inspire past and present victims to speak out

"I knew I was making a conscious decision to break the barriers and break the cycle I was in," Mr Rider said.

That's when Mr Rider, who had been a lifelong skateboarder and surfer, took to prone paddle boarding, spending hours in physical pain, completely alone in the ocean, as he propelled himself forward with only his hands. But swelling up with that physical pain

was the emotional pain of his childhood.

"It was pretty tough on me at the start, plus you are out in the open ocean, feeling quite vulnerable. There is no protection, no security blankets, just you and the ocean. Anything can happen and you just have to kind of go with it.

"Once I found my peace, or I thought I had, I decided to do my paddle to inspire victims. I had thought about doing things for kids before, but thought it would be hypocritical, because I hadn't found my peace.'

In a media stunt to raise awareness for his organization PACA and to start real dia-

logues about child abuse and its many forms in Australia, Mr Rider took on the unassisted 800km paddling trip.

The furthest I'd ever paddled before was 40 kilometers, and here I was about to paddle 800km alone," says Mr Rider, who broke three world records on his epic voyage.

"Once I finally got into Bondi, I realized for the first time in my life that I had found peace

Child abuse can be found everywhere in the world including Australia and Thailand, Mr Rider pointed out.

Many children in Thailand are victims of physical or sexual violence or abuse. Many of these cases are never reported, as the children are afraid of reprisal and still don't have access to the infrastructures that help them report them, Humanium, an international child sponsorship NGO, states on its website.

A 2002 study cited by United Nations Children's Fund in the 2012 report Child Maltreatment: Prevalence, Incidence and Consequences in East Asia and the Pacific found that 30.3 per cent of 212 polled, grade six students reported experiencing physically violent acts from both parents. Another cited study from 2010 found

that 16.7 per cent of 1,052 Bangkok residence between 16 and 25 reported experiencing physical abuse as a child.

Many types of physical abuse go unreported, especially those associated with punishment, notes Humanium.

"In this situation, the children consider the abuse as a punishment and try to hide their pain because they feel guilty for misbehaving. For that reason, children comply with that situation, believing that it is a normal part of their life," the Humanium website states.

However, child abuse often goes beyond physical violence in the more damaging realms of mental and emotional abuse, Mr Rider explained.

Phuket children are most at risk to these types of abuses, explained Urai Maidukem, of the Phuket Shelter for Children and Families on Koh Sireh.

'Nowadays, children are left alone at home, or handed over to caretakers while their parents are at work. These children do not receive enough love or family time," Ms Urai said.

"We don't see a lot of chil-

dren in Phuket being physically abused. However, regular violent confrontations between parents can have deeply scarring affects on children – more so than direct physical violence."

Issues within families are derived from complicated situations that are not helped by social media, which often alienates children and parents from each other, Ms Urai said.

"Each family has it's own unique problems and we cannot always get to the root of it. We lend our hand and it sometimes ends with us mediating a discussion among family members. However, this doesn't always work."

In addition to welfare officials, teachers also have a role to play in combating child abuse, explained Jakgrit Siriwat, deputy director of the Department of Student Affairs, Satree Phuket School.

Teachers are told that they must be sensitive to whether or not a student is having issues at home," Mr Jakgrit said.

At the same time, teachers must watch each other to ensure physical violence isn't being

used as a form of discipline.

'Violence is prohibited in schools. A teacher caught being violent with a child will be fired," assured Chalam Attatham, the director of the Phuket Primary Educational Service Area Office.

Anyone with evidence of a teacher physically punishing or abusing a student can report it to a councilor, the director of the school or to the police, confirmed Mr Chalam.

Those fearful of their complaints falling on deaf ears, or of retribution, can anonymously send evidence to the Damrongtham Center (Ombudsman's office).

"Students who are abused by their teacher can come to us or send evidence to our office inside Phuket Provincial Hall. We can also be contacted by phone at 076-213 203," confirmed Damrongtham Center Chief Prapan Kanprasang.

Police will also investigate any claim of child abuse made by the victim or a third party, confirmed Maj Nucharee Longkaew of Phuket City Police.

To do this, police coordinate their efforts with the Department of Social Development and Welfare in Phuket and other child protection foundations.

"I would like to urge anyone who witnesses abuse to report the issue to us. This is not just a family problem, this is a problem in society as a whole," Maj Nucharee said.

THE 4-billion-baht pipe to bring water to Phuket from the Chieo Lan Reservior in Surat Thani was a 'done deal' according to Deputy Interior Minister Somchai Sunthornvat a decade ago.

The mega-project was going to be the nail in the coffin for the island's water worries and was expected to be completed in just 18 months. However, 120 months later, we are still relying on local water reserves and even building new reservoirs on the island, such as the one in Chalong, to ensure there is enough potable water for the ever-growing number of people occupying the province.

Though the need to wet our lips scored page one in the 2005 September 24-30 issue of the *Phuket Gazette*, the big story was the need to leave the local watering holes. To explore the dangers of confusing home with

a pub, then-Managing Editor Alasdair Forbes settled down with two former heavy drinkers who had managed to turn their lives around through the discovery

of Alcoholics Anonymous: "I started drinking when I was 14 or 15, growing up in a place where everyone drinks. It wasn't very social if you didn't drink in Australia - you know, 'Never trust a man who doesn't drink' sort of thing.

For Phuket, alcohol seems far too often to work as the social glue that brings any group of people together, an excuse to actually spend time together, as if such an excuse is needed. Far too often booze is being overlooked as the menace to society, from the seemingly socially accept-

the bottle'.

However, Thailand as a whole has seen a significant shift in alcohol consumption with it being ranked by the World Health Organization as the fifth booziest country in the world in 2000 and to not even making the top 50 in the 2010 survey.

In those ten years, the amount of alcohol consumed per person over the age of 15 was slashed by almost 50 per cent. Yet, it remains a serious concern on the island, especially as the province develops and expands, destroying many of the social safety nets

for locals and expats.

That's not to say wine tasting at the Green Man Pub in Rawai once a month, artful cocktails at Zimplex or even a cold beer with a few friends out on the boat is ruining Phuket – in fact sometimes it seems to make the moment. But, as reported ten years ago, it's the dependency: "In my last year of drinking, six years ago, I would wake up at six o'clock every morning and the first thing I would do was take a drink to calm my nerves. I could not hold a cup of coffee."

Activist to hit Natural Fruit with counter charges

A BRITISH activist fighting a series of legal battles against a Thai pineapple company plans to file complaints with the anti-corruption agency and launch counter prosecutions 'to prevent ongoing harassment'.

Andy Hall posted on the news on Twitter on September 18 after the Appeals Court dismissed an appeal by Natural Fruit and the Attorney General in one of four cases the pineapple company filed against him.

Photographer sued over monkey selfie

A RARE crested macaque monkey who snapped a wellknown, grinning selfie should be declared the photo's owner and receive damages for copyright infringement after it was used in a wildlife book, animal rights activists argued in a federal lawsuit filed on September 22.

Naruto, a six-year-old macaque who lives free in the Tangkoko Reserve on the Indonesian island of Sulawesi, took the image and several others about four years ago using a camera left unattended by British photographer David Slater, People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA) said in the suit.

The so-called Monkey Selfies that resulted came from 'a series of purposeful and voluntary actions by Naruto, unaided by Slater,' said the complaint, filed in US District Court in San Francisco.

"Naruto has the right to own and benefit from the copyright ... in the same manner and to the same extent as any other author," the suit said.

Mr Slater told Reuters he felt "rather bemused" and persecuted by the lawsuit, which he said seemed to be a publicity stunt.

Police confirm clash with Vietnamese

THAI police confirmed on September 17 that one of their patrol boats clashed with Vietnamese fishing vessels.

According to the Vietnamese government, the skipper of one boat was shot in the head and killed, while two other men were wounded.

Roadside blast wounds three

THREE patrolling police were slightly wounded by a roadside bomb laid by insurgents in Pattani province on September 21. The attack happened just before 8am on a road in Tambon Sabarang in Muang

Polices said the 10-kilogram bomb was assembled in a pipe and was detonated with a walkie-talkie.

Deadlines set to tackle fishing and trafficking

THE government has accelerated efforts to tackle illegal fishing and human-trafficking problems, with November 15 set as the deadline to meet crucial international requirements.

Additional amendments to the Fisheries Act would be enacted by mid-November so as to fully meet the international regulations on fishing as re-

quired by the European Union, said Deputy Prime Minister Prawit Wongsuwan on September 18. The EU earlier issued a warning to Thailand to comply with its rules or face a ban on seafood exports worth billions of baht to its 28 member coun-

Meanwhile, Prime Minister Prayut Chan-o-cha also ordered authorities to finalize the country's 2015 report on antihuman trafficking measures by November 15 in a bid to show the international community the progress Thailand has achieved in preventing and solving human-trafficking problems.

Both issues damaged the country's reputation and would hit Thai exports if countries start imposing bans.

32 transferred in trafficking crackdown

THE drive against human trafficking has brought further retribution with the authorities on September 21 slapping 32 police officers with transfer orders for their alleged roles in the trade, National Police Chief Somyot Poompanmuang said.


The transferred officials belonged to police regions 8 and 9, plus the Immigration Bureau and Central Investigation Bureau, he said.

The transfer [of the officers] has been done under police jurisdiction in accordance with recommendations from concerned agencies,' Gen Somyot said.

The move is reportedly based on the ongoing investigation led by Deputy National Police Chief Aek Angsananont, which started in earnest after authorities discovered mass graves of Rohingyas at alleged trafficking camps in southern Thailand and Malaysia earlier this year.

Push for PACA

THE efforts of Australian paddle boarder Damien Rider to raise awareness of child abuse, which is an important, yet seldomdiscussed topic, deserves the support of everyone on Phuket.

At first glance, an 800-kilometer solo paddle board expedition through some of the planet's most notoriously shark-infested waters in Australia might seem an impractical and dangerous way to try and raise awareness of child abuse issues back on terra firma. But a closer look into Mr Rider's difficult life journey as a victim of extreme forms of childhood abuse reveals a personal triumph.

Those traumatized by direct and indirect violence at school or at home deserve all the support society can give them. By setting up the 'Paddle Against Child Abuse' (PACA) foundation to raise awareness of these issues and provide direct assistance to young child abuse victims, Mr Rider is taking the next step – and apparently healing himself in the process.

'Child abuse' is a very broad term, one that encompasses a wide range of negative behaviors from neglect to actual physical and mental harm. The key to preventing child abuse lies in maintaining strong family units that provide children with a sense of comfort and positive support.

'Social media', perhaps inappropriately named given how unsocial it makes people, is a growing concern when it comes to abuse, as pointed out by Urai Maidukem of the Phuket Shelter for Children and Families on Koh Sireh. Too often children and parents are plugged into their phones, forgetting to take the basic steps to develop those close bonds necessary for a strong family unit to be created. However, it is a double-edged sword, which can also be used by victims as a comfortable way to cry out for help.

Here in Phuket, we can still witness child abuse all around us every day. Most often it comes in the form of sheer neglect.

Despite the gravity of the problem, talk about child abuse issues seem to arise only following incidents that are reported in the media, such as when an irate teacher metes out excessive corporal punishment to a disobedient student.

For the most part, however, cases of child abuse remain hidden behind closed doors, and even when they are not, most of us tend to look the other way even when the child is staring us in the face.

If the PACA can raise awareness of some of the issues involved and actually set up a center to help child abuse victims, it would be a step – or paddle – in the right direction.

LETTER FROM THE GOVERNOR

I AM impressed with Phuket for many reasons.

First of all, all the projects that are taking place on the island would not be possible for me to handle on my own. It comes with a great deal of cooperation from local sectors.

Additionally, Phuket has a very strong local community network. They strictly monitor officials' work and effectively voice their opinion, reflecting the problems in the province, such as the protest that took place at the Samkong underpass construction site.

They take their civic duty seriously and take good steps to improve political development.

On my official Facebook fan page that is open for Phuket's people, there are a lot of useful comments, complaints and suggestions on subjects concerning my work. It connects residents and officials and encourages them to work together. It makes the process quicker.

On the other hand, Phuket is a very challenging place to govern.

I have had to substantially improve myself in many ways. Every day, new problems or issues come up, all different and unpredictable.

The associations and clubs, such as the Phuket Chamber of Commerce and the Tourism Industry Union, have given me moral support and have advised me many times when dealing with difficult situations.

And lastly, the media here is very supportive and is always offering suggestions and bring up topics to help make my work as efficient as possible. We

changes in Phuket and its future.

share information with one another to best understand what's best for the island.

As for the work I have done, I have always said that I have tried to govern the province with four main principles in mind – to upgrade standards, encourage tourism, preserve the natural environment and implement sustainable management systems.

As we can now see, the traffic problem is being solved with the underpass projects that have received a budget of more than 1 billion baht. Projects like this will help develop the province in the next two years.

However, there is no development that will be convenient for everyone 100 per cent of the time. People will definitely face traffic jams, but please be patient.

Apart from the big budget for the traffic infrastructure, there are projects that I have started that I am very proud of.

Phuket received a 180-million-baht budget to finish the Klong Kata Dam in Chalong and connect with the Provincial Waterworks Authority's water supply center. After this is complete, the water supply system in Phuket will flow much

more efficiently.

The construction of the Chalong Hospital also received a budget of 105 million baht. I have already set up a committee to work on the project and this will take about 2 years to complete.

Meanwhile, the flood protection system in Patong recently received 420 million baht, while a separate budget of 550 million baht was approved for the Muang District flood protection system.

Aside from infrastructure, I was also able to obtain a 29-million-baht budget to purchase more than 200 CCTV cameras and 150 million baht from the Ministry of Tourism and Sports' project, 'Phuket, Peaceful City', to install and maintain the cameras.

I am also proud of implementing the Grab Taxi system in Phuket, as well as approving 87 new tuk-tuks to work legally, while pushing 50-baht public van transportation between Patong and Phuket.

Although almost every project will be completed in a few years, I am proud that I have laid their foundation and created a great standard for Phuket's future.

Free road accidents

YEAR on year, the population of Phuket grows along with the island's traffic problems. In my 12-year experience on Phuket, I would say that traffic is now worse than ever.

It's no wonder that the governor decided to spend money in order to reduce traffic by building underpasses in certain areas.

However, the thing that concerns me the most is the condition of the roads near the construction sites.

There are not enough warning signs or lights to help drivers safely maneuver the road at night, causing many people to have accidents.

The Samkong intersection underpass that was originally slated to be finished in March has seen delays causing it to push back its completion date until the end of the year.

Delays in construction are acceptable, but along the road in that area you'll face very extreme conditions, like tracking on the surface of the moon with an added accident for free.

During construction, particularly in the last 6 months, I have read accident reports online from that area every day. Most often it involves a motorbike hitting a big pothole at night because of the inadequate lighting or warning signs.

Last week four local men bought their own asphalt and

started patching up the road.

At first, they were only able to fix two holes, but after people saw their good deed on Facebook, more people joined them and now many areas of the road have been mended.

Their work has already made the road so much safer and is better than the whole lot of nothing that was done before.

It was only after their story had spread that the government jumped in and ordered the Highways Department to act.

I know that the government had this in their view and that these issues take time to fix, but why did we have to wait so long and let so many accidents occur before action was taken and why did the community have to demonstrate what action needed to be done for the problem to finally be solved?

As underpass construction continues in different areas of Phuket, I can only hope they will do a better job at maintaining the construction area.

However, big vehicles, such as buses and trucks or other lowspeed vehicles like motorbikes, must be driven in the left lane unless obstructions prohibit this.

If someone is caught breaking traffic rules then they will be fined 400 to 1,000 baht.

Focus on China when investing

CHINA'S stock market is imploding and that's not only shaking confidence in the country, it's also impacting global financial markets. However, investors need to keep in mind that over the past 15 years, the Chinese stock market has actually experienced both sharp rises and steep falls with the last crash occurring in 2007.

The market then largely moved sideways until about a year ago when the government and state controlled media began talking it up as they began promarket reforms. Since there are few productive places for Chinese savers to put their money to work beyond the property market (which the government has also tried to cool), many new and inexperienced retail investors entered the stock market.

The problems started at the beginning of this year when economic growth slowed dramatically and the effort to reform financial markets turned into an effort to create a wealth effect to prop up faltering economic growth.

There were actually several catalysts that finally burst the Chinese stock market bubble and these included MSCI not including China in their emerging market indices (meaning no big

influx of foreign institutional investing), the easing of monetary policy (but no fresh money entering the stock market), and heavy margin financing that caused small margin calls to lead to increasingly larger share price falls. There were also expectations that the government would never allow the stock market to fall since it had talked up the markets.

Most foreign investors and funds own shares or have exposure to Chinese stocks trading on foreign exchanges, or the Hong Kong Stock Exchange but not the sinking Shanghai Stock Exchange, which the government is attempting to prop up as local investors are taking heavy losses.

As draconian policy interven-

tions aimed at shoring up share prices have largely failed or only had a short-lived effect, the widely held belief that China's government and policy makers are in complete control of the economy (and can achieve whatever outcomes they desire) has been badly shaken. In other words, there are still limits to autocratic command and control economies.

China's government is also still dominated by autocratic political leaders schooled in Maoism who are neither economists nor technocrats – meaning they can't necessarily grasp the free market policy concepts needed to run a modern economy. This makes

badly needed long-term structural reforms difficult to consider or implement.

The stock market crash can still spill over into the general Chinese economy to impact multinational companies with big operations there, but many companies do not break out their sales and profits for the country – making it difficult for investors to quantify any direct damage or exposure.

Aside from Chinese stocks and China ETFs, consumer stocks with heavy exposure to China like Yum! Brand Incorporated (NYSE: YUM), casino stocks with Macau operations like Las Vegas Sands Corporation (NYSE: LVS) and commodities (e.g. copper prices have neared six year lows) could continue to see bigger headwinds.

However, not all stocks with exposure to China will be impacted the same way e.g. Boeing Co (NYSE: BA) has long term (as much as 20 year contracts) to sell aircraft or spare parts to China, but shares of Caterpillar (NYSE: CAT), which sells both mining and construction equipment that's also used in big infrastructure projects that the Chinese love to undertake, have recently hit a 52 week low.

The bottom line is that the Chinese economy is second in size to the US and is still very dynamic and growing – meaning foreign investors cannot ignore the direct and indirect investment opportunities there. Moreover, any investor with a well-diversified portfolio should see a limited fallout from any Chinese stock market crash.

Baht inches up, FED keeps rate

THE US Federal Reserve's decision this week to maintain its policy interest rate at between zero and 0.25 per cent weakened the US Dollar Index by around 1 per cent and contributed to the strengthening of other currencies when compared with the greenback.

However, uncertainty with the timing of the increased federal funds rate remains and the capital outflow from emerging markets is expected to continue, said the Bank of Thailand. The baht appreciated by 0.51 per cent from its opening value of 35.762 per US dollar to 35.577, but there was no significant change in the Stock Exchange of Thailand, whose main index had risen by just 3.04 points to 1392.47 on a market value of 16.207 billion baht

Currencies in India, Malaysia, Japan, Taiwan and South Korea strengthened by 0.88, 0.58, 0.49, 0.36 and 0.27 per cent respectively.

Closures jump 17 per cent in first 8 months

THE number of business closures increased considerably in the first eight months as a result of lower crop and fuel prices and the strict regulating of the lottery industry, said the Business Development Department.

The department reported that the number of business closures rose 17 per cent year on year to 9,984 compared with 8,563 during the same period in 2014.

Pongpun Gearaviriyapun, director-general of the department, said that while the increase in closures was quite high, it was not a surprise because firms selling lottery tickets accounted for most of the shutdowns.

Last month, the number of closures increased 25 per cent from August 2014 to 1,542. Most were lottery companies, followed by construction, property-development, and retailing companies.

The department reported that the number of new companies

increased by 4 per cent year on year during the first eight months to 41,857 firms, indicating that the business sector remains confident that the economy will continue to recover.

In August, the number of new companies was down 6 per cent year on year to 4,912 and down 9 per cent from July.

The upcoming full implementation of the Asean Economic Community, the establishment of special economic zones and the government's re-

cently launched economic stimulus packages should encourage more investment in the long term, Ms Pongpun said.

Her agency projects that this year will see between 60,000 and 65,000 newly registered companies.

The total value of companies' initial-investment capital in August was down 35 per cent year on year to 13.24 billion baht.

There are 617,851 registered businesses operating in the Kingdom. – *The Nation*

Waking the Sleeping Dragon

Social media, KOLs necessary to access wealthy Chinese market

KEY Opinion Leaders (KOL) and Chinese-based social media applications are the key to unlocking high-end Free Independent Travellers (FIT) for Phuket, experts told a packed room at the American Chamber of Commerce (AMCHAM) Phuket chapter seminar on September 18.

The in-bound Chinese market for Thailand is booming with more arrivals between January and June this year than all of 2014, putting the country on pace for more than 12 million arrivals.

Though the Chinese market is often painted with a single brush – zero baht package tours – key speaker at the event, David Johnson of Delivering Asia Communications (DAC), estimates 7-10 per cent of these arrivals are FIT.

A fresh wave of FIT travellers is splashing across Thailand, explained Vanessa Zhu, DAC's digital marketing specialist and communications director for China.

"There is an increasing number of FIT travellers from China because Thailand has become famous among Chinese travellers for more than ten years. The first wave of travellers who

came to Thailand now already understand and like the country, so they are willing to do a deeper trip," Ms Zhu said.

To market themselves to these clients, Phuket businesses need a completely new set of tools, explained Ms Zhu.

"It is a great opportunity to let Thai people know how the media really works in China. Because of the 'great wall', the Chinese firewall - censors almost everything, people do not know what really works and what doesn't," Ms Zhu said.

"A lot, or probably all, of the social media that we are using here does not work in China. Therefore, they [tourism industries outside of China] have to realize that there is a parallel universe existing in China. They have to share information with different tools."

There are clear equivalents for mainstream products such as Facebook inside China: Weibo (Twitter), Baidu (Google) and DaoDao (TripAdvisor). However, the big pusher is WeChat, which comprises the functions of Facebook, LINE, Instagram, Twitter, PayPal, Skype, Pinterest and more.

"Outbound Chinese travellers are more likely to consider a product they see referred to in social media. They are in

general skeptical of information from news sources and advertising," states the *Hurun Report*.

This makes it essential for companies wanting to access the high-end FIT Chinese market to understand how to use the 'new' social media platforms effectively.

"Chinese people right now are really eager to go travelling outbound. The important thing is to let them know where to go, what to play and how to access knowledge about the destinations," Ms Zhu added.

One of the many ways suggested during the seminar was to dial in on KOLs, such as famous Chinese bloggers or other Chinese celebrities, encouraging them to visit a destination and push product on their followers.

Also highlighted as essential

moves for those wanting to successfully tap into the market were having Chinese speaking staff, menus and itineraries; setup WeChat accounts to allow more convenient interactions with guests; develop specific itineraries for the market; conduct press trips to get Chinese social media buzzing with your brand; and encourage Chinese guests to indulge in posting selfies online.

Value in organic search results



WHILE I believe that, because of Social Media (Optimization), Search Engine Optimization (SEO) itself is becoming less relevant, there is no doubt it is still important in getting organic search results, especially with Google and YouTube, by far the leading search engines.

While the algorithm for being ranked is constantly changed by Google, and like the recipe for Coca Cola is one of the world's best kept secrets, it is possible to analyze trends and predict certain components of the 'Quality Score' used to rank sites.

A couple of clear trends are emerging.

The intelligent approach to building websites and making them user-friendly seems to correspond directly to the results. Such as having a website that is "responsive", which simply means no matter what device you view it on, it adopts that format. This includes mobile devices, iPads and so on.

The content is also unsurprisingly key. The reliance on keywords has become less pronounced and a more holistic view has been taken. So more relevant content, with easier readability and more quality and detail is being rewarded. Providing the actual information that searchers are looking for, is now the most important element, rather than trying to pad an article, or load it with keywords.

Finally, while Google denies it, there is a strong correlation between popularity in social media platforms and the Google results.

Nok Air plans big push in Phuket

PINYOT Pibulsongkram, a Nok Air Vice President, told Up in the Air recently that Nok currently has five daily flights between Bangkok and Phuket with six flights on Fridays and Sundays. Nok plans to increase these services for the upcoming high season.

Operating out of Don Mueang Airport in Bangkok, Nok offers flights to Phuket from the capital aboard its fleet of 189-seat Boeing 737-

Load factor on the Phuket flights has been consistently

strong at about 90 per cent, even in the aftermath of the Erawan Shrine bombing, Mr Pinyot said.

"Usually after an event like that one would expect to see an immediate drop in bookings, but that was not the case. We were all really surprised by it, to be quite honest.

"We expected a slight seasonal dip in September followed by increasing demand in October and into the high season."

Nok plans to increase the number flights to Phuket even further after the current airport expansion project is complete and deems six or seven flights daily as 'manageable' after the work is complete.

Seasonal demand for flights to Phuket have changed a great deal over the past five years and

the island is now much more of a year-round destination. Nok uses a variety of advertising campaigns to remind its main client base, Thais living in metropolitan Bangkok, that it does not rain continuously in Phuket during the monsoon season.

Load factors on the Bangkok -Phuket route have consistently been among Nok's highest in recent years.

"In the mechanics of lowcost carriers, we do not typically push promotions on flight routes that are doing well. But the downside of this is that we have not directed much promotion effort to foreigners.

"Our passengers to Phuket are about 95 per cent Thai, but in a market like Phuket where as much as 80 per cent of passengers in transit are foreigners, we need to do a better job capturing that market," Mr Pinyot

Nationwide, Nok Air and Thai AirAsia are neck-andneck in terms of market share, each with about one-third of the domestic market. The final third is divided among other carriers including Lion Air, Bangkok Airways and Thai

"But it varies from city to city. For Phuket, AirAsia has greater market share because they offer more flights," he

Aircraft center on AOT agenda

AN AIRCRAFT maintenance center may be built at the Chiang Rai International Airport in the North to cope with the growth in air travel and tourism in Southeast Asia and China, the Airports of Thailand (AOT) said.

Nitinai Sirismatthakarn, president of AOT, said last week that the company was studying the feasibility of building an aircraft heavymaintenance center at Mae Fah Luang Chiang Rai International Airport to handle the significant growth in the aviation and tourism industries in the North and the region as a whole.

"Chiang Rai airport has high potential. If the project happens, AOT should take benefit from many airlines operating in the southern part of China, as well as in Southeast Asia and Thailand," Mr Nitinai said.

AOT is the operator of six international airports in Thailand.

Singapore is benefiting from the bulk of the business from aircraft heavy-maintenance and after-sales services. Many airlines from southern China are using Singapore for such services, he added.

Once the feasibility study is completed, AOT will invite key aviation players to join the in-

vestment and development.

Aside from the impending projects at Mae Fah Luang and Don Mueang airports, AOT is also planning to build a third runway and second passenger terminal at Suvarnabhumi Airport in the next five years.

Phuket International Airport is also expected to complete renovations by 2017, while Chiang Mai and Hat Yai airports have plans for renovations in 2020 and 2023, respectively.

"A budget of 142 billion baht is set for developments at six airports over the next 10 years" Mr Nitinai said.

By 2019, the number of annual passengers at the six airports is expected to increase from 81 million to 165 million.

Getting a foreign divorce in Thailand

RECENTLY our firm was hired to handle a divorce case. This case was different from the typical family law divorce. The Thai couple met in the United States while attending college. They fell in love and got married in the United States. They completed their university degrees, lived in the United States for a few years, and then returned to Thailand.

After returning to Thailand, the couple began to grow apart. They separated and decided to terminate their marriage. The husband came to my office and asked a series of questions that I believe are pertinent to many couples in similar circumstances. There are many foreign couples, Thai couples, and mixed marriages where the couple was married overseas then decided to get divorced in Thailand.

Here are some common questions:

Q) We were legally married in the United States but we never registered our marriage in Thailand. Do we need to get a divorce since we now live in Thailand?

A) Thailand and the United States do not have a specific treaty on marriages but gen-

erally recognize marriages and divorces in both countries as long as the marriage relationship does not violate general prohibitions within each country. For example, a same sex marriage in the United States is not recognized in Thailand.

If a couple was legally married in the United States and does not violate Thai law or moral code, the marriage is recognized in Thailand. However in order to obtain certain spousal benefits, Thai nationals need to register their marriage.

Married couples who are now separated should obtain a divorce because there is the liability of something occurring in the future. They cannot get remarried since both Thailand and the United States do not allow bigamy or polygamy. The second marriage can be legally voided and the first spouse can claim a portion of the assets if the initial marriage has not been properly terminated

Q) What do we need to do to get divorced in Thailand?

A) There are two options to obtaining a divorce in Thailand. Couples can register their foreign marriage at the local distirct office. For marriages that have been registered at the

local amphur and the parties agree to the divorce, the couple can go to the same amphur to register the termination of the marriage.

However for most courts in the United States to recognize a foreign divorce, it is important to ensure due process. This means that the court must have jurisdiction over the parties and proper notice must be provided. This is generally completed through an agreed divorce filed through the Thai court system where the parties submit to the jurisdiction of the court and allow a judge to issue a formal judgment. **Q**) If my spouse does not cooperate with the filing of the divorce in Thailand, can we still proceed with the filing of the divorce?

A) It is possible to file a divorce for a foreign marriage in Thailand as long as all parties are provided proper notice and the court has jurisdiction over the parties. However, the process can be costly and take much longer to complete. There is also the possibility of the court not accepting the case because of the complexity of ruling over a divorce of a for-

eign marriage.

The dissolution of a foreign marriage is a complex undertaking. It is highly recommended that before starting the process, the parties seek counsel of a licensed Thai attorney who understands the requirements.

Triathlon training tips

WITH barely two months to go before the Laguna Phuket Triathlon, these next 8 weeks are vital to help you prepare for the race ahead, but it's also a perfect time to challenge yourself.

Here are some top tips compiled by Thanyapura's Head Triathlon Coach Sergio Borges.

HEAT AND HUMIDITY

About three to four weeks out from the race, go to a steam room two to three times per week and just sit there for 10 to 15 mins. By doing that you're making your body more efficient in dealing with heat and humidity so that when you get to Phuket, you will feel a bit better.

THE SWIM

My best advice is to swim more before the race. Most athletes overlook the swim training as they think it's just a small part of the race but the truth is that the swim is the foundation of the triathlon. The fitter you are swimming, the better you will feel on the bike, and on the run.

PROPER EQUIPMENT

The next challenge you will

encounter are the hills. There are a few very steep hills (up to 22 per cent gradient) on the course and I often see athletes pushing their bikes up the hill due to used, improper gear. If you are a strong cyclist and are used to climbing hills, I still recommend the use of a 39 (small chain ring on the front) and a 28 (cassette on the back wheel). If you are a beginner you should be using what we call 'Compact Cranks' that have smaller chain rings on the front (36 or even 34 teeth), making it easier to spin up the hills.

RUNNING IN THE HEAT

As I mentioned previously, the weather will be challenging so pay attention to hydration, especially during the cycling part. Make sure you drink plenty of fluids on the bike (one to two bottles per hour), preferably electrolyte drinks. When you get to the run, control your pace and do not start too fast, take your time at the aid stations to cool yourself off and get in enough fluids. I also advise athletes to consume calories during the bike and run as you need to replace glycogen when exercising over 90 mins. I recommend between 200-250Kcals/ hour for women and 300-350Kcals/hour for men, through sports drink, gels or bars.



War of hotels raging on island



THERE is a war going on in Phuket. It's not being fought on the street, or across the beaches, but in glittering hotel properties across the island. Both sides are squarely facing off against each other trying to woo guests and conquer higher levels of occupancy and premium room rates. In this instance the war is one between branded versus independent hotels.

Tracking performance of hospitality assets here over the past decade, the market has experienced a series of volatile events ranging from the Asian tsunami, global financial crisis, 2013 coup, political crisis and the latest being the Bangkok bombing. While the destination has been remarkable in recovery as has been demonstrated by the numbers time and again, there are both winners and losers in the hotel market.

On a broad pallet, our research has shown that branded hotels outperform non-branded offerings in a downturn. Of course generalizations are never wise in a business view, but the reality is that when rates soften to spur a return to normal, consumers tend to be sheep and flock to the known brands versus the unknown. I

can hear the brand men licking their lips in anticipation as I

That said, Phuket has a number of star war superstars who have bucked the trend, broken away from the flock and are often admired, yet hated, by the brand set. Twinpalms comes to mind with their unique offering of design, food and beverage culture and events. Sri Panwa at the top end, where Wan Issara and crew continue to attract chic travelers, while over the bridge Aleenta has set a magical stage for beachfront getaways. Or

Gordon Oldham's Pavilions in Layan who proved that offbeach can still equate to high rates, as does the Indigo Pearl in Nai Yang.

Certainly I could go on with other anecdotal offerings but there is the flipside, or more appropriately, the downside of the argument. Once you get into the mass offerings of upscale, midscale, and budget and economy offering, the trend starts to fall off the rails. At the forefront of the argument remains the distribution debate that chains can provide wider booking systems and access to a global marketplace. Yet the counter argument to this is that the island has increasingly seen a growing dependence on wholesale tours and online travel agencies, such as Agoda, Expedia, etc. in the leisure market, versus chain-generated business.

Taking the brand issue a step further would be to mention those hotel group loyalty programs by Hilton, Hyatt, IHG and ACCOR as a starting point, but the main benefactors that drive these brands are good

corporate or urban settings, and at the end of the day, resorts are mainly used by loyalty cardholders who earn points on business trips and redeem them on vacations.

Still travelers have to make a decision on what hotel to stay in and in this case it is recognition that draws them in. Yes, TripAdvisor has brought an entirely new dynamic to the exercise of booking and certainly authentic boutique properties are growing in preference, and yet the larger world brand still carries incredible weight in our daily lives, from consumer electronics, smartphones and fashion, to even our morning coffee.

When I look at Phuket by the numbers, I see financially adept developers gravitating towards chains and, as such, the physical component of the offering is often more complete, as is location. Lending institutions for larger hotels tend to favor the use of brands, which is often a strong motivator for owners.

To close this out, as Phuket moves towards a decided case of hotel oversupply, the battle between independents and chains is likely to become more magnified, and those who move into the winners circle need more than just a uniform sign and global affiliation they will need in addition, excellent design, concept, and delivery elements.

Myanmar slashing real estate prices

prices, highlighted as one of the biggest business barriers in Myanmar, are expected to be brought down to a level competitive with that of neighboring countries by 2018.

Moe Thida, deputy director of the Construction Ministry's Urban and Housing Development Department, told the Myanmar Global Investment Forum last week that some measures have been launched and more will be coming to bring down the prices.

As more office space is in focus, more land would be allocated to private construction projects.

'If the supply of commercial space increases, prices will fall. We are now observing how much land to be allocated for office and commercial development and how much for residential development," she

According to Colliers In-

ternational Myanmar, the total office stock in Yangon the biggest commercial city was 107,000 square meters at the end of last year. It predicts annual average new supply of 70,000 sqm from 2015 to 2018. Citywide, office rents rose 6 per cent from 2013 to US\$69.17 (2,500 baht) per square meter per month, but buildings in the inner city zones enjoyed a 23-per-cent

At that rate, it is more than

S\$11.93 (300 baht) per square foot - the average monthly gross rent for premium office space in the Raffles Place/New Downtown micro-market in Singapore.

Moe Thida attributed the high land prices to high demand as well as speculation. While demand is out of control, the government is reining in speculation through tax mea-

"The government needs to monitor land use purposes. We are trying to satisfy demand," she said.

Another focus is also placed on low-cost residential construction. Myanmar plans to provide 30,000 such units in three years.

Moe Thida noted that 58 per cent of households in Myanmar earn less than 300,000 kyat (8,300 baht) a month.
