### Violent riot at police station prompts official attack on mob mentality

THOUGH blockades, protests and other forms of mob rule appear to be an effective way for Phuket community members to kick-start official action, justice eventually catches up with the instigators, said Commanding General of the 41<sup>st</sup> Military Circle Teenachat Jindangen.

The commander's comments come fast on the heels of an unprecedented riot and attack on the Thalang Police Station and closure of Thepkrasattri Road on October 10. About 20 police officers were injured and more than 6 million baht worth of damage was done, as hundreds of rioters set fire to police vehicles and bombarded the station with bricks and rocks.

The catalysts for the violence were the deaths of suspected drug dealers Patomwat Panarak, 22, and Teerapong Srisamut, 17, who died in a police chase after allegedly refusing to be searched at a checkpoint.

Protesters claimed that the 50 pills of *ya ba* (methamphetamine) and one kilogram of *kratom* leaves in the young men's bags had been planted by police. The allegation was vehemently denied by Provincial Police Commander Patchara Boonyasit.

"Though the riots yielded immediate results with the Ministry of Interior demanding an investigation into allegations of excessive force by the four officers who crashed into the fleeing men, we would have conducted a fair investigation ourselves," Phuket Governor Chamroen Tipayapongtada told the *Gazette* on Wednesday. "Now, we not only will ensure that this matter will be looked into, but we will also hunt down those who helped turn the peaceful protest into a violent riot, damaging Phuket's international reputation."

The deaths of Mr Patomwat and Mr Teerapong were most likely used as a cover by criminal teenagers in the local community to take revenge on police, said Maj Gen Patchara earlier this week. As of Wednesday, police had identified at least nine instigators, but had yet to seek arrest warrants.

However, the devastation of the lives lost and the parents' fear of police inaction was very real, assured Governor Chamroen, who had negotiated with the parents and...



## 12-year-old passenger dies after bus fire

A FIRE that broke out on a Phuket-Satun bus on October 7 claimed the life of a 12-year-old girl on October 10.

The girl, named by police only as Panida, is the second of four victims admitted to the Phang Nga Hospital ICU to die from smoke inhalation. The other two victims remain in comas in the ICU, while Daeng Thaharat, 76, was pronounced dead at the scene. The day after the accident, 25-year-old Sunisa Chookaew died from her injuries.

A total of 21 passengers were on the bus while the 54year-old driver, Prathueng Sakkaew, used a borrowed welding torch to fix his seat. A spark from the torch set the seat on fire. The flames quickly spread to the back of the bus.

Nearby locals responded to Mr Prathueng's calls for help and broke the windows of the bus, allowing the passengers to escape the smoke filled vehicle.

Mr Prathueng was charged with causing death and injuries. – *Chutharat Plerin*

Kongsamut, 34, told police that he was running methamphetamine for a drug lord operating out of a prison in Nakhon Sri Thammarat.

"This was a random check," explained Tah Chat Chai Deputy Superintendent Nikorn Choothong. "We stopped the van and noticed two suspicious light blue bags on the seat next to the driver."

After seizing the drugs, the



police began to question Mr Sutthichai.

"He said he was hired by Bang Lee, a prisoner in Nakhon Sri Thammarat, to deliver the drugs and sell them in Phuket," Lt Col Nikorn said.

Mr Sutthichai was charged with possession of a category 1 drug with intent to sell.

## Meth network unraveled, guns confiscated

POLICE confiscated four firearms, 194 rounds of ammunition, 3,507 *ya ba* (methamphetamine) pills and 31 grams of *ya ice* (crystal methamphetamine) during a two-day raid on a Phuket Town drug network last week.

"The contraband seized was in possession of four suspects," said Lt Col Prawit Engchuan of the Phuket Provincial Police.

All suspects were charged with possession of a category

1 drug, while two were additionally charged for possession of illegal firearms and ammunition.

## Surin Beach business on Gov's hit list

GOVERNOR Chamroen Tipayapongtada vowed to be cautious in his dealings with the numerous beach businesses, including several iconic beach clubs, occupying government buildings along Surin Beach on October 8.

"If it was up to me, I would have them torn down," Governor Chamroen said yesterday. "However, I don't have the authority to do that. We will need to review the appropriate laws and regulations, as they are government buildings on government land."

In June last year, Cherng Talay Local Administration Organization (*OrBorTor*) President Ma-ann Samran and then-Vice Governor Chamroen gave sevenday eviction notices to numerous businesses allegedly encroaching on public property at popular beaches in Cherng Talay.

Though Governor Chamroen

made his intentions clear, he asked for time to complete the task lawfully.

## Phuket-Hat Yai direct flights now available


BANGKOK Airways officially launched its daily direct flights between Phuket and Hat Yai on October 11.

# Patong night club fires security after Australian tourists' beating

MANAGEMENT from the White Room Night Club in Patong denounced the violent actions of five of their bouncers who brutally beat six Australian tourists on October 7.

A video of the security guards attacking two of the Australian tourists was shared on Facebook and quickly went viral.

"We, the management of White Room Night Club, are shocked and upset by the violent incident. We strongly reject all forms of violence and we are currently reviewing the necessary measures to ensure nothing like this will ever happen again," management wrote in a statement to the *Gazette*.

"Needless to add, the culprits of this despicable act have had their employment at White Room immediately terminated."

Patong Entertainment Business Association President Weerawit Kurasombat called representatives from nightlife venues in Patong together to review policies concerning bouncer's conduct.

"I plan to implement strict

rules about the use of violence by security," Mr Weerawit said. "If any bouncer at any club is violent with a tourist, the club will be shutdown for at least two days."

The security guards told officials that the fight started when the tourists refused to pay their bill and one of them started fighting with a guard.

"That's garbage, we went in there with tickets with drinks," said one of the Australian men, named by *ninemsn* only as 'Aaron'.

"We had drink cards that were 'drink-as-much as you

want' from 10 until one for 800 baht."

Aaron then went on to detail the confrontation to *ninemsn*. He said that the bouncers were aggressive from the very beginning, and that when he stepped in between a bouncer and his friend, the bouncer knocked him unconscious in the club.

"Not one of us threw a punch," Aaron added.

Mr Weerawit requested that Kathu District Office penalize the White Room Night Club by forcing it to close for seven days. "I am very sorry about what happened, but I would have appreciated them [the Australians] clearing up the issue through the police, rather than going to the media back home," Mr Weerawit said. "I worry about Phuket's reputation."

If the Australian Embassy does not issue a formal complaint, the Patong Entertainment Business Association prefers to move on from the incident.

"We do not want the problem to get bigger, so we will stay silent and improve ourselves."

## Gov Chamroen disbands island haze committee

THE committee monitoring the Indonesian haze that descended on Phuket last week was disbanded by Phuket Governor Chamroen Tipayapongtada on October 9.

"Even though we have officially closed down the committee, all officers remain on call in case the issue arises again," Governor Chamroen said. "At this stage, we will continue to monitor the air pollution levels."

Indonesian Consul Triyogo Jatmiko met with Gov Chamroen on October 8 to detail what efforts were being made to put out the Indonesian forest fires.

In addition to promises made by Indonesia, changes in weather conditions played a major role in clearing the air in Phuket.

If there are any public health concerns, up-to-date information will be released in Thai and English, Gov Chamroen promised. – *Kongleaphy Keam*

...reached an understanding hours before the protesters turned violent.

"I understand that sometimes people feel that they have nowhere to go but to the streets the seek justice," Gov Chamroen said. However, the need for justice does not validate closing down major roadways or violence, he noted.

"Local people must change their mentality about the effectiveness of using violence to get their demands met. Think about what will happen to your family if you get arrested," Gov Chamroen said.

"If you look back at previous protest instigators on the island, you will see that all of their leaders were arrested and charged for their crimes."

Though the violence at the Thalang Police Station was unprecedented in Phuket, prior to the National Council of Peace and Order taking over, blockades were clearly being used by different communities on the island to get their demands met.

Maj Gen Teenachat Jindangen explained that the number one goal of any military or government agency confronted by protesters, violent or non-violent, is to defuse the situation, which often means making immediate concessions.

"Once we are able to breakup a protest or riot, we can start searching for a real solution to the issue," Gen Teenachat said.

"Our number one priority is to assure that our officers do not use any form of violence against the protesters.

"The protesters may get what they want. However, they are breaking the law and will be punished."

The Public Assembly Act of 2015 forbids people from blocking the entrance or exit of a government office or disrupting

the work being conducted at the facility. Those found guilty of doing so face a maximum penalty of six months imprisonment, a 10,000 baht fine or both.

Those seeking justice against officials or government offices should first present their cases to the Damrongdhama Center (ombudsman's office) at Phuket Provincial Hall, Gov Chamroen explained.

"I am making changes to the work flow at the center and have asked the Public Prosecutor's Office to review all cases that have eventually led to protests on the island," Gov Chamroen said.

Damrongdhama Center Chief Prapan Kanprasang assured the *Gazette* that his office would seek justice for those who file a complaint.

"There are many ways to seek justice. Please follow a path that is within the law. Riots and protests, especially ones that cause harm to others, will not yield real results," Mr Prapan said.

Those wanting to file a complaint can do so in person at Provincial Hall; send the complaint by mail to the Damrongdhama Center, Phuket Provincial Hall 5 Narisorn Road, Talad Yai, Muang Phuket 83000; or call 076-213 203.

"Blockades, protests and riots can cause a great deal of harm to Phuket – not only to the local community, but to our image internationally. Our officers acted with restraint last Saturday, as they refused to fight violence with violence," Gov Chamroen said.

"I do not want to see another blockade or protest on this island. If you are unable to get justice through local officials or even the Damrongdhama Center, come talk to me – let me bear the burden of your need for justice. Every problem has a solution."

THREE gibbon touts were arrested in front of the Andaman Resort on Phi Phi Don as they attempted to cajole tourists into using the protected species as a prop for photographs earlier this month.

"The police did a great job. They have finally improved their efforts on cracking down on these animal touts," said Suwat Suksiri, chief of the Thung Talay Non Hunting Zone. "The key is that tourists tipped them off, so they were able to arrest all three at once."

The suspects were in possession of gibbons ranging from one and a half years old to just nine months.

"Gibbons are generally brought over from Phuket. These baby gibbons, costing about 25,000 baht each, are sourced from the wild by poachers who take them from their mother. The mother is killed in the process," Mr Suwat said.

The suspects were named as Abdulvaris Imuesa, 21; Chaiyarak Ninsamut, 20; and Anucha Bangsai, 21.

The three were charged for the illegal possession of a protected wild animal.

All three gibbons were taken to the Phang Nga Wildlife Nursery Station.

"Our goal is to rid Phi Phi of gibbon touts. We really appreciate the help of citizens and would like people to continue to send leads in to us," Mr Suwat said.



MOM Luang Tridhosyuth Devakul, probably better known on the island simply as 'Mom Tri', scored page one with the dream of developing a new International Baccalaureate (IB) school on the island. With a master's degree in Architecture from Harvard - the real Harvard – Mom Tri was an early visionary leader, recognizing Phuket's potential and was instrumental in the development of the Phuket International Airport, as well as a number of other properties on the island, such as Royal Phuket Yacht Club, which in 1986 was the island's first luxury hotel and is now reopen under as 'The Nai Harn'.

The vision for the IB school was beautiful and was y muddy, and when it rains it's

There is one thing I'm culties, and it may even jeopardize to include an 'integrated community' with the school at its heart. There was also to be a residential development, sports facilities and a library. Unfortunately, the plan neither bloomed nor bore fruit. Instead, it has merely become a foot note in the development of educational institutes on the island.

Though the Gazette was keeping it classy and staying intune with the community for the lead in the October 15-21 issue, there was plenty of titillating sensationalism with the sidebar headline: Bar busted for underage male prostitution. The gist of the story should be pretty well understood from the headline: a total of 20 alleged male prostitutes, some under the age of 15, who were working at a bar on Soi Paradise were rounded up



in a sting operation.

"Using banknotes with prerecorded serial numbers, the officers paid for sexual services from six boys under 18 years of age, including two 14 year olds, and then made the arrests... The fact that the boys willingly engaged in prostitution has little bearing on the charges," the Gazette reported.

Such an effective effort by police makes the recent months of officers ending up empty handed after raiding nightlife venues in hopes of finding illegal workers quaint. But maybe, just maybe, officers ten years ago did such a good job that there aren't any illegals left operating on the island. Well, of course, there will always be just a few that can't afford to pay for tea and end up surfacing here and there, such as the man running sex shows on Soi Bangla who was ousted by pop star Rihanna via Twitter in 2013.

This issue also detailed the budget for the Rawai Pier, which has become a staple landmark for the southern tip of the island, and even has Stephen Fein, who still wields the pen for the Gazette's editorials, discussing his battle with lower-back pain. However, the real kicker is the Time Machine (October 15, 2000): Protests cause park fee increase to be postponed.

The implementation of the dramatic increase in park fees, which were to only apply to foreigners, was pushed back from September 13 to X October 1, 2001. The fee for October 1, 2001. The fee for a foreign adult was to jump from 10 baht to 200 baht. Twenty years later, almost to the day, a foreign-faced, American citizen who was born and raised in Phuket – and very much Thai at heart - worked up a social media frenzy about double-pricing at Emerald Pool, Krabi. He refused to pay his 200 baht.

## Separatists call for international observers in peace talks

THAILAND-BASED separatist group Barisan Revolusi Nasional Melayu Patani (BRN) said on October 12 that it would join peace talks with the government only if they are conducted in accordance with international standards and norms.

The dialogue must include mediators and observers from other nations, said the group, which the government accuses of orchestrating the current wave of violence in Deep South.

The parameters of the formal discussion have not yet been established. The BRN said it would not get involved in the meetings brokered by Malaysia.

## Deputy PM resolves issue of celebrities promoting booze

THE issue of Thai celebrities posting pictures of themselves endorsing alcoholic beverages online has been resolved, as they have been brought up to speed with Thai laws, said Deputy Prime Minister Prajin Jantong on October 12.

They were simply ignorant of the law, Air Chief Marshal Prajin said. However, they will feel the long arm of the law if they repeat the offence.

30 Thai celebrities who posted pictures of themselves with alcoholic beverage on social media were in violation of Article 32 of the Alcohol Beverage Control Act, said Samarn Futrakul, director of the Office of Alcoholic Drinks Control Committee of the Diseases Control Department.

"These actors, singers or athletes are like magnets for copy cats and there were also some captions convincing



people to drink. All these could be considered a violation of article 32," Dr Samarn said.

## Koh Tao trial verdict set for December 24

THE verdict in the trial of two Myanmar migrant workers accused of killing two British tourists will be announced at the end of the year, a defence lawyer confirmed on October 12.

Britons Hannah Witheridge, 23, and David Miller, 24, were found bludgeoned to death on the southern island of Koh Tao last year. Post-mortem examination also showed that Ms Witheridge had been raped.

The killings raised questions about the safety of tourists in Thailand, the competence of its police force and its treatment of migrant workers. Lawyers for the accused, Zaw Lin and Win Zaw Htun, both 22, have made police incompetence and mishandling of evidence central to their defence.

During the trial, which be-

gan in July, defence lawyers complained of a patchy police investigation marred by disputed forensics. The trial ended this weekend with the men alleging they were tortured and sexually assaulted in order to force them to make false confessions.

Rights groups have become involved in the trial and claim the men are being used as scapegoats because of their status as foreign migrant workers.

## Culture Ministry bans film on Thai monks

THE Culture Ministry issued a ban on the screening of 'Arbat' yesterday, forcing Sahamongkol Film to cancel all premiere events scheduled for October 13, as well as the planned release set for October 15.

The ministry's Film and Media Screening Committee explained that the film was banned because it depicted misconduct by monks and novices, including drinking, violence and improper relations with women.

## Trafficking cases moved to new court

TRAFFICKING cases involving Rohingya and other migrant victims have been transferred to the Criminal Court's newly established Human Trafficking Case Division.

The lawsuit filed at Songkhla's Na Thawee Provincial Court against 72 suspects was moved to the new division because they involved a transnational criminal gang and many state officials, Attorney General's Office Spokesman Somnuek Siangkong said on October 10.

Evidence in the cases is slated to be inspected by the

Human Trafficking Case Division from November 10-13, while the first batch of defendants, including former Army special adviser Lt Gen Manas Khongpaen, will be transferred to Bangkok Remand Prison.

## Temporary police traffic checkpoints banned

THE use of temporary police checkpoints to catch those violating traffic laws is now banned nationally, unless they meet stringent criteria.

The public had called for the temporary checkpoints to be scrapped, saying that they were randomly set up so officers could earn a percentage of the fines.

Police Spokesman Prawut Thavornsiri said a checkpoint must now be supervised by a police inspector or a higherranking officer and be marked with clear signs.

## Social Security Act to benefit millions

THE newly passed fourth edition of the Social Security Act will provide additional benefits to almost 14 million subscribers, the government said on October 10.

Those benefits cover healthcare, childbirth, unemployment and death. The new law will come into effect on October 20.

## Artifacts lost in museum fire

YUAM TAI Mayor Sati Sapthaweephan called for the Mae Sariang Museum on the Myanmar border to be rebuilt after a fire gutted it on October 12 and destroyed important artifacts.

The century-old Poy Sang Long suite contained a great number of historical and ethnic antiques.

# Phuket locals believe snake deity raised road

A CRACKED, raised road in Surin filled locals with the belief earlier this year that perhaps the cavity below was made by a Naga, a deity in a number of eastern religions that takes the shape of a snake – sometimes with seven heads – or even a Buddha image. Villagers gathered at the site, only 300 meters from a local graveyard, and attempted to peek beneath the road into the steaming hole below as they recalled a number of ancient items having been found in the area before. ## History of mob rule

THE Royal Thai Police must conduct a full and transparent investigation into the sad chain of events that led up to the riot at Thalang Police Station – all instigators must face justice.

Issues of democratic development aside, one of the silver linings of living under de facto martial law has up to this point been the dramatic reduction in the number of tourismkilling road blockades set up by protesters.

Prior to the seizure of power by the National Council for Peace and Order (NCPO) in 2014, hardly a month passed without a roadblock of some kind taking place. The island seemed to be dangerously close slipping into a 'protestocracy', which was fostered by widespread self-entitlement, greed, corruption – and residents not trusting police.

Many, if not most, of these blockades have taken place in Thalang District, which has a long and depressing history of poor relations between local residents and police at all three of its stations: Thalang, Cherng Talay and Tah Chat Chai.

But the unprecedented riot at Thalang Police Station represents a particularly worrying break in what had been a period of relative peace on the island, and may reflect a growing public discontentment with the police.

Our national police force has failed to earn the same level of respect as their counterparts in the military and is still regarded by large segments of society as not only self-serving and corrupt, but also incompetent.

It is fortunate that the officers on duty at the time of the unprecedented violent attack did not fire on the attackers in self-defence. The restraint exercised by the officers is to be commended, as riot police in developed, as well as developing countries, far too often fail to do so. However, the failure of wellarmed police to 'hold the fort' could also be misconstrued by the public as yet another form of incompetence. Some might ask: How can they be expected to protect society at-large if they can't protect their home turf?

It is in fact this restraint and the confidence that justice will be eventually served, versus the immediate desire to get even with the attackers, that will best serve the force in the long run. Police have already gathered enough solid evidence to put at least nine of those responsible where they belong: behind bars. However, it must be done so with complete transparency. And, at the same time, it is equally important that the incident that triggered the riot also be investigated in a transparent way. Otherwise, widespread perceptions that police are 'above the law' will continue to prevail.

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

# **Phuket's new Governor**

### LETTER FROM THE GOVERNOR

IT IS essential that the people of Phuket understand their rights, as well as obey laws and orders. For us to build a harmonious society, we must communicate well and work together.

The recent riot at the Thalang Police Station could not be predicted. However, the heart of the issue was misunderstanding and miscommunication, all driven by social media. Before things became violent, I spoke with the parents of the two men killed and we reached an understanding about what had happened and what would happen. However, those who we were not able to directly address started spreading misinformation through social media.

We thought our work was done, as the families understood what actions would be taken, then the riot broke out. This is the perfect example of people knowing their rights and knowing how to follow orders. I received a direct order from the Minister of Interior to proceed in a way that would not lead to anyone else being seriously injured. This meant that the police who were guarding the building could not fight back. They are human. They have feelings. However, they did what was necessary to avoid any Phuket people being injured.

There are a number of large tasks for me to tackle during my time here as Governor, and this is just one of many serious situations that requires my attention. Once my role in this is finished, I will start tackling

other problems. However, I've yet to decided what is at the top of the list, as I have a number of projects that were handed over to me by the former governor, as well as policies that I was working on when I was a vice governor here.

No matter what projects I decide to start with, I can't do it alone. It is necessary to have a strong team and the support of the island so that we can work together to move forward.

For the moment, there are at least beach management and jet-ski rules, so I am happy to leave those for the time being. I not only want to push forward the policies presented by the central government, but also those ideas from local government offices, as we all work together for a better future.

There is no need to stick to the same routine. I am hoping that people will put forward creative and interesting ideas on how to boost tourism on the island and fix the issues we are facing. This type of creativity is what the central government

wants to see.

The core issue of almost all of the problems on the island is that too many people only want to take from Phuket, and are not willing to give back.

Simply being considerate of those around you and the rules set in place is a way to give back to the island. For example, if a person sees a curb painted red and white, they know it means no parking. But they break the rule anyway, because it interferes with what they want. They don't care about how their selfish action will affect others living in this society with them. We see the same kind of mentality from those making dangerous uturns in front of the Darasamuth underpass. The list goes on forever.

Every society has bad and good people. However, we must come together and follow the rules so those that break them feel like outsiders to our society and realize that their actions are not normal or permissible on Phuket.

## **Neolithic bouncers**

The story of the five bouncers brutally beating the Australian tourists would not have made international news if it had happened in Glasgow, London or New York City. However, it happened on the paradise island of Phuket at about the same time that the central government has made it clear that tourism is the most important source of revenue for Thailand.

To add to their poor judgment and brutishness, the bouncers are mentally better equipped for the Neolithic period rather than for the modern world, where publicly beating men to the ground in front of a crowd of people with video cameras, Facebook and YouTube access

However, there is no way to prevent such incidents from eventually reoccurring – every bouncer has a tipping point – so it is up to citizen journalists to collect evidence and spread the word. Hopefully, next time - and there will be a next time - the victims will have enough faith in Thailand's police to seek justice.

### What do I do if I leave something on the songtaew?

IF I forgot something on a songtaew, am I able to get it back? Is there a lost and found somewhere? Who would I contact?

Sudarat Choothong of the **Phuket Provincial Adminis**tration Organization (PPAO) replies:

The pink Pho Thong (songtaew) is under the responsibility of the PPAO. If you have lost something or left an item on a *songtaew*, you can call us at 076-210 806, Monday through Friday, 8:30am to 4:30pm, except on public holidavs.

It is helpful if you can remember the details of your route and the exact time you were on the *songtaew*, as well as details of the items lost. We will then contact the driver of that specific route to look for your items.

We can not guarantee that we will find your things, as there are many other passengers on the bus. However, we will do our best to look for them.

In cases where we find lost items, they are sent to the transportation division of the PPAO located near the PPAO Hospital in Koh Sireh. This is where you would be able to collect your things, should they be found.

We recommend that you have a person who can speak Thai to help you when you call us.

## Asset trade discussed by SET, BOT

SATHIT Limpongpan, chairman of the Stock Exchange of Thailand, said that he would meet with the new governor of the Bank of Thailand, Veerathai Santiprabhob, in the coming weeks to discuss allowing investors to trade Thai assets in currencies besides the baht, such as the US dollar or Chinese yuan, to help expand the SET's market capitalization.

One of the remaining challenges for the bourse is to beat Bursa Malaysia (MYX) and Singapore Exchange (SGX) in market cap by encouraging more foreign companies and state-owned enterprises (SOEs) to go public, Mr Sathit said.

The SET has one of the most reliable transaction and clearing systems in the region with wellbalanced investor types and a risk-management system in place, Mr Sathit said. Its average daily turnover of 46 billion baht means that it is the most liquid in Asean, but its market cap is still far behind SGX.

Mr Sathit's two-year term as SET chairman ended on September 5 but he is staying on until the appointment of the new chairman at the next meeting of the committee of the Securities and Exchange Commission, which is expected to be held before the end of this month. – *The Nation* 

# Gold glitters amid economic woes

GOLD is such a different asset class that it can really be very confusing thinking about it. As I write, gold is forming a classic technical trading pattern known as a symmetrical triangle, which makes it an interesting time to talk about it.

These consolidation patterns usually result in a big move one way or the other, but let me be clear that even a technical breakout to the upside wouldn't necessarily mean this is a good time to invest. It could simply be a retracement before another big decline.

What has made gold potentially interesting again is that with the fall of the Chinese market and delay in US interest rates being raised by the Fed, there is a potential scenario that could be good for gold if things in the world economy take a turn for the worse. This is a big 'if' of course, and there is still plenty of downside risk for the precious metal. As Warren Buffet likes to point out, gold is a useless shiny rock that produces no cash-flow and thus cannot be valued using traditional cash-flow analysis. Its value is derived from perception, which makes it a lot of fun to discuss, but not so much fun to predict.

However, looking back at past price action can give us a guide to the types of events that typically influence our perception of the metal and thus drives the demand, which in turn effects the price direction. Stock markets and the gold price have both crashed simultaneously before, so in terms of gold being a pure safe haven you cannot be so assured.

However, it has done very well before periods of inflation, which is most directly caused by money printing. If the world economy does head for the gutters, with interest rates so low, printing is pretty much the only tool left to major central banks.

The efficient markets theory states that current market expectations are generally built into the price of assets, and this is the only part of that theory that I tend to agree with. Market participants had been mainly expecting a gradual increase in interest rates, or a tightening of the money supply, which is generally not good for gold. However, this is based on the assumption that a recession is not imminent, but rather a continuation of the recovery. This is where things have the potential to get interesting for gold.

If the recent sell-off in China is an indicator of what's in store for the global economy, there could be some printing coming that is not yet expected. Economic numbers can go from mediocre to bad to horrible very quickly and become a selffulfilling prophesy as everyone throughout the supply chain begins to slow down their activity in anticipation of worse conditions and the wealth effect causes households to spend less. This would be the perfect storm that could lead to a new shiny day for gold.

Of course there are a lot of assumptions underlying this

possibility, but if things begin to look worse it may be a good idea to begin watching gold again and seeing how it reacts. If a major crash does come, easing into gold may not be a bad bet with a small portion of a portfolio. I surely wouldn't be buying in now, but I will be watching it with increased interest if things get worse.

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## Analysts confident 4G licences will go ahead

MARKET analysts believe that the auctions of fourth-generation telecom licences are highly likely to take place as scheduled this year, though there is still some concern about a possible legal challenge.

Sukit Udomsirikul, managing director of Maybank Kim Eng Securities (Thailand), said investors had high hopes of seeing the auctions, especially for the 1,800-megahertz spectrum.

They might wait to see when the auction of 900MHz licences will take place. But in general the market believes the auctions of both spectra will be held, Mr Sukit said as one of the panelists at a seminar at the Stock Exchange of Thailand on 4G and its effects on the Thai economy, cohosted by the National Broadcasting and Telecommunications Commission and the Money Channel.

Waraporn Wiboonkanarak, senior vice president of KT Zmico Securities, said many believed the auctions would happen but might not feel 100 per cent certain, as the spectra to be sold off had been held by the state telecom agencies.

Ms Waraporn believes that it is highly possible that the 1,800MHz licences will be auctioned, while in the case of the 900MHz licences, people would have to wait to see if TOT would mount a legal challenge against the auction.

Pisut Ngamvijitvong, vice president for research of CIMB Securities (Thailand), said foreign investors were waiting for certainty on whether the auctions would definitely take place.

# CFA Cat Hospital first of its kind

AFTER many people asking for it, and rumors abounding of how it will work, it is finally here: Facebook has announced a trial in Ireland and Spain for a new series of emoji called 'Reactions".

Users now have the choice to rate posts with a 'like', 'love', 'haha', 'yay', 'wow', 'sad' or 'angry' emotive. Very similar to the emoji responses readers of the *Gazette Online* are able to use at the bottom of every story.

The idea is that we can give a more opinionated response to what people are posting. It looks like the 'sad' and 'angry' buttons are as close as we are going to get to the 'dislike' button that people have been desperately wanting for ages.

Still its early stages, this new system will eventually be rolled out globally. But for the time being, it is only available in these initial markets, as Facebook believes they are the best test markets for the system. Interestingly, from a market-

ing perspective, it seems that Facebook hasn't quite worked out how it is going to rate these, as currently they are all bundled in as a 'like' for ad tracking purposes. However, a more detailed breakdown will be given in the advertiser's insights tab – so you will be able to see the impact it is having on your audience and its costs.

This will pose a new challenge to marketers, as now when they boost a post it will be necessary to weigh up the possible consequences of getting a negative consumer response.

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

# **Importance of earth on Earth**

### Keep It Green By Patrick Campbell

SOIL is one of the essential constituents of our aptly named Planet Earth. Essential for plant growth, it has been recently estimated that one square meter of the stuff contains 2,000 different species, as well as bottling up massive amounts of potentially harmful carbon dioxide – which plants are able quietly to dispose of. Even more extraordinary, a mere pinch of top soil contains billions of bacteria. No one knows precisely what most of these microorganisms do, since most research into matters ecological has concentrated on things above ground.

But we do know a few facts. Top soil consists of four elements: mineral matter, organic matter, air and water. The min-

eral constituents are the result of the eons-long breakdown of rock into tiny particles of sand, silt and clay. The organic element is derived from the much more rapid decomposition of organic material such as fallen leaves, much of which is consumed by detritivores such as earthworms and converted into valuable humus.

Air and water inhabit the spaces between the fragments of soil. They are both essential for plant roots. Too much compaction, which is especially common with clay-based soils, will close most of these spaces, with the result that the earth will become sour and sodden with too much water, or stifling from lack of air. Most roots grow in this uppermost layer which is biologically active and is directly affected by weather. Improving it has the most beneficial impact on plant health. Phuket's soil is, in any event, less than ideal. True, we mostly position our gardens in lowlying areas and mountain valleys where the top soil is theoretically more plentiful than on hillsides, where weathering and erosion has caused the underlying granite to become exposed, leaving very little tillable earth.

The ideal soil for your garden is loam, which is mostly composed of top soil. It contains sufficient air spaces for healthy roots and enough organic material to encourage growth.

## Documentary follows young Thais with Down syndrome

THEY'VE drawn embarrassed stares, looks of pity or simply been ignored, but now the lives of youngsters born with the genetic disorder trisomy 21, or Down syndrome, are coming into the spotlight and for all the right reasons.

Sutthiphot 'Bank' Kanoknak, Kamonporn 'Pan' Vachiramon, twins Onnipa 'Orm' and Atiya 'Un' Kanjanasiri and Sirinluck 'Beer' Chalat, all in their 20s, are the main characters in *The Down*. The documentary, which follows the lives of all five over the course of a year, is directed and produced by Wongthanong Chainarongsingha, founder of A Day magazine and the managing director of A Day Poets Publishing group.

Mr Wongthanong, who narrates the documentary, says that he was inspired to make the film during a visit to Italy.

"I saw many people with Down's and was impressed by how they were simply part of society. No one paid them particular attention. There was none of the giggles behind hands that we so often observe here in Thailand," he says.

Part of the problem, he continues, is that Thais tend to know very little about people who are different from them. "We are very insular. We stick to our circle of friends, those with whom we share similar interests, lifestyle or social status. When we do venture out of our cocoon, it is to pander to those who have higher status in the hope it will bring us some benefit.

"Those who have a lower status than us, we automatically push away. They include people with special needs as well as workers from neighboring countries. It's not just prejudice but ignorance about those who do not interest us," Mr Wongthanong says.

*Ocean Emerald* is the first of what the government hope will be many more, but so far

Phuket (and Thailand's) charter industry is still an unpolished gem. It promotes the best of what Phuket and Thailand is all about, leaves a minimal environmental footprint (at least compared to other tourism activities), yet apart from the odd Tourism Authority of Thailand overseas exhibition presence, roadshow or photo in a brochure, it gets scant attention.

It's time for change. It's time for a more holistic look at the country's marine industry. If the powers-that-be did, I think they would be pleasantly surprised at what they saw.

# Welcome to wild west of cliches

### BOOKS By James Eckardt

THERE was a time, for about three decades in the middle of the last century, when Westerns were the predominant form of American entertainment. Books, magazines, movies and television shows were all devoted to tales of the Old West. Cowboy writer Louis L'Amour was the country's bestselling author, and even the great Elmore Leonard got his start writing pulp Westerns.

Along the way, some real literature was created: *Lonesome Dove* by Larry McMurtry, *Blood Meridian* by Cormac McCarthy and *True Grit* by Charles Portis. The latest candidate for this kind of immortality is Robert Bausch's *Far as the Eye Can See* (Bloomsbury, New York, 2015, 307pp).

Alas, it doesn't even come close to raising the bar. While the aforementioned novelists fully inhabited their 19<sup>th</sup> century characters, Bausch remains stubbornly apart, a sentimental 21<sup>st</sup> century voice of political correctness – showy reverence for nature and the American Indian – despite a stab at ungrammatical narration. The plot is contrived, the characters shallow, the

philosophizing lame.

The narrator is Bobby Hale who had made a living during the Civil War by collecting recruitment bonuses, deserting, and then claiming a new bonus under a new bogus name. He did this seven times. Nevertheless, he did get caught up in some battles – Fredericksburg, Chickamauga, Spotsylvania – and acquitted himself well.

After the war, in 1869, he joins a wagon train going west, equipped with a fast mare named Cricket and an Evans repeating rifle with a magazine of 34 bullets. His vague idea is to find land and a wife in Oregon or California. Instead, he wanders off hunting and trapping in 'the paradise' of the Rocky Mountains with a giant Crow Scout named Big Tree. "I've said it before and I'll say it again, there wasn't never a man more free on earth than an Indian," Hale observes.

In line with every cliche, Big Tree is both magnificent and silent. In any event, after five years in the wilderness, Hale never picks up any Indian language. He does acquire an Indian bride, a tall Sioux named Morning Breeze, but she runs off with Big Tree, leaving Hale to return to white civilization in Bozeman, Montana.

Here he winters in a covered wagon with two sisters, Eveline and Christine Barkley. He becomes informally betrothed to Eveline before going off to scout for the US cavalry in Yellowstone Valley. This is in the spring of 1876, just before Custer's Last Stand. Hale promises to return to Eveline in June. Instead, through more improbable plot contrivances, he winds up fleeing both the Indians and the cavalry. He shoots a stalking Indian only to find his victim is a half-white woman named Ink, captured by the Sioux at age 16 and fleeing her warrior husband of five years, named Hump.

As Ink is recuperating from her wounds, Hale gives her this phony little speech: "I been where most folks never go. I seen what most folks never seen. I fought in battles... I foraged and roamed the countryside like a wild animal with other wild animals. I know what I'm doing."

Hale and Ink head for the Fort Buford in North Dakota where Ink's white father was last seen. In their wanderings, they adopt a cute little Cheyenne orphan boy, Little Fox. They sleep by day and travel by night, afraid of the relentless Hump, but it is a group of white renegades who rape and abduct Ink, leading her to decide to stick to the Indians, specifically the Nez Perce, who have a reputation for tolerance and peace.

Thus, the novel ends tied in a tidy bow, decorated with more leaden philosophizing. In case this is not enough, the author appends a windy afterword, continuing his lecture on Native Americans 101. The moral is that white men are bad: "They believed that God blessed them in their endeavors... This meant 'civilizing' and 'saving' those who were not of the same belief, and eradicating those who could not accept it."

## Miss Thailand stops traffic

THAILAND has a new national costume – well, at least Miss Thailand Universe Aniporn Chalermburanawong has one.

But you'd look terrific in it too, and judging by the first images we've seen, it's definitely an outfit to consider with Halloween coming up.

Hirunkrit Phatharaboriboonkul has won this year's edition of the costume-design competition with a rig that looks like the front end of a tuk-tuk. The reaction on the social media has been mirthful.

Ms Aniporn won't be wearing hers for trick-or-treating but rather in an attempt to become Miss Universe, Queen of All the Cosmos, when the mother pageant takes place later this year, apparently somewhere in China.

It's a stunner of an outfit, dark blue with gold trim and a nice set of headlights – no, not where you think. Mr Hirunkrit, 35, works for the Culture Ministry, so he's got to show at least some

## Weaker baht boosts market demand

LEADING residential developers are boosting overseas sales of their luxury projects via roadshows and other initiatives, especially in Asian markets such as China, Hong Kong, Singapore, Japan and Taiwan, thanks largely to the baht's depreciation this year.

The unit weakened sharply, from 32.95 per US dollar on January 1 to 36.43 last week.

"We sold units in our two condominium projects under the brand, the Line – in Chatuchak and Sukhumvit 71, worth 1.8 billion baht in total – in the first nine months of the year, due to the baht's weakness," said Uthai Uthai-sangsuk, Sansiri's executive vice president of business development and project development division (high rise).

Most of the company's foreign customers are from Singapore, Hong Kong and Taiwan, with additional business being drummed up by road shows in these key markets.

These buyers, along with plans to enter China by the end of the year, are expected to boost full-year foreign presales to 3 billion baht, Mr Uthai said.

Eastern Star Real Estate is also holding a roadshow for its two condominium projects the Starview on Rama 3 and the Nara 9 on Narathiwat Road via the 'China Real Estate Business Exhibition 2015', which is touring the cities of Chengdu, Chongjin, Kunming and Gulyang during the remainder of the year.

"This is part of our efforts to boost sales in the final quarter, having seen strong demand from foreign buyers following the baht's weakness," said a member of the company's management.

Nuttaphong Kunakornwong, chief executive officer of SC Asset Corp, said that when the baht began to depreciate, it challenged foreign buyers to expand their investment in residential projects in Thailand.

For example, the firm succeeded in selling units in the 900-million-baht Saladaeng One after introducing the project to customers last week. The condominium project does not open to the general public for bookings until May 23.

Last week's interest in the company's latest offering shows that demand for luxury homes is still strong from both foreign and domestic buyers.

# **Protection from property fraud**

### Property Watch Desmond Hughes

RECENTLY a video produced by a global news outlet about property and fraud in Phuket went 'viral'. The video covered serious subject matter, involving people who had been injured and who had their rights violated. However, what many people I spoke to found, was that the presentation of the video, and representation of Phuket was fundamentally unfair. It is good to strike a balance when reporting on the negative aspects of a community.

### TAKE PRECAUTIONS

'It will never happen to me' is a common active or subliminal thought that most humans carry around with them as a method of getting through life without simply freezing all actions and risks under the weight of the potential for things to go wrong.

That said, there are many precautions most of us take in our lives with the usual exceptions to the rule manifesting themselves as prominent incidents.

After we have been burgled or seen others close to us burgled, we remember to lock doors; secure windows, and may even invest in a CCTV and alarm system.

After we have had a bag snatched or pilfered, or a mobile phone taken from the table in front of us, we may start to keep our personal possessions more safe.

Small companies, which become big companies often have to reinvigorate their compliance and anti-fraud measures, exert additional care on cheque signing procedures and review the authority of accountants and auditors.

Similarly, people that think about investing in a new country that has a completely different legal system and culture to the one they are used to, should also take care by applying measures to avoid or at least mitigate the risk of being

bag subjected to fraud.

### **REDUCING RISK**

1. Don't put property you have paid for in somebody else's name

2. Keep title deeds safe. If they get lost, obtain replacements

3. Take out property insurance and make sure you are the named beneficiary. Make sure the value of the property on the policy is kept up to date

4. If your life partner has debt, bear in mind that they will try to pay it off and if they own property they may take out a registered or unregistered loan using the property as collateral 5. Remember that a building

in law is different to land and

therefore security and contracts should address the difference

6. Don't invest your entire life savings in one thing, or one property

7. Keep some money overseas 8. If you don't like your lawyer, or no longer trust your lawyer, appoint a new one. Double-check the previous lawyers work. Don't choose a lawyer based on their fees alone. You get what you pay for is a rule that applies in most situations, although not all.

9. Invest time in understanding the property system; the criminal legal system; the civil justice and court system. Try not to learn about those systems after the event. Understand the waters you swim in. Watch out for the Red Flags.

### **BLAME CULTURE**

A colleague questioned why I ever read the comments sections on social media, news websites and forums and why I sometimes get irritated about the extreme lack of thought and analysis in writing a 'one-liner' about topics that are sometimes of great importance and enormity. I have to say I can't resist scrutinizing and being hungry for the opinion of others as a litmus test of the actively commenting parts of society.

Many express the view that we live in too litigious an environment and that we should learn to settle our differences without wasting years of our lives and others in the courts.

When that line is drawn, a point can be made, and compensation paid. However, if you find yourself a victim of fraud or a bad incident – don't blame everyone – only blame the perpetrators; don't blame 'Phuket'; don't blame every single person working for the government. Don't blame the country you chose to live in. Try and accept some of the blame, for yourself.

## Discounts at House and Condo Show

expected 100,000 visitors at the four-day House and Condo Show.


Meanwhile, Siam Paragon kicked off its own 'Luxury Property Showcase' that will run until October 18.




