YOUTH GANG VIOLENCE IS ON THE RISE'

Gangs of Phuket

■ More than 30 teen gangs high on drugs and packing heat take slice of island

THE justice system's soft handling of criminal youth is at the core of the growing drug-powered gang violence on the island that led to a 15-year-old bystander being gunned down during the final hours of the Phuket Vegetarian Festival last week, explained Phuket City Police Deputy Superintendent Khunnadet Nanongkhai.

Five suspects have already been charged for the murder of Thanakij Sawirum, 15, and the attempted murders of three 14-year-old bystanders who were injured by stray bullets as members of rival gangs *Wan Wai* and *Mac Tim Villa 3* exchanged gunfire.

"Shootings, thefts, drug dealing and violent crimes committed by youth associated with gangs on the island has been steadily on the rise," said Col Khunnadet.

"Fundamentally, the issue is that the courts don't deal out harsh enough punishments to minors, so these criminals get a slap on the wrist and are back out there causing problems. However, the recent increase is also due to social media. Gangs are able to quickly recruit members, set up drug deals, organize times to fight with other gangs and gain fame by boasting about it."

Col Khunnadet explained that his station was making about two gang-related arrests per month. Prior to the widespread use of social media, his officers were rarely having to deal with gang activity at all.

"Now these teens are able to easily purchase homemade firearms online. When they are on drugs with a gun in their hand, they will do whatever they want – this is an incredible risk for society as a whole."


Beach rules to be clear by Nov

Confusion sets in as booze ban comes with discretions

AS IS routine upon introduction of poorly formulated new rules and regulations in Thailand, confusion reigned again on October 23 when a new law dictating an alcohol ban around educational institutions came into effect.

"My initial understanding was that the law would name only universities and technical colleges as 'educational institutions'. This would be better, as many big businesses, such as Central Festival Phuket, would be affected if the ban applied to all 'schools'," said Phuket Excise Office (PEO) Chief Pairuch Kulima. "However, the law that has come into effect does not clarify what constitutes an 'educational institution'. In fact, it doesn't even tell us how wide the no-alcohol buffer zone is."

Lack of any clarity about the definition of 'educational institution' has been at the heart of the issue since the law was approved by Cabinet in July. At the time, the 'booze belt' around educational institutions was set to be 300 meters.

"Because the law only uses [mud-soaked] term 'nearby', it means that enforcement will come down to the

discretion of police officers," said Mr Pairuch in frustration. "Also, the lack of clarity about educational institutions means that it should be applied to all schools, colleges, universities and other places of learning.'

In Phuket, there are 106 primary educational institutions, four technical colleges and two universities, as well as 122 private schools, according to the Phuket Primary Educational Service Office.

"Since we are unclear about how [on earth] to proceed with

enforcing the law, we have yet to take any action," Mr Pairuch

However, as a preemptive measure the provincial government and Phuket Rajabhat University launched a one kilometer (radius) "Campus Safety Zone" last month with the goal of eliminating alcohol and drug use, as well as prostitution and gambling, in the area.

"Rajabhat University's campaign is a pilot project, so relevant officers will be checking in with them next week to see

how successful it has been," Mr Pairuch says. "We will use whatever information they have gathered and look at what can be applied elsewhere on the island."

Mr Pairuch noted that some government officers, apparently in recognition of a high-potential business opportunity, were already discussing the wiggle room available in the new law -- and the possibility of allowing businesses that already have permits to sell alcohol within the (undefined) booze-ban zones to continue to do so.

Two teens wield gun, get busted



The two teens were tracked down at their rental home in Kathu.

POLICE arrested two road-raging teens caught on tape waving an illegal firearm at a fellow driver on the bypass road on October 27.

The video posted on Facebook shows a car quickly overtaking the two teens. However, once the car is past, the teens take off after it with the passenger threatening the car driver with the firearm.

The driver of the car, Veerachon Chuaykhao, filed a complaint with Phuket City Police. Officers were quickly able to track down the 17-yearold suspects, who were identified by officers only as 'Mr A' and 'Mr B'.

Police found the pair at the suspect's rental home in Kathu after tracking down the licence plate number.

The teens were charged for the illegal possession of a firearm and intimidation.

ronmental Crime Suppression Division (NED) officers into four plots of land will dig to the root of the issue and reveal any officials neglecting their duties or acting illegally, says NED Region 5 Deputy Commander Montri Pancharoen.

A one rai plot of land currently occupied by a barbershop on Soi Bangla and a six rai plot on Paradise Beach were the first properties to come under fire during the investigation, which commenced on October 21.

The next day, officials looked into an 805 rai plot of land at Phuket's iconic Promthep Cape and an 11 rai plot in Sapam, confirmed Col Montri.

"At this point, we are just talking with the alleged property owners and collecting the necessary paperwork so that it can all be crosschecked," Col Montri said.

The investigating team includes officers from the Land Department, the Phuket Marine Office, the Tourist Police, Marine Police, Provincial Police, Provincial Hall and other local authorities

"We wanted representatives from all necessary agencies at hand to expedite the process of verifying documents.

Col Montri pointed out that it was still unclear whether or

not anyone was illegally encroaching on public land.

"If the plots are illegally owned, we need to identify which government office is responsible for this. Then, we can investigate why relevant officers neglected their duty or issued illegal land documents," Col Montri said. "We will get the entire system properly cleaned up this time.'

...150 people, have sliced up the island into 'home turfs'.

"There is a gang for nearly every village in Phuket. However, there are eight gangs that are known to be very criminally active," Col Khunnadet said.

Gangs are usually identified by their Facebook group name or the location they are based in, Col Khunnadet explained.

The eight major gangs on the island are: Baan Don (Thalang); Wan Wai (Patong); Sab Soon Mafia Phuket (Wichit); Harm Chaow Lol Kheng (Koh Kaew); Adoi Soi King Kaew, also known as KingKaew (Rassada); Sai Lang Sapan Hin (Sapan Hin, Phuket Town); La Taem (Talad Yai, Phuket Town); and Soom Thai Look (Sapan Ruam, Phuket Town).

Though these gangs bestknown to police for their criminal activity, others, such as Mac Tim Villa 3, which was allegedly part of the Vegetarian Festival shooting, are criminally active.

The gangs are mostly composed of male and female teens 15 to 18 years old, with about 40 per cent of them being female.

GANG ACTIVITY

Police records show that 80 to 90 per cent of the gangs operating on the island are involved with drugs on a daily basis.

Asking to be referred to only as 'Mr Fresh', a 27-year-old former leader of the KingKaew gang in Rassada - who has served nine months in prison for his involvement in a gun battle three years ago - confessed to the Gazette that he supported himself as a member of the gang through selling ya *ice* (crystal methamphetamine) and ya ba (methamphetamine) to younger members.

However, drug and gun dealing is not the primary source of income for most members, explained Col Khunnadet. The most popular way for the teens to get money is by asking their parents for it. Many also turn to theft or even pull guns on secondary students, demanding that they give them money.

'Most members of the groups are still students. They believe that we can take care of them. They feel safe with us,"

explained Mr Fresh. "To get into the gang, the new members have to respect us. Sometimes they will pay for our food, as they believe that we will help them fight members of other gangs.'

Conflicts are usually about girls or being disrespectful, Mr Fresh explained.

"Some gangs are our enemies and some are our friends. As the leader of the gang, I had to sort out the problems created by our members," Mr Fresh said. "If a younger member had a problem, I would talk to the leader of the other group first. If we couldn't solve the problem, we would let them have a fist fight. However, if the problem was still not resolved, we would revert to swords and guns.'

Local gang leaders are revered for their bravery by fellow members. They develop strong reputations for their ability to fight, Mr Fresh explained.


Gang members usually spend their time hanging around their base - Saphan Hin is a very popular area for Phuket's gangs - drinking and waiting for the opportunity to start a fight, Mr Fresh said. Some fights are prearranged on either LINE or Facebook.

"Under the influence of drugs, gang members will zip around the island in packs, usually stirring up trouble with other gangs," Col Khunnadet said. "Drugs are the main reason they get together. Kratom is particularly popular because it's cheap.'

No matter how a fight goes, each conflict between rival gangs feeds into a never-ending cycle of members seeking revenge, Col Khunnadet said.

We were never afraid of the police because we believed we could always escape," Mr Fresh said. However, like the five men arrested for the slaying of Mr Thanakij, the law eventually caught up with Mr

"During my nine months in jail, not one member of the gang came to visit me," he said. "After I was released, I quit the gang. I'm now trying to educate a new generation about staying away from drugs and weapons. I'm not saying they can't still be part of a gang. But they must talk with reason first, and then, if that fails, they can fight it out like men - no guns, no swords."

Police are struggling to rein in gang activity on the island, as they are usually limited to arresting the youths when they are caught in a criminal act.

"Because they are teenagers, it is very difficult for us to secure a search or arrest warrant, despite knowing that they have drugs or weapons in their home," Col Khunnadet said.

"We know the gangs' Facebook pages and other information about their members. They even post videos showing them threatening people with guns, but we cannot do anything until the court gives us permission."

Even when the teens are arrested, the cases against them are sometimes dismissed or they are only given a small fine before being taken to the Juvenile Observation and Protection Center, where their parents can pick them up, Col Khunnadet said.

"The teenagers are never afraid of being arrested because they know the penalties won't be severe. There are many cases where we have to deal with repeat offenders. They don't realize that the law is designed to give them another chance to be good people."

Deputy Phuket Court Chief Judge Boonjuan Panich confirmed to the *Gazette* that it was rare for a judge to sentence a teenager to serve prison time.

"Thai law is designed to protect youth. We believe that they

are too young to fully realize the consequences of their actions. Yes, they did something wrong, but we want them to have a chance to change," Judge Boonjuan said. "Police also have to be careful and ensure that they have enough evidence when they arrest the teens. They can't use handcuffs on them and must inform the legal guardians."

Judge Boonjuan noted that despite the good work being done by police, the real burden of responsibility falls on the shoulders of the parents and educational institutions.

However, the slaying of Mr Thanakij, who was not involved with any of the gangs on the island, set off alarm bells for officers.

A number of measures are being taken to clamp down on

gang violence on the island, explained Phuket Provincial Police Deputy Commander Peerayuth Karajedee.

"Starting next month, the Phuket City Municipality will close Leab Khlong Road at 10pm and Saphan Hin Circle from 12am to 5am to prevent teenagers from gathering at those locations," said Col Peerayuth. "We will also continue setting up daily checkpoints to create a police presence at popular gang locations, as well as check motorbike plate numbers and to see if there are any arrest warrants out for the driver."

Additionally, the Phuket Provincial Police have ordered all local police stations to launch investigations into gangs operating in their areas and to crosscheck their records with other local stations.

Phuket City Police, which have three of the eight most criminally active gangs in their jurisdiction, will begin calling in members of influential gangs, whether or not the youth have committed a crime, to establish a database, explained Col Peerayuth.

"By having their names and addresses, it will be much easier to track them down if they are wanted for criminal activity," he said.

alluring idea, even in 2005. Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura seemed to know it was a pipe dream: "We would need to wait for the government policy to go through the

public hearing process, and for laws to be revised before [this could be built]."

At the October 30, 2005 meeting about Ao Phuket, a number of farflung ideas were tabled with budgets ranging from 130 billion baht to a mere 70 billion. The kicker, of course, was that Phuket would reap the benefits, but 95 per cent to 100 per cent of the investment would come from the private sector.

This weekend, a stroll down to Saphan Hin, past the 153 million baht Indoor Sports Center, to the bay will reveal the sort of surprise that one gets at the end of a M Night Shyamalan movie - after you have already watched *The Sixth Sense* – nothing.

Though the unobstructed bay is beautiful, there is no modern city floating next to Phuket's shore, there is no casino, no grand hotel. In fact, the project

seems to have disappeared from the Phuket agenda faster than the failed 2.6bn-baht Phuket International Convention and Exhibition Center (ICEC). Perhaps we should be checking Chiang Mai for any signs of the fantastical Ao Phuket.

However, the real concern for the island – as it prepared for its first high season following the devastation of the tsunami – was on page three of the October 29-November 4 issue of the Phuket Gazette: Avian Flu.

On September 29, 2005, David Nabarro, the newly appointed Senior United Nations System Coordinator for Avian and Human Influenza, warned the world that an outbreak of avian influenza could kill 5mn to 150mn people, as every drinking discussion's favorite source, Wikipedia.com explained.

With a farmer in Kanchanaburi infecting his son with the disease and then dying, Gov Udomsak was not going to take any chances. He demanded that relevant officials take all precautions, with special attention being given to the illegal practice of cock fighting - just because there wasn't a legal casino in Phuket, didn't mean people weren't gambling.

Since then, Phuket has been fast to act when faced with the potential outbreak of other infectious diseases, such as Middle East Respiratory Syndrome-Coronavirus earlier this year. Protocols are well established, as the island continues to battle any possible threat to the tourism industry, which is increasingly becoming recognized as the entire Kingdom's economic lifeline – with or without a futuristic city floating in the bay.

EVEN now, ten years later, the images for the purposed Ao Phuket look futuristic - more appropriate for Japan, Singapore or South Korea than our island in the Andaman. The plan was to build a mini-city on reclaimed land in the bay off Saphan Hin, complete with hotel, conference hall, international sporting facilities and... wait for it... a casino. Perhaps for as long as people have been dreaming of Phuket's future, the deluge of profits from a casino on this paradise island has made them blind with the glimmer of endless piles of gold.

Just earlier this year, a section of the government was pushing hard to legalize casinos. However, attempts to navigate the rough waters around Gambling Act BE 2478 (1935) left only the wrecked hopes of investors and personally interested government officials.

Crackdown on mafia-style influentials on Thai horizon

THE nationwide crackdown on mafia-style influential figures will be launched as soon as Prime Minister General Prayut Chan-o-cha signs an order to establish a committee to carry out the task, Deputy Prime Minister Prawit Wongsuwan said on October 26.

Gen Prawit said the policy would focus on the suppression of crimes featuring military-grade weapons. He also revealed that the government was considering introducing a law to prohibit the carrying of weapons.

He said mafia-style figures at entertainment venues would also be investigated and, if any military or police personnel were found to be involved, their supervisors would also be held accountable.

Man happily bears weight of devotion


WE ALL have burdens to bear, but rarely can they be so accurately measured in weight as the 109 amulets that a Samut Prakarn man wears around his neck every day.

It is with these more than three kilograms of amulets that 46-year-old Damrong Jeerayuchaiwattana pays his respect to a monk named Luang Phor Khun, reports Sanook.com.

Mr Damrong's feverish praise of the monk comes from a life-saving miracle nearly 20 years ago. It was after receiving an amulet from Luang Phor Khun that he survived a horrendous motorbike accident — something that seemed impossible to survive, he explained.

The man now has about 300 Luang Phor Khun amulets. However, even for him, it is impossible to wear all of them, so he chooses 109 each day to wear.

Mr Damrong isn't phased by the critics who say he wears too many. For him, he is paying the maximum respect to Luang Phor Khun.



Police charge thousands for illegally entering Thailand

MORE than 9,000 foreigners were busted for illegally entering the country – including four wanted by Interpol – during a weeklong police crackdown that finished on October 25.

Police said 9,038 of the 9,265 people arrested – mostly migrants from nearby countries – had been charged with violating the Immigration Act 1979.

Drop charges against Koh Tao migrants, says defence

THE defence team in the Koh Tao murder case called for the Koh Samui Court to consider dismissing charges against Zaw Lin and Wai Phyo (Win Zaw Htun) during their closing statements on October 26.

The team is defending two Myanmar migrant workers accused of killing two British tourists in mid-September last year. The verdict is expected on December 24.

The team said to the court that confessions were gained through torture, no link was shown between the suspects and the alleged murder weapon and the lack of any significant

evidence being presented by the prosecutors connecting the men to the murders.

Hackers target telecom agency

HACKERS have struck the state-run telecommunications agency and published sensitive information, amid uncertainty over the government's plan to establish a single internet gateway for the country.

International hackers group Anonymous gained access to the systems of state-run CAT Telecom on October 22, according to posts on a Twitter account apparently run by the group's members on October 23.

The group has expressed concern that the National Council for Peace and Order still plans to tighten its control over the internet, despite saying earlier that the plan had been shelved.

Baan Tor Phrae wins community forest award

A COMMUNITY forest in Mae Hong Son province has won the top award at a national contest that seeks to encourage locals to conserve forestland.

Baan Tor Phrae community forest was declared Best National Community Forest, beating more than 1,200 others.

Their forest covers 1,170 rai with a rich variety of plants. After several years of rehabilitation, the forest now sports 300 different types of herbs, which earn the community about 30,000 baht every year. Additionally, the villagers are able to generate income from eco-tourism.

ThaiHealth may face new budget restrictions

THREE sections of the Thai

Health Promotion Foundation (ThaiHealth) Act, including the definition of health promotion and budget usage regulations, have been designated for amendment to resolve the management problems within the foundation.

Justice Minister General Paiboon Koomchaya, chairman of the Centre for National Anti-Corruption, said after meeting with ThaiHealth at Government House that the two sides agreed on the need to amend the three sections. They are Section 3, which defines 'health promotion'; Section 10, governing usage of the foundation's annual budget; and Section 18, on the qualifications of ThaiHealth's board members.

Boozing celebs broke the law, says panel

THE Alcoholic Drinks Control Subcommittee has said celebrities and an alcohol brand violated the 2008 Alcohol Control Act when they posted pictures of themselves posing with the brand on social media.

The act forbids the advertising of alcohol, even the display of brand logos and 'enticing' others to drink, and those violating it are subject to a maximum jail term of one year and/or a fine up to 500,000 baht.

The panel's office director, Dr Samarn Futrakul, said on October 26 that evidence relating to the 15 celebrities would be passed onto police and public prosecutors after November 3.



Growing problem

THE tragic shooting of a 15-year-old boy during the closing ceremony of this year's Phuket Vegetarian Festival is yet another indication that Phuket's increasing urbanization is having a dire effect on the cornerstone of any successful society: the family unit.

The ongoing investigation into the shooting of Thanakij Sawirum, who was apparently caught in the cross fire of two rival gangs, also reveals that not only is gang activity prevalent in Phuket, but that authorities' efforts to keep firearms out of the hands of the general public, especially minors, continue to fail abysmally.

Saphan Hin, where the murder took place, has long been the island's hotbed of gang activity. This is hardly surprising. As Phuket's largest public park, it hosts an almost endless series of large public events, from the Songkran water throwing mayhem to motor racing spectacles and many more that attract untold thousands of people from across the island, not to mention visiting tourists.

Responsible parents know the park is relatively safe during daylight hours, but that their children's safety there inevitably falls after dusk. This is especially true for teens and young adults with raging hormones and limited experience in how to control themselves while under the influence.

We respects the religious beliefs of the many island residents who hold as sacred the rites associated with the Vegetarian Festival. But from a more secular perspective, parents will now have to think much longer and harder before allowing their teenage children to join the closing ceremonies of the Vegetarian Festival next year. Having so many people together in so many different psychological states creates the perfect storm for potentially dangerous confrontations to arise.

Yet many of the teens involved in this tragedy were not only there unaccompanied by adults, but riding around in packs on motorbikes, armed with loaded pistols. Though police are actively doing their best, the front line in the battle against gang violence and ensuring children are not caught in the cross fire comes down to parents.

The Vegetarian Festival is meant to be a ritual of communal purification. To allow even a single youth to lose their life in this way is the greatest disrespect we could show to the countless ancestors whose sacrifices bestowed us with the incredible gift of consciousness in this most interesting, yet precarious, time.



Is Neil Woodford a financial genius?

I KNOW this has been written about in other media already, but as this fund and manager have a great track record and I believe we are nearing a sale in stocks, it is a good discussion to review. For those of you who don't know the fund or manager, Neil Woodford ran the Invesco Perpetual Income Fund for 25 years and achieved and average rate of return of over 13 per cent. 1,000 GBP invested when he started would be worth more than 25,000 GBP today.

He has recently left the fund and opened his own, vowing to continue the exact same strategy upon which he built his success. His successor at the old fund is Mark Barnett, a former colleague who also has a successful track record, but with less experience. On the one hand, Invesco is a big institution and that helps investors feel safe. I personally have been burned on specialist funds enough by now to prefer the big name fund houses, yet the 25-year track record does speak for itself.

For international investors, it may be difficult to access the new fund on some of the international platforms, but a direct investment may be an option for

those who simply love the manager. In my opinion though, the statistics quoted are a little bit deceiving as they ignore the impact timing would have on the results of investing with either manager. As so many academic studies have shown, asset allocation is far more important than individual security selection. I will explain this in simple terms next, but in my opinion it isn't so important which manager you choose.

If you invested with either manager right before the last of the two big crashes, guess what? Your performance to date would be abysmal. If you bought either manager at the bottom after the last crash, your performance would be way above average. Do you see the picture? In the end you could have dollar cost averaged, for example putting 1,000 pounds per month into either fund, and made an ex-

tremely nice return over the last decades. Or you could have waited for a crash but missed the bottom significantly, and still done extremely well. This matters far more than which fund within an asset class you invest in.

So how will you know when it is a good time to invest in either of these funds? The answer lies in the overall valuation of the developed world's stock markets, and the S&P 500 is the most watched index by most traders even though the funds we are discussing would be investing in FTSE-based stocks. I would set a target on the price to earnings ratio of the S&P 500 at something like 12 to start nibbling (say 20 per cent or so of a position you hope to build from your cash holdings), and go in heavy when it dips below a P/E of 10. Historically you would have never gone wrong buying at these valuations even if you were still off the absolute bottom a little.

This strategy is good because a bull market always ends with valuations over 20, meaning even if corporate profits stagnated, which they never do over the medium term, you will likely double your money in the next bull market. The last few bulls have gone on to silly valuations, but setting a target to sell say half when the 20 level is reached and then scaling out at levels like 25 or 30 would have never steered you wrong.

Vanich Farm promotes agritourism

THOUGH agricultural tourism hasn't really developed enough fruits to make it a serious market segment on the island, that hasn't stopped the government push for exploring yet another avenue for potential profits.

In 2014, then-Phuket Governor Maitri Inthusut threw his weight behind elephants, goats and pineapples in the hopes of seeing growth in Phuket

agritourism and its One Tambon One Province (OTOP) products.

Joining those projects, the island's newest agriculturist tourism attraction – an

organic sweetcorn farm – opened its doors at a 45-rai plot of land in Rassada on Sunday.

"There are sheep and rabbits on the farm to entertain tourists. Additionally, visitors will have a chance to plant vegetables, as well as see the agricultural process in the farm's showroom,"

The facility will be a learning center for children and adults to see how the farm-to-table process is achieved, Ms Kobkarn said.

eigners. Children and the elderly will receive a 30 per cent discount.

Battling through the haze

Aussie navigates Phuket waters in paddle against child abuse

AS PART of his battle against child abuse, Damien Rider successfully circumnavigated Phuket on his standup paddle board (SUP) earlier this month, despite the dense Indonesian haze leaving him lost at sea.


Mr Rider, a victim of child abuse, first caught the media's attention with Paddle Against Child Abuse (PACA) when he completed an 800 kilometer prone paddle through the shark infested waters of the Gold Coast to Bondi Beach.

Though not as dramatic as being knocked from his board by a great white shark, Mr Rider faced a number of different challenges as he paddled around Phuket.

"Definitely the most challenging part was absolutely not knowing where to go. When that haze came in, I didn't know what I was aiming for," Mr Rider said.

"The haze was definitely a massive factor. I got lost at sea twice for about an hour. I couldn't see land at all, not at all.

"It was kind of eerie when I was out there, because I'd start hearing these things and the water was making these noises and I was just waiting for some mon-

ster to come out of the mist."

Mr Rider navigated during the trip by going from headland to headland. A single navigational error would more than double the distance paddled as he went around islands on Phuket's calm east coast and was occasionally lured into bays that he then had to paddle back out of.

The community that Mr Rider has found at Phuket Cleanse and in the southern end of Phuket, as well as his own mental space following a newfound pride in himself, set the

stage for a very different game during the paddle.

"It was completely different than my last paddle. Last paddle, there were a lot of hidden demons in my head and emotional baggage that I had to get through," Mr Rider said. "It was good for me to see that all that was gone and my PTSD [post-traumatic stress disorder] was gone. There wasn't one time that I had a negative thought about my past or anything out there.'

Mr Rider's childhood was filled with abuse from the age of six onward. He regularly attempted to flee it: sleeping in rock caves and under jetties - anywhere that he could escape to.

However, during this paddle, his time was eaten up with thoughts on navigation, looking at the stunning landscape as it appeared from behind the haze, listening to the sound of the water on his board and planning on how to ration his water and food.

Over the four days it took Mr Rider to circumnavigate the island, he spent a total of about 26 hours on the board.

"It was a lot easier than I thought it would be. All the training leading up to the event definitely made a difference. And all that's down to Phuket Cleanse making it easy for me,' Mr Rider said.

Now, Mr Rider is hooked on

"I've found that it [Phuket] is a really good base for training for me, or anyone really, especially around Rawai.

"There are a lot of people here for the same reason: to get healthy and train – it's that fit, healthy lifestyle."

Since his arrival on Phuket, Mr Rider has become a role model to many youngsters and adults on the island. During his stay, he has visited a number of schools to talk about his personal experiences with child

"I'm just a regular guy having a go at trying to change a situation that I have experienced. People don't have to paddle all kinds of stupid distances to make a difference," Mr Rider said. "Dedicate something you are passionate about each day to the victims of child abuse. You don't have to announce it. Just start within yourself."






Asia's growing elite begins to set sail



FOLLOWING a successful summer season of boat shows in Europe – Cannes Yachting Festival, Southampton Boat Show, Monaco Yacht Show, Genoa Boat Show and so on – the marine world now turns its attention towards South East Asia.

South East Asia – and Asia as a whole – is seen as the industry's growth engine. The future. It's where marine brands are re-focusing their marketing efforts, opening up new branches and regional offices, and they are targeting the growing middle classes and elite that are developing a taste for the boating lifestyle.

And with this attention comes Asia's boat show season.

Following the Phuket International Boat Show is the newest show on the circuit, the Thailand Yacht Show (11-14 February) at Ao Po Grand Marina. Organized by the people behind the Singapore Yacht Show, the inaugural Show will be held with a strong superyacht charter focus.

Shows will then follow in Singapore (7-10 April), China

(7-10 April and 18-21 June), Hong Kong (29 April - 2 May), Indonesia (30-31 July), all helping to position Asia as the 'new' frontier of the global marine industry.

Even when there is not a show in Phuket, it is still the marine playground of Asia. It's the place where owners come to cruise, or where they base their boats so they benefit from the hundreds of islands surrounding Phuket. Equally appealing are the stunning lifestyle facilities that the island has to offer, which together make Phuket the destination of choice for yachting aficionados in Asia.

Yellow card 'unlikely' to be withdrawn this December

THE European Union is unlikely to revoke the 'yellow card' it issued to Thailand over illegal, unreported, and unregulated (IUU) fishing practices, when it reconsiders the issue in December this year, according to industry sources.

The 28-member EU was earlier supposed to review Thailand's status this month after having given the country six months – since April this year – to solve the IUU problems. However, the review was recently postponed to the end of this year.

Given the various legal and other measures taken by Thai authorities and the time-consuming process of effective implementation, it is likely that the yellow card will stay for another six months, according to sources.

Another scenario is that the

yellow card will be withdrawn in December if the EU is satisfied with the measures taken by Thailand.

Over the past six months, Thai fishery exporters have faced some impacts from enforcement of the stringent rules on fishing practices, resulting in a shortage of raw materials and a slight drop in export sales.

However, the industry is optimistic, expecting the hard work done so far to solve the IUU problems to bear fruit with the removal of the EU yellow card so that business may return to normal soon.

Poj Aramwattananont, president of Thai Frozen Foods Association, said Thai authorities are heading in the right direction and the EU is expected to withdraw the yellow card soon.

See through the Indonesian haze



TWO days ago as I gazed out from my third floor balcony, I could just make out the familiar silhouette of the Mingmongkol Buddha atop the Nakkerd Hills. Today, shrouded in dense haze, it has vanished from view. Inevitably, as the haze has thickened, so the air pollution levels associated with it have climbed. At the time of writing, they are running at 121 micrograms per cubic meter – above safe levels.

You might well ask "Why is it happening?" although a more

pertinent question would be 'Why is it allowed to happen?"

First a few facts.

Every year in parts of Indonesia, notably South, East Sumatra and Riau, fires are deliberately started in order to clear forested land for commercial plantations. Mostly designated for palm oil, they are also used to cultivate trees such as eucalyptus for the paper industry.

The method is simplicity itself: so-called slash and burn - though often the gangs involved don't even bother to slash vegetation or chain-saw the trees, as it is cheaper to light fires, indiscriminately, and often at night. Traditionally this arson was practiced by small farmers. Now as big corporations have got into the act, the whole destructive process has intensified. Vast tracts of land are now involved and the smoke has long since blown across to the neighboring countries of Malaysia and Singapore. Now it has extended to Thailand and even to the Philippines.

Worse, the process is accelerating: As the torched land becomes drier with no trees and roots to retain moisture, it will burn with increased intensity next time around. Add to that the fact that much of the land area consists of peat, which is highly flammable and can burn underground for months, and you have some sense of the magnitude of the problem.

Of course, the haze is an eyesore and an inconvenience, and has led to flight cancellations and school closures. The damage to natural habitats is

probably irreversible and already a number of orangutans have had to be rescued. But for hu-

mans, the health hazard is the overriding concern. Besides minor irritations to eyes and nose, there are more significant health issues. Measured by indices that gauge the particulate matter in haze and its attendant gases - sulfur dioxide, carbon monoxide, nitrogen dioxide and ozone, these toxic constituents can enter deep into the lungs, causing respiratory damage.

What is being done to stop these conflagrations? Clearly all too little and too late. Indonesia's attempts to douse the fires by dumping water and sending in the military to help the firefighters are barely scratching the surface of the problem. Both Indonesia and Malaysia have been seeding rain clouds in an endeavor to induce rain.

But despite the President's

pledge to crack down on the incendiarists, little has happened. Admittedly policing the vast areas of Sumatra is difficult. But there seems to be few effective penalties for illegal burning or for fire damage liability. So far, ten corporations have been named as suspects, not all of them Indonesian. But

where corporations are concerned, you can bet your bottom dollar that corruption and graft are getting in the way of genuine progress.

Ironically, and as if things were not already difficult enough, the haze itself helps to inhibit the heavy tropical rains which, more than anything else, might douse the wildfires.

Developers add to govt stimulus with promotional campaigns

PROPERTY firms are launching promotional campaigns to cash in on demand awakened by the government's stimulus package, including discounts of three to five per cent and free furniture.

Sansiri has launched a 'Now or Never' campaign for its 62 residential projects nationwide. Homes range in price from 1.5 million baht to 40mn baht. The campaign offers discounts of .99 per cent, making the homes even more affordable after the Cabinet approved cutting the residential-transfer fee from two per cent to just 0.01 per cent.

Normally, the company has to pay half of the transfer fee, with the rest paid by the customer. When the Cabinet approved the reduction, Sansiri decided to use this to offer a .99 per cent discount. For example,

The campaign will run from now until November 30.

stimulus package, chief executive officer Chatchart Sitthiphan said.

Pruksa Real Estate launched 'Pruksa Best Buy Moment' on Thursday. The campaign offers special discounts to boost sales in the final quarter of the year.

"We are launching this campaign to support the government's stimulus package to boost the property market in the last quarter of this year," said the company's chief operating officer, Lersak Chuladesa.

He added that the company had already transferred 17,585 residential units from 170 projects nationwide, worth 54.67bn baht. The campaign is part of the company's aim to boost pre-sales above the early estimates of 47bn baht by the end of this year.
